CHEST FUND**DISTRIBUTION
TO BE DISCUSSED**

A meeting to determine the usage and distribution of the community chest fund, which will remain in this center, is scheduled to be held on December 12.

The various representatives at this meeting will include those from the community councils of both camps, the block managers groups, parent teachers association, girl and boy scouts, young Buddhist association, USO, Christian church, nurses' aides, 1944 community chest trustees, Arthur L. Griswold, and Earl H. Goodman.

**PROPERTY INFORMATION
ON NOTES MORTGAGES**

(Here is the fourth of a series of five articles dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.)

Evacuees who wish to collect debts owed them may do so with the aid of the Property Office if they will supply complete information to that office.

GIVE ADEQUATE DATA

The date of the note or the date the debt was made; explanation of how and for what the debt was made (for work done, goods purchased, etc.); the original amount of the debt, rate of interest and the plan of repayment agreed upon; the balance due, name and address of the debtor; and any evidence of the debt, such as a note, mortgage, purchase contract, etc., should be given to the Property Office to speed collection.

Where an evacuee wishes to rent or lease property he should supply the Property Office with an accurate description and the location of the property. He should specify rental rates but must keep in mind that OPA rent ceilings may apply and that where they exist rental rates cannot be raised unless proper authorization from the OPA is given. Such permission is usually hard to get. Complete details about the terms of leases, length of lease desired and other special terms should be given to the Property Office.

LAND LEASING

In cases where farm land is to be rented out or leased, it is important that the evacuee supply the Property Office with complete details about irrigation assessments, electricity bills, water district taxes, methods of determining shares when share rent is desired, use of farm equipment left on the farm, building insurance as well as the evacuee's desires regarding all other leasing specifications.

Dates for payment of rent and expiration of leases should be specified to the Property Office. The Property Office can also help the evacuee in handling matters such as inspection of property, fire insurance, vandalism and pilferage.

STORAGE SPACE

Evacuees should understand that as long as the military exclusion order remains in effect the WRA will provide storage space for property left in the evacuated area or left in a center by an evacuee who either relocates or is inducted into the armed forces.

On the other hand the WRA cannot assume responsibility

Election Approaches

Candidate for the positions of community councilmen for Butte and Canal for the new 1945 term total 135 men, the largest since the councils were organized in this center.

NEW FACES

One can see from the list of candidates that new men formerly of Jerome have served to bolster the roster of candidates. So have other residents who, in the face of the continued relocation of leaders, are rising to the occasion. The material is surely there--135 strong; it now rests on the residents to do something about it, come December 12.

Too often residents demand of their candidates all those qualities of courage, decision, leadership, and energy; and as often they themselves are unwilling to give councilmen even a semblance of interest, let alone active support. When there's trouble in the air, it's "councilman to the fore; what did we elect you for?" When the sailing is smooth it's "by the way, who is our councilman?"

MORE INTEREST?

But this time, the fact that enough people took interest in the nomination to put up the unusually large number of candidates may indicate a strengthened interest in representative government. We should like to see this followed up on election day with a record turn-out of voters, each intent on selecting a man who will work for the best for the most and in whom residents have faith and trust.

The election commissions of both Butte and Canal will soon be announcing the registration of voters and the location of polls. Each voter might well remember that in the few moments that are required to place the check mark at the polls he will be deciding his representative for the next half year.

Pittsburgh is a labor shortage area. The classified advertisement in the papers show a great need for men as laborers in the steel mills, as accountants, cooks, auto-mechanics, machine operators, bakery workers, domestics, as professional people, radio service men, stock clerks, produce workers, and others. Advertisements for women also are endless, calling for such artisans as bookkeepers, beauticians, bakery workers, commercial artists, domestics, clerks, cooks, dental assistants, factory workers, clothing workers, nurses, vegetable trimmers, and others.

JOBS WILL OPEN

Many of these jobs will undoubtedly be opened up for evacuees as soon as a permanent WRA official is appointed and an office is established, Cullum said. He added he expected to open such an office in a few days.

bility for the storage or care of a relocated evacuee's property at the point of relocation. This includes property of evacuees who were inducted after relocation. The WRA will, however, assist in moving the household, personal and commercial property of evacuee going out on indefinite leave from a relocation center.

PROPERTY OF INDUCTEES

Any evacuee inducted into the armed services and who wants the WRA to store property he has left in a relocation center or on the West Coast should designate some person to represent him in dealing with the WRA.

Any evacuee wishing to have personal or commercial property picked up and stored must fill out Form WRA - 155. The form must be filled out, signed and witnessed. It must be signed by the owner or for him by someone who holds power of attorney.

STORAGE TRANSFER

Evacuees who wish property stored by them in a commercial warehouse or in private storage transferred to a WRA warehouse must pay storage costs that have accrued before the WRA can move such property to a WRA warehouse. Warehousing receipts must be supplied by the evacuee.

The WRA maintains warehouses at Seattle, Portland, Sacramento, Stockton, Fresno, Watsonville, Los Angeles and San Francisco for storing evacuee property.

Full membership in the Rochester, N.Y., Local #15 of the International Typographical Union, AFL, has been enjoyed for the past several months by Harry T. Yasuda, former linotypist of San Francisco, Honolulu and Delta, Utah, who relocated to Rochester last June from the Central Utah Relocation Center. In the near future he hopes to bring East his wife and 7-year-old son Stanley, who now reside at 40-4-A, Central Utah.

The secretary of the union local, the Ledger Printing and Publishing Co. of Rochester, and the Rochester relocation officer, Calude C. Cornwall, all cooperated in arranging for Yasuda to take the linotypist's job which he has held in the printing company's union shop since three days after his arrival in Rochester last June.

"Everybody in Rochester has been swell to me and the union members have been especially friendly," Yasuda said recently. "They treat me like one of the boys. They're really fine fellows. I don't know all the members personally, but all our monthly union meetings even strangers come over to ask me how I'm getting along. I like my job and the shop where I work, too."

Financial Help For Nisei Cases

I have noted the statement in Saburo Kido's column of October 21 that Wayne Collins spent \$2,000 of his own money in the Korematsu case and that James Purcell has spent about \$3,000 of his own money in the Endo case. No mention is made of the time the attorneys have spent on these cases, to the detriment of their own private practices.

As a matter of fact, the Northern California Branch of the A.C.L.U. has thus far spent exactly \$1485.16 for the printing of Mr. Collins' briefs in the Korematsu case, while Mr. Collins has contributed the substantial cost of making two trips to Washington besides months of time in working on the case.

Mr. Collins has also prepared briefs for the Northern California Branch of the A.C.L.U. in the Hirabayashi, Yasui, Endo, and Regan cases. The branch has spent exactly \$739.46 in the printing and filing of these briefs and Mr. Collins has not been compensated for his work.

I venture to say that if Mr. Collins were compensated for all the work he has done in these Japanese test cases in accordance with usual fees in the legal profession, the bill would run into five figures.

Sixty per cent of the money the branch expended on the Japanese test cases came out of its reserve funds. While we haven't solicited funds from the Japanese in support of these cases, it is interesting to note that out of our expenditure of \$2,224.62 not one cent has been contributed by any person of Japanese ancestry.

