CO-OP

CASH REFUNDS START SATURDAY

Cash refunds on the remaining 70 per cent of the Co-op's revolving fund certificates, issued for the fiscal year which ended last June, will be paid to residents beginning this Saturday, July 15.

The schedule of payments for Butte is as follows:

July 15-blocks 73 and 74 at mess 73 from 1:30 to 2:15 p.m.

July 17-blocks 61 and 72 at mess 72 from 8 to 8:45 p.m.

July 18-blocks 59 and 60 at mess 60 from 8 to 8:45 p.m.

Canal blocks will get theirs at their respective block managers' offices as follows:

July 15-block 7 from 1:30 to 2:15 p.m.

July 17-block 8 from 7 to 8 p.m., block 9 from 8 to 9.

July 18-block 10 from 7 to 8 p.m., block 27 from 8 to 9 p.m.

July 19-block 25 from 7 to 8 p.m., block 26 from 8 to 9 p.m.

The remaining schedule will be published in following issues of the paper.

DOCTORS ASK COOPERATION

Doctors, at the last blocks managers meeting, requested that persons with only minor cuts and bruises do not come to the hospital for aid because the quota for each doctor is about twenty cases a day.

If persons abuse this request, individuals needing the attention may be deprived of proper care.

It was pointed out that some residents go directly to the doctor's home to be treated. That must stop.

Ice cream will be sold in Canal from 1:30 p.m. Saturday. Butte will remain the same.

Returning to the project Tuesday, Project Director Leroy H. Bennett stated that beer cannot be sold in this center and Japanese

SPECIAL COACHES LEAVE JULY 20-27

A sufficient number of people have signed up for leave to assure the chartering of a special coach from Chandler on both July 20 and 27.

There is still room for 18 persons to leave on July 20 and approximately 28 more persons on July 27. When all of these seats have been reserved no more relocators will be scheduled on the special coach for these days since it will accommodate only a limited number.

The remaining seats will be assigned "first come, first served" until the capacity is reached.

AMBULANCES WILL BE TRANSFERRED

Beginning Saturday, July 15, the ambulances will be transferred to internal security, said Hugo W. Wolter. One ambulance will remain on duty 24 hours a day at each of the police stations and be available for emergencies. Transportation of nurses' aides and clinic patients will be handled by special bus service under the transportation office on a regular scheduled basis. All calls for emergency ambulance service should be made to internal security.

THREE INDUCTED INTO ACTIVE DUTY

Tom Teramoto and Edward Aeizo Inouye left yesterday to report for active duty in the US Army at Fort Douglas in Utah.

Benjamin Ehara left this morning for Fort Douglas.

Said Bennett, "Phillip Glick, solicitor in Washington, is very definite on the opinion that beer cannot be sold on the project because it is located on Indian land."

At the annual conference of the Church of the Brethren held at Huntingdon, Pennsylvania, on June 10, the following resolution was passed:

"We recommend with respect to Americans of Japanese descent that our churches welcome into their services and fellowship those who are resettling in their communities; and that, as opportunity arises, we support the early return to their rightful homes of those who wish to resume residence on the Pacific coast."

The Church of the Brethren sponsored the hostel in Chicago and now has a hostel in New York.

DUNWOODY

TO GIVE COURSE IN MECHANICS

A new intensive course in mechanics is scheduled to open at Dunwoody Institute August 16, according to Elmer Isaksen, Minneapolis relocation officer.

The tuition is \$15.00 a month for the first six months and less thereafter.

The instruction is equivalent to a regular two-year, course, but those with a mechanical background and aptitude are able to finish the course within three to nine months. Classes are held from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

In addition, the Dunwoody Institute offers a number of free war training courses in subjects such as welding, electrical assembly and repair, inspection and gauging, machine shop, and mechanical drafting.

TWO PERSONS PLEAD GUILTY

Interior Secretary Harold Ickes announced that plans to transfer citizen troublemakers in Tule Lake to an isolation center at Leupp, Ariz., has been abandoned, according to the Associated Press.

The small number of citizens remaining in the Tule Lake stockade after re-study of the cases made it appear unnecessary to re-open the special center in Arizona, it was explained. There are 25 U.S. citizens being held in the stockade at present.

Of interest to young girls relocating to Chicago is the opening of a girls' club offering board and room. It is sponsored and supervised by the Episcopal Church on Chicago's west side, announced Raymond Booth, Chicago relocation officer.

The club will use part of the dormitory at the St. Mary's School, 2822 West Jackson, just 15 minutes by bus or street car from downtown Chicago. Mr. and Mrs. Kohachiro Sugimoto, formerly of San Francisco, will be in charge.

Applications for reservations may be sent to the school. As accommodations are limited, applications should be made quickly, said Booth.

REASONS ARE MANY-FOLD

The primary purposes of the Butte Recreation Association which was formed sometime ago and which, with its other activities, took over the financial angles of the Butte Baseball Association early this month, is as the following when resolved:

a. To act as an advisory council for the Community Activities Section.

b. To extend full benefits and privileges of membership in the Association to all groups, in the Butte Community, formally organized for a recreational purpose, with properly elected officers, and a regular meeting schedule, who rely on the services of the Community Activities Section.

c. To help exemplify the importance and significance of recreation and its activities.

d. To devise ways and means of raising funds when in emergency and also in fostering adequately the varied activities of all age groups for the center residents.

f. All revenue producing activities shall collaborate to clarify financial statements so when and if funds are desired, appropriate allotments can be provided.

g. To help recommend to the Administrative Office the desirable use of necessary center buildings and facilities to accommodate adequately the needs for community-wide activities.

IT WAS FURTHER RESOLVED that a Board be appointed semi-annually and that the Community Council Chairman for Recreation be ex-officio Chairman of this Board and that he be empowered to select the membership of this Board, and to hold all elections and meetings for the proper conduct of the purpose of this Board.

AND ALSO, that this board shall act in trust for the treasuries of the Member Groups, and shall also receive money for a general Community Activity Fund and determine the purposes for which this fund shall be spent.

MORNING SESSIONS.

Elementary school children in Butte attend the morning activities at the school. For the first three grades this includes some light reading activities, some remedial work and review, library reading, a story period, art, quiet play in the room and in the shade of the barracks, and some music. For the fourth, fifth, and sixth grades, the program includes 40 minutes of sports and games for all children, light reading and library work, English and social studies with relocation as the theme. From 10:30 to 11:30 each day, the pupils in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades go to clubs, which the children have chosen. They include the Spanish Club, 30 members; Dramatics Club, 30 members; Red Cross Club, 35 members; Science Club, 35 members; Airplane Club, 30 members; Hobby Club for boys, 60 members; Hobby Club for girls, 60 members; Crafts Club for boys, 60 members; Crafts Club for girls, 40 members.

THE AFTERNOON PROGRAM

From 1:00 to 2:30 every afternoon over 100 boys and girls of the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades come back to the air-cooled mess hall 41 to work with art mediums. There are several teachers in charge. Children of the kindergarten, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grade, may come to the library for rest, music, and a story hour. As many as 50 have attended this group. All are welcome.

ALL ARE WELCOME

Any child from kindergarten age through the sixth grade is welcome to come and participate in as many of the activities of the school as he wishes. There is something for each person from 8:00 to 2:30. From 3:00 p.m. on, the church and community are given the privilege of working with the children.

editorial:**AN ACTIVE PROGRAM**

Extensive summer school activities and courses have started in both Butte and Canal for all students from high school age down to the smallest. In a place where children have not much to do except go to school, there is nothing better than a summer program like those in Butte and Canal to keep youngsters out of trouble and at the same time help develop wholesome habits. When one of the community's pressing problems is juvenile delinquency, we feel that parents can help solve the problem by urging children to attend the summer school classes and join in the activities and recreation.

The term "summer school" may sound very forbidding, and one's first impulse may be to stay away. Perhaps it is the "summer" in it that makes it dry sounding and hot. However, if one takes a look into the curricula, he will find that interesting and varied programs for young people are offered.

Elsewhere in this issue is a report by Principal Roe H. Strickland on the program worked out for his Butte Elementary School. Such programs are not confined to Butte alone, nor are they for elementary students only.

It is interesting to note that Principal Strickland has included among his activities a Spanish Club for the fifth and sixth graders, an eleven week course to introduce the students to the foreign language. Among the other clubs are those in science, Red Cross, handcraft, airplane, music, and dramatics. Whether or not the students actually become study conscious and acquire a tremendous amount of knowledge is not the question. What is important is the interest that these varied programs hold for the students and how well they help to channel youths' energies into constructive fields.

Sometimes we fail to appreciate the school system that we have here, schools accredited in the state and respected by the students and parents alike. We hope that all residents will take advantage of the carefully worked out summer program that will not only educate but also will keep young people off the delinquency list.

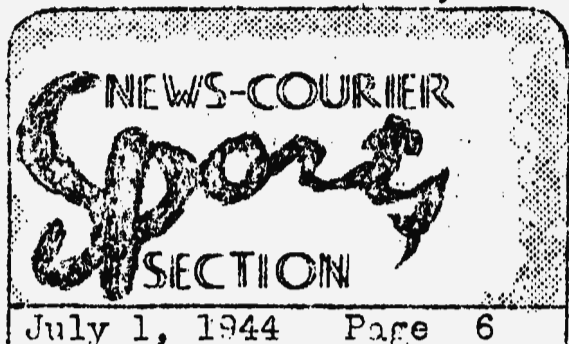

FIGHT FOR INDEPENDENCE

One hundred sixty-eight years ago 56 courageous Americans signed the Declaration of Independence to free their country from the shackles of tyranny and to win back for their people the unalienable rights endowed to all people by the Creator, the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. Ever since, we have been fighting wars to protect those rights, and today we are engaged in the biggest of them all, the second World War.

