#### Second Term.

English Literature, Political Economy, History and Philosophy of Ecucation, Virgil.

Essays, &c., during the course.

On completing either of the above courses a corresponding diploma will be given, entitling the holder to teach in the public schools of the Territory.

Students can take an advanced standing by passing an examination in the previous studies of the course, but no one can graduate without attending the school at least 22 weeks.

#### ADMISSION AND TUITION.

For admission to the Junior Class, the following qualifications are requisites:

- 1. AGE. -- Sixteen years.
- 2. CERTIFICATES. -- A valid certificate, Territorial or County, of any grade.
- 3. DIPLOMAS. -- A diploma of graduation from any public Grammar or High School.
- 4. EXAMINATIONS.—Persons desiring to enter, and not having the qualifications required in (2) and (3), will be given such an examination in the common braches as to show that they can be reviewed and completed in the allotted time.

#### TUTTION.

Tuition is free to those who intend to teach in the public schools of the Territory; also to those who are nominated by a member of the legislature. Others are charged \$4.00 per month.

FORM OF DECLARATION (FOR TEACHERS ONLY.)
We, the undersigned, hereby declare
upon honor:

First.—That our purpose in coming to this school is to prepare ourselves to teach. Second.—That it is our present intention to teach in the public schools of Arizona for a reasonable length of time.

#### EXPENSES.

Board can be obtained in private families at from \$5 to \$6 per week. A limited number can board with the family of the Principal.

#### GENERAL INFORMATION.

TEMPE is located near the Salt River in Maricopa County, Central Arizona, nine miles from Phoenix with which it is connected by daily stages. The climate during most of the school year is unexcelled for comfort and salubrity. The methods of instruction are modern and thorough; subjects are studied rather than text books, and the philosophy of things investigated. The school belongs to the people and visitors are welcome at all times. For further information, or to secure teachers, address the Principal.
