THIRTY RESERVISTS CALLED FOR DUTY

STUDENT RELOCATION COUNCIL TO FUNCTION THROUGHOUT NEW YEAR

Thomas R. Bodine, National Student Relocation Council field director, said on his recent visit here that the Council will continue in its present function throughout 1945.

In talks to students Mr. Bodine discussed the value of going on with education beyond high school. "Nisei need to be better than average to get ahead," he said. "They have to work harder and get more education."

Before coming here he stayed two weeks on the Coast to gauge the probable reaction to returning students. He said he found friendliness on every campus.

Although a few colleges and universities are unable to accept Nisei, there are now more openings in all types of schools than there are students to fill them, he reported. There are no longer any military restrictions (cont. on Unit I page)

S/Sgt. HIROSHI FUJITA CORRECTS US FROM FRANCE
November 23, 1944
Somewhere in France

Gentlemen:

I have just received a clipping from your paper dated Sept. 24, 1944 concerning an article of myself.

I am quite depressed to see only my name mentioned in the article. No action of that specific type is successful without the cooperation of every person of the patrol. Therefore, I feel you did a great injustice to others in not mentioning every man concerned.

The item above mentioned however, is secondary in my thoughts at present. In the article you also stated that I was at one time honorably discharged from the Army because of my ancestry. I do not recall to this day of ever receiving a certificate of honorable discharge from the Army.

I shall at this time try to enlighten you to certain facts about myself. In March of '41 I was transferred to the Enlisted Reserves. Had I been discharged I would have had to notify some draft board of my status. However, having been transferred, I could have been recalled to active duty with no red tape except report to the nearest military camp, post, or cantonment as I was ordered.

I hope the errors I have mentioned concerning the article will be corrected and reprinted for your readers. Also that what I have criticized will be received in a manner of correction and not ingratitude on my part.

As a former resident of Boston I thank you for your kindness in writing as you did, other than facts mentioned previously, concerning me.

REPRIMANDS HOOD RIVER LEGION POST'S ACTION

Another public reprimand of the Hood River, Ore., American Legion Post, for its removal from the service honor roll of 16 Nisei names, has come from the New York Times.

Entitled "Hood River's Blunder," the New York newspaper's editorial said, in part:

"The Portland Council of Churches has answered the Hood River post by calling upon ministers to aid loyal Japanese Americans in returning to their homes and denouncing racial discrimination as a denial of 'the very principles of Americanism which our boys are fighting to preserve.' Japanese-American units have done splendid service in Italy. Japanese-American units have been of great help in the Pacific war. They do not ask recognition beyond that given to German-Americans and other sorts of Americans who have served faithfully. They are entitled to as much recognition. Hood River owes them an apology."

The new five-foul ruling introduced this season, apparently, was being taken advantage of. So, in order to keep down the casualty rate, it was agreed that the four-foul ruling would remain unchanged, at least in Unit I.

MONEY, MONEY...

Photographs of local scenes on attendance at East or Midwest Schools. Over 2,000 have gone out from centers to over 500 institutions. Mr. Bodine cited the many college offices to which these students have been elected as evidence of the cordial welcome on campuses throughout the country.

West Coast colleges and universities are offering to consider the applications of Nisei on the same basis as other students, he said. Included are the Universities of Oregon, Washington, California at Berkeley and Los Angeles, Caltech, Pomona, Fresno State, Occidental, Redlands, Mills, Scripps, Chapman, La Verne, Pacific School of Religion, Loyola, Stanford, Whittier, and College of the Pacific.

Mr. Bodine urges students to choose a college and apply independently of the Council in the same way that other students apply. Advice on how to choose a school should be gotten from the project high school office rather than the NSRC in Philadelphia. After choosing a school, students may apply to Philadelphia for help in preparing a budget and for a cash grant to meet any deficit in their budget. Allocations made in the past two years total the sum of \$162.00.

IT'S TIME FOR BEGINNING AGAIN:

The last page of the calendar turns. A new page, opening a new book, lies fresh and clean before us. A new year with its opportunity to begin anew is here.

And, for the residents of Poston, that new page is particularly significant!

Backed by the ruling of the U.S. Supreme Court and action of the War Department, persons of Japanese ancestry can again move with the freedom heretofore considered the inherent right of persons friendly to the United States, whether they were native or alien.

Tomorrow, your life in a democratic nation begins anew.

Democratic processes are often slow, yet no one who has studied the history of our nation can doubt that justice will and does eventually prevail. The will of the majority is, in the final analysis, the highest law of the land, and the majority in a nation whose beginning was based on the principles of freedom is usually fair.

So, though beginning again may take courage, it is worth the effort. Ability to maintain the privacy of family life, where father, mother and children may sit at the table and discuss family affairs without the whole neighborhood listening in---that alone is worth all it takes. And there are many other compensations which outweigh any difficulty which might be foreseen.

