This will be a luncheon (\$1.35) followed by an open forum. We would like each of you to read through the following suggestions carefully, note down your thoughts on the reverse side, bring it with you and help make this a stimulating, informative, and decisive meeting.

The first four suggestions are made by the executive board for your consideration. They are an attempt to answer the question, "How can ASMTA better serve its members."

1- Publish a directory of teacher-members, at no charge to you. This would be put in the hands of the Chamber of Commerces, Music Dealers, etc. so that your names would be available to all interested in private study.

2- Secure Blue Cross and Blue Shield insurance for the members who desire it. These can only be secured through an organization and, since many of you private teachers are not eligible through an employer organization, perhaps we could serve you by getting it through ASMTA.

3- Sponsor a series of recitals on which member-teachers could present pupils. Each teacher, who so desires, would be allotted an equal number of minutes for a nominal fee to cover rent of the hall and printing of the programs.

4- Let the members take a more active part in planning the convention. Bring your suggestions for convention activities to this meeting.

The following statements are taken from your replies to the questionnaire which we mailed to you this spring. They embody many good, thought-provoking ideas--let's discuss them. If you have others which you neglected to call to our attention--now is the time to make them available to us. We feel that each of you can be better served if we consider these answers and act on as many as the group as a whole feels have merit.

There is no official state bulletin for the Arizona State Music Teachers Assn. The Arizona Music Educators Assn. nor the Arizona Instrumental Instructors Assn. So with your help and co-operation we will do our best to include a page each month on news on the MUSIC-FRONT in Arizona.

1. The Contral District of the Arizona State Music Teachers Assa, had their second meeting on Dec. 11th, Mrs. Nadine Dresskell, Vice President of the Central Dist. was in charge. After an excellent luncheon the teachers divided into two groups...piane in one and instrumental and voice in another. Dr. Louise Grant presented an excellent two heur workshop on supplimentary teaching materials suitable for pre-schoel, primary and grades I, II, III & IV. Mrs. Betty Denaldson presented new materials to the other teachers. Mr. Harry Helden assisted in the piane workshop. The meeting was enjoyed by all...annd prefited in many ways. The next meeting of the Central district as ASMTA will be some time in February. The state convention (in Tueson) will be held early April.

2. One of the new projects of the ASMTA is the publishing of a teachor's directory of members of the Central District. This directory will seen be off the press. 

3. Students in the "A" Category who pa in all three areas of the spring auditic will receive honor certificates. Students the "A" category who do not pass in three areas will receive Certificates of Pticipation. Students in the "B" and "C" Ca gories who complete all the requirement for their respective Categories will receive Certificates of Participation.



# CENTRAL DISTRICT RECITALS

### RECOMMENDATIONS PRESENTED AND ADOPTED AT FEBRUARY 1968 MEETING

We recommend that recitals be continued throughout the year except July and August. We estimate that if 50% of Central District teachers present 3 students a year, the recitals will be self-supporting.

### THE RECITALS

Teachers of Central District, ASMTA, may present students.

The recitals are held the second Sunday of each month.

Time -- 4 P.M. Fee -- \$2.00

The recitals should not exceed one hour 30 minutes; one hour 15 minutes is preferable. No less than 9 teachers, no more than 12 teachers are to be represented on each recital.

#### THE RULES

A teacher may present 1 or 2 solo performers, or a solo and/or an ensemble (duet, duo, etc.). Total time for a teacher is 6 minutes which includes entrance to stage, the performance, and the exit from stage.

Solos are to be played from memory.

Ensemble players may use notes.

A student or guest performer may exceed the six minutes if playing an advanced composition such as a complete sonata, a concerto movement, a suite, etc. Permission must be obtained from the chairman to present these longer numbers. Do this well in advance of the program, so that the chairman can keep the program within time limits.

A teacher may play the accompaniment for a concerto or for vocal, string or orchestral numbers, or the second plano part in a duo.

A piano duet should be played only by 2 students.

# GENERAL CHAIRMAN OF DISTRICT RECITALS

The general chairman should line up chairman for the year's recitals, and have this list printed in the District Newsletter. Each month's letter should then give the name of chairman for the following month.

#### THE RECITAL CHAIRMAN

Each chairman should make sure her program is filled. Preferably one month, but at least 2 weeks in advance of the program, she should call teachers to help fill the program if she needs these numbers.

Each chairman should endeavor to have one or more non-piano numbers on her program. This means the chairman should phone string, vocal, and teachers of orchestral instruments and request their cooperation.

The chairman should have America, America The Beautiful, or Star Spangled Banner as the opening number. The teachers whose students play these numbers need not pay a fee, unless the name of the teacher is to be placed on the program. If the teacher wishes to have his or her name on the program for this type of number, the fee is to be paid.

The recital chairman should arrange the program progressively from the simple number to the more advanced.

# CENTRAL DISTRICT RECITALS Page 2 THE RECITAL CHAIRMAN Continued

If a teacher presents two students of widely separated levels, the more advanced student should play later in the program, and the teacher's name may appear twice.

The recital chairman should type the program, checking to be certain all names are included. Check spelling.

The recital chairman should give 2 copies of the printed program to the president for the files. The typed program should reach Mr. Hoff 8 days before the recital.

## RECITAL DAY

The chairman should be at the Hall 30 minutes before the program opens. An assistant should help --staying at the rear of the auditorium and collecting fees. The assistant should direct performers to the front seats and see that someone passes out the programs.

The chairman should stay up front, seating the performers, answering questions, checking off names.

Before the program, the chairman should arrange with someone, preferably a man, to open or close the piano lid as necessary.

The chairman should open the recital promptly, even if there are tardy performers. A short welcome to the recital, an announcement of any changes in the program, a few words of encouragement to the students is all that is needed.

After the program, thank the performers and audience.

#### PARTICIPATING TEACHERS

Decide on the month or months in which you wish to enter students. Notify the chairman of the month as early as you can-one month in advance if possible.

Select good material. Avoid simplified arrangements of great solos. Each composition should be within the students ability to play well. Avoid too difficult numbers. A simple number, well played, is always preferable to a harder one full of stumbles.

The student should be told that it is an Honor to play in a District Recital.

He should be instructed in stage deportment.

He and his parents should understand that they are expected to be on time and to remain for the entire recital.

He should have the opportunity to try out the piano in Harmony House. There is no fee for a brief session, but you will have to pay for an extended practice there. You must call Harmony House to arrange a practice time.

Except for July and August, the Central District met at Harmony House each second Thursday morning of the month. Our District Recitals were also scheduled once each month. There were 29 participants in the Auditions Recital this September.

During the year, 23 members have served on panels which have discussed Christmas materials of proven worth, improvising, recitals, the adult student, value received from spring auditions, making lesson time count, choosing materials, and incentives.

In addition, two members showed interesting slides of their European trip. The Telephone Company showed the film, "Music of Charles Ives." We saw the film demonstration of the Yamaha Music Course. Leslie Rawlings, student from ASU and Arizona collegiate representative to the National Convention, presented obce selections. Dr. Broekema, Head of the Music Department at ASU, spoke on current trends in music teaching, performance, music careers, and public relations. Hazel Griggs, concert pianist and adjudicator spoke on "25 Years of Judging."

In January, Dr. Donald Isaak gave a recital designed particularly for students. However, last year evidenced more parents attending as well.

Fern Nolte Davidson from the College of Idaho conducted a two-day workshop in February.

#### DISTRICT GUIDELINES FOR AUDITIONS OR COMPETITIONS

- I. Teacher Responsibility: application dealling
  - A. Paid-up members of at/least six months standing prior to an audition date may enter students in an audition/competition.
  - B. Each student entered must have been a student of a given teacher at least six months prior to the date of the audition/competition.
  - C. Intermediate (levels 5-7) and advanced (levels 8-12) repertoire may be entered in an audition/competition. No more than <u>six</u> students may be entered by one teacher for both categories combined. In the case of a recital audition (i.e. Honors Recital) teachers are limited to 3 students. Students in school grades 10-12 should enter Advanced auditions regardless of repertoire level.
  - D. Each teacher must abide by, application requirements and deadlines. Mon-compliance will result in disquelifation.
  - E. To avoid disqualification teachers should not identify themselves or their students to the judge(s) at any time.
  - F. Decisions of the judge(s) are final and shall not be questioned.
  - G. Chairpersons of the audition/competition may enter students.
  - H. In the case of a scholarship competition: students entered must have completed school grade 8 by June of the current year to apply for a high school scholarship, and a student must be between grades 6 and 9 to apply for a junior high scholarship.
- II. <u>Student Responsibility</u>
  - A. Only original compositions by serious composers may be entered.
  - B. No xerox copies may be used.
  - C. Preparation: piece(s) must be memorized. Complete mastery, technically and musically is required at auditions/competitions.
  - D. Anonymity: Teachers or students names must not be found on the music. A student will not identify himself (herself) by name. Each student's audition number should be clipped on each piece of music, and a clip should be used to identify a piece within an album.
  - E. A student may not compete for a scholarship in a me competition if he (she) won a scholarship in that grade category given competition the previous year.
  - F. One solo or two contrasting pieces, a sonatina in entirety, or a single movement of a sonata are acceptable audition material. An exception may be 3 or 4 selections from a suite. Pieces prepared must be a minimum of two minutes and no more than eight minutes in length.

