**OVER 100 NET
WORKERS WANTED**

With over 500 workers employed, the net factory lacks only a little over 100 workers of its employment capacity, stated manager Thomas Reynolds.

Last week, the workers nearly hit the 1,000,000 square feet mark, when on Tuesday, production totaled 949,000 square feet, an average of over 1,900 sq. ft. per weaver. Since that day, production has slumped a little, said Reynolds.

Quoting figures relative to wages, the manager revealed that an average of 1,900 square feet over a period of a month will net a worker about \$110.00 or \$55.00 per bi-weekly pay day.

Wage Plan Being Mooted

Whenever questions of wages are involved, particularly when talk of wage cuts are in the air, it is a source of gripe, discontent, and agitation among the workers affected. Thus, it is not alarming that camouflage net workers appear upset over conferences now being held to change the present wage scale.

Yesterday, it was reported that several workers had quit in protest. When negotiations between the committee appointed by the Community Council and the committee representing the factory hands are yet in a very indecisive stage, this is foolish.

A plan has been submitted by the Community Council Committee to the workers for considerations. It calls for a reduction in the net earnings of net workers. The average net worker will receive under this plan, more than three times as much as the WRA worker who will receive approximately \$24 (\$6 plus \$8 from trust fund) for living under the same conditions and receiving same services and working five days a week.

But this plan has not been approved, despite the rumors to the contrary.

Important thing to bear in mind is that the net plant is one of our bids for favorable publicity, and nothing to jeopardize the production record of the plant should be done. Most of us who work on WRA jobs either liked our present jobs too well or disliked the hard physical labor involved in the work at the factory so have no right to raise a fuss. On the other hand the net workers can work at the plant only because the balance of the workers do the necessary work which make the center livable.

In the negotiations now going on for a satisfactory solution to the problem, these factors must always be considered.

NO MORE ODORS IN CANAL

The new \$125,000 sewage treatment plant for the Canal Community is now fully operating, disclosed Theodore Ryan, sanitary engineer.

The plant is similar to the one installed in Butte and according to Ryan, as good as any in the state of Arizona. Heretofore, raw sewage had been bled onto the soil of the farm.

The donations were made through donation boxes placed in the block managers offices in the community.

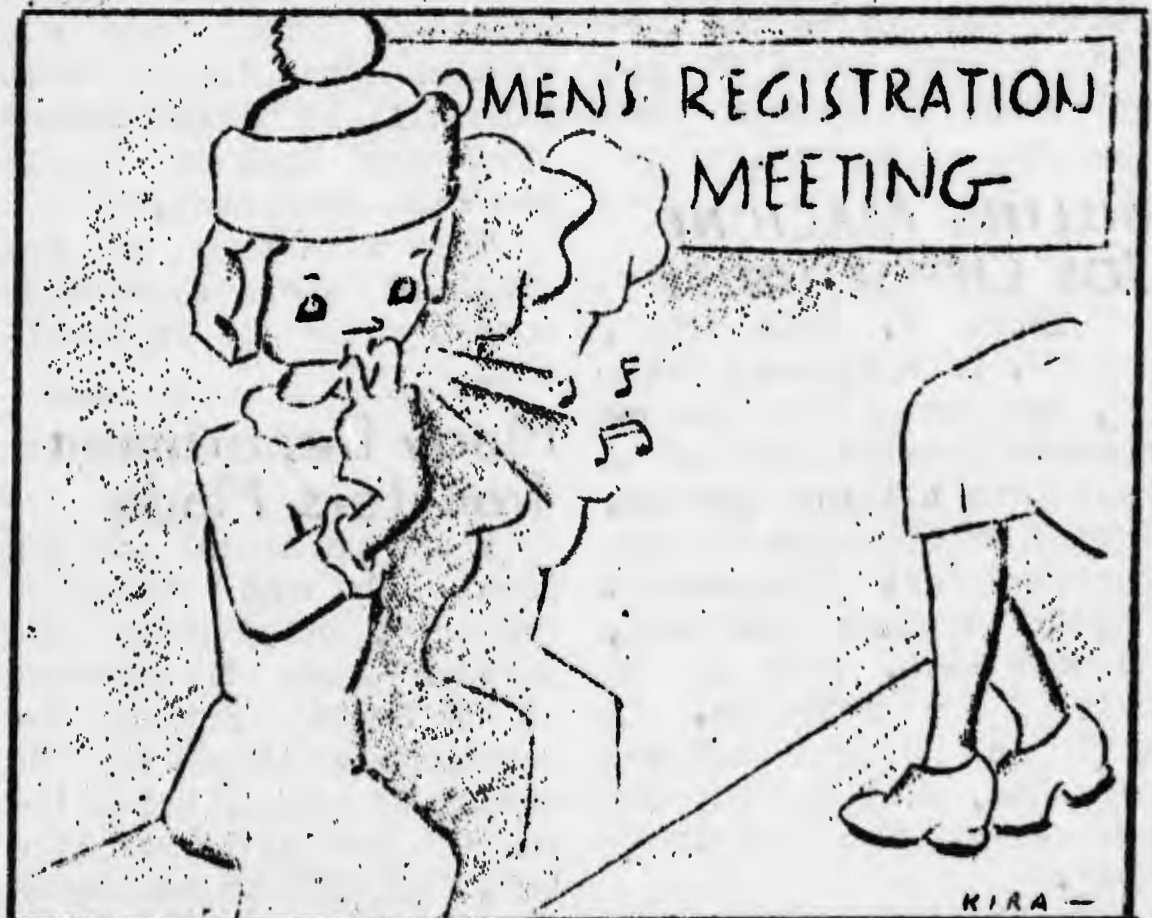
NEW SEMESTER DRAFTING CLASS

GILA, POSTON IN FREE ZONE; ARMY LIFTS RESTRICTION

Most of Arizona Now Open

Gila River and Colorado River Relocation Centers, and much of Arizona's restricted zone will become a non-military zone tonight at midnight by the order of Lt. Gen. John L. DeWitt, Commanding General of the Western Defense Command, announced Project Director Leroy Bonnett yesterday afternoon.

Roughly, a strip 5.0 miles wide was released from the restricted zone by the order, leaving Gila well within the free zone. All of Pinal County, in which Rivers is located, lies north of the new line, outside of the restricted area.

Cities now open to people of Japanese ancestry include among others, Phoenix, Tempe, Mesa, Coolidge, Prescott, and Casa Grande. Tucson, Arizona's second largest city is south of the line.

Edmund Marks, advisor to the Community Activities Section of the relocation projects, arrived here yesterday with Walter on a short official visit. Marks revealed Mich Yamamoto, supervisor of Evacuee Property. In all probability new procedures will be in operation within 10 days, he added.

Evacuee May Return Home

"Approximately 245 persons evacuated from the area now removed from the evacuated zone in Arizona will be allowed to return to their homes immediately," teletyped D. S. Myer, WRA Director, to Project Director Leroy Bonnett, following the Western Defense Command which opened a part of Arizona's restricted zone to persons of Japanese ancestry.

The teletype adds, "—the new development—fits in with the past developments of leave policy and army enlistment—it is still another step toward re-establishing normal life to persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the west coast."

IN LITTLE TARO'S MIND

Teacher asked Taro why he hadn't brushed his teeth that morning. Taro had always had sparkling white teeth, a result of assiduous brushing every morning and evening. Why then was his teeth becoming dull and stained?

If Taro were a frank young fellow aware of the failings of men instead of sitting shamefaced in his seat, he might have answered thusly:

"Teacher, we have no tooth powder at home. The canteens are out of them. Whenever a supply comes in, many people make a rush and buy off a large supply instead of buying what they need. They don't realize or don't care what happens to the less fortunate who either were not aware that a supply had come in or didn't have the money to buy it more than barely enough.