The love of fair play which is typical of the average American will insure your acceptance into almost any community. Even in those few where economic interests have wrapped the almighty dollars in the folds of the American flag so tightly that it cannot wave, the record of your sons on the battlefield and your own steadfastly loyal behavior cannot fail to win recognition. There is no American community which does not have some thoughtful, sincere residents.

As the new year begins, we bow our heads in sad tribute to 13 Poston boys who, during the past year, have made the supreme sacrifice for the democratic way of life and to 57 more who have taken upon their bodies the wounds directed toward our principles. We salute proudly 900 men and women from this center who wear the uniform of the United States, proving beyond question their devotion to this country and their belief in its policy of justice for all.

To them, and to millions of others of practically every race, creed and color who wear that same uniform, we owe the fact that beginning again is possible.

Re-establishment somewhere in the U.S. of the homes for which they fight is the only way the debt can be paid.--P.B.B.

ASSISTANCE GIVEN TO RESETTLERS WITH PERSONAL PROBLEMS

How security for resettlers is provided by public and private agencies is shown in a newly issued report from the Middle Atlantic area relocation office. Included in the report are a number of actual examples of assistance to resettlers in meeting health, financial and family problems.

For instance, two families were aided in resuming housekeeping by grants of \$100 and \$195 from social security funds; several sick persons were provided with free medical care in hospitals and clinics; a Nisei girl was provided funds for a winter overcoat, and assisted in obtaining dental care by a private agency.

Such services are available, according to the report, "to all resettlers in case of need, regardless of whether they live in a large city which has a district relocation office or in some small community miles away."

Center residents who wish information regarding their personal resettlement problems are invited to bring them to the attention of Harold S. Fistere, relocation supervisor for the area, through the relocation program officer for the center.

DETROIT HOSTEL OPENS SUITE FOR USE BY COMPLETE FAMILY UNITS

Detroit, Mich. --In order to make it possible for families to relocate to Detroit as complete units, Fellowship House, the hostel in the city of Detroit, has set aside a suite including cooking facilities for use by the family. A special rental of \$12.50 a week will be charged for the rooms and no time limit will be placed on the length of occupancy.

Inquiries regarding this suite should be made to Rev. Shigeo Tanabe at the Fellowship House located at 130 East Grand Avenue, Detroit. This move closely mirrors what has been done by hostels in both Cincinnati and Cleveland.

RESETTLERS TO NEW YORK WILL BE MET AT STATION

New York, Dec. 6--Resettlers arriving in New York City will be met at Grand Central Station or Pennsylvania Terminal and escorted by the Resettlement Council of the Japanese American Organizations of New York City if the New York WRA has been given advance notice.

Resettlers can transmit information regarding their travel plans in a "tour-rate" telegram from any point in the United States to any other point at a cost of only 44 cents for 15 words.

METAL REFINERY NEAR CHICAGO WANTS 25 MEN

UNIT II BOYS COMPLETES CHEMICAL WARFARE COURSE

Staff Sergeant Toshio Tokiwa, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jisuke Tokiwa, 213-4-A, was among the non-commissioned officers who graduated from the Chemical Warfare School's Toxic Gas Handlers' Class at Edgewood Arsenal, Md., on Dec. 23.

Some of the subjects included in the Toxic Gas Handlers' Course are offensive and defensive tactics of gas warfare; the prevention and the treatment of gas casualties; the use of protective clothing and equipment; de-contamination techniques.

The course is designed to qualify enlisted men to fulfill the duties of non-commissioned officers in chemical sections of their branches of the service.

NEW MAN JOINS OFFICE OF INTERNAL SECURITY

New assistant internal security chief here is Marcus Campbell, who arrived in the center early in December.

Mr. Campbell has worked with the Western Defense Command as investigator, and at Marysville and Tulare assembly centers, Topaz, Heart Mountain and Oswego.

Previously, he worked with the Chicago police and the sheriff's office in Santa Barbara, and operated a private detective agency in Phoenix.

cuated to the Gila center in 1942. He went to Des Moines to join his wife, Tomoko, who is widely known there as an expert in flower arrangements.

Surviving him are his wife, two sons, Verlin and George; and one grandchild, all of Des Moines.

Metals Refining Company of Hammond, Ind., wants 25 men, according to the Chicago WRA office.

Nisei would be able to work immediately while Issei must have PMCO clearance. The basic rate is 90¢ per hour with time-and-a-half for overtime. At present, men are working 15 to 18 hours overtime weekly.

Since the work involves production of various types of oxides, each worker is given a medical examination weekly, and a blood smear test monthly. No Nisei worker has yet been affected by the work, the company says. Each worker is given a respirator, and the management is confident that if a person observes plant rules, there will be no ill effects from the chemicals. A number of Nisei have been there approximately a year, and have earned the respect of the community, it is reported;

The company, despite severe labor shortage, has been able to win the Army-Navy "E" award for excellence in war production, and recently a star was added, signifying continued excellence.

The plant is within commuting distance from Chicago.

TWO VETERANS OF SOUTHWEST PACIFIC VISIT

Two army veterans of the Southwest Pacific theater of war, the first to visit Unit I, arrived here during the past week to visit their families and friends on 30-day leaves.