- III. Announcement of audition/competition
  - A. Announcements of auditions/competitions should include a statement of <u>purpose</u> and these "District Guidelines".
  - B. Application forms, including the fee amount, should
    - be sent with the announcement and guidelines. Selection of judge(s)
    - A. Competent pianists, who are either college music professors or non-members of A.S.M.T.A. should be chosen to adjudicate. College professors may or may not be members of A.S.M.T.A.
    - B. No judge should be selected to adjudicate the same audition/competition two years in succession.
    - C. The number of judges should be determined by the audition chairpersons.
  - D. A judge should be paid no less than \$25.00.
  - V. Audition/competition environment and conditions
    - A. The order in which students are scheduled to perform shall be determined by chance.
    - B. The judge(s) may sit out of view of contestants if he (she) desires.
    - C. Teacher monitor(s) should be present to meet and assist students at the audition/competition location.
    - D. The piano used should be a grand in good condition.
    - E. Adjudication sheets should be provided for the judge(s) with the student number, composition title(s), composers and length of time(s) filled in ahead of time.
  - VI. Selection of winners

IV.

- A. Prior to the audition/competition the judge(s) should be given a statement of the organization's purpose for the event, i.e. to award scholarships or to select students for a recital of an approximate length.
- B. In the case of duplicate reperioire, the judge will determine the superior performance.
- C. The judge(s) will select the winners:
  - 1. In the case of a competition the judge will decide the order of placement of winners and alternates.
  - 2. In the case of an audition for a recital the judge will determine the pieces to be programmed (identified by student numbers) within an approximate length of time.
- VII. Post-audition/competition guidelines
  - A. Chairperson(s) should notify respective teachers regarding the outcome of the event by the end of the next day after it occurs.
  - B. Completed adjudication sheets should be distributed to the teachers of participating students.
  - C. Teachers of students selected for performance in a recital should instruct their students in stage deportment and appearance, and alert them to wear clothes and shoes they can play in comfortably.
  - D. Chairperson(s) should arrange a time, if possible, for recital participants to try out the recital piano.
- VIII. <u>Chairperson(s)</u> are responsible for ensuring compliance with these guidelines.

- A. To recognize students whose performance is above average and to give them an opportunity to perform in a select group.
- B. To award NAU Summer Music Camp Scholarships to students auditioning.
- II. Function of Chairman
  - A. To act as liason between Central District and the Phoenix Arts Council.

- III. Duties of Chairman and Co-Chairman
  - A. To obtain necessary information from the Phoenix Arts Council concerning the Celebration. (Chairman)
  - B. Obtain recital site.
  - C. Obtain audition site (home of Central District teacher who owns a grand piano). (Chairman)
  - D. Select judge for the auditions. (Chairman)
    - 1. Must have at least B.A. in Music.
    - 2. Judge is paid \$25 for half day or \$50 for full day
    - 3. Judges name should not be announced prior to audition date.
  - E. Select monitor for auditions to usher students in and out and to keep judge on schedule. (Chairman) Co-Chairman
    - Over-see Auditions (C0-Chairman)
      - 1. Accept applications
      - 2. Set up audition schedule
      - 3. Notify teachers of audition times
    - 4. Prepare adjudication sheets
  - G. Publicity (Chairman)
    - 1. Announce audition and recital dates to Central District members at least two months in advance.
    - 2. Put all information, rules and application blanks in September Newsletter.
    - 3. Notify newspapers of recital dates and time.
  - H. Notify teachers of results of adjudication. (Chairman)

I. Arrange recital program and have program sheets printed, (Chairman)

- J. Preside at recital (Chairman and Co-Chairman)
- K. Write necessary thank yous and congratulatory notes. (Chairman)
- L. Submit bills to Central District treasurer. (Chairman)
- M. Set up scholarships. (Chairman)
- N. Arrange for guest artist. (Chairman)

- IV. Date of recital. Set by Phoenix Arts Council.
- v. Scholarships

- 4. Maximum playing time will be ten minutes and must include the cadenza. Cuts may be necessary and this must be done at the discretion of the teacher. Contestants will be stopped after 10 minutes, without exception.

- 6. A copy of the work to be performed must be provided by the contestant for the use of the judges. The copy must be free of personal identification.
- 7. The decision of the judges will be final in all Divisions.

DIVISIONS:

ELEMENTARY: Up through 11 years old The first place winner will receive \$150.00 plus a personal award. Second and third place winners aill receive a personal award. Awards will not be given to the same person more than two times in the same age division. First place winners may win in a given division not more than two times in that same age division.

INTERMEDIATE: Ages 12 through 14 Same as Elementary Division.

ADVANCED: Ages 15 thgouth 18

# 1984-85 DISTRICT GUIDELINES FOR AUDITIONS OR COMPETITIONS

- I. Teacher Responsibility:
  - A. Members may enter students in an audition/competition, provided they have paid their dues.
  - B. Each student entered must have been a student of a given teacher at least six months prior to the date of the audition/competition.
  - C. Intermediate (levels 5-7) and advanced (levels 8-12) repertoire may be entered in an audition/competition. No more than three students may be entered by one teacher for both categories combined. Students in school grades 10-12 should enter advanced auditions regardless of repertoire level.
  - D. Each teacher must abide by application requirements and deadlines. Non-compliance will result in disqualification.
  - E. To avoid disqualification teachers should not identify themselves or their students to the judge (s) at any time.
  - F. Decisions of the judge (s) are final and shall not be questioned.
  - G. Chairpersons of the audition/competition may enter students.
  - H. In the case of a N.A.U. Summer Music Camp Scholarship Competition: students entered must have completed school grade 8 by June of the current year to apply for a high school scholarship, and a student must have completed school grade 6 by June of the current year to apply for a junior high scholarship. In the case of Central District Lesson scholarships, they will be divided between students in grade categories 1-8 and 9-12.
- II. Student Responsibility:
  - A. Only original compositions by serious composers may be entered.
  - B. No xerox copies may be used.
  - C. Preparation: piece (s) must be memorized. Complete mastery, technically and musically is required at auditions/competitions.
  - D. Anonymity: teachers or students names must not be found on the music. A student will not identify himself (herself) by name. Each student's audition number should be clipped on each piece of music, and a clip should be used to identify a piece within an album.
  - E. A student may not compete for a scholarship in a given competition if he (she) won a scholarship in that same grade category in that given competition previously.
  - F. One solo, two contrasting selections or movements or several selections from a suite are acceptable audition material. Students must perform a minimum of 2 minutes and no more than 8 minutes.
- III. Announcement of audition/competition:
  - A. Announcements of auditions/competitions should include a statement of purpose and these "District Guidelines".
  - B. Application forms, including the fee amount, should be sent with the announcement and guidelines.

- IV. Selection of judge (s):
  - A. Competent musicians, who are either college music professors or non-members of A.Ş.M.T.A. should be chosen to adjudicate. College professors may or may not be members of A.S.M.T.A.
  - B. No judge should be selected to adjudicate the same audition/competition two years in succession.
  - C. The number of judges should be determined by the audition chairpersons.
  - D. A judge should be paid no less than \$50.00.
- V. Audition/competition environment and conditions:
  - A. The order in which students are scheduled to perform shall be determined by chance.
  - B. The judge (s) may sit out of view of contestants if he (she) desires.
  - C. Teacher monitor(s) should be present to meet and assist students at the audition/competition location.
  - D. The piano used should be a grand in good condition.
  - E. Adjudication sheets should be provided for the judge(s) with the student number, composition title(s), composers and length of time(s) filled in ahead of time.
- VI. Selection of winners:
  - A. Prior to the audition/competition the judge(s) should be given a statement of the organization's purpose for the event, i.e. to award scholarships or to select students for a recital of an approximate length.
  - B. In the case of duplicate repertoire, the judge will determine the superior performance.
  - C. The judge(s) will select winners:
    - 1. In the case of a competition the judge will decide the order of placement of winners and alternates.
    - In the case of an audition for a recital the judge will determine the pieces to be programmed ( identified by student numbers) within an approximate length of time.
    - In the case of a student auditioning more than one piece, the judge may specify one or more of theppteces to be played in the winner's recital.
- VII. Post-audition/competition guidelines:
  - A. Chairperson(s) should notify respective teachers regarding the outcome of the event by the end of the next day after it occurs.
  - B. Completed adjudication sheets should be distributed to the teachers of participating students.
  - C. Teachers of students selected for performance in a recital should instruct their students in stage deportment and appearance, and alert them to wear clothes and shoes they can play in comfortably.
  - D. Chairperson(s) should arrange a time, if possible, for recital participants to try out the recital piano.
- VIII.Chairperson(s) Responsibilites:
  - A. Chairperson(s) will ensure compliance with these guidelines.
  - B. Chairperson(s) will inform teachers of inappropriate repertoire selections or other errors in category or placement.







### Celebration of the Arts 1986 Comments and Suggestions

- 1. Add up performance time after applications are received, then decide how much time to allow between recitals. Be sure to allow time in between for judges to comment.
- 2. Possibly have preliminary auditions and a finalist recital where the winners are announced. This will depend on how many applications are received. The 1986 enrollment was up over the 1985 enrollment.
- Don't schedule the celebration on the weekend of any major holiday.
- 4. Check into alternate locations. Some possibilities are:
  - a. Sherman Clay near Camelback and the freeway.
  - b. ASU Recital Hall or Music Theater.
  - c. Scottsdale Center for the Arts (could possibly tie in with Arts Festival).

The drawbacks to the Art Museum were that the parents and teachers had to pay, and that we had to bring in another piano which creates extra work for the chairman.

- 5. Personally check the piano to be used, including all the pedals. Be sure the sostenuto pedal is connected.
- 6. We suggest a revised application form as follows. This will save tremendous work for the chairman. The top of the form should include a statement of what scholarships will be awarded, audition date, recital date, and locations. The more impressive the location, the better.



Much has been said about music that is fun. Not enough has been said about music that is interesting to the student at each ability level. Everything doesn't have to be fun. Young people will work to perfect something if it interests them as it becomes more polished. No student puts a real effort on music that is basically uninteresting. Perhaps a bit more time spent in selection of compositions that are both within each child's ability and sound like something when played correctly would stir the individual imagination a bit more. After all, it is a big boast to a student's morale to help him sound as if he plays somewhat better than he actually does. It takes time to pick out piano literature of this type. No one pays the teacher to do it and most of us can "get by" without this effort.

