COUNCIL TO MEET FOR DISCUSSION OF CONFERENCE

The Butte Community Council and representatives from all blocks will meet at the 69-6 courthouse building 1:30 p.m. Monday, Feb. 5, to prepare for the all-center conference to discuss problems arising from the proposed closing of centers.

The Council decided at Monday's meeting to suggest to the Topaz Center that the tentative date for the meeting be Feb. 19 to 25 and the locality be Salt Lake City.

Two official delegates to the conference will be elected on Feb. 12.

AGED RESIDENT HANGS HIMSELF

Sango Goto, 72, of 45-5-B, was found dead about 6:30 Thursday evening, Feb. 1, suspended by rope from a beam of a canopy at the dump ground beyond the hills west of camp.

Coroner Walter B. Love, Jr., who investigated, stated that it was suicide.

Goto, formerly of Jerome, left no other identification and is apparently a bachelor. He is listed in the Japanese directory as a native of Kumamoto prefecture and formerly of Fresno.

Chief John W. Nichol, who was called to the scene, stated that indications showed the man's first attempt to take his own life had failed when the rope broke, and he had tried the second time.

KUROKI BROADCAST

Emphasizing that racial discrimination produces "wounds in this war that don't get the Purple Heart," the Army Air Forces Radio Unit dramatized the story of Technical Sergeant Ben Kuroki, Nebraska-born Nisei hero of the Eighth Air Force, in a half-hour program which was broadcast on Jan. 19 from New York City's Station WABC over a national hook-up of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

BOY FROM HERSHEY

Early in the program the narrator said it would "tell the story of a boy from a farmhouse near a potato field in Hershey, Nebraska," who had "picked up a very fancy collection of decorations, commendations, medals and citations--including two Distinguished Flying Crosses, the Air Medal and four oak leaf clusters, a Presidential citation, and half a dozen bronze stars--but no Purple Heart. Which is the point of the story?" "Have you heard the story of the boy from Nebraska? He was missed by flak over Germany, but he could get it right in the teeth from a storekeeper out West. He flew past the Fock-Wulfs all right, but the gentleman from the little town nailed him. He made it through the Floosti raid, but he didn't quite make it through a truck farm in the U.S.A. And the point is, there are wounds in this war that don't get the Purple Heart...."

HIS BROTHERS

"The neighbors of the truck farmer who needed help with his crops and hired five Japanese Americans... didn't run out, five of the people who brought death to China, and plunder to Burma, and starvation to the Philippines. They ran out five people like the boy from Nebraska."

"The gentlemen (who) counted off the names of the Japanese Americans on their servicemen's honor roll and got a bucket of paint and wiped out the names... weren't wiping out the people who raped Nanking, who came to Pearl Harbor in the dawn, who planned the death march of Bataan. They were wiping out the brothers of the boy from Nebraska...."

ALL FOR ONE

"Do you hear the story of the boy from Nebraska? Do you listen closely, and understand that he could have been from Seattle or Staten Island, or Sandusky, Ohio? And for Kuroki, read Canalli, read Kantrowitz, read Kerchuski. Any name that comes hard to the tongue, a different slant to the eye, the shape of a nose. They are riding the tail turrets from Me 11 to Burma. They are spelling it out slowly in fifty calibre bullets that it isn't race or religion that makes free men. They are writing it across the sky in demolition bombs that freedom isn't color, but a way of life. And all men are created equal until they prove otherwise."

BLIND HERO TO GRADUATE WITH SEEING EYE DOG

Pfc. Koshindo Omiya, blinded Hawaiian-born Ni-sei hero of the Italian campaign, and his Seeing Eye dog, Audrey, will soon be graduated from "school," reports Edward V. Berman, relocation officer in charge of the WRA office in Newark, N.J.

In company with his secretary, Miss Hideko Tsutsumi, formerly of San Luis Obispo, Calif., and Gila River, Berman recent-

ly lunched with Pvt. Omiya at the Seeing Eye Institute in nearby Morristown, N. J. There they learned that each blind person and his Seeing Eye dog go through a four-week course of study at the Institute before going out into the world together.

Berman, who was for several years a resident of Hawaii, said that Pvt. Omiya was very happy to meet "someone from the Islands" and to talk about poi and lomi salmon. He plans to return to his home in Hawaii after his and Audrey's graduation.

Pvt. Omiya served with the famed 100th Infantry Battalion and lost his eyesight during the crossing of the Volturno River in Italy on October 13, 1943.

HOSTEL OPENED FOR EVACUEES

According to a letter recently from Esther Rhoades of the American Friends Service Committee, a small hostel has been opened in Pasadena for the use of returning evacuees who wish to have temporary living quarters until they can find a more permanent home.

The Friends group is also assisting persons to find permanent living quarters in Pasadena. Anyone interested in making use of the hostel facilities may arrange a reservation through either the Canal or Butte relocation offices.

JOBS FOR NISEI IN CIVIL SERVICES

According to Walter Mewing, relocation supervisor in San Francisco, the California regional office of the United States Civil Service Commission is anxious to eliminate any possible discrimination in the assignment of qualified Nisei applicants to employment in federal government agencies on the West Coast. Any persons living in the center who wish to apply for civil service jobs in California may do so by sending an application to the United States Civil Service Commission, 12th Region, 630 Sansome Street, San Francisco, Calif. The application blanks, civil service form no. 57, may be obtained in either the Canal or Butte relocation office.

In many cases, persons are eligible for civil service jobs even though they have never taken a civil service examination before applying. Person who were working in Federal agencies on the West Coast prior to evacuation should follow the same procedure.

HOSTEL STARTS PRIORITY SYSTEM

In view of the coming relocation from centers to the eastern states, priority space in the Cleveland Hostel has been set. Priority will be given in the following order: (1) Remnants of family groups (having close relatives in Cleveland already), (2) Whole family groups having no relatives in Cleveland, (3) Single women, (4) Married men preceding the rest of their families in relocation and (5) Single men.

