(Letter to S.F. Chronicle, September 25, 1944, by Monroo E. Deutsch, vice president of the University of California.)

Editor -- In The Chronicle for Septembor 19 I note the statement that Governor Dewey "expects to get first-hand information on the question of the return of wartime evacuated Japanese to Pacific states "from the people with whom I confer this week" in California." It is a little difficult to understand what this means. Since the Japanese and American-Japanese were removed from this area by the military authorities, their return will not take place until the military authorities permit. But when the military authorities have taken this action, it is difficult for one to see what the views of the people of California will dotermine. There is a document called the Constitution of the United States: I assume that, as an attorney, Governor Dewey knows it well. I should like to know under what authority it is legally possible to prevent American citizens, whatever their ancestry, from coming back to California after the military authorities have removed the ban. Or is Governor Dewey following the path of Governor Bricker, who stated that he favored allowing each community to determine whother tho , Japanese should be allowed to come back? The aburdity of that statement was pointed out by several writers to the Chronicle, including Chester Rowell.

I am sure that Govornor Dewey would be one of the first to emphasize the importance of living fully up to the Constitution. This should be done, however, not merely in those instances where popular support is readily obtainable, but even for those who may momentarily be unpopular in the eyes of some of our people. Surely, when one reads of the heroic deeds of the Americans of Japanese descent in Italy and sees the commendation given to them by Lieutenant General Mark Clark, when one scans the list of Japanese names among the wounded and among the dead, he has no right to treat them as though they are anything other than loyal citizens of the United States.







OCHIKUBO.

CASE DOES NOT AFFECT OTHERS Recent discussions in a

number of project papers of the injunction suit filed by Dr. George Ochikubo to prevent interference with his proposed return to the West Coast military area, have included a misleading inference that should the case be tried in court its outsome will determine the rights of Nisei in general.

This, project attorneys have pointed out, an orrone ous interpretation of the facts. The Army has revoked the applicability of the mass exclusion order as far as Ochikubo is concerned and has issued to him an individual exclusion ordor. Docision in his case will therefore pertain to him alone, and will not decide the question of return 'to the West Coast of other evacueds, either individually or as a group.

CLEVELAND AIDS. FAMILY HOUSING

A new policy designed to help families come to Cleveland as complete units and have immediate security of housing was announced today by Max L. Franzen, Director of the Cleveland Baptist Hostel here.

The new setup, worked out though a joint effort by Franzen, the Cleveland War Relocation Authority, the Cleveland Resettlement Committee and the Cleveland Federation of Churches, calls for progressively turning over the facilities of the hostel to family groups.

Under the plan, a man, his wife and children would live together in the hostel as long as it was necessary until adequate housing was found. The cost would be moderate, calling for \$1.00 a day for each adult and 50% a day for each child.

Franzen suggested that interested family heads contact the hostel representative or leave officer at each project to make the necessary arrangements.

PAEVEIN THAT FIRE

What! Another waning about fire, residents might say in disgust after being warned so often about that match, the cigarette, the rubbish, that lumber around the barrack, etc.

But this time it's no false alarm; it's the real stuff. For Rivers will be just one of thousands of communities in the United States that will be observing Fire Prevention Week from tomorrow until next Saturday, October 8 to 14.

THE HAZARDS

Fire prevention week comes at just about the right time too, for autumn is the time when fire prevention needs renewed stimulation. With the heat of summer gone and the cool mornings and evenings approaching, dangers of fire recede into the back of the brain to hibernate for the winter. It's exactly this type of attitude plus the coming of stoves that can cause a large fire, unexpectedly too. In fact it was on October 9 in 1871 that Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a lamp to start the famous Chicago fire, which is still remembered to this day by this national Fire Prevention Week.

Rivers' part in fire prevention, not only for this special week but also for all the 51 other weeks of the year, will be to cooperate with the fire department in eliminating fire hazards.

Although Rivers hasn't suffered serious residential fires, the 311% increase in fire losses during the past year for WRA as a whole is not a pleasant indication.

Fire Chief E.D. Mauser lists the common hazards as follows:

Rubbish and scrap lumber, stoves, electric appliance and cords, smoking, and matches. He states that fuel oil must not be stored inside buildings except in screw top metal containers. Stoves should be in good condition before using this winter. Careless smoking too has caused most of the fires in the centers.