Certainly a driving desire for musical achievement for the student is the only motivation causing the piano teacher to spend the hours necessary in this area. Interesting music is what keeps students at the piano over a long period of time, and that special piece that might prevent another piano student dropout may be in those stacks of new music.



I speak to honor Bea Searles and her dedicated endeavor to further the cause of the ARIZONA STUDY PROGRAM: The ASP has an outbine of specific technical, theoretical and performance goals for each student to accomplish as they progress. These goals are to encourage musical growth that will expend the appreciation and love of music; to encourage a student to strive for a musical excellence that will reward his efforts; to set forth basic goals for students so that they will endeavor to maintain a steady and conscientious standard of effort each year; and not least .... to provide opportunities and challenges for advanced students.

It was Janice McCurnin, Kathryn Pooler, and Dr. Hartzell--all of Tucson--who got the ASP off to a good start. Even after 30 years Janice McCurnin is again at the helm to keep the ASP rolling along. Bea was not on its board at first but was soon elected and served as long as she wanted to, and has had the strength.

Never did Bea object to phone calls relating to ASP. She was always ready to share her knowledge on encouraging musical growth, excellence and appreciation first to the music teachers and to be furthered in their students.

For teachers there was a ties in of reward which then was state accreditation, and after several years was followed up with national accreditation. For our students Bea helped Janice and Kathryn draw up the theory drills which have been revised several times...last time in 1983. when we included the modes to the last 4 drills.

Through the years THE GUIDE TO TEACHING PIANO has been updated again and again. Then National MTNA came out with A Trans - - - + -

.

. . . .

In order to help teachers and their students attain and understand the theory goals, Bea began making available the blue Theory Workbook, the CrissCross Dictionary which later became the Signs and Terms, which by the way has now been revised to cover all 12 levels used presently. She spent many years accumulating facts on piano composers and THE HISTORY OF THE PIANO AND ITS COMPOSERS was published. and updated last fall. To help out with consistency in Theory Terminology I helped along with that book on the first 5 levels so far. All this for "free" to our teachers and their students only for the printing costs plus a few cents for the Central District treasure. I must not forget the DEAR PARENT LETTER which also has been a helpful aid in reminding parents that piano study is a long-time effort.

In June 1964, Dr. Robert Dumm came to Phoenix with a very special workshop for our ASP students and their teachers Using his munor in getting musical points across is his forte yet today. He still publishes a column in KEYBOARD CLASSICS on Finger Fitness. I still have my notes from that workshop and will share a few of his remarks that are so revealing.

In Bach's Musette, Dr. Dumm says Bach's bagpipe goes dow scalewise as a LH bounce, while the RH tune is one that can be whistled. Temperatures loud and soft are like sunshine and shadows, with "p" as a whisper and "ff"s loud and redblooded hot-spots. The piece has design as artists use 3 colors to mix with other colors, Bach uses various rhythms to help keep the music alive and dancing. Harmony colors with sweet consonant chords together with the sour dissonant pickle notes constantly busy. Dr. Dumm then told more about baroque style where sometimes music is like conversation between RH as LH, and sometimes only small talk. Classical style has its rhythms and phrasings and the chords are the orchestra...the

and the bows and curtsies are tied with bow-knots that become the turns and trills. Romantic style music has more salt and pepper notes. Modern music began as early as some Chopin with vibrations in chord changes, melodies of far-awa away hauntings of the wind. Syncopations say "boo" where there is no down-beat but you expect one and held back. Rests are like electric flash bulbs. More pickle-notes like cactus spines carrying a point. I could go on and on. I have found his remarks so very useful in bringing points across to my students.

It has been most interesting for me to go back through my old notes of speakers we have had at our C.D. meetings through these years. And the notes are still just as inform ative today. Thank you, Bea, for giving me htis opportunity to share some of these back-glances with all of you here today.

#### NOTICE TO ALL DISTRICT PRESIDENTS AND HONOR RECITAL CHAIRMEN:

Please review these guidelines carefully before auditions.

#### ASMTA GUIDELINES FOR HONOR RECITALS

#### I. TEACHER RESPONSIBILITY

- A. Members may enter students provided they have paid their dues.
- B. Each student entered must have studied with the current teacher entering
- him/her for at least six months before the local auditions are held.
- C. Teachers may enter THREE students in each category.
- D. A teacher may belong to as many districts as desired, but a student must enter the Honor competition in the District in which that student resides. The teacher must conform to state guidelines for three entries per category overall.
- E. Teachers must abide by application requirements and deadlines. Non-compliance will result in disgualification.
- F. To avoid disqualification teachers should not identify themselves or their students to the judge (s) at any time.
- G. Chairpersons of the audition may enter students.
- H. Application must include complete and accurate names of works to be performed, clearly printed or typed, including opus number and movement designations for each composition, and the duration of the piece(s).
- I. Categories are:

School Grades	Achievement Levels*	Max. Time
Elementary: Grades Pre-School-6	minimum level 3	4 min.
Junior High: Grades 7-9	minimum level 5	6 min.
Senior High: Grades 10-12	minimum level 8	6 min.

#### II. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITY

- A. Only original compositions by <u>composers of renown</u> may be entered.
- B. No photostatic copies may be used.
- C. Preparation: piece (s) must be memorized. Complete mastery, both technically and musically, is required.
- D. Anonymity: teachers' or students' names must not be found on the music. Each student's audition number should be clipped to each piece of music and a clip should be used to identify a piece within an album.
- E. One solo or two contrasting selections or movements are acceptable audition material.

#### III. ANNOUNCEMENT OF AUDITION

- A. Announcement of auditions should include a statement of purpose and a copy of these STATE GUIDELINES.
- B. Application forms, including the district audition fee, will be distributed by districts at or before their first meeting in the fall.
- C. Chairpersons will notify teachers of the judges' decisions no later than the day following the auditions. Chairpersons will report results, not explain them.

#### IV. SELECTION OF JUDGES

- A. Competent musicians, such as college music professors or nationally certified members should be chosen to adjudicate.
- B. No judge should be selected to adjudicate two years in succession.
- C. The recommended number of judges is three.
- D. Payment of judges will be determined by each district.

#### V. AUDITION ENVIRONMENT AND CONDITIONS

- A. The order in which students are scheduled to perform shall be determined by chance.
- B. Teacher monitor (s) should be present to meet and assist students at the audition location.
- C. The piano used should be a grand in good condition and well-tuned.
- D. Adjudication sheets should be provided for the judges and filled in ahead of time with the student's number, composition (including title, opus number and movement tempo designations), composer and performance time.

#### VI. SELECTION OF WINNERS

- A. Prior to the audition the judges should be given a statement of the organization's purpose for the event.
- B. Selections of winners will be based on the students' entire programs, but judges may select a portion of the program to be performed at the recital. Each student should be identified by his/her audition number.


#### VII. POST-AUDITION GUIDELINES

- A. Chairperson (s) should notify all participating teachers regarding the outcome of the event by the end of the day following the event.
- B. Completed adjudication sheets for performance in a recital should be distributed to the teachers of participating students.
  C. Teachers of students selected for performance in a recital should
- C. Teachers of students selected for performance in a recital should instruct their students regarding stage deportment and appearance, and alert them to wear clothes and shoes in which they can play comfortably.

#### VIII. CHAIRPERSON (s) RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. Chairperson (s) will insure compliance with these GUIDELINES.
- B. Chairperson (s) will inform teachers of inappropriate repertoire or other errors in category placement.





# Arizona Study Program

#### 1. WHAT IS THE ARIZONA STUDY PROGRAM?

An organization of Grade Year requirements in music study and an important area of the requirements of the State Association for the accreditation of private music teachers.

#### 2. WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE TEACHER ACCREDITATION?

To recognize excellence in teaching and to give the public a basis for selecting qualified music teachers. State Accreditation is demanding. Many good teachers are not accredited but every accredited teacher is a good teacher.

#### 3. WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE STUDY PRO-GRAM?

To assure the continuing development of the highest quality of all phases of musicianship in student pianists, the establishment of good study habits and concentration which will carry over to all learning situations.

#### 4. WHO SPONSORS THE STUDY PROGRAM?

The Arizona State Music Teachers Association, the Arizona affiliate of Music Teachers National Association.

#### 5. WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR THE PROGRAM?

Students of teachers who are members of A. S. M. T. A.

#### 6. IS THIS AN EASY PROGRAM?

The Program sets the highest standards and is demanding of both teacher and students. There is no place in the Program for either the lazy teacher or the indifferent student.

#### 7. SHOULD MY CHILD ENTER THE PROGRAM?

Yes, if there is a real desire for fine music education on the part of both parent and child and a realization of the student and parent responsibility for adequate lesson preparation.

#### 8. WHY ARE THERE A. B AND C GROUPS?

To make possible a meaningful Program for all students, regardless of wide variation in abilities and work habits.

#### 9. HOW ARE PUPILS GRADED INTO A, B OR C GROUPS?

The private teacher determines the category by the amount of work the student has accomplished during the year.

#### 10. DOES EACH STUDENT STUDY THE SAME MATERIAL?

No. Requirements are very general, allowing the teacher a wide latitude in choice so the selection may be geared to the needs of the individual students.

#### 11. WHY IS IT NECESSARY FOR THE STUDENT TO STUDY THEORY?

The study of music involves more than the mere training of fingers. Just as a study of grammar is necessary to the knowledge of a language, so the study of Theory is necessary and basic to good musicianship.

