Pair Tried For Improper Use of Government Trucks

Judicial Commission Stresses Gravity of Offense in View of Recent Reminders

Two residents, Susumu Kawato and Aiji Ochi, pleaded guilty this week to charges of using government property without proper authority and were sentenced to seven days in jail, suspended, and put on 40 days' probation.

In pronouncing the sentence, George Takaoka, Judicial Commission chairman, reminded the defendants of the importance of conserving government property. The offense, he said, was one against the community, which might endanger the privileges of all the people. Future offenses of this kind are to be punished by fine and jail sentence or both.

Letter From Cpl. John Narimatsu, Who Died in France, Denies Rumor

Memorial Services Held Yesterday Afternoon for ex-Reedley Soldier

Memorial services were held yesterday afternoon in Unit III for Cpl. John Narimatsu, a boy from Reedley, Calif., who died in France on November 1.

The following is a letter received from Cpl. Narimatsu by Setsugo Sakamoto. The letter was mailed on October 15.

"Dear Mr. Sakamoto. Somewhere in France in a muddy adobe field stands a pup tent. From this tent I say Bonjour, meaning good day. Yes, it might be a good day in Poston, but here it's not so good--mud to your ankles and deeper, and rain helping the mud along every day.

"Guess the last time I wrote you was from Italy before I joined the 442nd Infantry. Back in Italy us replacements were assigned to companies. Since then (Cont. p. 2)

So far I haven't seen any action, but having a few friends in the 100th and also 442nd who have seen action, I've told them what our folks' worries were and they laugh and some think it a joke. They admit that fighting is no vacation but no need to worry thinking that we have gotten and will get more. Far as that goes, it's no vacation, unless we do here. I wish that people back home could talk to some of these fellows, they maybe they would change their feeling towards having their sons enter service. Maybe then they'd quit bad talk of the 100th and 442nd Combat Team.

"Myself, I'm very proud to be a member of this team, and now if I was given a chance to leave this unit for another unit in the army, I wouldn't accept it. I'm so proud of this team no other combat team is good enough for me. Mr. Sakamoto, you being a man as you are and seeing things the correct way, I wish you could be here with us for a few days. Then I'd know no one else would need to tell you a thing and you'd be very proud of us fellows, the fellows who are fighting for our country and for the betterment of the Japanese people in the U. S.

"There's many things I'd like to tell you of this unit but there's no limit. We're also a popular outfit here, overseas. Yes, if some man like you could only come here and see and hear the combat team and could go back home to tell our folks it'd sure help. Maybe before long some boys with the Purple Heart come back and try to convince our folks. Even with that I can hear some folks saying, oh the army hired that boy. If the boys back home could understand us they wouldn't hold back as some are doing. Here the boys are trying to build a stepping stone for the Japanese in the U.S., and there are some crazy fools breaking it away faster than we can build. I know when we come back those boys will more than hear about it for we here know about it. I'm sure that the sooner they get off of that one track mind of theirs, it'll not only help them but the whole Japanese population.

"Well, Mr. Sakamoto, as I've said before, there is really no limit to how much I can go on, so guess I'd better call it stops. Before closing, my regards to the whole family. The next time you write to Jimmy and Ed, forward my regards, please.

"P.S. Can't talk French so my hands are learning to talk for me. What a way to talk..."

ork is said to be simple, with everything operated by machinery. Deferment for those eligible may be obtained after 60 days, with reasonable guarantee of post-war work. In case one is called for active duty, seniority is still retained, and the job will be open to the soldier after the war.

Nisei working at the refinery are now getting \$104 weekly, in rate 2, working 12 hours at press machines, according to Pvt. Okawa.

Open shop prevails, and workers can join the CIO or not. The attitude of Kansas City people and co-workers in the company are said to be favorable.

"It's a great life, though. Not as tough as the men's army.

"There's another Japanese-American girl in my company who was chosen to be the colonel's orderly. It's an honor and we were happy to hear that a girl from our company received this honor during the regular guard duty.

"I've had K. P. duty already. Washing and scrubbing from morn till evening. But work is fun if you make it so. I had a swell girl working with me. She kept calling me "Kid." Kid this and kid that. In fact, most of the girls call each other "honey." Nothing unusual.

