FIFTEEN TAKE OATH IN CANAL

Fifteen Canal councilmen were sworn into office and members of the executive offices chosen at the special session of the fourth community council in Canal, Tuesday, Dec. 26.

As a result of the vote for the executive offices, Ben Fukuzawa, Katsuji Kiriwara, George Harada, and Mitsuo Daita were all re-elected to serve as chairman, vice chairman, secretary, and treasurer, respectively.

The new council accepted the letter of resignation from the councilman-elect of block 26. Katsuji Kiriwara was appointed to see that the vacancy is filled by the block.

The chairman will appoint the executive board and submit the appointments for approval at the meeting this afternoon.

The councilmen unanimously agreed to change the regular meetings to Mondays at 1:30 p.m.

National Citizens League Opens Office In SF

With the lifting of the ban for all loyal persons of Japanese ancestry by the Western Defense Command, the National JACL will open its offices in San Francisco, Calif. from Jan. 3, 1945.

JACL ADVISES CAUTION IN RETURN TO COAST

Both Issei and Nisei were advised by JACL national headquarters to study carefully their own problems before making any move to return to the Pacific Coast.

As far as Nisei who are still within the draft age are concerned, it was stated that they should not return to their homes without clearing their status with the local draft board. If they are in essential work and return without obtaining releases from their employers, they will not be able to obtain new employment to qualify for deferment. Under such cases, the local boards would have the right to induct them immediately into

The film consists of ten reels. Two cartoons will also be shown, making the movie about 2½ hours long. Residents are asked to watch the mess hall bulletins for further details.

the armed forces.

Even in the cases where the evacuee is returning to his farm, it would be advisable to contact the local board to ascertain the status he may be able to obtain before making the move. This precaution may avoid considerable hardship in the event the local board is not friendly.

The Issei must remember that the contraband provision which was revoked by the Western Defense Command does not apply as to them. They are still subject to the restrictions of the Department of Justice which prohibits them from having short wave radios, cameras, and so forth.

Also on the Pacific Coast, because of numerous defense installations and factories, the Issei must be especially careful in complying with the travel regulations. When traveling more than five miles, they must first obtain permit from the United States district attorney. Also in changing their employ-

will be in charge. She already has her army clearance and is in San Francisco to make the necessary arrangement.

The main job of the San Francisco office is to carry on the educational campaign to bring about a better understanding of the evacuation and the position of persons of Japanese ancestry in this country. The JACL job will be to supplement the work of the Caucasian friends on the Pacific Coast.

Also when the staff is completed, assistance will be given to evacuees in their problems of readjustment upon their return to the San Francisco Bay Region.

PEARL BUCK:**'MAY THE BLOT BE REMOVED'**

Writer Pearl S. Buck, a member of the East and West Association, sent special Christmas greetings this year to those who are still in relocation centers.

Her message appears in the New York Resettlement Bulletin of December as follows.

"I send my Christmas greetings this year to those who are still in the relocation centers. I cannot do so without a deep sense of shame that there should still be those centers. I hope that by the time another Christmas rolls around they will be closed forever, and that American people everywhere will have welcomed into our life those who today are in those centers. I think we all feel that never again must there be such a blot upon our democratic life."

"Friends are waiting outside for you all. Indeed, I think that there is more friendly feeling today for the Americans of Japanese ancestry than there has ever been before. Part of this is because of the bravery of Japanese Americans in Italy. But much of it is due to the dignity and patience with which those who have been in the relocation centers have met their difficult lives there."

CHANCE FOR STUDENTS

Successful resettlement of individuals and family groups who plan to make this country their home is a necessity. But as important as such relocation is, there also is the most pressing need for student relocation at this very time.

All people can wait for a little while until they can find readjustment on the outside by slow and careful planning. But for the young people, waiting too long is often disastrous. Many a high school graduate, fired with hopes for college, has waited--too long, and has found it impossible to get back into the old groove of books and midnight oil.

Letters from college students, Rivers' alumni, to Miss Mabel Sheldon and to other friends here about friendly campuses and students and how Gilans have been helped financially by the Student Relocation Council are facts that cannot be disputed.

Considering community acceptance, financial help, opportunities for part-time jobs, and the benefits of education, the time is now for young graduates to get higher education. If a young student has any persuasion at all, he should use everything in his power to persuade himself and his parents that the time for schooling comes only once in a lifetime, and when that time is past, the chance is usually gone forever. Of course hardships on parents must be considered too.

Thomas Rodine, student consultant, is here now, not to recruit or coerce. His being here is just another opportunity for Nisei students.

We don't want the next generation of Japanese Americans to face a post-war country uneducated, just because it happened to live at the time of evacuation and temporary confinement.

REV. YAMAZAKI**CHRISTMAS LETTER**

The Rev. John Yamazaki, former Gilan, sends the following Christmas message to all his friends:

Dear Friends:

"This is a letter which has allowed the seasons to pass. Since arriving in Cincinnati in July, we have experienced the turning of the leaves to varied colors of yellow, brown and red. Now we are witnessing for the first time in our lives the falling of snow flakes as it gently covers all our surroundings.

Throughout the six months I have been moving around Southern Ohio visiting settlers, conducting services, speaking before churches, clubs, and conferences. The inspiration for our work has been the life with you and yours. You understood a young couple in the ministry and helped that our work might not be in vain. The emergence of goodwill and understanding that we have witnessed throughout this period of war before leaving our homes, while in the center, and now in the middle west testify to God's Hand in creation and history.

This Christmas Eve, as I conduct the Midnight Service at the Church of the Good Shepherd, in Cincinnati, whose rector is away, I shall be praying with you that the day of Peace and Good Will towards all men may come--through our unwavering belief that Christ is the Son of God."

**VETERANS RISE AGAINST
OREGON LEGION STAND**

Hundreds of veteran American soldiers are indignant over an item in the Army newspaper, Stars and Stripes, which said that an American Legion post in Hood River, Ore., had advised Americans of Japanese ancestry to sell any property they own and leave town, a U.P. dispatch states.

There was violent local reaction among doughboys of Lt. Gen. Alexander Patch's original divisions, the 36th and 45th, who know the gallant record of the 112nd Infantry Regiment with which the 36th fought in Italy.

Reaction was particularly vituperative against the Legion post's action among the 1st Battalion of the 111st Regiment of the 76th Division--a battalion which just two months ago was rescued from a German trap near Bruyeres by Nisei troops who slashed through German lines to the isolated battalion at great cost to themselves.

One of those rescued stated of Nisei, "Those boys deserve a hell of a lot more than the men sitting back in that Oregon town who don't want them around, and we feel pretty lousy having to fight for the rights and liberties of people who do something like that to these Japanese Americans fighting over here."

In case trouble arises, the first group to contact will be the WRA or the resettlement committee's which the church groups and friends have set up or will be setting in most communities throughout the Pacific Coast. It is important that every returning evacuee should find out from the nearest WRA office where such committees are located and who are the leaders.