#### 12. WHY IS THERE A SPRING EVALUATION?

It is an incentive for the student and an impartial check on the work accomplished by the student and teacher during the year. The adjudicator passes or fails the student on his technic and solo work and gives an evaluation. A Study Program adjudication is not just flattery and compliments. Adjudicators are instructed to give careful, detailed and helpful criticism. Each evaluation by adjudicators from the faculties of the Music Departments of our State Universities and Colleges will be a learning experience.

### **RAGTIME-JAZZ FESTIVAL**

Mark your calendars for our Ragtime-Jazz Festival on November 11-12. Plan to attend the concert on Saturday. November 11. Yvonne has submitted some pointers for playing ragtime piano music. Rhythm is what gives ragtime music its distinctive character-the accenting of the usually unaccented part of the beat. This rhythm, known as syncopation, is set to a strict pulse, usually in the left hand. The accent is not strong, but is present. The main concern when playing any ragtime piece is to keep it at an exciting yet comfortable tempo so it doesn't sound rushed or compromised, but interesting to the listener. Technique and accuracy are still very important to a good performance. Go easy on the damper pedal. Ragtime pedaling, although rarely notated, should be done sparingly as ragtime is usually played with more of a staccato touch. Have students listen to themselves. With ragtime, they need to feel the beat "in their bones". Keep the piece melodic, harmonious, haunting yet frolicking, fun and happy. Trust your instincts. Use a metronome. Ragtime music is structured and jazz is usually improvisational.

### VIGNETTE Submitted by Dean Elder

### **EILEEN FLISSLER (1965)**

This excerpt is from Ellen's article in *Music Quarterly* (March, 1965) which reveals a unique humor within the intensity and seriousness of the lessons. Eileen Flissler was one of Madame Vengerova's most gifted students at the Curtis Institute of Music.

"No one who ever had one will ever forget a lesson on Chopin. Let's take, for example, a simple nocturne, the most famous one in E flat Major, *Opus 9*, *no.2*.

"How could you, dear reader, be expected to understand the 200,000 things that could go wrong with that first, tiny measure of music! First, we must establish the correct tempo with the up beat, that first tiny B flat sitting there. How innocent it looks. Little do you know the tears that have been shed over that note. First, it's too loud. Then, it's too soft. Then (by now you're getting careful), it's too slow. Now, we must ascertain why the wrist doesn't move correctly. That note prepares for the next note. "Vot's wrong? Your fingers were frrrozen ven you were a child? Viz vit finger you are playing dot note?' Two more hours of this, we proceed to the next note. You think we had troubles with the first note. Don't be silly! The piece really starts on the second note. We must find the exact pressure for the second note. It must sing. It must set the mood for all of Chopin. How can we go ahead until that's perfect? (By this time you're absolutely positive you'll never go ahead.) The first note was alone in the right hand. On the next note, the left hand joins in. You think the right hand was stupid? Wait until you meet the left hand. That hand, on one note, must establish the key, the harmony, but must not obscure the melody! OK! More tears on your part, more insults to your already demolished ancestors. We are now almost ready to play a whole bar. Wait! We forgot the pedal (pronounced peh-doll). By the time you have gotten two dumb feet to co-ordinate with two impossible hands, all led by that stupid head, you're not fit for much, and you're bound to forget something. Suddenly, the lesson stops. Madam, very quietly, with deathly still-calm patience (the calm immediately preceding the typhoon), says: "Tell me, vot iss your name?' You are convinced something has slipped somewhere, and it could be you! "Excuse me, Madame?' "Viz such a mentality (a favorite expression), I just vondered, since you remember notink, maybe you had an injury to the brain. You know your name?

"Amusing? Try it through the entire piano literature. You will then understand why it took a whole year to prepare two pieces for the student recital at the end of the season."

PURPOSE: To give students the opportunity to be adjudicated performing various movements of a solo and/or duet sonatina/sonata before a judge in a private audition. Each student will receive a written critique and a bronze, silver, or gold medal, or a participant's ribbon. A recital of the Gold Medal winners and awards ceremony will be held the day following the auditions.

#### **ELIGIBILITY:**

- Teachers entering participants must be active members in good standing of PMTA.
- Teachers and students must abide by the *Participation Requirements* and the *Guidelines for all PMTA Events*. Non-compliance will result in disqualification.
- Students entered must have studied with the current teacher at least six (6) months before the registration deadline.
- Teachers may enter any number of students. Chairperson(s) may enter students.

### GENERAL INFORMATION

- Students may register for either a solo audition and/or a duet audition.
- Students are to perform two movements of the same sonatina (or sonatas) from the Required Sonatina Repertoire List NO EXCEPTIONS.
- Students of any age (this would also include adults) may register "FOR EVALUATION ONLY." Students registering "For Evaluation Only" may select from any category; memory is not required; no medals or cash will be awarded.
- · All music is to be the original work of the composer. Transcriptions or arrangements are not allowed.
- All solo sonatina/sonata performances must be memorized with the exception of students registering for evaluation only.
- Duet sonatinas/sonata performances have the option of memorizing or not memorizing. If a score is used, an original (not a copy) must be provided for the judge.
- Repertoire cannot be changed after registration.
- NO COPIES ARE ALLOWED (except for the MTNA approved CD Sheet Music scores). Use of materials copied in any other manner will result in immediate disqualification.
- Bring music to the event. Music should be clipped or marked and each measure numbered.
- Teacher or student name must not be found on music or disclosed at any time.

- All gold medal winners must participate in the Gold Medal Winners' Recital. Failure to do so will result in ineligibility in future festivals.
- Awards will be based on the entire performance. Because of time elements, judges may choose only one movement to be performed in the Gold Medal winners' recital. Choices will be indicated by the judge on the critique form.
- The judge's decision is final.
- Students will be awarded either a gold, silver, or bronze medal, or a participation ribbon. Students registered for evaluation only will receive participant ribbons. Cash awards may be given, depending on availability of funds.
- The following DRESS CODE must be followed at both the audition and the recital; failure to do so will result in immediate disgualification.

Ladies:	Dresses or skirts of adequate length (at least to the knee when seated).
	Pants or pant outfits are not allowed.
	Apparel to be modest and non-revealing; no side slits or spaghetti straps.
Gentlemen:	Dress shirt and tie (suit coat or jacket is recommended but not required).
All:	Dress shoes are required for the auditions and the recital: no sneakers, gym, tennis, or boat shoes; no platform shoes (soles which are greater than one inch.)

### TEACHER RESPONSIBILITIES

- To avoid disgualification, teachers should not identify themselves or their students to the judge at any time.



## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Picture This ...."

The other day I received an e-mail from my sister with the following item of interest:

"Aoccdrnig to a rscheearch at an Elingsh uinervtisy, it deosn't mttaer in what oredr the ltteers in a wrod are, the olny iprmoetnt tihng is that first and last ltteer is at the rghit pclae. The rset can be a toatl mses and you can sitll raed it wouthit porbelm. This is beuseae we do not raed ervey lteter by it slef but the wrod as a wlobe."

Shortly after reading this, I was teaching a student who was struggling with a difficult section. I could tell he was working very hard - - trying to play every aspect of that passage just right. Quite the perfectionist, this child was becoming increasingly frustrated as he labored through that section yet again. He is a hard worker and a very bright child so I knew it wasn't laziness or ineptness that kept him from mastering that passage. I went over the concept of reading ahead and looking for patterns and sequences (for the umpteenth time it seemed). He tried again with only little improvement. Suddenly this e-mail popped into my mind. I brought him a copy and told him to read it. Before long, a big grin appeared as he realized that he understood every word. "You see, you are already doing it. You are able to look beyond each little letter or note and take in the bigger picture. Your brain is wired to work that way - - it's just a matter of belief and trust." We analyzed the chords and patterns in that passage once more, and with renewed confidence he played it again - - almost flawlessly!

Always one to draw a lesson from things, I couldn't help but think how this applies to every one of us. Human nature is such that we are often our own worst enemy. Are we working too hard, trying to read every single note instead of trusting ourselves to see and sense the whole picture? I know I have been guilty of this many times.

So trust yourself. Read the above text box again and remind yourself that you are wired to see beyond each letter - to take in the whole word. So go ahead and step outside your comfort zone - always having faith in the big picture. You might just surprise yourself at how far you can see - and at what a beautiful view it is!

Several new and existing members have committed time and energy to learning more about the program. What started out as six basic workshops (two elementary, two intermediate and two advanced) has mushroomed. Consequently, the project has been extended through March! Theory concepts are discussed at the first session and teachers then have two weeks to complete the workbooks. However, if any selections do not meet the requirements, those selections will be disqualified and the student will automatically be put in the "B" category. If in doubt, submit a program form.
- 3) Janice McCurnin Teacher Enrichment Grant Information and application forms are available in your PMTA yearbook and on the ASMTA web site. Have fun with your Winter/Spring ASP preparations. Although it takes time, it's well worth it!

## **PMTA Roundtable Discussions** Dec. 11, 2003

## **Performance Anxiety** (Moderator: Yonna Meyerowitz)

- 1. Practice slowly from memory. Don't overdo practice on the day of performance.
- 2. Worst case scenario thoughts may help with anxiety.
- 3. Try to focus on the music rather than yourself.
- 4. Rest well before performance.
- 5. BREATHE Before and During performance!
- 6. A teacher's attitude reinforces the students for good or bad.
- 7. Tape yourself.
- 8. Know your work extremely well.
- 9. If student is too anxious for solo, a duet may help.

## **Technique Preparation** (Moderator: Charlene Zundel)

- 1. For proper hand position, technique should be taught by rote.
- 2. Stay upbeat and positive to make technique fun.
- 3. Practice Hanon with creative variations in rhythm, dynamics, articulation, etc.
- 4. To strengthen your fingers, try this challenge: Place thumb on corner of a single sheet of newspaper - then finger crawl until you've turned it into a ball. (Be sure to wash newsprint off hands before playing plano again).