The main purpose will be to encourage and help evacuees to accomplish the uniting of families.

Relocation officials in Cleveland feel that it is preferable for married men to relocate together with their families, and face the relocation experience together. For that reason, married men preceding the rest of their families in relocation are fourth on the priority list. Another reason is that ample living facilities for unattached males can be found.

Oregon Farmer Seeks Japanese

A farmer, David Chadwick of Route 1, Ontario, Ore., wants one or two Japanese families to handle his beet crop for the 1945 season, according to Ernest J. Palmer, relocation officer at 328 Idaho Building, Boise, Idaho.

Chadwick's proposition is as follows:

Sixty acres of beets; Japanese to do all hand labor. Their compensation will be 35 per cent of the crop. Expense money will be advanced as each operation is finished, at the government scale for that operation. Chadwick will do his part of soil preparation, seeding, and cultivating in proper manner to obtain maximum yield.

FOUR SUSPECTS APPREHENDED IN AUBURN ARSON

TWENTY RECEIVE NOTICES FOR ARMY DUTY MONDAY

Four men, charged with felony counts of arson and attempted dynamiting in the Sumio Doi case, are in custody of civil authorities at Auburn, Calif., according to R.P. Cozzens of the San Francisco WRA office.

Two brothers, both AWOL from the Army, and two other brothers, distant neighbors of Doi's, have been apprehended by state and country law enforcement officials. They are Pvt. Elmer R. Johnson, 20, picked up by MP's and turned over to civil authorities; his brother Alvin E. Johnson, 18, both of Redding; James Edward Watson, 38, and Auburn bartender; and his brother Charles, 35.

Four young women, with whom the men are said to have been on a drinking party, are considered material witnesses although released on their own recognizance while each of the men are held in lieu of \$5,000 cash bail or bond of \$10,000.

Arrests were made after intensive investigation and cooperation of the state department of justice, military police, sheriff's office, district attorney's office and others.

In the meantime the Doi's have had nightly protection since Jan. 18 from the state highway patrol and special deputy sheriff. There have been no further incidents.

ALIEN TRAVEL RULES

Regulations controlling the travel of aliens are explained by Victor L. Furth, acting assistant director at the San Francisco WRA office, in a letter to William Russo.

Rumors that aliens may not travel more than five miles has no foundation. Under the regulations of the U.S. Department of Justice, an enemy alien may freely travel without special permission within the limits of the community in which he resides. The community includes all the area constituting a metropolitan district or an urban or rural community and is not limited to the boundary lines of a city or county. Thus he may commute between his home and his place of business.

TRIPS, MOVES

If he wishes to make a trip or move from one community into another, he should send a statement to the U.S. Attorney of the district of his residence at least seven days before his intended departure, stating in a form furnished by the U.S. Attorney his name, his home address, his business address, his Alien Identification number, the purpose of his trip, the persons to be visited, his intermediate and final destinations, the dates of his intended departure and return, his address while he is away, the routes to be followed to and from destination, and the means of transportation. If neither the attorney nor the FBI know of any reason why the trip would endanger the national security, the attorney will stamp an endorsement on the form and will deliver in time before he travels.

Salesmen, drivers of truck, etc, will not have to make a separate application for every trip.

CHANGE OF RESIDENCE, WORK

Change of residence or of employment shall be made only after at least seven days notice to the U. S. Attorney of the proposed change; and the holder of a Certificate of Identification shall not change his name, residence address, or place of employment without written notice to the Alien Registration Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and to the FBI at the office shown in the holder's Certificate of Identification.

Travel by airplane is not permitted.

The Bronco Babes also displayed sterling performances as they walloped the Q-Balls on the same day by an overwhelming score of 37-11.

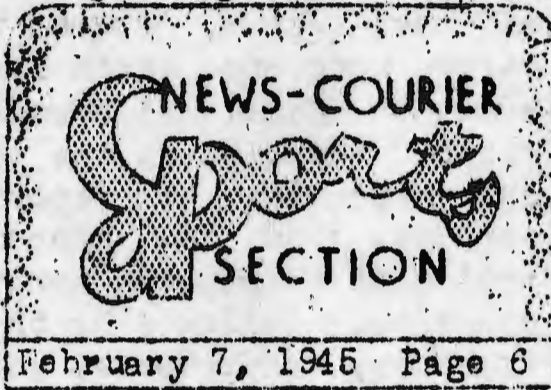
Girls League Gets Underway

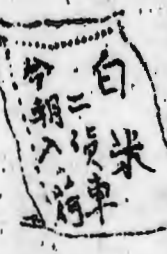

RELOCATION CENTERS TO CLOSE BY DECEMBER 31

War Relocation centers will close by Dec. 31, 1945, Hugo W. Wolter, liaison officer of the relocation division in Washington, declared this week in addresses before the Canal and Butte residents.

Wolter declared that since the danger of the West Coast invasion has passed, war hysteria is gone, and since the coast exclusion has lifted, all work of the WRA will now turn to resettlement and to helping evacuees back to the normal way of American living.

The purpose of the WRA has always been and still is to resettle dislocated people. Now that the reasons for evacuation and exclusion are gone it be-

comes the natural, normal thing to go out and seek life just like everybody else.

He outlined the Resettlement Assistance program, which has been organized to help all evacuees resettlement into normal life. This program, he declared, takes care of all types of cases including welfare cases, the ill, crippled, large families, etc. This program has an answer for every resettlement problem, he said.

Social security boards have guaranteed help to needy evacuees. Resettled evacuees may apply through local social security boards for funds from the Resettlement Assistance Program. This fund is WRA money set aside to help evacuees; it is not charity, Wolter stated.

He listed five groups under which evacuees will fall.

1-Those willing and able to relocate.

2-Those willing to relocate but needing assistance to meet problems.

3-Those who want to re-

Hawaiian evacuees eligible for travel grants may receive leave assistance to relocate to the Midwest or East and will be eligible for boat transportation at WRA expense when they are permitted to return to Hawaii. The boat trip must be made before March 1, 1946.