The Rivers Honor Roll monument with its more than 500 names is standing evidence that nisei Americans from Gila are doing their part. And that they are doing that well is written in the reports that come in from the Italian and South Pacific battle-fronts telling of Japanese American courage and sacrifices. Rivers is fully in the fight with the lives of its boys as stakes. No matter what the price, they must win, for the future of all of us depends on them.

On this Fourth of July, as the nation reaffirms its declaration to free the country from the oppressions of tyranny, nisei Americans will no doubt see the importance of their part in the struggle. For theirs is a fight that is two-fold--one for the freedom of their country, and the other for the freedom of their people.

Buffalo is a critical labor shortage area, and day after day newspapers are full of advertisements for employees in a wide diversity of occupations, announced Harry Weiss, acting relocation officer in Buffalo.

JOBS

A few casual contacts have already turned up jobs for mechanics and mechanic helpers, bench hands, machinists, mechanical engineers, draftsman, tire recappers, tool and die makers, and welders, said Weiss.

The starting rates for the less experienced persons in Buffalo is 75 cents an hour.

HOUSING

Generally speaking the housing situation is better than that existing in Detroit and Cleveland. Two nisei families are living in Federal housing projects in Buffalo.

There is no easily dis-

cernible prejudices against persons of Japanese ancestry and it would appear that there must be a number of evacuees who will venture out to Buffalo and test its slogan, "The City of Good Neighbors," said Weiss.

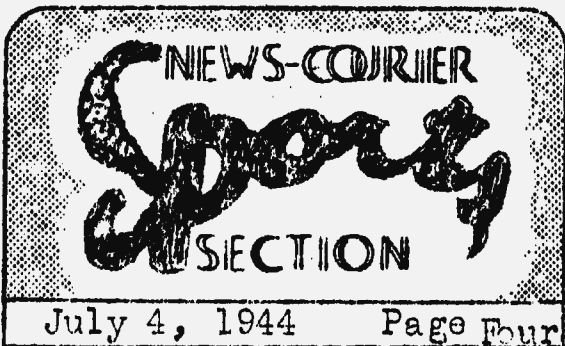

PRESIDENT SIGNS CITIZENSHIP LAW

Legislation to withdraw the citizenship of Japanese born in this country whose loyalty to the enemy marks them as Japanese nationals was signed by President Roosevelt on July 3, according to an A.P. report.

Francis Biddle, attorney general, said the law was needed to deal with the problem of 300 to 1000 Japanese at the Tule Lake relocation center, who he said, "assert their loyalty to the Emperor of Japan and their desire to renounce their United States citizenship and to be recognized as Japanese nationals."

By making it possible for this group to abandon American citizenship, Biddle told Congress, "They could thereupon be dealt with as alien enemies under the applicable statutes."

RETURN ALLOWED AFTER INDUCTION

Evacuees on seasonal leave who have received army induction notices will be released from WFA contracts and allowed to return to the center on presentation of induction notice by the evacuee or telegraph notification from the project director.

Director Dillon Myer teletyped to the project yesterday that field officers are reporting some difficulty with evacuees on seasonal leave seeking to return to the projects on the basis that they have been ordered to report for induction. The WFA has agreed to release such men and provide transportation provided definite proof of the army order is furnished. Letters or wires from friends within the project will not be accepted as evidence.

PFC. ARAKI

GILAN DIES IN ACTION ON ITALIAN BATTLEFRONT

Pfc. Masashi Araki, 21, Canal's champion weight-lifter and formerly of Selma, California, was killed in action on the Italian front on June 2, the War Department notified

his father, Choemon Araki of 27-7-D, Monday.

The terse War Department notice announces the first Gilan to be killed in action in any war front.

Young Araki, '41 graduate of Selma High School, joined the first group of volunteers that left Rivers on May 24, 1943. After receiving his training at Camp Shelby, he volunteered for active duty, fighting with the 442nd infantry.

While in Canal camp he set marks for weight-lifting in the continental clean, jerk 230, and two hand snatch 160.

Besides his father, he is survived by his mother, two sisters, and four brothers, all of whom are residing in Canal camp. Four men from the Canal Council, one representative from block 27, and the Servicemen's Association will take care of funeral arrangements. The date is undecided as yet.

TULEAN KILLED FROM STABBING

Yaoza Hitomi, 44, Japanese alien was found stabbed to death Monday night at the Tule Lake segregation center, the war relocation authority announced Tuesday, according to UP.

Hitomi, formerly of Sacramento, California was engaged in the insurance business.

U.C. PRESIDENT URGES TOLERANCE

Warning against hysteria in dealing with Japanese Americans now and after the war, Dr. Robert Gordon Sproul, president of the University of California, last week pleaded for a "sensible" approach to the problem before the Pacific Coast Committee on American Principles and Fair Play, reported the L.A. Times.

The committee, formed 18 months ago in San Francisco and of which Dr. Sproul is honorary chairman, wholeheartedly endorses President Roosevelt's policy of relocation of Japanese evacuated from coastal areas after Pearl Harbor.

Said Sproul, "The committee helps the public to discriminate sharply between our enemies in Japan, the military criminals for whom no fate is too harsh, no punishment too cruel, and those persons of Japanese stock in

PFC. HIGA**WAR VETERAN VISITS DENVER**

Pfc. Thomas Higa, 27-year-old Japanese American war veteran wounded at Cassino in the Italian campaign, is in Denver to tell other Japanese about the wonderful treatment the United States army gives members of his race.

GOOD TREATMENT

"And I mean wonderful," said Private Higa, who was the smallest man in the famous 100th Battalion, which distinguished itself in the fighting at Salerno and later at Cassino. The battalion, virtually all of whose members were Japanese Americans born in Hawaii, is still fighting in Italy.

"It was wonderful to be treated just like everyone else, even though your parents were born in Japan," added Private Higa. "Over there no one cares what your ancestry is. The only question is, can you fight? And my battalion fights like hell."

Private Higa is five feet, one and one-half inches tall--or short.

"But in a battle," he smiled, "It's pretty good to be small--you don't make such a good target."

AT PEARL HARBOR

Higa was inducted into the United States army in June, 1941, and was stationed at Schofield Barracks, Honolulu, the day Pearl Harbor was attacked. He declined to talk about his Pearl Harbor experiences, for military reasons. Six months after this country entered the war he was sent to Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, thence to Camp Shelby, Miss. He went overseas in August, 1943, landing at Oran, Algeria, and going directly from there to Salerno.

He hopes to return soon to a fighting front, and he doesn't care where it might be.

Asked if he'd like to fight in the Pacific, he replied: "Sure, I like to fight the enemy no matter where he is. I'm an American, see, and I want to get this war over as soon as possible."

DEATH OF SOLDIER

War this week struck closer to Rivers than it has ever done before with the announcement that one of its boys was killed in Italy while fighting with the 442nd combat team.

What has been a foreboding ever since Gila's boys first began volunteering for the army early last year has come to pass. This announcement will no doubt be only the first of many similar notices, for it is more than probable that as Gila's service list grows, it will take its share in the form of wounds suffered and supreme sacrifices given.

Death of one whom we know back home as a neighbor, or as that boy who used to pole vault for our high school, is hard to accept. With every war casualty announcement some family and friends somewhere in the nation suffer personal grief. This is one of the results of war that cannot be helped.

But what we can help is to make sure that our soldiers do not fight and die in vain. They have gone forth from our community to gamble their individual futures for big stakes, the future of all Japanese Americans in this country. However much we would like to treat ourselves like any other American, we cannot help feeling especially sorry for the nisei soldier who left his family confined in a relocation center to die for his and his people's right to live unconfined anywhere in the country. It is ironical to know that while the nisei was giving his life so that all people might live freely, his parents and others like them were still being excluded from their home states and home towns.

Dying is a wartime sacrifice that all Americans must be prepared to face. That cannot be helped. But what can be helped is that the rest of us must see to it that those who sacrificed--did not do so in vain. For if after all this, nisei and their parents are not given all the privileges of citizenship, including the right to live anywhere in the United States and freedom from all discriminations because of race, then the boys who gave their youth for the ideals that America has promised will have died in vain.

TIME**LETTERS RAP PREJUDICE**

Several letters in this week's Time Magazine takes H. Frederick Peterson to task for writing in last month's Time that, "For all the years that are left to me, I shall loathe every Jap....I shall want them scourged from this our blessed America."

One of the letters reads "I have read H. Frederick Petersen's letter and I am shocked that people who have lost a son in this war should have so little respect for the cause for which he died.

"American citizens of Japanese ancestry are no more to blame for that ancestry than is Mr. Peter-

son for the Scandinavian ancestry which his name indicates. Let the Petersens remember that boys of Japanese ancestry have given and are giving their lives for America too--for the Petersens as well as those who really believe in the American way of tolerance."

Any person who is authorized to proceed to Hawaii and is otherwise eligible for assistance grants will be entitled to total passage including boat travel, reported Dillon Myer, WRA director, in a teletype to the project.

