CALIFORNIA HAS TAX EXEMPTION FOR VETERANS

Veterans are exempt from taxes to the extent of \$1,000 in property value under a provision of the California State Constitution.

To claim such exemption the veteran or servicemen must appear in person and make affidavit before the county assessor as to information required by him.

However, if an applicant is unable to attend in person before the assessor then the affidavit may be subscribed to before any person authorized to administer an oath.

Thus a qualified evacuee should write his county assessor giving his reason for failing to appear in person and request necessary forms in order to subscribe to such affidavit as may be required before a notary in a relocation center.

Affidavits must be filed with the assessor by the last Monday in June.

The exemption does not apply to any person owning property worth \$5,000 or more or "whose wife owns property worth \$5,000 or more."

dicate that some of our project personnel remain skeptical. Some staff members apparently are not only dubious in their own minds of our ability to complete the relocation job on schedule, but many of them are openly expressing their doubts in the presence of evacuee residents.

"If these reports are true, I am deeply disappointed. Personnel who engage in this kind of activity are not only disloyal to the program of which they should be an integral part but are doing a serious dis-service to the residents by building up expectations which cannot and will not be realized. The status of our operating funds and our relocation plans is such that there is no feasible alternative to closing the eight relocation centers on schedule even if we felt postponement would be desirable -- which we do not."

NEW RULE EASES PAROLEE TRAVEL

New procedures have eased traveling restrictions for parolees and will eliminate some of the delays which have been encountered by them, stated Dillon S. Myer, national director. Procedures:

(1) Provide for prompt approval of the travel permit authorizing the parolees to proceed to his destination;

(2) Direct the parolee to report to an officer of the Service or in some instances to a designated public official, within 24 hours after arrival at his destination;

(3) Provide that travel permits shall not be detrimental to the national security.

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MILD SENTENCE

The San Francisco Chronicle, which has maintained a staunch policy of fair play for all loyal citizens, last Friday reprimanded Superior Judge Lawler of Seattle for a half hearted sentence in the case of arsonist Harold Burton, who was fined \$1000.

The Chronicle editorial states:

"California is all too familiar with halfheartedness of worse on the part of peace officers regarding outrages against the persons or property of Americans of Japanese descent. Now the State of Washington furnishes an example at the judicial level.

SEVERITY JUSTIFIED

"For the crime of burning four homes belonging to evacuated Japanese, Superior Judge James I Lawler, of Seattle has accepted a plea of second-degree arson from Harold S. Burton, and fined Burton \$1000.

"Burton was allowed to plead in second degree because the houses were unoccupied when he fired them. This deal in itself, in view of the necessity to set up an example of West Coast hoodlums, was questionable enough. But, in addition, Judge Lawler meted something like the minimum possible punishment, even under the second-degree plea. He was empowered to impose a \$5000 fine and sent once up to 10 years in prison, or both.

MILDNESS URGES OUTLAWRY

"Concurrently, fresh outrages are reported from Fresno and vicinity, with the familiar accompaniment of 'puzzled' law-enforcement officers.

"In the Seattle affair, it is not disclosed whether the owners included citizens; that is American-born Japanese. If not, the chances are strong that at least one of the four houses was the home of a son or sons in American military service. It would make no difference anyway; the hoodlums probably would not have been stopped by a service star in the window--they haven't been in previous cases; and even if there were no American-born Japanese involved, decent persons cannot condone the foul and sneaking crime of arson against whomever directed.

"Together with his complacently 'puzzled' colleagues at the police level, Judge Lawler shares a heavy responsibility. He has praised this kind of outlawry with faint damns."

CALIFORNIA**CLEAN UP BACK YARD**

How to re-educate and de-nazify youth in Germany is a tough problem, a \$64 question, but California might make a start toward discovering the right answer by looking at a similar problem right in their own back yard. And that problem is one of law enforcement and law observance, of preventing terrorism against minority groups in California.

This is the gist of an editorial in the Santa Barbara News Press of May 15. Says the News Press:

"We cannot, as Californians, do much about cleansing the minds and hearts of German youth of Nazi cruelty, arrogance, intolerance and sadism. But we can, if we really desire, exert an influence on the youths, and the adults of California against hoodlumism, arrogance, intolerance and cruelty.

"If in this state which stands high in education, culture and enlightenment, we cannot cure our own ills of bigotry, hatred, greed and "know-nothing" mob spirit, then heaven help us in trying to set up a world organization for peace and justice.

"The \$64 question is aimed at California, as well as at Germany."

SGT ICHIKI**AWARDED MEDAL
POSTHUMOUSLY**

Staff Sgt. Stanley T. Ichiki, formerly of Rohwer, earned the Silver Star award posthumously for saving the lives of a reconnaissance party of which he was a member.

AP's Kenneth L. Dixon this week told the story of Stanley's heroic action in an AP dispatch, a part of which is printed here:

"Armed with only a light carbine he arose and walked across that open road in the face of the blazing machine gun firing as he walked.

FALLS SHOOTING

"Somehow he managed to outshoot the machine gunner without getting scratched and once their main weapon was neutralized the Germans quickly withdrew.

"But even as they went one retreating Nazi tossed a grenade back at Stanley and a fragment of it did the job.

"The rest of his pals knew Stanley had saved their lives and they told the story where it would do the most good and get official recognition.

"The citation mentioned Stanley's full name--Staff Sgt. Stanley T. Ichiki but it did not mention his slanting Nisei eyes which shot so accurately.

"It did not mention the reason why he felt that he could not go home to California from where he entered the army -- because his father had been transported out of there.

STORY UNTOLD

"It did not add that the only reason he did not want to return to the West Coast home he had left was his well earned quiet soldier's pride, which would not permit him to go anywhere he was considered undesirable.

"All it said after telling how Sergeant Ichiki saved his comrades' lives was this:

"His courageous and forthright action remain an inspiration to those with whom he served and exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States"

KEHOE PREPARES NOVEL ON NISEI

Miss Karon Kehoe, former staff member at Rivers, has won the Dodd, Mead Intercollegiate Fellowship competition for her now projected novel, City in the Sun, which has its setting in a relocation center. It is the story of a Japanese American boy, Kim, who grows up in a relocation center.

Miss Kehoe, who is attending Hunter College in New York City, submitted a 15,000 word sample and a detailed plan of the whole work, as the contest required by April 1. Her contract calls for two more novels following this one.

She will receive \$100 a month for a year while she is completing the book.

Miss Kehoe has also won a scholarship to Yale University for this summer, and is one of five undergraduates to be chosen to attend the Institute for Alcoholism.

Her sister, Dr. Monika Kehoe, remembered here as head of the adult education department, has also written articles on the Japanese American problems.

PET SHIPMENT

EVACUEES MAY SHIP CATS, DOGS

Pets such as cats and dogs may be shipped in accordance with state laws and regulation, stated Malcolm E. Pitts, acting WRA director.