Rivers has a fire department in each camp, backed by a group of 598 volunteer firemen, 462 in Butte and 136 in Canal. Each block is organized into a company and a captain appointed for each group. They have been given special instructions in fire fighting, fire prevention, and the common fire hazards found in camps.

Add to this organization the conscious effort on the part of each of the 9000 residents to individually climinate hazards, and we ought to have a pretty good protection against fire destruction.

"Americanism is not a matter of race or ancestry, but a matter of the mind and heart. It is a creed Tearned by practice and action." So stated Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, in behalf of the Japanese Americans at an inter-faith meeting at the Friday Morning Club in Los Angeles last Monday, according to the L.A. Times.

This was the second of his addresses in Southern California in which he spoke for the interests of the Japanese Americans.

"In the past several months the temper of public opinion on this issue of 'Ban the Japs' has been changing rapidly and unmistakably," he told the "The religious leaders. change has been brought about, I am convinced, by the magnificent combat record of the Nisei boys in the uniform of the US Army."

1300 MEN

He pointed out the record of the 100th Infantry Battalion which first met action around the Salerno beach head. To the 1300 men who have served in this unit, he said, more than 1000 Purple Hearts, 44 Silver Stars, 31 Bronze Stars, 9 Distinguished Service Crosses and 3 Legion Merit medals had been awarded: The entire battalion had received Presidential citation within the past three weeks, he also stated.

Myer reminded the audionce that the Nisei in uniform, many of them evacuated from the West Coast 2 years ago, are not only on the Italian front, but are in Burma, China, the Pacific islands, and some with the famed Morrill's Marauders.

30,000 LEAVE CAMPS

Branding as extremists, those who keep the fires of hatrod burning against the Japanese Americans, he said that"they based their suspicion not on disloyalty but on racial prejudices."

- Ho disclosed that about 30,000 people of Japanose ancestry have been released from the camps, whose peak was reached at about 107,500 internocs. A p proximately 800 of that number are now living in the Tost Coast area.

PFC. HIGA Relates War Experiences

Japanese. American soldiers in the U.S. Army are fighting, not to kill or to win glory, but to insure a place in this country for all persons of Japanese ancestry. Nisei soldiers are valiant fighters because they have that purpose in mini. The greatest support that civilians can give to these fighting men is to keep writing letters to them in English or in Japanese.,

This, in brief, was the ·message brought from Italy to Rivers' residents. Sunday as Pfc. Thomas Higa, wounded veteran of the Italian battles, delivered his two and one-half hour · speech at the Butte amphitheater. Sunday afternoon and again at the Canal auditorium that evening.

Higa, who arrived here Saturday, left for Poston yesterday.

The Hawaii born, Japan oducated, United States soldier Higa, speaking in . forceful Japanese, gave an account of his experiences as a member of the 100th Battalion, which left Hawaii on June 5, 1942, laft Now York harbor on August 20, 1943, and saw first action on September 29 at Salerno.

Nisei Destroy German Nests

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--Two Japanese American soldiers, hometown buddies from Waianae, Oahu, serving with the Fifth Army's Japanese American battalion in Italy, recently destroyed four German machinegun nests, enabling their platoon to capture an important hill position above Rome.

They are Technical Sergeant Yeki Kobashigawa, platoon leader, and Private First Class Shinyei Nakamine, both veteran infantrymen who have fought with the Fifth Army since Salerno.

As their platoon began its advance against heavy enemy fire, Kobashigawa and Nakamine crawled to within 50 feet of the first machinegun nest and silenced it with several well aimed hand grenades, capturing two Germans and killing one.

Similar tactics knocked out another fun emplacement directly behind it, yielding four prisoners in the process.

Leading their platoon steadily forward, they shot up two other machine-gun nests with tommy guns at close range.

In this daring advance the two Hawaiians worked so swiftly and efficiently that their whole plat on suffered only one casualty though it was constantly moving against superior forces.

Returning Misei wounded soldiers all state that the latest books are in great domand. The boys take good care of them because everyone is anxious to read to pass away the time. Most of the books donated by many groups are old and out-dated so the latest publications are the things desired.