"People are also hoarding soap. I know of some people who have laid aside enough to last a year or more. Without a question, soap and many other things will not be as plentiful as they used to be. There will be many of us who will suffer for unheeding selfishness of people who buy more than they need.

"I realize that it is a very human weakness to make the future secure. But in a community of this nature, I thought that people would think more in terms of the whole rather than the individual."

So he might have answered with truth. There has been a great deal of talk of people suffering a common plight in these centers, but apparently, no real spirit of unity has come.

Ration Book Arrangements

Drastic curtailment in the production of consumer goods has wrought its charges in the community stores.

The shoe store remains closed. With a long range view of the situation, Washington WRA office and the OPA is working on a procedure to eliminate as much as possible the inconvenience now being suffered by the center. In the meantime, John Landward, administrative assistant is working out a procedure whereby evacuees urgently in need of shoes can make a special application to the Coolidge, Arizona, ration board.

"Sennin-Bari" This With My Soldier!

Many of us are wondering where mom goes nowadays--well, its like this:

The "sennin bari" or thousand unbroken stitches, an old Japanese custom, has made its appearance in the Gila colony in great numbers.

Many a nisei soldier will be a happy recipient of this coveted symbol of love, each knot tied firmly and individually by one thousand girls and women--all with a single prayer in their hearts that the soldier recipient of the sennin bari will fight for his country with the might only his country and his people will understand and appreciate.

While those born during ordinary years take but one stitch on the white cloth which is usually a waist band or vest, women born in the year of the Tiger take the number of stitches equivalent to their age, therefore wishing more strength onto the soldier while in battle. To many, this may be only a superstitious feat, but to those mothers who have sons in the United States armed forces, a more sincere way of showing their love is not to be had. It is the only way in which she can let her sons know that she is with him and also that within the sennin bari, a thousand prayers are stitched--each prayer direct from the heart of the home-guardians, the women left behind, to spur him on to brave deeds on the battlefield to make our country, America, a safe and free place to live. MONEY SAVING PROPOSITION

DAIRY, POULTRY, HOG, PROJECTS

Savings of tens of thousands of dollars to the government will be effected when the newly approved construction on the dairy, hog and poultry farm are completed, and the projects are operating as per plan.

Approval has also been sent in for the bakery and carpentry, plumbing, and electrical shops.

Dairy farm will include a milk room, cold storage, machine room, sterilizer room, wash room, dressing room, and office. Construction for the hogs will be 75 farrowing houses, 10 portable hog houses, 25 self feeders, 35 garbage feeding stations, 2 warehouses, and shelters and waterers. Two huge 20' x 40' laying houses, 20 portable brooder houses and a warehouse will house the hens.

In more specific terms, if we can take the other free zone centers as a criterion, our contacts with nearby communities, through visits, work and joint organizational activities will be increased many-fold.

We can also shop in a "real" store again, walk on pavements, feel a little less like being "in Japan" as a youngster in Tanforan once expressed it. Our issei and nisei friends on the outside will be able to visit us without passes from the WCCA in San Francisco. We will be able to visit Poston, should we need to, without much red tape. And many other things we anticipate.

WOMEN OUTDO MEN

We wondered why the registration of women 17-38 have shown that women are more positive on their loyalty stand. We asked a registrar for his opinion. His reply was a blow to the so-called masculine superiority.

"They are more intelligent. They see the future with less befogged eyes."

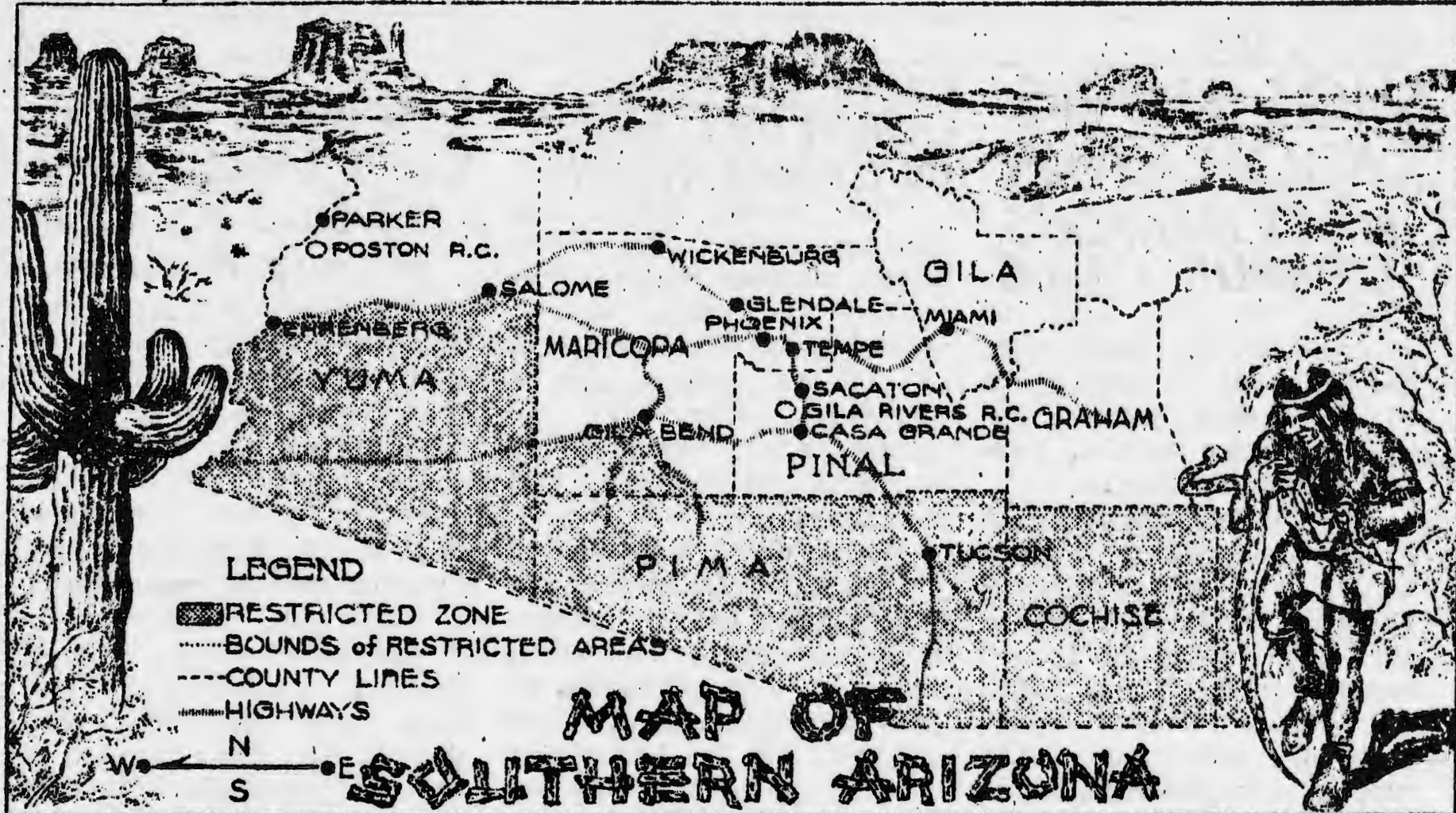

BOUNDARIES RECLASSIFIED

MANY ARIZONA COUNTIES FREE

The proclamation issued recently by Lt. Gen. John L. DeWitt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command, regarding modification of certain restricted areas in Arizona as a non-military zone fixes the boundaries as follows:

The northern boundary of Military Zone 1 will run from the Arizona-California state line at Ehrenberg easterly along U. S. Highways 60 and 70 through Vicksburg to Salome; thence southeasterly on an unimproved road through Harrisburg to the Yuma-Maricopa county line; thence southerly on an unimproved road to the Maricopa-Pima county line; thence easterly along the Pinal-Pima and Graham-Cochise county lines to the Arizona-New Mexico state line.