Since most railroads will accept pets such as cats and dogs as checkable baggage and transport them in the baggage car on the personal transportation ticket of the traveler, evacuees desiring to ship pets shall be permitted to do so provided the pets are transported as a part of the free baggage allowance they are entitled to under their personal transportation ticket. If the evacuees are unwilling to so use their free baggage allowance, shipment will be made at their expenses.

The shipment of pets is subject to state laws and regulations; all such laws and regulations must be complied with. Passenger agents will be able to furnish full particulars in each case.

STAY AWAY FROM VEGETABLE FIELD

Residents of Rivers are asked to refrain from going out to the vegetable fields and picking vegetables without the permission of the farm management or from the mess operation.

Residents are receiving their vegetables at the mess halls, and they are asked not to go out to the fields for more.

ISSEI DOCTOR IN NEW YORK DIES

Dr. Toyohiko Campbell Takami, a specialist in skin diseases, died May 17 at his home in Brooklyn, N.Y. He was 70 years old.

He served on the staffs of Cumberland and Prospect Heights Hospitals. He also was an instructor in dermatology at the Cornell University Medical College and Bellevue Hospital and was a member of the board of the Biological Association of Cold Spring Harbor.

He leaves his wife and six children.

Guilford is near the ocean and the weather is temperate. Apples are raised, small fruits, truck gardens abound. Berries are also grown. Large poultry farms are in the vicinity.

Friends Help In Des Moines

Cornell Hewson, of the sales promotion department of Grocers Wholesale, will serve as chairman of the Des Moines' Citizen Relocation Committee, Miss Prudence Ross, acting relocation supervisor of the North Central Area, has announced. Hewson replaces Robert Root, editorial writer for the Des Moines Register and Tribune, who has resigned to accept an assignment as correspondent for the World Council of Churches in Switzerland.

Mr. and Mrs. Hewson, members of the American Friends Service Committee, have been active in helping Japanese families relocate since the day of evacuation. When the first Nisei students appeared on the Drake University campus in January of 1943, several of them made their home with the Hewson family and others have done so since.

More than 500 Japanese Americans have settled in the Des Moines district, half of them in Des Moines and the others in 50 widely scattered towns and communities of Iowa. Temporary housing is available at the Friends Hostel in Des Moines.

The Cards who were silenced up to now began ticking by scoring a digit in the third and again in the fifth when Yamamoto momentarily lost control walking three and giving 2 hits, the Cards cracked through for 3 big runs.

In the top half of the sixth, the Taiyos tallied a digit on Ohashi's double and an error to make the score 6 to 4 in their favor.

The fighting Cards proved to be far from through as they came to bat in the last of the sixth banging out 3 hits to pour across 2 runs to even the score and Yamamoto had to apply every technique to retire the sides.

Egusa retired the sides in order for the Cards in the seventh and eighth innings.

However, with darkness closing, the Cards banged out 2 successive hits after one away in the last of the eighth inning to put the winning runs on base, but Yamamoto remained cool as a cucumber inducing the next batter to force the runner on first, then working over "Freezer" Furuya very carefully, he ended the close game by fanning him.

Tom Ehara clouted 3 hits to pace the hitters while Mas Hiramoto and George Egusa followed closely with 2 hits.

NISEI FIGHT IS TWO-FOLD

(New York Times editorial)

"No soldiers we have sent abroad have a more distinguished record than these Nisei. On the record none surpasses them in loyalty, devotion or courage. More than 17,600 have been inducted into the Army. The men of the famous 100th Battalion are typical. They were originally Hawaiian volunteers but heavy losses brought replacements from many sections. Distinguished Service Medals are a common place. Private Jesse Hirato won his by seizing a shovel when his rifle jammed, charging an enemy nest and capturing its occupants armed with a machine-pistol, files, and grenades.

"Most of the Nisei want to fight in the Pacific. They believe that, raised in the institutions of democracy, they are better soldiers than Japanese of their own generation, trained to savagery and hate. But they do not differ in appearance from our Pacific enemy and would invite attempts at enemy infiltration. Some are used there as interpreters and specialists but they have seen combat service chiefly in Italy and France. Thus far they have won every fight they have been in. But their hardest fight is still ahead and may outlast the war. It is the fight against prejudice roused by color of skin and slant of eye. It is easy to admire them while they are still in uniform. It would be kinder to remember and reward them when the battle is over."

MOST DECORATED UNIT

The 100th Infantry Battalion, composed of Nisei soldiers who spearheaded Fifth Army advances through Italy, has become the most decorated unit in Army history, according to an article in the June issue of the American Mercury magazine.

The battalion has a record of just two AWOL

**Parlier Gunman
Gets Probation**

Levi Multanen, 33, a Fresno rancher, pleaded guilty last week to firing two shots into the home of a returned Japanese American and drew a six months' suspended sentence in Justice Court at Parlier, Calif., the S. F. Chronicle reported.

Multanen, the first man arrested for shooting at Japanese Americans in Fresno county, told Judge L. B. Crosby that he hadn't heard from his soldier nephew in the South Pacific for a long time, and that he was worried and "very mad at the Japs."

The Judge warned him against further illegal acts and placed on him probation for six months.

cases-- those when two wounded soldiers left the hospital to join their advancing unit.

Typical of their exploits is cited the case of the late S/Sgt. Kazuo Masuda, whose parents reside in Gila.

Masuda was leading a six-man mortar squad against well entrenched Germans near Castellina when they were halted by terrific enemy fire. Carrying a mortar tube under his right arm and an extra steel helmet in his left hand, alternately running and sidestepping like a halfback, he dashed 25 yards up the slope. He filled his extra helmet with dirt and anchored the mortar in it. Squatting beside his improvised emplacement, he wrapped his legs around the tube and without sight or bipod calculated the deflection and opened fire. Though Nazi bullets peppered the ground around him, Masuda kept on firing until his ammunition ran out. Then he went back for two more cases of ammunition and poured shells into the enemy until they withdrew in confusion.

RADIO MAN FROM GILA WINS ARMY BRONZE STAR

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--One of the first volunteers from the Gila River Relocation Center in Rivers, Arizona, Sergeant Charles S. Mayeda, radio maintenance man of the 3rd Battalion, 442nd Japanese American Combat Team, recently was awarded the

Bronze Star for meritorious service in combat. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Yoshitaro Mayeda of Rivers.

Mayeda, formerly from Vacaville, Calif., was decorated by Major General Edward M. Almond, commander of the Fifth Army's 92nd "Buffalo" Division at a victory ceremony in Genoa a few days before the final Allied victory in Italy.

Mayeda was decorated for action during the Battle for Germany in the heavily wooded and mountainous Vosges Forests of northeastern France.

The Nazis' heavy artillery and mortar concentration disrupted wire communication so constantly radio contact became a necessity. During a particularly intense barrage, Company I's radio was damaged. Mayeda dashed 30 yards through the barrage to his trailer for basic repair parts and equipment. Without waiting for the shelling to cease, he ran another 100 yards and repaired the radio.

He repaired radios throughout the day and voluntarily operated the company radio during the night when the section was reduced to two men because of enemy action.