#### **Studio Policies** (Moderator: Marci Harwood)

1. A good policy should include:

All the "business" essentials spelled out precisely - - Studio name and contact info; Length of lessons; Type of lessons (private, group, both); Tuition rates; How and when payment is expected; How and when make-up's are given; Basic studio calendar including weeks of the year you teach; vacations you take, etc.

**Opportunities offered (PMTA** events, Recitals, etc.)

Expectations of the student and parent.

Goals of the teacher

2. Policy enforcement: Make sure to cover all the sticky situations in your policy, then you can always "blame it on the policy" instead of you.

- 3. Be clear about make-up lessons (if given, when given, requirements for - - 24, 48 hr. notice, etc.)
- 4. Offer an exchange list to parents. If they know of a conflict, they can make arrangements to trade times with another student - then notify teacher of the trade.
- 5. Expect students to take lessons seriously, because you do.
- 6. Some teachers have a 2-3 month "getting to know you" or probationary period.
- 7. Have parent and student sign paper saying they have read and agree to your studio policies.
- 8. Make sure to tailor your policy to your specific situation. Don't force yourself to do something that just isn't you.
- 9. Hard-and-fast vs. flexible: To paraphrase Teddy Roosevelt, "Speak loudly, but carry a soft stick!" It's better to be firm in writing and make exceptions on an individual basis, than try to enforce vague policies.

#### **Mental Rejuvenation** (Moderator: Gail Quackenbush)

- 1. Summer break change of scenery.
- 2. Group lessons allow for breaks in your schedule.
- 3. Attend good concerts.
- 4. Study privately continue your education.
- 5. Use different methods to avoid hearing same songs with beginners.
- 6. Take one minute during your student's lesson to play something you are personally working on.
- 7. Awards - Keep students rejuvenated.
- 8. Go to conventions/meetings/workshops.
- 9. Add a new student who is excited about lessons.
- 10. Take care of yourself - diet and exercise.
- 11. Tired of same piece? Listen for different interpretations of the same piece.


## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

## 2004 Fall Celebration (formerly Fall Festival)

This year's celebration is being planned for November 2004 - final dates to be announced. The event for this year is the Rainbow Sonatina Celebration. The Required Repertoire List will be the one used for the 2002 Rainbow Sonatina Festival. This list can be found on pages 21 through 25 of the PMTA Yearbook for 2002-2003. If you need a copy of this list, please call or e-mail Bobbi Stoutenburgh, chairperson. Additional sonatinas may be added to the 2004 list, which will be available after May 20th.

The biggest change for this Rainbow Sonatina Celebration is the addition of three categories:

**Category A:** Student must perform two memorized movements of the same sonatina. Student is eligible for Gold Medal Winners' Recital if a gold is awarded.

**Category B:** Student performs only one memorized movement of a sonatina. Student is NOT eligible for the Gold Medal Winners' Recital, however, a gold medal can be awarded.

**Category C:** Student performs for evaluation only - not memorized. No medals can be awarded - participation ribbon only.

Therefore, sample student registrations would be as follows:

1. Student wants to perform two memorized movements of Clementi Sonatina in C, Op. 36, No. 1. This student wants to be considered for the Gold Medal Winners' Recital. This student would register Class Orange, Category A.

2. Student wants to perform only one memorized movement of Clementi Sonatina in C, Op. 36, No. 1. This student cannot be considered for the Gold Medal Winners' Recital, but could be awarded a Gold, Silver, Bronze Medal, or Participant Ribbon. This student would register Class Orange, Category B.

3. Student wants to perform one or two movements of Clementi Sonatina in C, Op. 36, No. 1, not memorized and for Evaluation Only. This student will receive a participation ribbon only. This student would register Class Orange, Category C.

These changes were made to encourage more students to participate in this event. If you have any questions, please call or e-mail Bobbi Stoutenburgh.



#### CHANGES TO PMTA BYLAWS

In accordance with Article VIII, Section 2 of our bylaws\* and upon recommendation of the PMTA Board of Directors, a committee was formed to revise the existing PMTA bylaws. This committee drew upon the wisdom and expertise of our State Parliamentarian, Sherry Lenich. Additionally, to ensure our local bylaws are harmonious with both State and National, these changes were submitted to a professional parliamentarian, Mr. Dan Newkirk. Mr. Newkirk is the Registered Parliamentarian (referred to as RP in explanatory paragraphs) that ASMTA consulted regarding the recent amendment of their Constitution and bylaws. These changes were reviewed by the PMTA board, resulting in the following recommendations to the general membership. Committee suggested revisions to Article III, Sect. 1; Article IV, Sect. 1, 2, 3, 4, 8; Article XIII, X, XI and Special Rules of Order have been tabled, pending further consideration.

Please compare the current bylaws found on pages 43 - 45 of the yearbook with the revised document enclosed. The general membership will vote on these changes at our February General meeting. The following paragraphs provide explanation and reasoning for each change.

\*Modern usage now spells "bylaw" as one word, in all lower case. This change has been made throughout the document wherever applicable.

## Paragraphs of Explanation

ARTICLE I, Sect. 2: With permission and encouragement from Phyllis Piefer, MTNA president, we adopted National's new Purpose Statement to reflect our support of MTNA, aligning ourselves more fully with their vision.

ARTICLE II, Sect. 1-B: As per board discussion held on this topic, the mandatory \$50 fee for teachers who do not attend a meeting or help on a committee was dropped. It was determined the original reason for instituting this practice was no longer a vital concern. Many members feared it portrayed an unduly harsh image of PMTA. Additionally, justification for the time and human resources required to enforce said policy has not been supported. With the new wording, members are still strongly encouraged to attend meetings and donate their time, particularly if placing students in an event.

ARTICLE II, Sect. 3: RP recommended inserting an official definition of a member "in good standing"

ARTICLE II, Sect. 4: Following RP recommendations, 2 changes in verbiage were made:

1) The word "usually" was added to allow for potential conflicts or contingencies. "... General Membership Meetings of educational and professional value are usually held on the second Thursday of each month..."

2) The corrected sentence "A majority of members present shall constitute a quorum" is used.

ARTICLE IV, Sect. 9: Following advise of RP, the outdated definition of majority as being "50% +1" was changed to "more than half".

ARTICLE V, Sect. 8: Following advise of RP, we list only one parliamentary source, the latest edition of Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised. This source is harmonious with both State and National. Though Sturgis and RROO are similar, there can be inherent conflicts when using different parliamentary authorities.

ARTICLE VI: This article on Parliamentary Authority was inserted. Wording was taken directly from MTNA.

#### PMTA BYLAWS

The Phoenix Music Teachers Association By-Laws are part of the Arizona State Music Teachers Association Constitution. A copy of this Constitution may be found in the annual directory.

#### **ARTICLE I - NAME, PURPOSE AND POLICY**

6

SECTION 1. The NAME of this organization is the PHOENIX MUSIC TEACHERS ASSOCIATION (PMTA), a local association and affiliate of the Arizona State Music Teachers Association and the Music Teachers National Association.

SECTION 2. The PURPOSE of the Phoenix Music Teachers Association, as outlined by MTNA, shall be the advancement of music education, and in specific furtherance thereof:

A. To conduct programs and activities to build a vital musical culture and an enlightened musical public for the benefit and the general welfare of all persons;

B. To ensure that every student shall have access to a balanced, comprehensive, and high quality program of music education;

C. To improve the quality of teaching, research, and scholarship in music;

D. To promote the involvement of persons of all ages in learning music;

E. To foster the utilization of the most effective techniques and resources in music instruction; and,

F. To facilitate the education of music teachers.

SECTION 3. The POLICY of the Phoenix Music Teachers Association is:

A. To cooperate fully with the parent associations: Arizona State Music Teachers Association and Music Teachers National Association;

B. To operate as a nonprofit organization as defined in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and its regulations as they now exist or as they may hereafter be amended and in the event of dissolution, to contribute any remaining funds in the Treasury (after payment of debts) to the ASMTA.

#### **ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP**

SECTION 1. Membership in the Phoenix Music Teachers Association shall be open to any person of business engaged in furthering the purposes of the Association.

A. Membership provides the privileges of participation in all activities of the Association. This includes holding office and voting.

B. When students are registered for any activity sponsored by the Phoenix Music Teachers Association, the teacher is encouraged to assist the association by serving actively on a committee or on a state or local board and attend at least one general membership meeting per membership year.

SECTION 2. The Membership Year is the same as the fiscal year: July 1 to June 30. The student membership year shall be October 1 to September 30.

SECTION 3. The Annual Dues are payable by July 1 of each membership year. The combined Local, State and National dues for each member are billed by and mailed to the Music Teachers National Association. Dues not paid for the current year are delinquent and membership privileges are suspended until dues are paid. A member in good standing is defined as a member whose dues are current.

SECTION 4. General Membership Meetings of educational and professional value are usually held on the second Thursday of each month, September through May, at a location predetermined by the Board of Directors. A majority of members present shall constitute a quorum.

### **ARTICLE III - NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS**

SECTION 1. The Nominating Committee shall consist of three members: the Immediate Past President, a current member of the Board, and a member appointed by the Board. This committee shall recommend a slate of Officers to the membership. This slate will include recommendations biannually for President and President-elect and annually for Vice President of Student Activities, Vice President of Teacher Activities, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer.

SECTION 2. The Nominating Committee will present the slate of recommended Officers at the April membership meeting. Nominations may be made from the floor provided the nominees are present and have consented to serve if elected.

SECTION 3. A majority vote of those present, qualified to vote and voting at the April general membership meeting shall constitute an election.