FOR THE NISEI CAUSE

The letter printed on the side column prompted this reply from a T. Kako to the Pacific Citizen, 415 Beason Building, Salt Lake City, 1, Utah:

Dear Sir:

The Ernest Besig letter as director of the Northern California Branch of the American Civil Liberties Union addressed to you in the November 4 issue of the Pacific Citizen astounded me. That the various cases waged on behalf of the civil and citizenship rights of Japanese Americans have been carried on solely without the financial support of those who would derive the most benefit shows an astonishing lack of gratefulness on the part of those of Japanese descent.

One reads how Red Cross and bond drives top quotas in the centers. One sees of many Nisei earning wartime salaries. Apparent, too, are many Nisei enterprises prosperous and thriving. In the face of this, the fact that the efforts of our Caucasian friends go unrecognized is indeed a strange and paradoxical situation.

It so happens that I am an Issei with children who are American citizens. Though I am an alien "ineligible to citizenship," I feel strongly that the rights which our boys are fighting to maintain overseas should be preserved intact at home. The maintenance of civil rights is one of the homefront battle.

This is a continuing battle, and I am sure as others of Japanese descent become aware of the imperative necessity for this effort, financial support will be forthcoming. To start the ball rolling, I am hereby enclosing my check for \$50. Please convey this to Mr. Ernest Besig with my apologies on behalf of those who are the recipients of their efforts. Express also my confidence that others like myself will join in and that ingratitude is not a quality which can be attributed to Japanese Americans.

EVACUEE PROPERTY

Shipping Information

(This is the concluding article in a series of five dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.)

An evacuee who wishes to arrange for shipment of personal property must request such shipment by filling out Form WRA-156, signing it and having the signature witnessed. Complete information should be given on the form.

Evacuees are entitled to free shipment of their household or personal effects from the original point of storage to a center or a point of relocation or, if they already have them in a center, to a point of relocation from the center. Evacuees wishing to have personal property shipped from a center to the point of relocation should make their requests to the Project Director of the project from which they moved.

The WRA will furnish help to the evacuee to get information on transportation costs when the evacuee wishes to have a private company ship his property. Request for such help should be made on Form WRA-153.

In the matter of shipping commercial property, the property office will help the evacuee arrange for shipment to any point he desires but the cost of ship-

CANAL LISTS PRINCIPLES FOR AUDITORIUM USE

The ten principles for the usage of the Canal High School auditorium were drawn up by a committee composed of representatives from Canal High School, Canal High PTA, Community Council, Elementary School, Elementary School PTA, CAS, James L. Shelly, and W. C. Sawyer.

The principles are:

1. The custody of the Canal High School auditorium shall remain with the Canal High School principal, who is responsible to the WPA for all movable property therein. He shall retain the keys, and charge any other organization using the facilities with the care of all property therein.

2. Smoking shall be positively prohibited. Organizations using the auditorium shall request the police or firemen to enforce the "no smoking" instructions.

3. Community activities and education sections shall be the only sections authorized to schedule events in the auditorium. Community activities shall pass on requests of all other than school groups for use of this facility.

4. School activities shall have the right of use of the auditorium from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

5. In the use of the auditorium, no attachments shall be made to the floor or walls except through approval of the custodian.

6. The auditorium shall not be used for carnivals.

7. There shall be no objection to use of the auditorium for activities charging admissions, so long as they are within project regulation.

8. Banquets may be held by unanimous consent of the afore named groups represented at this meeting. Light refreshments may be served incident to a social affair, subject to the approval of the custodian.

9. Auditorium may be used for athletics if the floor is safe in the estimation of the custodian.

10. Parties using auditorium are responsible for returning it to the same condition as it was found.

As the Co-op will try its best in equal distribution, all the residents are asked for their cooperation.

The cigarette shortage is acute all over the nation, Bunji Ikenoue, general manager pointed out. In Chicago, at stores where cigarettes are still available, there were long queues of purchasers. Another instance showing the evidence of the unusual value placed on cigarettes these days was the scene outside the post office in Chicago where they had the semi-annual auction of unclaimed merchandises which included cartons of cigarettes. The cigarettes were moved across the town to a warehouse in an armored car with the shotgun ready. A pack sold, for as high as 88 cents.

OREGON LEGION DROPS 16 NISEI

The names of 16 Nisei now serving in the U.S. Army were erased by the Hood River (Ore.) Post of the American Legion from the county's war memorial, said Joss Edington, commander, according to an AP release. Many of these soldiers are serving on overseas battle fronts.

ment, including packing, crating, loading, etc., must be paid by the evacuee.

However, the WRA will pay for shipment to points of relocation tools and equipment of an evacuee's trade, business or profession, including farm machinery and equipment sufficient for a family-sized venture (but not over 5000 pounds shipping weight per family) if the relocation officer in the community in which the evacuee relocates or intends to relocate will certify that the use of such tools, equipment or fixtures is necessary to the evacuee's successful relocation and that they cannot be replaced locally at the time because of wartime shortages.

All shipments must be made by freight unless the items are difficult to send safely by freight because of high value or small size. Furthermore if the Project Director or relocation officer certifies on Form WRA-156 that express shipment is necessary in the interest of the relocation program, goods may be sent by express. Express shipments at government expense may not exceed 500 pounds shipping weight.

Evacuees should consult with and ask the advice of the property office in all matters pertaining to shipment of all types of goods, sale of all types of property or in matters involving rentals, leases, taxes or disputes arising from contracts.

The property office, of which there is one on every project, has been established for the purpose of aiding the evacuee. While its functions necessarily are limited, it can be of help to the evacuee in solving many types of individual problems. The evacuee is welcome at the property office and should avail himself of the services offered.

SEABROOK CALLS FOR EMPLOYEES

Thirty-one more families and fifty more unattached workers are needed by Seabrook. Women are preferred for the unattached workers but men will be acceptable.

On November 23, 1944, there were 477 Japanese Americans employed at Seabrook Farms. Of this number 350 are men and 127 are women. There are a total of 134 families living at Seabrook.

Further information concerning Seabrook Farms may be secured by the relocation office, 69-8.

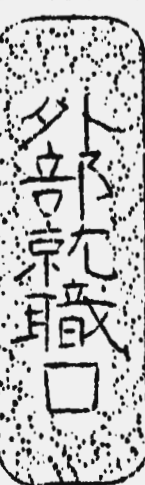

PARENTS TEACHERS

"PTA" is a common and dull sounding term, made even duller by its very familiarity. Maybe Parents Teachers Association spelled out would arouse some fathers and mothers into feeling more involved. Perhaps we should go further and call it "The Future of Our Children" or "Will My Boy Succeed?" At any rate the need for a good PTA should not be under-estimated as it seems to be by some parents, if attendance at meetings is any criterion.

A little consideration will surely show that what youngsters get out of school now will be the basis upon which they develop later. Influences here will leave deep grooves that will shape their characters for life. Guidance and discipline now is a must.

Because we are in a "RA" center and know that children cannot go far beyond the fence is no reason why parents should relax their vigilance. And it is not the barrack buildings or the lack of facilities that should take all the blame in case of poor showing of students. It could well be the attitude of the students themselves, who in turn often reflect the attitude of parents that is to blame.

A high school principal reports a marked drop in scholarship of his students. Students who passed through the first year of heat, dust, and bare barracks are now lagging--in the face of improved conditions, a new auditorium, science buildings, lawns, etc. Why?

Questions such as these can best be met and answered by parents and teachers who coordinate their efforts through PTA meetings. It should not be that parents are coaxed to join and attend by membership drives. It should not be that parents are lured to meetings by interesting programs, nor should they come just to listen to reports from the faculty. It is for parents to come willingly for the sake of young students. It is for parents to give criticisms, suggestions for improvement, and commendations when merited.