An interview with the battle-weary vets, First Lieutenant Gary T. Kadani and Staff Sergeant Albert Y. Tamura,

POSTON SOLDIER CITED FOR BRAVERY

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, Italy--Pfc. Henry N. Shibata of Poston, Ariz., has been cited for exceptionally meritorious conduct while he was serving with Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's Fifth army in Italy.

When it was learned that one of the men of the company was seriously wounded and in desperate need of medical attention, Shibata and three comrades voluntarily formed a litter party.

Running through sniper and shell fire, he and his comrades reached the wounded man, rendered first aid and carried him back to the company command post.

New Year's Day will be a holiday for evacuees only, according to Duncan Mills, project director.

It will be a holiday for those evacuees not employed in essential services, such as fire protection, internal security, and mess halls. There will be no bus service.

"ARE YOU A JAP?"

Tak Shirazawa, formerly of Visalia and Poston, was visiting his uncle, Dr. James Takao in Cincinnati, Ohio. One evening as he walked down a street, a cafe door swung open and out came a huge Caucasian soldier. He stalked over to Tak, grabbed him by the shoulders and shook him.

"Are you a Jap?" he asked meanly. Tak fearfully admitted he was a Nisei.

"Well," said the tipsy G.I., "You ought to be proud of it." He then identified himself as a member of the 34th "Red Bull Division" which has been fighting with the Nisei in Italy and France. He wore a Purple Heart and could not say enough about the courage, skill and loyalty of the Japanese Americans.

His parting shot at Tak was: "If you know what's good for you, you will live up to the good work being done by the Fighting Nisei."

Pfc. Jou Okitsu Reported German Prisoner of War

Pfc. Jou Okitsu, holder of the Purple Heart and Bronze Star, is a prisoner of war of the German government, according to a report received through the International Red Cross, the War Department has informed his father, Eikichi Okitsu, 54-1-C.

Pfc. Okitsu was hurt on the Italian battle-front last Fourth of July. Awarded the Bronze Star for heroism in Italy, he was subsequently reported missing in action in France since Oct. 19.

TWO POSTONIANS AMONG 22 HONORED FOR CONDUCT

WITH 442ND COMBAT TEAM, SEVENTH ARMY, FRANCE--Two local boys were among 21 Nisei soldiers who received a 34th Infantry Division Commendation for a reconnaissance patrol, led by 2nd Lt. Francis Bianco, which reached Pisa airport in Italy.

The two are Pvt. Clement Miyaya, Denver, Colo., formerly of Blk. 27, and Pvt. Takeshi Takayama, 226-10-B. Pvt. Miyaya was reported wounded in Italy several months ago, and is now visiting his family in Chicago. Pvt. Takayama was wounded in Italy, July 6, 1944.

The citation reads, "For exceptionally meritorious conduct in combat on the 21st of July, 1944, in the vicinity of Pisa. The patrol was instructed to reconnoiter the area (Continued on Unit I page.)

He is from Holtville, Calif., and a graduate of Holtville High, where he was active in football and track.

SECRETARY ICKES' MESSAGE TO RESIDENTS (cont.)

"I congratulate you upon the recognition you have received as a group and I want to express my heartfelt appreciation of the patience and understanding which the great majority of you have displayed as cooperative and law-abiding residents of relocation centers. Few groups in the population, outside of those in uniform, have made a greater personal sacrifice than you have during the past three years.

"The one-third of your original group who have left the centers have proved to you that opportunity, acceptance and personal satisfaction may be yours in states other than those which were your former homes. More important to you, however, is the fact that these 33,000 men, women, and children have proved to the Nation that they, and you, may be quiet, law-abiding and useful members of a free society when given the opportunity. Still more important to you and to your future is the almost incredible record that your sons and husbands have made fighting for this country on every battlefield of the war. Every thinking man and woman in the United States shares my pride and thankfulness for their bravery and their unstinting sacrifice to home and country.

"The announcement that the centers will of necessity be closed within one year should not be alarming to you, for many reasons. The facilities of the War Relocation Authority and the Department of the Interior will continue to be available to you for that period, and every assistance will be directed toward helping each of you to make a satisfactory resettlement in the community of your choice.

"I hope that the great majority of families in the centers will find it possible to work out acceptable relocation plans during the next few months. I think that your best opportunity will be found while war production activities and employment needs still remain at existing levels. It is my considered judgment that a wider opportunity, for most of you, lies in states east of the Sierra Nevadas, where your friends, and in many instances members of your families, are establishing new and successful homes. But, regardless of where you finally decide to relocate, all of you who leave the centers ~~during~~ ~~the~~ next several months can be assured that the War Relocation Authority will make every reasonable effort to facilitate your transition back to private life."

APPLICATIONS FOR IDENTIFICATION CARDS HERE

Identification cards are not required for persons returning to the evacuated area, but any person on the Army clear list desiring such a card should apply directly to the Commanding General, Western Defense Command, Presidio of San Francisco, according to Corlies R. Carter, relocation program officer.

