Ongoing events: Saturday recital series, Music at the Mall (now two events held on the east and west-side of Phoenix), Duet Ensemble.



Hello from the East Valley!

Our year is off to full swing in the East Valley. We have a full calendar of events and because of our very capable and dedicated chairpersons, everything is going off very smoothly.

Our year so far: In October our meeting was taken up entirely with running through our Ensemble repertoire. Sherman-Clay allowed us to use their pianos and we all had a productive time trying out the music. Linton-Milano's Music Store of Mesa was present to sell ensemble music members needed.

In November Evonne Beatty from Central District spoke to us about working with student composers. She had many ideas on how to take the sometimes mundane and unimaginative musical ideas which children bring to us and turn them into acceptable compositions.

At our November Student Recital, chaired by Debbie Dosdall, 24 students played pieces representing 9 of our teachers.

In January our own member, Dr. Edward Wolfe presented a program on an unusual technical approach, involving mirror imaging. Members enjoyed the hands-on participation.

<u>Upcoming events:</u> One of our East Valley members, Walter Cosand, will present a program, "Problems of duet and two-piano playing" where members are encouraged to bring repertoire to share with Walter and the others.

At the end of February we will have our annual Ensemble Concert and our Scholarship Recital will take place in March.

At our April meeting we will vote in our new officers and by-law changes. Our program presenters will be two East Valley members, Manuella Pagano on accessible Brazilian contemporary piano repertoire and Marina Dolgin on available contemporary piano compositions which both teachers and students enjoy playing and studying.

New Programs this year: Our Music Carnival was resurrected this year after several years of inactivity by Nancy Spitzer and Debbie Dosdall. 125 children participated, both students of 20 individual piano teachers and also other children, members of St. Peter's Lutheran Church where the carnival took place. 10 teachers and 6 advanced students helped out at the tables, running theory games and preparing the hot dog lunch. Festivities also included a piano lab, bell chime choir lab and a teachers' potpourri table of recycled music. Our chairpersons organized carefully and although they have some suggestions to improve our next carnival, the event was deemed a success. Although primarily mounted to help prepare students for the ASP tests, it was also hoped that the children would have fun using their musical knowledge and meeting other kids who are studying music.

In February we are planning our first ever Teachers Musicale in which the entire meeting time will be given over to teachers' sharing music with each other. It is intended to be a low-key affair for those of us who do not have great blocks of time in which to prepare difficult music. Acknowledging that there is a great deal of interesting and challenging intermediate level materials, we hope that teachers will share some newly discovered teaching pieces as well as play old favorites which will simply entertain the others.

Our new library, although still somewhat in the planning stages, has already received some donated materials. Connie Backus, our new librarian, has some background in library science and is ready and anxious to build a usable library for East Valley members.

Our by-laws are in the process of being revamped to clarify succession and other vague wordings and to comply to ASMTA and to MTNA by-laws as well as to stipulate East Valley policies. In March these changes will be presented to our membership along with the new slate of officers for 1996-97.

East Valley instituted this year its own version of New Member Mentorship by asking Marge Gunnell, our Vice President to keep in contact with our new members by maintaining them on a separate telephone tree list and keeping herself available for questions and guidance through our year's activities. This seems to be working quite well.

I have enjoyed my role of facilitator this year. I am happy that during my tenure we have been able to institute some new programs, additions to the usual calendar offerings. My chairpersons have done and are doing an exceptional and outstanding job working independently to facilitate our East Valley and ASMTA programs. They are to be commended highly.

We had a Holiday Luncheon scheduled this December and despite the hard work of our chairpersons, only 10 people including the chairman signed up for it and it was cancelled. I was disappointed that this event did not go on, but many of our members have a full Saturday teaching schedule and or family obligations which may make a Saturday luncheon difficult. My telephone chairman works extremely hard to alert members to our upcoming events and we feel that members are kept very well informed of happenings in East Valley. It has been a pleasure to get to know some of my colleagues, however. Overall, it has been a pleasure and an honor to serve as President of East Valley District.

