addition For the purpose of this Code and in to, but without limitation upon, the acts declared to counselor, is also sched-. be offenses under the laws of this Community, the following shall be designated as juvenile offenses time. The Mayhan sisters and shall be punishable in the same manner provided for violations of any law of this Community:

> . a. It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to smoke tobacco within Butte Community.

b. It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to use, drink, possess, sell for give away, or permit or encourage another juvenile to use or drink any intoxicating liquor.

c. It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to take part in any baseball game or play whether with a hard or soft baseball in any residential block area or any street or road adjacent thereto.

### MORE JUYENILE OFFENSES

(Cont. from page 1)

other social function held in Butte Community without official invitation, or to cause any disturbance or to loiter in or around the place where such function is being held or to refuse to leave the premises if requested to do so by any member of the Internal Security force or any member of the appointed staff or any resident of the Community in charge of such function.

It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to use vile, obscene, profane or blastho mous language in any public place or at any public gathering.

shall be unlawful for any male juvenile to assault any annoy, molest or in any manner female juvenile.

It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to be  $\mathbf{g} \bullet$ absent from his block and from his home night without the express permission of his parent or parents.

It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to enter h. upon, possess or in any manner use any mechanical equipment owned by the government of the United States without the express permission of the official responsible therefor.

It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to create i. any unnecessary noise or disturbance or to annoy or molest any person attending any moving picture show, play, dance or other public exhibition in the Community.

It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to loiter after the hour of 8:00 p.m. in blocks 57, 58, or 69 or in the area containing government buildings, shops, warehouses, and storage yards the north of said blocks and it shall also be unlawful for any juvenile to loiter after the hour of 8:00 p.m. in blocks 41, 42, or 43 or in or near school buildings to the north of block 43 except for the purpose of attending a regular class or function in an orderly manner.

It shall be unlawful for any male juvenile to k. wear clothing of the type known as "zoot suit" or to wear his hair in the style known as "duck tail" or "zoot suit."

8. Effective Date. This Code is declared to be an Emergency Law under Section 7 of the Constitution and the Community Clerk shall furnish copies of this Code to each Block Manager and cause the same to be posted in a conspicuous place within each block immediately and shall cause this Code to be published in full in the next edition of The NEWS-COURIER and this Code is declared to be in effect on and after September 1, 1944.

This Act duly passed this 28th day of August, 1944 by three-fourths vote of the total membership of Butte . Community Council and approved in the manner provided by · law •

German and Japanese soldiers are using almost indertical tactics in their efforts to stave off defeat, according to the personal, unofficial opinion of Socond Lieutonant Richard K. Hayashi of the Japanese American 442nd "Go For Broke" combat team which was attached to the 34th "Red Bull" Infantry Division of Fifth Army in Italy, a War Department release states.

As an enlisted man with an American air force in New Hebrides, Lieutenant Hayashi participated in the New Georgia and Bouganville campaigns, thereby gaining first hand knowledge of the Japanese fighter and his methods.

Now, on the Fifth Army death." front in northern Italy, he is leading fellow Japanose Americans against the German foe.

"Chasing. Jerry over here is almost like chasing Japanese over there in the South Pacific," he observed, "for both seem to employ about the same tactics and weapons. Both are definitely on the defensive now and use thit and run' tactics. They both leave a lot of snipers behind with orders to fight until



Spoaking to residents of Modoc County, Houser charged the New Deal with plans to permit the return of evacuees. Said he:

"...Decision has been made to permit Japanese to resettle in this State regardless of the fact that California is still in the war zone and regardless of objections people here have to such a move.

"You in Modoc County know better than most Californians the character of these people with whom we are at war and how little they can be trusted, yet the administration is ready to turn the Japs loose in ou r communities as soon as the November election is over."

No doubt Mr. Houser has heard about the 100th and the 442nd combat units composed of Japanese American soldiers. When the Army announcement came to reinstitute selective service for Japanese Americans, Mr. Houser should have yelled his head off warning Californians about "the character of these people" who were about to don U.S. uniforms. Now that the Nisei are fighting in Italy Mr. Houser ought to warn his fellow citizens that Nisei soldiers shouldn't be allowed in the war zones—if Japanese Americans are considered dangerous on the West Coast, then surely they should not be allowed on the front lines in Italy and the South Pacific.

But no, Mr. Houser is the type that keeps quie to when he so feels. He was content to live peacefully in California while Nisci were dying in Italy so that war wouldn't come to California and to the 47 other states. He was content to let the Nisci exchange their lives for the Purple Hearts, Distinguished Service Crosses, and the Medals of Honor.

But now that the brothers, sisters, children, and parents of these Nisei soldiers might be allowed the freedom that is long overdue them, Mr. Houser decides it's about time he break his silence and expose the "character of these people."

In so doing he certainly reveals his own character -- one that is marked by prejudice and lives on distortion of facts. And as to the character of Japane se Americans, the Purple Hearts and citations earned by Nisei on the battlefronts speak for themselves.

### BUTTE CODE PROVIDES FOR JUVENIILE BOARD OF THREE

The Juvenile Code of Butte Community, in addition to the offensos published in the previous issue, provides for a juvenile board as follows:

l. Juvenile Board. A Juvenile Board is hereby established to consist of three members to be appointed by the Community Council to serve for a period of one year. In the event that any vacancies occur in the Juvenile Board the Community Council shall fill such vacancies within a period of two weeks.

2. Jurisdiction of Juvenile Board. The Juvenile Board shall hear and determine all cases of juvenile delinquency and all offenses committed by juveniles which may be referred to it by the Judicial Commission. When and after any case has been referred to the Juvenile Board by the Judicial Commission the same constitutional rules and procedures applicable to the Judicial Commission shall govern the procedures of the Juvenile Board.

