done in the way of improvements or additions to the Asylum for the Insene. This is due largely to a lack of funds for carrying out the more extensive improvements and also to the want of a definite plan for the construction of new buildings and improvements which would ultimately result in a harmonious and useful arrangement. The plans laid out by Mr. Thornton Fitzhugh of Los Angeles, of which the new hospital building is a part, were not considered suited to the needs of the institution in many ways, and it was thought best to defer the addition of the cold storage plant and other buildings until a definite plan could be decided upon. This has not yet been done and we would recommend that a competent architect having knowledge of the needs of such institutions be employed to design a plan for the construction and arrangement of such future additions to the Insane Asylum as may be deemed necessary by the Board from time to time.

During the past year the Superintendent, Dr.

Ketcherside, was forced by press of private business to give up his position in the institution and the Board appointed as his successor, Br. H. K. Beauchamp of Phoenix.

During the past year the population of the Asylum has shown considerable increase, keeping pace very closely with that of the Territorial Prison, and, as in the case of the latter institution, the net daily per capita cost of maintenance has dropped considerably, that for 1910 being \$.5977 and for 1911, \$.4933. This, as in the case of the prison, is due to increased population and the greater amount of supplies consumed from product.

Superintendent Beauchamp, in his report, attached hereto, has made recommendations for certain improvements, all of which the Board of Control endorses most earnestly.

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit the twenty-fourth annual report of the Territorial Asylum for the Insens, for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1911.

Approximately the first belf of this period the management of the institution was under the ferner Superintendent, the remainder under the present.

There were in the Territorial buylum for the Insume on July let, 1910, 368 immates - on July Let, 1911, 370. There were admitted during the year 122. This is an increase of only two during the last year. With this small rate of increase, the Torritory is earing for for more insens than its population varrants. It is not to be inforred that we have a larger native income population than other states, since a study of the nativity exhibits readily shows that we are caping for many insume not natives of this Territory, several of whom have not been within the Territory long enough to octablish a residentship. To illustrate provisely, will cite two cases one a venen, age 46, who was currente to Fheenix from an acatern state: was removed from the train and kept in a hospital for ten days, at the and of this time was committed to this institution. Another ease was a young nea of twenty-cover, committed on the fifth day of his sojourn in the Territory. Others have been ploked up along the redirends too for demonted to tell where they were from, and it is such eases that cesse our number of insene to appear relatively larger for our population than of the states. Of the foreign born, Moxico leads with a

total of thirty, some of whom are proper subjects for deportation.

The exhibit showing the number equitted from each county would lead one to believe that Maricopa County greatly outmusbered the other counties with the number of insene, but several of these were brought by relatives from other counties to Phechia to be committed.

The death rate has been high but is accounted for by the fact that, almost without exacption, the cause of death has been some chronic gilment from which it was hopeless to expect recovery. There has been no suicides or hewicides, but I regret to report the accidental drawing of an insete while swiming in the lake. This patient had been restored mentally and was to have been discharged at an early date. The health of the immates has been all that con be hoped for, and with the exception of two sasss of Chicken Fox there has been no contagious or infectious duseases. So far as I on able to loors, the first suthertic case of Pellegra ever reported in the Torritory was admitted during the month of June. The case, so far as recevery is concerned, is regarded as hepeless. Of the musber discharged mone have been returned. Of those pareled only two have been returned. The discharge rate is higher than for any other similar institutions of which I have may report. Not all the cases discharged were nersal individuals, but they were regarded as hereless and able to care for themselves, and requested to have the opportunity of showing their fitness. Some have returned to their homes and contributed to the support of their families and no course for regret has been had from any discharged estiont.

The not expense for the year is \$65143.60 as compared with 74591.17 for the previous year, and the not daily per capita .4933 as against .5977 for the previous year. The income from the farm was \$12192.35 which is greater than for any former year. May improvements have been made which added to the expense, such as the purchase of

ferming implements, wagons, a modern Chemical Fire Engine, the latest system of filing cases for the office and a complete detailed system of book-keeping. Complete climical records of the immates will be introduced with the ensuing year. In the past the work has been too great for the superintendent, unaided, to keep climical records of the patients, and an assistant that is able to fill them is difficult to secure and retain at the present salary paid. However, the services of a trained psychiatrist has been secured in the person of Dr. G. W. Stephons who has been assistant physician for the past three years at the Eastern Mississippi Insene Mospital. He comes highly recommended and, no doubt, his assistance will contribute anterially for the betterment of the institution.

For the ensuing year, the following estimated expenditures are advisable for the post officient and equipment administration:

There are many botterments mapped out for the future but they cannot be hurried, as it will require time and labor to reach the goal of our mabitions. There is always comething to be constructed and re-