As a service to residents, a supply of the application forms is available in the unit relocation offices. Two recent photographs (size $1\frac{1}{2}$ x $1\frac{1}{2}$) and a fingerprint must be submitted with the application form. The photography department will take photographs only upon referral by the unit relocation offices, and the fingerprints may be taken in the project leave office following the photograph appointment. Development of the photographs takes approximately ten days.

WINCHELL INTERVENES

A Nisei veteran of World War II has gotten back his old job at Paramount Studios in Hollywood, through the intervention of Walter Winchell, radio and newspaper columnist.

On Dec. 3, Winchell brought the attention of his radio audience to a war veteran of Japanese ancestry, whose re-employment at Paramount was opposed by some members of a studio labor union who threatened strike. At the time, the columnist said that he himself would give the Nisei a job if Hollywood would not.

On a recent broadcast, Winchell said that the president of Paramount Pictures had taken a personal interest in the case and that the Nisei was back at work.

JOHNSONS RECEIVE MORE TRAGIC NEWS

Tragedy came again to James J. Johnson, junior cost accountant, when he received word that his father had died suddenly in Globe, Ariz., last week.

Mr. Johnson's son, Robert, was fatally injured in an accident last May, and the sudden death of an uncle occurred soon after.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson left Friday morning, Dec. 29, for Globe.

SANTA ANA TODAY

Shosuke and Hitoshi Nitta of Block 21, father and son, returned to the center this week after a brief stay at their farm in Santa Ana.

Although it was evident that there was a small group opposing Japanese return, the people that they met were all very friendly, the Nittas report.

On their attending church, the congregation was told of their arrival and asked to help make their return as easy as possible. After the service, so many of the church members stayed to speak to them that they were forced to leave without greeting everyone in order to keep other appointments, they said.

Among the warmest well-wishers were a woman whose son was listed missing in the air battle over Midway, and an old school friend of Hitoshi's, a Navy veteran of the South Pacific.

The entire Nitta family is planning to leave this morning to take up residence again in Santa Ana.

CALIFORNIA PATIENTS

Members of the committee include prominent business men, educators, government officials, writers, ministers and other religious workers, trade union officials, and other community leaders. Allen J. White, executive secretary of the Washington Friends Meeting and teacher, is chairman of the hostel sub-committee.

"Our primary concern is to make the Washington hostel a comfortable and friendly temporary residence for newly arrived resettlers, particularly Issei and family groups," Mr. Barrett said.

LUNT AND FONTANNE
ASK OVATION FOR NISEI

A U.S. ARMY HOSPITAL, England--Actress Lynn Fontanne and her actor-husband, Alfred Lunt, halted their entertainment program and called for silence. Lunt walked out into the audience and asked five wounded soldiers to come to the stage with him.

"This is Pearl Harbor day," Lunt said. "And, here are five Japanese Americans who showed their loyalty to the United States by volunteering for service. They showed further proof of their loyalty in the fighting in Italy and in France where they were wounded. They deserve our thanks and praise."

The ovation from the wounded buddies of the Nisei soldiers shook the rafters, the Associated Press reported.

ST. LOUIS (MO.) PAPER SHOWS LIBERAL VIEWPOINT

Two clippings from the St. Louis (Mo.) Post-Dispatch have been received by the Chronicle from Matsu Yoshioka of St. Louis, formerly a Unit II Chronicle worker.

The first is a recent editorial entitled "Fair Play for Japanese Americans" commanding the exclusion lift announcement as "a step... taken toward righting a gross violation of civilian liberties," but adding that "more than this is necessary before justice is fully done."

The editorial, aware of "Professional anti-Japanese agitation" and "reactionaries," concludes by recommending that, "A big job of

education in fair play and tolerance needs to be done on the West Coast, to assure these American citizens of their rights."

The second clipping is of a column by Lowell Mellett, who retells the story of the rescue of the "Lost Battalion" by Japanese American soldiers, and adds facts about other Nisei who are active in the Pacific theatre of war.

Commenting on the revocation of the evacuation orders, Mellett discusses the "real problem" confronting Americans, a "test of American liberalism on our own premises" with a world fighting for freedom looking on.

Pacific Coast CIO Pledges Support to Returning Evacuees

The CIO wing of Pacific Coast labor has gone on record in support of the Army's revocation of the order excluding persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast and has pledged whole-hearted effort to insure that returning evacuees receive just and decent treatment, the Pacific Citizen reports.

Two large West Coast CIO unions, the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen, and the National Maritime Union, plus the Oregon State CIO Council and the San Diego CIO Council issued statements hailing the government's action in re-opening the West Coast to Japanese Americans.

Harry Bridges, president of the ILWU, has declared, "Our union has never believed that the test of loyalty should be the color of a man's skin. Our brother Americans of Japanese ancestry have shown their patriotism the hard way as evidenced by our members on the battlefronts."