3. Definition of Juvenile. For the purposes of this Code a juvenile shall be any evacuee resident of Butte Community under the ago of 18 years.

4. Laws Applicable to Juveniles. All acts declared to be offenses by the laws of this Community shall also be deemed offenses when committed by juveniles.

5. Assistance to Juvenile Boards. The Juvenile Board shall have the power to appoint one or more probation efficers subject to the approval of the Judicial Commission. The Juvenile Board shall have the authority of the Community Council to request information from any officer of the Administration of this Center which it doems necessary or advisable to assist it in the hearing, determination and sentence in any case.

6. Appeal. Appeal may be taken from any decision lege. Job is to assist of the Juvenile Board to the Judicial Commission within one week of the imposition of sentence. In the event of such appeal the decision of the Judicial Commission shall be subject to the same review as pro-





### MILLITARY DISCRETION

(Editorial in the Washington Post, August 28)
Sometimes the law moves slowly—to slowly to afford much relief to the individuals deprived of their rights in emergencies. In time, we have no dombt, the courts will rule that the commanding general of the Western Defense Command is without authority to continue excluding from their homes on the West Coast citizens of the United States who happen to be of Japanese ancestry. But there may be much obfuscation and delay in the sottlement of this issue under our somewhat complex judicial system. And meanwhile the particular potitioners who want to go home will continue to be excluded.

The United States army has it in its pawer to rethis issue by a simple acr -- an act which would solve be at once humane and democratic and in no sense perilous to the security of the United States. It can end its exclusion order on the simple and sensible ground that exclusion is no longer necessary for military safety. The evacuation from the West Coast of all persons of Japanese descent had its justification in the crisis conditions which obtained immediately after Pearl Harbor. There was danger of a Japanese invasion, and, in the urgency of the moment, there was no time to sift the loyal from the possibly disloyal among the Japanese Americans who dwelt in the threatened area.

But the loyal and the disloyal have now been soparated. And the danger of invasion has long since disappeared. The military has so little fear of a Japanese thrust at our mainland that it long ago rescinded such elementary restrictions as the blackout and the dimout of coastal communities. There can be longer be any military consideration whatever which could reasonably dictate the continued exclusion from the West Coast, on purely racial grounds, of American citizens whose loyalty to this land has been thoroughly investigated and proved. The exclusion order today can be considered in no other light than as an arbitrary exercise of military rule intelerable in a free society.

The Army needs now to ponder the implications of its insistence on a decree which has lost all validity. There is always a danger that broad general powers employed by the military in an emergency will not be relinquished when the emergency has passed. The Army itself should be zealous in avoiding any abuse of the reconstructed upon it. Here is an opportunity for the Army to reassert its faith in the democratic process — an opportunity to give belated justice to some people upon whom the exigencies of war have worked an extraordinary hardship. We hope that the Army will not wait for the courts to force recognition of basic constitutional rights in this case.

Enthusiastic approciation was expressed to President Roosevelt, the Government and the American people "for their kind hospitality" by the 982 European refugees, recently installed for the duration at Fort Ontario, Oswego, N.Y., in a message made public by Acting Secretary of the Interior Abe Fortas.

### PRESIDENT'S REPLY

The message was sent at the request of tho refugees by Joseph H. Smart, Director of omergoncy shelter for the War Relocation Authority which, as an agency of the Department of the Interior, has custody of the refugees.

Fortas, in reply to Smart, said:

"The President has asked me to convey through you to the War Refugees at Fort Ontario his appreciation of the sentiments expressed in their message to him. I gratified that the refugees already have the warmth of American hospitality and I that they will steadfastly rotain their faith in the future freedom of mankind from the blight of warfare and racia l strife."

### REFUGEE MESSAGE

The message from Fort Ontario mad:

all parts of Europe, sheltered at Fort Ontario, Oswego, N.Y., wish to thank you, Mr. President, the Government of the United States and the American people from the bottom of their hearts for their kind hospitality. Longing for liberty and cooperation in the reconstruction of the destroyed world and their own existence, they beg to add thoir heartiest wishes for a complete and earliest victory of the glorious Allied armies fighting for freedom and democracy and for the creation of a durable poace which might include, all races and nations in welfare and security."

Japanese Americans are better than okay in the Army: why can't they be acceptable in the Navy?

This is the stand being taken by newspapers in various parts of the country in response to the recent explanation by Acting Secretary of the Navy Ralph A. Bard that the presence of Nisei would "create collateral racial problems of a complex nature which cannot be handled under war conditions."

The Milwaukee Journal of August 30, 1944, asks, "Why (in the Navy) is there any more risk than in the Army?"

### MILWAUKEE JOURNAL

Navy fears that disloyal Americans of Japanese descent might impersonate loyal persons and then make trouble. How could disloyal Americans of Japanese ancestry impersonate loyal citizens any better than could disloyal Americans of Italian or German ancestry. The Navy--rightly--does not

"The Navy acts arbitrarily in the policy whon it bars Americans whose loyalty can well be established, if the Navy cares to establish it.

"The Navy, the same as the Army, should be open to all loyal Americans of any origin. The only measure should be that of usefulness."

The Washington Post on the same day came out with the following editorial:

### WASHINGTON POST

"This (Bard's explanation) is a fancy way of saying that, naval, authorities don't feel able to cope with the racial prejudices of the Navy's personnol ...