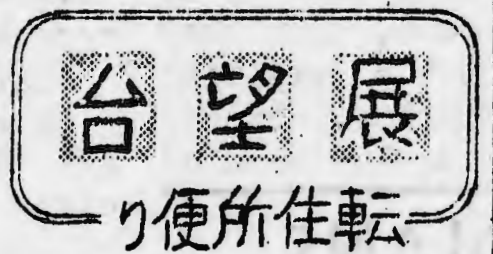

Restricted Zone Visiting Rules REVERSED FROM PREVIOUS NOTICE

No permits will be granted to inductees into the evacuated areas except to visit WRA projects, without escort, or to visit members of immediate families still in evacuated areas in danger of immediate death, or case of death to attend funeral, stated Colonel Scobey, executive aid to Secretary of War H. L. Stimson, yesterday while on a visit.

The statement came as a reversal in the announcement made earlier that permits will be granted to inductees to visit restricted zones. An error in teletype communications was responsible for the misunderstanding.

Open only to men of military age who have unqualifiedly answered loyalty questions in the affirmative, a strictly invitational Army Smoker will be held tonight and tomorrow night at 8 p.m. at mess hall 41, announced Captain Norman Thompson this morning.

Only men with invitations will be admitted. Arrangements are being made to transport Canal men with trucks.

Coach Bill Kajikawa of Arizona State Teacher's College, Capt. W. F. Patterson of 319th M.P., Project Director Leroy Bennett, and Captain Thompson will address the groups. Movies of the 1941 war maneuvers held in Louisiana, and of Army life in general including shots of various services will be shown.

Answer To How To Treat Disloyal Evacuees Sought Witnesses Advocate Segregation Majority of Gilans Loyal

Approximately 60% of 5,000 Japanese of military age at an unnamed relocation center declared their loyalty to Japan rather than to the United States, states A. B. Chandler, chairman of a U. S. Senate sub-committee investigating the Japanese problem, according to the March 6 Arizona "Republic."

GILANS APPEAR AT HEARING

Called before special hearings yesterday, conducted by George W. Malone, special consultant to the Senate Military Affairs Committee, were approximately 20 Rivers issei and nisei leaders.

The hearings were held behind closed doors, by Malone in lieu of Senator Chandler who was in Tucson.

The Senator was in Rivers Saturday evening following an open hearing he called and conducted in Phoenix.

OVER-ALL

Registration Ends Tomorrow

With approximately 3,500 total registrants, the military and leave clearance registration in Canal ended Saturday, and Butte sign-ups will be completed tomorrow, stated John Landward, senior administrative assistant.

Tomorrow will end four full weeks of time in which evacuees gave full, particular information relating to themselves, answered loyalty questions, asked for leave clearance, volunteered for the U. S. Army. Tomorrow will see the final inking of the last of about 9,000 questionnaires estimated for the center.

Senator Chandler stated that the question before the committee was, what to do with the evacuees who are not loyal or are traitorous. He admitted that the problem was complex.

He said, "This country has been very good to them—No real Christian wants to persecute people, but we must protect our own citizens—"

ONLY LOYAL DESIRED

"And another strange thing, we have found that the Japanese government wants those who are loyal to the United States—but they don't want any of the others.

60 TO 75% LOYAL

From Rivers, W.C. 'Tom' Sawyer, superintendent of Education, and Robert LeBaron, Information Specialist, were questioned by the Senator. Sawyer said that 1,000,000 square of camouflage net was being finished at Rivers, that 60 to 75% of evacuees are loyal, in his estimation, to the United States.

ASSIMILATION OPPOSED

Project Director Wade Head of Poston said, in explaining the riot on his project, that conditions were bad and "I guess they had to make some kind of protest."

Farmers representatives at the hearing were opposed to assimilation of evacuees into Arizona. Churchmen asked for fairness.

Practically all witnesses advocated segregation of loyal and disloyal.

TO OVERCOME PREJUDICE BARRIERS

We did some anticipating, in the last issue, of what may be in store for us now that this has been declared a "free" zone.

But we must not forget that the order is new and that one day or short-term leave procedures have not been set up; that most people in Arizona are not inclined to accept us in a friendly spirit.

If we want any amount of freedom, we will have to make it. In Topaz and some of the other centers, after an initial period, suspicious people in the nearby communities accepted them as one of themselves we have been told.

The reason is that the evacuees went more than half-way to extend friendliness. They helped in scrap drives, met in joint club meetings with similar organizations on the outside, sent out speakers to acquaint the people with facts about the evacuees, and extended many other friendly gestures.

We, too, must break down the barriers that have been raised against us through just such contacts. We, too, must go three-quarters of the way.

This is the second time that Rivers residents will be able to participate in the harvesting of the vital war crop, Pima or long staple cotton, for the 1942-1943 picking season. It was on September 21, 1942 that General DeWitt had issued the order temporarily lifting restrictions against persons of Japanese ancestry in Arizona's cotton belt. With a cordon of military police guarding the area, the temporary order was recalled on November 12 as practical consideration made the whole deal unfeasible.

Five cents per pound will be paid the pickers. One dollar will be deducted, 55 cents to pay for subsistence, and 45 cents going to the community fund. In the event the employer provides the noon meal, 30 cents will be discounted.

300 VOLUNTEER IN HUNT, IDAHO

A total of 300 Americans of Japanese ancestry at Minidoka project volunteered for service in the U. S. Army, WRA announced yesterday. This represents 19 per cent of those eligible for army service. Those meeting requirements for army service will be assigned to duty in the new A J combat team.

The Japanese American volunteers include 41 married, 24 with children, and 11 Japan-born who are not eligible for service at the present time.

Co-op Certificate Of Incorporation Received Delegates' Congress Convenes Soon; Inc. Articles Dispensed

The Gila River Consumer's Cooperative was incorporated under the laws of District of Columbia on February 23. Certificate of Incorporation was received by the Incorporators of the Cooperative March 8, revealed Masato Kato, secretary to the board of directors.

Kato stated that the by-laws of the cooperative were sent to Washington for approval. The board of directors is meeting at least once a week to study

the set-up of the Community Enterprises.

The by-laws of the Articles of Incorporation have been distributed to the Congress of Delegates, community Councils, and block managers. Each responsible member of the coop will soon receive a copy of the Articles of Incorporation and the by-laws in English and in Japanese translation, said Kato.

The first official meeting of the Congress of Delegates will be called on March 20, where a report of the progress made by the Incorporators and the Board of Directors will be given.

To investigate rent and share-crop possibilities in the sugar beet area of the Rocky Mountain states, ten former sugar beet growers from widely distributed areas of California

will leave the colony in a few days with a representative of the Utah-Idaho Sugar Beet Co. with all expenses paid.

In charge of picking representative growers from Butte is Harry Kamiya and Kay Nobusada will select Canal men. Kamiya is a former shipper from Santa Maria, and Nobusada, a chemist from Kingsburg. Both are employed by the Farm Division on the project.

The ten men are being selected now, and they will depart as soon as travel arrangements are made by the sugar beet company representative.

MORE TESTS TO ENDURE

Phoenix Republic carried a story on March 6, that 60% of evacuees at an unnamed center had indicated in their military questionnaires that they were not unqualifiedly loyal to the United States.

The figures appear to be based on estimates on early results when the issues were yet not clear. However, the article, which certainly does not cast credit on evacuees, was written and many people in Arizona will base their conception of persons of Japanese ancestry on it.

Without question many more such stories will be published, and pressure groups will tar and feather the evacuees in effigy. They will renew efforts with greater confidence to divest the nisei of whatever rights they still retain.

Within the center, the pro-Axis agitation will reach new heights. The non-loyal will justify, because of vociferous outside pressure, their stand that nisei have no chance in America.

Verily, these loyal--who, in spite of the bitterness they have felt, in spite of the pressure they have been exposed to, have stood by their conviction--will go through further trials.

