Sgt. Sugiyama Has Busy Day in Italy

Posthumous Report on Brother of Poston's First City Clerk

In a single day, Sgt. Togo Sugiyama from Los Angeles killed eight Germans, took one prisoner and was credited with knocking out or routing four machine-gun nests near Pastina, Italy.

Sugiyama's outfit, the 442nd, was fighting with the 34th "Red Bull" Infantry Division on the Fifth Army front at the time.

In the early morning attack on Hill 119, Sugiyama first supervised his squad in setting up their heavy machine gun on a saddle-back between two hills to protect the advance of two companies of rlemen, along the forward slopes of both hills.

Having his guns and men emplaced, Sugiyama crawled along a ridge and established an observation post on a point of high ground about 75 feet away.

From his OP post the sergeant noticed an enemy machinegun and snipers firing on his gun positions from a point 150 yards away. He crawled 150 yards along the reverse side of the slope until he was opposite the enemy position. Using his Garand rifle, Sugiyama killed two snipers and drove off the machine gunners. Mr. and Mrs. Henry K. Akiyama, 12-10 D, received a telegram on Oct. 23, informing them that their son-in-law, John F. Aiso, 35, had been commissioned a major at Ft. Snelling.

Maj. Aiso, whose wife is the former Sumi Akiyama, entered the service three years ago and has been civilian director of academic training at the Snelling language school.

He was educated at Brown university, Harvard law school, Chuo university law school, and practiced law in New York.

Mrs. Aiso is a graduate of the USC school of music and was teaching violin in Los Angeles when she met her husband.

Maj. Aiso's parents reside at Manzanar.

Among the few Nisei majors, whose ranks were recently increased, is Maj. Frank Masao Ikuno, brother of Bill Ikuno, fund custodian for the local C.E.

Maj. Ikuno was born in Rock Springs, Wyo. where he graduated high school. In 1933 he graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

A lieutenant colonel in the National Guard, Maj. Ikuno was called into service before the outbreak of the war. He is believed to be stationed in Alaska.

Later, after returning to his OP, he sighted two snipers about 15 yards from his gun position. Taking a bag of grenades, he led three riflemen to the German dugout. He ordered the two snipers to surrender but one refused. Firing a rifle grenade into the dugout, Sugiyama killed the remaining German. The German prisoner

was sent back to the battalion command post.

Early in the afternoon the Japanese-American squad leader located a hostile machine-gun firing from a slope directly in the path of his advancing riflemen. Sgt. Sugiyama fired tracer bullets to indicate the enemy position and they were wiped out by the American riflemen.

Later, he noticed enemy troops in a concrete building 25 yards away on the right forward slope. Crawling 25 yards back, he went around the right reverse slope to warn the advancing infantrymen. He led a squad back and drove out the Germans.

He returned to his OP and sighted two light machine guns manned by eight Germans. They were crawling up a draw to ambush the advancing Americans and were below the line of fire of Sugiyama machineguns. He crawled forward 25 yards and took cover in a shallow ditch.

Firing rifle grenades he killed five Germans and the other three fled without their machineguns. This action drew fire from another machinegun 600 yards across the valley. The weapon withdrew, however, before he could return the fire.

Sgt. Sugiyama was reported killed in action in early July, 1944. His father, Yasukichi Sugiyama, resides at Rohwer center. His brother, Franklyn Sugiyama, was first city clerk here and chairman of the Unit I council. The latter relocated with his wife to Sweetmine, Utah last year, where he is now foreman with the Hudson Coal Mine.

A sister-in-law, Mrs. Lois Sano, is a resident of this center, at 6-4-B.

THOUGHTS PROMPTED BY ANTI-EVACUEE TIRADE

(The following thoughts were prompted by Lt. Governor Frederick Houser's recent address in Riverside, says Dr. Eubanks Carsner, U.S. Department of Agriculture senior pathologist in charge of sugar beet experimentation, who is stationed at Riverside, Calif.)

There is here, though, such a wide area of agreement among Democrats and Republicans and all the rest of us that choices among candidates are often sadly limited. The level of the wide area of agreement is low. President Roosevelt is reported to have once said, when chided with some of our reprehensible national policy: "There is an old Rumanian proverb 'It is permissible to walk with the devil until the bridge is passed'". Most Americans, I greatly fear, agree. Governor Dewey in his very shrewd pursuit of votes seems also to have profited by this "wisdom" of the Rumanians. As I understand some of his promises he will vigorously advance certain commendable ends of the New Deals but of course by superior means. His confidence in this appeal apparently has already caused heart failures among the old guard of both parties. The basic fallacious philosophy of ends and means that is involved might be restated: "It is right for me to do evil if good for me will come of it".

Does the pervasiveness of this pernicious philosophy prove that this is the only heritage which all who can call themselves Americans share in common? Probably it is the lowest common denominator. No! We have in common wisdom and goodness and justice and mercy that have come down to us from on High. These have come down to us through Moses, Isaiah, Jesus, Paul, Francis, Tolstoi, Kagawa, Buddha, Laotse, Mohammed and Gandhi...

Mr. Houser is, I believe, on the basis of limited information, admirably qualified in many ways to represent us citizens of California in the United States Senate. I had intended to vote for him. Now I am in a quandary about it. I do not want him to represent us at our lowest level. I do not know much about Senator Downey. Those who control the most accessible sources of information have seen to that. I wish I could vote for a man who means what he says when he repeats the American Creed: "with liberty and justice for all".