"The Army has found very useful employment for loyal American of Japanese encestry without creating any "collateral racial problems." General Clark, for example, has tostified with pride to the courage of such men who fought under his command in Italy. Mr. Bard argues that their presence would be "particularly troublesome in active areas of combat, such as in the Pacific." In this connection, it is worth noting that four "Japaneso Americans" have just been cited by the Army for valor in procisely this combat area. Does the Army have personnel of a higher "The 982 refugees from quality than the Navy? We think not. But plainly it has leadership with greater faith in the Americanism of its men. And that Americanism can be best encouraged by 'a firm insistence upon it at the very top levels of command.

### CANAL'S CODE ARTICLE IO ALTERED

Canal's Juvenile Code, which becomes effective on Monday, is identical with Butte's except for article 10 which in Butte makes unlawful the wearing of zoot suits and duck tail haircuts.

We feel that Canal, in omitting that article, does not necessarily approve of that type of apparel, but it does recognize the right of individuals to wear whatever they want. And because of that omission, Canal's law is no less effective than Butte's since all juveniles, zoot suits or no zoot suits, will be picked up and penalized if they viclate any of the other laws in the code or laws of the community.

Canal's code we feel is a good set of laws -- it has just as much teeth in it, and at the same time avoids that part which might be objectionable because it might be considered too dictatorial.

Commercial equipment be- equipment, or fixtures of and the particular nature of some equipment, has necessitated a change in regulations governing free Government shipment evacuee commercial property. In the future 500 pounds of such property may be sent express under the following conditions:

(1) if the items are difficult to send safely by freight, or (2) if the project director or relocation officer certifies that express shipment is necessary in the interest of the relocation program.

It was further pointed out that the 500 pounds of equipment provided for by this change in ruling will be included in the maximum 5000 pounds of commercial property shipped for an evacuee by the government upon justification or need.

### MI FA REPRESENTATIVE SEEKS SEASONAL MEN

B. O. McCulloch, War Food Administration representative from Burley . Idaho, is now on the project and wishes to talk with any person interested in seasonal farm work. McCulloch has jobs for 75 to 100 men to work in Cassia County, Idaho, harvesting potatoes and beets. Pay rates will be the same as those established in 1943: \$1.34 a ton for. boots, and 10¢ to 12¢ a bag for potatoes depending upon the yield. He states that present indications show that this year 's crops will give a heavier yield than has been produced for several years.

Available housing will. be furnished either on individual farms which offer complete furnished quar-

ters including cooki ng utensils without charge, or labor camp quarter s which include mess halls wperated by Japanose personnel where hoard is available for \$1.20 a day. and 50¢ a wook is charged for lodging.

The labor camp located in the town of Burley is from the business a mile district. Sentiment in this area is good according to McCulloch. Transportation and meals enroute will be furnished by the WFA for the round trip. Employment will begin about September 25 and continue through the middle of November.



2nd Anniversary

Today marks the second anniversary of the birth of the GILA NEWS-COURIER. In the regular routine of working, eating, and sleeping we forgot the passage of time until a milestone such as September 12 jerks us up with a start and makes us remark, "Time flies. We're two yoars older, but haven't gained a thing."

Every young person in the center has probably felt some such restlessness and perhaps a feeling of the futility of center living. Many are relocating, which is a good thing for most, since anyone who intends to make this country his home must make the break from a relocation center sconer or later.

The exceptions will be those whose ages limit their working capacities, whose breadwinners are serving in the armed forces, or who for some other reason find it difficult to make a living on the outside. They will have the security of a relocation center, knowing that no one can be forced from that security against his will.

Obviously, for those who are still in their active years, it is better to make the break now and establish themselves before the war is over and Johnny comes marching home. However, for those who are young and reckless in temperament, it might be well to consider carefully and plan shead before jumping on the bandwagen of relocation just because "all my friends, are going out."

Relocation for the purpose of gring to school and to learn askill, trade, or profession, is good. But for the young man or woman who goes out "to have fun or "to get some easy money at a defense plant,"it might be wise to consider a few things.

First of all they should be prepared to make ad injustments. Often people go out with dream cities in mind--of New York with its sky scrapers and lights, of Chicago and its busy streets where an evacuee can easily fit in and meet all his friends. But they rarely associate those cities with the harder side of life -- difficulties of finding appropriate housing, looking for jobs they had hoped to get, etc. One is just as likely to meet the hard side of life as the easier. There is no need to be frightened by such prospects, but it is better to be prepared for the rougher side than to go out expecting the best and then having the dream bubble break.

Those who go to work at defense plants will no doubt realize that those jobs are wartime jobs that will probably cease to exist when war ends. They must be prepared for, or at least be thinking about, a peacetime job that they can get and hold when demobilization starts. It is too bad that Nisei must face life for the first time just at a period when conditions are so unnatural, when jobs are plentiful and workers lacking. Readjustment will be just that much harder when peacetime brings a shortage of jobs with an over-abundance of workers.

And the young Nisei must be determined not to fall victim to wartime environment which is morally loose, at least relatively less strict than the lives they led. back home under parental guidance. On the whole Nisei are a reputable group, but some reports do come in of lack of restraint and generally lax habits. If families can be united on the outside, much of this will no doubt be eliminated.

With relocation again the major interest for the coming year Nisei might well look to it with an eye not only to freedom but also to post-war adjustment.



### HE PULLS TEETH BY FLASHLIGHT

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--Graduate of a six-year dental course at the University of California, Captain George Takahashi of 118 North Humbolt Avenue San Mateo, California, now fixes teeth by flashlight in an old wine cellar near the Fifth Army front lines in Italy.

Captain Takahashi is regimental dentist of the 442nd Japanese American combat team which has fought with the 34th "Red Bull" Division.

"It's quite different from my sunny office in San Mateo," says Captain Takahashi, "but actually we can do just about everything for the men here we could do at home - right here in range of Kraut artillery."