CIO STOCKTON UNIT RESENTS NISEI

The executive board of CIO Warehousemen's Local No. 6 in San Francisco met last week to hear the report of President Richard Lyndon on his suspensions of the local's Stockton unit for refusal to work with a Japanese Americans.

Lyndon reported he had placed Joseph Lynch, vice president of the local, in charge of the suspended unit to administer it until members of the unit unwilling to work with Japanese Americans have either changed their attitudes or been expelled from membership in the union.

Members were asked to sign anti-discrimination pledge cards which concludes with these words:

"I, as a member of the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union, will not refuse to work with any person because of such person's race, color, or creed, including Americans of Japanese origin."

RELOCATION AID AVAILABLE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES

RIVERS HIGH SCHOOLS GRADUATE 230 SENIORS

Resettlement assistance for families of three or more members who need help in buying household equipment or furniture during the first month of relocation is now available at the welfare offices in either Butte or Canal. This service was formerly given by local welfare agencies in various parts of the country to evacuees after they had relocated.

BASIS OF NEED

Project Director Bennett said that this assistance is available only on the basis of need and can only be available to one-tenth of the families in the center. This WRA assistance will be available only to those who need temporary help in reestablishing themselves and their households. Needs will include household equipment, transportation of goods from railway stations to residence, and one month's rent.

Single persons or couples without children are ineligible for resettlement assistance because it is assumed they can get furnished apartments. Families returning to their old homes which are furnished would also be ineligible as well as those who take jobs where furnished housing is provided by employer.

DEDUCTIONS

When a family applies for this assistance, cash resources such as currency on hand, funds in a bank, loan association, U. S. Postal Savings account, the market value of bonds, major items of personal property or income anticipated from property or investments will have to be deducted from the maximum amount allowable for such a family.

Resettlement assist -

Two hundred and thirty seniors received graduation diplomas at exercises held in Canal and Butte school auditorium Thursday and Friday.

Canal High School graduated 94, of which 21 were given in absentia. The valedictorian Kazuko Deguchi returned from Kingsburg, Calif., to deliver her address, "Relocation." Kinji Imada was salutatorian. Joe Mori received the science award, and the Casa Grande American Legion medals went to Hisako Sasaki and Roy Kuramoto.

GOLD STAR AWARDS

LAW ABDICATED

(Editorial from Arizona Daily Star, June 3, 1945)

"...In the town of Parlier, Calif., the law abdicated in favor of community opinion, in the case of the farmer who fired a shotgun into the home of Charles Iwasaki, a Japanese American. The guilty man was given a six-month sentence--suspended.

"L.B. Crosby, the justice of peace, defended his leniency with the plea that feeling in the community was such that he did not feel that public opinion would support any other sentence. The community decided that if he was lenient with the guilty man, there would be no more shootings! In other words, the law abdicated in favor of a localized public opinion, which in this instance is merely polite terminology for mob rule.

"It will be our national shame, and not merely a matter of one state, if this situation is not corrected. Those Nisei were removed from their homes and business due to an army order under the stress of military necessity. Most of them have behaved in a manner which displayed exceptional poise and dignity under extreme stress. Now, the government which ordered them removed, has issued orders for their return. It is up to the government to see that they are permitted to return to their homes and businesses without being met with gun fire and arson at the hands of some super-patriots. It is equally a task for the government which moved them to see to it that they have the protection, under the law to which they are entitled. They obeyed the law when they were moved. The law should insure them safety as they return.

"Any other action, such as the one taken at Parlier, is an abdication of law in the face of mob rule, regardless of what pretty words are used by the justice of peace to explain his leniency. It takes little imagination to figure out what would have happened in Parlier had the shotgun been fired into the other man's home by Iwasaki."

**Correction On
Co-op Payments**

Gila River Co-operative Enterprises' general reserve payment was mistaken for the revolving fund payment in the last issue of the News-Courier which appeared June 6.

What was decided by the Congress of Delegates is that 50 per cent of the total general reserve for the two fiscal years (July 23, 1942 to June 30, 1944) will be paid to residents sometime this month. The order in which the blocks will be paid depends on when the block delegates handed in the name lists.

This payment is 50 per cent of the general reserve fund for the two-year period and has nothing to do with the revolving fund certificates.

Under this new procedure, which went into effect on June 5, relocators should ask for their ration books at 69-11 the day before they depart so that there will not be a last minute rush for ration books. Thursday mornings bus was delayed 40 minutes because some relocators did not have ration books.

When Gen. Mark Clark visited Chicago for Memorial Day ceremonies at which 13 men in his command received honorable discharge including T/Sgt. Goro Tsuchida of Chicago, the WRA officer sent General Clark a telegram expressing appreciation for the tributes he has accorded Japanese American soldiers in Italy. This is General Clark's reply from Washington:

"I and the Officers and men who accompanied me from Italy were deeply impressed by the tremendous honor paid us in Chicago. I realize that the honor was intended for the fine Americans who have won this war in Europe. It has always been a privilege for me to have under command the Japanese Americans of the 100th Bn. and 442nd Combat team. They have always fought magnificently, so selflessly and successfully. They have made a great contribution to the final victory we had in Italy."

WRA FORMS NEW EAST COAST AREA

Japanese Hold Memorial Rites

First Memorial Day services for the dead of Japanese ancestry in Los Angeles since the year of evacuation were held May 30 at Evergreen Cemetery, Los Angeles. About 100 Nisei and issei participated.

"We hope that the community will try to persuade girls with nurses' aides experience to return to their posts, and do so as a community responsibility," stated Miss Priscilla Parker, chief nurse.

RESERVE CORPS STATUS CANCELED EFFECTIVE JUNE

Effective from this month, all citizens of Japanese ancestry and those Japanese aliens who volunteer for induction and who are forwarded by their selective service local boards for induction will not be transferred to the enlisted reserve corps after induction, the leave office was notified yesterday. Such registrants will be inducted and forwarded to reception centers for processing and assignment in accordance with current instructions for other registrants.

Nisei and aliens who volunteer and who have been or will be inducted and transferred to the enlisted reserve prior to June 1, 1945, will be called to active service not later than June 30, 1945.

Summer Classes Are Voluntary

The Butte Elementary School will open its summer session Monday, June 18.

**PFC. WADA WINS
STAR FOR VALOR**

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY -- Pfc. Takashi Wada of Sanger, Calif., whose mother lives at 4-8-C in Canal, recently was awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement in action.

The presentation was made by Lieutenant Colonel Alfred A. Pursall of Crystal City, Mo., commander of the 3rd Battalion, 442nd Japanese American Combat Team, at a ceremony in Carrara, famous marble mining town in northern Italy.

Wada was cited for risking his life to rescue an injured comrade when their unit was attached to the 36th "Texas" Division and fighting in the French Vosges Mountains.

During a German artillery barrage, a loosened boulder rolled over a slit trench, crushing the occupant and leaving him exposed to flying shell fragments. Wada and another rifleman, heedless of the danger, exposed themselves above ground and extricated the injured man.