FARMING OPPORTUNITIES OPEN IN NEW ORLEANS

MANAGER GROCERY - Arden, Delaware. Opening for a manager of a cooperative grocery store at \$50 a week. Vacant two room apartment available with bath and kitchen for \$47.50.

MECHANICAL ENGINEERS, DRAFTSMEN, AND CHEMISTS - Newark, New Jersey. Numerous openings for mechanical engineers, draftsmen, and chemists in the Newark area. Income varies with training.

FOUNDRY WORKERS - Waterloo, Iowa. Issei acceptable. Start at 70¢ per hour with time and a half over 40 hours. As soon as ability is shown will be raised to 75¢ an hour. No experience necessary as men will be trained.

PHOTOGRAPHER - Omaha, Nebraska. Two openings for commercial and portrait painting and enlarging. Salary \$185 per month. Must be efficient and experienced. Will take apprentice at lower salary. Position permanent. Issei acceptable.

FARM WORK - Milwaukee and Madison, Wisconsin. Couples and single workers. Several dairy, poultry, truck farms, throughout district. \$70 to \$100 per month for single persons; \$100 to \$125 for couples, with and without maintenance.

POWER MACHINE WORK - Milwaukee and Madison, Wisconsin. Mostly piece work. Experienced persons can earn 65¢ to 90¢ per hour. For beginners with some knowledge of machines, 50¢ an hour until put on piece work basis.

EMPTY BOTTLES MUST RETURN

It has been reminded by the Co-op that all empty bottles of the soft drink, Doctor Swett's, must be returned.

If the empty bottles are not returned it will be impossible to purchase more of the soft drinks in the future.

The area around New Orleans according to William Huso, relocation program officer, has abundant opportunities in various types of farming and in the fishing industry.

Vegetable farming has not been tried on an intensive scale in Louisiana. However sweet and Irish potatoes, celery, cabbage, shallots and turnips are grown successfully there, and a few Japanese are engaged in small vegetable operations.

Outside of New Orleans and along the Mississippi river the rainfall is 60 inches per year and water for irrigation can be piped from the river. On the average the weather in the winter is warmer than in California.

There is an abundant market for all types of vegetables there, and while the marketing system in New Orleans is considerably behind time there is a splendid chance for evacuee farmers to make favorable contracts with various restaurants and hotels.

There are very few nurseries and greenhouses and chances to get into the flower business are excellent. Those who would like to engage in dairy farming will find an excellent market because of the acute shortage of milk in Louisiana and the fact that the ordinary dairy herds are very mediocre.

Poultry farming too has a bright future there since little has been done in the past to intensify operations in this occupation.

From now on these Japanese, some of whom were born in the United States and some elsewhere, will be under the direct supervision of the Department of Justice.

Renunciation of American citizenship was made possible by the recently enacted public law No. 405.

same day, previous to this game, the Gila Indians outscored the Cubs 36-30 to become consolation titlists of the same tournament.

Saturday, Dec. 30, the Broncos downed the Gila Indians to a sad tune of 40-32 in a semi-final match for the tournament flag. Practicing for team work, they came up against the Olympic Club in the crucial tilt on New Year's Day.

Trailing at the half 13-11, the Broncos sparked up with Aki Kubo swishing 14 of his 17 points in the latter period and showing magnificent "pass cuttings" and ball handling. Taking the rebounds as they came was Akira Tsutsui, youthful center for the Broncos.

Smarting from the defeat on Saturday afternoon, the Gila Indians came back that evening to squeeze through a close 37-36 victory over the spirited Five Brands. Still not satisfied they outscored the Shamrocks the following day 37-27 in a semi-final consolation match. Ready for the final game with the Cubs in the Consolation title tilt, they were hotly contested, but their fast break proved to be fatal to the Cubs. (continued from page 4) officer in charge of the New Orleans office, has covered the fishing opportunities quite well. In talking to the owners of several large canneries he found that they were willing to hire evacuees, and presently there are quite a few boats available. A large sea food company stated that it would hire citizens if they were there on the spot. However, it did not seem interested in having them negotiate from the project. While in the state of Mississippi the fishing industry is largely controlled by unions; such is not the case in Louisiana. There are numerous jobs that a fisherman could accept pending his placement in fishing operations. Of course clearance by the army is necessary in all cases.

There are a few Japanese families in New Orleans, Baton Rouge, Eunice, and Alexandria, La., engaged as farmers, food merchants, photographers, school teachers, physicians, salesmen, etc. The families have become integral parts of the community and are well received. In this area like others where relocation has been substantially built up it is recommended that residents go in on an employee basis in order to determine for themselves just what business they should go into.

This message to all American soldiers of Japanese ancestry was given last week by Harold L. Ickes.

"I have gained deep satisfaction, which must have come to you as well, from the announcement by the Western Defense Command that the West Coast mass exclusion orders have been lifted. This action is a well-earned recognition of the loyalty which the great majority of evacuee people of Japanese descent have displayed in the severest test that any group of

Americans have ever had to face. It is a victory of faith in the principles of real Americanism, and of unflinching patriotism so well exemplified by valiant American soldiers, from the mainland and Hawaii, whose parents come from Japan. You have made a magnificent record of

Resident Found Dead Last Night

Joe Tsujimoto, 29-year-old discharge veteran of World War II, was found dead at his home, 65-6-A, about 9:50 o'clock last night, with a knife wound through his heart, probably self-inflicted.

John W. Nichol, police chief, stated that a coroner's jury is coming today. Their verdict will be known this afternoon.

Tsujimoto was discharged from the Army on Dec. 28, 1943, and has lived with his parents here ever since. He was found dead by his father, who with other members of the family had attended the Japanese movie at the amphitheater.

NISHIMURA HEADS BUTTE COUNCIL'S FOURTH SESSION

Hiroji Nishimura of block 40 formerly of Jerome, was elected chairman of the Butte Community Council at a special meeting of the new council held on Jan. 3.

Other members of the cabinet elected to assist Nishimura are Masami Honmi (block 57) vice chairman; Yoichi Nakase (blk. 52) executive secretary; and George M. Oyo (blk. 56) treasurer.

The five members of the executive board are Nishimura and Nakase, automatic members, and three others elected, Masami Honmi (57), Masakazu Aeto (34), and Mitsugi Hamanaka (28).

All members of the new council, the fourth to be elected in Butte, were sworn into office by James L. Shelly.

Susumu Koyamatsu (block 31) was chosen chairman of the Butte Recreation Association Commission.

The council body also approved the re-appointment of the three judicial commissioners, Ernest K. Iwasaki (blk. 64), Shotaro Hikida (64), and Fred Wakita (54). The Juvenile Guidance Board will be composed of Hiroji Nishimura, Mitsugi Hamanaka, Michimasa Asami (46), T. Hasegawa (59), Douglas Mitsuhashi (63), and Shotaro Hikida (64). The Gila Health Committee will consist of Masao Nishimura (29) and Hiroji Nishimura.

CITY ORGANIZES TO AID EVACUEES

Wholeheartedly endorsing the program to assist evacuees in getting established in Pittsburgh, a group of forty leading residents met in that Western Pennsylvania industrial city on Wednesday, Dec. 20, and formed the Pittsburgh Citizens Committee on Resettlement.