The "PTA" will be as dull or as interesting and useful as participants make it.

be the worse thing for him. All visiting regulations in hospitals are made first, for the welfare of the average patient and second, for the efficient functioning of the institution. It is necessary for the patients' welfare that a hospital be quiet; loud talking, confusion, or any unnecessary noise often delay recovery.

"For these reasons it is suggested that:

"(1) Parents and relatives of small children in the hospital contact the nurse in charge of the floor before visiting the patient, since occasionally small children react unfavorably toward visits from relatives.

"(2) That visitors come during the regular visiting hours when possible and enter the front door of the hospital stopping at the receptionist's desk before going to the ward.

"(3) That relatives of very ill patients get permission for special visiting.

"(4) That soldiers home on leave having relatives in the hospital visit the nursing office to get special permits.

"We are asking soldiers and civilians alike to cooperate with us. We are asking you all to observe regular visiting hours unless there are special conditions present. Then we shall be glad to help you in any way we can."

DR. KEHOE DISCUSSES LIFE IN WRA CENTER

Dr. Monika Kehoe, formerly director of the adult education program in this center, discusses life in the center in an article, "Issai and Nisei," published in the Friends Intelligence of Philadelphia. Dr. Kehoe is now an instructor in the department of personnel service at the Brooklyn College.

She asks what a fifteen-year-old Nisei boy would think in a civics class at a relocation center high school when the teacher discusses "the democratic way of life". She tells of the father who is released from an internment camp and tagged as a "parolee" for a crime that he has not committed, the struggle of women who try to learn the English language and American customs to fit themselves for the dreaded adventure of relocation.

She states the necessity of speedy relocation of these families now under the tension in the artificial organizations of center life and the assistance all must give for the readjustment of these people to the normal pursuits of life in a community where tolerance and understanding prevail.

Poston Evacuee Returns To L.A.

Tadayuki Todah, 54-year-old naturalized Japanese from Poston, returned to his home in Los Angeles with full approval of Army authorities last Tuesday, according to the L.A. Times.

While still a Japanese citizen, he volunteered in the World War I and served with the United States Army. In 1937 he applied for citizenship and received his naturalization papers.

Todah's release from Poston is the first resulting from actions brought in Federal Court in behalf of several native-born American Japanese and others who have been naturalized.

Resettlers Get Financial Help

How security for resettlers is provided by public and private agencies is shown in a newly issued report from the Middle Atlantic Area relocation office. Included in the report are a number of actual examples of assistance to resettlers in meeting health, financial, and family problems.

Copies of the report in English can now be obtained from the local relocation program office. That office will also soon have available copies in a Japanese translation which is now in preparation.

The report describes the following typical examples of assistance to resettlers provided by public and private agencies:

Two families were aided in resuming housekeeping by grants of \$100 and \$195, respectively, from social security funds; an Issai who lost his savings was granted funds for his immediate needs by the Social Security Board; several sick individuals were provided with free medical care in hospitals and clinics; and Issai who

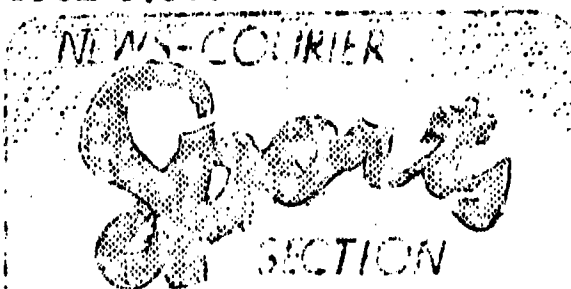

GILA ARCHITECT WINS \$750 PRIZE

Kenneth M. Nishimoto, 37, former Los Angeles architect now residing at 44-1-B, was notified last Wednesday he has won the \$750 third prize in a national architecture competition sponsored by the Bituminous Coal Institute of Cincinnati, Ohio.

The problem presented to competitors was to design an ideal post-war house of a given size on a given lot, incorporating modern facilities and equipment, and providing a basement for recreation.

A graduate of the College of Architecture of the University of Southern California, Nishimoto was granted a license in 1941 and practiced in Los Angeles. He worked for several Los Angeles architects and also for J. J. Davidson and Paul T. Frankl, both designers. Previously he has won two prizes in Southern California contests and an honorable mention in a national competition.

CO-OP RESOLUTION LOOKS TO THE FUTURE

WHEREAS, the Delegates from eight Center Business Enterprises to the Third All Center Enterprises Conference, being held at Gila Project, Rivers, Arizona, under the sponsorship of the Federation of Center Business Enterprises, are gravely concerned with the multi-phases of problems attendant to the eventual liquidations faced by all the center cooperatives, and

WHEREAS, the Delegates recognize the existence of a gap of time spanning the period between the final closing and liquidation of the center cooperatives and the completion of the general evacuation and exodus of the residents of the center, wherein no provisions are definitely established to and the residents are deprived thereby of the services and goods necessary and instrumental for their daily needs, and

WHEREAS, the Delegates, at its General Assembly, had reached to an unanimous conclusion that the formation of a definite policy pertinent to and the establishment to that end wherein the residents are afforded a mean to acquire and purchase such necessary services and goods are primarily the responsibilities of each Project Director as well as that of the War Relocation Authority,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the War Relocation Authority be requested to give serious thought to the problem and formulate a definite policy and establish or cause to be established a mean or means, at minimum prices consistent to the best interest and the benefit of the residents and thereby give assurance to and render relief to each center cooperative of its moral obligation.

A SAFE CHRISTMAS

Director Dillon Myer has issued a request for a "Safe Christmas" campaign this year. His statement follows:

"Each Christmas hundreds of homes and many lives are lost by fire throughout the United States. The gayest hours of the year have too often become scenes of tragedy. The causes of these fires are well known to fire protection officials and can be prevented.

"The traditional festivities of the Yule season can have tragic results if precautionary measures are not taken. Therefore, it is fitting to request each WRA center and the Emergency Refugee Shelter to do their utmost to promote a 'Safe Christmas' campaign this year in an effort to maintain our present perfect record of no fires nor loss of life from Christmas activities."

HEART OF AN AMERICAN

The following editorial appeared in the Omaha World Herald, November 28, 1944.

"I have the face of a Japanese but my heart is American," said T/Sgt. Ben Kuroki in revealing here that the War Department has granted his request for assignment to combat duty in the Pacific.

Speaking before a group of transplanted Nisei (Japanese Americans shunted from the West Coast) this modest soldier from Hershey, Nebraska, who flew with the first Liberator squadron over Europe, told of his ambition to fly over Tokyo in a bomber.

His words might well be pondered by some, perhaps well-intentioned, who have the face of Americans but the hearts of bigots so far as Ben Kuroki and his minority group of Americans are concerned.

Best man for the occasion was Bon Abo, the bridegroom's friend since boyhood days in Central California.