THOMAS

Expresses Views On Evacuation

Californians who oppose the return of the Japanese Americans to their homes in California "legally, if possible, illegally if no cessary," do not believe in democracy, Norman Thomas, presidential candidate of the Socialist party, declared in a campaign speech before a San Francisco club on Sept.26, according to the AP.

Thomas said the flareup of "racism" against the California - born Japanese is "a far greater danger to American liberty in general than to the Japanese Americans in particular."

He stated that "What was done on the west coast was, as Justice Murphy admitted, painfully similar in principle to the German treatment of the Jews."

Thomas insisted that "greed for land made fertile by Japanese skill and labor was partly at the bottom of the herding of these: American citizens into concentration camps. Thomas argued that if military necessity dictated the treatment accorded thom, they should be paid damages for what was done to them, "just as we give property owners damage for things done to their proparty under military Mecessity."

GILANS NAMED IN ESCHEAT CASE

The state of California has started an escheat action in Fresno Co. against Mr. and Mrs. Tamigoro Chiamori, residents of Canal, and their two sons, Akira and Yasushi.

The escheat case involves an 80 acre orchard
and vineyard land, valued
at \$50,000, which is lotated one mile southwest
of Parlier. The state
charges that it was owned
by aliens of Japanese ancestry in violation of the
state anti-alien land law.

PARENTS' RESPONSIBILITY

The importance of the home, school, and religion in a child's life was outlined by Cecil F. Andres, assistant counselor of the social welfare section, in a talk entitled "Juvenile Delinquency--A Challenge to Parents," delivered before a meeting of the Butte Elementary PTA last week.

One of the big factors leading to juvenile delinquency is unhappiness, turmoil, and discord between parents within the home, the one place where a child looks for support though all else in the world may fall apart.

A SECURE HOME

Mrs. Andres stated that the most important influence in a child's life is his home, his parents, and family life. To a child his parents represent almost God-like beings. A child must have a sense of "home" as a place where no harm can come to him because his parents are there. He should have the feeling of security of acceptance and understanding. Parents must set a constant example of honorable character for the child to follow.

It is not moreohance that the greater number of delinquents come from broken homes where parents are separated, divorced, or where there is such unhappiness between the parents that it almost soaks into the child's body.

When a child enters school, the teacher can only share but never completely take over the parents' responsibility. The child must have definite hours for study at home. The parents must see to it that he is never unnecessarily absent since such habits lead to laziness, discouragement, and failure. When a parent fails to meet this obligation, when a child truants, then the community must step in because such neglect can be a threat to all.

Religious training is of utmost importance. It is one of the greatest sources of ethics, faith, courage, and comfort.

COMMUNITY'S PART

How can society as a group prevent juvenile delinquency? Youth must be given outlets to their natural instincts for dare and adventure. A youth center might be a solution. A clubroom, perhaps, where boys can make as much noise as they want without being bothered, play games, turn on the radio or phonograph. They can be taught to make things such as airplanes, cabinets, desks, or clay articles. Exhibitions of these articles will serve to give incentive to their efforts. They must be given tools of learning, for plays and for work.

In conclusion she declared to her PTA audience:

"The world moves forward on the feet of its children. Will those feet be strong, sure, purposeful or will they be faltering, wayward and lead to destruction for themselves and their people? How will we meet the challenge? The answer rests with you."

The Korematsu and Endo cases, tosting the constitutionality of evacuating citizens of Japanese ancestry, were taken before tho United States Supreme Court on Tuesday, according to the AP release.

KOREMATSU

Frod Korematsu, formerly of Oakland, asked the high tribunal to rule on the validity of evacuation orders which resulted in of other citizens so far his being placed in the Topaz WRA Center. Mitsu ye Endo, formerly of Sacramento, demands freed om from the same center and a court declaration that she has the right to go wherover she pleases.

The court was told that there is no question of the loyalty of either to the United States, and that there was no evidence involving any Japanese American citizen in espionage or sabotage on the west coast.

found.

Due to shortage of stoves the following policies have been drawn up by the housing dept.approved by Project Director L.H. Bennett.