PFC. PAUL HORIUCHI

Pfc. Fumio Paul Horiuchi, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Takeji Horiuchi, 2-14-E, was reported killed in action in France on Oct. 19.

Pfc. Horiuchi volunteered from the center in May, 1943 and was assigned to Co. E of the 442nd Combat Team at Camp Shelby, Miss., from where he was sent overseas earlier this year.

Born in Walnut Grove, Calif., he was a graduate of Watsonville (Calif.) high school, where he was active in football and basketball.

Prior to evacuation, he was a pressman with the Nichi-Bei, a San Francisco Japanese-American newspaper. He came to Poston in July, 1942 from Salinas assembly center with his parents and four brothers, Thomas, Tsuyoshio, Mitsuru, Yukinari and Masaru. From Oct.-Nov., 1942, he was out on seasonal leave in Brush, Colo.

The official notice of his death was received here last Friday and was addressed

to his brother Tom, a former Chronicle printer, who is returning here from Chicago, where he relocated recently.

PFC. LOUIS HIRATA

Mrs. Margaret Hirata, 35-9-Q, mother of Pfc. Louis Mitsuru Hirata, 19, was informed last Saturday that her son was wounded a second time on Oct. 15, in France, while fighting with the 442nd. He was previously wounded in Italy.

His father, Jusuke Hirata, has received two Purple Heart medals from his sons, Louis, and Sgt. Manuel Hirata, now instructing trainees at an Oceanside (Calif.) marine base.

Louis attended Lincoln high school in Los Angeles, where he majored in ROTC and re-ramps. He volunteered from here in Oct., 1943. He has two brothers and one sister here.

Pfc. Hirata recently wrote to Pauline Bates Brown, reports officer, expressing his surprise at being sent to France on a troop ship, and his pride at fighting with the 442nd Team.

PFC. KOICHI MATSUBARA

Pfc. Koichi Matsubara, 27, nephew of Mrs. Kiri Matsubara, 19-2 A, was slightly wounded in action on the French front, Oct. 16, it was learned here last Saturday.

The wounded 442nd soldier's parents are in Japan, and he received his high school education there. His education here includes the 7th grade.

Pfc. Matsubara entered the service before evacuation from Los Angeles, where he worked in a market.

He has a younger brother who has relocated to Chicago.




Mr. Crawford came to Poston in May, 1942, from the Navajo Reservation in Albuquerque, N.M., where he was assistant supervisor. He worked in the housing and registration division before he was appointed Unit II administrator in June. In November, 1943, he was appointed relocation program officer, when the old employment division was reorganized into the personnel management and relocation sections. For a time, he was also local selective service representative for Yuma County.

Mr. Crawford also kept the weather station in Unit II, and was district chairman of the local Boy Scouts.

He is survived by his parents, three brothers, Willie, Ben, and George, and a married sister in Idaho. His brother Ben has been called for duty.

Reported missing in action in France since Oct. 19, is Pfc. Jou Okitsu, 25, son of Eikichi Okitsu, 54-1-C, who previously received the Purple Heart for wounds received in action in Italy.

In a recent War department release, he was also reported as having braved enemy fire to rescue some of his wounded 442nd comrades on the Fifth Army Front in Italy.

Pfc. Okitsu was called for duty before Pearl Harbor, but was placed on reserve after the outbreak of the war. His second call came in August, 1943, and he was assigned to Camp Shelby.

Los Angeles - born, the missing soldier lived in Brawley before evacuation. He graduated Brawley Union high school in 1937 and Brawley Junior college in 1939.

Before evacuation, he was engaged in farm work, and was employed as a surveyor here. His father and sister, Suji, still live in the center. His mother passed away earlier this year, before he went overseas.

Mr. and Mrs. Tomoji Katayama, 305-4-A, have been informed that their eldest son, Pfc. Sho Katayama, was slightly wounded in action on the French front, Oct. 20.

The official wire was addressed to Mrs. Midori D. Katayama, the wounded soldier's wife, who has relocated to Milwaukee, Wis.

Pfc. Katayama was drafted in January, 1942 from Orosi, Calif., where he was farming after graduation from

Orosi high school.

He has two brothers and a sister.

S/Sgt. Frank Wada, 23, was reported slightly wounded in action in France on Oct. 18, according to word received by his mother, Mrs. Waki Wada, 30-2-D.

The wire of notification was addressed to Mrs. Jean I. Wada, formerly of 327-1-C, who is now living in Chicago, Ill.

S/Sgt. Wada graduated from high school in Redlands, Calif., and later worked as bookkeeper at a San Diego, (Calif.) vegetable exchange. He volunteered from Poston in May, 1943.

Word has come to the families of Sgt. Fred Sakasegawa, 213-12-A; Pvt. Sakaichi Soda, 213-3-BC, and Pfc. Harry Kowase, 322-14-F, that they have been wounded.

A letter from Sgt. Sakasegawa said that he had been wounded in France on Oct. 20. He is from Salinas and is 24 years old. He was called before evacuation.

Pvt. Soda's letter told his family that he was wounded in Italy, July 6. He is 19, a graduate of Gilroy high school, and volunteered from Poston.