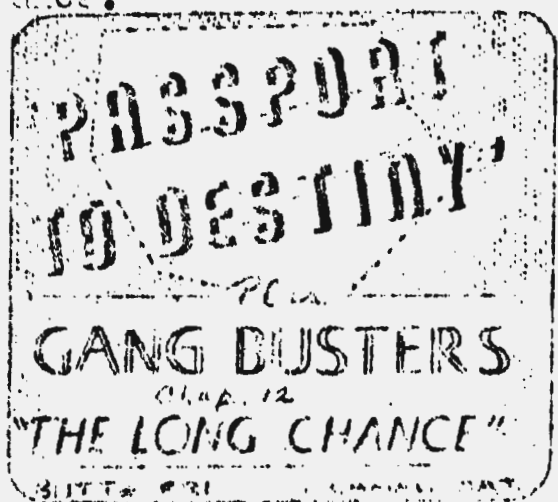

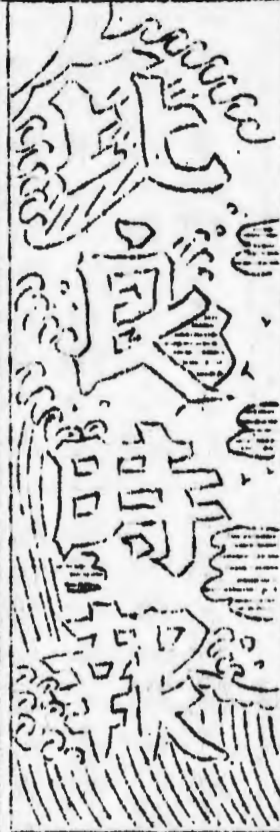

ANTI-UNI-AMERICAN ACT

(From the Milwaukee Journal, Dec. 5, 1944)

"There is nothing very American about that American Legion post in the Hood River valley of Oregon which removed from its war memorial the names of 16 Americans of Japanese ancestry now serving in the United States army. Some of these men are overseas and at the battle fronts.

"We are sure this is not in the spirit of the legion as a whole, and we hope the national organization will do something about it, even though it does try to leave its posts as autonomous as possible.

"This matter involves the future of the legion, which wants to bring the boys of this war into its organization. Well, they are not fighting for the kind of thing the Hood River post has done. Ask any one of them who comes back. He'll tell you America's racial prejudices must be corrected. He is not likely to come into any organization which, because of such prejudice, erases the names of loyal Americans--whatever their color or their ancestry--from its rolls."

CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM NATIONAL YWCA

The following Christmas message to residents of relocation centers was written by the National Young Women's Christian Association. The Committee on Resettlement of Japanese Americans in New York received the message too late to include in its Bulletin and requests that it be printed in the center papers.

ARMY LIFTS COAST BAN

HUSO TELLS OF EASTERN TRIP

William Huso, relocation program officer, returned from a detail to the N.Y. relocation office for four weeks. On his return trip he called on former Gilans at Seabrook and on WRA offices at Savannah, Ga., and New Orleans, La.

At the N.Y. office he met many employers and evacuees who had newly arrived and were seeking employment. "Evacuees already resettled there," said Huso, "had a high regard for the efficiency of the office, and this is understandable because of the type of people who were assisting evacuees with their problems." He found that relocation officers were men of broad background with knowledge of employment opportunities and social problems.

VARIETY OF JOBS

Huso stated that there were a wide variety of jobs in various skills and trades. In many cases it is impractical to develop a job for a relocatee until he is on the spot for placement. He felt that a person going out should to some degree know what he contemplates doing so that a relocation office can explore for the type of job he wants. Too many he said were not too clear in their minds about what kind of a job they were after.

OPPORTUNITIES NOW

"I believe," said Huso, "that evacuees should take advantage of the many opportunities now." The employment market is abundant and there is a strong chance of getting into work which will carry on through any business recession which may come as a result of cutbacks.

The mass exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast will be lifted midnight, Jan. 2, 1945.

The Western Defense Command on Sunday, Dec. 17, issued the necessary orders to terminate mass exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from the Pacific coastal area.

The details of the revocation order will be explained in both English and Japanese through bulletins from Washington, which already have been sent out and are expected this week, probably today. As soon as they arrive, these bulletins will be distributed for residents to see.

The revocation proclamation, Public Proclamation No. 21, issued by Maj. Gen. H.C. Pratt, commanding general of the Western Defense, explains.

CONDITION WARRANTS

"The present military situation makes possible modification and relaxation of restrictions and the termination of the system of mass exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry...and permits the substitution for mass exclusion of a system of individual determination and exclusion of those individuals whose presence within sensitive areas of the Western Defense Command is deemed a source of potential danger to the military security thereof."

ARMY MEN HERE

Army officers, as representatives of the Western Defense Command, have arrived at the center and starting this week will individually notify individuals whether they are free to enter the Western Defense Command area or are to be excluded. They will also notify those individuals whose cases have not yet been determined and will interview such individuals in order to determine their final status.

KUNIYOSHI

'FEELING SHOWS IN ART WORK'

Yasuo Kuniyoshi, who was recently awarded a \$1000. prize in the Carnegie Institution of Pittsburgh's exhibit of Painting in the United States, stated that "if you feel something, it comes out in your work," according to an article in the PA Daily of Nov. 27.

His paintings run largely to abstract still-life and he says that you don't have to paint war scenes to reflect the war.

He is a chairman of the Arts Council of Japanese Americans for Democracy and a member of the Japanese American Committee for Democracy in New York.

As a young boy of 13, he came to America and lived on peanuts for several days in Seattle and then went to Los Angeles where he attended the public school and began to study art.

DETROIT HOSTEL HAS FAMILY UNIT

In order to make it possible for families to relocate to Detroit as complete units, Fellowship House, the hostel in the city of Detroit, has set aside a suite including cooking facilities for use by the family. A special rental of \$12.50 a week will be charged for the rooms and no time limit will be placed on the length of occupancy.

Inquiries regarding this suite should be made to the Rev. Shigeo Tanabe at the Fellowship House located at 130 East Grand Avenue, Detroit, Mich. This move closely mirrors what had been done by the hostels in both Cincinnati and Cleveland.

BAN LIFTING HEADLINED

The announcement of the lifting of the West coast ban of Japanese Americans hit the front pages of coast papers this week in streamer headlines that shoved war news to the background.

Most papers gave factual accounts of Maj. Gen. H.C. Pratt's proclamation, emphasizing that the return of evacuees will be gradual. At least two governors, Warren of California and Osborn of Arizona, have made public statements urging decency and tolerance and asking their citizens to maintain and protect the constitutional rights of loyal Japanese who return.

EVACUATION 'RIGHT'

The United States Supreme Court Monday ruled 6 to 3 that the Army had a right to remove all Japanese from the West Coast in 1942 because American shores were "threatened by hostile forces."

It is presumed that the ruling applies to the Korematsu test case which had questioned the constitutionality of the evacuation.

The majority decision delivered by Justice Black upheld as an emergency measure the Army's edict issued in the mass evacuation of Japanese from the coast.

In the Mitsuye Endo case the court unanimously ordered her unconditional release from the Topaz Center. The tribunal ruled that the WRA had no right to detain loyal citizens under the circumstances.

JACL

SEEKS MINORITY GATHERING

Calling upon President Roosevelt to issue invitations for a White House Conference on Minorities, the National JACL Conference held in Salt Lake City, Dec. 1-3, made a number of noteworthy decisions. In its petition to the President, the League pointed out that the domestic problem of minorities is of growing national concern, especially typified in the wartime treatment of persons of Japanese descent. The status of Orientals in the United States in relation to Asiatic policies were pointed out as necessary items for such Conference.