"We were in another parade today. It's an awfully wonderful feeling with the drums beating, and the band playing..."



Center Honor Roll Goes Up in Unit I

Over 800 Soldiers Are Listed

Paying tribute to the more than 800 men and women serving in the armed forces of the United States from the three units in this center, the Poston Honor Roll was set up between the Post Office and administration building in Unit I on November 31.

Measuring 21 feet, 6 inches in length and approximately 7 feet in height, the grey-painted, glass-encased honor roll is to be extended with 7½ feet wings on either side. When completed, there will be space for more than 1,400 names.

Keeping vigil over the names is a golden American eagle, carved by Carl Yamane of Unit III. Work on the structure, which was done by evacuee carpenters, is not yet finished, and more names are to be added.

TECH. SGT. ATSUSHI SAKAMOTO POSTHUMOUSLY AWARDED SILVER STAR

Technical Sergeant Atsushi Sakamoto, who died in Italy on July 17, has been posthumously awarded the Silver Star. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Uchachi Sakamoto, 226-8-B, will receive the decoration during the send-off program on Monday evening at Block 4 stage.

Presentation of the nation's third highest award will be made by Colonel Louis S. Norman and Captain George H. Preston from SCU 1921, Phoenix.

DECEMBER ARMY CALLS ARE FOR MONDAY

BOYS 18 MUST REGISTER AT UNIT I SS OFFICE

Unit Administrators Will No Longer Handle Army Draft Registration

Effective Dec. 10, 1944, all boys living in Poston who become 18 years old, will be registered under the Laws and Regulations of the National Selective Service Act, in the Unit I Selective Service office, Ad. Bldg. Rm. 27, according to Herbert W. Carter, Selective Service representative for Yuma County.

As boys in the center become 18, they will be registered, and DSS forms No. 1, registration card; No. 2, registration certificate; No. 3, Selective Service questionnaire; and No. 4, statement of United States citizen of Japanese ancestry, will be processed in the Selective Service office.

Unit administrators will no longer take care of registration in their offices.

Fifty-seven Ordered to Report

Fifty-seven boys have been called from this center to report for active duty next Monday, Dec. 11, to Fort Douglas, Utah, the Selective Service office announces.

A send-off program has been planned for that evening at Block 4 stage, and will begin at 7:30 o'clock. During the program, the Silver Star, which has been posthumously awarded to T/Sgt. Atsushi Sakamoto, will be presented to his parents.

Masu Kawashima will be master of ceremonies and Gyosuke Iseda will be the speaker from the Council. Other speakers had not been announced at press time.

Unit III boys are requested to be at their departure station at 6:30, Unit II boys will leave their camp at 6:45, and Unit I boys are asked to be at the stage by 7 o'clock

Warren Pledges Support If Military Decides on Mass Japanese Return

California Governor Earl Warren declared recently that if the government decides that Japanese exclusion is no longer necessary, the state government would give "full recognition to their constitutional and statutory rights" according to the Associated Press.

This concluded a written statement which was prompted by a misapprehension among "many people" that the state could prevent Japanese return.

He also said that because California is proud of its "freedom from racial conflict... and we are apprehensive of re-introducing Japanese into our... strained wartime life," he has suggested that the Commanding Generals "evaluate the dangers to the war effort from civil disturbance."

900 IN ARMED FORCES FROM THIS CENTER

UNIT III MAN IS VICTIM OF HATCHET ASSAULT

Hiroshi Shima of 307 suffered lacerations of the scalp and contusions about the face and neck last Wednesday night, after he was assaulted with a hatchet, according to James LeBerthon, internal security chief.

Atsunobu Sato, 57, of 307-7-A, suspected of having committed the assault, tried to kill himself by cutting his throat with a razor Sunday night at Unit III police station, where he was being held prior to being taken to Yuma for trial. He is now at the hospital.

Shima said that he had been threatened three days previous to the attack. He and Sato have known each other for 20 years.

The motive is believed to have been jealousy.

DELANO CAPTURES TOURNAMENT CROWN

Nearly 1000 rabid spectators witnessed the Delano Dukes upset the Red Devils in the final play-off for the City Tournament championship at court 15, Sunday afternoon.