Among the Committee members were representatives of labor, industry, social and welfare agencies, governmental bureaus and churches of several denominations. Also a member is the wife of the mayor of the city.

Speakers at the meeting, which was attended by reporters from each of the city's three newspapers, included Dr. A.B. Kinsolving, chairman of the committee and leading Episcopal clergyman; Rev. Shunji F. Nishi, also an Episcopal clergyman, who works with the Cleveland Federation of Churches on relocation problem; and Robert M. Cullum, Great Lakes Area supervisor of the WRA. Cullum discussed the Government's program; Rev. Nishi, the evacuees' viewpoint; and Dr. Kinsolving, the attitude of the residents of Pittsburgh.

Outcome of the meeting was the appointment of a nominating committee which was empowered to formulate sub-committees on housing, public information, community participation and employment.

1944 Births Top Deaths By 115

The number of births in Rivers during the 1944 calendar year exceeded the number of deaths by 115, according to a report from the Rivers hospital. One hundred ninety-three babies were born and 78 persons died during the past year.

Other statistics are as follows:

Hospital admissions-252; medical and surgical treatments in out-patient department-33,140; dental treatments-21,628; patients contacted and treatment given by public health nurse, 23,000.

SIGNIFICANT YEAR

The year 1945 may well turn out to be the most significant even though a most trying one in the lives of Japanese Americans.

MOMENTOUS DECISIONS

It will be significant because the decisions we make here during next year may shape our environment and our lives. It is a good bet that many relocatees who have gone East to "look around" and have found something to their liking will decide to stay there even though the West Coast has opened. This year can decide what we do for a living, with whom we will associate, and in what part of the country we live for the rest of our lives.

In the face of difficulties are several reassuring factors. There are sympathetic groups and persons like the Friends of the American Way and church organizations to give us physical and spiritual aid. The WRA is still here to help us with job placements and financial support to a certain extent. Those who still have homes on the West Coast will be able to return.

GOV'T RESPONSIBLE

With the announcement that the WRA will close within a year, those who have no immediate means of starting anew will no doubt be disturbed. But so long as we have a democratic government, we can expect humane treatment. A government which carried out evacuation with reasonable order in a short time will surely be able to meet the resettlement problem without undue hardship on evacuees. Responsibilities of the WRA may end with its closing, but that of the government will continue.

With those things in mind, we face 1945 and the problems of resettlement with hopes for the best under difficult conditions.

service of your country. All good Americans are proud of you.

RESETTLEMENT DIFFICULT

"The removal of the exclusion orders forecasts an end of the need to provide the refuge of the relocation centers for thousands of loyal and law-abiding people who are now free to live wherever they desire to make their homes in the United States. It is for their own best interests, and for the interests of all Americans of Japanese descent, that they should leave the centers as soon as possible. I am fully aware that departing from centers will involve difficult readjustments for some people, but they will be given ample time to make them and the War Relocation Authority will continue to give all of the assistance that it has previously given. Federal and state welfare agencies will aid families that need special help."

A FUTURE WELL EARNED

"This message is addressed to you with full confidence that you will continue to enlarge with the splendid record of America's fighting Nisei, which has been so effective in demonstrating that Americanism is not a matter of race or ancestry, and in winning the respect of all good Americans for their loyal fellow-countrymen of Japanese descent. I send to you my wishes for your safe return home, and for a future in America endowed with the happiness that you have so well earned."

COUNCIL OKAYS COMMITTEEMEN

Chairman Ben Fukuzawa's appointments to boards, commissions, and committees were unanimously approved by the Canal council at the first session of the fourth community council. The four executive officers, who were elected at the special session on Dec. 26, will serve on the Executive Board. They are Ben Fukuzawa, Katsuji Kiriwhara, George Harada, and Mitsuzo Daita. Advisers to the chairman are Takato Hamai, Torata Hoshiko, Teizo Yahanda, and Frank Sasaki. On the Judicial Commission will be Hiroshi Hiratsuka, Kojiro Hamada, and Torata Hoshiko; Juvenile Board—George Onoda, Toyoko Ito, Masako Fukuda, and Kumakichi Sekiguchi.

CHAIRMEN

The Chairmen appointed were:

Masuzo Sano—public relations; Takato Hamai—Relocation Commission; Sam Mitsuyoshi—Manpower Commission; Fred Kobayashi—Health Board; Teizo Yahanda—Evacuee Property Commission; Shunsuke Uchiyama—Community Chest Fund Committee.

The council agreed that an all center conference to discuss problems that arise from the opening of the coast and the possible closing of centers soon is advisable. Selection of representatives, expenses, etc. were tabled for study.

The question of accepting Henry Yoshimi's resignation as community clerk was brought up but tabled until the next meeting.

CHEST FUNDS

As a result of the Community Chest Fund Committee meeting in Canal on Dec. 22, the YBA, YMCA, YWCA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, USO, and nurses aides were recommended to

ARMY TO PLACE RESIDENTS INTO THREE CATEGORIES

All residents here will be placed in either the cleared, excludee, or segregate groups after the Army completes its investigation in Rivers.

Project Director Leroy H. Bennett issued the following statement to the community council, outlining the freedom of movement allowed for per-

sons of these groups:

"Any persons whose name appears upon the cleared list is free to leave the center and travel to any point within the continental United States. Such a person may also travel to Alaska and Hawaii if the Army approves the trip."

EXCLUDEES

"Persons on the excludee list may travel anywhere in the continental United States except in such areas defined by the Defense Command, roughly these restricted areas consist of the western half of Washington, the western half of Oregon and all of California. In addition they must not travel in the restricted area of Arizona which includes Tucson, nor in any county which borders upon the Atlantic Ocean or the Gulf of Mexico."

SEGREGEEES

"In addition there will be a segregate list. The determination of the persons on this list will be a function of the Department of Justice."

"In order to keep our records straight, we will expect everyone who leaves the center to secure a pass at the Leave office. By so doing a great deal of time will be saved for any evacuee who wishes to leave. The Military Police at the gate are required to be certain of the status of any person who leaves this center."

Residents interested in becoming informed about relocation opportunities in Philadelphia and in other communities in Pennsylvania and southern New Jersey are invited to obtain copies of this pamphlet from the relocation program office.

A number of photographs of Issei and their families who have resettled from various centers appear in the 20-page pamphlet, together with several pictures, of Nisei resettlers, a cover photograph of Philadelphia, and a map.

It also gives information about job opportunities in cities and on farms; living costs; educational, cultural, and recreational facilities.

FOUR RETURN TO SOUTHERN CALIF.

One more permanent Japanese-American resident is scheduled for return to Southern California, bringing the total to four since the effective date of the Army's decision to rescind regulations excluding persons of Japanese ancestry from the Pacific Coast, announced Paul C. Robertson, Los Angeles area supervisor for the War Relocation Authority.

He is Shizuo Shiosaki, from the Colorado River Relocation Center at Poston, Ariz., who will return to Riverside where he will resume his work as a gardener.