His present cellar "office" is in an abandoned house in a mountain draw, only 100 yards from a Japanese American artillery outfit. Sometimes he must halt delicate work temporarily as a roaring battery of 105s shakes the foundations of the building.

However, Captain Takahashi's portable den tal chest includes every glittering instrument found in a dentist's office at home, neatly laid out on the inevitable snow whito towel, spread over the head of a wine cask.

The man who neatly lays the instruments out is Corporal Abraham Tokioka of Honolulu, the captain's assistant. He also helps mix cements, pedals the foot drill and, when they set up in old wine cellars, hold the flashlight.

Corporal Tokioka trained as a dental assistant at the Army's O'Reilly General Hospital in Springfield, Missouri. He had previously taken pre-dental courses at the University of Hawaii, and worked in a dentist's office in the Islands.

When Captain Takahashi and Corporal Tokioka have no dental appoint ments they report to front line aid stations to assist in receiving and caring for the wounded.

### COAST RETURN TEST CASE

The scene of the injunction suit which is intended as a test case for the right of the Nisei citizens to return to the evacuated area of the Pacific Coast will be Los Angeles, Calif., where the federal court is expected to hear witnesses, the JACL reports from Salt Lake City.

Major General Charles H. Bonesteel is expected to be one of the chief witnesses under an order to show cause why Dr. George A. Ochikubo of the Topaz Relocation Center should not be permitted to return to the coast.

HEARING IN L.A.

Dr. George Ochikubo left Salt Lake City for Los
Angeles Friday merning, accompanied by Attorney Saburo
Kido, national JACL president, who is serving as one
of the counsellors for Ochikubo. The two were given
special permits by the Western Defense Command to go
to Los Angeles without escorts and are expected to remain in Pasadena with friends until the court hearing
is over.

The developments of the case are being watched closely by all interested parties since it will set the precedent for others who have had no military connections or cases of mixed marriages. The granting of permits to Mrs. Shizuko Shiramizu of Poston, Arizona, formerly of Salinas, California, and Masaru Baba who has an honorable discharge from the army and now residing at Reno, Nevada, has indicated that the army is relaxing the restrictions as far as those with honorable discharges and families of men in the armed services are concerned.

WILL ARMY SIDE STEP?

Dr. Ochikubo's case undoubtedly will reveal the extent to which the army is willing to relaxits exclusion orders at this time and will show the procedure the army intends to adopt in handling these civilian applications for permit to return to the evacuated area, stated the national headquarters of the Japanese American Citizens League. JACL officers expressed the hope that Dr. Ochikubo's case will be tried in court so that it will not be handled on an individual basis. Otherwise, other cases will have to be filed to test the right of the Nisei in general. Indications are that the Western Defense Command may set up a procedure whereby the permit will be granted on an individual basis and thus climinate the necessity of a test case.

### STUDENTS CENTER VISITS PERMITTED

A rocent revision of the WRA manual regulations on Japaneso Americans who are visiting the centers provides that, in the future, students who have returned to their families during official vacation periods (when they have not graduated and intend to go back to school), will not be charged for either meals or quarters, the information digest published on August 15 points out.

In the past a charge of 20 cents per meal and 20

cents per night for occupancy of living quarters (other than the quarters of the students's family, friends or relative) was made. Evacuees out on student relocation, however, had pointed out that such charges made to them during their return to the center constituted an undue hardship in view of the fact that they were not wage earners. The above revision was made, therefore, in recognition of their particular prob-

### JACL SEEKS REOPENING OF CALIFORNIA

Nimeteen nationalities are represented in the 982 European refugees who have arrived at the rofugo e center in Oswego on Lake Ontario, according to a WRA information digest.

Among the nationalities represented in the group, the largest number, 363 are from Yugoslavia with 228 from A ustria, 152 from Poland, 93 from Germany, 42 from Czechoslovakia, and smallor groups from 14 other countries.

A large percentage of the refugees speak German, and at a rough estimate one - quartor to one-third of the group speak a fair amount of English. Many have relatives in this country. Agos range from three wooks to 80 years.

### CALIF, PROPOSAL ACKS SUPPORT

A California measure, intended to make it oconomically impossible for persons of Japanese descent to earn a living in that state after the war, failed to get on the November ballot because of insufficient signatures to petitions, the S.F. Chronicle reportod Monday.

Petitions filed bore 77,875 names-100,000 short of the number required to insure a vote on the measure this year.

The present alien land law, passod in 1920 and amended since, prohibits any alien who is ineligible to U.S. citizenship (thereincluding Japanese aliens) from owning any land is m : California and from leasing agricultural land. It permits the aliens, however, to lease commercial, industrial,. and residential properties.

The proposal initiative measure would have extended the present law to prevent any Japanese alien from owning or leasing any kind of property in California.



# AMONG FIRST

FIFTH ARMY. ITALY-Membera of a reconnaisance patrol of the Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team are believed to have been the Tirst allied troops to reach the historic city of Pisa.

Among the 12 who volunteered for the patrol were Sgt. Masaharu Okumura, former Gilan, and S/Sgt. Hiroshi H. Fujita of tho Poston Center.

VOLUNTEERS

On the evening of July 20, the commanding officer of the Combat Team which was spearheading the Fifth Army drive northward callod for volunteers to go on a recommaisance patrol and attempt to enter Pisa, then believed to be cooupled by Germans in spito of rumors to the contrary. The regiment was at the time deplayed along the Coble-Salvetti Nuova line. Little was known of enemy positions to the north. The terrain to be covered was flat, with little cover or concealment.

Many times the number needed volunteered for the patrol. Besides the two Nisei from Arizona centers there were Privates first class Jim T. Suzuki, Yasuo P. Fujino and Kon Higashi of Minidoka, and Pvt. Suco Takahashi of Rohwer.