Wada administered first aid while the other went for a litter. Then they evacuated the casualty.

Wada also holds a Distinguished Unit Badge, the Purple Heart, a battle star for the Rome-Arno campaign on the Fifth Army front, the Good Conduct Medal and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

Camp life may have stunted the growth of evacuees in various ways, but it has not in education. Could have one high school student. \$100 to \$150 plus quarters with radio, light, bath, chicken and eggs, garden plot, access to swimming pool. Light work gathering eggs, grading, packing. Could work to 80 or 85 years.

Another is an apple orchard and vegetable farm. A couple or family, \$100 for the man with quarters, for family plus light, water radio, heating plant, garden plot. If wife cares to do house work, she would get prevailing wages. Man must understand pruning, speak English, drive truck and tractor.

Dairyman would furnish 7-room quarters, 2 quarts milk daily and pay \$150 for dairyman who understand cows.

All employers insist the jobs are post war permanent.

Eviction Suit Win

Evacuee Masayuki Fujimoto won an eviction suit in a Portland, Ore., circuit court on May 28 before Judge E.M. Page, when the jury returned a verdict in favor of permitting Fujimoto to regain possession and control of his property, which he had leased.

SECOND ACTION

The Oregon Journal of May 29, which reported the decision, stated that the jury was locked up just 15 minutes before returning the verdict.

This is the second action in the Clackamas circuit court in which the lease agreement was found to be in favor of Fujimoto's regaining possession and control of his property. The first was tried without a jury before Judge Earl C. Latourette, who found the agreement meant that Fujimoto's repossession should occur when he gave notice that he wished to return, if the War Department permitted evacuated Japanese to return to their former homes.

The defense in both cases was that the war emergency is not over. But the plaintiff's agreement, that the emergency as it affected his return to his property near Damascus was ended when the army permitted him to return to the coast, was upheld.

FAVORABLE DECISION

These decisions indicate that the legal interpretation of "war emergency" or "duration" in regard to the return of evacuees to the West Coast will be that as long as the Army permits an evacuee to return, the emergency has ended for him. In other words it is likely that a returnee, who had leased property "for the emergency" or "for the duration," will now be able to regain possession if he so desires, through court action if the lessor refuses to leave or transfer possession.

STUDENTS GET COOK TRAINING

Cooking classes for the purpose of giving people, who might be interested in domestic or cooking jobs, when they relocate, some practical training has been meeting under Dr. Grace Lawson. The course is primarily for adults and to teach the people to get jobs outside.

When the courses are completed next Tuesday, each student will receive a certificate of completion. No person who has previously taken work under Dr. Lawson is eligible to attend these classes.

New students may register at the Butte mess operations for the same course to be repeated beginning June 25.

Fred Minakata, assistant senior steward, has been Dr. Lawson's chief assistant.

WRA**Nisei Casualty Hits 750 Mark**

Nisei soldiers, who so next of kin have been or are in WRA centers, have suffered a total of 750 casualties, of which, 166 are killed, according to a WRA statistics report published on June 2.

573 have been wounded and 11 are listed as missing.

Of the centers Mini-doka leads with 34 dead, 90 wounded, and 2 missing. Granada had 23 dead, 74 wounded, and 2 missing. Colorado River suffered 14 killed 81 wounded, and 2 missing.

Gila River is listed as fourth with 15 killed, 60 wounded and 1 missing, followed by Rohwer with 23 killed, 47 wounded, and 3 missing.

Manzanar has the least with 3 killed and 14 wounded.

DECISION FORCE ILLEGAL IN EXCLUSION

Ruling that the military authorities had no power to enforce exclusion orders against Americans of Japanese descent, or of any descent, Judge Peirson M. Hall of the Federal District Court at Los Angeles last Friday ordered an injunction to issue restraining Major General H.C. Pratt, Western Defense Commander, from interfering with or preventing by military or physical force the right of Elmer Yamamoto, Dr. George Oohikubo and Kiyoshi Shigekawa to return to California and the Pacific Coast.

All are American citizens of Japanese ancestry. The test cases were supported by the American Civil Liberties Union to secure a court ruling as to whether the exercise of military force in the enforcement of military exclusion orders is constitutional.

JUDGE HALL

Judge Hall took the view that it was unnecessary for him to decide whether the individual exclusion orders issued by the military authorities of themselves were unconstitutional, since he ruled that the military orders can legally be enforced only in the Federal civil courts; and that when a subject of an exclusion order is prosecuted in the Federal courts for violation of an Act of Congress which makes it a crime to disobey a military order, he would then be given full opportunity to have his claim that the military order was unconstitutional passed upon by the Federal courts.

GRAVE CONSEQUENCE

Although holding that the courts could not pass upon the question of military necessity, and that the question was for the decision by the military authorities, Judge Hall outlined the grave consequences of the unlimited exercise of military power over the entire civilian population along the Pacific Coast as well as the entire United States.

CANAL SUMMER SESSION BEGINS MONDAY

Cooperation from all block managers or others coming into possession of undelivered checks will be greatly appreciated, he said.

CALIFORNIA ATTACKS AROUSE FRIENDLY GROUPS

The few anti-Japanese incidents in California, while unfortunate for the victims concerned, have worked to the advantage of returnees as a whole, Robert Cozzens, assistant WRA director, explained at the Block Managers meeting last week.

The fair minded people have been aroused to take positive action toward aiding returnees instead of remaining silent, he stated. For example in Merced County, the welfare agency which had refused aid to returnees, voted overwhelmingly in favor of helping returnees after one of the anti-Japanese shootings. There have been 3,000 or 4,000 good things against the 19 anti cases, he pointed out.

There are about 1,400 persons relocated in the Fresno area and from 800 to 1,000 in the other parts of San Joaquin Valley.

Cozzens mentioned the Hood River incident which backfired on the perpetrators. The Nisei names had been freshly painted out from the service honor roll. When they were restored because of nationwide condemnation, the Nisei names stood out as never before because they had backgrounds of fresh white paint.

Attacks Against Nisei Deplored

The people of California have been urged by the Military order of the Purple Heart to put an end to terror attacks against Japanese Americans.

The State Department of the order of those wounded in battle deplored the growing discrimination against the Nisei in concluding its weekend convention.

Fund Proposed For Student Aid

A proposal to form a Japanese American Students' Scholarship Fund has been originated by the Butte Community Council and will be sent to the seven WRA centers for approval of having such a fund in all centers.

The scholarship fund, if approved, will be granted as loans to worthy and needy Nisei students on the recommendation from their respective colleges. The loan is to be made without interest during the student's school years and will be repaid to the fund after graduation.

The fund will be administered by an office set up for the purpose. Details of administration will be decided by a committee of representatives from the various centers.

Money for this fund will come from the surplus money of various organizations such as Red Cross, PTA, community enterprises, churches, and surplus school funds. The Council wishes all organizations would give surplus money to this fund instead of spending unwisely.