It is unlikely that any person evacuated from Hawaii will be permitted to return for the duration of hostilities.

Therefore, applicants should be confined to those who left other than by evacuation, according to the WRA handbook.

HIRABAYASHI HELD ON DRAFT CHARGE

Gordon Hirabayashi who once held an unsuccessful court fight against the legality of the evacuation was arrested in Spokane, Washington, on a charge of failing to fill out and return a selective service questionnaire, according to the AP.

The arrest was made on a Federal warrant and followed by a few days Hirabayashi's disclosure that he and Esther Schmoer of Seattle plan to be married in August.

Gen. Bonesteel Commands Coast

Major General Charles H. Bonesteel, at his first press conference Friday after assuming command of the Western Defense Command, turned aside a question as to whether he would permit the Japanese Americans to return to the coastal area, according to the Associated Press.

"I do not know enough about it," he said. Commenting on the possibility of any other change in WDC policies, he explained, "I will have to study the situation for a month or two. It would be very foolish anyway to make any radical change."

Bonesteel came here from command of the Army infantry school at Fort Benning, Georgia. He succeeds Lt. Gen. Dolos C. Emmons who has been given an unannounced assignment.

S.P. COACH

Will Leave On Alternate Weeks

The special Southern Pacific coach from Chandler will be available in July on alternate Thursdays only, instead of every Thursday as heretofore announced, said Wilson Hart, relocation adviser.

The new schedule is being followed because war transportation regulations prevent the chartering of special coaches for less than 40 passengers.

Coaches are scheduled to leave Chandler July 13, and 27.

Stated Hart, "All persons planning to leave for eastern points during July are urged to schedule their departure on one of these two dates so that the special traveling facilities can be available to them."

RELOCATION PROGRAM PROGRESSING, SAYS MYER

Restoration of evacuees to normal living outside relocation centers is now on a well-established basis and moving forward at a steady pace, D.S. Myer, director of the WRA, said last month.

EXTENSIVE

"Since its modest beginning approximately two years ago the program of evacuees resettlement has developed to its present stage where a network of 38 WRA field offices and many organized groups and individuals are actively helping evacuees to relocate and become satisfactorily adjusted," he stated.

"No longer need an evacuee resident of a center wonder how he will be accepted and how he will make his living in an outside city or town. With 25,000 evacuees resettled in normal communities in all 48 states and the District of Columbia, an evacuee who now leaves a center will probably resettle in or near a community where persons of Japanese descent are already members in good standing.

CONDITIONS

"Jobs are available in all lines of work in most localities. Housing is easier to find in some places than others. The newspapers carry stories once in a while about the trouble an evacuee or a group of evacuees had in gaining acceptance. These are the exceptions. For every such case there are thousands of successful instances of relocation that have taken place quietly and without news-

APPEAL NOTICES FILED IN COURT FOR 63 JAPANESE

Notices of appeal were filed in U.S. District Court on July 1 in behalf of 63 Heart Mt. nisei alleging each defendant had been deprived of his rights as a citizen by being confined in a relocation center surrounded by a barbed or other wire fence guarded by the military force of the United States and restrained of his liberty without due process of law and in violation of the Constitution of the United States.

The 63 Japanese Americans were sentenced to three years imprisonment on convictions of failure to report for pre-induction physical examinations.

"The Newark relocation office has been opened following a survey which indicates there are numerous excellent resettlement opportunities for center residents in the industrial and agricultural sections of New Jersey," Fistere said.

One of the additional couples would be engaged in gardening and housework and the other would assist with the cooking and perform houseman duties. No fancy cooking would be required. Each couple will receive \$150 per month plus complete maintenance including private living quarters and dining room. If they prefer to prepare Japanese dishes they would be free to do so. They would receive three consecutive days off each month and would be provided with complete home furnishings including radios. These jobs are permanent, if the person employed wishes to

stay with the employer.

In addition to being one of wealthiest men in America, Spanel has been active in organizing a citizens league to assist in resettlement of evacuees on the East Coast. It is believed that this is one of the most outstanding offers that has ever been received at this center from the East Coast, said Huso.

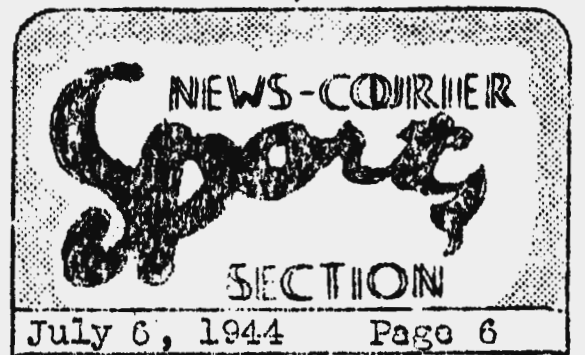

COUNCIL STUDIES JUVENILE CODE

A tentative juvenile code, providing for juvenile hearings and listing offenses, has been drawn up by the Butte Community Council and will be submitted for council approval, probably at the next meeting. The code is subject to change.

The tentative code, which would affect all Butte residents under 18 years of age, reads as follows:

1. JUVENILE DEFINED.

Any person below the age of eighteen is a juvenile.

2. JUVENILE SUBJECT TO LAWS AS ADULT.

Any juvenile is subject to the laws of this community in the same manner as an adult, except that the provisions of this code shall be intended to be corrective, not penal.

3. POWER TO MAKE LAWS VESTED IN THE COMMUNITY COUNCIL.

The power to make or enact, modify or repeal any laws under this code is vested in the Community Council.

4. JURISDICTION OF JUVENILE BOARD.

The jurisdiction of the Juvenile Board shall be limited to hearing and determining such cases of juvenile delinquency as are brought before it, and to dispose of them in accordance with the provisions of this code.

5. CASES HOW DISPOSED.

The board may conduct its own independent hearing for determination and dis-

PETITION SEEKS TO ENJOIN COAST EXCLUSION OF NISEI

A petition which would restrain the Western Defense Command from blocking the return of three Japanese Americans to the Pacific Coast will be heard on July 21 before

the Superior Court in Los Angeles, according to an A.P. report.

The petition sponsored by the American Civil Liberties Union contends that there is no military need justifying further exclusion from California of "loyal American-born Japanese" and that the removal of "all enemy forces from Alaska and the Aleutians" makes any further exclusion of such citizens "unnecessary and therefore unconstitutional."

Filed in behalf of Shizuko Shiramizu, widow of Kiyoshi Shiramizu, fatally wounded in Italy, Masaru Baba, honorably discharged from the army, and George Oshikubo, a dentist now at Topaz relocation center, A.L. Wirin, Civil Liberties attorney, said the action may become a test case.

The petition is directed against Major General Charles H. Bonesteel, Western Defense commander and three other officers of the command.

RELOCATION BUS GOES FOR GOOD

Rivers' large relocation bus, which has changed hands at least four times between the WRA and the Army, left Rivers Thursday, apparently for good.

posal of each case brought before it, or it may in its discretion turn over the case for prosecution before the Judicial Commission.

6. NUMBER OF PERSONS TO SERVE ON BOARD AND TERM. The number of persons to serve on the Board shall not be less than three nor more than six, and each shall serve for a term of one year.

7. BOARD TO HAVE POWER TO ISSUE SUBPOENAS, CALL WITNESSES. For the purpose of conducting a proper and efficient hearing, the Board is authorized to issue subpoenas, call all such witnesses as are material to the proper conduct of the hearings.

8. DECISION OF THE BOARD BINDING BUT APPEAL PERMISSIBLE. The decision of the Board is binding, except that an appeal may be made to the Project Director upon a showing of proper grounds.

9. PROCEEDINGS BEFORE JUDICIAL COMMISSION A CRIMINAL CASE. All proceedings before the Judicial Commission shall be tried and disposed of in the same manner as a criminal case.

10. CURFEW FOR JUVENILE. A juvenile shall not wander away from his living quarters during the late hours of the evening without just cause; nor shall he loiter or be found out of doors after the hour of 12:00 midnight without a proper escort.

11. PLAYING OF HARD AND SOFTBALL AN OFFENSE. All playing of hard and softball other than at the place provided is deemed an offense.

12. DRINKING AND SMOKING AN OFFENSE. Drinking of alcoholic beverage or smoking by a juvenile is deemed an offense.

13. ZOOT - SUIT GANGSTERISM, AN OFFENSE. Any juvenile who shall engage in zoot-suit or any other form of gangsterism is guilty of an offense.

EFFECTS OF RACISM

In an article entitled "Racism on the West Coast," Carey McWilliams discusses the West Coast's campaign to prevent the release of any persons of Japanese ancestry from the relocation centers for the duration in the June issue of the New Republic.

There can be no question, he writes, but that anti-evacuee agitation in California is being cultivated for partisan political purposes. The hearings were, in large part, aimed at smearing the WRA and building up a wall of reactionary feeling of stimulating racial hatred. To some extent this agitation has unquestionably been effective, wrote McWilliams.

Various emergency measures adopted after Pearl Harbor have been relaxed on the West Coast and the general opinion has so changed in our favor as to warrant the military lifting the ban against the return of evacuees. If the ban is lifted, there will be no mass return of the evacuees and the freely predicted "murder" and "bloodshed" will not occur. There is a respectable opinion in California today that favors lifting the ban.