One disappointment I have had is that I failed, due to personal conflicts, to follow-up on my intention to become involved in Music Advocacy this year. I still hope to get together with Betty Allen to see what I can do in my community as I feel this is vitally important.

By-Laws Changes.

Please note the following proposed By-laws changes. It is the hope of the Executive Board that these changes will simplify the PMTA By-laws and make future yearly changes and updates unnecessary. A vote on these changes will be made at the general membership meeting on April 10. The following are the new wordings and revisions to the By-laws listed by Article and Number. Please refer to your yearbook p. 37-40 for the present wording.

The following articles shall now read:

ARTICLE I- Section 2.

d. To encourage excellence in students preparation and performance through awards or scholarships.

ARTICLE II- Section 6

Membership: When students are registered for any activity sponsored by the Phoenix Music Teachers Association the teacher is required to assist the Association by serving actively on a committee or on a state or local board and attend one meeting per district year. Any member with students participating in a PMTA event who does not volunteer in the association within the event year (September to June) will be issued a bill from the Scholarship Committee for \$50.00. This donation to the Scholarship fund is payable in full before the member will be allowed to enter students in a PMTA event the following Calendar year.

ARTICLE III- Section I

Nominating Committee: The Nominating Committee shall consist of three members: The Past president, the Out-Going president and a member appointed by the Out-Going President. This Committee shall recommend a slate of officers (These members having agreed prior to serve if elected) to the membership. This slate will include recommendations for President, President Elect, Vice-President of Student Activities, Vice President of Teacher Activities, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer.

ARTICLE IV - Section 1 THE GENERAL BOARD OD DIRECTORS:

- a. Consists of the Executive Board of Directors and Chairpersons.
- c. Meets two times each year. Other meetings may be called during the year by the President or upon request of three members of the board.

ARTICLE IV -Section 2 - THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF DIRECTORS:

- d. Consists of all elected officers and members appointed by the president.
- f. Meetings will be called during the year by the President or upon request of the Board.

ARTICLE V - Section 1

GENERAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS: The General Board of Directors will be installed at the May general membership meeting. Officers and chairpersons must return all materials for their positions to the President at this meeting. Specific guidelines for carrying out each office or chairmanship are given at the beginning of each term of office.

BY-LAWS REVISIONS, CONTINUED

ARTICLE V - Section 3

PRESIDENT-ELECT: The President-Elect is kept apprised of all organizations business, is prepared to assume the President's tasks during absence and helps the President plan the content of the monthly programs. The President-elect upon completion of his/her term of office will become President of the Association.

ARTICLE V -Section 4

VICE-PRESIDENT OF STUDENT ACTIVITIES- The Vice-President of Student Activities coordinates the duties of the chairpersons of the local association's student activities.

ARTICLE V- Section 5-

VICE-PRESIDENT OF TEACHER ACTIVITIES- The Vice President of Teacher Activities coordination the duties of the chairpersons for the local association's teacher enrichment programs.

ARTICLE V- Section 6

IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT: The Immediate Past-President serves as Chairman of the Nominating Committee and implements the district election procedures as set forth in Article III

ARTICLE V -Section 7

RECORDING SECRETARY: The Recording Secretary keeps the minutes and takes roll at the board meetings. He/She posts the minutes.

ARTICLE V -Section 8

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: The Corresponding Secretary is responsible for any official correspondence in cooperation with the President.

ARTICLE V -Section 9

TREASURER: The treasurer is responsible for the accounting and disbursement of funds. This officer gives quarterly reports based on the fiscal year to the Board of Directors and will post these reports at all membership meetings. The treasurer is responsible for the preparation of the annual report for an audit at the close of the fiscal year. The Treasurer will also assist the Executive Board with the budget for the coming year.

ARTICLE V - Section 10

ARIZONA STUDY PROGRAM: The Arizona Study Program Chairperson shall be the state appointed district chairperson.

ARTICLE V -Section 11

PIANO ENSEMBLE: The Piano Ensemble Chairperson shall coordinate all duties and activities related to the annual Piano Ensemble.