CANAL CAMP WILL CLOSE BY OCTOBER SAYS MYER

The Gila River Canal Camp will be closed to evacuee occupancy no later than Oct. 1, 1945, according to an announcement just received by Project Director Leroy H. Bennett.

The announcement, signed by Director Dillon S. Myer, stated that administrative consideration, plus the fact that con-

tinued normal relocation should in itself depopulate Canal on or before that date, made the decision necessary. It also stated that units II and III at the Colorado River Center would be closed by the same date, for the same reasons.

3 MONTH NOTICE

The announcements were made at this time in accordance with WRA's previously stated policy of giving the residents three months advance notice before closing centers or units.

Myer stated, "During the next three months, I am confident that you and your staff, with the cooperation of the evacuee committees, can work out relocation plans with all residents of the Canal Camp. If need be, the Washington Office will provide additional assistance, and I am asking all field offices of the authority to render special services to the Gila River and Colorado River Centers during this closing period."

TRANSFERS LIMITED

It is expected that all residents of Canal will relocate before Oct. 1. Transfers to Butte will be permitted only in those individual cases where WRA is not able to complete final relocation arrangements for persons needing continued public assistance or some form of institutional care.

The Director's letter announcing closing of three units sent to all projects, also asked that appointive staff and evacuee leaders work out recommendations for setting of individual center closing dates, prior to Jan. 1 where feasible, as determined by present and probable relocation rates.

Santa Barbarans Meet Tonight

Eric Thomsen, district relocation officer from Santa Barbara, will meet tonight with residents formerly from Ventura, Santa Barbara, and San Luis Obispo counties in a round table discussion on sentiment and conditions in that area. The meeting will start 7:30 at mess hall 52.

Thomsen and Taki Asakura, former Gilan, arrived from Santa Barbara yesterday and will meet with groups and individuals who are interested in the Santa Barbara area. Thomsen probably will leave this Friday, but Asakura expects to stay for a week or ten days.

At tonight's meeting both men will be present to discuss relocation problems and answer questions.

TRANSPORTATION BY BUS SOUGHT

The Arizona Corporation Commission took under advisement following a hearing Friday an application of the Greyhound Pacific bus lines for authority to transport passengers from the Gila River Relocation Center to Chandler and Phoenix, according to an AP report.

The Greyhound Lines seek a certificate of necessity and convenience to provide the transportation.

MYER —

To Inspect WRA On West Coast

Southern California War Relocation Authority facilities are to undergo the inspection of Dillon S. Myer, national director.

Myer will spend three days in Los Angeles beginning June 18, going to Fresno for a conference of key personnel from Los Angeles, Seattle, and San Francisco on June 22.

In announcing the Myer inspection, Supervisor Paul G. Robertson made public the latest government estimates on returned evacuees, showing that since January 2, when the Army lifted the mass exclusion ban, to May 31, a total of 1022 persons relocated in the nine Southern California counties. Of these, 911 settled in Los Angeles.

Nisei Veterans Reach New York

Japanese American members of the 100th Division were among the nearly 2,000 servicemen who arrived home on the super-transport Gen. W. P. Richardson which docked at the New York port on June 5, according to the New York Times of June 6.

Soldiers of the Thirty-Fourth Division highly praised the fighting qualities of the Japanese Americans and some stated that the Nisei Battalion was one of the finest in the Army.

BUTTE LIBRARY GETS NEW BOOKS

Two new books have been added to the Butte community library rental shelf, said Sumi Yoshida, librarian.

"China to Me," by Emily Hahn, is a partial autobiography. She tells of her life in China during the critical years 1935-43. Miss Hahn witnessed the great events of China as a newspaperwoman.

COMMUNITY DISGRACE

It is an insult to decency and to the draftees and their friends, when a community-wide sendoff ceremony for Army draftees begins to take on the aspect of a carnival or a festival.

DECENCY LACKING

What we have in mind specifically is last Friday's sendoff ~~from~~ at the Butte amphitheater. The young privates sat on the stage, flanked by representatives of the Council, the administration, and the Servicemen's Relatives Association. To the six young men on the stage, the occasion was no less solemn than it was for the first group of draftees which left on May 18 of last year, several of whom are already dead.

At Friday's sendoff the aged parents, wives, and brothers and sisters of these draftees, their heads bare in deference, stood at attention far to the sidelines, shoved there because others occupied the entire area in front of the stage. The "others" were movie fans who had occupied the best spots in anticipation of the movie to follow and the empty blankets they had laid out for friends to occupy later. And this in spite of the Community Council's request that blankets must not be spread in the area until after the sendoff!

A CHANGE NEEDED

If the movie is so important that we can't even sacrifice a few minutes of our time to show due respect to our soldiers, then the sendoff program should be held away from the movie grounds. And if the lack of microphones makes it impossible to hold both sendoff and movie on the same evening, and if the movie cannot be delayed, then the community sendoff ceremony must be sacrificed.

If it were our brothers or sons who were being sent to the Army, we would much rather send him off quietly, sincerely, and solemnly from our own homes, rather than be placed on a stage and insulted before a group of people who not only come just to see the movie but who at the same time prevent parents and friends of the boys from participating in the ceremony.

LA WRA ANNOUNCES 1,007 RETURNEES

The reports officer of Los Angeles reports the best estimated monthly arrival of relocators during the month of May to the Southern California area.

Los Angeles district leads with 216 relocators on May and 911 up to date, San Diego district follows with 30 in May 73 up to date, Santa Barbara district has 4 in May and 15 up to date, El Centro district 1 in May and 3 up to date, and Santa Ana district has not yet been reported in.



A news sheet published by the Council explaining that this organization shall encourage every person of Japanese descent to perform faithfully all his duties and obligations as an American and as a member of the state and the community in which he resides.

The main object of the Milwaukee Nisei Council is to help the resettlers become united.

TRAVELERS URGED TO TAKE SHEETS

Evacuees and appointed personnel headed for Southern California are urged to carry a pillow slip and a sheet or two in their traveling bags.

This wartime note comes from Paul G. Robertson of Los Angeles, who says it applies both to those who will start at the hostels and to those who will live temporarily with friends.

Some hostels have no linen, while others can offer only bleached muslin substitutes.

HOSTEL RULING EASES HOUSING

WRA has removed the limitation of three weeks residence from West Coast hostels furnished with center surplus stock. Hereafter families moving into Coast hostels will be subject only to the policies on residence set by the sponsors of these temporary homes.

The rescinding of the restriction will make it easier for entire families to return together, thus permitting more than one member of a family to spend time finding a permanent house or apartment. WRA-furnished hostels now may, at their discretion, allow a family to remain in these temporary quarters until the family finds permanent housing.

CLEVELAND CALLS RELOCATION MEET

At the call of the Cleveland Resettlement Committee, delegates of similar committees from ten cities in the Great Lakes area convened in Cleveland on June 1 and 2 to discuss relocation.