California has forced the Washington authorities to adopt a series of measures each of which has seriously jeopardized our national interests in the Far East. It requires no insight to predict that this same situation will continue until the American people realize the local areas should not be permitted to force the federal government into the position of having to adopt their particular attitudes on race relations, concluded McWilliams.

"since it gives the evacuees a four to six months' period to make a permanent adjustment in a new community, and permits them to return to the center if such an attempt is unsuccessful.

"Trial period indefinite leave, however, may be issued only at the center, and evacuees out on seasonal and short-term leave will not be granted permission to transfer to trial period indefinite leave."

Additional revisions of leave regulations at this time provide that: (1) each person 18 years of age or over, plus those who became 17 before May 17, 1944, must execute a separate trial period agreement in applying for trial period indefinite leave; (2) an evacuee who is converting to indefinite leave from short-term, seasonal, or trial period indefinite leave, who is otherwise eligible for a grant, and who has paid his own travel expense to the community in which he is resettled, may be reimbursed for his actual travel expense including Federal tax on his ticket; and (3) travel of evacuees on indefinite leave may now be authorized to points of relocation outside the continental limits of the United States.

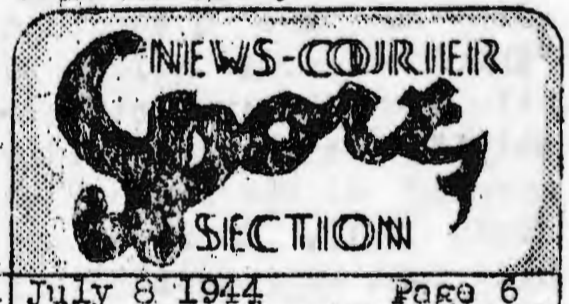

THREE IN ARMY, THREE TO GO

ITALY

NISEI AMERICANS LEAD ASSAULT

Japanese Americans of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team spearheaded the assault along the West Coast sector of Italy toward the Port of Livorno (Leghorn) on July 9, it was officially announced yesterday.

With tank support, this force, a part of Gen. Mark Clark's Fifth Army, smashed into enemy positions in the face of determined resistance.

Said an Allied spokesman:

Spearheading the assault was a unit of the 442nd which has performed brilliantly throughout the Italian campaign.

CONSERVE WATER JANEWAY WARNS

The danger of acute water shortage in Rivers, with even the possible necessity of periodic water shutoffs again this year, was pointed out by J.E. Janeway, construction engineer.

"If some attempt is not made by all residents to conserve water, it is going to be necessary to cut water off from 2 to 5 p.m. each afternoon in order to keep enough water in our tank for fire protection," Janeway warned.

He declared that there is entirely too much water wasted by turning on too much cooler water and from too much sprinkling in the afternoons. From 2 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. more water is being used than the pumps are able to produce.

Nisei Family Enjoys Dairy

"We are fitting into the community quite well," writes Izzy Otani, former Butte Community clerk, who with his family has resettled on a dairy farm in Poplar Grove, Ill.

Otani does the milking twice daily of 24 cows, helps in haying and in cultivation of corn and soy bean, in addition to working on his own vegetable garden.

He writes as follows:

"We are the only nisei for miles around us but we have made friends and will continue to do so. We have a kind boss who treats us like a million. He has given me two raises in the short time I've been here.

"We have attended church every week since the family became united. We've had newly made friends bring us fireworks for the kids, strawberries, toys, play books, etc...At first people seem to stare and look us over, but as soon as we start conversing, all the mystery seems to melt away and no one seems to question anything.

"The first Sunday we went to church the people seemed to line up to invite us to other gatherings and invite the children to Sunday School and other church activities."

Otani advises that a single man should not be recommended for dairy farm work because it would be a tough, lonely life, but for a family man it's quite the thing because it insures him a house and quite a helping of food.

WATCH THAT MATCH

Small fires like the one that threatened one of the new school buildings in Butte and another one that started in block 55 last week are not big enough and disastrous enough to impress us too much. But they should be enough to warn us that the hazards of fires do exist.

Anyone who stops to consider for a moment just what it would mean to him and to his neighbors should a barrack or two burn up would be careful how he throws his matches around. The thought of fires often brings to mind the excitement of seeing another's home burn; it hardly ever occurs to him that his may be the one.

Gila has been relatively fortunate in regard to fires within the residential area. With the newcomers added from Jerome, and living space a little more crowded again, it is well to give some thought to fire prevention.

Amount of prevention in this case is almost priceless, because after a fire has run amuck in a barrack or a block, cure is an impossibility.

THE AMERICAN WAY

(Under the date of June 23, 1944, the Milwaukee Journal carried the following editorial:)

"On the west coast, many otherwise respectable organizations--including the American Legion, which should stand for the finest kind of Americanism--have been engaging in a bitter hate campaign against the Japanese Americans. They have sought to direct the enmity for Japan against these citizens. The west coast press has also played a disgraceful role in this attack.

"What kind of Americanism is it for the city of Gardena to omit from its honor roll of citizens the names of 17 Japanese Americans in the service of our common country? What kind of Americanism is it for the American Legion to revoke the charters of two posts made up of Japanese American veterans of the first World War? What kind of Americanism is it for the legion in Portland, Oregon, to protest the efforts of local citizens to provide some volunteer care for a Japanese cemetery?

"The attitude expressed in these actions is a disheartening sign that we have a long way to go to achieve the kind of tolerance and democracy we fight for."

FIVE SONS SERVING IN ARMED FORCES

The name Nakada is Japanese, but if the number of sons contributed to the armed forces means anything, the Nakada family of 47-9-A are more than 100% American. They have five sons now serving from the Pacific to the Italian fronts.

They are Pvt. Saburo J. Nakada in the Pacific; PFC. Henry I. Nakada, in the thick of fighting in Italy; Pvt. Minoru P. Nakada, attending Savage; S/Sgt. Yoshinao, at Har-

vard; Pvt. George at Fort Benning in Georgia. Yoshio is now awaiting his call, which will make the sixth son to be serving.

James who is attending the University of Illinois received an editorial comment in the Oak Park weekly paper in Illinois where he was enrolled in high school.

Dr. Eugene Youngert in addressing the graduating class called particular attention to James as having five brothers in

the United States armed forces. Dr. Youngert described the service which each of these five brothers is rendering to this country in some detail, and after each such description, the audience is reported to have broken into applause.

Asked how she felt, Mrs. Nakada said, "it cannot be otherwise because they are all American citizens." They are formerly of Azusa, Calif., and recently transferred from Heart Mt.

MANY OPPORTUNITIES OFFERED IN BUFFALO; LABOR SHORTAGE

A survey of conditions in Buffalo, N.Y., discloses in wide area of unexplored opportunities which waiting to be opened to

for and by persons of Japanese ancestry. It is a critical labor shortage area and day after day the newspapers are full of advertisements for employees in a wide diversity of occupation.

A few casual contacts by the Acting Relocation Officer who has just been assigned in Buffalo have already turned up jobs for mechanics and mechanic helpers; bench hands, machinists; mechanical engineers and draftsmen; tire recappers; tool and die makers and welders. The starting rate there for the less experienced persons is 75¢ an hour.

Generally speaking the housing situation is better than that existing in Detroit and Cleveland.

At the present writing the nisei population in Buffalo is about 25 and there are two families of issei with nisei children. There are also a brother and sister who are issei. These people have been working in war plants or in private stores or garages. Several are students at the University of Buffalo; one girl is a secretary for the Secretary of the YWCA; one fellow works for a Baptist church here.

O'HARRA GILA OBSERVES SOBER FOURTH

Celebration of July Fourth at Gila River in traditional American fashion is described by Michaela O'Harra, feature writer for the Arizona Daily Star, who covered the Rivers parade and ceremonies last week.

The keynote of the day was sober, she writes. Just before singing the "Star Spangled Banner" as prelude for the speeches, the holiday crowd was told of the death of Masashi Araki, first Rivers boy reported killed in action in the present war.

Among the evacuees whom she mentioned in her long write-up were the war heroes Shimazu and Komoto; Councilmen George Nishimura, John Fukushima, and Robert Nomi; Kameji Komuro, police officer; John Tachihara, scout leader; and Jitsutaro Tokuyama.

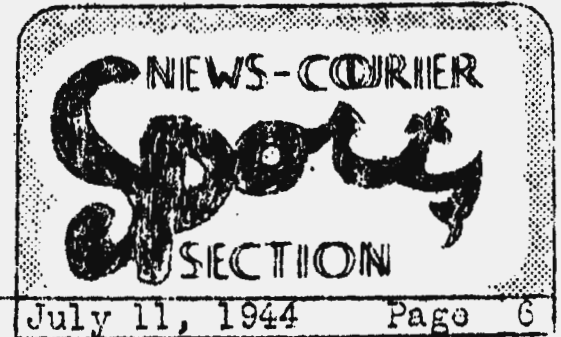

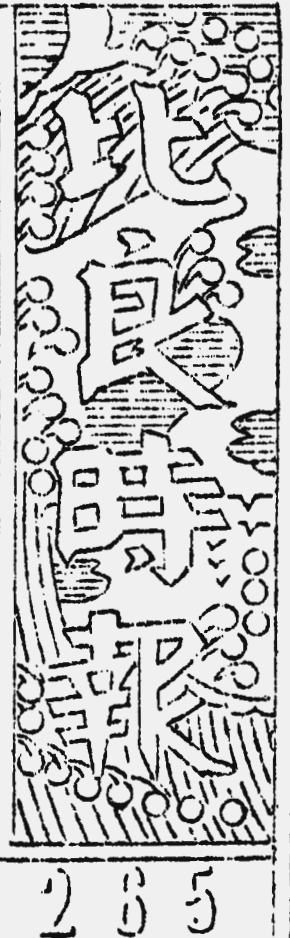

INTERCAMP CAR CHECKING STOPS

Trucks and cars traveling between Canal and Butte will no longer be checked by internal security men at the entrances, as has been done in the past.