The evacuee will have to pay his own expenses from the place to which he has relocated to the point of embarkation, according to instructions received recently from Dillon S. Myer.

DELEGATES TO CONFAB CHOSEN

Four evacuees, two from Canal and two from Butte, were chosen this week to represent Rivers at the all-center conference at Salt Lake City, from Feb. 16 through Feb. 23.

Mitsuru Fukuzawa and Shigeichi Mitsuyoshi will represent Canal as a result of the election last Tuesday night. Of the 3091 votes cast, Fukuzawa and Mitsuyoshi received 961 and 679 votes, respectively.

Hiroji Nishimura and Yoriyuki Sato were elected to represent Butte at a meeting of block representatives yesterday afternoon.

AWARDED ARMY BADGE

One hundred and eighty-eight American soldiers of Japanese ancestry who were called to service from government War Relocation Centers to which they and their families had been evacuated in the spring of 1942 from their homes on the West Coast have been awarded Combat Infantryman's Badges for exemplary conduct under enemy fire in France.

All are now members of the 42nd Japanese American Combat Team. All are reinforcement who joined the Combat Team in Italy prior to its departure for Southern France and earned their awards in the bitter fighting in the Vosges Mountains of eastern France with the 7th Army. They participated in the historic breakthrough of the main German lines of resistance in this sector and in the dramatic rescue of the now famous Lost Battalion of this war in the wooded ridges near Bruyeres, France.

HOOD RIVER**LEGION REFUSES TO ACT**

The membership of Hood River American Legion post rejected the recommendation of the Legion's national commander that it restore the names of Japanese American servicemen erased from the country's honor roll, AP reports.

A terse statement said simply that the post "deems it inadvisable at this time to take any action."

National Commander Edward N. Scheiberling had asked the post to reconsider its action when widespread protest against the removal of the Nisei names came from church groups, the civil liberties union and others. Scheiberling said the erasure brought much "unfavorable publicity" to the Legion and was officially called to his attention by the War Department.

CANAL**DONATES \$300 FOR DELEGATES**

turn to their California homes.

4-The welfare cases- aged, crippled, etc.

5-Those who want to stay until the war ends.

He said that those in the first four groups will be taken care of through either temporary assistance or permanent assistance, according to need. These assistances, to be given to resettled evacuees from local social security boards, will last until June 30, 1946, six months after centers have closed. In other words 17 more months of assistance will be given to those now outside, but if residents wait until Dec. 31 before resettling, assistance will be available only six months thereafter.

'LET US HELP YOU'

"All we ask," stated Wolter, "is that you let us help you; those who don't want help, we can not help."

It is the first time in history that the U.S. government has set up a definite program for the express purpose of helping out a group of people, he pointed out. In each city there are groups of people willing to help evacuees. Giving examples of wonderful job offers that have been turned down by evacuees, he stated that these things are most discouraging to people and agencies who are really trying to help Japanese.

ON INDEMNITIES

Wolter also stated that indemnities have no connection whatsoever with resettlement. It will be up to Congress to decide on indemnities, and resettlement will not change the indemnity status at all.

Answering questions as to how certain and how soon financial assistance on the outside can be obtained, Wolter said that cash aid when needed will be immediate. The best thing to do would be to see for oneself how Resettlement Assistance actually works for resettled evacuees, he said.

準備しました、自治の出来ない方即ち病人老人就傷者少なき大家族等又何人にも現在及び今後普通の生活に支障あると思ふ人も一切心配する事は有りませぬ、WRの本部は今年中地方部は来年四月一杯で閉鎖しますが前掲補助金は全國の社会救済機関に渡されて諸君に助力する事にしてあります。救済の方法は一人何程と前金では渡しませぬが各自再転住して見て実地困る人を補助します。病人は病院へ、若者は養老院へ、生活費不足は其不足額を支給します。凡そ右補助基金の支給は貸すのでなく給與されるのであります。返金の必要はありませぬ、夫に付ても早く再転住するのが各自の得策ですと云ふのは押

LERROY BENNETT WILL LEAVE FOR CALIFORNIA TRIP

Project Director Leroy H. Bennett and Mrs. Evelyn Swiggum, acting head of the welfare section, will leave tomorrow for California to work out some of the problems of relocation. They will visit San Francisco, Sacramento, Fresno, and Los Angeles.

At San Francisco they plan to confer with R.B. Cozzens, assistant director of WRA, and will ask that more information be sent to the project from field offices on the coast in regard to social security and welfare assistance, community sentiment, and acceptance in different communities.

They expect to return Feb. 27 or 28.

Rules Given On Tobacco Cards

Persons who have lost their tobacco ration cards will not be re-issued cards for a period of one month.

Feb. 15 and 16 will be the last days for those who wish to change their tobacco preferences, either cigarette, pipe, or sack tobacco. No changes will be made after that until the cards expire on May 31, 1945.

Visitors or re-inducted persons who have returned while a cigarette sale is on (sales usually take place about once in ten days) will not be eligible for cards until the new period of sale begins.

SNELLING BOYS TO GET LEAVES

Furloughs for Nisei soldiers from Ft. Snelling will be for one week only, beginning Saturday, Feb. 17.

The men must return to Fort Snelling, Minn., by Feb. 25.

Gila's four delegates to the all-center conference to be held in Salt Lake City will leave tonight by automobile to Phoenix and then entrain for Utah.

Mitsuru Fukuzawa, Shigeichi Mitsuyoshi, Hiroji Nishimura, and Yoriyuki Sato were chosen by Canal and Butte to attend the one-week meeting from Feb. 16 through Feb. 23.

MONROE TRIAL SET FOR APRIL

The trial of James Monroe, charged with shooting three Japanese at Wells, Nev., on Jan. 20, probably will be held about the first week of April.