In its statement, the San Diego CIO Council pledged whole-hearted effort to insure fair play for evacuees of Japanese ancestry returning to the area, and warned against domestic reactionaries who would use the return of Japanese Americans as "a means of converting a war of liberation into a fascist race war," the Pacific Citizen adds.

LOCAL SOLDIER AND HIS LIEUTENANT FIGURED PROMINENTLY IN LIBERATION OF BRUYERES

When H Hour dawned, the Lieutenant and Corporal set up their artillery observation post some 300 yards ahead of the advancing infantrymen, on a high hill overlooking the strongly defended key communications center. As the riflemen attacked, the enemy retaliated with heavy concentrations of mortar, artillery and self-propelled gun fire on the

hill.

One company reported an enemy tank advancing toward them from Bruyeres.

In spite of the heavy barrage, Lt. Blackburn, the observer, and Cpl. Shiozawa, the radio operator, left their comparatively safe position in the foxhole in order to seek a better vantage point from which to direct their artillery fire in support of the infantry. After they had found a more suitable spot, they directed their artillery effectively on the German tank, forcing it to retreat. Many enemy strongpoints were reduced to rubble, and their infantry battalion was able to advance in and take the northern end of the town.

Cpl. Shiozawa formerly lived in Oakland, Calif., where he operated a florist shop. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Yoshindo Shiozawa, reside at 317-10-C. He wears the Purple Heart for wounds sustained in Italy.

Lt. Blackburn was a law student at Washburn University, Kan., before entering the service, Feb., 1944.

SEATTLE SUMITOMO BANK NOW IN LIQUIDATION

Creditors of the Sumitomo Bank of Seattle, Seattle, Wash., in liquidation, who have properly proven their claims, will receive checks in payment of a 100% dividend within the next thirty days. This has been announced in a letter from Joe S. Utterback, liquidator, dated Dec. 28, 1944.

Persons who have changed their post office address since proving their claim and who have not notified the bank, should do so at once so that their checks may not be returned unclaimed.

Those who have not yet proven claims are advised to do so at once so that they may be paid at a later date.

Persons who have attempted to prove their claim but who have been unable to do so because of a lost savings passbook or certificate of deposit, may file an affidavit with the bank instead.

Anyone on this project who is a creditor of the firm may contact the evacuee property office and obtain the necessary affidavit for claim.

LEBERTHON IN ARMY

James T. Leberthon, son of James Leberthon, chief of internal security, left last Saturday, Jan. 6, to report for active duty in the armed services at Ft. MacArthur, Calif. By Jan. 17, he will report at Kessler Field, Miss., for air combat training.

Eighteen years old and in the enlisted reserves since last last year, young Leberthon has been employed as gate clerk on the project. A younger son, Edward "Mickey", will enlist in the Navy soon.

FORMER POSTON DOCTOR'S SISTER IS ARMY CAPTAIN

Captain Yoshiye Togasaki, sister of Dr. Teru Togasaki, formerly of Unit III, is the first Japanese American woman to win captain's bars, and will serve with the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, the Pacific Citizen reports.

The captain graduated from the University of California and John Hopkins, and later served as bacteriologist for the city of Berkeley, Calif. Before evacuation to Manzanar center, she was a resident physician at Los Angeles County Hospital.

HOW SOME SOLDIERS FEEL ABOUT THE WHOLE THING

(And here is another editorial, this time from the Midpacifican, published by servicemen in the Central Pacific area.)

Three dispatches just came in from Army News Service.

Two will make you proud.

One will make you angry.

The first, datelined Washington, reveals that a single AJA (Americans of Japanese ancestry) division in Italy was awarded 1,000 Purple Hearts. The second, datelined France, reports how the "lost battalion" in the Saint Dies area was rescued by American soldiers of Japanese ancestry who fought their way through to the trapped men.

The third, datelined Poston, Ariz., tells how a crippled AJA was ejected from a barbershop because the proprietor didn't like his ancestry. The GI was Pvt. Raymond Matsuda, 29, from Hawaii. He had served two years with the 442d Combat Team in Italy. He wears seven campaign ribbons and decorations, including the Purple Heart.

The action of one ignorant American brings shame to all of us.

His ignorance is dangerous. It stabs at the heart of the things for which we fight.

GIs who kill Japanese on Pacific battlefronts can tell you why they feel friendship for the AJAs fighting in Italy.

They're brother Americans.

GIs who kill Nazis know who they continue to like and respect German Americans now fighting at their side in Europe.

We don't make war on people because of the color of their skin, or hair, or the shape of their faces or the nationality of their fathers or mothers.

We fight for an idea.

We kill fascists because they think their race or blood makes them better than other people.

We kill fascists because it's our idea that people from every race and of every tongue should keep on living in our country as good neighbors.

We fight our idea because it is the cement that holds democracy together. We fight against the fascist idea because it is the poison that holds our enemies together.

GIs know that the only difference between our enemies and our friends is what goes on in their minds.

The ignorant American from Arizona is one of a few rotten apples in the big barrel of America. His thinking does not reflect the way America thinks.