Geo. Yamaguchi, capable Delano pilot and star guard, proved to be the key man as he personally sank seven baskets with uncanny accuracy in the first half, all from distances of 35 to 40 feet.

EVACUEE PROPERTY PROGRAM INFORMATION: AUTOS

This is the third of a series of five articles dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.

Requests to the Property Office by evacuees who wish to sell their autos or trucks must be accompanied by ownership and registration certificates signed by the owner of the vehicle. If the evacuee does not have the certificates he should then make out an "Application for Duplicate Ownership Certificate." In such a case, he must be sure that the application for it is made out in the same name as the original.

An evacuee wishing to sell an auto or truck which has not been in use since evacuation (but which has been in storage) should provide an "Affidavit of Non-Operation". The evacuee should write to the custodian of the truck or auto in storage and authorize him to allow the WRA to inspect and remove the car when it is sold. In cases where the vehicle is being used by the custodian, arrangements for its release should also be made by the evacuee.

CARS IN STORAGE

The evacuee-seller should understand that cars in storage usually require some servicing such as a battery recharge or a new battery. Therefore it is necessary that the evacuee provide funds for placing the car in usable condition so that it can be demonstrated to prospective buyers. If a car is to be sold "as is" without any repair work, a top price cannot be obtained. Evacuees should understand that later models bring higher prices but that there are OPA price ceilings which cannot be violated.

The evacuee should provide the Property Office with any information as to storage charges, if any, and if they or other charges exist, they must be paid before the car is put up for sale.

The evacuee must remember that the WRA is not able to obtain or provide drivers to move evacuee-owned vehicles from the military area. It is the responsibility of the evacuee to hire the driver and arrange for his pay.

Under OPA regulations, ration boards are authorized to provide special rations of gasoline for the removal of automobiles from one part of the country to another when a legal change of residence occurs. Only the owner or authorized driver may apply for supplemental gasoline. The driver should also be authorized in writing to obtain the car from its place of storage and to sign the necessary papers to obtain gasoline rations.

The Office of Defense Transportation will not authorize gasoline rations for a trip of more than two hundred miles for trucks or pick-up trucks, and the evacuee usually has to arrange to have his truck shipped to him by rail if the distance is over the 200 mile limit.

(How can an evacuee go about collecting debts? How can he arrange to lease or rent properties? The next article will tell how the Property Office can aid him. Watch for it.)

Conservation of Fuel Oil Necessary To Avoid Shortage

All center evacuees, as well as appointed personnel, are asked to conserve fuel oil in every possible way in order to avert the threatened shortage, reports Maurice Lipian, assistant project director.

Because of transportation difficulties, an ample supply of fuel oil cannot be brought into Parker. At the present time, each shipment consists of two rail-tanks which is enough for summer needs but inadequate for winter weather.

Due to the gravity of the situation, Mr. Lipian will go to Los Angeles, probably next week, to discuss this matter. Whether this shortage will last throughout the winter or will be temporary, will depend greatly upon the outcome of this conference.

It is imperative that the consumption of oil in heating stoves be reduced in every possible way and everyone is urged to make a serious effort to decrease the use of fuel oil, Mr. Lipian said.

CIGARETTE RATIONING TO BEGIN NEXT WEEK

This brings up the little matter of cigarettes which people all over the nation (including Poston) are missing.

GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS

Because of this shortage, smokers will be issued coupons beginning next week, which will entitle them to their share of cigarettes, pipe tobacco or Bull Durham.

The first issue of the coupons must be used before Dec. 25, as they will be void after that date. New coupons will be issued every ten days. If this system does not prove satisfactory, other methods are to be tried.

The coupon will entitle a person to purchase ten packages of cigarettes, or five packages of either pipe tobacco or Bull Durham.

EVACUEE PROPERTY PROGRAM INFORMATION, NO. 4

(Here is the fourth of a series of five articles dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.)

Evacuees who wish to collect debts owed them may do so with the aid of the Property Office if they will supply complete information.