NEAR PISA Two officers attached to the regimental staff, 1st Lt. Norman R. Gilbert and 2nd Lt. Edward E. Androvette, volunteered to

lead the patrol.

The patrol reached a point near San Giusto within the outskirts of Pisa and hid in a ditch heside a road. German trucks could be heard moving from San Ermete, to the northeast, toward the patrol's left flank and across its path. Under these circumstances it was decided that it would be a useless risk of lives to proceed further into Pisa. About midnite the patrol began its journey back to its regimental command post.

Not a single shot was fired by the patrol which numerous enemy patrols.

### PANESE BAITALION

The following editorial appeared in the Minneapolis Morning Tribune on August 24 under the heading "The Japanese Battalion." Its reference to the two Japanese American soldiers who had been guilty of absence without leave is especially interesting.

conviction in Denver of three American born Japanese women for participation in the escape of two German prisoners, has received so much publicity that in all fairness to loyal Americans of Japanese another story should be teld-that of the ancestry 100th infantry battalion, a unit composed entirely of volunteers of Japanese descent.

"This battalion has been fighting 10 months in Italy and has received a unit citation for its record. Seventeen of its chlisted mon have been commissioned on the field for gallantry in action. Second Lt. Chata has been decorated with the DSC for killing 50 Germans in one day. Three members of the battalion have received legion of merit medals, nine have won DSC's, 31 have been awarded bronze stars, more than 1,000 wear purple hearts and 44 have received silver stars.

"There has not been a single desertion from the battalion and but two AWOL's involving wounded men who left the field hospital without official leave in or-

der to hitch-hike back to the battlefront.

"This, we submit, is a record of which our citizens of Japanese ancestry may well be proud. It likewise suggests that the Japan of the future, once it is liberated from the primitive ideologies that now control it, may be a contributor to the welfare of the world. loyalty to the country of their birth displayed by the men of the 100 infantry battalion shows what can happen in a proper democratic environment. In any the record of the battalion is more than an offset to the actions of the three treasonable women sentenced in Denver."

relative absence of serious contamination of
wounds in this war," he
said. "This is due in
part to the use of sulfa
drugs and penicillin, but
is largely due to the excellent physical condition of our men and to excellent surgery promptly
performed.

"One of the differences in this war and the last is that the surgeon has been pushed far forward. We are taking the surgeon to the soldier as against bringing the soldiers to the surgeon. This forward work is done largely in mobile field hospitals to which we attach export surgical teams. A man can reach one of these teams in two to three hours after he has been hurt. Excellent first aid care is given previously by the enlisted men of the Medical Department."



On September 10, Richard Nakamura, 3, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Nakamura, formerly of Gila, was accidentally shot and killed by a playmate with a supposedly unloaded gun.

All Cloveland papers carried a story of the accident. The day after the initial story was published, the Cleveland Press sent a reporter to the Nakamura residence on a "tip" that the neighbors had risen beautifully in an effort to help lessen their loss.

Wayne Collins, attorney for the ACLU in Northern California, will most likely argue in the Korematsu case and James C. Purcell of San Francisco will represent Miss Mitsuye Endo. The JACL is expected to file briefs in both of the cases and its attorney may have some time to argue.

National JACL president Saburo Kido is expected to be present at the court hearings.

Seasonal workers interested in going to Burley, Idaho, for the fall harvest should go to the relocation office at once to sign their contracts in order that their transportation may be secured.

"The Nakamuras aren't lonely anymore. The tragedy of a child's death combined with a uniwersal love of children, has brought them into a greater intimacy with the neighborhood near their home.

"Richard will be buried from St. Patrick's Church tomorrow at 10:30. He will be the first American Japanese over to be buried in Calvery Cometery.

"'Once we thought we'd go back to California after the war, Mrs. Naka-mura said. 'But now, with our boy buried here, and because of our gratitude to our neighbors, Clevelandwill be our home."

### MORE LEAVE WRA CENTERS FOR COMMUNITY RELOCATION

More than 400 Japanese Americans loave Relocation Conters on indefinite leave each week to work and live in widely scattered American towns, cities and rural communities, Director Dillon S. Myer of the War Relocation Authority reported to Acting Secretary of the Interior Abe Fortas.

The figure for the four week period ending August

26 was 1,717, bringing the total number of relocated persons to 30,572, the WRA compilation showed. About 60,100 evacuees remain in the eight relocation centers, including most of the older people and the very young children.

The number of indefinite leaves granted during the August period from each of the centers follows: Central Utah (Utah) 150, Colorado River (Ariz.) 325, Gila River (Ariz.) 298, Granada (Colo.) 200, Heart Mountain (Wyo.) 180, Manzanar (Calif.) 70, Minidoka (Idaho) 155, Rohwer (Ark.) 339.

"Gie of the most heartoning developments in rocont wooks," Myer said, "is the growing number of Japanese Americans who are invited by American communities to share their work opportunities. These 'community invitation' usually are extended through WRA relocation of ficors, assigned in principal cities to the job of helping the evacuous make thoir adjustment to new surroundings.

"Approximately threefourths of the August total left the centers in
response to these community invitations. The remainder were those who
left to join family mem bors already relocated and
those who left to accept
specific job offers."

In addition to the 30,572 persons permanently relocated, a total of 5,233 are outside the centers on seasonal leave working in activities such as carning, beet thinning and harvesting.





# SGT. TOGIOKA WINS SILVER STAR FOR GALLANTRY

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--While convalescing recently in an army base hospital in Italy, Sergeant Noboru Togicka, formerly of Dinuba, California, was presented the Silver Star for gallantry in action.

