She had gone to Texas and worked foz severan years, and she used to come In and wonk one weekend, I think, a month at the hospital withus. She was in the school system. I worked and I vent and applied, atter ten years steady in o3, and went to work in the school system.

And we provide them with an emergency caller in theizu apartments and so we maintain a Gine on ai of them and provide them nithemergency care.