Our Commitment

The Christmas House Foundation was established to provide music education and enrichment to children and youth in central Phoenix. Each student is provided with a loaned instrument and receives cost-free, individualized music instruction by professional music educators in a safe, comfortable, properly supervised environment close to his or her home. In addition to developing specific music skills. The Christmas House Music Education Program enables students to build confidence and self-esteem, to experience personal success, and to acquire the social skills necessary to become responsible, productive members of our community.

Program and Services

The Christmas House Music Education Program serves students from four inner-city school districts. Interested individuals submit a written application provided to their school by Christmas House and, when accepted, sign a contract in which they agree to participate in one music lesson per week with a professional music educator, to practice at least 20 minutes per day, five days per week, to participate in four community service projects per year, and to abide by rules and regulations which have been established to foster a constructive learning environment. Strong personal motivation and a demonstrated willingness to make the effort required for success are the primary criteria for admission. Parent/guardian assistance and accountability are also required, thus extending The Christmas House Music Education Program to the student's home environment.

Solo and ensemble performances before an audience are scheduled three times a year, enabling students to look upon their instruction as a rehearsal rather than a series of isolated lessons. Christmas House encourages and will provide funding for students to advance to established music organizations throughout the Phoenix area, such as the MLK Music Profram, Mariacchi/Folk Lorico, local youth symphonies, and other performing ensembles. Currently, more than 70 students are enrolled in the Christmas House Program. There is a significant waiting list of qualified applicants who cannot be served within the limits of the available funding.

Background

When Christmas House launched its Music Education Program in early 1996, it represented the realization of a dream by Rosebell Schurz and her husband, Woody. In 1989, Rosebell and Woody purchased the property at 333 North 17th Drive with the intention of turning it into a lasting gift to their community and country. After two years of meticulous restoration, funded by \$100,000 of their own savings, additional gifts of \$50,000, and in-kind contributions by professional designers and builders, a neglected inner-city house had become the beautiful home now serving central Phoenix as Christmas House, where children's lives are enriched through the gift of music. Rosebell and many dedicated volunteers also secured over 160 donated instruments and put together a comprehensive music library. Christmas House hired its first Executive Director/Music Director, Kirk Utzinger, in late 1995. Kirk immediately set out to bring together the resources needed to initiate the program. Seven part-time professional music instructors were hired and the four participating school districts were asked to help identify candidates, distributing applications through their music educators to interested students. On March 4, 1996, Christmas House opened its doors - and its heart - to the young people of central Phoenix.

Funding

Funding for Christmas House currently consists of approximately equal amounts from the private sector - individuals and businesses - and from government sources, in the form of Community Development Block Grants. Our goal is to broaden private support substantially for the twofold purpose of expanding The Christmas House Music School Program and to offset anticipated reductions in government funding due to federal budget constraints. Christmas House was organized as a 501 (c) 3 corporation, as such, contributions are tax-deductible to the full extent of the law.

Governance

A Board of Directors drawn from business and the professions established policy and provides oversight of all Christmas House activities. An Educational Advisory Committee composed of music educators, representitives of the participating school districts, performing artists, and other music professionals provides direction for the Music Education Program and monitors program quality on a continuing basis. Administrative, operation, and development are under the supervision of Executive Director Kirk Utzinger, who is a professionally trained musician with previous experience in the management of a large community orchestra. Valuable guidance and support is also provided by generous individuals who contribute specialized skills and expertise to the organization.

OUR HISTORY

- The first Phoenix Piano Ensemble was May 7, 1953. (Marie needs early programs.) Marie has been on the Ensemble Board since 1962 and Rita Quay became chairman in 1983.
- Student Recitals began in 1965.
- The first Central District newsletter was issued by Central District President Ethelle Lemon in 1966.
- The C. D. Library was publicized in the 1969 newsletter. The video and cassette library was approved in 1993.
- In 1987, Central District split into two districts - Central District had 106 members and East Valley had 55.
- Exciting Teaching (E.T.), today known as "Sharing Plus" has been continued by Mary Phelan since the districts split.

Although PMTA is very active in the Study Program, we account for less than a third of the students enrolled statewide. my goals is to increase our enrollment so the largest district will have the largest enrollment. (The state figures will be in the Musigram.)