They must gird themselves to meet this further test. If they, the majority of nisei, do, they shall have contributed to the reservoir of courage and tolerance without which there can be no lasting peace.

WHAT PRICE FREEDOM?

The shamrock was the rallying call for the freedom for which the Irish fought so hard and bitterly and finally won. Today it is worn by the free and the freedom-loving as a symbol.

What better occasion could there be to honor the volunteers for the AJ combat unit than the Shamrock Dances to be held in both communities this week end?

Minority Aid Group Formed

FAIR PLAY GOAL

Being formed now to carry on the fight for the preservation of the democratic rights of nisei and all minority groups is a committee on American Principles and Fair Play, according to a letter received by the NEWS-COURIER from Galen M. Fisher, executive secretary of the Northern California Committee for Fair Play.

SUPPORTERS

Notable supporters of the Committee are Honorary Chairman Robert Sproul, President of U. of Calif., Maurice Harrison, Dr. A.C. McGiffort, Mrs. Harry Kingman, General Barrows, Dr. Henry Grady, Dr. Robert Millikan of Cal Tech, Dr. Roy Lyman Wilbur of Stanford and others.

COOPERATION

Fisher urged the evacuees to cooperate with the government in the military registration. He wrote, "Knowing your tragedies, my heart bleeds for you. But all this makes us more anxious that you cooperate with the War Department and the WRA in the forming of the combat unit and in applying for resettlement."

POSTON

THREE RECEIVE JAIL TERMS

Three Poston evacuees, born in Hawaii, were detained in Phoenix county jail for action in the federal grand jury after being accused Thursday of stealing \$60 worth of government property from that center, according to the Arizona Republic. Eggs, bacon, sugar beef were some of the stolen property.

MOVIE TONIGHT AT BUTTE

Relief for the acute shoe situation in the center was in sight as John Landward, administrative assistant, announced that 12,000 shoe stamps had been received and will be distributed to the residents next week.

He said that a special ration board had been created for Gila, of which James Sholly, superintendent of Community Enterprises, and a Coolidge man and himself were members.

The arrival of the stamps heralded the success of the WRA in coping with a ration problem that promised to become a source of gripe with the center residents with the cry of "red-tape."

BAGGAGE

TRANSPORT GI EXPENSE

Five hundred pounds of personal effects will be shipped free for residents going on indefinite leave in addition to the baggage transportation to which each person is entitled in connection with the purchase of railroad tickets, revealed Mich Yamamoto, supervisor of evacuee property.

In order to qualify for this additional freight shipping service, it is necessary that the evacuee going on indefinite leave take full advantage of the baggage shipping privileges it was pointed out.

2,071 LEAVES

A total of 2,071 indefinite leaves plus 2,430 leave clearances have been granted to evacuees in the ten relocation centers by the WRA Washington office, according to the Pacific Citizen. Six hundred seventy-five were for students.

Travel Leaves To Free Areas

ONLY LEGITIMATE BUSINESS REASONS

Through mutual agreements reached by the Gila and Poston project offices, it was announced that more than 20 persons per week or more than 5 at one time will leave one center for the other.

Leaves for Phoenix are based on legitimate business reasons or in regards to project operations.

John Landward, leave officer, stated that leave grants will be based on (1) medical reasons; (2) legitimate business reasons; (3) visits to see members of immediate families or life-long friends.

For transportation, a Project bus leaves for Phoenix on Tuesdays and on Thursdays for Sacaton. Coolidge may be used as a take-off place it was also indicated.

Director Bennett To San Francisco

Project Director Leroy Bennett left for San Francisco Thursday to confer with R. B. Cozzens, Chief of the San Francisco field office of the WRA. Deputy Director Firman Brown will be Acting Project Director.

SNAG LULLS COTTON WORK

Cotton harvesting work on the outside for Gilans hit a snag this week as an employment deal with the Indian Service fell through stated William Huso, employment supervisor.

Huso said that he is now working through the United States Employment Division to obtain work for approximately 150 men who have been signed. With a great need for more pickers existing, he said the men will probably be out in the fields early next week.

DUAL CITIZENSHIP

JACL Charges 'Race Baiters' In Deliberate Misrepresentations

The Japanese American Citizens League charged that California "race-baiters" deliberately misrepresented facts when they used the "dual citizenship" issue in attacking loyal Americans of

Japanese ancestry, according to a March 4 issue of the Pacific Citizen.

Article 20, Section 2 of the 1924 law passed on July 15, 1924, by the Japanese Imperial Diet reads:

"A Japanese who, by reason of having been born in a foreign country designated by Imperial ordinance, has acquired the nationality of that country and who does not, as laid down by order, express his intention of retaining Japanese nationality, loses his Japanese nationality retroactively from his birth."

ALIEN

Naturalization Rights Told

Introduced into the House of Representatives was a bill (H.R. 2011) to give oriental aliens the right to become naturalized citizens of the United States by Vito Marcantonio, Democrat of New York.

"The passage of this bill will establish the equality of the Asiatic people with all other people, thus providing a fundamental basis for ending discrimination because of race, color, creed, or national origin," states a press release from the Japanese American Committee for Democracy of New York.

An obscure OPA ruling upset the program to issue shoe ration certificated to every evacuee. The ruling forbids issuance of shoe certificate to evacuees except in "need" cases.

The administration, after apparently ironing out details of certificate distribution, was working again to straighten out this latest snag.

In the meantime, forms are being issued throughout the community to list an inventory of shoes and their condition to determine the needy cases.

Central Block Manager Harry Miyake stated that certificates will be available to anyone in need. He warned, however, that falsification of information is a criminal offense.

editorial**THEY SERVE TWICE**

ALMOST a year ago, over 100,000 persons were evacuated from the West Coast to assembly and then to relocation centers. Reasons were complex. For our purposes it suffices to say that one of the reasons were, they were not completely trusted.

Since that time thousands have been released from the centers. They will go out in ever increasing numbers from now on--with the assurance that the United States government believes them to be loyal. These people who resettle are paving the way for acceptance of persons of Japanese ancestry. Some to a greater extent, some to a lesser degree.

Of all the groups and individuals who have gone from the centers to date, with the exception of the men who earlier enlisted in the Military Intelligence School, the ones who will give this country more hope in the loyalty of the nisei and will do more towards establishing the faith of the American people in the evacuees, are the men who will leave the center in a few days as volunteers for the United States Army. They are out to prove that nisei can fight as well, if not better, have as much faith in the ideals of democracy, be trusted as much as any other Americans.

There are other factors, too. Many of these men have wives and children. Most have parents, many of them dependents. They go so that they can make the lives of their close ones secure in America. They are looking far into the future, and see that their decision will help greatly to pave their way to that goal. The ramification of that decision will help all other evacuees, and even alleviate the plight of other minority groups.

These men have volunteered, then, to serve twice. They fight for this country, and for their people.

Provisions of this section were extended by Imperial ordinance on November 15, 1924, to include persons of Japanese ancestry born in the United States, Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile and Peru.

Persons of Japanese ancestry born in the United States after 1924 do not acquire Japanese nationality and nisei born in the United States before 1924 may lose Japanese nationality by renouncing it. Mike Masaoka, National JAFL secretary, noted that members of the Japanese American Citizens League are required to sign an oath of allegiance to the United States which is a

LICENSES FOR YOUR CANINES

Residents of this Project, both evacuees and appointed personnel, who own dogs, are urged to get licenses from either the Butte or Canal Internal Security office immediately, according to W. E. Williamson, director of Internal Security. Within the near future, all dogs not possessing licenses will be picked up and destroyed. State law requires that owners purchase licenses for their dogs and licenses be on a collar.

renunciation of loyalty to and other power.

Article 20 of the Japanese law also stated that persons who acquire "foreign" nationality voluntarily lose Japanese nationality.