All single person will be allowed to remain where they are without stoves, but single men who want heat will have to move to another apartment which is occupied by a single person who has a stove. Single persons who have stoves must accept people moving in from a place without a stove. In some instances it may be necessary to move a stove and the single person from an apartment to a quarter of other single persons.

Except for moving, all requests must . be taken up with the block manager. Contact the housing department directly when a family or single person wishes to move.

TS Chomori's

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--For demonstrating exceptional qualities of leadership against the enemy on the Fifth Army front in northern Italy, Technical Sergeant Masuo Comori, formerly of Glendale, Calif. has been commissioned a second lieutenant.

A platoon sergeant with the Japanese American 442d Regimental Combat Team since its activation in Camp Shelby, Miss., February, 1943, Chomori won his battlefield commission for his exemplary and inspiring leadership during both training and battle periods. He demonstrated his abilities as a field commander under the most adverse conditions in combat.

When his platoon leader was wounded during an at-*tack in the vicinity of Suvereto, Italy, Chomori assumed command. His rifle plateon was counterattacked by enemy forces consisting of one infantry company, three Mark I V tanks, and one self-propelled 83 - mm gun. The enemy also had the advantages of commanding ground, initial surprise, and superior fire power.

Chomori reorganized his platoon and directed its withdrawal to a more tenable position. His cheerfulness and efficiency contributed much to the maintenance of morale in his platoon and company.

On another occasion, in the vicinity of Hill 140, near Molino A Ventoabbato, he again assumed charge of his platoon when his platoon leader was wounded. His company had dug in to hold off enemy counter thrusts after capturing its objective. His platoon was entrenched in the center of the company sector on high ground which dominated the fields of fire to the company front.

Toward evening, German artillery laid an extremely heavy barrage on the Japanese American positions, followed by a concentrated 81 - mm mertar barrage.

The new church is affiliated with the Buddhist House of Los Angeles and the Dharma House of Santa Fe. It will maintain a counselling service for resettlers and assist with such problems as housing and general information.

The incense offering was particularly impressive with representatives of the eight War Relocation projects, Nisei servicemen, the Issei, and longtime Japanese American residents of Chicago taking part. Included were: George Fujihawa, Central Utah; Fob Shimizu, Colorato River; Jiro Aratani, Gila River; Kikuyo Masuda, Granada; Asako Kubo, Heart Mountain; Kiyo Nishimori, Manzanar; Keichi Hayashi, Minidoka; Shig Kitahata, Rohwer; Sgt. Eiroshi Taniyama, Camp Snelling; Teruo Muroyama, Chicago, and T. Mayeda, Issei.

The service was opened by Arthur A. Takemoto, executive secretary of the Young Buddhist Association of Chicago, who introduced Taro Kawa, chairman, formorly an active Bussei leader of Los Angeles and Gila River. Takemoto, who is from the Colorado River and Central Utah centers, is the only Japanese American member of the Board of Directors of the Buddhist Brotherhood in America.

G. Raymond Booth, Chicago district relocation officer of the WRA, gave a congratulatory message, while Gustav Carus, attorney and son of the late Dr. Paul Carus, author of a number of well-known books on Buddhism, responded in behalf of the church. A period of silent meditation was observed for the nation's war dead.

A former resident of Heart Mountain Project, he is planning to visit various centers in the near future. Mrs. Kubose and their two sons, 7 and 3, are presently living with her parents at the Colorado River Project.




Small Private Saves Big Pal

They built reads, constructed by-passes and picked up hundreds of enemy mines, all in range of German shell fire -- meanwhile knocking off their share of Krauts.

TOUGH JOB

Part of a special regimental combat team activated and trained at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, last year, all members of the Engineer company are Americans of Japanese descent who volunteered for combat duty from Hawaii and relocation centers United States.

The Friends of the American Way group of Pasadena has suggested the procedure to follow for evacuoes formerly of Pasadena who are eligible to return to the Western Defense Command area.

We believe that the procedure is a good one to follow for any evacuee who wishes to return to the Western Defense area and are printing it for those who might be interested.