A telegram has come, informing Mr. and Mrs. Gitaro Kowase that their son was wounded in Italy, July 17. He was inducted in San Diego before the war, and is a graduate of Ft. Loma high school.

Cited for Bringing Aid

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--For successfully bringing medical aid through to wounded comrades with whom contact had been lost, Pvt. Jou Okitsu, formerly of Los Angeles, Calif., and last week reported missing in action in France, recently was awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement. He serves with the Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team.

His citation reads, in part:

"When 10 and 15 men were wounded by extremely heavy enemy mortar and artillery barrages, the executive (cont. on front page)

CENTER JOB QUOTA IS 5,180, SAYS CASSILLY REPORT

ALL MALE MESS WORKER
PROBLEMS TO BE TAKEN
TO UNIT COMMITTEES

Philip Cassilly, personnel management officer, told the last meeting of the new Manpower Commission that the authorized job quota for Poston is 5,180, reports Dr. John W. Powell, MC chairman.

About 4,500 full-time positions are filled, Cassilly said, but half-time workers--two filling one position--bring the total to between 4,800 and 5,000.

Unit I council proposals for exemptions from male mess hall worker quotas were considered, and the only one approved was 1-b, which provides that male workers physically unable to perform other work and holding a doctor's certificate to this effect, are exempt from the ruling.

(cont. from front page) officer of Pvt. Okitsu's company was unable to contact the battalion aid station due to severed communications. Pvt. Okitsu upon his own initiative began the journey over approximately 300 yards of open terrain to find aid for his wounded comrades. Almost the entire length of the trip, he was subjected to machinegun and sniper fire. Several times he was halted by artillery and mortar barrages. At length, by creeping, crawling, and running through all the hazards that befell him, he managed to locate the aid station. Summoning litter bearers, medical aid men and a surgeon, he returned to his company area. Pvt. Okitsu's voluntary actions and heroic determination enabled the wounded men to receive prompt medical attention."

Four more have been reported wounded, two seriously, bringing the total of wounded from this center to 37. At least four of them have been twice wounded.

One is missing in action in France, making a total of 48 casualties.

Pfc. Hachiro Mukai, 25, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Jisaku Mukai, 318-3-A, and Pfc. Fumitake Nagato, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bunzo Nagato, 60-4-C, who was previously listed as missing, have been reported killed in action in France.

Pfc. Mukai died on Oct. 22, the War department message to his brother, Goro Mukai, disclosed. He entered service before evacuation in February, 1942, and went overseas with the 442nd Combat Team.

Graduating from Live Oak high school in Morgan Hill, Calif. in 1937, Pfc. Mukai won valedictory honors and was given the citizenship award for outstanding records in both athletics and scholarship. Prior to his induction, he was engaged in farming.

Pfc. Fumitake Nagato, last week reported missing in action since Oct. 20, was killed in action in France on that day, a wire informed his parents yesterday.

Besides his parents, two brothers and two sisters survive him. One sister has relocated to Washington, D.C. He graduated from

Brawley Union high school and was farming before he was drafted about three years ago. Prior to his assignment to Camp Shelby, he was stationed at Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind.

IS 50TH CASUALTY FROM THIS CENTER

Pvt. Yukio Sumida, 24, husband of Molly Tsuboichi Sumida of 215-5-B, was wounded in action in France on Oct. 22, according to a War Department message late last week. He is the 50th casualty from this center.

with one of the first American units to land in Italy. Pvt. Matsuda, who does not talk very freely, tells that he was awarded the Purple Heart medal for wounds received in action on the night of July 22, when his outfit was wait-

ing to be relieved by another. As the men advanced slowly across a riverbed, Pvt. Matsuda stepped on a landmine concealed beneath the soft mud. The explosion injured him in the right leg just below the knee. Unable to go any farther, he lay in the soft mud for almost two hours. Finally at 12:30 that night he was evacuated to another zone and taken to a makeshift hospital where his wounds were treated. He arrived back in the States a few months ago.

He does not know, at present, whether he will be discharged from the Army or not, but he wishes to go back to Hawaii to pick up his life where he left off.

"Nisei in Uniform" Pamphlet Issued by War Dept. and WRA

From Attu to Kwajalein and Burma in the Pacific war and from Salerno to Livorno in Italy, the battle record of American soldiers of Japanese ancestry is told in "NISEI IN UNIFORM," an illustrated pamphlet issued recently by the War Relocation Authority in collaboration with the War Department.

The achievements of Nisei with Merrill's Marauders in Burma only recently have come to light, the WRA said, too late for more than a brief reference in the publication. News of Japanese American participation in the campaign in France also was announced after the publication went to press.

"Every race and nation from which our population is drawn," the publication states, "is represented among the young Americans who are fighting side by side to overthrow the Axis powers. Men of German ancestry have been helping to smash the German Nazis; men of Italian descent have participated in the struggle to drive the Axis forces from Italy; men whose parents came from Japan are showing that devotion to America and gallantry in action are not determined by the color of the skin"

Johnson Asks Early Mailing of Packages

It would be wise to start getting Christmas packages ready for mailing now, advises Postmaster Clarence Johnson.

The volume of mail is expected to be unusually heavy again this year because of the war, and the post office will be greatly aided by persons who mail early to avoid the holiday season rush, Mr. Johnson says.