As wire chief for a battalion headquarters company of the 442nd Japanese American Regimental Combat Team then attached to the 34th "Red Bull" Division, Togicka kept communication lines between the battalion and regimental: headquarters open during a heavy concentration of fire. The action took place on the Fifth Army front.

The 442nd Regiment is composed entirely of Americans of Japanese descent.

### CITATION

Togioka's citation

reads, in part:

"During poriodic mortar and artillory shollings that a battalion command post was subjected to for six hours, telephone lines 'connecting the battalion CF, the regimental CP and the front lines were knocked out. Learning of the situation and its seriousnoss, Togioka, on his own initiativo, took his ropair kit and made his way along the telephone lines in the midst of terrific barragos. When two of his men offered to accompany him ho refused their offer. Tracing the lines in full view of the enomy, 'he located the damaged line and repaired it.

AWARE OF DANGER

Fully aware of the danger he continued to patrol the lines for more than an heur, making repairs as the lines were blown apart by shells. It was during one of the heaviest shellings and while repairing a line that Togicka was wounded seriously by shrapinel. Togicka's determination and undaunted bravery at the risk of his life are a credit to himself and his organization.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kango Togioka, now of Poston Relocation Center.

We've been hearing reports that the Nisci have been gathering in large groups, on street corners and public places, conducting themselves in a "rowdy" manner, causing the people to doubt them. We also heard that cortain groups are having "gang" fights in public places, forcing the manager to put out, "No Japs Allowed", signs, How do you suppose your own brothers sweethearts feel, who have died and are dying in the battlefields? How do you suppose all of us feel, when we hear such disgusting reports? Need we answer that? Do you want your brothers who are fortunate to return, come back to a country whore they aren't wantjust because of a few rowdies? Yourare letting us down terribly, if such things continue. You have an important job to do and that's to keep a country to live in and for us to return to. We are doing our best here; won't you do your part? I know many of you are doing your best, but you must try harder to suppress such conduct that would create had feelings. I give crodit to those who had courage to relocate and have made friends with Caucasians, proving to them that you are also good Americans. Reading the papers, I'm inclined to think that the women are doing a more successful job than the mon. We salute you, ladies.

HOW ABOUT A HAND

What are the men fighting and giving their lives for? For each and everyone of you, yes, you. We all volunteered not for "glory," (there isn't any glory in war, it's inhuman and cruel), but to help make a place for all of you in America and to do our share for our country. We ask for no special credit, since it was our duty. Other Americans have been giving their lives; why shouldn't we?

Are we asking too much to you all to keep the "Wol-come Mat" for us, as we march down the "gang plank"? How about it follows, we all know you're OK. How about a hand?

The late Staff Sorgoant Kazuo Masuda, for whom Rivers gave a memorial service was Fridey, was a "One - man mortar 'squad" near Castollina, Italy, according to a War Departmont rolease:

IN "RED BULL" DIVISION SYNATT-

ing in no-man's land under heavy enomy fire, plunked the tube of his 60-mm. mortar in a holmet filled with dirt and singlehandodly broke up a Gorman strongpoint.

Kazuo fought with the Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team. then serving with the 34th "Rod Bull" Division on the Fifth Army front in Italy.

The regiment, made up of Americans of Japanese ancestry, was storming tho enomy's main line of resistance near the Italian village of Castollina. Tho Germans, well entrenched on the hill, word pouring

steady artillery, machinegun and mortar fire down on the advancing Americans

Masuda's six-man mortar squad went into a huddle. Their job was to silonce the enemy guns. Out ofgroup, omerged that figure, loaded down lone ammunition bulging with pouches slung in front and on his back, carrying a mortar tube under his right arm and an extra steel helmet in his left hand. The amazed Germans, suspecting some kind of Yankee trick, uncorked a terrific barrage of selfpropelled guns and mortars.

FOUGHT SINGLEHANDED Alternately running and sidestepping like a col logo halfback, Masuda dashod 25 yards up tho slope. Hastily filling his oxtra helmet with dirt, he buried the mortar barrel in it. Squatted beside this improvised suplacement, he wrapped his logs around (continued to page 5)



"The Japanese American students barred from the Western Reserve University will now be admitted on the same basis as are all other students," said Dr. Winfred G. Leutner, president of the university, according to the Cleveland Press of Sept. 16.

# BRAVES MAZIFIRE TO SAVE BUDDIES

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--Private Jou Okitsu, who fights with the Japa-nese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team on the Fifth Army front in Italy, recently made his way more than a half mile through heavy artillery, machinegun and sniper fire to get aid for 15 wounded buddies.

Okitsu, formerly of Los Angeles, California, is a messenger in a rifle compay. His parents and sister resido in Poston. ENEMY SHELLS

In the vicinity of Suvereto, Italy, the enemy occupied a high hill commanding the flat ground over which the Japanese Americans were advancing. German heavy artillery, mortar, and small arms fire sprayed them continously.

In the initial barrage, 15 men of the supporting company were injured. Three casualties managed to work their way to Ckitsu's company under the covering fire of the forward company. He aided the wounded men in finding cover and making them comfortable as possible.

Contact with their battalion headquarters as well as the nearest aid station was lost when onemy shells cut the communication lines between the front lines and the rear.

REACHES AID
On learning of the predicament, Okitsu undertook to summon the necessary aid. He refused the offer of others to go with him.

Three thousand feet of exposed flat ground, all under observation of the enemy and subject to his constant artillery pounding, lay before him . During the entire course of his trip, Okitsu was subjected the machine gun and sniper fire, intermingled 'with artillery and mortar fire. At length, by creeping, crawling, and running--halted several times by artillery and mortar barrages which fell perilously close to him -- Oki tsu finally managed to find the aid station.