1. Checking at the entrances is not needed because the trip ticket system is used, whereby drivers will carry tickets for all trips.

She suggested that Rivers have a training class for home service workers. The home service department's main job is to give instructions and information to servicemen and families, concerning rules and regulations on allotments and allowances for active servicemen, compensation and pension for ex-servicemen, prisoners of war, mustering out pay, and emergency furloughs.

She met with members of the administration, the welfare staff, and with Red Cross representatives of both Canal and Butte. She expects to be back again in September.

Kaltenborn, nationally known radio commentator, enclosing Mr. Kaltenborn's check for \$100 to help provide a scholarship for a young American of Japanese descent at Wayland academy, Beaver Dam, Wisconsin. Mr. Kaltenborn writes: 'As one who has personal contact with the magnificent contribution being made by young Americans of Japanese ancestry to our war effort in the South and the Southwest Pacific areas, I am happy to have an opportunity to make this contribution. I feel that I personally owe something to my fellow-Americans of Japanese ancestry to make up for sometimes unfair and sometimes unintelligent treatment which they have received. You are at liberty to publicize both this contribution and this statement if you feel it will serve the cause of fair play to our fellow-Americans of Japanese ancestry which we both have at heart.' Atty. Bull has been active for many months in behalf of American citizens of Japanese descent in helping them to find employment and a chance to assist in our war effort."

Deferment Plan Is Explained

The National Selective Service headquarters will investigate any cases of nisei over 26 in essential occupations, ordered for induction by local Selective Service boards, that is brought to their attention. The National office points out that everything possible should first be done to straighten out the case with the local board.

Following are the steps which should be taken:

1. The employer should send a request for deferment to the local board.

2. If within about ten days, no reply has been received from the local board, a second letter should be sent by registered mail, calling the attention of the board to the fact that the first communication has not been answered.

3. If the board continues to ignore the request and the induction of the nisei is ordered, an

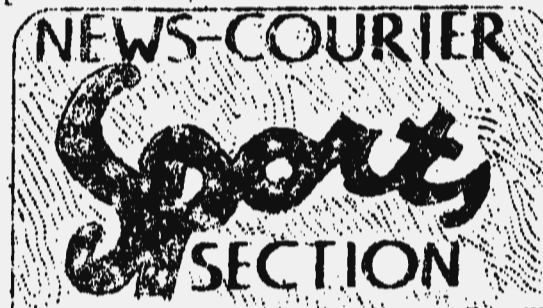

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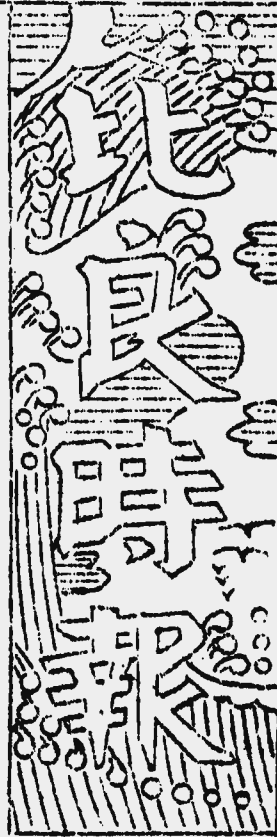

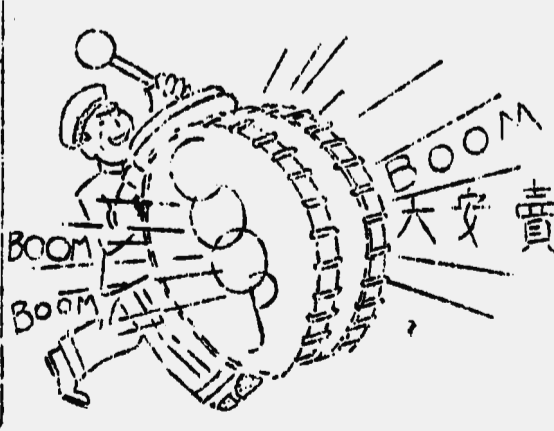

3. POWER TO MAKE LAWS VESTED IN THE COMMUNITY COUNCIL. The power to make or enact, modify or repeal any laws under this code is vested in the Community Council.

4. JURISDICTION OF JUVENILE BOARD. The jurisdiction of the Juvenile Board shall be limited to hearing and determining such cases of juvenile de-

CITIZENSHIP**RENUNCIATION
NOT COMPULSORY**

On July 1, a bill simplifying the method by which citizens of the United States may voluntarily renounce their citizenship, became a law over the signature of the President.

The new law, according to Project Attorney James H. Terry, does not compel any American citizen to renounce his citizenship against his will. It provides, however, that an American citizen may renounce his citizenship by making a statement to that effect on a form to be prescribed by the U.S. Attorney General, and before an officer designated by the Attorney General. Such a renunciation must be approved by the Attorney General as not being contrary to the interests of national defense, which means that persons subject to the selective service act will not be able to use the law as a device for evading service in the armed forces.

The new law will be effective only while the United States is at war, and will not become fully operative until publication by the Department of Justice of the necessary regulations, development of the necessary forms, and designations of the officers authorized to accept the forms.

editorial:**LIFE WITH A PURPOSE**

It is hard to realize that today marks the end of the second year at Gila, and that from tomorrow we shall be going on the third. Especially for the young it is almost frightening to see that two good years of a young life have been wasted and that all we have gained during those years is age. We are standing still while the rest of the world goes whizzing by.

It is a good thing that there are calendars and year marks like July 20 to remind us of a year's flight, for in the methodical living we tend to forget that we too have, or once had, ambition of getting ahead.

The biggest tragedy of camp living can well be the mental inertia of its residents from long and purposeless living. A young mind which had the potentialities of expansion, leading with it a body which had potentialities of great exertion, may be dulled because of the momentary disruption in our natural lives and may forever go undeveloped by being hampered at a critical time.

It's well for those who have relocated and those who plan to. It's well for the parents of growing children and for the youngsters themselves who are happily worried by exams and report cards. All of these have a goal and a hope, more or less, to give them the satisfaction of progressing each day.

But all is not well for the young men and women just out of school who for individual reasons are remaining in this center for the time being. Theirs are lives where energies are stifled in their natural expansion and where mental and physical stagnation can easily set in. They owe a duty to themselves to keep themselves progressing where progress is difficult until they can resume their normal life outside.

Any goal, big or small, will act as guide to progress. The one who aspires to write may be keeping daily impressions of life. Each page added to his notes means progress toward his goal. The person who wants to go out of camp as a better physical specimen will be working out on bars or taking physical exercise. Every muscle developed will be an achievement and a satisfaction.

There is nothing quite so pleasing as the feeling of having accomplished; nothing quite so peculiarly lonely as realizing at day's end that not a thing has been accomplished, that a day has been lost. Once we have set up our goals, camp living ceases to be a pause, for in having a goal we progress, and in progressing we live.

linguency as are brought before it, and to dispose of them in accordance with the provisions of this code.

5. CASES HOW DISPOSED.

The board may conduct its own independent hearing for determination and disposal of each case brought before it, or it may in its discretion turn over the case for prosecution before the Judicial Commission.

6. NUMBER OF PERSONS TO SERVE ON BOARD AND TERM

The number of persons to serve on the board shall not be less than three nor more than six, and each shall serve for a term of one year.

7. BOARD TO HAVE POWER TO ISSUE SUBPOENAS, CALL WITNESSES. For the purpose of conducting a proper and efficient hearing, the board is authorized to issue subpoenas, call all such witnesses as are material to the proper conduct of the hearing.

8. DECISION OF THE BOARD BINDING BUT APPEAL PERMISSIBLE. The decision of the board is binding, except that an appeal may be made to the project director upon a showing of proper grounds.

9. PROCEEDINGS BEFORE JUDICIAL COMMISSION A CRIMINAL CASE. All proceedings before the Judicial Commission shall be tried and disposed of in the same manner as a criminal case.