Persons are permitted to write, "DO NOT OPEN UNTIL CHRISTMAS", on the outside of the packages.

Packages should be wrapped securely to prevent their breaking apart en route, he adds.

Taps and flag raising by the Boy Scouts will follow. Hymn No. 306 will be sung, and Bible readings in English and Japanese will be given by Yoshiya Tsujimoto and Rev. Kenzo Kubota. Prayer will be led by Rev. Yoshimasa Shigekawa.

The wounded are T/Sgt. Makoto Mochizuki, Oct. 30; Sgt. Mikiri M. Ogata, Oct. 27; Pfc. Martin Lloyd Ito, Oct. 28; T/5 Haruki J. Koba, Oct. 30; Pvt. Harvey Masakatsu Iyama, Oct. 29; Sgt. Paul E. Takagaki, Oct. 29; Pfc. Jim J. Tokushige, Oct. 28, and Pfc. Takenori Ohara, Oct. 30.

It has been learned here that T/Sgt. Makoto Mochizuki, brother of Terumi Mochizuki, former resident of 30-10-A, was slightly wounded on the French front, Oct. 30.

Because Mr. Mochizuki has relocated to Chicago, Ill. with his family, and no other relatives of T/Sgt. Mochizuki reside here, no details of his personal history were available. It is believed that he was inducted before evacuation.

The War Department informed Mrs. Yone Ogata, 6-10-B, on Monday that her son, Sgt. Mikiri M. Ogata, was slightly wounded Oct. 27 in France while serving with the 442nd

Yenkichi Ito, 327-1-C, father of Pfc. Martin Lloyd Ito of the 442nd, learned Monday that his son had been slightly wounded in action on the French front, Oct. 28.

Pfc. Ito, who is 27 years old, left here with the second group of volunteers last year. He is a graduate of San Diego High School, and was a farmer before evacuation.

T/5 Haruki Koba, 24, only son of Mrs. Shizue Koba, 330-4-B, was slightly wounded in action in France on Oct. 30, a War Department message said this week.

T/5 Koba was a volunteer from San Diego, Calif., in February, 1942, when he was a student at the University of Redlands. He is a graduate of Coronado (San Diego) high school in 1939, and of San Diego Junior College.

A member of the 442nd Combat Team, he went overseas in April this year.

Pvt. Harvey M. Iyama, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tsunekichi Iyama, 219-9-A, was slightly wounded in action in France on Oct. 29, a telegram from the War Department revealed on Monday.

The wounded soldier is 26 years old and

was a farmer and carpenter in Salinas, Calif., from where he was inducted four days before the Pearl Harbor attack.

Sgt. Paul E. Takagaki, son of Mr. and Mrs. Yoshigusu Takagaki, 54-2-D, was slightly wounded Oct. 29 in France, a wire from the War Department reveals.

Sgt. Takagaki was a pre-evacuation selectee and was inducted from Heber, Calif. Before assignment to the 442nd Combat Team at Camp Shelby, Miss., he was attending Bakers and Cooks' school at Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind.

He is a graduate of Holtville Union High School (Holtville, Calif.) and El Centro Junior College.

Mr. and Mrs. K. Tokushige, 219-10-A, formerly of Chualar, Calif., have received word that their son, Pfc. Jim J. Tokushige of the 442nd, was slightly wounded in France on Oct. 28.

The 25-year-old soldier was drafted five days before the Pearl Harbor attack from King City, Calif. He was first stationed at Ft. Ord, Monterey. Prior to that, he was engaged in chick-sexing work. He is a graduate of Salinas Union High School in 1938.

Mr. and Mrs. Buyemon Ohara, 329-5-C, were informed Tuesday that their eldest son, Pfc. Takenori Ohara of the 442nd, was wounded slightly in France on October 30.

Pfc. Ohara is 27 years old and was drafted in 1941 from San Diego, Calif., where he was farming after graduation from San Diego High School.

He went overseas in August of this year. He has one brother here.

and other battle awards. Articles and photographs also record the exploits of individual Nisei assigned to scattered units, including some in the Army Air Forces, and in infantry organizations that fought in the Marshall Islands, the Aleutians and Burma. A Nisei paratrooper and Nisei WACs also are featured. Many of the soldiers and WACs once were in relocation centers.

"No publication can do full justice to the heroism of Joe Nisei," Director Dillon S. Myer of the War Relocation Authority said. "He is giving a splendid account of himself faster than anyone can record it."

GIs of Japanese ancestry were in America's fight from the beginning, the pamphlet shows in its accounts of the 100th infantry battalion's first experience at Pearl Harbor. One Nisei soldier was killed by Tokyo's attack on December 7. The next day two Nisei soldiers assisted in capturing the first Japanese prisoner of the war, the operator of a one-man submarine, which had grounded on

a reef off Oahu. Another Japanese American led a detachment of soldiers which captured a Japanese flyer who landed on the island of Nihaun and terrorized the natives until he was seized.

Minors Relocating Alone to Chicago for Study Must Pay Tuition Fees

Chicago, Ill.-- The city of Chicago rules that tuition must be paid where the sole purpose of attending its public schools is given as the reason for an unattached minor coming into the city.

The rule is in no sense discriminatory and is applied equally to all such persons coming into the city. Those accompanied by their parents are accepted without tuition in Chicago as in most, if not all communities in the United States.