The bill to amend the "Nationality Act of 1940" follows: "Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section 303 of the Nationality Act of 1940, approved October 14, 1940 (54 Stat. 1142, 8 U.S.C. 703), be, and hereby is, amended by striking out the said section and enacting a new section replacing it to read as follows: "THE RIGHT OF A PERSON TO BECOME A NATURALIZED CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES SHALL NOT BE DENIED OR ABRIDGED BECAUSE OF RACE, COLOR, CREED, OR NATIONAL ORIGIN."

Plans have been completed to use a sizable portion of the 100,000 persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the West Coast on farms in 21 Western and Mid-western states, according to a Washington UP report of March 11.

Only able-bodied workers who volunteer and whose records have been checked by the F.B.I. will be accepted for farm work. The WRA estimates that of 40,000 employable, some 20,000 can qualify for farm work outside of the center.

Believe it or not, the residents here consumed over five million pounds of vegetables raised on the Gila farms during 1942. Our fellow evacuees in the other centers relieved us of the surplus daikon and turnip as we had shipped out 800,000 pounds in two months. During this year, the present plan calls for an eleven million pound production program aside from the barley and hay and the livestock products. If the present plans are fully carried out, local residents will produce a major portion of our food here, as well as to help to supply the other centers with green vegetables. In addition to the food program, the farmers are carrying on experiments with peanuts, long staple cotton and flax to aid the nation in the production of vital war materials.

Dairy Needs More Workers, Women As Well As Men

DANGER OF LOSING DAIRY INDICATED

Handicapped by the lack of sufficient labor and facing the ever-increasing threat of milk shortages, the Farm Management Division issued a rallying call for prospective dairy-men.

When the dairy is in full swing, some 300 cows

are expected to produce 1,000 gallons of fresh milk daily.

Persons interested in learning dairying, it was stated, would be sent through a thorough educational process.

The dairy is open not only to men, but women who are in great demand as milkers. Unless enough labor is found to cope with the shortage, indications are that there will be no dairy, it was announced.

JUSTIFIABLE DISCRIMINATION?

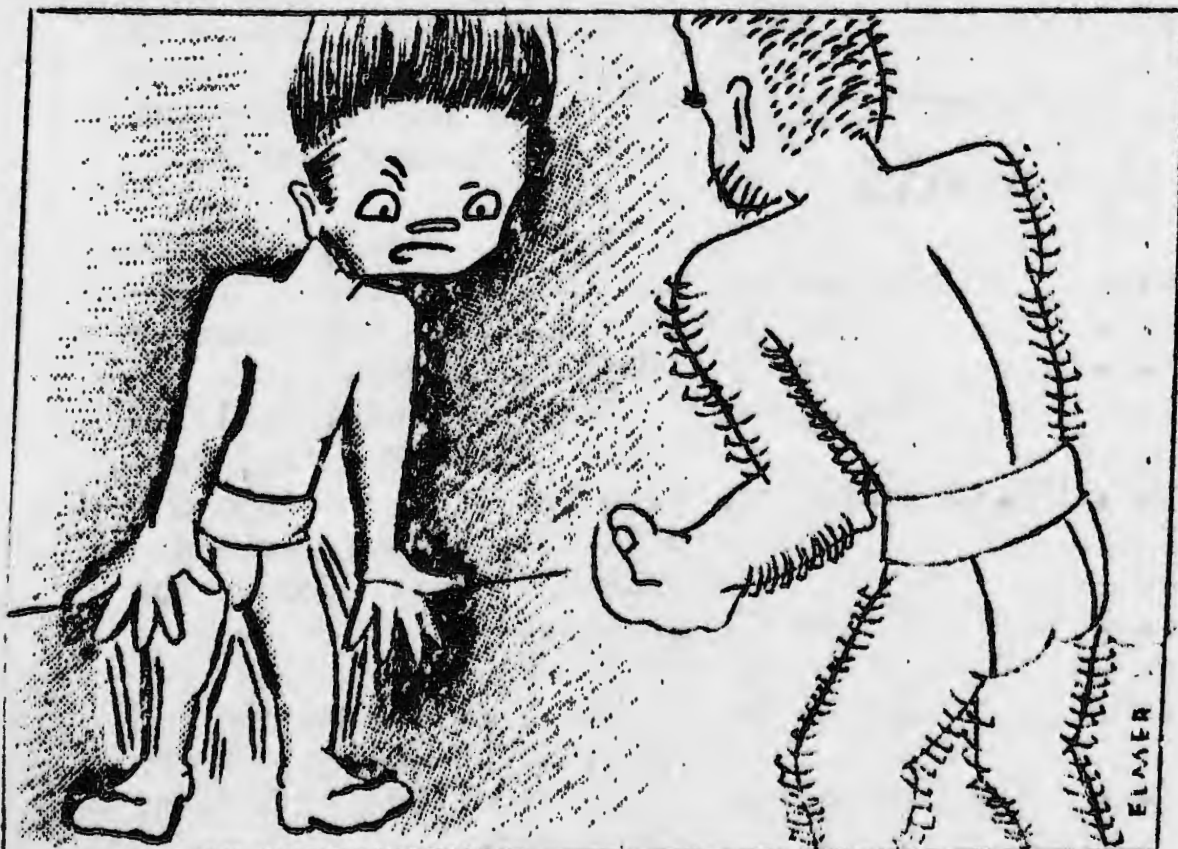

Before Captain Norman Thompson left the colony, he assured volunteers to the AJ combat unit that they need not fear any pressure against their families.

He said, "The army will protect the loyal. If any person has the temerity to make life uncomfortable for the families of the enlistees, he will be defying the U.S. Army. Such persons will be properly taken care of."

Thus it will be. The volunteers are out to win, not only peace for America, but security for all loyal evacuees. They acted on principle, and among sane thinking people in the world, there is only respect for such, though they may disagree with the principle. From the evacuees, these volunteers who go not only for the principle involved, but to soften the harsh realities confronting the issei and nisei, deserve the utmost in honor and respect. Any attempt to discredit their action cannot be tolerated.

**NEW BILL OF RIGHTS OUTLINES
 POSTWAR SECURITY PROPOSALS**

To insure freedom from want, the opportunity to work, and the promotion of the health of the people of the United States, President Franklin D. Roosevelt last week passed on to the Congress, comprehensive recommendations for "cradle to grave" security prepared and submitted by the Nation Resources Planning Board.

for post-war rehabilitation of dislocated war workers and soldiers, for rapid conversion of war plants into peacetime factories, and for public aid to a large number who will need it following the war.

The program outlined by the NRPB would provide

9 Point Bill of Rights

The principles of the recommendations are embodied in the following "New Bill of Rights", proposed by the NRPB:

1. The right to work, usefully and creatively through the productive years.
2. The right to fair pay, adequate to command the necessities and amenities of life in exchange for work, ideas, thrift and other socially valuable service.
3. The right to adequate food, clothing, shelter and medical care.
4. The right to security, with freedom from fear of old age, want, dependency, sickness, unemployment and accident.
5. The right to live in a system of free enterprise, free from compulsory labor, irresponsible private power, arbitrary public authority and unregulated monopolies.
6. The right to come and go, to speak or to be silent, free from the spyings of secret political police.
7. The right to equality before the law, with equal access to justice in fact.
8. The right to education, for work, for citizenship and for personal growth and happiness.
9. The right to rest, recreation and adventure, the opportunity to enjoy and take part in an advancing civilization.

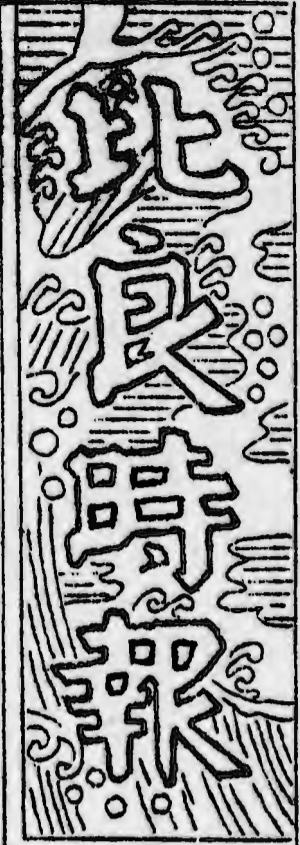

CLEARANCE IS NOT 'GO' SIGNAL

"Leave clearances and indefinite leaves are not the same," declared leave officer John Landward. "It is not true that after obtaining leave clearance an individual may leave the center immediately."