- 1. Have a definite place to go to live. If you are to live with a family in the community, have them write you a letter telling you they want you and what the living arrangements will be.
- 2. Have a definite job and a statement from your employer giving the terms of employment, type of work, etc. If you are going to school, have a copy of your admission papers.
- 3. Send these with your request for return to the coast to the Commanding General, Western Defense Com-Presidio, San Francisco, Calif. He is the only person who can grant you this permission.

sending these applications to the Commanding General we believe that the applicants should also give other pertinent information, especially if they have family members or relatives in the armed forces of the United States. Indications are that those with they were assigned the close relatives in the armed forces get quicker and of advance in more favorable action on their applications.

The general policy of exclusion from the West Coast toughest jobs on the front. still remains, and each application is considered individually.

STATE ATTORNEYS URGE LIFING OF COAS

Attorneys general of California, Oregon, and Washington, on October 7, petitioned the U.S. Supreme Court to lift -- as soon as national security permits -civilian exclusion orders against citizens of Japanese

ancestry issued by military authorities in the West Coast area, according to an AP report under a Washington dateline.

Filing a joint petition as friends of the court in the case of Fred T. Korematsu, Oakland Nisei, the petitioners said the high tribunal had emphasized in the decisions handed down previously that except in the most unusual cir oumstances racial discriminations are prohibited. The petition assets that "it was reasonable for the military commanders to meet the danger threatened (after Pearl Harbor) from unidentified disloyal members of the group (of porsons of Japanese ancostry) by excluding the group as a whole." The attorneys. concluded, howover, that "the restrictions placed upon this group of our citizens must be removed as soon as the military authorities termine and the national socurity permits."

Additional opportunities exist for a large number of family groups to resettle successfully at Seabrook Farms, according to Hideo Kawamura of 31returned from Seabrook for a visit. Kawamura transferred here from Jerome and left Gila in July for Seabrook, Leroy H. Bennett stated where he has been working since that time. states that the reports to the effect that Japanese workers are only getting 5 hours of work a day are unfounded. After they had been there several weeks, however, he became convinced that his fears were needless, for Gila families all the seemed to make a satisfactory adjustment.

EVACUEE FARMER GETS 31500 LOAN FROM ISA

Word was received recently of a \$1500 Farm Security Administration Government Loan made to an evacuee farmer who settled near Lapeer, Michigan. A complete account of the case was given in a letter from the FSA

County Supervisor to Lee A. Marsa, relocation officer, in Detroit.

FROM ARKANSAS

The evacuee farmer relocated from Arkansas Center in 1943 and worked for a farm near Lapeer on a salary basis during summer. Of that year in the winter, he earned additional capital in a Detroit war plant. Since he had been a truck farmer produce man in California, he returned to Lapeer in the spring and on the basis of recommendations from his former employee and the County Agent, who he had met the proceeding summer his loan was approved. Since machinery, including a truck, was leased with the farm, the money loaned was used entirely for operating expenses. Security consisted of a mortgage on the crops to be grown this year. Although the farm was hampered in the earlier part of the season with difficulty in obtaining satisfactory labor, workers were finally recruited from the center and the crops were not seriously affected.

LOAN SUCCESSFUL The FSA man writes, "From present indications I believe that the loan will be a financial success as well as giving the applicant an establishment of his own. 

CRAFTSMEN BUILD 800 MODEL SHIPS

The Navy flier hunting enemy targets in Philippine waters will spot warships faster because he first learned their outlines through ship models made by Japanese American craftsmen in the Gila River Relocation Center, the WRA reported last week.

Young Americans, with Japanese names and faces, built nearly 800 models of Japanese, German, and American ships for the Navy in the ship model shop at this center.

VALUE

The value of the miniature craft is estimated at \$25,000 in monetary terms. They are considered of inestimable value in teaching new Navy personnel attending ship identification training classes, the characteristics of ships of various types and nations. Except for materials the work was done at no cost to the Navy, the WRA reports.

The pocket-size counterparts of World War II
warships range in size
from two inches to two
feet. The fleet, fashioned from poplar, scrap pine,
and tin cans, included
small replicas of the German battleship Tirpitz,
the German cruiser Prinz
Eugen, the German destroyer Koln, a number of submarines and many PT boats.