He probably doesn't even realize he thinks like our enemies.

But he does.

Misguided people, such as he, parrot the racial ideas of the Nazis and the Japs.

As long as they do, they constitute a menace to our country.

It would be foolish for any GI to feel that fascism will be wiped out with the defeat of Germany and Japan.

The job will not be done until all Americans are educated to think and act like Americans.

That's our job, too.

GARDENA RECONSIDERS LISTING NISEI SOLDIERS

Citizens of Gardena, Calif., are re-considering the omission of Nisei soldiers' names from the town's honor roll, the Pacific citizen has learned from The People's World, a liberal San Francisco newspaper.

The Gardena post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, in refusing to allow Nisei names, omitted the names of Pvt. Kiyoshi Muranaga, who died a heroic death in Italy and was posthumously awarded the nation's second highest military decoration, the Distinguished Service Cross.

The Gardena incident was publicized by Drew Pearson, in his "Washington Merry-Go-Round" column, and Gardena citizens "were quick to acknowledge that a wrong had been done," the Pacific Citizen story said. "Now they insist the mutilated honor roll does not express the feeling of the community."

Friendly statements have come from the following Gardenans: Mayor James E. Rush; City Clerk Lucille Randolph, Louis T. Gill, editor of the Gardena Valley News, Frank Goulet, high school principal, and W. C. Kelley, VFW secretary-treasurer.

JACL OPENS SF OFFICES

With the lifting of the ban for all loyal persons of Japanese ancestry by the Western Defense Command, the National JACL opened its offices in San Francisco, Calif., on Jan. 3.

Miss Teiko Ishida, the acting national secretary, who has been in charge of the New York City office, will be in charge.

The office will work for the betterment of Caucasian and Japanese American relations.

PITTSBURGH LEADERS TO ASSIST RESETTLERS

Pittsburgh, Pa., Dec. 22, 1944--Wholeheartedly endorsing the program to assist evacuees in getting established in Pittsburgh, a group of forty leading residents met in that industrial city on Wednesday, Dec. 20, and formed the Pittsburgh Citizens Committee on Resettlement.

Among the Committee members were representatives of labor, industry, social and welfare agencies, governmental bureaus and churches of several denominations. Also a member is the wife of the mayor of the city.

Outcome of the meeting was the appointment of a nominating committee which was empowered to formulate sub-committees on housing, public information, community participation and employment.

The papers reported the proceedings very favorably and one prominent person in attendance commented that he had rarely seen so representative and influential a group take so determined a stand on a program as had been taken at this meeting.

FRENCH FRONT SOLDIERS ANGRY AT HOOD RIVER LEGION POST'S ACTION

The reaction of front-line soldiers to the news of the Hood River (Ore.) American Legion post's erasure of Nisei soldier names from its honor roll was "bitterly angry" and "particularly vituperative among members of the 1st Battalion of the 141st regiment of the 36th Division" who were rescued last October by Nisei fighters.

These reactions were noted by two war correspondents, Gordon Gammack of the Des Moines Registar and Tribune, and Clinton G. Conger of United Press, according to the Pacific Citizen.

A sample comment came from a former Des Moines attorney, Capt. John Harper, who said, "That Hood River business was the worst thing I ever heard of."

Said Lt. Joseph Kimble of Scranton, Pa.: "Why, the dirty, lousy ... that's the lousiest thing I ever heard of. We men who came off that hill in the mountains know that those Japanese aren't just as good as the average soldier...they're bet-

On furlough in the center from William Beaumont Hospital in El Paso, Tex., is S/Sgt. Min Murakami of Maui, Hawaii, who has been wounded three times on the European front. He holds the Purple Heart with two oak leaf clusters, and ribbons for both the European and Asiatic theaters of war.

S/Sgt. Murakami, who is 26, went overseas in Sept., 1943, and was first wounded in Dec., 1943 at Cori, Italy, where he got a bullet in his arm. On July 9, last year, he received shrapnel wounds at Leghorn, Italy, and on Oct. 17, near the outskirts of Bruyeres, France, he was wounded in the face by a shell fragment.

SECRETARY ICKES IN MESSAGE TO NISEI SOLDIERS

Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes has issued a message to all American soldiers of Japanese ancestry.

It reads, in part, "I have gained deep satisfaction...from the announcement...that West Coast mass exclusion or-

ders have been lifted. This action is a well-earned recognition of the loyalty which the great majority of evacuee people of Japanese ancestry have displayed in the severest test that any group of Americans has ever had to face...

"You have fashioned a magnificent record of service to your country. All good Americans are proud of you...

"This message is addressed to you with full confidence that you will continue to enlarge upon the splendid record of America's fighting Nisei, which has been so effective in demonstrating that Americanism is not a matter of race or ancestry, and in winning the respect of all good Americans for their loyal fellow-countrymen of Japanese descent."