STAND UP AND TAKE A BOW, MR. HALE, SIR

There is a gentleman in Parker who runs a barber shop. His name is Andy Hale. He has three sons serving in the U.S. armed forces. There aren't many men like Mr. Hale.

Mr. Hale hails from Texas. Texas is a wonderful state, pod'nah. That's where all the lovely bluebonnets grow deep in the heart of. That's where all the beautiful women come from, like Linda Darnell and Ann Sheridan... and, well, Linda Darnell. And Texas is the largest state in the Union. Naturally, there aren't many men like Mr. Hale.

As if that weren't enough glory for one man, Mr. Hale is also a man who stands solidly behind his convictions. The world might have never known, and the gem of purest ray serene that is Mr. Hale's integrity, might have remained hidden forever, if it weren't for something that happened last week in his barber shop. This is the story:

A World War II veteran spent a couple of days last week in Parker. He was on furlough from a California army hospital where he is still convalescing from wounds received one July night this year in Italy. He had ribbons and things on his chest, among them a Purple Heart medal. His face was battle-scarred and he was using a crutch, because it was his leg that got it when he stepped on a hidden landmine that Italian summer night.

Thinking he could do with a shave on the second day, he walked into Mr. Hale's tonsorial salon. Mr. Hale, a man of action (not many men like Mr. Hale), rushed over to the soldier and helped him outside. "Can't you read?" Mr. Hale asked the soldier. "Keep Out Japs, You Rats," the sign outside the shop said.

It was really funny. Here this soldier, a private named Raymond Matsuda hadn't noticed the sign. And imagine, even if he had, he wouldn't have thought it applied to him, he said later. Lord, just because he was born in Honolulu, Hawaii and got called for service in the U.S. Army and trained at Camp Shelby, Miss., and went overseas to Italy and got hurt fighting the Germans and had to lie in the mud a couple of hours before he got evacuated to a makeshift hospital--Lord, just because of little things like that, he had the incredible simplicity to suppose that he was an American. He was probably under the impression that he could walk into any barber shop in the U.S. and get a shave.

Like I said, it was really funny. But Mr. Hale showed him. You bet. Mr. Hale taught Pvt. Raymond Matsuda to look for signs before going into barber shops. Not only Pvt. Matsuda. Why, about eight months ago there was another soldier like that, and Mr. Hale says he told him to keep out, too. Because you just can't fool Mr. Hale. He can tell a Jap. A Jap is a Jap is a Jap. "They all look alike to me," he says.

There aren't many men like Mr. Hale.
Thank God.

Cpl. John Narimatau, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mitsui Terakawa, 307-10-D, was seriously wounded in France on Nov. 1, according to a War department message to his sister, Mary Narimatsu.

The wounded soldier is from Reedley, Calif., and is a 1938 graduate of Reedley Union high school. Inducted in February, 1941, he was first stationed at Ft. Ord, Monterey (Calif.), and was assigned to several camps before joining the 442nd at Camp Shelby, Miss. He went overseas last August.

Pfc. Yasuo Nakamoto, 23, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Kichisaburo

Nakamoto, 323-6-C, was slightly wounded on the French front, Nov. 2, it was learned here Thursday.

Pfc. Nakamoto is from San Diego, Calif., and left here with the first group of volunteers in May, 1943. He graduated San Diego high school in 1939 and was active in sports. Before evacuation he was employed in a fish cannery.

Pfc. Haruo E. Mochizuki, 25, son of Eitaro Mochizuki, 3-6-D, was seriously wounded in action in France on Nov. 2, a War department message said yesterday.

Pfc. Mochizuki was drafted a few days after Pearl Harbor, and first trained at Camp Robinson, Ark. After being transferred to several camps, he was assigned to Camp Blanding, Fla., and went overseas in August this year.

Reedley-born, the wounded soldier is a graduate of Bakersfield Union High School. He has two brothers in the army. One, Pvt. Saburo Mochizuki, is at present overseas in France. The other, Pvt. Akio Mochizuki, was drafted from Chicago, Ill., where he had relocated, and is stationed at Camp Blanding, Fla.

Miss Yasuko Inai, sister of Pfc. Haruo Inai, 24, was informed yesterday that her brother was seriously wounded in France on Oct. 29.

The wounded soldier, son of Kumeji Inai, 27-7-D, is from La Habra, Calif., from where he was inducted in January, 1942, while he was still attending high school. His first training was received at Camp Robinson, Ark.

A LETTER FROM TOOELE ORDNANCE DEPOT

Nov. 8, 1944

Dear Editor:

Since I have many friends in Poston who might
be interested in relocating here with their
families, I thought it might be of interest to
them to know what's what here at the Tooele
Ordnance Depot...

...At present there are about forty families
settled here, working under Civil Service in a
very vital and necessary defense work, and
many are coming in every week. These young
men and women are setting a record and an ex-
ample. We on the home front are also doing
our share in a big way without a whimper or a
cross look, endeavoring to keep the traditional
"Go-for-Broke" determination of the famous
100th Battalion.

I have travelled far and near working with
many groups, but this is the very first time I
have seen such perfect co-ordination shown by
our race of people, where group labor was re-
quired. The work of this group, under the able
leadership of Tom Okamura, a veteran of this
war, is constantly being complimented by the
officials of this Depot and officials from
Washington.