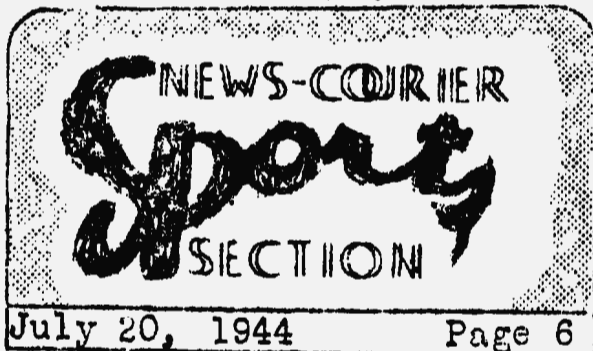
BRONCOS CINCH NAT'L LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP

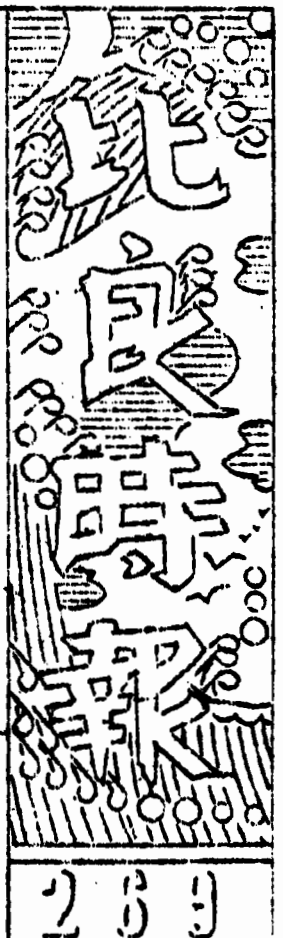

The ten were chosen at a meeting of the hospital committees of both camps which have been working on the proposed token of appreciation for doctors for several months. After much discussion on the amount it was decided that 7 cents be contributed each month by each resident.

It was also decided that two representatives will be chosen from each block to work out the method of collection and the method of distribution after the money has been collected.

A special treasurer of the Red Cross will take care of the collected money.

SECOND GILAN DIES IN ITALY

"Please convey to all residents of the Gila River Relocation Center my best wishes. I should like for each resident to know that I appreciate the fine spirit he displayed in activities incident to the recent closing of Jerome.

"Particularly, those former residents of Jerome who now are establishing new homes in your center are to be congratulated--for their part in planning the movements from Jerome and the willingness with which they did their share of the many tasks involved; for the graciousness with which they understood and accepted the necessity for closing the center; for their cooperation in facing the crating and the dust and the inconveniences of moving; and for the good housekeeping they did before leaving their former relocation residence.

"So, too, the earlier residents of Gila River are to be congratulated--for their willingness to watch that center again become a crowded community; for their participation in the mechanical job of receiving the people from Jerome; and for the hospitality and welcome they extended to the weary newcomers.

"Jerome was closed with so very little confusion that the entire operation was accomplished with small concern on the part of the national director. The smoothness of the transfer operations and the efficiency of physical abandonment would have been impossible without full cooperation of the residents. This chapter of WRA's history is a credit to each of you."

A SOUND CHOICE

Because we are, in a sense, only visitors in Arizona, the political vicissitudes of the State are not, strictly speaking, our business. Nevertheless we think that the Democrats of the State are to be congratulated for their selections in the major primary contests this week.

NO DELUSION

We do not delude ourselves into thinking that Arizona's delegation in Congress and Governor Osborn have extended to us the famed hospitality of the West or have been sympathetic or particularly interested in our disrupted existences. They have made it quite clear that the State is opposed to immigration of Japanese Americans resulting from the establishment of relocation centers in the somewhat sparsely populated state.

THEY DID NOT STOOP

This point of view is at least understandable. The Governor and Congressional delegation succeeded in inducing the WRA to adopt a policy of refusing to approve relocation leave to Arizona except in cases of extreme hardship. On the other hand, Senator Hayden, Governor Osborn, and Representatives Murdock and Harless have never stooped to blind, vitriolic expressions of hatred and prejudice against the citizens among us who would be citizens but for the naturalization laws. We think that those four gentlemen have tried to represent the viewpoint of the better citizenry of Arizona without either injustice on the one hand or sentimentality on the other. As much cannot be said for some of their opponents in the primary election who have at times vented their spleen and bigotry in a manner unworthy of the principles and ideals of the State and the Nation.

We are glad to note that the democratic voters of the State wisely selected candidates most apt to carry on the best traditions of a State with a future of great promise.

NISEI FIGHT IN BURMA

In writing to the Pacific Citizen about the many nisei soldiers fighting with Merrill's Marauders in Burma, a Marauder sergeant says:

"I hope I haven't given the impression that I'm trying to glorify him. Many of the boys, and myself especially, never knew a Japanese American or what one was like--now we know and the Marauders want you to know that they are backing the nisei 100 per cent.

"It makes the boys and myself raging mad to read about movements against Japanese Americans by those

4-F's back home. We would dare them to say things like they have in front of us."

The particular nisei the American sergeant wrote about is Sergeant Henry G. formerly of Seattle, Washington. Henry is known to everyone as "Horizontal Hank" because he's been pinned down so many times by the Japanese machine-gun fire.

"We, of the Merrill's Marauders, wish to boast of the Japanese Americans fighting in our outfit and the swell job that they put," the letter said.

PARSELLS**May Charter Special Car**

In a telephone conversation to William Huso, yesterday, E.S. Parsells, employment manager from Seabrook Farms, New Jersey now visiting Poston, advised that he will charter a private railroad car at his own expense if there are enough people at both Gila and Poston who wish to work at Seabrook on a six month trial basis.

There are a considerable number of Poston people who are interested in the proposition, according to Parsells. Parsells will return to Gila Monday and anyone interested may contact him at the relocation office or Fukuji Sasaki at block 56.

Although Seabrook Farms does not offer as high wages as are available for relocators in large cities, it is the first offer received at the project where the employer is willing to pay all transportation expenses for persons who are willing to go out on a six month trial leave.

It is also one of the few offers which gives adequate housing for family groups at low rentals with furniture and utilities provided, he said.

Year around employment is available for both men and women, not only on the farms but in canneries and dehydration plants.

FAMILY RESETTLEMENT EMPHASIZED IN IOWA

Continued emphasis is placed on the relocation of entire family groups. writes Frank E. Gibbs, relocation officer for the Des Moines, Ia., district. At the present time, there are 54 families in the state; 36 families live in Des Moines and the other 18 are scattered throughout the remaining part of the

state. These 54 families represent a total of 176 individuals.

Gibbs writes as follows:

"Issei have found it quite easy to adjust to their new life in Iowa. Those in Des Moines have companionship with one another, while those outside of Des Moines find it quite easy to commute over weekends to see their friends. We have a total of 43 issei in Iowa and 16 of them are family heads. All of them are employed and have been successful in supporting their family groups. Only in two instances has it been necessary for Japanese Americans to secure emergency assistance from the funds allotted the Social Security Board. Our State Department of Social Welfare has cooperated very closely with our office and will see that financial need is met in all emergencies. They will also aid in community adjustment even when financial assistance is not requested.

"Besides the many students we have had enrolled in colleges, universities, junior colleges, business colleges and trade schools, we have had 24 pupils attending public grade and high school. Many of the high school group have held offices in their classes as well as participated in extra-curricular activities."

Residents of the community are asked to cooperate with the mess operations by putting their watermelon and cantelope rinds in the garbage containers, said Harold E. Keadle, project steward.

Milk bottles must be returned to the mess halls if the residents wish to avoid a milk shortage, he added. Those who use milk bottles to carry water in to the movies and ball games are asked to refrain from doing so. If there are those who desire some container for water, any mess chef will be able to furnish them with some kind of jar, other than the milk bottles, stated Keadle.

Nisei Soldier Wins Distinction

Allan Ohata, one of a squad of Japanese Americans who killed 47 Germans near Cerasuolo, Italy, last November, was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross Tuesday and promoted to lieutenant, according to an Associated Press report.

Ohata, who lives in Honolulu, is a member of the 100th battalion of Japanese Americans. His citation said he rescued a companion whose rifle had been damaged, killing 10 of the enemy. Then he and another rifleman stood off repeated attacks for hours and finally charged and captured the remaining Germans.

Masanano Otako also was promoted to lieutenant and Sgt. Bert M. Tanaka was awarded the Silver Star. Tanaka was decorated for

crawling through intense fire to aid his company near Lanuvio June 2.

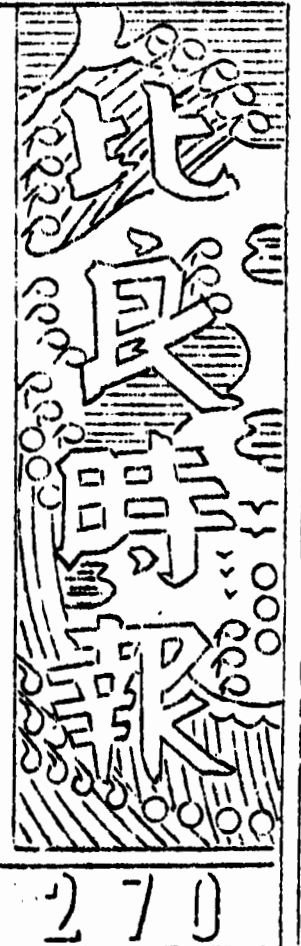

中西部或は東部諸州の曲農家生活の一端が上掲の大谷君の消息を通じて多少の現はれると思ふが衆知の如く此の方面の曲農家は曲農耕のたはら養良雞或は牧畜を主業として冬閉期の収益を補つてゐる。故にその経営方法は加州の如く投機的傾向を帯びず飽くまで堅実な経営方法を採用してゐる。こと農業に關しては日本人に及ぶ

者のない事は自他共に許す所であり随つてこの方面の農業に就いても日本人の目から見れば作物の撰擇或は耕作方法の上に改良を革を加へらるべきものが多いと思ふ。今年に入つて中西部及び東部の各地から日本人農家を要求且つ歓迎の聲は日と共に高く機會が益々日本人に幸してゐる。これは既に転住した先行者に依つて農業に對する日本人の手並みか實証され一般の認識を深めると共に人間としての日本人に諒解を持つて来た結果に他ならない。過去に於て農業のみに依存して来た人々殊にそれが扶養食者の多い大家族の家庭ではやはり農に依存して將來の計を樹てるのが最も賢明である。

NISEI FROM CANAL GETS ARMY AWARD

Pvt. Takashi Wada, formerly of Sanger, California, was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received on the Italian battlefield on July 6, according to the telegram sent to Mrs. Rai Wada of 4-8-C on July 20.