Eighteen separate recommendations dealing with community adjustment, housing, employment, and community services summarized the findings of the two-day meeting. The conference directed these to the community councils as well as to WRA personnel in the centers. A number of committees were established to give life to these recommendations.

Delegates came from Ann Arbor and Detroit, Mich.; Pittsburgh, Penn.; Buffalo, N. Y.; Columbus, Cincinnati, Wooster, Dayton, Warren, Toledo, and Cleveland, Ohio.

However, Lefty Fujioka was less successful as he was touched for a digit in the fifth, sixth and seventh innings.


Of the 12 hits garnered by the winners T. Hasegawa, T. Nishino, Y. Ushiro and M. Kikuchi collected 2 hits apiece.

Trade Schools Open To Nisei

There are good business and trade schools in all big cities for students who wish to enroll, said Dr. J. C. Reagan, Butte student relocation adviser. Trade courses in any occupation can be taken in short, intensive, speed-up courses or in a long thorough plan of study.

A directory of opportunities for vocational training in New York City may be obtained at the Butte student relocation office. This bulletin was published by the Vocational Advice Service and is being circulated by Priscilla Ayres, relocation officer in the New York City area. Miss Ayres states that the Service is equipped to handle family relocation, and students who wish to enroll in vocational schools are urged to relocate with their families wherever possible. Payment of tuition and registration fees in advance is strongly discouraged by the relocation offices. This is because many offers made to uninformed students are not authentic.

More information concerning vocational schools may be obtained at the relocation office.

was asked to clarify some of the details announced by Myer. Shelly stated that the Director's announcement means this:

1. Generally speaking there will be no transfers from Canal to Butte.

2. All those who, in the opinion of WRA, do not need financial or institutional help must automatically relocate.

3. For others who need continued assistance on the outside or institutional care, WRA will contact local counties (counties where evacuees formerly lived) and arrange for aid. Families for which arrangements for such aid is completed must relocate.

4. Those for whom continued assistance on the outside is needed but for whom arrangements are not completed by WRA -- they will be designated for transfer to Butte. It will be for WRA to decide who may transfer and who may not.

All families in Canal will be investigated whether they apply for aid or not, to determine whether they need or do not need aid.

Asked whether this isn't forced relocation Shelly replied, "When you come right down to it, it is forced relocation. It was forced relocation when the proposed closing of all centers by Jan. 2, 1946, was announced. And in a way this new announcement is discriminating against Canal residents but that can not be helped. It is Director Myer's edict," he added.

According to Washington order, all residents except those on the Army or immigration stop lists must relocate. Repatriates and expatriates must relocate the same as anyone else.

ATTACK VICTIM ASKS WHY

(San Francisco Chronicle, June 14, 1945)

Editor--Whenever I look at the holes left by the buckshot which ripped through my home I begin to wonder whether peace officers really mean it when they say the equal protection of the law will be given to all.

WHY LENIENCE?

For shooting through my home with a gun, Levi Multanen received a six months suspended sentence upon his plea of guilty. This is the first arrest in 21 shooting incidents against returned evacuees of Japanese ancestry in California since January 2, 1945. There have been four attacks in my area within a week.

But in my own case and others there are some things I can't understand. For instance:

Why aren't Multanen's shotgun and high-powered rifle confiscated? Why isn't Multanen arrested for felony? He could have killed someone in my house. Why does Justice Crosby have to consult the voters before giving out a decision?

IT BREEDS LAWLESSNESS

Why does the Attorney General of California, Robert W. Kenny, say "One of the first jobs of a police chief or law enforcement officer, is to keep his job"? The first job of a peace officer is to enforce the law. That's why he was elected. Is that why Attorney General Kenney and Governor Warren do nothing but hold their jobs?

As an American citizen, voter and taxpayer, I'd like the answers. It seems to me if we can't master lawlessness, then lawlessness is going to master us, beginning with Fresno.

SOLDIER

'DOWN WITH BIGOTRY'

A soldier who fought with the Nisei in Italy, Pfc. Philip E. Lerman, 87th Mountain Infantry, AFO 345, care Postmaster, New York, urged Stockton Longshoremen to work with Nisei. His letter, written to the San Francisco Chronicle, reads in part:

"I want to take the privilege as an American trade-unionist, and a soldier to excoriate the type of worker that refuses to work with a Nisei.

"Just a short month and a half ago my company pushed off on the offensive that saw the complete defeat of Nazism at its end. We had fought in the mountains and finally broke through to the Po valley.

"All this was made possible because a regiment of Japanese Americans, had a few days previous, started a diversionary attack on the Ligurian coast.

"These men did not stop to consider what you would do or say. They picked up their weapons and savagely advanced against the Nazi.

"Those of us who have had the privilege to fight alongside the Nisei look upon him as a brother, a comrade who has fought and suffered with us as Americans. We do not ask you to let them work with you. WE DEMAND IT.

"We have not left our homes, our wives and children, our future to allow men like you to start another holocaust in 10 years. Yours is the mentality that breeds Fascism. Too many Americans of Japanese, Irish, Slavic, Jewish, Negro and other descants have died to give you the privilege to live in our midst.

"To the union trialecmmitee I say, 'Hats Off!' Make our homes worth coming back to. Down with bigotry and ignorance."

MONTEREY CANNERY AWAITS EVACUEE RETURN

Louis Martin, head of the Fish Company workers Union at Monterey, states that close to 500 persons of Japanese ancestry are in good standing in the Monterey Cannery Union. Anticipating the return of evacuee workers, he has made a survey of the possibility of their employment in the fishing industry. He stated that without doubt, any and all of the former evacuees employed in the industry would be welcomed by the industry and by the union, should they desire to return in the coming season.

The canneries expect to start on August 1 and they generally run continuously for six and a half months. During the peak of the season, there is much overtime work. There are jobs on both salary and piece work basis for both men and women.

Persons interested should bear in mind they should return before August 1 to locate suitable housing. The housing situation in Monterey--like other west coast cities--is critical. However, several places owned by evacuees in Monterey may be used if they are made available. It is believed that certain housing may be secured if evacuees display sufficient interest at once.

SEATTLE PLANS RESETTLEMENT

The first meeting of the newly organized Resettlement Council of Seattle was held the evening of June 13. A proposed charter was drawn up and temporary officers and committees were appointed.

142 Issei and Nisei have resettled in the Central Ohio District according to an account just received by the Reports office. The complete story of these resettlers is presented in pamphlet form in the Japanese language. Copies entitled "New Opportunities for Issei-Nisei in Central Ohio," are available, without cost, in the newly established district offices throughout the project.

Several former residents of the Gila River Project are among those appearing in the pamphlet account. Included are Eiko Nakagaki now employed as a secretary by the Franklin Life Insurance Company in Columbus. She came to Gila from Rio Vista, Calif.

Aiko Nishi and John Nishi, former residents at 6-10-D, are also living in Columbus where she is a student at Capital University and he at Bexley High School. Their home had been in Rio Vista, Calif.

Mr. and Mrs. George Ogura and their daughter Kathleen have resettled in Columbus where Ogura is employed by the National Carloading Corporation. They had come from Gila from Los Angeles.