## NURSES AIDE PROBLEM

This week it appeared likely that the year-long nurses aide shortage problem is on its way to solution through the efforts of the community council and the cooperation of relatives of some of the hospital patients.

Beginning next Monday morning relatives of the patients in the D and E wards of the hospital will start working with pay in those wards, thereby releasing the regular aides to fill up some of the shortages in the other wards, confining their work to wards exclusive of D and E.

The nurses aide problem stems from the reluctance of workers to serve in those particular wards, but now that the relatives are taking over duties there, the biggest obstacle to the assigning of aides is eliminated.

It will take continued interest by residents and in some cases personal sacrifices in order to keep the hespital functioning at capacity or even near capacity. It has been brought to our attention that among those who have sacrificed for the benefit of the community is Miss Inouye, licensed nurse, who turned down a civil service position in order to continue serving Rivers when the hospital shortage was in its critical stage.

Even new, with the problem much relieved, the hospital needs more nurses aides, and we hope that the need will be answered. And with workers constantly relocating and leaving, there will be need for new aides to take up the nurses aide courses being offered at the hospital to fill in where vacancies arise. True, other sections may suffer from the drainage of workers to the hospital, individuals may affer because of personal sacrifices, but this is the price we must pay for continued good health.

Askod again how he was feeling, the Japanoso American, a corporal in a cannon company, answored, "I'm feeling fine. Treat

the others first."

As a result of his reposted assurance, the soldior, whose home before his family had been evacuated, was Los Angoles, California, was among the last to be treated.

Both of his logs had been blown off by a direct hit from a Gorman 88 Evacuated, he died the next night.

He was not identified.



Evacuees who have passed pre-induction physical examination for armed forces and wish to return to the center pending call to duty and do not wish to pay board and room will be reinducted into the center, according to a teletype from E.G. Arnold, acting director of WRA.

If they wish to be visitors, they will be required to pay board and lodging during period of their stay. Those who have been inducted into

the armed forces and assigned to the enlisted reserve will be considered non-paying visitors. WRA will not generally approve induction or reinducthe tion into centers of medically discharged service If such a person men. wishes to return to the center to 'holp his family relocate he will be granted a one-month stay as a non-paying visitor after which he is to relocate oven if family is not yet prepared to leave.

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--High tribute was paid to the fighting sol-Japanese diers of the American 100th Infantry Battalion by their battalion commander, Lieutenant Colonel Gordon Singles a West Point graduate.

"There are countless instances of battlefield heroism by these infantrymen. fighting on the Fifth Army front," said the firm, steel-nerved battalion "They commander. fought their way over endless mountains in Italy since September. last They have captured towns from Germans without assistance of other units. Recently they captured a Gorman command post, comploto with a large meter pool and an entire field artillory battory; all in-

Miss Esther Takei's returning to California and her entry into Pasadena Junior College indicates that permits to return to the Western Defense Command are not confined to cases of "mixed marriages" or to those who go temporarily for business.

Several Nisei who have been trying to bring up test cases which would set a precedent for other evacuees have been given individual permits and their suits artfully dismissed so that actually the suits were not tried in court; no precedent is set.

POLICY UNCHANGED

"Insofar we know Director Dillon Myer has stated: there has been no change in the policy of the War Department governing return of evacuees to the evacuated For sometime now the Western Defense Command has been issuing special permission for individuals to. re-enter the area either temporarily or permanently when good reasons for such re-entrance are given. Ordinarily temporary permits have been granted to individuals who have property problems or other personal business which require personal handling and thus necessitate the presence of the evacueus in the evacuated area for a short period. Permits for definite residence have been given mainly to "mixed marriago' cases...".

Although "in the main" indefinite permits given only to "mixed marriage" cases, the Takei case Italians towns recently seems to indicate that any evacuee who wants to go for a good reason may be permitted.

OTHERS MAY APPLY

Wo cannot see how the Commanding General can say yes to one person and no another unless there is definite indication that the second would be dangerous to the war effort if he is allowed on the West Coast.

Those desiring to re-enter the western defense area for indefinite residence should apply directly to the Commanding General, Western Defense. Command, Presidio, Those who want tomporary re-entrance San Francisco. will continue to apply through WRA channels.

LETTER The Chicago Sun of September 10 publishes a letter

by a "Joo Fromm" which concerns itself with the primary worries of the American soldier abroad abou t conditions at home and with evidences of race feeling at homo.

In regard to Japanese Americans, Fromm writes as follows:

"Similarly disturbing to overseas soldiers -- especially those who are liberal and telerant -- are the growing raco hatrod's at home. When my outfit moved over to Cassino from the Adriatic in Italy several months ago, I read in American magazines and newspapers, letters condemning all Japanese, regardless of birth, in the most bitter, intolerant and un-American manner. WITH U.S. FORCES NEAR FLORENCE, Sept. 1 (Delayed).--Lt. Masao Yamada, a Protestant chaplain with a Japanese American infantry unit, today told how ho and, 11 onlisted men penetrated German lines west of Moronce under a white flag of truce to bring back the bodies of two Japanese Americans killed during a combat patrol.

Yamada, whose home is in Koalakeku, Hawaii, said: "A few days ago I heard that three of our men were missing from the preceding night's patrol. Learning where they had gono, I got my men together and we started in joeps.

"At our front lines w e left the jeeps and crawled forward until we saw the German positions in a small wood across an open field. Binding our handkorchiefs tegether, we fastened thom to a stick and waved the improvised flag at the Germans.