Monroe, 41, of Minidoka, Idaho, is an employee of the Union Pacific Freight and Passenger line operating between Wells and Minidoka. He is charged with shooting Harry Gomi, Kyutaro Fujinami, and Kenneth Kikumoto, all employees of a cafe in Wells. Gomi was shot in the chest and leg, Fujinami in the hip and abdomen, and Kikumoto in the thumb.

Monroe, who was well acquainted with Gomi, walked into the Wells cafe on Jan. 20 and asked Gomi to cash a personal check. Gomi refused, stating the manager was out and he couldn't cash it without the manager's approval. Monroe then asked Gomi to lend him \$20, which the latter refused, stating he didn't want to because Monroe seemed to be under the influence of alcohol.

Monroe returned about 5:30 p.m. and ordered a meal. The waitress served him, but returned with the order, stating Monroe was not satisfied. Monroe followed her and started shooting, injuring three,

NEW YORK

Resettlement Aid Discussed

Representatives of 20 national and local agencies and organizations cooperating in resettlement attended the first of a series of discussion meetings designed to acquaint them with community resources available to resettlers in the Middle Atlantic Area on Jan. 27 in the New York City WRA relocation office. The audience of some 50 persons included many Issei and Nisei.

Four speakers discussed the various ways in which public and private agencies are assisting evacuees in meeting problems concerned with resettlement and family reunions. They also stressed the fact that these services would be continued after the liquidation of the War Relocation Authority. Resettlers who need aid in planning for family reunions as well as financial assistance were urged to avail themselves of all the services provided by these organizations which have been established to help people who need assistance.

Speakers explained how the Federal, state, and local governments cooperate in aiding evacuees to meet their security needs under the special Resettlement Assistance Program of the Social Security Board, for which some of the funds have been provided by the War Relocation Authority.

RULES ON VISITS TO WRA CENTERS

It will no longer be necessary for members of the armed forces on furlough to get advance approval from the relocation officer before visiting a center.

Men in uniform will be granted admission merely by showing the MP on duty their furlough or leave papers.

It will be necessary for them to pay the usual visitors' guest charges for the actual period of their visit. However,

THE GILANS' RETURN

"The people from Gila River are leading the way for evacuees returning to California," according to Walter Mewing, area supervisor, of the War Relocation Authority in San Francisco, who spoke enthusiastically of the record being made by returning Gilans, in a phone conversation with William Huso recently.

Probably the outstanding achievement made since California was reopened was the departure last Tuesday of Fred Wakita and a group of 25 persons who were returning to their former homes in Florin, Calif. With courage and determination which would do credit to pioneers who made their way westward in covered-wagon days, Wakita's group set out with boldness and a resolute will to resume their lives as free Americans despite the discouragement of a fire which destroyed the home and farm buildings of one of the families in the groups, and the noisy and irresponsible statements of a few West Coast people whose belief in American principles are apparently less well founded than those of Wakita and his group. Their action will serve as a home front inspiration to all Americans who believe in the ideals for which United Nations soldiers of all races and creeds are offering their lives to strengthen and preserve.

WOLTER

'KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK'

"Keep up the good work" were the parting words of Hugo Wolter, who left Gila by plane early Friday morning to return to Washington. Wolter spent a busy week at Gila talking to many groups and individuals in an effort to clarify the present resettlement program for everyone.

He said that the evacuees working at the ordnance depots, particularly those Issei at the Sioux Depot, had done a great deal to convince the army and the general public that the rest of the people living in the relocation centers, aliens as well as citizens, were on the side of the United Nations. These people have joined with the boys fighting overseas to prove to the vast majority of the American people that Japanese Americans do not deserve a status of second rate citizenship. Consequently, the community attitudes of all sections of the United States have improved very noticeably in the last six months.

This is particularly true on the West Coast. As evidence of this, he cited Dillon Myer's great pleasure upon returning from his recent trip through the breadth and length of California to find that people of all types and classes were very cordial and friendly to him and much more interested in the resettlement program of the War Relocation Authority and much more sympathetic to the problems of the evacuees than they had been six months before. Another heartening sign which Wolter pointed out was the fact that people in one section of Louisiana have offered hospitality to as many as 2,000 Japanese people. These people feel that the skilled farmers among the evacuee population will be able to develop the rich river bottom land of Louisiana into a large vegetable garden

TOOELE WORK FOUND 'AS GOOD AS IT SOUNDS'

"Too good to be true," was the reply at Manzanar to the first representative who investigated the Tooele project, according to Kegs Shiwota from the personnel office there, who is here to answer questions that might arise in connection with securing employment at Tooele. However, word went back to the Manzanar project from the employees that the job is really as good as it sounds.

Workers may now relocate to Tooele without their families if the families plan to follow in a reasonable length of time. The PMGO Clearance can be obtained in much less time than it formerly took, usually in about four days. Single men may now be employed. Shiwota may be reached through the Canal or Butte relocation offices

or the Central Block Manager's office, 42-2-A for conferences.

HOUSING

Plenty of housing is immediately available. He says the women especially, have been pleased with the new and comfortably furnished apartments, consisting of living room, kitchen, one, two, or three bedrooms, and bath. Furnishings include stove and ice box. Good elementary schools are available on the project. Junior and senior high school students are taken by bus to the Tooele schools where they have been well received.

Women are employed as clerks, typists, and stenographers.

(continued from page 2) comparable to those in any other section of the United States.

All these factors have led the government to conclude that the relocation centers have outlived their period of usefulness and that they should not be operated any longer than is necessary for individual residents to work out their own and their family resettlement problems. Consequently, the War Relocation Authority has not asked for any funds from the Congress for the operation of any relocation project after December 31, 1945. Until that time the War Relocation Authority will exist solely for the purpose of assisting those residents who wish help of any kind, Wolter concluded.

Nisei Casualty Score Hits 486

Casualty totals among Nisei serving in the armed forces of the United States as of January 25, 1945 were 486, announced Robert Cozzens, assistant director.

The total includes only Nisei who entered the armed forces from WRA relocation centers and whose next of kin at the centers have been notified.

