
#### **CELEBRATING 2007 ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

- Board approves mission and vision statements and goals for the agency
- Groundbreaking of the Sycamore Transit Station in Mesa
- Two new express bus routes offering bidirectional peak hour service in Glendale/ Phoenix and Surprise/Scottsdale
- Grand opening of East Valley Bus Operations and Maintenance facility in Tempe
- Official opening of the Superstition Springs Park-and-Ride at Power and US 60
- Valley Metro was awarded New Freedom Grants for the East Valley Partners Alternative

Transportation Services Program and the Regional Travel Training Program

- The Regional Paratransit Study is completed after months of review, input, member briefings, workshops and numerous meetings

- The public relations campaign, Find Your Match, began with a proclamation from the Governor and continued with a speed-dating event in Scottsdale on a Valley Metro bus. It netted nearly \$500,000 worth of media and publicity
- The 2007 Valley Bike Month activities generated 3,000,000 impressions and 20 media placements valued at \$74,500
- The "Valley Metro is the Best Way to get from Point A to Point B" advertising campaign received a Spotlight Award by the South West Transit Association
- ValleyMetro.org web site was awarded by More Riders Magazine as one of the best transit web sites in America for attracting riders

- Start-up of new new express bus service from the new Glendale and Chandler park-and-rides
- Start-up of the new Red Mountain express service to downtown Phoenix from Mesa
- Start-up of the Mesa Main Street BRT service begins with the first day of Metro light rail service
- The Strategic Plan provides future direction for the RPTA
- The Valley Metro Identity Plan is implemented

## Gila River Indian Community Helps Fund Chandler Park-and-Ride

handler's Transit Division has received a \$50,000 grant from the Gila River Indian Community to assist with construction of the city's regional park-and-ride facility. The grant, which is funded from state-shared gaming revenues, will help with the construction of the new commuter facility located on a 10-acre site at the southwest corner of Germann Road and Hamilton Street adjacent to Chandler's Tumbleweed Park.



The facility will have approximately 450 parking spaces to support the regional bus system, carpooling and vanpooling. New bus service to downtown Phoenix and the Scottsdale Airpark will serve the park-and-ride, which is funded by the Regional Transportation Plan's Proposition 400. Opening in July 2008, the park-and-ride will serve residents of Chandler and neighboring communities, including the Gila River Indian Community.

## More Chandler Residents On-board For Transit

City has increased ridership, facilities

Bus ridership in Chandler is expected to break records with an anticipated 690,000 passenger boardings between July 2007 and June 2008, which is an increase of 52 percent from three years ago. Eight bus routes, including two commuter express routes, currently serve Chandler providing a total of 704,600 miles of annual transit service.

Recent service changes include the expansions of Route 72 on Rural Road and Route 156 on Chandler Boulevard. During that time the number of bus trips have doubled, the hours of operation have expanded, and weekend service was added. Adding to passenger convenience, Chandler has installed 29 new bus shelters and constructed 16 bus pullouts since 2004.

## Phoenix's Police Transit Bureau Aids Riders Graffiti reduction, on-board behavior targets of enforcement

he Phoenix Public Transit Department has been working to provide safer trips for bus riders in Phoenix through the creation of the Phoenix Police Department Transit Bureau. Funded by the Public Transit Department the bureau, now in its second year of operation, provides transit-focused security at facilities like park-and-rides, bus stops and maintenance centers. Bureau staff also tackle issues onboard buses operated by the city of Phoenix.

Currently, the Police Transit Bureau has more than 60 employees, including sworn police offers, municipal guards and police assistants, which are non-sworn uniformed police employees. Led by Commander Louis Tovar, the bureau is focus-

ing particular attention on graffiti crimes, which is an important quality-oflife issue for bus riders that also can cost taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars in rehabilitation expenses. Police officers and police assistants are also taking extra measures to maintain transit security using surprise checks and undercover work.

for passengers.

"By creating a police bureau dedicated to transit, our men and women can learn much more about challenges facing our bus operators and facility managers," noted Tovar. "It gives us an extra boost in combating crimes like vandalism and assault where preventative measures can help diffuse a situation."

## **Bus Riders: Catch the Changes in Service**

On January 28, service was added or changed to give riders better options for traveling in the Valley.

- Introduced two new city of Phoenix neighborhood circulators: Desert Ridge Area Revolving Transport (DART) and Deer Run (Deer Valley)
- Added new RAPID trips on existing routes
- Extended ALEX neighborhood circulator to 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue
- Extended hours of service from 5 a.m. to midnight on routes 8, 10, 15, 43 and 77
- Introduced Route 17A on McDowell from 75<sup>th</sup> Avenue to Litchfield Road
- Changed routing on Glendale's GUS 1 and GUS 2

- Changed Route 70 with select trips serving Glendale Park-and-Ride and all trips serving South Mountain Community College on 24<sup>th</sup> Street
- Adjusted Route 573 to serve the Glendale Parkand-Ride and trip times are revised for the first two morning trips departing Phoenix
- Adjusted two morning trips on Route 572 to allow transferring to the Route 573 at Arrowhead Towne Center
- Changed all trip times on the Route 660 to accommodate travelers between Arrowhead Towne Center, Surprise and Wickenburg

# Heed as you proceed on Washington Street

id you know that a light rail train traveling 35 miles-per-hour has a stopping distance of 200 feet? That's almost two-thirds the length of a football field. Motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians on Washington Street must take care to follow all traffic signals to stay safe.

Instead of using police officers to guide traffic at intersections during testing, METRO is using a new, high-tech traffic management system on a one-mile section of Washington Street between 44th Street and Priest Drive.

"The new signal system has been tested and proven to work effectively," said Joe Marie, director of operations and maintenance. "Now it's up to motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians to do their part and obey all traffic signals."

Heed the simple and important rules of light rail safety:

- Obey traffic lights
- Cross only at crosswalks and obey the signals
- Expect a train at any time, from either direction
- Never stop your car on the tracks, never walk, skateboard or bicycle in the track area
- Parents should hold the hands of small children when near light rail tracks