The date of the note or the date the debt was made; explanation of how and for what the debt was made (for work done, goods purchased, etc.); the original amount of the debt, rate of interest and the plan of repayment agreed upon; the balance due, name and address of the debtor; and any evidence of the debt, such as a note, mortgage, purchase contract, etc., should be given to the Property Office to speed collection.

ACCURATE DESCRIPTION: Where an evacuee wishes to rent or lease property he should supply an accurate description and the location of the property. He should specify rental rates but must keep in mind that OPA rent ceilings may apply and that where they exist rental rates cannot be raised unless proper authorization from the OPA is given. Such permission is usually hard to get. Complete details about the terms of leases, length of lease desired and other special terms should be given.

In cases where farm land is to be rented out or leased, it is important that the evacuee supply complete details about irrigation assessments, electricity bills, water district taxes, methods of determining shares when rent is desired, use of farm equipment left on the farm, building insurance as well as the evacuee's desires regarding all other leasing specifications.

Dates for payment of rent and expiration of leases should be specified. The Property Office can also help the evacuee in handling matters such as inspection of property, fire insurance, vandalism and pilferage.

Evacuees should understand that as long as the military exclusion order remains in effect the WRA will provide storage space for property left in the evacuated area or left in a center by an evacuee who either relocates or is inducted into the armed forces.

On the other hand the WRA cannot assume responsibility for the storage or care of a relocated evacuee's property at the point of relocation. The WRA will, however, assist in moving the household, personal and commercial property of evacuees going out on indefinite leave.

Any evacuee inducted into the armed forces and who wants the WRA to store property he has left in a relocation center or on the West Coast, should designate some person to represent him in dealing with the WRA.

PICKUP FORM: Any evacuee wishing to have personal or commercial property picked up and stored must fill out Form WRA - 155. The form must be filled out, signed and witnessed. It must be signed by the owner or for him by someone who holds power of attorney.

Evacuees who wish property stored by them in a commercial warehouse or in private storage transferred to a WRA warehouse must pay storage costs that have accrued before the WRA can move such property to a WRA warehouse. Warehousing receipts must be supplied by the evacuee.

Four of them are in the Mediterranean area and two of them have been wounded in action.

MASS EXCLUSION TERMINATED!

CENTER WILL REMAIN OPEN FOR A YEAR

Now that the blanket exclusion orders have been lifted, the War Relocation Authority has made a number of basic policy decisions covering the immediate future of its program. These decisions are:

(1) WRA assistance will now be made available for relocation in the evacuated area on the same basis as elsewhere.

(2) All relocation centers will be closed within a period of six months to one year after the revocation of the exclusion orders. No centers, however, will be closed without three month's advance notice to the residents.

(3) Essential services at the relocation centers--food, housing, and medical care--will be provided until the centers close. Schools will be maintained at (cont. on city page)

HEADQUARTERS WESTERN DEFENSE COMMAND

The Commanding General of the Western Defense Command has today issued the necessary orders to terminate mass exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from the Pacific coastal area. In the future only those individuals whose records indicate that they are potentially dangerous to the military security are to be excluded.

The new system will permit the great majority of persons of Japanese ancestry to move freely anywhere in the United States that they may wish to go. The military authorities have now classified Japanese-Americans in three groups:

1. A group of those persons who will be free to move about or reside in any part of the United States. The vast majority of persons of Japanese ancestry will be in this group.

2. A group of those who have definitely indicated that they are not loyal to the United States or are considered as potentially dangerous to the military security. These individuals will continue to be excluded.

3. A very small group of individuals whose cases have not yet been determined.

The Project Director of the center has been supplied with a list of those individuals who are to be permitted to move freely throughout the United States..... Those on this list who wish to have identification cards from the Western Defense Command in their possession may secure them by applying through the Project Director, to the Western Defense Command.

mand have arrived at the center and starting immediately will individually notify any individuals who are to be excluded. They will also notify those individuals whose cases have not yet been determined and will interview such individuals in order to determine their final status.

It is not contemplated that any list will be published to the general public or those whose exclusion is to be continued.