"One big Gorman bockoned us forward. We walk-(continued on page 5)



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

Recently, Tech. Sgt. Harry Fukuhara, formerly of the Gila River Relocation Center, was awarded the BRONZE STAR MEDAL for his meritorious duties in various campaigns in the South West Pacific Area. This is especially significant because he is among those who first volunteered for the Army from Gila in November 1942. At that time, the status of the American Japanose soldiers was very questionable -- even the Army was very skeptical for the Nisei soldiers were not allowed on the West Coast -- the attitude of the whole nation was one of doubt and suspicion -- and the pressure against volunteering, brought about ospecially by the "unhealthy groups" was strong. 



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

## B5 NISEI AMONG CASUALTY LIST

The war department reported 2,209 more soldiers yesterday as wounded in action, among them 135 from Hawaii who are American citizens of Japanese ancestry, according to an AP release.

The regiment, made up of the old 100th Infantry Battalion of Hawaiian National Guard and recruits from relocation centers, reached Italy last May and was attached to the 34th Infantry Division, a part of the Fifth Army.

A recent army dispatch from Italy said the regiment went into action late in June and remained in the line almost a month. During the approach to Leghorn, Pisa and Florence, its members are said to have killed 1,124 Germans, captured 331 and wounded several hundred.

"There is no red tape involved if you are interested in accepting this Civil Service job except that which everyone goes through who has Civil Service Status. PAY RATE

## DECORATEDINISEL EARNS FURLOUGH

ITALY--Granted a wellearned furlough after nine months on the Fifth Army front, Sergeant Masaru Suehiro of Honolulu was asked what was uppermost. in his mind. After a dramatic pause the homewardbound here replied, sober-"I want to sink my tooth into a home-fried chicken."

Sergeant Suehiro, holder of the Distinguished Service Cross, is a member of the Japanese American 100th Infantry Battalion Hawaii recently cited for outstanding battle record. The outfit had. been in the front lines almost continuously usually with the 34th "Red Bull" Division, since the Salerno invasion last fall.

The Honolulu soldier, an American of Japanese descent, received the Distinguished Service Cross early in the year for his performance as a one-man mortar section near Colli, Italy. Exposing himself to concentrated enemy fire, Suchiro loaded and fired a 60-mm mortar alone such efficiency he singlehandly broke up a sizeable German infiltration attempt.

He also holds the Purple Heart for wounds remeived in action.

My 3 sisters and their families are and have been out there for over a year now and they seem to like it very much. I have been encouraging my folks to go east and make a try at it so by the time you get this, they might be gone.

URGES PLANNED RELOCATION "After all, we are here, fighting for just that right to be equal as any one and be able to go and do as we please. Already, we've had many boys that are gone and many who are war casualties that have paid dearly for what they think is right. We've done this much so it's the people's turn to do their share. I don't say or mean, that a person should just go out blindly and try to relocate but at least plan for the future because the camps won't last forever. I'm sure my sisters would be only too glad to help anybody out. They've already had many people come to their house and stay for a short time and then move to their own place when things were all set. One of my sisters lives in a nice district, attends the church there and is liked by all the neighbors. One of her neighbors writes to me even though we aren't acquainted. Their children play and sleep at each other's house and are real play mates. Well, I guess I've said enough and I hope I've put over my ideas and thoughts to you.

"I'm in a hospital but expect to be out shortly and be back in this outfit. I'm fine except for a slight wound. I got the injury in one of our battles."



Pastor Asks for Fairness

In a statement made during a morning church service, Dr. John S. Scott director of the All Saints Episcopal Church, declared that "We must differentiate between loyal fellow-Americans of alien ancestry and enemy Japanese; to fail to do so is grossly unfair, un-American and un - Christian," reported the Fasadena Post.

"Many had asked my position in a matter which is causing considerable agitation here in our community," said Scott.

"A California-born girl of Japanese parenta ge (but of whose loyalty to this country there is no question) with the permission of the milita ry authorities has entered Pasadena Junior College, where she is welcomed by 90 per cent of the student body. Some citizens are disturbed and are seeking to have her removed. Why and from what motives, I do not know.

"It seems to me that here is opportunity to prove the reality of our Christian profession. We speak beautifully in Church of the ideals of justice and brotherhood; but now we have to uphold them in the common ways of life, because there are those among us who would trample

COAST CATHOLICS APPROVE RETURN

"Immediate return of loyal Japanese Americans and Japanese aliens to their homes from war relocation centers is advocated by the Catholic Interracial Council of Los Angeles," said Daniel G. Marshall, chairman of the executive committee, Monday, according to the L.A. Times.

A resolution of the council stated that the confinement of the Japanese Americans marks "the first time in this country that any group of citizens has been punished sololy by reason of racial orgin."

The resolution also said that the government spokesmen have stated "there has not been one proven case of sabotage on the part of a Japanese American and that some 10,000 Americans of Japanese ancestry are serving with our armed forces."

34TH INFANTRYMAN LEADS SUCCESSFUL PATROL MISSION

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY-Performing like a one - man company, Private First Class Takeo Takahashi of Liliha Street, Honolulu, Oahu, a member of a Japanese American battalion attached to the 34th Infantry Division, recently bagged 7 German prisoners and an enemy motor pool in one afternoon on the Fifth Army front in Italy.

Private Takahashi, acting squad leader in his platoon, was given a mission to reconnoiter 200 yards to the left sector. With four men, Takahashi took off and they did not go far when the patrol met with stiff machine pistol fire. They located the enemy patrol firing behind

a clump of bushes.

"You guys cover me and I'll crawl up and get them," Takahashi told his buddies.

While the men engaged the enemy with fire, the private crawled to the flank and took the two be-wildered Germans from their foxholes.

Later he led his squad in an ambush patrol against a group of onemy vehicles. While his men covered him, Priva te Takahashi again slipped into the enemy ranks, surprised the five guards at the vehicles and marched them back to his cutfit. The motor pool included five large enemy jeeps, two trucks, a medium sized truck and five motorycles.