Re: Questions arising from the January 16, 1998, General Board meeting

I am continually reminded that it is an honor and a headache to be the president of such an enthusiastic, intelligent and dedicated association. I appreciate questions and comments that will strengthen and improve PMTA but I expect them to be presented in a professional manner. Since some of these issues have been discussed among board members, I'm sending this to all of you with the hope that this will clarify the questions that have been raised.

1. Was there a quorum at our January General Board meeting? Yes.

Our By-Laws state that "2/3 of the total number of members of each Board shall constitute a quorum at board meetings." We have either 33 or 35 positions on the board, depending on how they are counted. A quorum for 33 is 22; for 35 it's 23.3. We had 23 positions represented.

According to Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised:

"Before the presiding officer calls a meeting to order, it is his duty to determine, although he need not announce, that a quorum is present." I did.

"Any member noticing the apparent absence of a quorum can make a point of order to that effect at any time so long as he does not interrupt a person who is speaking." No one did.

The Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure by Alice Sturgis and revised by the American Institute of Parliamentarians further states:

"It is the duty of the presiding officer to declare the meeting adjourned at any time it is apparent that a quorum is not present. If the chair fails to do so, it becomes the duty of any member who doubts that a quorum is present ... to rise to a point of order and request that the members be counted. Or a member may ask the presiding officer whether a quorum if present."

"The question as to the presence of a quorum at the time of voting on a particular motion must be raised at the time the vote is taken, if it is to be raised at all. It cannot be raised later."

"It is not permissible at some later time to question the validity of an action on the ground that there was not a quorum present at the time the vote was taken."

2. Is it legal for a non-profit organization to pay the expenses of a delegate to a national convention? Yes.

Dr. Kim Hayashi was at our meeting and saw no problem with this. Since there was some concern that this was an issue several years ago, Kim referred me to Dr. Rex Woods and Charlotte Heermann. Dr. Woods, the lawyer the state has used when necessary, assured me it was not even an issue. I left a message for Charlotte, the national liaison for local associations, and asked her to send a letter so we could have the ruling in writing but have not heard from her yet.

3. Is it legal to provide food at association meetings? Yes.

Garnet Mallery checked with her CPA and found no problems. Dr. Woods said it was common practice.

Can the General Board make a committee decision? No.

After careful reconsideration, I realize that accepting a board decision to change the Sonatina required list to a recommended list was wrong. The board can only <u>recommend</u> this change to the Sonatina committee. Each committee has the responsibility to make their own decisions. If there are questionable issues or major changes, it is expected that the chairman will bring these to the board for additional opinions before final decisions are made. Since there was no Sonatina chairman at the time, I mistakenly thought the board could make that decision. There was a clear majority in favor of it but, since it was not a motion, I am referring this suggestion to the Sonatina committee for further discussion.

I am very happy to announce to you that Bobbi Stoutenburgh has accepted the Sonatina chairmanship. If any teacher has suggestions or would like to be on the committee, please let her know. I hated accepting Norma Meredith's resignation but look forward to working with Bobbi.



MTNA COMPETITIONS

MTNA State Auditions will be held at ASU on **Saturday**, **November 7**, **1998**. Karen Maison, ASMTA Vice President in charge of the state auditions, has sent the following decisions made by the Board of Directors meeting at the Nashville Convention rescinding several recent actions which established new performance competition policies.

- 1. Teacher will NOT be allowed to accompany their students.
- 2. Repertoire requirements WILL remain as they have been.
- Students, with the exception of collegiate, will NOT be allowed to change repertoire between state and division/national levels.
- Collegiate maximum performance time WILL REMAIN as stated in the current regulations.
- Official accompanists WILL CONTINUE to be provided at division and national levels.

There is always a need for monitors at this event. Even if you don't have students entered, please help out if possible.

ARIZONA STUDY PROGRAM

Thanks to all the teachers who have so patiently waited for the completion of all twelve theory levels and all three teacher's guides. PHOENIX MUSIC TEACHERS ASSOCIATION BY-LAWS REVISION

The following revision of the BY-LAWS of the PHOENIX MUSIC TEACHERS ASSOCIATION will be voted on at the general membership meeting on April 8, 1999.