Leave clearance is a preliminary step toward indefinite leave. It is proof that an individual's record has been checked and approved by the WRA and the FBI. It eliminates most of the red tape in the application for indefinite leaves.

To receive an indefinite leave after being cleared, a person must file WRA form 130 and have a definite job offer, a school to go to, or adequate means of support. An alternate method for leaving the center permanently after clearance, is to receive approval on a job offer from a relocation office.

VOLUNTEERS! Over Thousand Army Reports

Over 1,000 evacuees from the ten relocation centers had volunteered for the Army's new AJ combat unit, the War Department announced Thursday.

From Hawaii came news that the original quota of 1,500 for the Territory of Hawaii had been upped to 2,600. The additional 1,100 will be inducted from among the 9,507 who volunteered their services during February.

Rivers' total had climbed to 102 as of yesterday noon. Latest official figures from Minidoka Relocation Center showed 301 volunteers. Poston's unofficial total, it was reported, was 218.

BILL TO DEFER FARM LABOR

Moved to militant action by reports of imminent food shortages, the senate overrode war department protests Wednesday, March 14, to pass, 50 to 24, a bill denying any more agricultural workers to the armed forces, disclosed an AP report.

The measure, which now goes to the house, would direct draft boards to defer all men employed substantially full time in production of essential foods and fibers. It would replace the so-called Tydings amendment to the present law in which deferments are authorized but not made mandatory.

ABOLISH FEARS OF RESETTLEMENT

Inclined to pessimism after the ordeal of evacuation, evacuees have generally viewed the outside public with suspicion. Thus, it is that news of anti-Japanese character receive greater attention, is a source of greater gossip-interest.

But in the past six months, by and large, publicity has taken a definite trend away from yellow-peril propoganda. On the Pacific Coast where the ceaseless war against the return of evacuees propagated by pressure groups has intensified, more favorable opinions and articles are being written and expressed. It is, however, in the East, the Middle West and the Rocky Mountain States that the indications are most evident.

From a survey conducted by the Topaz Relocation Center reports division, 83.5% of persons who had worked on, the outside reported public sentiment as good, and about 11%, fair and only 5%, poor. Periodicals in the Middle West seemingly ignorant of the issei and nisei problems on the Coast in the past, are now carrying articles about the evacuees with greater regularity, and almost without exception, place them in a very favorable light. Letters from evacuees from the Rockies to the Atlantic carry an optimistic tone, urge resettlement, voice the need for courage to take the first step.

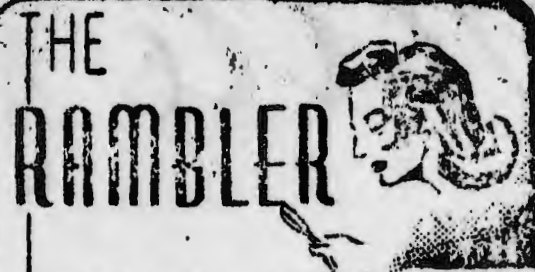
On the basis of these facts, the fears expressed by residents here of physical violence and social pressure are hardly grounded on solid premises. After resettlement, on the side of the evacuees inspiring the general public towards democratic acceptance is the WRA and its relocation offices, and the church groups, and their militant campaign. Against them is only a nebulous worry and fear, which can be erased by the fact that labor shortages can be mitigated, and the issei and nisei are people not differing from others. If the evacuees will face the future with courage, they need have no fear of resettlement.

The revised measure accepted the government's version of what constitutes essential crops but substituted the requirement of "substantially full-time" farm work for the minimum of eight "war units" which now is the test of essentiality. A unit is a standard of measuring the amount of a worker's labor in terms of food production. A man tending eight milk cows is eligible for deferment as an essential worker. Other units are based on production per acre of food and fiber crops.

The war department outlined a policy by which it would permit the use of soldiers in farm work upon "evidence that the agricultural emergency is of greater danger to the nation than the military situation." Army units may be used to harvest vital crops endangered by labor shortage at the request of the War Manpower Commission, and soldiers over 38 in this country who apply before May 1 may be discharged to work in essential agricultural jobs if the efficiency of their military units will not be impaired.

CIVIL AFFAIRS DIVISION TAKES OVER

Another reminder of the mass exodus of persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast was written off the books, when Lt. Gen. J. L. DeWitt, Commanding General of Western Defense Command dissolved the War-time Civil Control Administration this week.

VOLUNTEERS FOUR TEACHERS OFFER SERVICES

Four evacuee faculty members of the Canal schools have volunteered their services in Uncle Sam's Armed forces. They are, Seiichi Yamamoto and George Domoto of the high school staff, and Sam Sakamoto and Ed Tagami of the elementary teaching staff.

The agency was created in March 11, 1942, to handle the evacuation, and was responsible for the removal of 90,193 persons to temporary assembly centers, and 18,026 directly to war relocation centers. Movement of evacuees under the WCCA started in April, and on November 3, 1942, they had all been transferred to the WRA, except for the few, who were for various reasons, detained on the Coast.

General DeWitt stated that the few remaining tasks, uncompleted by the WCCA, would be handled by the general staff civil affairs divisions at the Presidio, San Francisco.

The findings from 165 questionnaires in the survey answered in usable form reveals that approximately 83.5% of workers who had gone out on outside work reported that community reception and employer-worker relations were "good," 12% "fair," and about 5% "poor."

HOW TO CASH YOUR CHECKS

Effective immediately, no checks will be cashed at stations other than the canteens in block 5 at Canal, 42-7-D and the enterprise office at 69-15 in Butte, announced the Rivers Community Enterprise.

As usual, all government pay, clothing allowances and camouflage checks of less than \$50 will be cashed immediately, subject to cash on hand.

NET CAMOUFLAGE WEAVERS CRACK ONE MILLION MARK

464 Garnish 2,262 Sq. Ft. Average; Substantial Payroll For Workers

After threatening to crack the million mark for three weeks, the camouflage net weavers finally achieved the goal Friday, March 16, as they garnished 1,009,952 square feet of netting in one eight-hour day announced Thomas Reynolds, manager.

To hit the new height, it required 464 weavers to average 2,262 square feet each. On the same day, one six-man crew hit 3,408 square feet to take top honors. Four other crews hit 3,000 or over the same day, while 16 wove over 2,700 square feet. Yesterday, the weavers were again menacing to go over the million mark.

Servicing the needs of the 464 productive workers are 60 non-productive hands. They include warehousemen, reefers, foremen, cutters, and office help.

Penalty For False Info

Falsification of information in applying for shoe ration certificates is punishable by a maximum of \$10,000 fine or two years in prison, it was emphasized by the Rivers ration board.

Said James Shelly, superintendent of Community Enterprises and member of the board, "The certificates are given on the basis of need. If a person has two serviceable and wearable shoes, he is not entitled to a certificate."

Leave officer John Landward, also a member of the board, stated that the certificates are valid for 30 days. If a person does not intend to use them within that time, it should be returned immediately. Certificates will be available to all who need them. It was disclosed that OPA has a right to investigate the validity of information given in applying for shoes.

CONFIDENCE IN NISEI

NISEI IS A word which up to now is known to few Americans east of the Pacific West, but which we have a notion will be well and favorably known to all of us before the war is over. A nisei is an American-born citizen whose parents were Japanese.