Wada entered the armed forces in February, 1942.

Gilans Injured In Collision

Sunday evening, on the way back to the center after a shopping trip to Mesa, Mr. and Mrs. Sterling Couch and John McKeague were badly injured when a car swerved out of a forked road and smashed into the right rear half of their car. in custody under a Presidential citation and "is under the circumstances not a free agent nor is any plea he may make free or voluntary, and hence he is not accorded due process in the very proceeding."

Goodman's decision said "It is shocking to the conscience that an American citizen be confined on the ground of disloyalty and then, while under duress and restraint, be compelled to serve in the armed forces or prosecuted for not yielding to such compulsion."

"The issue raised by this action is without precedent," the decision pointed out. "It must be resolved in the light of the traditional and historic Anglo-American approach to the time-honored doctrine of due process. It must not give way to over zealotry in any attempt to reach via the criminal process those whom we may regard as undesirable citizens."

NISEI FROM MESA DIES IN TRAINING

Word was received from the War Department by Mr. and Mrs. Mimeo Ikeda of Mesa of the death of their son, Pvt. Katsumi Ikeda, 23, who has been in the army only two months. He was stationed with the 442nd Infantry at Camp Shelby, Miss.

The message stated the death was the "result of a gunshot wound received during training."

He is survived by his parents, five brothers, and two sisters. The oldest brother, Tom, is remembered here for testing the constitutionality of the anti-Japanese Arizona law, which practically prohibited all trade with Japanese.

WILL PROPERTY BE LOST?

A few of the evacuees who are being inducted into the Army fear they may lose their property on the West Coast through escheat proceedings filed against them while they are in the Army. They also fear that in case of their death, their parents may lose this property through escheat proceedings instituted immediately following the death of the service man.

If an escheat proceeding should be filed against an evacuee in the Army, he would be entitled to the protection of the Soldier's and Sailor's Civil Relief Act, states Philip Glick, WRA solicitor in Washington. This statute affords protection to a defendant, who is in the military service, in "any action or proceeding commenced in any court." The WRA solicitor states it is highly probable that a stay of an escheat proceeding involving an evacuee service man could be obtained because of the very nature of the evidence required to defend such a proceeding.

TITLE TRANSFERS

Some of the evacuees entering military service have considered transferring legal title to their property to Caucasians to hold for them until they return to civilian life. They apparently believe that this will protect them against escheat proceedings. Glick states that if the land to which they hold title is in fact owned by their alien parents, transferring title to it to Caucasians would not legally prevent escheat of the property.

Some of the evacuees have expressed concern that the families of service men may lose the property owned by the soldier if he should die in Army service... Under the laws of California and Oregon, land which is inherited by an alien not capable of holding such land is sold under an order of the probate court and the proceeds are paid to the alien.

Under the laws of the State of Washington the alien parent would be entitled to hold the land for a period of not more than 16 years from the date that the title to the land was acquired by will or inheritance and during this period would be permitted to sell it and to receive the proceeds...

MAKING OF WILLS

Glick states it would be advisable for all evacuees who enter the military service to make wills providing for the disposition of their property. By devising it to other family members who are United States citizens, it will be possible for the land to remain in the ownership of the family. If an evacuee going into the Army is an only child, there is no way the land could permanently become the property of the alien parents. However the interests of the alien parents in the management and sale of the land, under the Oregon and California laws, pursuant to orders of the probate courts, would probably be better protected by a person sympathetic with and interested in the welfare of the evacuee family. For this reason, it is important that the executors named in the wills of the evacuees be carefully selected.

Alice Ota, University of Texas graduate, has accepted a teaching assistantship at the University of Minnesota.

Beloit College in Wisconsin wants nisei students, wrote Mary Lu Shaffer, student body vice-president.

Writes H.G. Williamson, dean-registrar, at Woods Junior College of Mathiston, Mississippi, "Anxious to have two Japanese American girls. Some of the girls are pleading for them, and the girls will find a friendly attitude on the part of all our students and faculty." A scholarship is also offered.

These and many other offers are now available at the student relocation office, 43-3-A, said Reagan.

Trade schools are also open to student relocators. Schools of art, cosmetology, and drafting are willing to take nisei. For the boys, there are offers where they may be working for good rates while training to be mechanics.

HOSPITAL REGULATIONS ISSUED BY MEDICAL HEAD

For the comfort and the welfare of the patients in the hospital, Dr. John S. West, acting chief medical officer, has issued the following regulations which are not new but need re-emphasis:

1. No visitor will be allowed in the wards without a visitor's pass.

2. A patient is allowed to have only two visitors on each visiting day.

3. No visitor is allowed to remain in the wards later than the visiting hours.

4. All passes are to be returned by the visitors when leaving wards, and must be in by the end of the visiting hour.

5. Only patients who are critically ill may have visitors during hours other than visiting hours.

6. Visitors are not allowed to patients with contagious diseases.

7. Since only two passes are allotted to each patient, it is important

DARING MISSION PROVES VALUABLE

A daring daylight mission, which resulted in information on the disposition of enemy units through the capture of two Germans, was carried out behind German lines at Anzio by an officer and an enlisted man of the 100th Infantry Battalion, according to a War Department release.

The two are First Lt. Young Oak Kim of L.A. and Pfc. Irving M. Akahoshi of Hawaii.

Believing that the other patrols had failed because they worked under cover of darkness at a time when the enemy manned all positions, Kim and volunteer Akahoshi crawled into enemy territory before dawn on the morning of May 16. Their plan was to take prisoners and they did.

The Germans captured and disarmed by Kim and Akahoshi were armed with rifles and machine pistols and were on duty as sentries for the Nazi outpost.

NEW YORK

Domestic Work Popular In Area

Of the 137 Japanese who relocated to New York in June, 80 per cent were placed in domestic jobs, announced Director E. Price Steiding of the New York Relocation office.

"Housewives are hiring servants sight unseen from the relocation centers, even couples with children, at from \$150 to \$175 a month," he said.

A large number of teenage part-time domestic workers, who have just completed their high school course and want to continue their education are taking domestic jobs. Most can pay their tuition but need maintenance and a little spending money.

"Demand for many other types of workers are great," stated Steiding, "including factory workers, stenographers, secretaries, and radiomen of all kinds."

To date there are 1,245 evacuees relocated in the New York area.

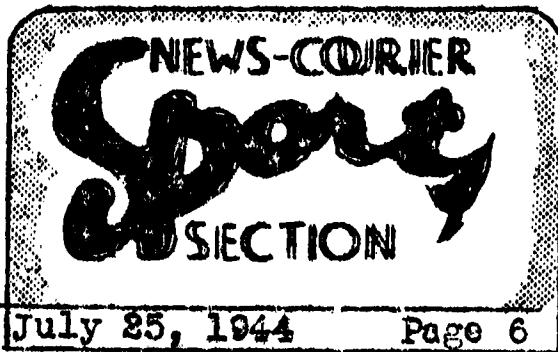

BROWN TO LEAVE FOR CHICAGO

Dr. Gordon Brown, social analyst, will leave Saturday for Chicago to spend six weeks at the Civil Affairs Training School as instructor in anthropology and British Colonial administration. He expects to be back in Rivers after the six weeks.

During his absence, what community analysis needs to be done will be handled by a board of eight residents under the chairmanship of Mrs. Gordon Brown.

Seichi Oguchi, senior research assistant to Dr. Brown, is also relocating this Saturday to the same city.

HOSPITAL FUND NOT COMPULSORY

The seven cent monthly contribution from residents for the hospital fund which will be used to express the residents' appreciation to the evacuee doctors is entirely a voluntary matter, according to the hospital committee which is working on the details of collection and distribution.

In other words, only those who want to will contribute the seven cents each month. It is not meant to be a compulsory move, requiring residents to contribute the set amount, the hospital committee said.

More details about the hospital fund collection will be announced as they are released by the hospital committee.

FARM STARTS MAIZE PLANTING

One hundred acres of maize have already been planted and 500 acres more will soon be planted on Gila's farm, stated David Rogers, farm chief. A part of the maize will be used for silage and the rest for grain to feed the farm's hogs.

Stated Rogers, "We feel this maize is just as essential as producing vegetables, because it produces food for the farm livestock so that the center can be supplied with meat." He commended the work of Foreman T. Yamazaki, who is in charge of planting and the preparation of land, and of Henry Yoshimi, who handles night irrigation.

"It is not generally known that these fellows work long hours at night," stated Rogers. "They are contributing a great deal toward producing food for the residents."

WRA

Regulation On Foods Revised

A WRA release on July 24 indicates that a revision of WRA distribution regulations on rationed foods is expected to provide additional benefit to center residents.