The Phoenix Music Teachers Association By-Laws are part of the Arizona State Music Teachers Association Constitution. A copy of this Constitution may be found in the annual directory.

ARTICLE I - NAME, PURPOSE AND POLICY

- SECTION 1. The NAME of this organization is the PHOENIX MUSIC TEACHERS ASSOCIATION (PMTA), a local association and affiliate of the Arizona State Music Teachers Association and the Music Teachers National Association.
- SECTION 2. The PURPOSE of the Phoenix Music Teachers Association is:
 - A. To represent the highest standards of music teaching and performance within its membership;
 - B. To provide continuous, on-going professional growth and training opportunities for all members;
 - C. To foster cultural activities for students, parents, and community;
 - D. To encourage excellence in student preparation and performance through awards or scholarships.
- SECTION 3. The POLICY of the Phoenix Music Teachers Association is:
 - A. To cooperate fully with the parent associations: Arizona State Music Teachers Association and Music Teachers National Association;
 - B. To operate as a non-profit organization and in the event of dissolution, to contribute any remaining funds in the Treasury (after payment of debts) to the ASMTA.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

- SECTION 1. Membership in the Phoenix Music Teachers Association shall be open to any person of business engaged in furthering the purposes of the Association.
 - A. Membership provides the privileges of participation in all activities of the Association. This includes holding office and voting.
 - B. When students are registered for any activity sponsored by the Phoenix Music Teachers Association, the teacher is required to assist the association by serving actively on a committee or on a state or local board and attend one general membership meeting per membership year. Any member with students participating in a PMTA event who does not volunteer in the Association within that membership year will be issued a bill from the Treasurer for \$50. This donation to the scholarship fund is payable in full before the member will be allowed to enter students in a future PMTA event.
- SECTION 2. The Membership Year is the same as the fiscal year: July 1 to June 30. The student membership year shall be October 1 to September 30.
- SECTION 3. The Annual Dues are payable by July 1 of each membership year. The combined Local, State and National dues for each member are billed by and mailed to the Music Teachers National Association. Dues not paid for the current year are delinquent and membership privileges are suspended until dues are paid.
- SECTION 4 General Membership Meetings of educational and professional value are held on the second Thursday of each month, September through May, at a location predetermined by the Board of Directors. The voting majority for general membership meetings shall be a majority of members present.

MTNA CODE OF ETHICS

Vision and Values

The mission of MTNA is to advance the value of music study and music making in society and to support the professionalism of music teachers.

The mission is accomplished by members who teach with competence, act with integrity, volunteer services to MTNA programs, provide professional support for colleagues and communities, and comply with all laws and regulations that impact the music teaching profession.

The mission calls for an ethical commitment to students, to colleagues, and to society.

Code of Ethics

COMMITMENT TO STUDENTS—The teacher shall conduct the relationship with students and families in a professional manner.

- The teacher shall respect the personal integrity and privacy of students unless the law requires disclosure.
- The teacher shall clearly communicate the expectations of the studio.
- The teacher shall encourage, guide and develop the musical potential of each student.
- The teacher shall treat each student with dignity and respect, without discrimination of any kind.
- The teacher shall respect the student's right to obtain instruction from the teacher of his/her choice.

COMMITMENT TO COLLEAGUES—The teacher shall maintain a professional attitude and shall act with integrity in regard to colleagues in the profession.

- The teacher shall respect the reputation of colleagues and shall refrain from making false or malicious statements about colleagues.
- The teacher shall refrain from disclosing sensitive information about colleagues obtained in the course of
 professional service unless disclosure serves a compelling professional purpose or is required by law.
- The teacher shall respect the integrity of other teachers' studios and shall not actively recruit students from another studio.
- The teacher shall participate in the student's change of teachers with as much communication as possible between parties, while being sensitive to the privacy rights of the student and families.

COMMITMENT TO SOCIETY—The teacher shall maintain the highest standard of professional conduct and personal integrity.

- The teacher shall accurately represent his/her professional qualifications.
- The teacher shall strive for continued growth in professional competencies.
- The teacher is encouraged to be a resource in the community.