In addition, six persons of Japanese ancestry, three from the Manzanar Relocation Center and three from the state of Utah have arrived in Los Angeles for a short visit to inspect property owned by them.

From Manzanar went Henry Fukuhara and his father and a Mr. Muro. The three from Utah are Kenji Osaka, James Kobata, and John Takahashi.

RUMORS INVESTIGATED

The Naval Intelligence has investigated the reported beating up of an evacuee doctor in Los Angeles and the burning of a farm home near Fowler, Calif., and has found those rumors false and wholly unfounded. The Intelligence men will investigate any other reported discriminatory acts against evacuees, if the names and addresses of those involved are reported to them.

HONEST PICTURE WANTED

In all fairness to former Californians who want a true picture of conditions there, they should be kept informed about actual cases of evacuees being beaten up or otherwise harmed. They should be given the facts, names, dates, and places where such incidents occur, just as they were in such cases as those in Hood River and Parker. And unless these facts can be verified, they should not be passed on as truth.

There are many evacuees, Central Californians for example, who are anxious to return to their grape vineyards, sentiment permitting. They have property and income at stake. They would like to be there in time for the next harvest. Any false rumor that would tend to keep them from going back to produce and share the benefits of wartime prices would be unfair to the evacuees.

FIRST HAND INFORMATION

Several evacuees are returning to California to re-establish themselves there. Residents would do best by learning first hand through them on the actual conditions in California instead of listening to rumor or propaganda.

Just as we would hate to have someone fool us into going out to a community where sentiment is bad, just so we don't like to be frightened about returning home if there is favorable community acceptance and benefits to reap.


the tournament.

AIR MAIL RATE TO HAWAII CUT

MAN CONTRIBUTES \$478 TO JACL

A Christmas present was sent to the national headquarters of the JACL from Boston, Mass. It was in the form of a check for \$478.79 which was sent by Godfrey L. Cabot, a business man of that city. The money was sent to defray partly the expense incurred by the National JACL in filing in brief in the Korematsu evacuation case carried to the Supreme Court. The total cost of the brief was \$1,114.

Last year when the JACL filed a brief in the Yasui-Hirabayashi cases, Cabot donated over \$1000.

Cabot expressed his deep concern over the civil rights of Nisei. He said his interest in minority problems, was the reason he was aiding JACL.

SOLDIER WRITES FROM FRANCE

The following are excerpts from S/Sgt. Herbert Sasaki's letter to Frank C. Sasaki of Canal:

"We took up a collection of extra candy among the boys to fix up little Christmas presents for these unfortunate French children around here. I don't imagine Christmas would be much for them without candy. France and Italy seem to be alike regarding the food situation--no sugar, candy, butter, cocoa, etc. Italy is in much worse condition than France but that can be understood. People in the U.S. have never seen the misery and suffering that war has caused over here. In fact, very few of them are even concerned.

"...Harry came down to see me the other day...He received his promotion to Staff Sergeant after waiting for it since we left Shelby. He gave up hope in Italy and it doesn't interest him anymore. The boys in his platoon tell me that during enemy barrages he sits calmly in his slit trench and lights his pipe as though unconcerned about the matter."

'DID I GIVE MY ARM IN VAIN?'

The Los Angeles Herald Express carried a letter to the editor, "Back from Saipan" in the Dec. 15 issue. Signed by Sergeant E. J. Long, U.S. Marine, the letter reads:

"An article in your paper has been brought to the attention of 25 United States Marines who were at Saipan and are now back in the United States for certain reasons....It stated that the citizens of Altadena had refused to put the names of several Japanese American soldiers on their newly erected Honor Roll. Now don't get us wrong, but listen! Please! We HATE the Japs we've been fighting. We fought them to kill them. We fought them that our American way of living might be upheld. I'm no Jap lover. I killed them. But as I sat through a newsreel

FAIR PLAY URGED

Pleas for fair treatment of and tolerance toward Japanese-Americans returning to California are heard from all parts of the West Coast, despite the islands of protest from places like Marysville, Calif.; Hood River, Ore.; and the state Grange.

District Attorney Walter C. Haight of Visalia cautioned members of the Tulare County Peace Officers Assoc. to exercise common sense, tolerance, and an understanding of the rights of American citizens in dealing with returning Japanese Americans.

EQUAL PROTECTION

A state advisory committee on law enforcement in Sacramento reaffirmed a previously adopted resolution "to co-operate with Army authorities in dealing with the return of the Japanese residents of this state. All persons, regardless of race, are entitled to the full protection of the law."

Last week, an address before the City Commons Club of Berkeley, Dr. Monroe E. Deutsch, vice president of the University of California, stated that West Coast residents must differentiate between Japanese in Japan and Americans of Japanese ancestry here.

MONROE DEUTSCH SPEAKS

"Certain Americans charge that we cannot read a Japanese mind. I ask them, 'Can you read any mind?' We judge people by words and deeds and so we must judge the Japanese. It is not so long ago that the West Coast was demanding that the Chinese must go."

He said that 100,000 persons of Japanese ancestry, evacuated from the West Coast, are entitled to rights under the U.S. Constitution as upheld by the Supreme Court. He said that the losses of Japanese from evacuation is estimated at millions of dollars.

"Besides these evacuees were put in concentration camps surrounded by barbed wire and soldiers. They were granted only the poorest food and the smallest compensation for their services. Previously, they had lived here for years. They had become Americans in spirit. They had gone to our schools and colleges and the second and succeeding generations had become adjusted to our American standard of living. They associated on friendly terms with others."

Dr. Deutsch also cited the excellent war record of Nisei in the armed forces.

SHIMADA:

'I AM QUITE WELL'

"The knowledge has come to me that there is a rumor that I have been injured here in Hollywood, and I'd like to state here and now to all my friends in Gila that this report is false.

"I have never been hurt and everyone has been more than kind to me. /s/ Joe Shimada"

(The above letter addressed to the News-Courier comes from Joe Shimada, formerly of block 32, who now lives at 1615 No. Harvard, Hollywood, Calif.)

shown today of my 25 buddies at a convalescent show, I saw 500 Japanese American soldiers give their lives in France in order that 250 American soldiers might gain their freedom from the "Lost Battalion." The public seems to think that those of us who have been fighting in the Pacific will return to hate every Japanese we see. They are wrong. Many Japanese Americans enlisted. Let us remember we are Americans, tolerant people--or have I given an arm in this war in vain?"

Pvt. Kato, formerly of Suisun, Calif., was seriously wounded in France on Oct. 19, 1944. He had helped take one city and was advancing further when hit in the face near the right eye.

"I give plenty of credit to the front line medics," he commented. "All soldiers feel the same about these medic boys who come right through gunfire to care for the wounded."

Pvt. Kato entered the Army in June, 1941, and was fighting with the 442nd. After he was wounded he learned that it was his outfit that had helped rescue the Texas "Lost Battalion."

After his furlough period is up, he will return to the hospital in California.

He had been overseas since April 1944.

BOWRON GREETS EVACUEE IN LA

Mayor Bowron of Los Angeles Saturday officially welcomed a group of Japanese Americans back to the Southland in the public reception room of the Los Angeles City Hall, the L.A. Times reported this week.