Particularly outstanding was the rehabilitation measure proposed for returning veterans. The as-

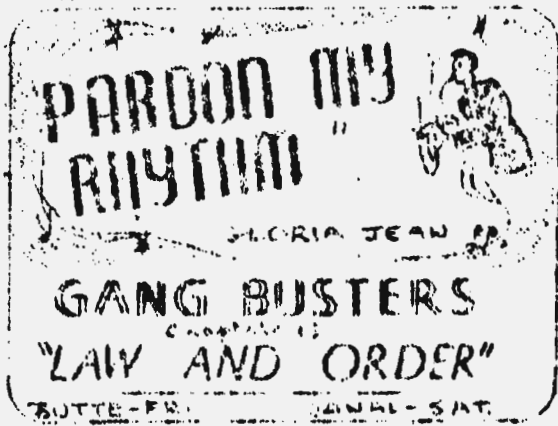

INCIDENTS TOLD OF EVACUEES GETTING AID

Incidents where resettlers in need have been helped by public and private agencies are told by relocation offices in New York City, Philadelphia,

Rochester, and Washington, D.C.

The case of a Nisei from Gila is an example of the valuable services provided by private social agencies. After living with his sister for eight months in Pennsylvania, where she had resided for five years, Mr. T. was called for Army induction. His physical examination revealed that he had tuberculosis. Expensive medical care was essential, many X-rays were required, and it was important for Mr. T. to quit work and rest. Furthermore, because of his condition, it was not wise for him to continue living in his sister's crowded home. The relocation office arranged for the necessary medical care and X-rays to be provided without cost to him. They also arranged for his support until he could go back to work and obtained for him a separate room near his sister's house.

An old man from Heart Mountain had saved over \$500. This 61-year-old Issei came East with his wife and their 17-year-old Nisei daughter. Mr. C., an artist, had definite plans for his family's future, which included working a while to save some more money and then opening his own studio, as he had done in California. At this time, Mr. C. broke his glasses. A new pair at regular rates would cost about \$30 and the expense would oblige him to delay the opening of his studio. But the social agency arranged for him to be given an excellent eye examination for fifty cents and perfectly fitted glasses for only \$2.75.

Hospital Bars Nisei Nurses

The County Hospital advisory committee in San Diego, Calif., opposed the acceptance of Nisei girls for training in the hospital's nursing school last Tuesday, stated the L.A. Times.

The resolution was adopted in response to a query from the State War Council to the director of nurses at the hospital.

One of the advocates of the resolution, D.C. Zeun, Commander of Post 6, American Legion, states that "until the war is over and there is some definite way to toll the loyal from the disloyal Japanese, bringing Japanese girls into the hospital would be unfair to the patients and to the nurses. I imagine the boys fighting Japs in the Pacific wouldn't like it very much if they knew their mothers or daughters were being nursed by Japs here at home."

According to E. Price Steiding, relocation officer in charge of the New York district office, "this reception committee, consisting of local residents of Japanese ancestry, has been especially helpful to Issei and several family groups that

DULUTH GROUP AID RESETTLERS

The Minneapolis relocation office has compiled a very complete information folder regarding opportunities for evacuees in Duluth, Minn. In addition to general information regarding the Duluth area, the kit contains large photographs of resettlers who are living and working in Duluth. The success which the first relocators found in this city has encouraged the Minneapolis office to assign a relocation officer to answer correspondence and meet incoming evacuees in Duluth.

Duluth is a city of over 100,000. Although it is located on Lake Superior in the Northern United States, its climate is similar to that of Minneapolis, where large numbers of resettlers are now living.

The citizens of Duluth have organized an active relocation committee, which is prepared to cooperate with center residents who are interested in further information regarding this area. Members of this committee will meet newcomers on the train or at the YWCA and assist them in housing arrangements. Also arrangements have been made with the War Manpower Commission to give special attention to finding employment for resettlers.