EDUCATION

BRONZE STAR**OKUMURA GIVEN
OAK LEAF AWARD**

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY -- S/Sgt. Masaharu Okumura, formerly of Santa Barbara, Calif., recently was awarded the Bronze Star with Oak leaf cluster for valorous conduct in action with the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team.

Okumura received his Bronze Star with Oak Leaf cluster from the 92nd "Buffalo" Division's commanding general, Maj. Gen. Edward M. Almond, at a special Fifth Army parade and awards ceremony at Novi, Italy.

The citation with the award reads, in part:

"When two riflemen on a combat patrol were severely wounded 25 yards from an enemy strongpoint in the outskirts of Le Petit Paris, France. Sergeant Okumura with utter disregard for his personal safety, crawled to the aid of the two wounded soldiers. He administered first aid and dragged them to cover, then crawled back under fire to his place in the attack. Later, during the withdrawal, he came across his officer who was seriously wounded in the head. Sergeant Okumura sent his men ahead to a safer position while he remained to administer first aid.

He remained with his wounded officer for six hours until counterattacks permitted safe withdrawal. His courage and initiative were exemplary and a credit to the Armed Forces of the United States.

CALL FOR WORKERS

The following letter was sent to the project from the mayor of Springfield, Ill.

A LETTER

"About four months ago Charles G. McCallister of the War Relocation Agency in Hartford, Connecticut came of Springfield to seek the assistance of the community in relocating loyal Japanese Americans in the Springfield area. A competent committee was chosen and despite some initial, uncontrolled unfavorable publicity, the committee has met with considerable success in preparing the community for reception for some of the dislocated citizens.

"Approximately twenty - eight offers of jobs have been received to date, including positions as farmers, houseman and housewife, shoe cobblers, and even offers of small neighborhood businesses. The local Morris Plan bank has offered to furnish financial assistance in taking over small neighborhood businesses.

FROM SPRINGFIELD ILL.

"We have arrived at a point where the local activity is running much in advance of cooperation from the federal agency. We feel that the time has arrived when it would be most advantageous for you to send one of your Japanese Americans to the Springfield area for the purpose of getting the ground knowledge of the situation so that he may take it back to the center with the expectation that he may persuade a group to come to this area.

"Unless some step like this is taken shortly, we fear that the community at large may get the erroneous impression that there is no longer a problem of relocating these citizens."

Film Comedian Lauds Nisei G.I.

The attitude of boys at the Pacific fighting fronts toward the Japanese is better than here, said Joe E. Brown, the cavern mouthed screen comedian.

"As for persecution of the Nisei here," he said, "they think its terrible. I know, I've had a number of round-table discussions with them on that subject alone."

He went on to explain that a loyal Japanese American was just as liable to be killed by his buddies as by the enemy, since many Japanese had been found dressed in American uniforms.

Brown just completed a 38,000 mile tour of the Pacific fronts.

Chicago Offers Free Schooling

It has been found that the school systems of suburban areas around Chicago will admit students who are working part-time in homes for their board and room on the same basis as other residents of the community, states a letter from W. W. Lessing, relocation officer. This means that they will be admitted without charges for tuition. Evanston, Winnetka, and Oak Park are among the communities where Nisei students have been so enrolled.

DISTRICT OFFICE HAS FARM DATA

Available in each of the 7 district offices located in Butte and in Canal are circulating kits of description information about modern farming and growing methods. These kits have been prepared and issued by the Department of Agriculture services in Washington, D.C., and therefore contain the most reliable and recent information about raising crops, fruits, and vegetables.

Included are valuable data about the care and use of soil, and the handling, storing and packing of produce. Emphasis is placed on means for getting

DRIVERS' LICENSE NOT RESTRICTED

The Department of Motor Vehicles for the State of California states there are no restrictions in the issuance of drivers' or chauffeurs' licenses. Both aliens and citizens may obtain them after passing the examination required of all applicants for licenses.

An interpreter will be provided for Issei applicants who are unable to read, and the written examination will be given orally. Issei must prove to the examiner's satisfaction that they are able to recognize all road signs and know what they mean. A driver's test and an eye test will be given in addition to the written examination.

NISEI INVITED TO ATTEND U.C.

The University of California YMCA offered its services to Gila students who plan to attend UC at Berkeley, in a letter to the student relocation counselor of Butte High School.

Registration for the summer term will be from June 28-30, 1945 and for the fall term October 25-27.

The letter points out the advantages and the disadvantages of enrolling in west coast colleges.

1. The advantages are the excellent opportunities for education offered at lower cost than most institutions; that many of the schools are tuition free.

2. The disadvantages are part time jobs which are offered are mostly offered for gardeners and domestics, and generally speaking, it is not desirable for Nisei to be typed as gardeners and domestics.

Opportunities for work in technical and professional fields after graduation may be more limited in the west than in the east, where acceptance of Nisei is more satisfactory. the largest possible produce yield and for disposing of produce profitably.

HOW TO START GROCERY STORE

Persons who want to start grocery businesses should take the following procedure, according to the OPA.

Applicants should apply to the local ration board, fill out Form No. B215 and specify in detail the number of ration points that will be required for the initial inventory stock. This estimate should be based on the first 30 days of business. After 30 days in business the applicant must submit a complete inventory of the stock on hand showing sales for that period and additional points required for the next 60 days. After the first 90 days in business the OPA will allocate a regular allotment of points for inventory stock.

It is reported that housing in pleasant surroundings is available for family groups in the Central Ohio District. Single men and women are apparently successful in obtaining accommodations in private homes. Permanent and temporary quarters are said to be obtainable in the YMCA, YWCA, and at hotels.

Carl L. Spicer, relocation officer, Central Ohio district, states that church groups, members of the resettlement committee, employers and real estate agents are actively assisting resettlers in finding desirable housing and in making community services readily available to resettlers.



RED CROSS AIDS FAMILIES OF U.S. SERVICEMEN

The Red Cross has an established home service program for servicemen, ex-servicemen, and their families. The responsibility of this program is to assist servicemen and dependents in meeting the needs which arise from the man's service in the armed forces.

Financial assistance may be required for temporary or for continuing periods. During the temporary period pending the adjudication or payment of family allowances or other government benefits and claims, home service itself gives financial assistance for basic maintenance as food, clothing, shelter, fuel, and medical care. It does not refer such cases to other agencies.

In meeting community needs, home service draws upon the national and community resources, and recognizes the responsibility of the government for basic maintenance.

In cases involving special and non-recurring financial needs home service, in general, assists through referrals to other agencies, as it is clear that the Red Cross cannot itself continuously meet all such needs of the families of ten million servicemen.

Home service functions include communications, information, benefits and claims, and reports.

The pay? "It's \$35 a week," she said. "That's the standard rate for cub reporters in Los Angeles, and I'm tickled over getting my chance to break in."