During this summer season, I have seen many
dissatisfied men and women in the WFA camps
but here at Tooele there is absolutely no
gripping.

There are many working in the motor pool
driving trucks and semis, some in the carpen-
ters and supply, but most are working as ammu-
nition handlers. All of this work is done to
a military precision that is firm and definite.

There are also many Nisei women employed in
the offices and on the outside working as am-
munition checkers. It is understood that there
will be other departments open for women. All
of these men and women do their work with a
pride for they know that they are not letting
the boys overseas down on the home front.

The living quarters are new apartments with
one, two or three bedrooms, fully furnished
if desired, with recreational facilities, schools,
and nurseries here on the project. All men
eligible for deferment are being duly processed.

If there is anyone who desires further in-
formation about this depot, I shall be more
than pleased to oblige.

SIXTH WAR LOAN BEGINS THIS WEEK, ENDS DECEMBER 16

Goal is \$14,000,000,000

With a fourteen billion dollar goal, the Sixth War Loan drive opened Monday and will continue until Dec. 16.

Chairman of the project drive is Ralph Drennen, assistant personnel officer, who is under Lyle Warnock, engineer, chairman for Northern Yuma County.

Five billion dollars is the quota set for individuals. The appointed personnel have been asked to purchase \$21,913.15 of War Bonds through payroll deductions or cash purchases, with regular deductions increased to 15%.

Evacuees who purchase bonds are asked to report their purchases to their block managers, anonymously, if they so desire. Applications for bonds may be had at the post office.

In connection with the drive, Project Director, quoting General Somervell, says that the choice here is between masses of men and paying in blood, or of using masses of material and paying "more heavily in dollars and sweat and fatigue, less expensively in casualties."

Commenting on the memorial services here which honored Nisei soldiers who fell in the Italian campaign, Mrs. Sugino, whose son, Arthur, is stationed at Camp Blanding, Fla., says, in part: "...beneath the serenity of the impressive...ritual, a deep hurt was felt by the families of the soldiers because they were still prohibited from the Western Command Zone..."

FORMATION OF YOUTH COUNSELING BOARD ANNOUNCED

Unit I Will Try To Curb Juvenile Delinquency

Recent instances of "gang" conflicts and conflicts prompted the meeting on Friday, Nov. 10, of the Youth Counseling Board of Unit I.

The four members, Tsuneo Sumida, Aijiro Takahashi, Seizo Sakamoto and Masaharu Hane, discussed delinquency problems to decide on effective action to curb repetition of the recent incidents.

The board was originally established in 1943. It met once and has been inactive since that time. Its purpose was to (1) investigate any and all cases involving juvenile delinquency, (2) recommend disposition of the problem to the judicial commission, project director, police department, and other officials and departments, and (3) act as probation officers and general counseling board on any and all problems concerning juveniles.

TAMIE TSUCHIYAMA, FORMER RESIDENT, JOINS WOMEN'S ARMY CORPS

FIRST OF SERIES OF ARTICLES ON TYPES OF ASSISTANCE OFFERED BY PROPERTY OFFICE

Following is the first of a series of five articles condensing previous information and giving additional information to help each evacuee understand better how the evacuee property program operates. The articles will explain the services and limitations of the program.

MANY SERVICES

The Evacuee Property Officer offers many and varied services to the evacuee and acts as intermediary or "middleman" in all property problems. While its functions necessarily are limited, there are many ways in which the Property Officer can be of service.

For example, it can arrange for the sale of any property, either real or personal, which the evacuee may wish to sell. It can arrange for the leasing or renting of business, residential or farm properties, assist in collection of obligations in the form of bills, mortgages, or other type of debts where such collections can be made without having to take legal action.

The Property Office can attempt the settlement of disputes arising from contracts or agreements between evacuees and residents of the evacuated area; it can investigate and report on the conditions of properties; personal effects, etc., and can, where court action is not involved, dispose of problems connected with the business or property interests of the evacuee.

However, no such action will be taken without the approval and consent of the evacuee and the evacuee should remember to take all requests for aid on property problems on WRA Form 153 or 153A.

PERSONAL, COMMERCIAL PROPERTY

In addition to the above, the Property Office can arrange for the picking up and storage of personal or commercial property of the evacuees.

As was stated before, functions of the office are limited. For example, the Property Office cannot assume responsibility for accepting or rejecting bids for property. No sale will be made through the office until a definite offer has been made to the evacuee and his acceptance of the offer has been received in writing by the Property Office. The evacuee, of course, is required personally to sign any legal documents required to complete the transaction.

\$500 CIGARETTE THEFT REPORTED BY CO-OP

Five cases of cigarettes, worth \$500, were stolen last Friday night from the Co-op warehouse, Community Enterprises announced yesterday.

The theft was discovered the following morning about 9:00 o'clock. It is believed that the thief entered by removing the hinges of the door, which were later replaced.

A new shipment of knitting yarns was upset and damaged but was not taken.

\$100 reward has been offered by the C.E. for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the guilty person or persons. The local police department, under Chief Matsumoto, is conducting a thorough investigation of the matter.

Dr. French Reports on California Attitudes

Dr. David French, who recently returned from an escort trip to Los Angeles, commented on the attitude of the people there to the problems of the evacuees.