In order that the movement away from the center may be accomplished in an orderly and peaceful manner and in order that proper plans may be made to receive them at their destination, the restrictions now in effect concerning departure from the relocation center will be continued in effect until January 20, 1945. Between the present date and January 20, those individuals who have already received or may receive permits from the Western Defense Command may leave the center. After January 20, all restrictions will be lifted except in the cases of individuals who will be specifically and individually notified.--December 17, 1944.

(5) WRA assistance will be extended, within certain limits, to previously relo-

cated and who now wish to return to the evacuated area.
(6) There will be no further processing of evacuees for leave clearance and leave permits will no longer be necessary for relocation. Relocation assistance, however, will be made available only to those whose relocation plans are approved by WRA.

(7) Arrangements will be made with appropriate state and local agencies to provide public assistance throughout the country for those evacuees who are incapable of self-support.

Glad tidings came to Murase family of 308 and George Kawano family of 309 when they were the first in this unit to be exempted from the exclusion order.

Before we entered camp and in the early days of it, Nisei were a source of worry for their parents. They were afraid that they would run wild, etc... But, it seems with two and a half years in camp, the tide has turned to vice-versa. The Issei seem to be the one that is getting off the beam and the source of most trouble here... However, they are not all to blame.. They don't have work suited for them and the time is aplenty to think, and thinking is not always a happy occupation.....

Their entertainment is limited--the shibai is held only sparingly. To comfort the minds of Issei and some better enjoyment, it may be a good idea next year to show more Japanese movies, of course, inspected and passed by the authorities. We know there are many non-militaristic pictures stored somewhere and we think that this type of movies will be greatly beneficial to the Issei and their morale.

CONSTITUTIONALITY OF EVACUATION UPHELD BY U.S. SUPREME COURT

Mass Meeting Held To Inform Residents Of Exclusion Lift

The Unit I high school auditorium was filled to capacity Monday afternoon, as Project Director Duncan Mills read particulars of the exclusion lift.

Remaining here for more than a year is out of the question, Director Mills said. The imperative step is to formulate plans for leaving Poston. The government, he was confident, has resources for assistance, which are not charity. He plans mass meetings before the closing.

"There is a great deal of work to be done, and at times, all of us will have to lend a hand," he added.

Basic Issues Avoided

Because U. S. shores were threatened, the Army had a right to remove Coast Japanese in 1942 as an emergency measure, a Supreme Court majority ruled this week, an AP dispatch said.

But the court differentiated between the exclusion orders and others whereby Japanese were detained in centers. Unanimously, it ordered the unconditional release of Mitsuye Endo, Topaz resident.

No military law was involved, and WRA had no right to detain loyal citizens under the circumstances, the tribunal ruled.

In neither case were broad constitutional issues ironed out.

The evacuation edict was canceled Dec. 17 by the War Department, effective at midnight, Jan. 2.



HOWSER CRITICIZED FOR ANTI-RETURN SPEECH

District Attorney Fred Howser has been criticized by many groups for his recent Bill of Rights Luncheon talk, in which he voiced opposition against return of Japanese to the West Coast, the Los Angeles Daily News reports.

The Fellowship for Social Justice of the Los Angeles First Unitarian Church wired Howser the following protest, "We regard your statement as un-American, un-Christian and calculated to en-

courage lawlessness and violence and the flaunting of constitutional rights of American citizens."

Howser had termed Japanese return as an "Infiltration" and a "second invasion of Pearl Harbor.

Another rebuke came from Daniel G. Marshall, chairman of the Catholic Interracial Council of Los Angeles. His telegram said, "Your ridiculous accusation...beclouds the Bill of Rights and insults the intelligence of the community.

"It is your duty to disclose immediately to the army and the FBI any evidence supporting your irresponsible charge.

"This council is confident that this community believes the army's judgment is far superior to yours."

However, the AFL Teamsters' union newspaper said that "no Japs (were) wanted now or ever..." This elicited the telegrammed comment from Mr. Marshall that friends of organized labor were "shocked and grievously disappointed" and that they hoped the statement would "be instantly and completely repudiated by your responsible leadership."

"This Is It!" by a Camp Shelby Soldier

The couch feels good beneath weary muscles; and juke box blares and then becomes soothing and blares again. The old familiar strain fills the club and the mind drifts back--far back five and one-half months. How long the time seems; then again terribly short.