#### ARTICLE IV - TERMS AND DUTIES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. The BOARD OF DIRECTORS of PMTA shall be the President, President-elect, Vice-President of Student Activities, Vice-President of Teacher Activities, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Immediate Past President, Membership Chair, Performance Plus Chair, Sharing Plus Chair, Vocal Teachers Chair, Celebration of Music Chair, Fall Festival Chair, Music at the Mall Chair, Piano Ensemble Chair, Saturday Recital Series Chair, Scholarship Chair, Honors Recital Chair, and Arizona Study Program Chair. 8

#### SECTION 2. TERMS OF OFFICE:

- A. The President and President-elect are elected for two year terms.
- B. The Vice-President of Student Activities, Vice-President of Teacher Activities, Recording Secretary, and Corresponding Secretary are elected for one year terms and may be reelected for one additional consecutive term.
- C. The Treasurer is elected for a one year term and may succeed herself/himself.
- D. Standing Committee Chairs are appointed by the President.
- E. The Board of Directors is installed at the May general membership meeting.
- F. Three consecutive absences from meetings of the Board of Directors without a valid reason shall be deemed a resignation.

SECTION 3. Any vacancy on the Board of Directors filled during the year shall be approved by the Board of Directors upon recommendation by the President.

SECTION 4. The Board of Directors is responsible for all funds, for the administration and execution of all provisions made in the annual budget, for the day to day conduct of all affairs of the Association, and for the activation of policies and procedures specified in the ASMTA Constitution and PMTA By-Laws. It also has the power to determine the annual membership dues, to transact the general business and to determine the general policies of the Association. Any deletion or addition of PMTA activities shall be subject to the Board of Directors. Furthermore, any change in format in PMTA teacher or student activities shall be subject to Board of Directors' approval.

SECTION 5. The Board of Directors meets two times each year. Other meetings may be called during the year by the President or upon request of not less than a majority of the members of the Board.

SECTION 6. A majority defined as "more than half" of the total membership of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board of Directors. The voting majority shall be a majority of the quorum. Any member holding more than one position will have only one vote.

#### **ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE ELECTED OFFICERS**

SECTION 1. The PRESIDENT is the official representative of the PMTA, presides over all membership and board meetings, is a member of the ASMTA Board of Directors, and may be a member of any committee. The President is Program Chairperson for general membership meetings, initiates communication with the membership, calls any additional board meetings, and appoints Standing Committees and Special Committee Chairpersons. The President shall send copies of an agenda to all Board members in advance of Board meetings and keep a copy of the minutes of Board meetings and all other reports in the President's Notebook.

SECTION 2. The PRESIDENT-ELECT is kept apprised of all organizational business, is prepared to assume all duties of the President in the absence of that officer, and assists the President in planning the monthly programs. The President-Elect will be nominated for President of the Association upon completion of the President's term of office.

SECTION 3. The VICE-PRESIDENT OF STUDENT ACTIVITIES coordinates the duties of chairpersons for student activities.

SECTION 4. The VICE-PRESIDENT OF TEACHER ACTIVITIES coordinates the duties of chairpersons for teacher enrichment program.

SECTION 5. The RECORDING SECRETARY keeps the minutes of all Board meetings (including the roll), sends copies of the minutes to the members of the Board within thirty days after the meetings, and preserves the minutes in a permanent Secretary's Minute Book. The Secretary posts the minutes at the general membership meetings.

SECTION 6. The CORRESPONDING SECRETARY is responsible for any official correspondence in cooperation with the President.

SECTION 7. The TREASURER is responsible for the accounting and disbursement of funds. He/she gives quarterly reports based on the fiscal year to the Board of Directors and posts these reports at all general membership meetings. The Treasurer is responsible for the preparation of the annual report for an audit at the close of the fiscal year and will assist the Board with the budget for the coming year.

SECTION 8. The IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT serves as Chairman of the Nominating Committee and

implements the district election procedures as set forth in Article III. He/She also serves as Parliamentarian according to the latest edition of Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised.

# ARTICLE VI - PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY (This article was added, resulting in different numbering of all ensuing articles)

The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Association's meetings in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the bylaws of the Association and any special rules of order the Association may adopt.

#### ARTICLE VII- STANDING COMMITTEES (formerly Article VI)

Chairpersons of these committees are appointed by the President and are voting members of the Board of Directors. Job Descriptions for these chairpersons are found in the Policies and Procedures Manual.

#### ARTICLE VIII - SPECIAL COMMITTEES (formerly Article VII)

Special Committee Chairpersons are appointed by the President as needed to carry out the business of the Association.

#### ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENTS AND REVISIONS (formerly Article VIII)

SECTION 1. The By-Laws may be amended upon the recommendation of the Board of Directors at a general membership meeting by a two-thirds vote of active members present and voting. Written notice of the proposed amendment must be submitted to the membership one month in advance of the ballot.

SECTION 2. The By-Laws may be revised upon the recommendation of the Board of Directors at a general membership meeting by a majority vote of active members present and voting. Written notice of the proposed revision must be submitted to the membership one month in advance of the ballot.



The advanced workshops will be Oct. 21 and Nov. 18; the intermediate ones will be Jan. 20 and Feb. 17; and the elementary ones will be March 17 and April 21. Please RSVP if you are coming and directions will be sent by email or phone.

The advanced workshops are first since the repertoire takes longer to learn and program forms for advanced students, levels 9-12, are due January 15 instead of March 1. Updated information for advanced students will also be given at that time. The ASP committee will be meeting in September to finalize the suggestions mentioned in the MuslGram.

Also new this year is the Vocal program. Levels 1-3 should be ready by the end of September and Level 4 will be completed by the end of October. If you are interested in learning more about the Vocal program, please contact Joy Baber.

#### STAR AWARD

Did you know that MTNA recognizes the achievements of recent college graduates through the StAR Award and the Studio Teacher Fellowship programs? Over the past seven years more than 400 students have received the StAR Award, which in addition to recognition includes a free one year active membership. Due to the success of the program, this year the award has been extended to include students graduating with an associate degree from community colleges, in addition to those obtaining a bachelor's degree or higher. Students receiving an associate's degree will be recognized with a collegiate membership to help them continue to grow professionally as they continue their music training.

Another new development has been the connection between the &tAQ Award and the &tudio Teacher Fellowship. The fellowship, a \$3,000 grant funded in-part by the Mary&ue Harris Endowment Fund, is presented to the candidate who most clearly demonstrates a strong commitment to the music teaching profession. It is designed to help music teachers develop and enhance their newly established studios. This year all &tAQ Award recipients will be eligible for the fellowship. This honor will be awarded at the 2006 MTNA National Conference in Austin, Texas, March 25–29.

#### **ESSENTIAL SKILLS**

Public school music education programs have a national standard for music education. These standards spell out the importance of arts for the educational well-being of our young people and country. Did you know that MTNA has established a counterpart to these standards for independent and collegiate music teachers? The Essential Skills for Promoting a Lifelong Love of Music and Music Making are an attempt to articulate the most basic skills that, when integrated into lessons, will provide students the tools to enjoy music for the rest of their lives.

These skills include:

- Ability to internalize basic rhythms and pulse
- Ability to read—musical literacy

Ability to perform with physical ease and technical efficiency

- Ability to hear the notes on the page
- Ability to work creatively—improvise, compose, harmonize and play by ear
- Ability to understand basic elements of theory, form harmony, etc.

 Ability to respond to the interpretive elements of the composition to express the emotional character of the music

- Ability to conceptualize and transfer musical ideas
- Ability to work independently and to problem-solve
- Ability to perform comfortably individually and with others in a variety of settings

These skills, as many of you know, have been explored through a series of four articles beginning with the February/March 2005 issue of American Music Teacher and ending with the August/September 2005 issue. They also are available on the website at http://www.mtna.org/essentialskills.htm.



Encouraging your students to achieve a working knowledge with each skill area will empower them to learn independently and develop a lifelong appreciation of music whether or not they become a concert performer. This academic year MTNA challenges each of you to incorporate activities that develop the Essential Skills into your teaching.

Repertoire and Technique workshops will continue with the Intermediate workshops on January 20 and February 17 and Elementary workshops on March 17 and April 21. Teachers are asked to prepare programs (4 pieces) for the slower learner, the average learner, and the accelerated learner in each level. Pieces and technique will be played and teaching ideas shared. This is an excellent time to learn from each other!

General updates for advanced students, effective September 2005, include the advanced repertoire options and the change in the James Anthony Level 12A award. One repertoire option allows advanced students (9-12) to replace ONE of their pieces with a **memorized** group of pieces from a larger work. Pieces must be chosen from the **required list**. This list may be found on the ASMTA web site or you can email or call Bobbi Stoutenburgh. The other option is to use a Bach Prelude **and** Fugue listed in an earlier level. The complete P & F will count as the Baroque piece at the student's level.

The James Anthony Level 12A award will be given to only **high school seniors**. The decision was made to return to Dr. Anthony's original intent that students continue their study throughout high school. Students completing level 12A before or after their senior year will continue to receive a trophy and certificate. The Bullock college scholarship will continue to be awarded only to students who have received the Anthony award. PMTA students receiving the James Anthony 12A award last year were Alyssa Johnson (Sharon Stevens), Lainie Plattner (Carol Hill), Amanda Judd (Evonne Beattie) and Emily Kriegshauser (Rosmary Stelmach. 


The Journey to Certification Continues......



#### ARIZONA STUDY PROGRAM

The 2006 Repertoire Guide was introduced at the state conference and is now available. The guide lists composers from Levels 4-12 in each period. New repertoire suggestions have been included and some levels have been changed. You can still use the repertoire guides in the 1998 Teacher Guides but check with Bobbi Stoutenburgh or myself if you have any questions on levels.

The ASP vocal program will be expanded this year to include Levels 1-5. Please contact Joy Baber for more information.