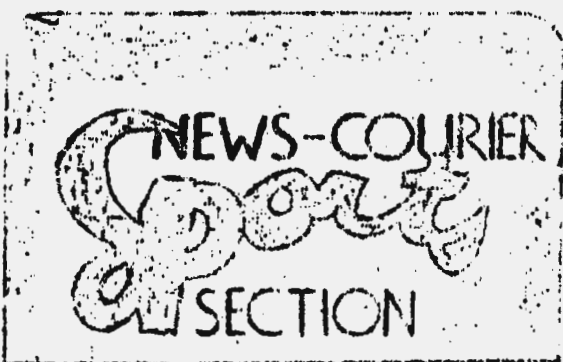

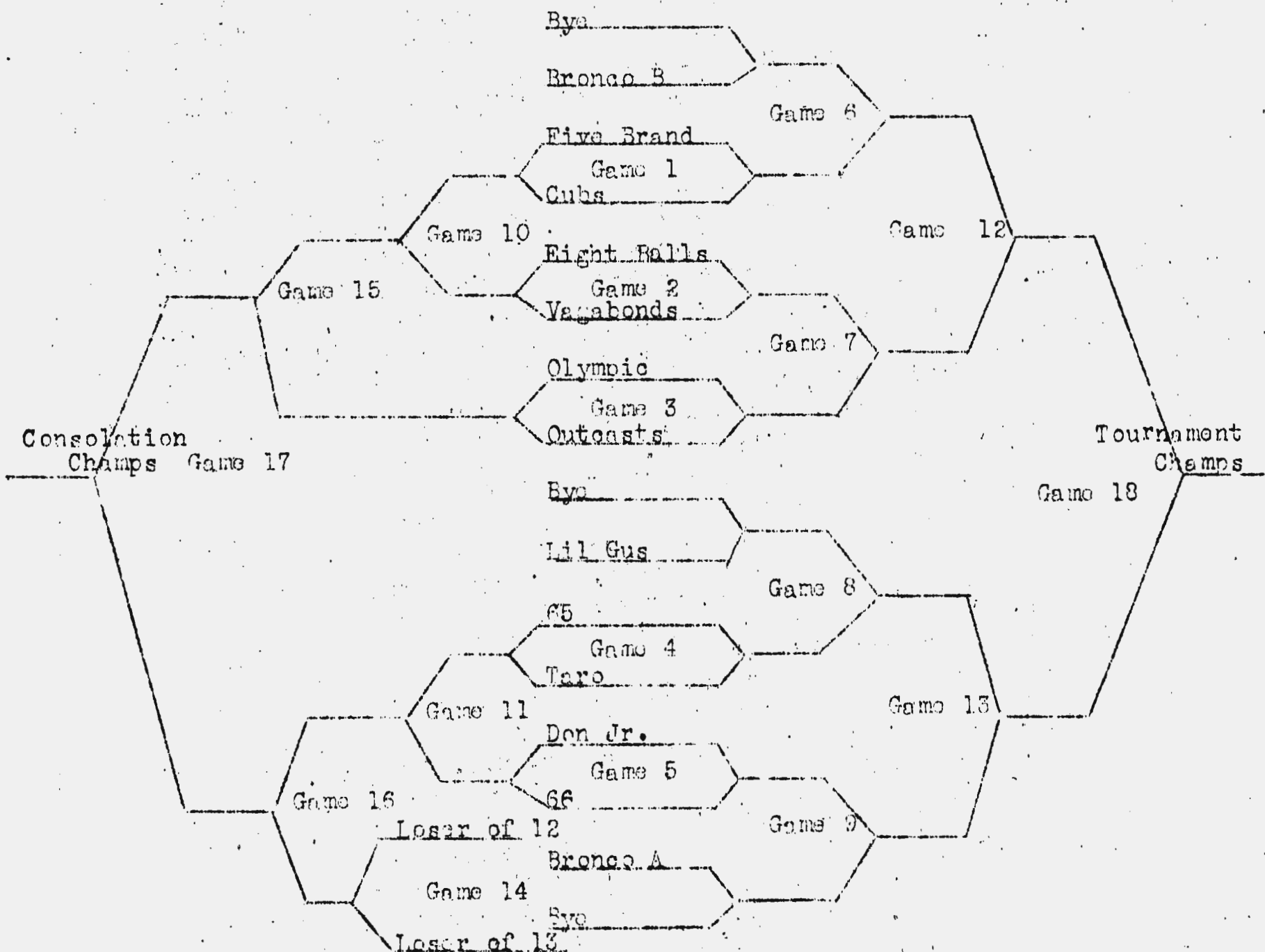

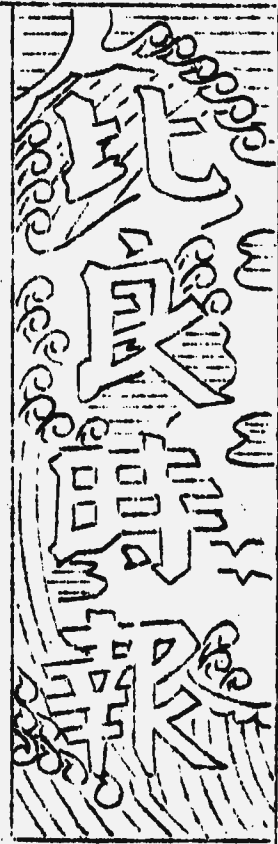

NEW SYSTEM OF PERMITS

Due to the rigid enforcement of the legal allowance of eight ounces of milk per person in the project, it is now necessary to cancel all previously issued permits. The milk will be used in the following manner:

"I admit the evacuation was wrong and apologize for and make restitution for its wrong. That is only fair---lifting the exclusion order and help the evacuees in establishing themselves; not in money, but actual friendly help. We are offering jobs and housing. We are also going to ask that they be protected from any criminal disturbance."

JACL CONFERENCE

To correct the wrongs brought on by the eviction of persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast and to display democracy in action, William C. Carr, realtor and representative of the Friends of the American Way, arrived from Pasadena, California and spoke before the National JACL Conference held in Salt Lake City, Dec. 1-3.

Carr described their slogan as: "Justice Delayed Is Justice Denied". Their activities included the molding of acceptance for the early return of Japanese. They have circulated leaflets urging tolerance; they have publicly recognized the exploits of Nisei soldiers; and they have eased the way for those who are returning.

GIRAFFE

"Our unofficial emblem is the giraffe, for we do believe in sticking our necks out. Funds for our works comes from envelopes, such as one received from the Italian front a matter of hours after one of their major engagements.

"The letter read, 'Just before we went on our last mission copies of your printed letter that 150 Pasadenans were willing to furnish housing and jobs for Japanese Americans were received. I distributed these as best I could to some of the leaders and I know that they talked about your wonderful work on their way up to meet the foe of all Americans. Later, some of our men were found dead with copies of your letters in their pockets nearest their heart.'"

HUSO SEES EVACUEES IN MANY OCCUPATIONS

(This is the second in a series of articles on William Huso's Eastern trip.)

In further recounting his experiences in the New York office, William Huso, relocation head, stated that he was surprised to find evacuees engaging in so many types of occupations. Many of these occupations had been denied them in pre-evacuation days. They were employed as architects, statisticians, medical social workers, school teachers, office managers and accountants and were working for the highest type of employers.

Ordinarily, Huso said, evacuees may not find the highest paying job in his occupation at first. A good example of this is in the beautician trade. Fashionable shops on 5th Avenue will pay \$25.00 to \$30.00 per week while those located in less desirable districts will pay considerably more. Artists may not be able at once to utilize their highest skill

but will be able to get on with something within their skills.

The opportunities for produce men in New York City are relatively few and outside of placements in the Eastern cooperative very little has been done for men of retail and wholesale grocery backgrounds.

If wives of relocatees want to work in the garment industry there is a world of opportunity because New York City is the center of garment manufacture. Those who have done home sewing are referred to the custom tailoring shop and there are a great number of openings among those.

So far as war work is concerned, New York has relatively little to offer in comparison with the opportunities in Cleveland and Chicago.

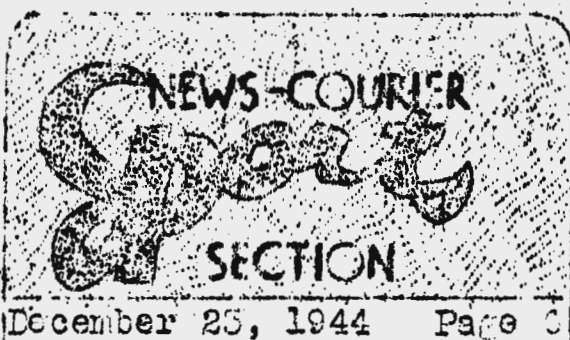

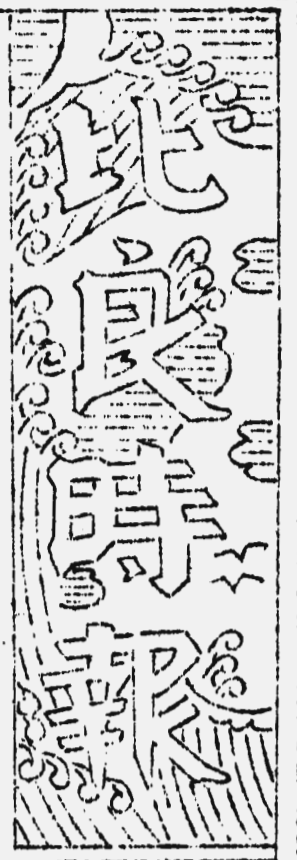
DAYTON, OHIO HELPS EVACUEES

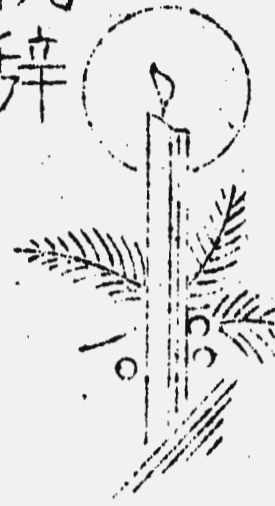

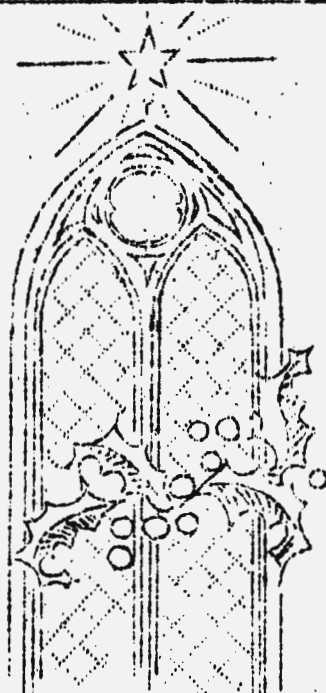

The 16 men who will leave Jan. 6 represent the tenth group of inductees to leave Rivers for Army active duty since the re-institution of selective service for Nisei in May of this year.