It was then five and one-half months ago--that I was an evacuee, unwanted and shunned by society; yet now barely five and one-half months since that time. I have become a vital cog in this country and in this war. By the simple change of clothes, one changes from the unwanted into the wanted--a soldier. How simple it is.

And what are the changes that took place in those fast-flying days?

I have changed; one must change in order to tolerate this new life. What a gap there is between living in an evacuee center and an army camp. The difference is as marked as day and nite. One can live a lifetime in five and one-half months, believe me, for it is so.

How vividly the days return. The early mornings, stumbling out of bed, half asleep, half-dazed. Sweeping, mopping, making the bed; then the blare of the whistle in the darkness of the dawn. The feet scurrying. Far away the bugle calls. The

ranks form quickly in the semi-gloom. The long hikes with perspiration sozing out on the neck and on the back. The wet spot grows on the man ahead of you. The sour smell of sweat. The breaks and rain. Of death and laughter. Sitting on the wooden pews--strange it seems to be in church with a unit

form and grieving the death of a fellow soldier--a victim of accident. All strange and new things in a separate world. Days on bivouac. The fireflies at night and the moon grinning down at you. Firing the mortars and rifles and carbines and pistols. An unexplainable thrill this. The instrument of death in your hands.

A slight pressure of the fingers and the messenger of death on its way. The action is so simple; everything to do with death is simple, never complicated.

The days going by on wings, never dragging. The weeks rushing by, and above it all is the sensing that death is near--so very near. That all this marching and sweating and cursing has but one objective --

death. Death to kill, to maim, to harass the foe. And the prevention of death to one's self--that was the objective. And as the days slipped by, this one feeling got lost somehow, but occasionally one thought of it, but not as before, for a new feeling is now surging thru the veins and in the pit of the stomach and in the mind. "WHEREAS, the strong tide of just hatred against Imperial Japanese barbarism and brutality has been turned without reason against loyal Japanese American citizens resulting in innumerable incidents of unjust persecution and unjust discrimination,

BOSTON SOLDIER GLAD TO HEAR PHILIPPINE NEWS

LEGION POST CRITICIZED
FOR ANTI-NISEI ACTION

The Hood River (Ore.) Post of the American Legion which lately removed the names of 16 Japanese-Americans from the Hood River Community Honor Roll has been roundly criticized by editorials in the Detroit (Mich.) Free Press, the Milwaukee (Wis.) Journal, by Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson and at least two other Legion Post.

Wolverine Post 360 of Reading, Mich., protested, "It is the opinion of this Post that your reported action is not only an insult to these men whose names were recently member of our armed forces and to the American Legion as well, upon whom this action has brought discredit and shame."

The New York Post also condemned its Oregon brother organization and incited the 16 Nisei soldiers to join its chapter.

Boston Community Enterprises announces its business hours before the holiday, and dates when stores in the three units will be closed.

In Unit I, stores 1, 3, 4, and Rainbow Mart will be open from 6:30-8:30 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 25, in addition to the regular daily hours, and all day Sunday but will be closed on Dec. 26 and 27.

In Unit II, stores 1 and 4, and in Unit III, stores 1 and 4, will follow the same schedule as Unit I stores. The Co-op office and warehouse are to follow the above schedule.

Check cashing windows will also be closed on Dec. 25 and 26.

United Nations' soldiers everywhere greeted the news of the American invasion of the Philippines with enthusiasm, but nowhere was the enthusiasm greater or more sincere than in the Vosges mountains sector of northeastern France where the 442nd is fighting, the Monterey (Calif.) Peninsula Herald reported recently.

First Sergeant Royal Mineda, formerly of Monterey, whose family resides at 13-3-D, was making out his morning report when the invasion news came over his captured German radio. In his excitement, he fell into a mud puddle as he hurried to tell his men that General MacArthur had landed in the Phil-

"That's the biggest news since D-Day at Normandy!" he exclaimed. And his comrades agreed. Among them was Cpl. Misamu Endo from Los Angeles, whose family lives here at 26-10-D. "It's damn good news, but there's still a lot of war to be won," the latter said. Endo ought to know, the news story said, because he spent 15 years in Japan, 15 years in which he learned by painful experience that the American way of life is best. "The defeat of Japan may bring liberalism, or even democracy", he stated, "and then perhaps the common man over there will get a break."