Following is the breakdown of the casualties:

Fifty per cent of the money collected will be spent in the county; the other half will be sent to the national foundation for research on infantile paralysis.

TULEANS LEAVE FOR INTERNMENT

A special train carrying 650 evacuees left the Tule Lake Segregation Center Sunday, Feb. 11, for an alien enemy internment camp operated by the Department of Justice, reported the San Francisco Chronicle.

Eighteen of the evacuees were Issei and 632 were Nisei who have renounced their citizenship.

The destination of the contingent was not announced. This is third of such groups to be shipped from Tule Lake. In all, 891 evacuees have been transferred from the center to an internment camp.

HAYASHI SISTERS LEAVE FOR U.C.

Ruth and Jane Hayashi of 5-12-A left Thursday for Berkeley, Calif., where they plan to attend the University of California.

Jane Hayashi was valedictorian of Canal High's class of '44. Prior to her departure Jane was head of the English section of the NEWS-COURIER in Canal. The two sisters are the first Gileans to leave the center to enter U.C.

RIGHTS BEING RESTORED

President Robert Gordon Sproul of the University of California has assured equality of opportunity to all students of Japanese ancestry.

President Sproul's statement says:

"The University makes no distinction among students because of their race, religion, or nationality. Therefore, persons of Japanese ancestry who have been cleared by the War Department and other federal authorities and who return to California either to begin or to resume their studies at the University will not be treated differently from other former students or applicants for admission.

"Moreover, such persons will be received by the University and by the faculty and student body as well, I am sure, in a friendly and cooperative manner. For they will have been certified, in effect, to have proved themselves free from any blemish or disloyalty even under the stress of most discriminatory treatment."

Such assurance, coming from men like President Sproul, is a big boost to Nisei morale and to the nation's aim of giving equal justice to all, regardless of race, birth, or creed.

In Seattle a Japanese American nurse at Harborview County Hospital left the city of her birth because the nurses at the hospital circulated a petition, objecting working alongside anyone of Japanese ancestry. In Chicago the Jackson Park Hospital refused to admit a Nisei girl who went there for emergency treatment. (Dr. Selig A. Shevin, member of the hospital staff, resigned in protest against the hospital's refusal.)

These cases of discrimination do hurt; nevertheless, we can take courage in the fact that through big men and big institutions the Nisei is being restored his citizenship rights.

SASAKI WOUNDED THIRD TIME

Frank Sasaki, 6-5-C, hospitalized. has received word that his son S/Sgt. Harry Sasaki has been wounded again in France, for the third time and has been

Sergeant Sasaki, formerly of Pomona, Calif., has been commended several times for conspicuous action against the enemy. He has received a Purple Heart, and in addition he now has received a cluster in lieu of the second Purple Heart. He also holds two Bronze Stars, a ribbon with three battle stars, and his Combat Infantryman's badge.

Sasaki is now with General Patch's 7th Army in France. His brother, S/Sgt. Herbert, is also in service in France.

DOCTOR FIGHTS DISCRIMINATION

Stories in the newspapers and protests from Chicago citizens have brought about a denial by a hospital superintendent that the Jackson Park Hospital discriminates in admitting patients because of race or ancestry.

Dr. Selig A. Shevin, veteran of World War II, recently resigned from the staff of the Jackson Park Hospital when one of his patients, former Gilan Toyoko Murayama, 19 year-old Nisei, was refused a bed in the ward. Dr. Shevin, who had served on the staff of the Jackson Park Hospital for 17 years, resigned to protest Supt. Lucius W. Hilton's conviction of Toyoko Murayama a few hours after she entered the hospital.

"She is entitled to all the privileges of other Americans," Dr. Shevin stated, according to a Chicago Sun story Feb. 7, "and any other attitude is un-American, unpatriotic and inhuman. It is the sort of thing that our boys are fighting for."

LEGAL AID CLUBS TO HELP NISEI

More than 60 Legal Aid Societies throughout the country will cooperate with WRA in assisting Nisei who are unable to employ the services of a lawyer, the National Association of Legal Aid Organizations announced in a statement unanimously adopted at a recent meeting of its Executive Committee.

The service of these voluntary organizations covers both advice and representation in court for all types of civil matters. Some organizations also handle criminal matters.

Among the more common problems requiring legal aid handled by Legal Aid Societies are these: installment contracts, wage claims, landlord and tenant relationships, recovery of personal property, small loans, family relations and workmen's compensation.

Persons able to pay are not accepted as clients of Legal Aid Societies, but will be referred to capable and honest attorneys who will charge a fair fee, or a reduced fee if necessary.

Relocation officers have been instructed to maintain contact with the Legal Aid Society in each area, to develop sound relationships which will be beneficial to evacuees.

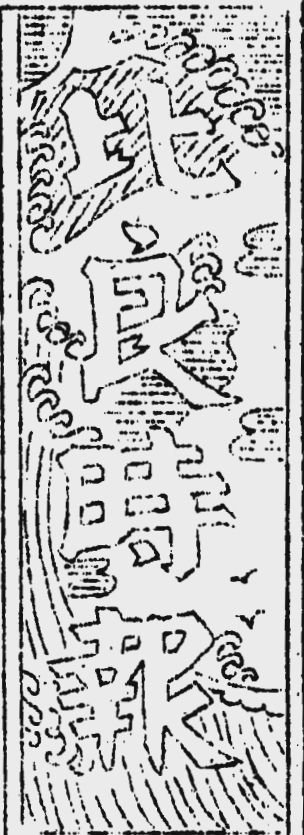

HOODLUMS BURN, SHOOT

Unidentified persons in Fresno county last week set one evacuee's house on fire and blasted two other evacuees' homes with shotgun barrages.

The home of Bob Morishige, who before the war operated Selma's largest garage, was set afire and destroyed Friday, Feb. 16, along with the owner's and several other evacuees' furniture and household effects stored there, reported the L.A. Times. The loss was estimated at \$7000.

The blaze was pronounced as "plainly of incendiary origin" by the Selma fire chief.