LT. MATSUNAGA**People Without
A Country**

The story of the Japanese and the Japanese-Americans--"people without a country"--was effectively told recently by Lt. Masayuki Matsunaga, of Hawaii's famed 100th and veteran of Salerno, to the Kiwanis Club of Milwaukee, Wis., and to the Nisei there.

Speaking at the Kiwanis luncheon, at which he was introduced by Gen. Paul Clemens, an assistant superintendent of the Milwaukee public schools, Lt. Matsunaga said:

"Here, in our democracy, we have a class of people who have been denounced and disowned by their families in Japan for coming to America and who have been denied the rights of citizenship in their adopted land. Yet they are loyal Americans, hoping for an American victory.

"My parents in Hawaii, I might boast, have contributed to making Hawaii the American community it is today. But they can never become American citizens. In the Heart Mountain relocation center in Wyoming, there is a mother who has given six sons to the service and whose seventh son has volunteered and is ready to be called up. Yet she can never become one of us."

"The boys in the 100th were 200% American, because they were fighting for American ideals, as were members of other units, and because they had to prove that they were worthy to be called Americans. I watched many of the men die. The dying thought of each was 'about making a better life in a better world for the people back in America.'"

FREEDOM LONG OVERDUE

(Editorial, Milwaukee Journal, Dec. 19, 1944)

After a 30 month exile, a majority of 100,000 Japanese American men, women and children are to be freed from camps where they have been detained and allowed to return to their homes on the west coast.

The army has decided that the changed military situation in the Pacific and a careful checkup of all detained Japanese Americans has made it safe to change the earlier policy. All those known to be pro-Japanese will continue to be detained. The decision of the army to release the loyal Japanese American comes almost at the same time as a unanimous supreme court decision that loyal Japanese Americans must be freed from war relocation centers. A simultaneous decision justified the original exclusion of the Japanese Americans from the Pacific coast areas as an emergency war measure.

The war relocation authority wisely will not attempt a mass return of the Japanese Americans to their homes, but will aid them to move back gradually to prevent dislocation. This decision to free the loyal Japanese Americans is, of course, right, but long overdue. They should be returned to their homes and their property should be restored in the same condition as when the evacuation was ordered.

If there is trouble caused by any of the groups opposing the return of the Japanese Americans to their former homes, the United States government should use whatever means are necessary to protect them. If this nation had the power to take them away from their homes for security reasons, it has the power--and the moral obligation--to return them to their homes now that the emergency is declared to be over.

HOOD RIVER**LEGION GETS BLACK EYE**

(From the Milwaukee Journal--Sunday, December 17, 1944)

The Capt. Belvidere Brocks post no. 450 of the American Legion in New York City has invited 16 American soldiers of Japanese ancestry to join the post after the war.

This action was taken by the New York post to offset the "black eye" given to the legion when the Hood River (Ore.) post of the legion caused the names of the 16 servicemen to be stricken from the local war memorial. Unfortunately, not all of the 16 will be able to take advantage of the invitation of the New York post--because death on the battlefield has already broken the ranks of the Japanese Americans from Hood River.

How can the legionnaires in Hood River look each other in the eye?

DILLON MYER'S MESSAGE

Following is a Christmas message which I would like to extend to all evacuees and appointed personnel---

There is a special meaning and a renewed note of hope in this Christmas of 1944 at the relocation centers. Within a few days the great majority of you will be restored to your free and rightful place in the society of this country. That is your promise for a fuller and a more pleasant life. That is my sincere hope--that next Christmas each of you will spend the holiday season pleasantly before his own hearth.

To all the residents and all the appointive personnel, Merry Christmas. May the coming year bring you a stronger faith in your fellow man.

**TAHARA CITED
FOR GALLANTRY**

WITH THE SEVENTH ARMY IN FRANCE--Pfc. Paul K. Tahara, rifleman with the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team now fighting in north eastern France, has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action just after that unit's first contact with the German enemy. Private Tahara and another enlisted man evacuated a wounded man more than 300 yards to the safety of a building by crawling turtle-fashion with the wounded man lying across their backs, in full view of the enemy.

Private Tahara, a veteran of the Italian campaign north of Rome to and beyond the Arno River, now wears the Combat Infantryman's Badge and is fighting the Germans in the Vosges Mountains. Formerly a resident of Olympia, Wash., he volunteered from the Minidoka Relocation Center, Hunt, Idaho. Inducted at Fort Douglas, Salt Lake City, Utah, he was immediately assigned to the Japanese American Combat Team. His parents live at 211 Greenleaf St., Peoria, Illinois.

**SGT. KIMURA GETS
FIELD PROMOTION**

WITH THE SEVENTH ARMY IN FRANCE--For demonstrating outstanding officer-ability in actual combat as an aerial observer for his Field Artillery battalion, Staff Sgt. Arata Kimura, formerly of San Jose, Calif., earned his field commission as a second lieutenant.

Member of a Field Artillery battalion of the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team, he won his combat appointment while serving as an aerial observer with the air liaison section, flying 61 missions during the great Allied drive from Rome to the Arno River in Italy. During 83 hours and 10 minutes in the air, he made general observations of the progress of the attack and of enemy positions and concentration, conducted base-point and check-point registrations of fire, directed counter-battery fire and shelling of opportunity targets and records the effect of pre-arranged firing.

A graduate of the University of California at Berkeley, with a degree in Mechanical Engineering, he holds a private pilot's license and has had some experience in commercial aviation.

The son of Mrs. Tsuji Kimura, now of 15-24-A, Heart Mountain Relocation Center, Heart Mountain, Wyo., he used to reside in San Jose, Calif., before all persons of Japanese ancestry were relocated in inland camps, leaving West Coast homes.

Lieutenant Kimura is believed to be the only aerial observer officer of Japanese ancestry in the United States Army.

HUSO SAYS EX-GILANS CONTENT AT SEABROOK

William Huso, relocation head, visited Seabrook while on his trip to the east and was able to see a great number of former Gilans there. Those from Gila were by far the most contented because of the fact that they repre-

sented family units and mature family heads. Out of 325 who relocated from this center only three persons had returned on November 20 and two of these came back because of army inductions.

The workers have been able to work long hours which may be curtailed considerably during the first few months of next year. Presently there are very few openings for evacuees since this is more or less the lull season. Those with families and living in the family unit housing have been fortunate in that it has not been necessary to pay rent. However, this condition will cease when carpets and electrical appliances are installed.

Evacuees are working in the plant where vegetables are packed, repacked, frozen and dehydrated. Only a limited number are in the fields and those are mostly in the nurseries.

Schools for grade children are provided near the housing area while high school pupils are transported to Bridgeton, New Jersey, six miles away. The schools are of the finest and everyone seemed satisfied with the type of schooling for children.

There are a general feeling of satisfaction at Seabrook. However, the single young men were inclined to be dissatisfied because of the fact that there was not enough recreation. The evacuees who came as families were content with the housing and employment and were able to save a substantial amount each month.

Yamamoto Seeks Farm Workers

Choichi Yamamoto of 65-12-A wants about four or five single men to sign up immediately for vegetable farm work at Newton, Pa.

Applicants must sign up with him right away, and they will go to work about March or April, 1945. Yamamoto will be running the farm on a share basis, just as he did last season.

BRICK FIRM OFFERS JOBS

Jobs are now available for both Issai and Nisei in the Brick Manufacturing Association of Chicago.