A special task force of Japanese-American soldiers felt so bad over the news that they surprised the enemy in a wide-flanking movement and captured 54 prisoners and killed 80. Another group chased 17 Germans into two houses, surrounded the houses and proceeded to "bazooka" them into submission, the story concluded.

POSTON GIRL AND SOLDIER BROTHER MEET IN PA.

Under the caption "Re-united in War Relocation Office Here," the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin recently published a picture showing the reunion at the Philadelphia WRA office of the Misses Mariko Ozaki and Nellie Karuke Nagano, who are employed there as secretaries, and their soldier brothers, Corporal Mike Masayuki Ozeki and Technical Sergeant Patrick Noriyoshi Nagano, who were visiting their sisters while on furlough. The Ozakis are from Minidoka, and the Naganos from Colorado River.

Miss Nagano, 21, is a native of Morro Bay, Calif., and her brother Patrick, 26, was born in San Luis Obispo, Calif. At the time the Nagano family was evacuated from Morro Bay, Patrick was managing a truck farm there and Nellie was attending San Luis Obispo Junior College. At Colorado River, Nellie was a secretary in the Maintenance Dept. of Camp III and her brother was head of the sanitation department. Nellie left Poston in August 1943 for Philadelphia, where she was employed by the Japanese American National Student Relocation Council until March 1944, when she took her present position in Philadelphia relocation office.

T/Sgt. Nagano entered military service as a volunteer and was trained at Camp Shelby, Camp Savage, and Fort Snelling prior to undertaking his present assignment in Maryland. He is a graduate of San Luis Obispo Senior High School and Stanford University, where he was a Phi Beta Kappa pre-medical student and a member of the varsity baseball team. He was awarded the bachelor's of science

degree in 1941.

The parents of Nellie and Patrick, Mr. and Mrs. George Yoshi Nagano, now reside in Minneapolis, Minn., where their sister, Mr. Takeshi Shibuya, also lives. Two other Nagano boys, Pfc. William H. and Pvt. George K., are both stationed at Fort Snelling.

"Your Committee recommends that the resolution be referred to the Executive Council for thorough-going study, for such recommendation and action as seem most appropriate."

EVACUEE PROPERTY PROGRAM INFORMATION: NO. 5

(Last article in series dealing with services, limitations of the evacuee property program.) An evacuee who wishes to arrange for shipment of personal property must fill out Form WRA-156, giving complete information and having the signature witnessed.

Evacuees are entitled to "free" shipment of their household or personal effects from original storage to a center, or a point of relocation or, if they already have them in a center, to a point of relocation. Evacuees wishing to have property shipped from a center to the point of relocation should make their requests to the Project Director.

The WRA will help the evacuee to get information on costs when the evacuee wishes to have a private company ship his property. Request for such help should be made on Form WRA-153.

In the matter of shipping commercial property, the Property Office will help the evacuee arrange for shipment to any point he desires but all costs for shipment must be paid by him. However, the WRA will pay for shipment to points of relocation the equipment of an evacuee's trade, including farm machinery and equipment sufficient for a family-sized venture (but not over 5,000 lbs. per family), if the Relocation Officer in the community in which the evacuee relocates or intends to relocate will certify that the use of such equipment is necessary to the evacuee's successful relocation and cannot be replaced locally at the time because of wartime shortages.

All shipments are by freight unless the items are difficult to send safely by freight because of high value or small size. Furthermore, if the Project Director or Relocation Officer certifies on Form WRA-156 that express shipment is necessary in the interest of the relocation program, goods may be sent by express. Express shipments at government expense may not exceed 500 pounds.

Evacuees should consult with the Property Office in all matters pertaining to shipment of goods, sale of property, or in matters involving rentals, leases, taxes or disputes arising from contracts.

The Property Office has been established to aid the evacuee. While its functions necessarily are limited, it can help him solve many types of individuals problems. The evacuee is welcome at the Property Office and should avail himself of the services offered.