Hereafter, the quotas which are allotted for rationed foods during specific periods but not actually used during those periods, may be carried over and used at a later time. As consumption of rationed food drops off considerably during summer and fall months when center-produced vegetables and fresh fruits are available, rationed points accumulated during this time will be of substantial assistance in less productive months.

In view of the fact that some previously rationed foods can be obtained, revised O P A quotas for civilian consumption will now be in effect at the centers. Per capita quotas have been reduced for processed foods from 48 points per month to 10 points per week, and for meat, fats, fish, dairy products, and evaporated milk from 16 points per week to one point per day. Sugar rations have been raised fractionally from two pounds per month to one-half pound per week.

A COURT STOOD FIRM

Justice came to clash with prejudice in a Federal District Court in Utah last month and successfully defended a Japanese American from racial discrimination which would have run him out of business in Layton City, Utah.

The plaintiff, Clarence K. Okuda, an American citizen, opened a grocery business in Layton City in July, 1942. The board of trustees of the town refused to issue him a business license upon the ground that he was of Japanese descent and threatened to prosecute him for conducting his grocery business without a license and to padlock the business.

The Federal District Court for the District of Utah, Central Division, on June 21, 1944, entered a permanent injunction, restraining the defendants from threatening or interfering with the plaintiff in the operation of his business provided he tendered license taxes which might now or hereafter be owed under the town ordinances. The court held that the refusal to issue a license on the ground stated, and the threats of prosecution and to close the business, violated the 14th Amendment of the Constitution.

This and similar court decisions show that despite the fact that some of the rights embodied in the Constitution have been breached in the case of evacuees, others are being protected. We look forward to the test cases which will be coming up before the United States Supreme Court this fall, contesting the legality of continued detention of citizens and the legality of the evacuation.

RESIDENTS WARNED AGAINST CAPTURING MIGRATORY BIRDS

Center residents are cautioned by WRA against violating federal regulations covering the capture or killing of migratory birds.

Under provisions of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, it is a criminal offense to hunt, capture, kill, sell, buy or transport any migratory bird protected by treaties with Great Britain and Mexico. Any resident possessing any wild bird should consult the chief of internal security or the project attorney as to the legality of such possession, (see also project director's regulation relating to wild animals).

Officials of the Fish and Wildlife service indicate that some center evacuees have unknowingly captured birds protected under these treaties. The birds must be liberated immediately or evacuees possessing them will be subjects to a fine up to \$500 and or imprisonment up to six months, as provided by the Migratory Bird Act.

Seven Held For Violating Law

More nisei charged with violating selective service laws are being held in Chicago and in Denver.

In Chicago three American born Japanese were held on bonds of \$1,000 each last Saturday by United States Commissioner Edwin K. Walker, the Chicago Tribune reports. The three, charged with evading selective service are Ted Tadao Migaki, 24; Douglas Dobuni Ishii, 21; and Sam Shuzo Nakatani, 19, the report states.

A U.P. report from Denver says that H.R. Duffey, special agent in charge of the Denver district office of the FBI, announced last week that with the arrest of four nisei and the previous arrest and conviction of three others, one of the underlying causes behind many selective service law violations by nisei was believed to have been eliminated.

All were alleged to be involved in a conspiracy to abet other persons in evading the draft.

FOURTEEN TULEANS ON HUNGER STRIKE

Fourteen Japanese confined as recalcitrants in the Tule Lake segregation center were on the fifth day of a hunger strike Monday, according to a WRA announcement reported by Associated Press.

W.R. Best, project director, said spokesmen for the group advised that they were determined to refrain from eating until released from the isolation area, which held 350 persons shortly after disorders at the center last November.

Although the men have insisted they are not eating, Best explained that the stockade kitchen contains food available to them if they want it, the A.P. report states.

A similar strike was started last spring in the stockade. It ended when some of the strikers discovered that others had secret food caches and vitamin pills, the A.P. report said.

RARE COMBAT INFANTRY BADGE AWARDED SOLDIER

A WRA release on July 19, stated that Pvt. Kenneth Otagaki, who has had his Purple Heart for more than six months, pinned on a further recognition under the smiling approval of his friends at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington. It was the relatively rare Combat Infantryman Badge, awarded to men who come up to War Department specifications in the field, particularly during combat.

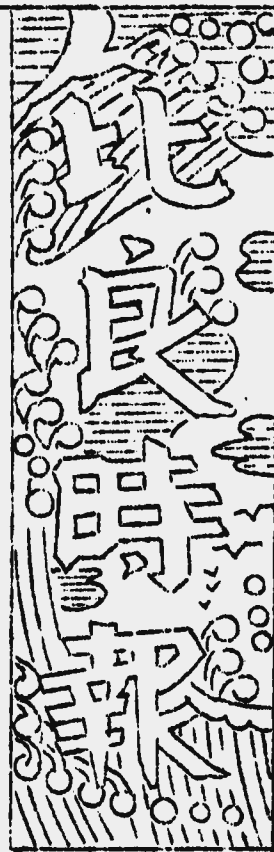

CONTRIBUTES TO 'VOGUE'

Taro Yashima, author of The New Sun, has found expression in the July issue of the Vogue magazine with his anti-Fascist cartoons and captions.

In a two page spread under the title, "An anti-Fascist Japanese depicts the artist's conflict under Fascism, Yashima paints with cartoons the picture of how a child who likes to draw grows up in Japan, begins to sense the militaristic movement, and finds his ideals in conflict with those of the military.

The Fascist to kill people; the artist doesn't, Yashima points out. The artist tries to work against his country's government without working

against his country.

"Art is silent now," he says. "They have much they want to say, now that they can not say it. There is much they will try when they can paint again. The Fascists die. White canvases are waiting."

Yashima, a member of the Japanese American Committee for Democracy, was jailed ten times in Japan for anti-Fascist activities before coming to America in 1939. He has contributed weekly cartoons to the Pacific Citizen, sketched drawings for the "Japan" issue of Fortune last April, and has held three one-man shows, besides publishing The New Sun, his autobiography in pictures.

EIGHT DELINQUENT YOUTHS PLEAD GUILTY ON CHARGES

Two youths pleaded guilty before the Butte Judicial Commission yesterday on the charges of disorderly conduct.

The sentence is as follows:

Submit themselves to a haircut for two months. During the time, hair must be allowed to grow not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ inch.

They must work for two months with pay and when school begins, they must work either before or after school.

They shall be required to abide by curfew from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m.

They must attend community programs only when accompanied by an escort who is approved by the internal security.

They must report to the internal security at least once a week.

Upon violation of any of these rules they shall be turned over to the county juvenile court which will mean reform school until the age of 21.

Six other juvenile delinquents who were taken into the Florence County jail on July 25 until the 27th, were given GI haircuts for disorderly conduct and charges of theft on Thursday, July 27, by the Butte Judicial Commission.

Three of the youths pleaded guilty for disorderly conduct and the remaining three pleaded guilty on two charges of theft and also charges of disorderly conduct.

Families of three will not be permitted to take six beam rooms but families of three already having these apartments will not be moved.

Persons are asked not to rush to the housing office to make changes.

WRA TO PROVIDE STORAGE FOR EVACUEE PROPERTY

WRA will provide storage space for property left in the evacuated area or in a center by an evacuee who either relocates or is inducted into the armed forces as long as West Coast exclusion remains in effect, according to a WRA release on July 22.

Efforts to obtain a second special car to accommodate the large number of people going to Seabrook Farms on August 3 have failed as a result of the heavy military demands upon the railroad facilities, announced Wilson Hart, relocation adviser. The one car which was previously chartered is already filled to capacity.

Approximately 40 of the people leaving on the regular August 3 coach will be headed for Seabrook Farms. Another regular coach is scheduled to leave August 10.

Additional workers are needed at Seabrook and transportation will be arranged on another date by either Southern Pacific or Santa Fe Railroads. In either event, all persons leaving on trial leave will have their transportation expenses paid in advance by Seabrook Farms.

The starting wages at Seabrook are not as high as those available in industrial work in larger cities. The popularity of this offer arises from the fact that it is an oppor-

The recently revised regulations further indicate that although WRA will assist in moving the household, personal and commercial property of evacuees going out on indefinite leave, it cannot assume responsibility for the storage or care of a relocated evacuee's property at the point of relocation. This includes property of evacuees who were inducted after relocation.

The revision also stipulates that an evacuee who has been inducted into the armed services, and who desires to have property he has left at the center or on the West Coast stored for him by WRA should designate some person to represent him in dealing with the authority.

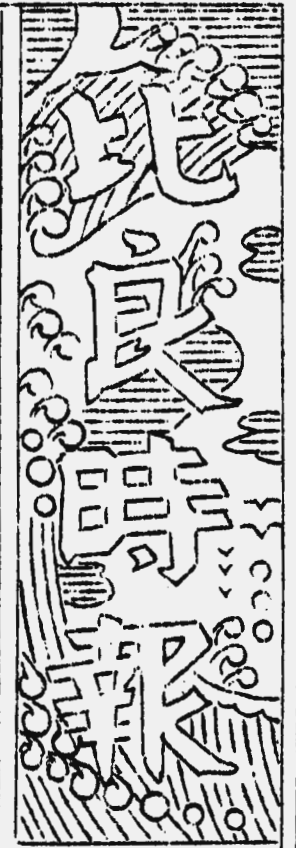