He reports: "The average man is either indifferent to the problems of the evacuees and to the possibilities of eventual return, or is sympathetic to a degree. People who were friends of the Japanese are still friends. Newcomers do not seem to care one way or the other. The people who are now making anti-evacuee propaganda are a small group. They were doing their best to be as noisy and to seem as numerous as possible. I was unable to find anyone who knew about any individual or groups who would resort to violence against evacuees in the future."

BARRACK 328-13 HIT BY FIRE LAST SUNDAY

Fire of unknown origin which began in the residence of Henry Suzuki, 328-13-G, late last Sunday afternoon, hit Apartments G, H, and part of F.

Firemen rushed to 328 in time to prevent the barrack from burning down. The fire was detected by Mrs. Larry Kaya, 13-G, who went outside when her apartment lights went out.

Government loss was not known at press time, but it is believed that personal belongings of the Suzuki family were entirely destroyed. Apartments H and F were unoccupied.

ALIEN VOLUNTEERS BEING ACCEPTED FOR MILITARY SERVICE

Volunteers Must Pass War Department Investigation

Subsequent to the decision to accept certain Japanese nationals who volunteer for military service, national Selective Service headquarters has sent a memorandum to all local boards prescribing procedure requested by the War Department for the forwarding for induction of such registrants as well as of those of Japanese extraction or parentage, national Selective Service headquarters announced late last week.

Primary requirements for induction of Japanese aliens are that they must volunteer and must be found acceptable after investigation by the War Department, and must pass the physical examination at an armed forces induction station. The determination of acceptability will be made on the basis of loyalty and other kindred factors.

SECOND ARTICLE IN EVACUEE PROPERTY SERIES DEALS WITH PERSONAL REAL ESTATE AND PROPERTY

(This is the second of a series of five articles dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.)

PERSONAL REAL ESTATE

What about sale of real estate? What information must the evacuee give the Property Office in order to get speedy action?

Full information concerning the property should always be provided by the evacuee. He must supply the exact geographical location as well as a legal description of the property involved, should state by whom the title is held and whether the owner is single or married. If the property is jointly owned by several persons, he must supply authorization for the sale from all of them.

The evacuee should supply full information about the amount of annual taxes of various sorts levied against the property, the amount and type of mortgage and the terms of the mortgage; the balance due on any type of lien or other encumbrance involving the property in question, and the status of the title and whether or not a title insurance policy is held by the owner. The evacuee should also state whether fire or other types of insurance are carried and give full particulars including the name of the company, the amount and the expiration date.

REALITY REQUIREMENTS

Most real estate sales are normally made through licensed real estate brokers, of course, and the brokers are entitled to a commission on sales. While the customary fee is 5 percent, the amount of the commission may vary in certain communities or localities.

Because of the Alien Land Law, title companies require a birth certificate from the owner if he is of Japanese ancestry and so each evacuee must supply one with his request for sale of real estate.

If the evacuee has a birth certificate, he should file the original or a certified copy with the request for sale. An evacuee who has no birth certificate can write for one to the recorder of the county in which he was born. The usual fee charged by the county is \$1.00. If the evacuee wishes the Property Office to get a certificate for him, he should give the Property Office his date of birth, the name of the city and county in which he was born and the necessary fee.

under prescribed conditions, certain Japanese aliens now residing in this country who are found qualified for military service was made by the War department in order to make it possible for those who desire to do so to serve in the American armed forces. In no case will a Japanese alien be inducted into the army unless he volunteers for service and his desire to volunteer must be evidenced by a request in writing signed by him.

This request, together with a personal history of the alien, will be sent to the War Department for a determination of his acceptability.

When a Japanese alien has been found acceptable for service by the War Department and the local board is so notified, it may proceed with the classification and forwarding for induction of such alien in a manner substantially the same as that prescribed for other aliens, whose acceptability also must be determined by the War Department.

262 NISEI CASUALTIES REPORTED TO WRA FROM RELOCATION CENTERS

Breakdown Shows 69 Killed,
187 Wounded, Six Missing

Heavy fighting on the Western front in Europe has accounted for 88 recent Japanese American casualties, including 20 killed in action and 68 reported wounded within the last ten days to parents or next of kin living at relocation centers, it was reported last Thursday in a release from the War Relocation Authority of the Department of Interior.

Casualties in France, added to those in Italy and the South Pacific, bring the total to 69 Nisei killed, 187 wounded and six missing, WRA reported in a compilation based on individual War Department notices received at the centers.

Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, said that the actual total of battle losses among Japanese Americans from the mainland is larger than the agency's compilation of 262 casualty notices. He explained that more than one-third of the evacuees have relocated from the centers to outside communities, and that several thousand persons of Japanese ancestry, who lived outside the West Coast restricted area prior to the evacuation order have never been in a center. WRA has no means of recording casualties among these families.

Evacuees Have Relocated to 47 States and D.C.

No Evacuee Reports Residence in
South Carolina; Illinois Heads
States with 8,085 Resettlers

Wider and more even distribution of Japanese American evacuees in relation to total population throughout the United States has developed with relocated families and individuals now reported in 47 out of the 48 states and the District of Columbia, the War Relocation Authority of the Department of the Interior said today.

Eleven states have absorbed more than 500 relocated persons each. Illinois with 8,085 evacuees resettled among its 7,897,000 residents in its metropolitan area (1940 census) has a lower ratio of relocatees than some smaller cities listed by WRA.