Grand Canyon University has almost closed their Fine Arts school. Consequently, we will be unable to use their facilities in 2007. Evaluations will be on April 28 and May 4 and 5 but the location is still to be decided.

2005-2006 was another successful year for ASP. There were a total of 213 teachers who entered students, 53 of them being in PMTA. Of the 479 PMTA students enrolled, 445 of them were evaluated. 262 of them received a Superior rating and 49 got 100% on the theory exam. There were 44 Level 4 awards, 16 Level 8 awards, and 8 Level 12 awards. Congratulations to all these students and teachers!



If we as teachers merely stay walled up within our studios and our associations, we will fail in reaching the many, many people who could benefit from exposure to great music and the study of great music. In many ways, the future of great music is in our hands. We must reach out and share this beautiful and glorious art form with everyone that we can reach. Everyone deserves great music in their lives!



This is an exciting time for our association, with the enhancements we are now making to our most publicly visible program, the Teacher Referral Service. To outline the changes, on Nov. 16 the Board voted to approve:

1. Adding a small business phone line, which will include a Yellow Pages and DEX online listing (published in March). The listing will read, "Phoenix Music Teachers Assoc Teacher Referral Service," and the number is 602-404-7068, effective Dec. 1.


2. Combining the two lists (phone and website) into one, which will be available to prospective clients, whether they go online or call the referral number. (For teachers not wanting their contact information published on the website, we will instead list the referral email address and phone number, which site visitors can use to obtain that teacher's contact info.)

So we now have the best of both ways to communicate with the public about finding a teacher! Those who do not have internet access, or who simply prefer talking with someone about finding a teacher, will be able to leave a message for callback on the referral line answering machine, while others who like to go online will be able to see ALL our available teachers pinpointed on a map, with links to pages describing their program and how to contact them. The very low fee of \$25/yr. for this service enables us to have the Yellow Pages listings, plus online advertising. Having a presence in these venues helps not only teachers wanting to grow and maintain their studio, but also increases our association's visibility in the community as a leading organization for music education and enrichment. This can in turn encourage other teachers in the valley to join our association, to be a part of all the wonderful programs we have to offer! The more teachers we have listed, the more we will be able to get the word out about our association.

I encourage all teachers to sign up and put your star on the map, even if you do not want more students (stating, "No openings at the present" on your teacher page). We have much to offer the community, and the Teacher Referral Service is one of the most effective portals between our association and those we wish to serve.

#### MAKE-UP LESSONS


The following is an excerpt from an article written by Vicky Barnham, Ph.D. Entitled "Make-up Music Lessons from an Economist's Point of View". The entire article was shared with me by our members Jennifer Foxx and Angie Prado-Stern.

"Like many parents, I pay in advance for lessons each term. In my mind, what this means is that I have reserved a regular spot in the busy schedules of my sons' teachers. I understand - fully - that if I can't make it to the lesson one week (perhaps my son is sick, or we are away on holiday, or there is some other major event at school) then we will pay for the lesson, but that my teacher is under no obligation to find another spot for me that week, or to refund me for the untaught lesson. And this is the way it should be.

In my 'other life' I am an economist and teach at our local university. Students pay good money to attend classes at the university; but if they don't come to my lecture on a Monday morning, then I am not going to turn around and deliver them a private tutorial on Tuesday afternoon. When I go to the store and buy groceries, I may purchase something that doesn't get used. Days or months later, I end up throwing it out. I don't get a refund from the grocery store for the unused merchandise. If I sign my child up for swimming lessons at the local pool, and she refuses to return after the first lesson, I can't get my money back. So there are lots of situations in our everyday lives where we regularly pay in advance for goods or some service, and if we end up not using what we have purchased, we have to just 'swallow our losses'. On the other hand, if I purchase an item of clothing, and get home and change my mind, I can take it back and expect either a refund or a store credit.

So why do I believe that music lessons fall into the first category of 'non-returnable merchandise', rather than into the second case of 'exchange privileges unlimited' (which I think is one of the advertising slogans of an established women's clothing store!)? Speaking now as an economist, I would claim that the reason is that items like clothing are "durable goods' - meaning, they can be returned and then resold at the original price - whereas music lessons are non-durable goods - meaning, once my Monday slot at 3:30 is gone, my son's teacher can't turn around and sell it again. The only way she would be able to give him a lesson later in the week would be if she were to give up time that she had scheduled for her own private life; and that seems pretty unreasonable - I can't think of many employees who would be thrilled if their bosses were to announce that they couldn't work from 3:30 to 4:30 this afternoon, but would they please stay until 6:30 on Thursday, because there will be work for them then!"





## Honor Recitals Climax Season

The James R. Anthony Honors Recital this past June, as part of the ASMTA Convention in Mesa at the Phoenix Marriott Mesa Hotel, climaxed the 2006-2007 teaching season. The preliminary auditions were held at

the Arizona Piano Company and the finals at ASU. Dr. Raymond Ryder of Tucson chaired these events.

The Primary Division of the preliminary auditions there were five entrants, in Elementary I, ten; Elementary II, ten; Intermediate I, five; Intermediate II (Junior High), twelve; and



Advanced (High School), six. All performed on a Schimmel concert grand. Asa McClellan and Kiyona Bernier of Tuscon and Robert Mills of ASU were the judges. Two each of Dorothy Dungan's, Irene Kuniski and Rosmary Stelmach's pupils advanced to the finals.

In the finals David Pasbrig (a former pupil of Barbara Stoutenburgh played a brilliant recital at the ASTA's Convention), Catherine Fletcher (ASU), and Dean Elder (PMTA) judged the Intermediate I/Advanced Divisions; Stella Saperstein (PMTA), Michael Mazzatenta (ASU), and Sherry Lenich (PMTA) the Elementary I/Intermediate II Divisions; and Christina Eide, Baruch Meier (ASU), and Any O'Brien (ASU) the Primary/Elementary II Divisions.

The judges chose 20 medalists to play in the Honors Recitals on Steinway concert grand at the Marriott Hotel in Mesa. The hall was filled, although PMTA members were conspicuous by their absence. Stirred by their colleague's performances, most of the winners played even better in the recital than they did in the morning auditions. Baruch Meier had five Medalists, Hong Zhu four, Fei Xu three, and Hamilton Tescarollo three. Judith Sandoval-Ferg, Natalya Thran, Kathryn Rood, David Sharpe, and Chase Coleman (Flagstaff) each had one Medalist. PMTA's Rosmary Stelmach's students received two Honorable Mentions and Dorothy Dungan's one.

Teachers who followed and heard these Honors Auditions and recital should be inspired to enter students next year. Even if a teacher has only one or two students who practice sufficiently and want to enter, they should enter – not to win a medal as much as to play their best. Teachers may not have time, teaching 30-70 pupils weekly, to polish pieces. They may have to be satisfied with getting the notes and rhythms correct. Yet perfecting tone, pedaling, phrasing, color, and projection in even one or two pieces will give them and their students' fresh ideas and inspiration. Phoenix Music Teachers need to enter more pupils in the Honors and Celebration auditions.



## Sonatina/Sonata Festival The Big Fall Event

One hundred and thirty-one (131) students played in this year's Rainbow Sonatina/Sonata Festival auditions November 10<sup>th</sup> at Herman & Sons Piano in Scottsdale. Pupils of 32 teachers participated, and to qualify for a Gold Medal with Distinction pupils had to play two movements from memory.


The judges were Natalva Thran, who has M.M. degrees from the State Conservatory in Tashkent and University of Nevada; Ruth Yandell, a scholarship student at Aspen and Fellow at Michigan University Western and piano department coordinator at Mesa Community College; and David Sharpe, who has a D.M.A. in Piano Performance from ASU, is currently a senior examiner for the Royal Conservatory of Music (Toronto) and a publications reviewer for the Frederick Harris Music Co. Rosmarv Stelmach was our experienced Sonatina Festival Chair, helped by her hard-working assistants, Irene Kuniski, Jo Ann Smelser, Pamela Smith, and Barbara Stoutenburgh.

Twenty-eight (28) entrants, pupils of Ashley Bradford, Carolyn Inabinet, Snezana Krstic, Irene Kuniski, Norma Meredith, Ursula Newman, Linda Porter, Angelica Prado-Stern, Genny Rafferty, Stella Saperstein, Georgia Sears, Susan Shiner, Jo Ann Smelser, Rosmary Stelmach, and Barbara Stoutenburgh, received Gold Medals with Distinction and were selected to play in a recital on Saturday, November 17, on a beautiful new Yamaha concert grand in the Herman & Sons Piano recital hall. The hall was filled to overflowing.

Sonatinas and sonatas develop fluency and the ability to keep a steady tempo, and some entrants were adroit in giving first movement themes character, unfolding lyrical second movements, and showing brilliance in final movements. Looking elegant in recital attire, their stage presence was exemplary.

Yet tone and temperament often were lacking. I didn't hear one real *fortissimo*, or *pianissimo* for that matter, in the entire recital. Many did not play melodies with sufficient tone to communicate and project, and thumped out accompaniment figures. Teachers who had Gold, Silver, and Bronze medal winners should also have attended—not one was there—to hear how the Gold Medalists with Distinction played and perhaps to try to understand the judging.

PMTA thanks Ed Hermanson, owner, and Bill Lester, manager of Herman & Sons Piano for providing their superb facilities. Next year's Fall Festival will be devoted to Preludes and Etudes.

### Make Your Tax Dollars Count!

Are you aware that you may designate a portion of your Arizona Income Tax liability to a specific public or private school without it costing you an extra penny? In addition, you can specify that your donation go to the Fine Arts Program/Music. Imagine the possibilities if everyone owing state income tax donated a portion of their taxes to a local Fine Arts Program! Here's how it works.