There are a large number of nisei in the Far West. Most of them are as loyal to the United States as any other group of Americans. Until recently, however, they were not eligible for service in our armed forces in this war with Japan and its Axis partners.

About a month ago, Secretary of War Stimson announced that nisei from then on would be accepted for training in special units, including infantry, artillery, engineer and medical personnel, and would see actual fighting service in due course. Under present arrangements, nisei can get into these services through draft boards in their communities.

It seems beyond dispute to us that this is the right way to handle the matter. We feel confident, too, that these men will become tough and valiant fighters for the country of their parents' adoption. Judging from our boys' experiences with the Jap soldiers on New Guinea and Guadalcanal, we can well afford to turn some Japanese-descended fighting talent against the original Japs.

We got the old familiar "That's the stuff!" kick out of this piece of news--a renewal of the conviction that American democracy can do such things and get away with them gloriously, because of its power to attract and hold the loyalty of all manner of people. In opening the Army to the nisei, we think the War Department did its best single day's work in months.

SOUGHT PERMANENT SOLUTION

To the problem facing the uprooted families of evacuees, the WRA is seeking a permanent solution, Elmer L. Shirrell, chief of the Chicago Relocation office, stated in an interview with Dorothea Kahn, feature writer.

Shirrell disclosed that the 130,000 persons of Japanese ancestry in the United States had been concentrated in communities in limited areas, and thus had aggravated their own problem of assimilation and Americanization. He stated that the leaders of the WRA believed that the present relocation would help disperse them and help in the solution of these problems.

Four field men from the Chicago office are working in cooperation with the United States Employment Service in locating employment possibilities for the evacuees.

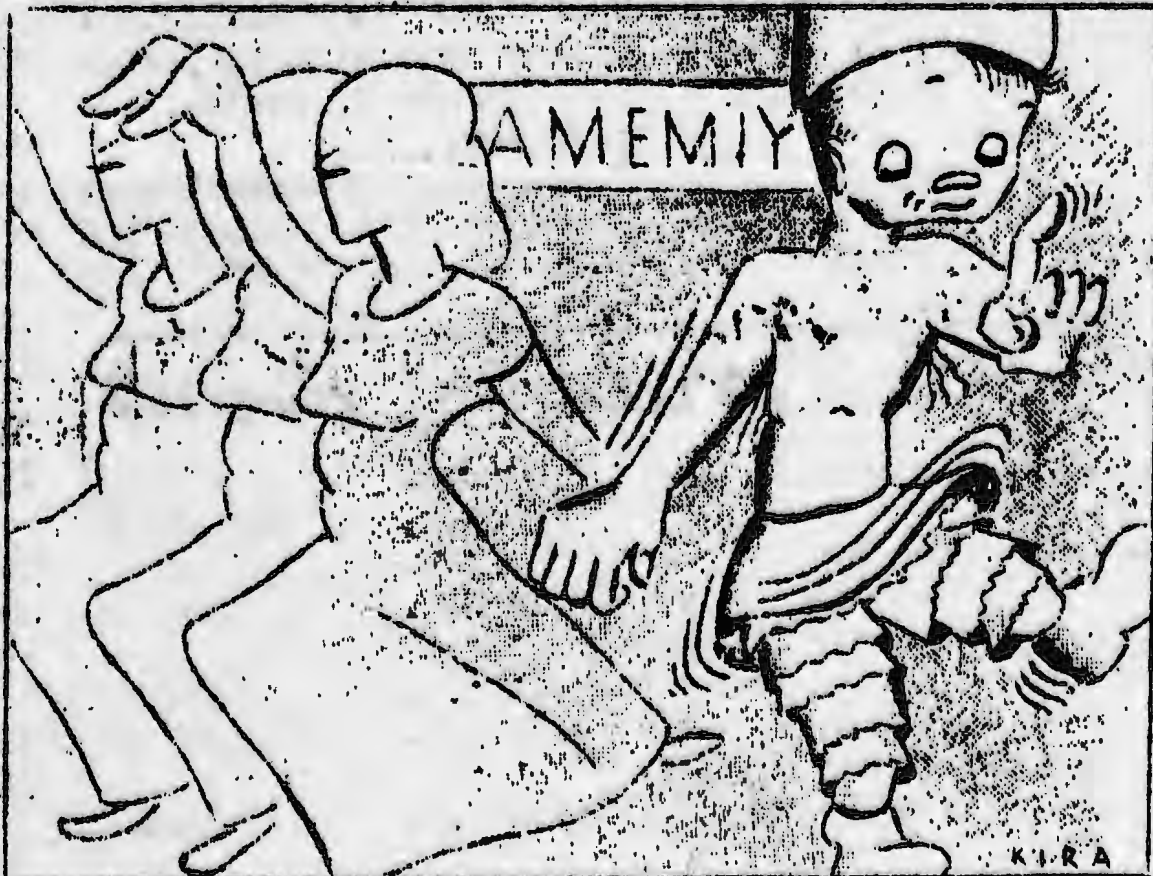

Possibility Of Rationing Told

With the approach of warmer weather and the consequent increase in the use of water, Project Director Leroy Bennett appealed to residents to use domestic water wisely and sparingly in a statement to the press yesterday.

Bennett pointed out that the water supply is limited because the pumping rate is fixed by the production of the wells. In event the present rising curve of consumption persists, a possibility of water rationing within the next month was indicated.

In Butte, water from the canal is now available in the irrigation ditch along the south side of the community. In Canal, WPA approval was received last Saturday for a pressure line to enable the pumping of irrigation water from the canal up to the south end of the area.

UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION CLAIMS POSSIBLE IN CENTER

RIGHT TO FILE EXPIRES APRIL 1

Initial claims for unemployment compensation against any state can be made through the employment office at 69-B, dis-closed Employment Supervisor William Huseo yesterday. The same service will be available in Canal from tomorrow.

Huseo urged residents with claims to file them immediately, as the right to do so will end April 1. The local office will handle initial claims and then turn the case over to the United States Employment Service in Coolidge.

On relocation, a claimant can receive continued claims at the nearest U.S.E.S. office. Huseo was appointed a special representative of the U.S.E.S. to handle this matter.

Claimants are asked to bring their Social Security cards.

CITIZENS ONLY FOR COUNCIL

Hopes that issei would be permitted to serve on the Community Council waned as a letter from WRA Director D. S. Lyer indicated an unlikelihood that contemplated revisions in regulations governing self-government within the centers would change the present rulings.

Pending Revision of Administrative Instruction No. 34, Section III B may be interpreted to read as follows:

"Only citizens of the United States, who are 21 years of age, or over, shall be eligible as elective members of the Community Council. However, non-citizens may be elected appointed, or otherwise chosen to assist in evac-see government, and the plan of government drafted by the Charter Commission may make specific provision for the organization and function of such non-citizen groups."

It is unlikely that the revision of Administrative Instruction, No. 34 will permit the election of non-citizens of the Community Council."

IT HAD TO HAPPEN

WELL, the expected happened. All the letters we had read, all the people from the outside we had talked to, had shown a spirit of courage, of pioneering, of adventure. They had been, and they still are, believers in the principle of resettlement.

But lately, we have come across a few individuals, and a few letters, that show an attitude of discouragement, of quitting, the tough grind on the outside, conditions, they say, are too tough. Quality food stuff is lacking, expenses are terrific, climate is still worse, they complain.

We have been and are advocates of the resettlement program. These reports may discourage some evacuees, but we publish them because it is not our policy to conceal facts. We believe that, by and large, asset and need will not be faced by the reported hardships.

We are however, gravely conscious of the subtle change in the psychological make-up of some evacuees who are no longer willing to undergo the same trials that other people are subject to. In the year that they have spent as government wards, some have grown soft.

As we say, we expected this. It is perhaps inevitable that people lose some of the initiative, some of the courage, that so characterized persons of Japanese ancestry prior to evacuation.