INFORMATION OF EVACUEE PROPERTY: REAL ESTATE (continued from Tuesday's issue)

Various communities have different customs with regard to title company charges for the search. In all cases, the seller pays for the recording of the release of a lien. It is also customary for taxes, insurance and rentals to be prorated as of the date of sale of property.

If the property to be sold has been leased, a copy of the existing lease should be provided to the Property Office. If one is not available, the evacuee should supply information about the lease, including the name of the tenant, period of the lease, rate of rental, whether there are any special conditions and whether there is a cancellation clause in the lease.

PERSONAL PROPERTY

Complete and accurate descriptions of personal property to be sold, such as refrigerators, sewing machines, furniture, etc., must be given to the Property Office so that there will be no error or misunderstandings. The evacuee should supply the location and name of the custodian of such property as well as information about storage charges and how they are to be paid. If the property to be sold is not completely paid for, the evacuee must inform the property office the amount owed and the name of the firm to which it is owed.

It is desirable that the evacuee place a reasonable price on the articles to be sold, or he may request that bids be obtained. In either event no sale will be made without specific authorization of the property owner.

On December 1, a campaign for the Hospital Christmas Fund will begin for the benefit of hospital employees, according to Minoru Okamoto, city manager.

Residents will be asked to contribute twenty cents each, and donations exceeding that amount from those who wish to contribute more, will be welcomed.

The contributions are to be held by the finance committee of the Community Council.

In order to decide how the money will be used, the local councils of the three units, the public health committee, hospital committee, and the Community Council will meet separately, and later together at a final conference.

TIME AND PLACE OF JAPANESE FILMS TOLD

Two Japanese films, "KA" (Hill), and "GO-KOKU-NO-HAHA," will be shown Thursday, at Block 4 stage, and Friday at Pool 44. They will be shown Saturday in Unit II, and Sunday in Unit III. The films are 1600 feet and silent. Shinkichi Hata of Block 16 will be benshi.

The film was previewed recently by Marshall Stalley, community activities supervisor, WRA Washington; Pauline Bates Brown, reports officer, and Dr. John W. Powell, assistant project director. Their comments are reported to have been favorable.

horn in Japan," Mr. Myer said, "have received word of sons killed in action, or wounded, with the same courage shown by parents elsewhere in the country who have made the same sacrifice. It is a common loss in the common American cause."

One young Nisei wife, speaking for her Issei parents and her Japanese American brothers and sisters, wrote to the WRA director of the death of her soldier husband in these words:

"The loss of my husband is great to me and to those who knew and loved him, but we take comfort in the knowledge that he was a real American and a good soldier."

Among those reported missing in action on the Western front was Pfc. Jou Okitsu, former student of Brawley (Calif.) Junior College, who received the Purple Heart and the bronze medal for wounds and gallantry in the fighting in Italy. Okitsu left his father at the Colorado River relocation center, Poston, Ariz.

One of the 68 recently wounded in France was Pfc. Siego Shimoyama, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kihachi Shimoyama, who were evacuated from their home at Kent, Wash., to the Minidoka Relocation Center at Hunt, Ida. He has three sisters in WAC uniforms.

Of the 13,000 Nisei who have been inducted into the Army, 2,146 entered as volunteers or selectees from relocation centers, latest WRA statistics show. The others were Japanese Americans from Hawaii and from Nisei in the United States who had left the States or were never subject to the evacuation.

ACLU TO CONTINUE
SUPPORT OF JAPANESE
AMERICAN TEST CASES

Among eight issues to be stressed by the American Civil Liberties Union in the immediate future is one which concerns Japanese Americans, reports a recent issue of the Open Forum.

The ACLU will undertake "Suits in the court seeking a judicial ruling on the right of loyal Japanese Americans to return to the Pacific Coast, now that military necessity can no longer be cited as a reason for their exclusion, together with test suits in the courts of the methods of determining the disloyalty of those now confined at the Tule Lake relocation center in California; also the constitutionality of the whole evacuation and the detention of American citizens of Japanese ancestry."

Other issues to be stressed by the ACLU concern poll taxes, greater freedom of the air (radio), amendments to the Oriental Exclusion act to make Filipinos, Koreans and East Indians residing in the United States eligible for citizenship, post office department censorship, support of the government's anti-trust suit against the alleged motion picture monopoly, extension of civil liberties to the introduction in Congress and state legislatures of a bill to promote democracy in trade unions.

Four states are near the 500 mark. Oregon has 496, Nebraska, 494, Wisconsin, 477 and Montana, 468.

The WRA based its analysis upon a compilation showing the distribution of 29,740 civilian evacuees, two-thirds of them citizens, reporting addresses as of November 15 from 47 states. Although no evacuees reported an address in South Carolina it is known there are Japanese Americans there who were not on the West Coast at the time of exclusion and therefore were not subject to evacuation and the relocation program.

Departures to restricted sections of Arizona, California, Oregon and Washington are under special permit issued by the Western Defense Command, WRA said.

The resettlers, some in family groups and some relocated as individuals, are reported living in 267 cities and towns scattered over the country. In the WRA compilation.

The 2,146 Americans of Japanese ancestry who left relocation centers to enter the Army as volunteers and inductees are not included in the Nov. 15 report, because they are at military camps and installations in various parts of the country, and on fighting fronts in France, Italy, the Pacific, and Burma.