SPECIAL JOBS

One of the scale model Prinz Eugens was presented to Mrs. Roosevelt, when she visited the conter, as a gift to the President. One of two special jobs, a seven foot fully operative minature of the Cruise r Cleveland was placed on display in a Naval laboratory in New York City, The other special undertaking valued at #1200 was an eight-foot roplica of the U.S.S. South Dakota, with all parts operative above the waterline.

One particular order called for two bot long precision minatures of a number of models of Japanese ships. These, scaled down to exact detail and valued at \$60 each, were produced at the rate of 40 a month.

DENATURALIZATION LAW

The law permitting an American citizen to renounce his citizenship, while residing in this country or its outlying possessions, is now operative, following the recent publication of procedures in the Federal Register.

No application will be accepted unless it is submitted in accordance with the regulations. Only individual applications will be considered.

Information received in Washington from the field indicates that few evacuees will take action under the new law.

The Department of Justice has indicated that no renunciation will be granted without careful examination of the facts and the reasons motivating the application. Requests for renunciation from citizens who are motivated by a desire to avoid Selective Service or other legal obligations, will be subject to particular scrutiny.

Highlights of the procedure follows:

The applicant forwards to the Attorney General his application for renunciation of citizenship, on the prescribed form, together with specified citizenship documents. Forms may be secured from the Attorney General as soon as they are printed. In the event the requested renunciation does not appear contrary to the interests of national defense, a hearing is conducted by a hearing officer whom the Attorney General designates. The applicant is notified of the time and place of hearing.

After the hearing the applicant may file formal renunciation of citizenship on a prescribed form and request its approval. The hearing officer recommends approval or disapproval to the Attorney General. This officer is authorized also to consider results of investigations and available records from government agencies and other sources.

A renunciation of citizenship does not become effective until the Attorney General approves it. Notice of approval or disapproval is given the applicant. If approval is granted, other stimpulated government agencies are notified so that the renunciation may be recorded on specified documents pertaining to the applicant.

BUTTE COOKING CLASS TO LEARIN "PHE BAKING"


"A Pioce of Good Pie" will be this Friday's lesson at the Butte cooking school which is meeting at mess hall 42.

500 SCHOOLS ENROLL 3000

Fivo hundred and fifty American institutions of available higher learning have enrolled hearly 3,000 Japanese American students in the past two and a half years, comprising almost all the young evacuees formerly in relocation and assembly centers who wanted college training, the War Reloca-Authority reported this week.

The current enrollment approximately 2,500 about evenly divided between men and women. Since sélective service for Nisei was reinstituted in January of this year, the percentage of male students had declined sharply. Many of the men, who might have gone to college, went from the relocation centers into the Army as volunteers and inductees, the WRA said, while others interrupted their lator college studies to enter military service along with many of their classmatos.

The Japanese American college group on December 7, 1941 totaled 2,300 Nisei registered in 74 colleges and universities in California, Oregon and Washington and about 200 (Continued on page 5)

(continued from page 4) in colleges elsewhere the country. Evacuation from the West Coast in the spring and summer of 1942 virtually wiped out the enrollment there, leaving only the 200 Nisei students in colleges east of the Sierra Nevadas.

Through relocation to campuses away from Pacific states, the colpopulation of Japanese American students now has climbed back to the level existing at the time of Poarl Harbor, in spite military inductions of Mstudents, annual graduation and other departures from colleges. The most striking change, the MRA pointed out, is that the hospital nursing schools states.

Each year about 400 of the 2,000 students who graduate from the high schools at the eight relocation centers leave to enter college. Since May l college applicants among those graduates have been accepted by more than 150 different institutions, TRA reported.

REPORTS FROM SEABROOK

As a result of reports received by several center residents from friends or relatives at Seabrook Farms to the effect that Seabrook workers were not receiving full time employment, a letter was written to H. Leon Yager, relocation officer at Seabrook Farms in an effort to obtain the facts. Yager reports as follows:

WORKING HOURS

"The report that there is not, at present, enough working hours is false.

Of course, there is parttime work available a t Scabrook Farms for high school students who may be free on Saturday or for others who are mainly occupied with their family duties.

