





When it rains, stormwater that doesn't soak into the ground starts to flow. This is called RUNOFF. Runoff collects in low, sandy areas called WASHES. The washes carry water to larger rivers. We learned that a desert wash or riverbed can be a dangerous place to play--so be very careful!





Snakes and scorpions often hide under bushes and rocks near washes. Since I don't like to get bit or stung, I don't play in the wash--it isn't safe!






