NISEI SOLDIER PATIENTS PRAISED BY ARMY NURSE

NINETY-FIFTH EVACUATION HOSPITAL, ALSACE--Lt. Lillian Smith, pretty, petite nurse from Brooklyn, Ia., told Gordon Gammack, Des Moines Register and Tribune war correspondent, that the wounded American soldier was the most courageous of all and "perhaps the best patients of all are the Japanese Americans."

"A bunch of us girls" were discussing it the other night," the Army nurse said. "We've had German, British, French patients, but the Americans are the real soldiers. They stand terrible pain and don't complain. We have to move them around a lot with broken bones, but they don't cry out.

"The German wounded do, though. They moan and groan over every little thing."

"Maybe it shouldn't go in the paper," the front-line nurse continued. "but perhaps the best patients of all are the Japanese-American soldiers who fought shoulder to shoulder with Iowa's 34th Division and other American units since the start of the Italian campaign.

"They are so grateful for everything you do for them. They always say please and thank you and they are so good about helping each other. All the girls talk about it. Why, a while back, one of them had a broken arm in a cast, yet he helped another wash his teeth."--from the Pacific Citizen, Jan. 6.

Sgt. Lester Hinz, Luverne, Ia.: "That's a shame, a dirty shame. If it was not for them a lot of us wouldn't be alive today. They're real men, those Japanese Americans."

Several of the veteran soldiers said they were writing to Hood River, to President Roosevelt and to congressman, protesting the injustice of the legion post's action.

Among them was Sgt. Hiller Hull of San Antonio, Tex., who said, "I told them they are the ones who ought to

sell their property and get out. I said it's too bad we have to fight for the liberties of men who'll do a dirty thing like that. I said if that sort of thing keeps up we won't want any part of the Legion after the war and we'd like to know the attitude of other Legionnaires in the States.

"I don't like to call them Japs or even refer to their origin. They are doing the same job as we are. I don't see why people back home are so narrow-minded."

only speak and understand Japanese, but read and write present-day idiomatic Japanese, although men having lesser language qualifications may be accepted if enough meeting desired standards do not apply.

Men from 25 to 35 years old are preferred, but men between 20 and 40 will be considered. Those under 30 will be considered only if they are classified 4F under Selective Service, but can pass the required overseas medical examination.

Salary is generally \$3,200 per year plus regular federal overtime pay of about \$628 per year. While on overseas duty, an additional living allowance is provided, planned to cover living essentials. Employees are entitled to federal compensation benefits resulting from accidents or illness due to conditions of employment. Employees are also entitled to insurance, up to \$5,000 covering all contingencies overseas, for which rates are low and vary with the age of the individual.

These are Civil Service positions and require three copies of Form 57, "Application for Federal Employment" and a physical examination for overseas duty. Arrangements for the physical check are also made on each applicant. It takes a minimum of sixty days and sometimes considerably longer, to process the application of an acceptable candidate.

Discharged Poston Vet Accepted As Hollywood Legion Post Member

One of the first Japanese-American World War II veterans to become a member of the American Legion is Santa Ana-born Harley Oka of Poston who has joined Hollywood Post No. 591. He was discharged last month from the Army for medical reasons.

Appearing in Monday's issue of both the Los Angeles Times and Examiner were pictures of Oka and several other evacuees returning to the Coast, who were shown being greeted by Mayor Fletcher Bowron.

Others from Poston in the pictures were Mary, Jack and Henry Yoshimizu of Block 2, who, according to the Examiner's story, plan to go East soon.

A former Hollywood businessman, he obtained permission from the WRA to return to the Coast. The 28-year-old graduate of Huntington Beach High School and Woodbury Business College in Los Angeles, was among 34 World War II veterans recently sworn into the Hollywood Post by Post Commander William Schneider. Will Combine With Block 5 February 1

Orders to close Block 12 mess hall were issued by Project Director Duncan Mills at the administrative staff meeting last week. Block 12, with a population of 113, will combine with Block 5, which also has a depleted population. The order is effective Jan. 29.

Mess halls serving less than 125 residents will be investigated by a special committee, to determine whether they should be combined.

At present, Blks. 12, 15, 21, 207, 209, 221, and 310 come under this category.

The local councils and the Community Council Food Committee have all protested vigorously against combining mess halls, which will mean reduction in mess workers. The majority of councilmen feel that since relocation centers will close within the year, this action is unnecessary.

PTS. FROM POST-EXCLUSION BULLETIN NO. 2
Dillon Myer Clarifies Exclusion Lift

Clarification of Dates:

Midnight, Jan. 2 is the date that revocation of mass exclusion orders became effective. Cleared evacuees may leave immediately for the West Coast; they do not have to wait until Jan. 20, which is the date that the Army will revoke orders on centers in the Western Defense Command, designated as military areas. They will remain in effect until then so that the War Dept. may complete its investigations.

Status of Visitors:

All visitors whose applications for reinduction were pending at the time when revocation of exclusion orders was announced, or who have subsequently applied, cannot be reinducted. Special cases will be carefully considered.