A Times photo shows the Mayor shaking hands with Harley M. Oka, recently medically discharged, who was present in his Private's uniform and a cap bearing the insignia of the newly organized World War II Hollywood Post American Legion to which he has been admitted. Others who were present to shake the Mayor's hand were Henry Yoshimizu, Jack Yoshimizu, Mary Yoshimizu, Mrs. Melba Matsuura, and Miss Marike Hoshiyama.

Mayor Bowron is quoted as saying:

Myer had explained the evacuees have been divided into three groups consisting of aliens, others refused permission to return to coastal areas, and the majority over which no supervision will be exercised at all. He defended the policy of not insisting upon the latter group carrying identification upon grounds he did not believe they should continually be forced to produce credentials. He said they had been thoroughly "scrubbed" by the Army anyway.

"But how are we going to tell without identification if they are not aliens or those excluded from the coast and who have disobeyed their orders?" Cohn is quoted as demanding.

ARMY RESPONSIBLE

Myer asserted it was an Army responsibility; Cohn thought it was also a WRA responsibility.

Myer said that Federal agencies, both civilian and military are prepared to uphold the rights of Japanese as they come back on Army permits.

The latest approvals to return to the evacuated area were granted to Lilian Yuriko Shimizu and four other members of the family, who are returning Jan. 24 to Selma, Calif.; to Nancy Saldana and her mother, who plan to return to Los Angeles on Jan. 19; to Ben Takeo Ono, who will go to Parlier, Calif.; on Jan. 18; Shotaro Takikawa, Selma, Jan. 18; Ben Taizo Iida, who plans to go to Los Angeles on short term Jan. 20; and Rose Keiko Takikawa and three children who will join Takikawa in Selma on Jan. 24.

d. Increased newspaper publicity of Nisei war contributions.

2. Study of Nisei war veteran benefits to be proposed by the JACL.

3. Financial assistance to the national JACL for 1945 and methods of raising funds.

4. JACL president's report on conference called by Committee on American Principles and Fair Play.

5. Functioning of San Francisco JACL office.

JAPANESE STUDY LICENSE ASKED

California State Senator Hugh P. Donnelly of Turlock announced last week that he will introduce a bill in the 1945 legislature to require the state department of education to license Japanese language schools, according to an INS report in the S.F. Examiner.

"I believe this will provide the answer to dual citizenship," Donnelly declared, "and all subversive activities can be closely checked through close inspection, which my bill would provide."

Donnelly asserted this action, if adopted by the legislature, would answer the problem now facing the state department of education.

LEGION POST 591

The Hollywood American Legion Post No. 591, which became the first post to welcome in a Nisei veteran of World War II, unanimously adopted a resolution on Jan. 9, 1945, condemning discrimination based on race.

The resolution states in part as follows:

1. We the members of this Post condemn any discrimination of whatsoever type against any American citizen based on the stand that he or she is of Japanese or any other racial descent.

2. We as veterans of World War II have been fighting for the ideals of and principles guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution and are much concerned over the actions of certain groups and individuals who are attacking these very ideals for which we have been fighting.

3. We strongly condemn any efforts to establish a false distinction among American citizens based on race, color or religious creed, such distinctions being a complete violation of the constitutional provision that there be no such distinction established among American citizens.

4. We therefore condemn the action of the Hood River Post of the American Legion in effacing the names of American soldiers fighting overseas from their honor roster as a shameful act which discredits and humiliates the name of the American Legion.

5. We urge all comrades of our Post and all other American Legion Posts and all citizens who have the welfare of the nation at heart to safeguard the constitutional rights of all Americans regardless of race, color and creed.

YMCA'S SATOW

URGES JUST TREATMENT

Masao Satow, YMCA leader who is remembered as coordinator of the Rivers Leadership Institute held here last year, urged just treatment of evacuees in a talk before a YMCA group in Cincinnati, Ohio, last week.

A home that Nisei soldiers can fight for and return to, not a relocation center, must be permitted for American citizens of Japanese ancestry, stated Satow, staff member of the YMCA National Council and former executive secretary of the Los Angeles Japanese American YMCA.

Satow stated that the 25,000 American high school boys in the relocation centers and several thousand more in military service "are bewildered by a system under which we have one kind of America for one group of native-born citizens and another kind for a second group."

"These boys are being drafted as soon as they are 18", he said. "Are they coming back to relocation centers? Is that the kind of America they are asked to fight for, just because their parents or grandparents were born in Japan?"

"There are 65,000 American citizens now confined behind barbed wire," he pointed out. "It is time to give this basic matter some consideration."

FISHERMAN**Japanese May Resume Work**

Japanese fishermen returning to the Pacific Coast from relocation centers will get their vessels back and will be permitted to resume operations under prevailing regulations, Dillon S. Myer said last Friday, according to AP.

Myer, director of the War Relocation Authority, declared at a press conference that anti-Japanese feeling on the coast has decreased materially. Only certain groups retain their animosity, he said, identifying them as:

Those seeking Jap exclusion for political reasons since about 1905, those who are being "misled" by propaganda, those with an economic stake in the Japanese return such as owners of businesses with which Japanese may compete, and the sort of "red-faced" patriots who take names of dead Japanese American soldiers off war memorials."

NINETEEN CITED FOR HEROISM

Nineteen American soldiers of Japanese ancestry, all of the 100th Infantry Battalion, held Bronze Stars for "heroic disregard of personal safety" in action near Biffontaine Oct. 27, according to a UP report from somewhere in France.

The awards announced by Lt. Gen. Jacob L. Devers, Sixth Army group commander shortly after soldiers of the Seventh Army had been angered by reports of anti-Nisei discrimination at Hood, Ore. Ironically awards included one for George Akiyama who entered service from Hood.

Three other recipients, now missing in action, include Sgt. George W. Sakiyama of Helena, Mont.; Sgt. Harry N. Kamikawa of Oahu, T.H.; and Pvt. William S. Yamaka of Freeport, Ill.

SEVEN RECEIVE DSC AWARDS

Award of the Distinguished Service Cross to seven Japanese American doughboys all from Hawaii, including one who attacked a German position armed only with a shovel, was announced last Thursday by the War Department.

The Washington Post reports that one of the seven was Pfc. Kiichi Koda of Oahu, who lost his life in winning his DSC. He was killed by a hand grenade in Italy while leading his squad against a German machine gun nest.

Pvt. Jesse M. Hiroto won his cross for charging an enemy sniper position with a shovel he had picked up after his rifle jammed. He captured the position and three German soldiers armed with a machine pistol, two rifles and grenades.

Others winning the cross were Staff Sgt. Yukio Yokota, Pfc. Haruto Kurada, Pvt. Thomas Y. Ono, Pfc. Kaoru Moto, and Pfc. Robert H. Yasutake.

Born in Santa Ana, Calif., Oka received his schooling at Huntington Beach and Woodbury Business College. After being medically discharged, he has been back in California since Dec. 27, 1944.