We can make this elaborate celebration a merry one, too, if we try, so let's put all we have into it! Let's let this one top the other two Christmases that we have spent here. With the exception of a few persons, this is the third Christmas which we will have spent in Boston. The first one was quite eventful as relocation had not yet affected the center population, and the activities were many and varied. Most of the original residents were still here to share in the numerous programs planned that year. The second Christmas, however, found many of our friends gone and the Seimon's activities were consequently planned on a smaller scale. It was during this Christmas and Christian Church groups throughout the country sent gifts to the people in Boston and all other relocation centers. This year, the churches are again sending gifts for distribution. At the same time, we find a still fewer number of our friends here to participate in the joyous season. It is truly a tangible expression of good will on the part of these Christians throughout the nation who are voluntarily contributing toward our happiness at this time.

On our part, there is much to reflect upon on our relationship with those on the outside has been predominantly one of "receiving." In our center life, all have given unselishly of their time and energies in attempting to create a comfortable and harmonious community, but such cannot be said of our efforts to contribute beyond our immediate needs. This limitation of our efforts within the center was prompted by the tremendous task which awaited the residents upon arrival here and further by feeling common among underprivileged society--that of limited endeavor.

As this Christmas brings again its message of hope, peace and good will, we can enter into the true spirit of the Nativity by identifying ourselves with those services and sacrifices which others are making for us.

Throughout this nation and in other parts of the world, the relocates have gone ahead to open the way into new communities in order that those who follow may do so in confidence, and are rendering unselfish service to that end. The servicemen are making unparalleled sacrifices in a conflict which they felt they could not stand idly by and ignore. The Christian friends are sending gifts with the hope of making our Christmas a more enjoyable one. The realization of all these things spurs us to a consciousness of the contributions we too can make in contrast to the prevailing attitude of resignation. True, our means are limited as to the things we can do or give but in times such as these, the emphasis is on the spiritual and not the material blessings of life. An encouraging message of cheer to some servicemen in the field of combat means more than an expensive gift. Similarly, a friendly letter to some friend who has relocated in a new community may change that person's entire perspective in the new environment. News of our activities here are always welcome to our former friends on the Coast and may open the way for future resettlement for us and others. The humble and lowly surroundings in which the Christ Child was born did not detract from significance of the occasion. Our situation is opportune in which to grasp the simple yet deep message contained in the hope, peace, and good will of Christmas that we fail to realize in times of peace under prosperous conditions. May Christmas, 1944, by far each one of us are reawakening of our hopes and joys and a rededication of our services toward a better community, nation, and world.

Thank you, darling!! With my heart full of gratitude, my dream was broken by the breakfast chow bell ...Shucks, it was only a dream and the calendar still showed December 25, 1944.

Two scenes associated with the Christmas season come to my mind at this time. One is in the far east and the other in the near west; both in our country.

Massachusetts's State House, with its golden dome, is on Beacon hill in the city of Boston. On Christmas Eve, hundreds of lighted candles shine forth from its many windows, while nearby homes also show lighted bangles. This glowing region of lights reflects the warmth of genuine hospitality, deep thoughts of genial joy in life, abundance of culture, and steady progress for all indicate more than the outside beauty reveals. Perhaps their special messages to the whole world at this time are two-fold: "Let your individual light shine wherever you are," and, "As Beacon Hill wishes 'A Merry Christmas,' so will you wish the people where you live, the same."

Before the present war, Santa Rosa Avenue in Altadena, California, and Christmas tree Lane in Fresno, famous for its rows of Christmas trees, was lighted every evening between Christmas and New Year's. For a mile on either side of this avenue, these majestic towering Himalayan cedars of Altadena reminded people of Christmas. Some called them God trees and appreciated the thoughtfulness of the men who long ago brought the seeds from India. Crowds admired the trees in the daytime but when night came and they blazed forth with myriad lights, it was for all who viewed them a scene of fairy-like beauty. Here, living Christmas trees, seventy-five feet and more in height and thirty or forty in diameter sparkled with lights in every color of the rainbow. The gracefulness of these deodars was seen in the spreading of their branches whose dark pendulous tips of long bluish-green needles contrasted with the brilliancy of the lights and made a suitable background for them.