Morishige formerly resided in Canal and was the block manager of block 10.

At about the same time that the fire occurred, a shotgun squad blasted a barrage of pellets into the home of S.J. Kakutani at Smith and Adama Ave., on the outskirts of Fresno. Kakutani, his wife and three children, and another couple, Ty and Kay

Pvt. Isodore Rubin's essay on "What Victory Means to Me" won the \$500 war bond grand prize in the Mediterranean Theater of Operations essay contest, the War Department announced. Essays were submitted by service personnel numbering more than 1,800. Pvt. Rubin's essay follows:

"However, ancient and stubborn enemies are still to be conquered. Enemies which must be overcome not by armies, but by minds and hearts and talents set wholly free. Such enemies are poverty, insecurity, prejudice, disunity.

"These too shall be conquered. For we have begun to think more deeply and more dynamically. And if we can sweep aside untold obstacles to smash the most ruthlessly efficient machine of destruction ever devised, surely we possess the vision and the practical genius to organize for peace, security, and a world designed for living.

LOOKING FORWARD

"Till now, many have ruled because of accident of birth or power of wealth. But throughout the world, the unfit, the weaklings, and the traitors are falling by the wayside. New leaders are rising from the people--those who never sold their heritage of courage, faith, and simple human dignity.

"With victory, we shall have destroyed those who would have enslaved the world. Our sacrifices have been great, but we have won the opportunity to emerge from the animal kingdom and enter the kingdom of man.

"I look forward to living in such a world."

NISEI FROM HOOD RIVER DIES IN LEYTE BATTLE

Frank T. Hachiya, 25, Feb. 16. of Portland, Ore., one of 16 Japanese Americans whose names have been stricken from the county memorial roll by the Hood River, Ore., American Legion Post, died while performing a dangerous volunteer mission, reported the Arizona Daily Star.

Hachiya, attached to the Seventh Division, was fatally wounded on Leyte December 30. He died January 3 after most of the men in his regiment volunteered to give him blood transfusion.

VOLUNTEER SCOUT

Lt. Howard Moss, Hachiya's commanding officer, said Frank volunteered to cross a valley under Japanese fire to scout an enemy position. The regiment was in a tough spot. Information on enemy disposition was essential. At the bottom of the valley Frank worked ahead of his protecting patrol.

HIT BY SNIPER

"A sniper let Frank have it at close range," Moss related. "Frank emptied his gun into the sniper. Shot through the abdomen, Frank walked back up the hill. Medics gave him plasma and started him to a hospital. He was operated on immediately but the bullet has gone through his liver and he died."

Hachiya attended the University of Oregon. He enlisted shortly after the Pearl Harbor attack. He had served through the Kwajalein and Eniwetok invasions.

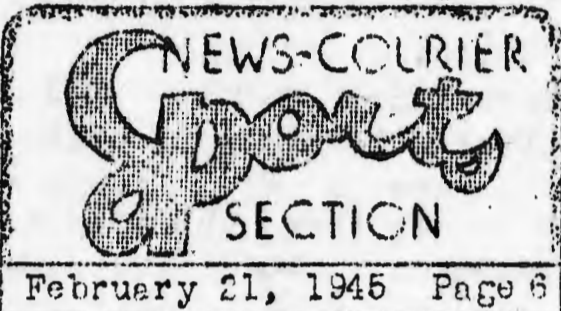

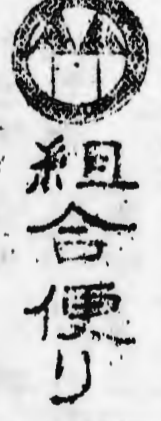

More On Filing Of Income Tax

Residents are reminded that their annual income tax returns should be filed by March 15, next, if their gross income for last year exceeds \$500, stated Attorney Ernest Iwasaki, of the project attorney's office.

The usual form to be used is Form 1040 where income is derived from wages, salaries, dividends, interest, gain or profit from business operations, etc. Withholding receipt Form W-2 may be used as an alternative form by any one where the income derived is virtually from wages or salaries.

EXEMPTION

A \$500 exemption may be claimed for a dependent regardless of age or physical condition if the following tests are met:

1-Dependent must not have more than \$500 gross income. 2-He must be closely related, by blood, marriage or adoption. 3-He must be a resident of the United States, Mexico, or Canada. 4-The returner must have supplied more than half of the total support of the dependent during the taxable year.

In any case cousins are never considered, close relations but claims for exemption may be taken for aunts, uncles, nephews and nieces, if they meet the above tests.

1945 ESTIMATES

Persons deriving income from wages or salaries who expect to receive an income over \$5000 for the current year should file their declaration of estimated tax by March 15. Where the income is less than \$5000 and is wholly derived from wages or salaries no declaration of estimated tax need be filed, stated Attorney Iwasaki.

ARMY EMERGENCY RELIEF

Army Emergency Relief this week released the follow-
 ing statement to WRA, pointing up the operation of its
 special funds to assist servicemen and their dependents
 in critical emergencies.

AER is a private corporation, organized under the
 laws of the District of Columbia, for the purpose of
 rendering emergency financial assistance to army per-
 sonnel on posts, camps, and stations, and to suppl-
 ment assistance to servicemen's dependents given by
 American Red Cross through its local chapters.

The organization is not supported by appropriated
 funds. Its sole source of income is from private do-
 nations, benefit entertainments, and shows and motion
 pictures such as "This is the Army" and "Winged Vic-
 tory."

In the event the dependent of an army person re-
 quires emergency financial aid, he or she should con-
 tact the nearest Red Cross chapter. Assistance will
 then be rendered directly from Red Cross funds, those
 of suitable community agencies, or from the funds of
 Army Emergency Relief.

Ordinarily cases requiring long or recurrent as-
 sistance, such as extended confinement for tuberculosis
 would be cared for by community agencies, equipped to
 render help of that character. Funds of Army Emergen-
 cy Relief are usually available only for emergencies.