There are six plants which are located on the west, south, and north sides, so workers who have friends or relatives living in either one of these areas may live near them and work in the plants.

The minimum pay in any of the plants is 95¢ an hour with time and one half over 40 hours. The work the evacuees are doing at present on the belt line is paying \$1.03 to \$1.11 an hour, plus time and one half for overtime.

Men who can do some heavy work without affecting their physical condition are preferred.

Upon the decision made by the executive board of the farm management's regular meeting held in Canal Thursday, Dec. 7, the Board members visited the various farm units with Messrs. Davidson, head of the farm management, Ichikawa, superintendent of the farm management, and Worn, assistant head of the farm management.

In closing, Yamamoto asked for co-operation in continuing work of the group. It is planned to have meetings every other Sunday.

That night (Saturday) from 8:30, following the Shamrock game, the loser of game 12 plays the loser of game 13.

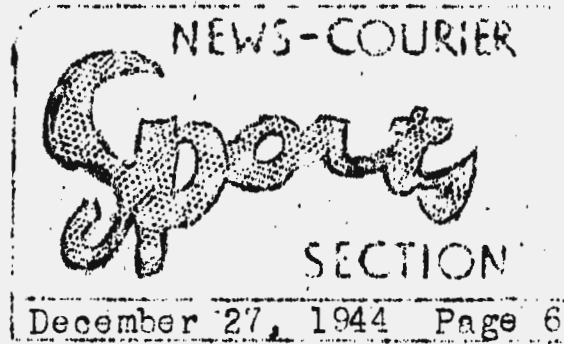

RESTRICTIONS ON VISITING GETS STIFFER

Further restrictions on visits to the center are given in WRA regulations from Washington, Dec. 18.

"There shall be no further transfers of evacuees from one center to another except upon specific approval of the director. Visits between centers shall be restricted to emergencies and to cases in which the center relocation divisions at the respective centers have been unable to work out a satisfactory relocation plan and such a visit is approved by them as necessary to complete and carry out such a plan.

"...visits will be restricted to the following cases:

"(Temporary) Any person who arrives at a center for a visit during the first two weeks following revocation of the general exclusion orders, who can show to the project director's satisfaction that plans for his visit had been made prior to the date such revocation was announced, for a period not to exceed two weeks except in cases where an extension of the visit for a total of not to exceed 30 days will aid in the completion of relocation plans for the evacuation.

more important to you and to your future is the almost incredible record that your sons and husbands have made fighting for this country on every battlefield of the war. Every thinking man and woman in the United States shares my pride and thankfulness for their bravery and their unstinting sacrifice to home and country.

"The announcement that the centers will of necessity be closed within one year should not be alarming to you, for many reasons. The facilities of the War Relocation Authority and the Department of the Interior will continue to be available to you for that period, and every assistance will be directed toward helping each of you to make a satisfactory resettlement in the community of your choice.

"I hope that the great majority of families in the centers will find it possible to work out acceptable relocation plans during the next few months. I think that your best opportunity will be found while war production activities and employment needs still remain at existing levels. It is my considered judgment that a wider opportunity, for most of you, lies in states east of the Sierra Nevadas, where your friends, and in many instances members of your families, are establishing new and successful homes. But, regardless of where you finally decide to relocate, all of you who leave the centers during the next several months can be assured that the War Relocation Authority will make every reasonable effort to facilitate your transition back to private life."

cues' immediate family:

"Visits by persons who have been accepted for service with the armed forces, upon pre-induction physical examination, for the period pending induction;

"Emergency visits because of serious illness or death of family members residing in centers, for such periods as the project Director may deem necessary;

"Students at the end of a school or college term, for a period not to exceed 90 days;

RELOCATION PURPOSES

"Visits deemed necessary to the relocation of family members residing in centers, not to exceed 30 days unless an extension is granted. No such visit shall be approved by a relocation officer until 15 days after the revocation of the general exclusion orders.

"A person who desires to visit a center to fur-

ther the relocation of center residents shall apply to the field relocation officer for a permit to visit the center on Form 388, executed in quadruplicate.

PRIOR APPROVAL

"A person admitted to a center as a visitor with prior approval of the relocation officer shall not be required to pay guest charges during the period of his authorized stay. Every person admitted to a center without prior written approval of the field relocation officer shall be required to pay in advance for meals and quarters for two weeks, regardless of whether or not a visit is subsequently approved.

It will be necessary for the relocation office to contact all visitors on the project to comply with the above regulations. Those persons will be called into the leave office for the purpose of setting a date for pre-payment of subsistence.

SECRETARY ICKES SAYS 33,000 HAVE RELOCATED

Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes expressed a belief last week that most of the 33,000 Japanese American and Japanese alien civilians who have relocated throughout the country "will choose of their own accord to remain in their present locations."

"They will want to stay on their war jobs and to make the most of their new opportunities," he said.

Secretary Ickes made his prediction in a statement announcing that resettlement of those still in war relocation centers "will be carried on with greater intensity in the weeks and months ahead."

The Secretary also commended both the evacuees who had left the

centers to relocate and the civic-minded individuals and organizations in hundreds of communities that have aided them to begin new lives.

IN 47 STATES

Evacuees have resettled in 47 States and the District of Columbia, with none reporting to date from South Carolina. Those returning in past months to the exclusion area comprising California and parts of Oregon, Washington and Arizona, have done so under military permits issued by the Western Defense Command.

IN ARMY SERVICE

He said that, in addition to the 33,000 who have left war relocation centers since 1942 to work in cities, towns and rural areas throughout the country, 2,500 other Japanese Americans went from WRA projects into active Army service. More than one-third of these were volunteers.

"The civilian relocatees have been contributing fully to successful prosecution of the war," the Secretary said. "They have worked hard at war production jobs and in related war supporting employment. Many of them have sons, husband and brothers in the Army."

In the case of these farmers their produce was sold mainly in Jacksonville, Florida, where they were competing with California vegetables. Georgia farmers by saving the freight charges which a California grower would have to pay, are able to add a sizeable amount to their profits.

LAND

Vegetable farmers coming into this area with the purpose of living and eventually buying may in most cases have to work on an employed basis. However, this is the most sensible plan anyway whether it is Georgia, New Jersey, Pennsylvania or elsewhere. For farmers who can look to the future it will be found that Georgia land has been relatively untapped insofar as vegetable production is concerned.

Trailing throughout the tussle with the Coolidge varsity, the Canal Hi Varsity was outscored 50 to 30 at the sound of the whistle which ended the game.

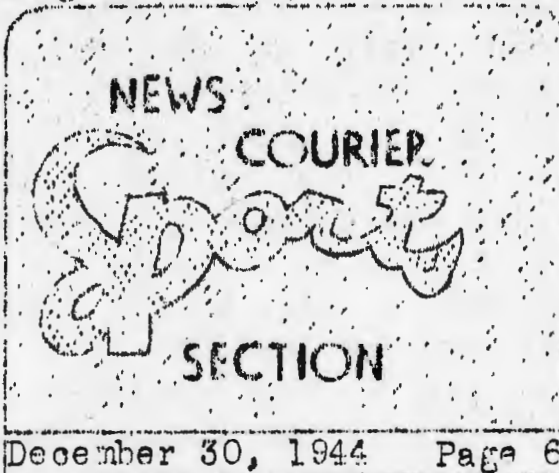
Dumping 11 points for the local lads, Haruo Hiromoto led the scoring for Canal.