But it is to combat this very growing dependence on a protector that resettlement is so vitally necessary. Unless evacuees can maintain the will to succeed in anything they undertake, their future is far from bright. It is necessary to shed the philosophy of escapism, they are heir to in a protected community of this nature.

MANPOWER REALLOCATION

As the resettlement program picks up, reports of acute shortages within the Center piles up in the NEWS-COURIER office.

In desperate need of nurse's aides, technical help, and others, is the hospital. None can dispute the claim that hospital efficiency must be maintained.

Out on the farm, a few workers are hammering, planing and sawing against time to construct a dairy before June 15th when Federal financing will be terminated. It is a losing race, and immediate help is needed if children and the ill are to be assured fresh milk.

And so it goes.

It becomes apparent that some method of reallocating workers in accordance with the needs of the community must be worked out. Because of the inflammatory nature of any move to enforce such a measure, it is evident that the community itself must realize the seriousness of the labor needs, and with the pressure of sentiment demand such a move.

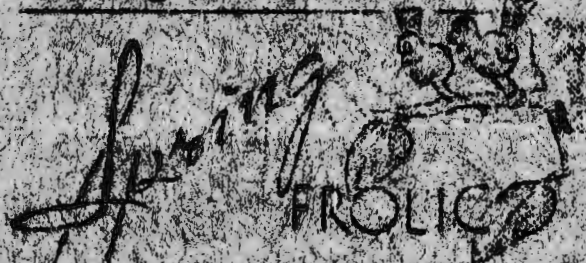

STEPS TAKEN TO REINFORCE BOARD

Working to revitalize the present Butte Temporary Council, the Council adopted a measure to create (1) a 12-man Issei Advisory Board, (2) a 5-man Executive Committee, (3) and an Advisory Commission to the Project Director Leroy Bennett, Thursday night at a special session.

The Advisory Commission was made to bring the administration closer to the people and to permit a greater interchange of ideas, it was stated. The Commission will be composed of the Executive Committee, four members of the Advisory Board and Harry Miyake, Central Block Manager.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE SET

The Issei Advisory Board to the Council was formed to utilize the wisdom and experience of Issei leaders. It will be appointed by the Council. Four men out of the Board will be appointed to serve on the Advisory Commission.

The need for a strong Council was voiced at the meeting. Chief problems facing the body are labor shortages, conservation of materials, and the rationing of food.

171 FILE CLAIMS FOR COMPENSATION

Flood of claimants applying for payment of Social Security Unemployment Insurance Compensation yesterday at the Butte employment office produced a total of 171 claims by closing time. Totals for Canal were unknown.

William Hugo, employment supervisor, emphasized again that all claims must be filed by Wednesday evening, March 31.

STRONG COUNCIL NEEDED

REPORTS emanating from Washington in the last three months up to a few weeks ago indicated that WRA regulations may be revised to make Issei eligible to serve on the Community Council. A letter a few days ago from Director Dillon Myer scattered to practical non-existence further hopes in this matter.

At the time the Community Council was being organized here, a petition was sent to the Washington office to revise its ruling by certain Issei and a few Nisei and missei leaders. In answer, John Province, Washington Chief of Community Services Division, explained the WRA's stand and stated that their request could not be granted.

The movement was justified on certain grounds, but it created undesirable stresses and strains. Its most damaging effect on the community was to shatter unity of Issei and Nisei thought. It was the ground for much hot discussions and animosities from which it appears the community has never recovered.

This was partly responsible for the fact that the temporary Community Councils have never had the support from the people that it needed to function as a powerful body to represent the people, and serve in an advisory legislative function to the administration.

In addition, a definite drawback to the success of the Council has been the general lack of interest in the community characteristic of most Nisei.

Nor can the council itself shrug off all the responsibility for its failure to serve a useful purpose. It had not exhibited the strength, the foresight, the pertinacity that is a requisite for such a body.

Under the circumstances, the administration did not, and perhaps, could not, have the confidence in the Council that it should have. Moreover, four projects stagnated in six months in the center did not make matters easier for the city "dada."

Realizing the deficiencies of the little Council under the present set-up, an attempt is being made to revitalize it. The experience and wisdom of the Issei will be utilized through the formation of an Issei advisory group of twelve. The council itself has elected an executive committee of five and together with four members of the advisory board and Harry Miyake will constitute an Advisory Commission to Project Director Bennett.

The time for wishful thinking concerning service on the Council on the part of Issei is over. The revamped Council has the makings of a group that will bring the administration closer to the people, will serve the community the better for it. It is time that the community forget its petty differences and lay aside its spathy and look to a future of greater cooperation, not for anyone's or any group's sake, but for the good of the community. Pressing problems are facing the residents. Without a strong council, these problems cannot be met honestly and intelligently.

WATER SITUATION

The water situation in the center is serious. The only way it can be met successfully is for the residents to construct, as block projects, laterals from the irrigation ditch to water the lawns and grounds.

Hostelers are required to pay their own traveling expenses. The hostels will charge the occupants a nominal fee of one dollar a day to help defray maintenance expenses. Loan funds are available to aid evacuees who are desirous of entering a hostel, yet who cannot pay the transportation expenses on the nominal hostel fee. Such loans may be repaid after the hosteler has secured employment.

If a hosteler should be unable to secure employment, he may return to the relocation center or to another hostel under another WRA field office.

WARM WEATHER BRINGS ON CRITICAL WATER SITUATION

Between February 20 to March 25, gallons per minute production of the Butte well dropped from 1200 to 800, disclosed by Earl Donald, Senior Engineer.

At the present rate of water consumption, all the faucets used to enter the

project grounds and farms will have to be closed, he said. The danger lies in the lowering of the water level in the well. The lower it drops, the less the output, and if it goes lower than 350 feet, the pump will have to be closed. At present, it hovers in the vicinity of 200 feet.

Consumption of water in the two communities shows 141,000 gallons per day average in a December to 500,000 in a February, in Canal. Butte meters show 745,000 in November up to 835,000 in February.

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FARM EQUIPMENT SURVEY TO COME

GIVE THEM TIME

That man has yet far to go before a world peace is attained, we grant. Against the irrefutable proof of the present war we have no argument. It is, however, global, and following this strife the world may be able to find peace on a global basis---because, willy-nilly man is learning the lesson that isolation is no longer possible, and that war is not a desirable means or an end. We do believe that the trend is hopeful.

We are aware that many do not believe as we do, as witness the pressure groups in California. Their latest outburst of anti-evacuee venom has to do with idle farm equipment allegedly owned by the evacuees. In their zeal to rid California of the economic competition of the 'yellow peril' menace, they are wrecking the good faith of the United Nations, and alienating minority groups throughout the world, and particularly in the United States.

Furthermore, they are a definite restraining influence to the winning of the peace following the war. The United States was and is a living proof to the world that heterogeneous populace can live in peace.

We are awaiting the time when Pacific Coast and Southern racists will learn a little of basic psychology and economics, to insure the peace to come.

tons with some producers getting over 20. The sugar content last year averaged 17.6%. At present the pay, based on 16.2% sugar content, amounts to \$11.50 per ton.

Labor terms provide for slightly better pay than the suggested pay scale prepared by the Department of Agriculture. On a thinning, hoeing, topping, and loading labor contract the employee will receive 25¢ a ton bonus. It was estimated that the workers will average from \$47 to \$50 per acre. In between the work on sugar beets, the worker will receive prevailing wages with a minimum of 50¢ an hour on any other work he may do.

Public reaction, it was stated was favorable. Two-way transportation will be provided for evacuees who go out on short-term leave and one-way for share-crop farmers.

The nine men are available for personal interviews on a fuller objective report of the prevailing condition. They are Harry Kamiya, D. Ichikawa, Steve Umino, George Nishimura, M. Matsuno and Jack Nishiwaki of Butte; Kay Nobusada, T. Matsumoto and S. Hanasaki of Canal.