Through more than 3,750 chapters and 6,000 branches,
 Red Cross uses its own funds, and is later reimbursed
 by Army Emergency Relief, to prevent delay in render-
 ing the assistance necessary. AER approves expendi-
 ture of its funds on a case basis.

**WRA WINDING

The War Relocation Authority's proposal to
 wind up its affairs before the war ends, made in that
 agency's annual report for the fiscal year ending

required as in the past.

However, should the
evacuee request pre-clear-
ance, he may still obtain
it by filling out the
questionnaire and sending
it to the depot with a
covering letter of explana-
tion at the same time his
application forms are for-
warded. The depot can
then deal directly with
the PMGO in handling the
Personnel Security ques-
tionnaire.

RELOCATION FOR ELDERS TOO

Elmer Tanaka, 51-9-B,
who is employed in a tent
factory in Chicago, has
returned to the center for
a brief visit. Tanaka has
done well in Chicago and
feels that there is a good
opportunity there, now es-
pecially for elder men.
Many jobs are open; some
evacuees are going to work
the day they reach the
city.

Housing is still the
biggest problem, especial-
ly for family groups. Ta-
naka lives with a group
of other workers in a
rooming house which they
operate on a cooperative
basis at a very moderate
cost. His suggestion to
the head of a family is to
go out to work, save money,
and with three or four
friends buy an apartment
house and then take the
family out. These apart-
ment houses can be bought
for as little as \$1,200
says Tanaka. He will be
on the project until March
5, and will be glad to
discuss Chicago's possi-
bilities with anyone in-
terested. Tanaka was pre-
sident to the PTA of
Butte Elementary School
before going to Chicago.

The teams are all nameless as yet. They are only known by the names of the managers of the team. They are Tets Santo, Tom Kumano, and George Egusa.

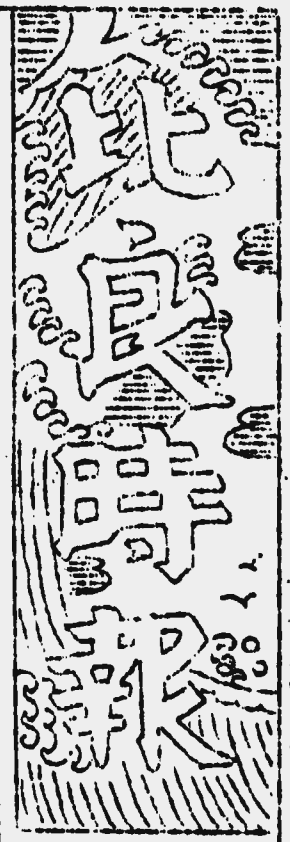

DELEGATES GIVE CONFERENCE TALK TOMORROW NIGHT

Rivers' four delegates to the Salt Lake City all-center conference, who returned here Monday, will present their reports at public mass meetings in Butte and Canal tomorrow night from 7 o'clock.

Butte's delegates, Hiroji Nishimura and Yoriyuki Sato, will speak at the Butte amphitheater, and Ben Fukuzawa and Shigeichi Mitsuyoshi will speak in Canal at the community stage.

Arsonists Will Face Trial

The four men accused of arson and attempting to dynamite a ranch building of Sumio Dei in Auburn, California, last Jan. 19, will face the county Superior Court at a later date as the result of the preliminary hearing in the Justice Court Feb. 21.

In the meantime, there will be a hearing in Superior Court on March 3 to determine whether or not the Surety Bonds posted by the two local brothers involved in the charges are sufficient in view of the serious nature of the charges.

The other two brothers held, both AWOL from the Army, are still in jail because of inability to make bonds of \$5000 each.

500 RETURN TO WEST COAST

Secretary of Interior Ickes announced that more than 500 persons have returned to the Pacific Coast from relocation centers since the lifting of the exclusion, the U.P. reported last Friday.

WRA records show that 418 went to California, 43 to Washington, 35 to Oregon, and 32 to Arizona.

OUCHIDA REPORTED SLIGHTLY WOUNDED

S / Sgt. Hiroharu P. Ouchida was slightly wounded in action in France on Feb. 10, according to a War Department teletype received by his brother, Harold Y. Ouchida of 73-10-A.

Sergeant Ouchida was a member of the squad which rescued the Lost Battalion.

HOSPITAL

Opens Class For Nurses' Aides

A new class for nurses aides will start 8:30 Saturday morning, March 3, at the Rivers hospital classroom. The first class meeting will be a period of introduction to the course with discussions on the hours for the class, the work, etc.

Chief Nurse Priscilla Parker states she would like to have as many students as possible because relocation is again making the nurse shortage acute.

Nurses aides applicants may be either job experience workers or those on the regular pay basis.

Interested girls who want to enter the new class are requested to notify the chief nurse at the hospital.

LEAVE PROCEDURE CONFUSIONAIRE

There has been some misunderstanding as to the types of leave now available. Seasonal or trial leave is no longer granted, and there is no possibility that it will be granted between now and the time the camp closes.

Short term leave is granted for a period of thirty days or less. Persons who are out on short term leave are not permitted to accept employment if they wish to return to the center.

MYER COMING SATURDAY FOR THREE DAY VISIT

Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, will arrive here Saturday morning for a three day visit, during which he expects to meet with residents and staff members. He probably will discuss the post exclusion program. He is scheduled to leave Monday noon, March 5.

The Rivers post-exclusion co-ordinating committee is making plans for Director Myer's appearance in both Butte and Canal, in cooperation with the community councils.

The Director probably will appear in a series of meetings with the appointed staff, the block managers and the councils, the two high school student bodies, and at mass meetings in both camps. His schedule will be announced in the next issue.

Pfc. Madokoro Awarded DSC

The Distinguished Service Cross was presented last week to Mrs. Matsu Madokoro of the Poston Center, who received the posthumous award for her son, Pfc. Harry F. Madokoro, killed in action in Italy last summer.