Earl M. Finch, the Hattiesburg, Miss., farmer who has befriended thousands of Nisei soldiers, entertained some 150 of them on Jan. 9 at a party in New York City's famous Hotel Astor on Times Square. Among the guests were four wounded Hawaiian-born veterans of the fighting in Europe, Pfc. Irving Okahoshi, winner of the Distinguished Service Cross; T/4 Robert Oda and Pvt. Tamotsu Shimizu, all of the 100th Infantry Battalion; and Pfc. Satoru Kato, of the 442nd Infantry Regiment. Most of the other Nisei honored were unassigned soldiers from Hawaii and the mainland in New York on furlough.

Two pictures taken at the party were published by the New York Daily News, which referred to Finch as a "one-man USO."

He is also remembered in Jerome and Rohwer for having sent 5,000 Easter eggs last year.

BY JUNE 30TH**BILL CALLED FOR
CLOSING CENTERS**

Associated Press reports this week that Representative Dworshak, Republican, Idaho, prepared a bill calling for the closing of virtually all war relocation centers by June 30—six months earlier than originally planned.

There is immediate need for the war effort of the thousands of Japanese Americans in the camps, Dworshak said, adding that such action also would divert 2,500 in personnel of the WRA into defense work channels.

"There will be less difficulty from the early closing of these camps than would result if their closing were deferred for periods of six months to a year," he is quoted as declaring. "Then, it is entirely possible that this country may be facing economic conditions as a result of the cessation of hostilities in Europe which will cause some confusion and conflict between these evacuees and other citizens, particularly returning veterans."

He advocated maintenance of camps for only those persons of Japanese ancestry whose loyalty to the United States is questioned.

**Rumor Revealed
Entirely Untrue**

The rumor that Dr. Hatsuji J. Hara was assaulted and injured in California is entirely untrue, according to a letter to Project Director Leroy H. Bennett from Dr. Orlyn P. Pratt, medical director of the White Memorial Hospital in Los Angeles.

Dr. Pratt wrote as follows:

"Dr. Hatsuji J. Hara has not been in California since he left in 1942. He is at present in Hinsdale, Illinois. The rumor that he was assaulted and injured in this or any other neighborhood is entirely untrue. Doctor Hara's wife, who is a Caucasian, was recently in Los Angeles and is at present in Arizona."

REACTIONS ON NISEI RETURN

As evacuees began slowly to return to the Oregon area, the Associated Press this week reports a variety of reactions from communities near Hood River.

The report states that placards warning returning Nisei that "no Jap trade" is solicited sprouted throughout the Hood River Valley, where the American Legion post recently erased the names of Japanese American soldiers from its honor roll. Groceries, repair shops, and filling stations joined in the move.

Other cards were displayed in Gresham by a grocery and a hardware store, reading "no Japanese trade solicited for the duration."

Meanwhile Hood River's Adell Methodist Church adopted a resolution asking the Legion to restore Nisei names to its honor roll. At the same time petitions were being circulated among valley residents stating signers were "100 per cent behind" the Legion.

Ray Sato, one of the evacuees who have returned to that area, said that their neighbors were "more than gracious" and that they had begun pruning their orchards.

"There's nothing like being home," Sato said. "Our Hood River Valley is the most beautiful spot on the face of the earth."

CINCINNATI**A BATTLE WOUND THAT'S ELOQUENT**

Our words can't be anywhere nearly as eloquent as Sgt. Sato's battle wound, writes Alfred Segal, Cincinnati Post columnist who writes *Cincinnatus*.

"There was a Japanese name yesterday in the local casualty list which the Post entitles 'Field of Honor' S/Sgt. George K. Sato, wounded in battle in France."

"Cincinnatus hopes that certain people noticed the name to their spiritual benefit. They are people with prejudices against other Americans with different complexions or odd-sounding names.

"From the fact of Sgt. Sato, a soldier of Japanese descent, giving his blood for this country in the patriotic American way, they may learn something. That America is all kinds, that it is Sato and Schmidt, Jones and Levy, Murphy and Catanzaro, Lausche a Slovak and Jansen a Swede, Miklovitz a Pole, and Washington who is Negro. These are America."

"Sgt. Sato's wound should be more eloquent to their minds than Cincinnatus' words can be."

FLAGSTAFF

JOBs AVAILABLE AT ARMY DEPOT

A variety of jobs were offered to Gila residents and their families by Captain Regester of the Navajo Ordnance Depot of Flagstaff, Ariz., who visited the Project Monday. The Navajo Depot located in northern Arizona is similar to Tooele Depot in Utah, but the employment offered differs in several important details. Jobs available to men include truck drivers, auto mechanics, plumbers, diesel mechanics, fork lift operators, painters, gang bosses, laborers, and mechanic helpers. Women can be employed immediately as clerk typists, nurses' aides, stenography teachers, and gang bosses. In the latter category, Captain Regester stated, women were preferred to men.

FOR DURATION

All jobs at the Depot carry civil service status. The Depot is expected to continue in operation longer than most of the other army posts of this type and employment will continue beyond the end of the war.

Captain Regester stated that he is anxious to fill present vacancies immediately and believes that he can hire persons on the project cleared list without waiting for provost marshal clearance. He also wants as many applications as possible from persons now on the Army excludee lists. Employment is offered to single men as well as families.

WOMEN'S PAY

The women's positions are classified under civil service at a salary of a \$1440 to \$1620 per year for clerk typists, \$1200 for nurses' aides trainees, and \$2000 for stenography teachers. There is additional pay of approximately 20% which covers eight

RICE TO ARRIVE FROM ARKANSAS

Arrangements have been completed for rice to be shipped here from Arkansas, stated John D. Seater, head of mess operations.

It will be about the first of February when the shipments will start coming in to Rivers, Seater estimated. If everything goes as arranged, Rivers ought to get about four cars of rice between now and Feb. 10.

hours overtime for the 48-hour week which is now in operation. Other positions are paid on a daily basis.

OVERTIME PAY

The pay rates are the base pay received for an 8-hour day and a five-day week. All work on the 6th and 7th day of the week, or in excess of 8 hours per day is paid at the rate of time and a half. At the present time all workers at the Depot are working a regular 54-hour a week. This would mean that auto mechanics and diesel mechanics who have been on the job for two months would receive a weekly salary of \$68.93.

Applications for any of the above jobs are made on civil service blanks and can be submitted through either the Canal or Butte relocation offices.

GOV. WARREN

SCORES AUBURN ARSON ATTEMPT

Governor Warren of California Saturday called the attempted burning and dynamiting of a Japanese home at Auburn "atrocious" and said a repetition of such incidents might cause enemy retaliation.

"I can't conceive of people who claim to be good Americans trying to further the war effort doing a thing of that kind," the Governor said at a news conference.

"Every officer and every citizen not only should resent such conduct but do everything to prevent it."

"Such incidents not only give California a bad reputation throughout the world, but might cause our boys and civilians in enemy countries to suffer additional injury."

Central Calif. Returnee Happy

Families who have returned from Gila to Central California are being well accepted and are experiencing no difficulty in carrying on their business, according to a report by Walter Mewing, area supervisor, to R. B. Cozzens, in San Francisco.