"I have interviewed a great many of our Japanes Americans at Seabrook in the past months and have made a point of finding out whether Mr. Seabrook's guarantee is proving true. That guarantee is that he will provide pay at the straight hourly rate and on an annual basis equal to an average minimum work wook of 48 hours. In all of the interviews. found not one who had fallen below an average of 48 working hours a week. hours will be in summer than in winter. WAGES

"Another rumer you mentioned is that Japanese workers are paid lower wages than non - Japaneso workers in comparable service. As a matter of fact, our Japanese American men have been started at 55¢ an hour which is 5¢ above the usual starting wage. This is done on the basis that our Japanese Americans are experienced. It should be remembered that Mr. Seabrook desires to obtain the Japanese Wo want to emphasize here that an increase of 5¢ in all hourly rates has just now gone into effect making the lowest starting hourly rate for men 60¢.

Hachiro Yuasa, associated with the New York Church Committee for Japanese Americans, will arrive in Gila this week-end to conduct a Christian Missions lecture tour in Canal and Butte, as a part of his 6 center, series which began the first of October and

SANSEI

Dr. Yuasa is a third generation Christian. He came to America, the land of his dreams, as a boy and worked on farms in California. In this countook academic try he training at Kansas State College, the University of Illinois, Cornell and the University of Chicago. He took his Ph. D. in entomology.

One gets an appreciation of the scholarship of Dr. Yuasa when he learns that in addition to the training received in American Educational Institutions, he spent a year in 7:30 p.m. -- Canal Christian He was called to the Presidency the Doshisha

University in Japan 1934 and servéd until 1937, when he resigned.

Dr. Yuasa is not only a scholar but he is a Christian scholar. In recognition of his Christian leadership, the Foreign Conference Missions North America invited him to attend the World Missionary meeting at Madras. India, in December, 1938. He accepted, representing the Christian Churches of Japan. Immediately after. Madras he came to America to participate in the post Madras Conference held across this nation. He traveled as one member of a team of speakers.

MISSION WORK After this work, Dr. Yuasa was invited by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions to remain in America and to work for a larger Christian fellowship.

At the urgent request of the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, he has been loaned for six weeks to conduct a series of Christian Missions in the Japanese American Relocation Conters. These Missions began last autumn, when nine were held in as many Centers.

The six relocation centers he will visit, spending five days in each center, are Hunt, Idaho; Topaz, Utah; Manzanar, California; Poston, Arizona; Gila River, Arizona, and McGehoe, Ark.

A SEMI-WHEEKEY PAPER

The change from a tri-weekly to a semi-weekly paper is made, not without regrets, for we realize the importance of distributing information often enough to keep the news fresh. It is only after careful consideration and attempts to find some other alternative that we have finally made this decision, which we feel was the best way to meet the critical manpower shortage which has been haunting the staff for several months.

By changing to a semi-weekly, we hope to be able to maintain more nearly the standards set by the NEWS-COURIER when it had a full staff and more experienced people. Necessarily, of course, timeliness in many of the stories will be sacrificed, but even before timeliness, we feel, accuracy should take precedence. With a depleted staff working overtime inaccuracies are bound to creep in, and have. Now with an extra day in which to collect, edit, and publish the news, while we do not promise to come anywhere near publishing errorless issues, our reporters will have time to verify more closely the facts that are collected, our proofreaders can be more careful in checking grammatical errors, and we shall not be rushed to the point of slapping stories into place and hoping that the facts phoned in or collected are true.

While not attempting to rationalize for changing to two issues a week, we should like to point out that your paper is not the only one that is a semi-weekly. In fact all papers of the eight other WRA centers with the exception of one, have been coming out only twice a week, some only once. The GILA NEWS-COURIER will now do likewise, not just to be following suit but to remedy an intolerable situationarising out of manpower needs. And so with regrets for having to publish less frequently, and bowing only to circumstances, we go into a new era of a twice-weekly publication from November.

As in the past we shall continue to welcome criticisms of all kinds, especially constructive criticisms that are given to improve the paper. We also welcome and encourage letters to the paper on any subject of community wide interest. We feel that only through continued interest by the people in their paper can such an institution continue to survive and thrive.