Brig. Gen. John Wilson, chief of staff of the Ninth Service Command, Fort Douglas, Utah, presented the award to Mrs. Madokoro, only living member of her family.

An infantryman with the U.S. Fifth Army, Pfc. Madokoro was cited for "extraordinary heroism in action" in three assaults at Molina A. Vontabato and in Luciana, Italy, in July. He died August 25.

A farmer resident of Watsonville, Calif., he volunteered for army duty in June, 1943.

BROOKS HEADS ST. LOUIS OFFICE

Miss Prudence Ross, acting relocation supervisor of Chicago's North Central Area, has announced the appointment of Miss Mary F. Brooks, formerly assistant counsellor at the Minidoka Relocation Center, to the position of district relocation officer with headquarters at St. Louis, Missouri. Miss Brooks entered on February 16, 1945. Her offices are located at 1415 Paul Brown Building, St. Louis.

Previous to her work with Japanese Americans, Miss Brooks directed an educational program for the Chicago health department. A graduate of the University of Minnesota, Miss Brooks was employed over a ten-year period in St. Paul as a social worker and later as supervisor of social services.

Yoshiharas Are 'At Home' Again

Welcomed by friendly Caucasian neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. George Yoshihara are "at home" once again in Shelton, Wash., having arrived a week ago from Granada Colorado Relocation Center.

While they are both working very hard to get their house and oyster beds in order again, the beaming couple took time off to tell two WRA representatives who called on them, of the wonderful welcome extended by neighbors. "When we arrived here, our good neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Stevens, invited us to be their house guests for three days so that we could get our own place in livable condition again," Yoshihara said.

"They even had a chicken dinner for us on Sunday, and a lot of the other neighbors telephoned us to say that they were very glad we were back again," added Mrs. Yoshihara. "We have even had people stop by and try to buy Olympia oysters from us in the few days we have been here, but we had to tell them to come back some other time,

PVT. HACHIYA, AMERICAN

The New York Times on Feb. 17 carried the following editorial about Private Frank T. Hachiya, a Nisei soldier who was killed in action at Leyte, and whose name was among those of sixteen Nisei soldiers removed by the Hood River, Ore., American Legion Post from their county war memorial.

ANSWERS THE CALL

The members of the Hood River, Ore., Legion Post who removed from their county war memorial the names of sixteen Americans of Japanese ancestry would do well to heed the case of Frank T. Hachiya, whose name was one of the sixteen.

Japanese treachery at Pearl Harbor reacted upon Hachiya as upon other patriotic Americans. To be sure, his eyes slanted, his skin was yellow, his name different. But Hachiya was an American. He enlisted at once, and it must have been a dramatic moment when he told his Japanese father of his plan. The son went to the front; the father was removed to a War Relocation Authority camp.

HERO AT THE FRONT

As a soldier, Private Hachiya saw action at Kwajalein, at Eniwetok, at Leyte. There he lay in a little valley under withering Japanese fire. Bullets cut up the ground. Men were killed and wounded beside him. The attack was stopped. Information on the enemy's strength was essential. The commanding officer asked for a volunteer to reconnoiter the position. Private Hachiya volunteered. He crept forward through the grass, now crawling, now running quickly through the open from cover to cover. The men behind watched him descent the slope and work into the valley. Then they saw him drop. A Japanese sniper had got him.

DISHONORED AT HOME

But Private Hachiya, mortally wounded though he was, could not lie there. The battalion wanted the information he had gathered. He must get back. So he crawled, bleeding and in agony, out of the valley and up the hill, through the grass and scrub and around the merciful protection of little hillocks. He was dying when he reached his lines. He made his report while they bound his wound. Then about a month after his name had been removed from the Hood River war memorial, Private Hachiya died.

Perhaps Private Hachiya never knew that the Legion post had dishonored him back home. Perhaps some day what is left of him may be brought back to this country for reburial among the honored dead.

The Yoshiharas are the only Japanese family who has returned to the small community of oystermen along Hood Canal. They had lived there for nearly twenty years, and in the community for forty years. Yoshihara said they had always been a part of the community activities and civic celebrations, such as school Christmas parties, Red Cross committees, etc.

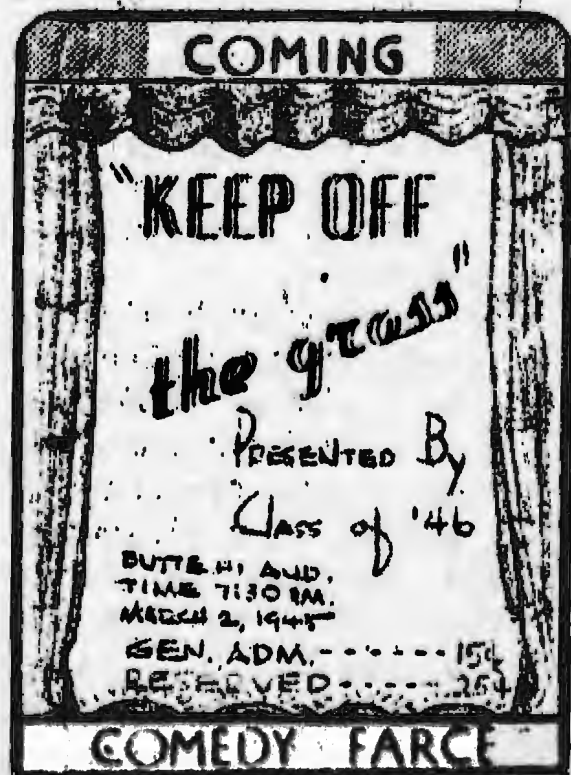

Born in Alameda, Miss Takeuchi was living in Oakland before evacuation. She went to the Fresno assembly center and then to the Jerome Relocation Center, where she remained until going to work for the Ohio CIO, in September, 1943. Her mother lives at Gila, 28-2-C.

"I got to like Columbus, and I thought I'd stay there the rest of my life," Miss Takeuchi confessed. "But now that I've changed my mind and come back, I'm tickled pink."