James Morishige, his wife and two daughters, returned to their farm three miles northwest of Selma. Their tenant, Frank Salido, vacated the premises before their arrival and turned over complete possession to the evacuees. Morishige states that they are well received and their children are going to school and are receiving very fine treatment.

The Fresno relocation officer dropped in to see the Kazuo Hiyama family at their Fowler farm. They too are well pleased at the treatment they are receiving at Fowler.

ARABIAN NIGHTS**'Four Horsemen' Arrive In Egypt**

The four men who left the Rivers farm section last September to head an agricultural mission in Arabia have arrived in Egypt, according to personal letters which have been sent to Rivers by Walt Emrick, "foreign correspondent."

David A. Rogers, Carl W. Quast, Raleigh J. Sanderson and Emrick compose the party formed by the War Food Division of the Foreign Economic Administration after the Arabian Government requested a group of agricultural men to assist in the farm production problems of that country.

LIKE FICTION

Reading like an Arabian Night fairy tale, Emrick's letter describes his trip over on a small cargo ship that rocked rolled, and at one point had them seriously wondering whether they would ever come through the storm. Emrick wrote at that time, "I would gladly give a thousand dollars to be home and forget this whole cockeyed deal." Throughout the trip all of them were required to wear life jackets at all times when on deck.

Rogers and Quast had sailed on a passenger liner, Emrick and Sanderson, had taken the cargo boat as "76 other knout heads like we did."

ONCE IS ENOUGH

Emrick's last letter written on Dec. 5, 1944, states, "I am glad I had the experience of making the trip under such conditions, but I certainly don't want to go back that way!" Excerpts from Emrick's letters follow:

"This is a hurried note to let you know about my safe arrival in Cairo, Egypt. Met Dave (Rogers) and Carl (Quast). They were just about as glad to see us as we were to see them. They have both been here and worried about us for days."

"Nov. 24, 1944. Believe it or not tonight I am in Beirut (Lebanon) and last night I was in Jerusalem! Climate is so mild

FACTS ON DOI CASE

In view of rumors, newspaper and radio accounts of incidents at Auburn, Calif., involving returnee Sumio Doi, his father and mother, here are the facts as teletyped to Project Director Leroy H. Bennett from R.B. Cozzens of the San Francisco WRA office.

Doi's return was without incident until the night of Jan. 17 when he heard a noise in the outbuilding. Investigation showed that hoodlums had started a small fire which was promptly extinguished by Doi and his father. The incident was reported to the sheriff's office.

The following night buckshot was fired toward the house from a shotgun in the hands of an unknown person on the road. The sheriff was summoned. His investigation showed several sticks of dynamite planted in the packing shed.

Governor Earl Warren and State Attorney General Kenny appraised the facts and immediately requested full protection for the Doi family. This was followed up with a conference with Placer County superior court judge, the sheriff, and the district attorney who assured protection.

Doi's immediate neighbors are friendly, extending help, Cozzens states. Merchants in Auburn are cooperative. The Doi family will feel happier when other friends have returned to the area.

AUBURN**NISEI PREMISES GUARDED**

After marauders tried to burn and then dynamite the home of returnee Sumio Doi near Auburn, Calif., on Fri-

Shig Kubo of 45-7-B and the project agricultural department returned Sunday night from two weeks visit to San Francisco, where he attended a three-day conference on inter-racial relations, and went to Sacramento and Placer county, where he visited old friends and investigated community sentiment.

The San Francisco conference held on January 10, 11, and 12, in the Palace Hotel was attended by nearly 200 delegates from all sections of the Pacific Coast from Seattle to San Diego.

Since Kubo was the only person at the convention who actually still resides at a relocation project, he was called upon to express the viewpoint of the center residents at a meeting of the entire group. He appeared on the same platform with Dillon Myer and other notables. He told the conference that considerable confusion arose in the minds of the Issei residents when the opening of California was announced, because the official Japanese translation of the WRA bulletin which was released from Washington was in very complex and unin-

CHEST FUND TO BE SHARED BY EIGHT ORGANIZATIONS

Eight organizations were approved to receive shares from the community chest fund at a meeting of the 1945 Chest Fund Com-

mittee held Tuesday.

The organizations approved for participation in the chest fund are the Young Buddhist Association, Young Men's Christian Association, Young Women's Christian Association, Girl Scouts of America, Boy Scouts of America, United Servicemen's Organization, Nurses' Aide, and Senior Men's Club. These eight organizations had been recommended by a special committee chosen to select the organizations for participation in the 1945 chest fund, which was raised through the "Give a Day's Pay" drive conducted last year.

Allocation of funds will be determined by the Chest Trust Fund trustees, the Chest Fund Committee decided. It was further approved that the trustees be guided in their allocations by the same rules set last year, and that special requests by individual organizations for justification of allotment be considered.

ARABIAN NIGHTS**EMERICK WRITES
OF EGYPT LIFE**

Walt Emerick, former Gilar who is headed for an agricultural mission in Arabia, writes of his experiences in Egypt.

Excerpts from his letters follows:

"This is truly a land where anything grows, oranges, vegetables, and fruits of all kinds.

"All prices here are 10 times what they were in normal times. There is no OPA or rationing. We used to cuss over OPA and rationing regulations, but I know now that they were a great help to the economic health of our nation.

"Egypt is a very interesting place; life is no different from that in the states. We go to work at 8 a.m. and work until 1 p.m. and then go home and back again at 3:30 p.m. and then stay on the job and go home after dark at 7:30. Dinner is not served until 8:30."

"Money here is a big puzzle. A pound is worth about four dollars and I do believe it goes about as far as one dollar. For ten dollars you can get a fist full of paper money of varying sizes and a third are cars."

NIGHT RIDERS

The following editorial "Night Riders" appeared in the Jan. 22 issue of the San Francisco Chronicle.

"Night riding tactics like the attacks on the Japanese-American farmer who returned to his Placer County home come pretty close to an invitation to the FBI to take an interest in the matter.

"Such instances are not quite on a par with disturbances which, although they deal with constitutional rights, are held clearly and exclusively the responsibility of local authorities.

"American citizens of Japanese antecedents who were removed from their homes and held under military guard have been Government wards. No amount of legal sophistry can alter that practical aspect. If local peace officers cannot protect those persons in rights which were disturbed in the first instance by the Federal Government it seems to be up to the Government to find a way to do it."

**Kenny Requests
Law Enforcement**

Robert W. Kenny, attorney general of California, has written to the law enforcement officers of the state calling upon them to see that returning Japanese American people are given full protection. In his letter he quotes the text of a statement issued by the State Law Enforcement Advisory Committee after a special meeting called at the suggestion of Governor Earl Warren. The statement follows:

"We consider it our sworn duty as law enforcement officers to fully cooperate with the Army authorities in dealing with the return of the Japanese residents of this state. All persons, regardless of race, are entitled to the full protection of the law. The Army has carefully investigated each person to be permitted to return and will not allow those who are potentially dangerous to return.