Suppose you are married and filing jointly and owe \$1,000 in state income taxes. If



you designate \$400 to a public or private school, you receive a CREDIT for the exact amount on your AZ Income tax return. As a result, you will only owe the state \$600 on your return. The donation to the school is from money you would ordinarily have to pay the state in taxes but this way you have control over how it is spent. To take advantage of this opportunity on your 2007 taxes you'll need to do this right away (before Dec.31<sup>st</sup>!)

There are several ways to obtain detailed information about this program, the easiest being to call or go to your favorite school and ask for the AZ Tax Credit form. They'll be more than happy to assist you. Here are a few other ways:

Please note that the deadline for registration is March 22. I would appreciate your response to this E mail to let me know whether or not you plan to participate.

In addition to the information printed, the Board has decided that teachers performing on stage need to have the same guidelines as students. Therefore, the "no pants" dress code for ladies applies teachers as well as to students.

There have been changes to the "Guidelines for all PMTA Events" on page 16. Please note the new requirements for dress or skirt length. The "entire hemline must be knee length or longer when seated."

The "no pants" requirement is not included on page 16. It will be added in the yearbook for next year.

Guidelines for vocalists have been added to page 16. Please note the following:

### PERFORMANCE ENTRANCE

. VOCALISTS: Arrive early enough to warm up voice. Do not start your bow until you get into the curve of the piano.

### PERFORMANCE

. VOCALISTS: Do not turn your back to the audience to talk to your accompanist. When you are ready to begin singing, nod to your accompanist while facing the audience. Concentrate on expressing the message of the song, the words and the music. Keep your concentration and stage presence until the pedal is lifted and no sound is coming from the piano. If memory lapses occur, try to go on, listen to the accompaniment for an entrance and try to finish the song.

### **PERFORMANCE EXIT**

. VOCALISTS: ALWAYS acknowledge your accompanist.

### **Celebration of Music**

This event is open to vocal students. The recital is Saturday, April 5. The deadline for registration is March 12. See page 32 in the year book for more information. The recital is open to beginning, intermediate and advanced vocal students. If there are more than three vocal students enrolled, the vocal students will have their own evaluation on the same date.

Irene announced that the Washburn Piano store on Bell Road is closing at the end of May. Discussion ensued about where to put the PMTA library and library cabinet. Our librarian, Susan Epps, reported that the library has had very little use in the past couple of years. Herman and Sons in Scottsdale may be able to help us. It was decided Susan and Irene would work out the details with Herman and Sons or make other arrangements if that space is not available. Peggy Rostron, our Historian, also needs storage space. The old pictures Peggy brought will be used by the state historian, Anna Mae Bruning, for a project at the ASMTA state conference this year and then she will give them to Genny Rafferty to scan and save as digital pictures. After being approved for another year, Peggy resigned as Historian. Gail Chang graciously accepted the position and was approved as the new historian. Irene is also storing PMTA scholarship music in her garage. The scholarship committee will sort through it to separate items to sell for scholarship and will donate the remainder to Rosie's House.

Since the Bell Road Washburn store is closing this summer, Irene suggested that next year we divide our general meetings between Herman and Sons in Scottsdale and the new Washburn Piano store in Goodyear. Carol Hill suggested that we alternate back and forth each month rather than have meetings at one location during the fall and the other location during the spring. That suggestion was generally accepted as a good idea to try next year. Our Treasurer, Georgia Sears, e-mailed reports to the board prior to the meeting. Pam Smith made a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report, Gail Quackenbush seconded, and the motion passed.

Peggy Rostron reported that we have run out of PMTA brochures. Last year she did not use the money budgeted for brochures because a friend did the job for free. She checked and found his normal price for the job would have been \$684 to print 1,000 brochures. Other quotes were anywhere from \$300-\$360 and even up to \$500. It was determined he should be paid something, but his normal price was on the high side. Peggy will talk to him about what he will charge us for the next printing and request that amount in next year's budget.

Irene announced Norma Meredith would not be continuing in the position of Membership Chair next year. She thanked Norma for her many years of service to the organization. Jo Ann Smelser shared that her last record of the PMTA membership total this year was 167.

Ursula Newman gave the scholarship report. Twenty-two seniors received \$3,850 in Senior Awards this year. More money was given to students with more points. The distribution was students with 25-34 points received \$150., 35-42 points received \$200., and over 42 points received \$250. Four students were given camp scholarships of \$200. each for a total of \$800. Ursula will sell t-shirts and wristbands at the state conference. She wants ideas for fundraising next year.

The Website and Phone Referral Service basically broke even this year. The Treasurer's report indicated \$1,680 in income and \$1,691.95 in expenses. It was questioned if the monthly website expenses for the rest of the fiscal year were included. Peggy explained she is waiting for \$500. from AZ Piano. However, in the future the referral service needs to stick to the budget. A higher budget amount needs to be requested next year. No PMTA program, including the Referral Service, is authorized to spend more money than is budgeted even if they make more money. The excess income goes into the general fund. Carol Hill made a motion that the Referral Service fee for active members who serve on the board, on a committee, or help in some capacity should be \$25. For inactive members who never participate the fee should be \$75. Ursula seconded the motion. It was noted that policing that policy would be difficult. Also we would need to define active and inactive. Three voted for the motion, seven voted against it, and the remainder abstained. The motion was defeated. Pam Smith made a motion to leave the referral service as it is for one more year. Ursula seconded the motion and it passed. Genny Rafferty made a suggestion to address the issue of teachers using the referral service without contributing to PMTA. On the web site page where teachers sign up for referral Genny will add a list of things that need to be done for PMTA and will ask what each teacher is willing to do.

Genny requested that chairmen send her all information to update the web site for next year. She does not update things without authorization from the chairs. When you send

your information to Liz Owens for the yearbook, send the same information at the same time to Genny Rafferty for the web site. The deadline for the yearbook is July 20, 2008.

Bobbi provided a written report. The Fall Festival audition and Gold Medal recital times and locations have been scheduled for next year. The committee would appreciate comments about the preliminary required list that was distributed in April. Those comments can be e-mailed to Bobbi Stoutenburgh. Bobbi made a motion to delete the cash awards for Fall Festival. Jo Ann Smelser seconded the motion and it passed.

Irene read a letter from Sue Shiner that reported on Piano Ensemble. Melody Bober is our commissioned composer next year. She will be here on March 5-6, 2009. If she does a workshop in the Phoenix area while she is here then Alfred will help out with costs. Irene suggested we skip our March meeting and consider the workshop Melody will present while she is in Phoenix to be our March meeting. Rita Quay submitted a written expense report for Ensemble.

Pam Smith requested that chairmen send copies of their programs to her. She must send these programs to national. MTNA covers the ASCAP requirements for all performances of music in local associations. However, they must be notified about the performances. Please send your programs to Pam immediately so she can send them in.

Irene reported that Dorothy Dungan has requested help at the state conference. Please contact Dorothy if you are willing to man the registration desk or help in any other way.

Barb Tilson provided a written report for Sunday Recitals. Next year in addition to one recital at Herman and Sons in Scottsdale and one at Washburn's in Goodyear, Barb has arranged for four student recitals at Glendale Community College in conjunction with their student recitals. She requested that we change the name from Sunday Recitals to Student Recitals since they will be occurring on different days. Bobbi made the motion, Carol seconded, and the motion passed to change the name to Student Recitals.

Tanya provided a written report for Celebration of Music. She made a motion to require 2 contrasting solos next year and eliminate the option of 1 solo. Pam seconded the motion and the motion passed.



On April 3, 2014, the Music Teachers' National Association ("MTNA") entered into a Consent Order with the Federal Trade Commission ("FTC") as a result of alleged violations of antitrust laws which prohibit competitors ("music teachers") from engaging in actions that could result in an unreasonable restraint of trade. As a part of that settlement, MTNA agreed to publish an antitrust compliance guide, and a model of that guide to be used by MTNA as well as its state and local association affiliates.

PMTA, a professional association, is, by definition, a combination of competitors in the relevant market. As such, certain topics of conversation that may lead to anticompetitive conduct must not take place within the many communications that occur between PMTA members. The Phoenix Music Teachers Association ("PMTA") has adopted this PMTA Antitrust Compliance Guide so as to comport with the Consent Order.

The following **list of prohibited topics** is taken from the MTNA Antitrust Compliance Guide, the FTC/DOJ Collaboration Among Competitors Guidelines, and is adopted per the advice of counsel. These listed topics are potentially illegal when they arise in conversations among and between PMTA members. Neither PMTA members nor PMTA leadership ought to talk collectively (two participants are "collective") about:

- Current prices or hourly rates for music instruction;
- Current billing policies or procedures;

- What constitutes fair profit margins;
- Plans to increase or decrease prices or hourly rates;
- Ideas or plans to allocate or divide geographic areas from which to accept students;
- Ideas or plans not to refer students to non-member music teachers or schools;
- Terms and conditions of music instruction sales such as late charges, prompt payment discounts, and credit terms;
- Salaries of music school employees or the profitability of any individual music teacher or school;
- Ideas or plans not to purchase from suppliers unless they change or lower prices;
- Pricing policies regarding student vacation time and missed lessons;
- Prices to be charged for collateral goods sold by individual members such as sheet music;
- Complaints about non-member competitors, particularly about their prices or marketing techniques;
- Complaints about suppliers or plans to use a "favored" supplier;

• Refusing to do business with anyone in the relevant market on a collective basis.

Any questions about this antitrust policy of the PMTA should be directed to the CEO/Executive Director the MTNA Antitrust Compliance Officer, and/or the attorney for the PMTA.

### Digital Sheet Music: Copyright Law, Online Resources, and More

Have you wondered what digital sheet music is acceptable to use under U.S. Copyright Law? In this presentation, Walter Cosand will provide both online and CD resources that follow U.S. Copyright Law.