KANSANS ATTEND HOSTEL OPENING

About 300 Kansas Citizens attended the open house last Sunday afternoon at the Kansas City Hostel, 2411 Independence Avenue. Among them were many of the more than 400 persons of Japanese descent who are students or employed in the community.

The visitors were registered at the door, served with punch, and escorted through the large building which once served as the Independence Avenue Methodist church parsonage. The well-wishers, arriving between 3:30 and 7 o'clock, expressed congratulations on the results of the complete renovating and re-decorating by the various groups backing the project.

Dr. George Nagamoto, temporary director, and Francis O'Malley of the United States Department of the Interior, greeted the visitors, explaining the new facilities for housing Japanese Americans as they arrive in Kansas City from relocation centers and while they are being located in jobs and living quarters here. Cooking, dining, and social facilities are on the first floor, bedrooms on the second floor and dormitory and recreational possibilities on the third.

Carl L. Spicer, relocation officer in Columbus for the past two years, will divide his time between his present station in central Ohio and the Cincinnati office in southern Ohio until further notice, announced Robert M. Cullum, Great Lakes area supervisor.

Both of the offices will remain open and fully staffed -- Louise Fletemeyer will continue full time in her capacity as associate relocation officer in Cincinnati and William Mackey, associate relocation officer, will be at the Columbus office.

NISEI SEEK REHEARING

Urging the Supreme Court of the United States to reconsider its order refusing to allow an appeal in the case of Minoru Tamesa, Heart Mountain evacuee, convicted for a violation of the draft law, a Petition for Rehearing was filed last week with the Supreme Court by Attorney A.L. Wirin.

REFUSE DRAFT PHYSICAL

Tamesa, with 62 other Heart Mountain evacuees, was convicted by Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy at Cheyenne, Wyoming, for having refused to report for a physical examination in compliance with an order of his Local Draft Board. Tamesa and the other Heart Mountain Nisei took the position that since they were virtually prisoners of war by virtue of their detention in concentration camps they were not free persons within the provisions of the draft law, and hence were not subject to a draft board order to serve in the armed forces. The Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals at Denver upheld the three year sentence imposed upon Tamesa and the 62 other Heart Mountain Nisei.

CERTIORARI DENIED

On May 28, the Supreme Court of the United States denied a "Petition for a Writ of Certiorari" without opinion. The Petition for Rehearing seeks to have that order denying the appeal set aside. This latest Petition is directed at criticism of a former decision by the Supreme Court, in which the Court ruled that the courts cannot review an order of a local draft board unless the person receiving the order complies with it and goes into the Army.

CORRECTION

It's Springfield, Mass.

We correct here an error which appeared in the June 27 issue, page 2, where we printed a letter from the Mayor of Springfield, calling for the federal agency to cooperate with his city in filling job offers and helping evacuees relocate.

The letter was sent by Mayor J. Albin Anderson, Jr., of Springfield, Mass., not Springfield, Ill., as erroneously printed in the previous issue.

Mayor Anderson is the chairman of the Springfield, (Mass.) Relocation Committee, which is organized to assist resettlers in finding housing, jobs, and social relationships in cooperation with WRA. He has been working to create a receptive atmosphere in the city. It was after he had lined up about 30 jobs for resettlers and had received little or no response that he asked WRA to take steps to fill those positions.

Springfield, Mass., is the home of the famous "Springfield Plan" which comprises a program of education from kindergarten through high school and extension classes of adults, teaching as a standard school subject racial understanding and acceptance for all groups regardless of race, creed, and color.

ADDITION TO BUTTE LIBRARY

Inglis Fletcher's new novel, "Lusty Wind For comers: the Friends' Hostel, 2820 Winslow Avenue, and the Family House at the corner of Winslow and Oak Street.

Carolina," has been added to the Butte community library's rental shelf, said Sumi Yoshida, librarian. Three streams of action interweave to make a colorful narrative, ending with a dramatic climax. Fletcher is also the author of "Raleigh's Eden."

REPORTS CONDITIONS IN IDAHO, OREGON AREA

After a ten days' tour of conditions and visits to the chapters of the intermountain area, National JACL President Saburo Kido returned to Salt Lake City. He commented on the great progress that the Ontario district, which is the eastern portion of Oregon, has made during the last three years. The city of Ontario is enjoying a regular boom because of the agricultural development which has taken place with the advent of the Japanese evacuees into Malheur County. As long as the population of persons of Japanese ancestry does not increase too rapidly, conditions are expected to remain favorable. The saturation point, however, may have been reached.

BAD SPOTS

Spots in Idaho appeared to be unfavorable. In Nampa and Caldwell, the old time residents seem to be treated without discrimination. But the newcomers are not welcome. There are no eating places available excepting one in each of the cities.

Here and there throughout the area of Western Idaho, there are signs, "No Japs Allowed."

FAVORABLE PARTS

In Eastern Idaho, the situation seems to be favorable. There are farms available but no applications from the centers. The potato crops have been bringing in good prices and so the farmers are optimistic about the immediate future. Public acceptance has been favorable because of the Nisei in uniform. Memorial services held in Pocatello have been attended by many Caucasian friends, and have opened the eyes of the public about the Nisei soldiers in American uniform.

The leading newspapers of Idaho have been fair and therefore have helped to check any troublesome development.

Placement Plan For Nisei Vets

A placement plan for Japanese American soldiers returning home after gallant fighting with the regiment in Italy and France has been organized by the officers of the United States 442nd Infantry Regiment.

Through arrangements by a committee of three officers, every Nisei soldier takes with him the names of men already contacted in America who will help him locate in the place and in the industry or profession he desires.

The system was arranged specifically for soldier victims of exclusion tactics on the Pacific Coast, like T/A Sagie Nishioka, Hood River, Ore.

Serving on the committee of three are Lt. William Wolf, originator, Lt. Edward R. Williams, and Capt. California Ushiro of Heart Mountain.

JACL

\$6,000 GRANT RECEIVED

The grant of \$6000 by the Rosenberg Foundation of San Francisco to assist the National JACL to operate its San Francisco office was announced today by National President Saburo Kido in Salt Lake City. The favorable news was communicated to the JACL through Mrs. Leslie Ganyard, the secretary of the foundation.

The money is to be used "to support an executive and activities related to establishment of a District Office and promotion of activities of the League in California north of Kern County to the Oregon border."

The final determination of allotments will be made by the Office of Dependency Benefits in Washington after investigation made for that office by the welfare section.

The Class A dependents will receive the following amounts each month: wife, no child-\$50; wife and 1 child-\$80; wife and 2 children-\$100; for each additional child-\$20; former wife divorced up to-\$42; former wife divorced and 1 child up to-\$72; former wife divorced and 2 children up to-\$92; for each additional child-\$20; child but no wife-\$42; for each additional child-\$20.

The Class B-1 dependents are entitled to the following amount: 1 parent-\$50; 2 parents-\$63; 1 parent and 1 brother or sister-\$63; 2 parents and 1 brother or sister-\$79; 1 brother or sister but no parent-\$42; for each additional brother or sister-\$11.