"There should be no difficulty involved in this transition unless incidents are provoked by intemperate words and thoughtlessness.

"During this period of adjustment the reputation of each of our California communities will be at stake. We confidently expect all citizens to join with us in furthering full respect of the individual rights involved."

DEAR NISEI SOLDIERS

To keep Nisei fighting on the far-flung battlefronts informed of progress on the home front, Pasadena Friends of the American Way, through Marjorie Noble, executive secretary of that group, has sent letters to Nisei soldiers whose homes were in the Pasadena area.

Addressed to "Dear Nisei Soldier," the letters tell the names of the returnees and what they are doing. Here's a sample:

"In this first week after the lifting of the ban, thirteen Japanese Americans have come to Pasadena. They include:

"Ko Yamaguchi, age 10, living with the Emerson family and attending McKinley Junior High School. A clipping about him from the Los Angeles Times is inclosed.

"T. Hata, who has found a gardening job, and housing for his family. He is temporarily living with the Emersons.

"Ruby Hori, who will be a freshman at U.C.L.A. next term, and has a housework job in Los Angeles.

"Akira Kageyama, who will work at Caltech, living now with the Emersons.

"Mitsuko Koyama, living at the Morses', will attend P.J.C. next term.

"Francis Uyematsu and Francis Uyematsu Jr., now at the Carrs', are here to look over their nursery and make arrangements for reopening the business.

"Mr. and Mrs. Iida and Mr. Yamamoto, who may accept jobs offered them at Moody's mattress factory, in Los Angeles, with the Nicholsons.

"Mrs. Lily Moriguchi, who lived with Miss Fanning while she was here on business.

FARM**FIELDS WILL BE
CONSOLIDATED**

All vegetables fields except for fields 51, 61, and 65 will be turned back into the original alfalfa fields before the month of February, Robert Davidson, farm chief, stated.

The consolidation of the vegetable fields into three fields is to save labor, seed, and unnecessary use of fields. Due to the consolidation of the fields all the tractors, seeds, and other farm equipments of surplus use will be taken in and stored in the warehouse.

Livestock are being sold so that feed will be plentiful for the livestock necessary for the use of this camp. No vegetable will be planted during the month of February unless it is possible to have the vegetables harvested before July 1. This means that this year there will be no watermelons, honeydews, cantalopes, and casabas.

Seven carloads of vegetables have been sent to other centers, and fifteen more carloads will be sent during February.





Shig Kubo, who returned from a tour of California, expresses surprise at the great amount of work being done to assist evacuees' return.

SAN FRANCISCO

Kubo visited the old Japanese sections of San Francisco and Sacramento and found that virtually all the living quarters in these sections were occupied by Negroes and that housing facilities are extremely crowded. A Negro delegate to the conference stated that Negro organizations in San Mateo County have passed a resolution welcoming the Japanese back.

Representatives of the Federal Housing Agencies stated that returning Japanese American would be treated on the same basis as other Americans, in so far as the facilities of government agencies are concerned.

IN AUBURN

Kubo spent the remainder of his visit in Auburn, the county seat of Placer County, where he interviewed the sheriff, the county agricultural commissioner, the vice principal of the high school, the tax collector, county assessor, the banker, and numerous businessmen, lawyers, and city officials.

FSA TO AID EVACUEES

Scope of the services the Farm Security Administration (FSA) can make available to returning evacuee farmers has been outlined in a letter sent to WRA by R.W. Hollenberg, regional director of the FSA, it was announced today by R.B. Cozzens, assistant director of the War Relocation Authority.

Before a loan can be made to any applicant, the FSA county committee, comprised of three prominent local farmers, must pass on his eligibility, character and integrity, Hollenberg said.

FINANCIAL AID

Rural rehabilitation or operating loans are available to citizens who qualify as low-income farm families (including owner-operators, tenants, share-croppers and farm laborers with sufficient family manpower for farm and home operations, except possibly at peak seasons) if certain other requirements can be met.

These other requirements include: The necessity of full-time farm operations effectively utilizing family manpower or part-time operations which may be supplemented by off-farm employment that will not interfere with successful operations in order to maintain full employment and a satisfactory level of living; a willingness to assume the necessary responsibilities in order to make an effective contribution to the Nation's war effort; a family background of rural experience and managerial ability; that the borrower be unable to obtain adequate farm and home financing at reasonable rates and terms from sources other than the FSA; that there be a reasonable possibility of repaying the loan and that the family's level of health and living can be maintained or improved.

HOSPITALIZATION

Heads of families eligible as standard borrowers can get loans for livestock, farm equipment, minor repairs and improvements for farm and/or home, participation in group health, hospital and/or dental services, for emergency health services and for correction of physical conditions when (continued on page 4)



the approved farm and home plan indicated that such expenditures are necessary to successfully conduct the family's war production program and rehabilitation of the farm family.

However, loans will not be made for refinancing, generally speaking, although exceptions may be made.

FARM PURCHASE

Farm purchase loans, which run for 40 years at three per cent interest, are available to veterans of the present war, farm tenants, renters and laborers who are citizens. FSA reports that due to the limited funds on hand for this purpose and the large number of applications already on hand it is unlikely that more than 12 farm ownership loans can be made in California this year.

Farm families, whose income for taxable purposes has average \$2,000 or less per year during the last five years, are eligible for prepaid medical and hospital care through membership in county health associations established by FSA in cooperation with California Physicians Service, county medical societies and local farmers.

UTILITIES LOANS

Water facilities loans, which run up to 20 years at three per cent interest, are available to farm families for repairing, rebuilding or constructing farm and irrigation water systems, provided the family cannot secure adequate financing from other sources.

Group services loans are available to farmers wishing to pool their resources for the purchase and use of services and equipment such as purebred sires and machinery which they cannot afford to own individually. These loans carry three per cent interest and no

NEW YORK CITY**ISSEI EVACUEES OFFERED JOBS**

New York City offers to Issei resettlers, a wide variety of excellent business opportunities in consumer industries and service trades, according to a report of the opinions of 30 New York business men and women of Japanese ancestry, which has just been issued by the WRA relocation office in New York City. The business people who cooperated in the survey offered to advise Issei evacuees regarding business opportunities in New York and invited correspondence from them.

Copies of the English edition of the report, entitled "Business Opportunities for Issei in New York City," are now available from the relocation program office. A Japanese edition of the report is also being prepared for early distribution.

The business people who were interviewed, mostly Issei, recommended the following types of businesses for Issei newcomers to New York: restaurants, small rooming houses, art goods, dental laboratories, soda fountain, pet shop, toy factories, Oriental food stores, florists, produce, specialty foods, dry cleanings, dressmaking, dress shop, novelty store, manufacture of art and specialty goods, handicraft shop, nurseries, photographic studios, small truck gardens, and watch repair shops.

POST OFFICE TO SELL POSTAL NOTES FROM FEB.

DEACONS LEAD AYE LEAGUE; MUNCIES MEET FIRST LOSS


The Brother Deacons kept their position of first place in the Canal Aye League by defeating the Snaefus 4-35 last Monday evening.