Relocation of Unattached Minors:

In view of the Endo decision, unattached children or children wishing to relocate without being accompanied by or going to responsible relatives cannot be refused permission if they are cleared. However, WRA has a moral responsibility here, and minors and older family members are advised to consult Family Welfare regarding state laws governing interstate placement of children. Minors must also have an approved relocation plan to qualify for relocation assistance, and because of their dependency, are urged not to leave until such a plan has been developed.

Travel Assistance:

1. Relocated evacuees are eligible for grants only if they are returning to the state or portion of state from which they were evacuated. However, in cases where the family head was evacuated from one state and his dependents from another, dependents may receive grants to accompany him to his former home.

2. Visitors cannot apply at centers for travel assistance for return to the Coast. They must apply to the field officer nearest the point they resided before visiting the center.

3. Travel grants for relocatees returning to the Coast will cover the most direct routing between the present residence and the Coast destination. Any additional travel involved will be made at their own expense.

4. Arrangements are being made to provide automobile transportation reimbursement for eligible relocatees returning to the Coast.

Housing Requirements for Relocation Planning:

Because of the acute housing shortage on the Coast and the difficulties experienced by those returning without prior housing plans, WRA will require evacuees to show evidence of such plans before approving their relocation plan. These arrangements may be temporary, but should be for a long enough period to permit the evacuee to obtain permanent housing.

Travel Permits for Hawaii and Alaska:

All evacuees desiring to travel to Hawaii or Alaska should submit requests to the Japanese American Branch, Office of the Provost Marshal General, Presidio, San Francisco, Calif.

Leave Clearance:

WRA is now out of the leave clearance business. All future determinations on freedom of movement of individual evacuees will be made either by the War Dept. or the Dept. of Justice.

The evacuee property officer has information regarding some lost baggage belonging to evacuees who left recently for Burley, Idaho.

Anyone having knowledge of people who have lost baggage or express is asked to call at the Evacuee Property Office.

SEVERAL CORRECTIONS

It was erroneously reported in the last issue that Joseph M. Fien, fire protection officer, was to assume the duties of guard chief at Manzanar center. He will be fire chief there.

It has also been learned that Harley Woodhouse, assistant fire protection officer, is to remain in Poston in his present position.

The name of Keith Hurlburt, who left for employment in Michigan, was spelled incorrectly in the same story.

And Dr. Jay D. Dunshee, new acting principal medical officer, was formerly head of the California, not the Colorado, Public Health Department.

ISSEI URGED TO RESETTLE IN NEW YORK AREA

New York City is pictured in a recent report as an area in which some of the 60,000 Japanese being resettled nationally could find excellent jobs and business opportunities and a not unfriendly population.

This was the conclusion reached on the basis of interviews with 30 of 100 Japanese who have conducted successful businesses or held jobs in the metropolis since Pearl Harbor Day, according to Leo T. Simmons, acting supervisor of the Middle Atlantic area of the WRA, the New York Times said on Thursday, Dec. 28.

Few Issei have gone to New York since relocation was undertaken, Mr. Simmons said. He argued that there are no sound reasons against their going there. He noted the lack of discrimination reported by the persons interviewed, even during the period shortly after the outbreak of war, toward Japanese business people even though many of these businesses are with Caucasians.

He said the Japanese consulted not only said they believed the New York district to be a good place for Issei evacuees to open new business, but they offered to advise and otherwise aid newcomers in getting started.

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALES REACH \$780.75 TOTAL

Complete returns on the sale of 1944 Christmas seals was \$780.75, in comparison to last year's \$494.08, indicating that residents have acquired a deeper understanding of the importance of the fight against tuberculosis, the local Red Cross reports.

The Red Cross acted as central campaign and sales agency for the community.

Of the total, Unit I is credited with \$483.75, Unit II with \$112.65, and Unit III with \$184.35. Fifty percent of the net proceeds will be retained for local use, and the remaining will go to the Arizona State Tuberculosis Association, which will send five percent to the National Anti-Tuberculosis Fund.

Those participating as salesmen were the Women's Clubs, appointed personnel, Red Cross office, high schools, elementary schools, and the hospital.

Appreciation is expressed by the Red Cross to volunteer workers for the success of the drive, as well as to residents for their co-operation.

WASHINGTON APPROVES ALL-CENTER CONFERENCES

Approval for a conference of delegates from the various relocation centers was received from the WRA office in Washington, according to Minoru Okamoto, city manager.

The conference, the purpose of which is to discuss relocation and its problems, will not be held until a later date, Mr. Okamoto said. He felt that it should wait until the WRA announces its future policies for the relocation projects.

SOLDIERS' DEPENDENCY BENEFITS

With the lifting of the ban, relocation will be speeded up. Among those relocating will be many families with sons and husbands in the armed forces. For the benefit of those who will be eligible to receive family allowances as dependents, a series of articles dealing with such payments for soldiers' dependents will be published. A copy of the pamphlet from which the following information is taken is available at the selective service office to any enlisted man or inductee awaiting call.

ELIGIBLE DEPENDENTS

Class A Dependents--The lawful wife of a soldier, his children, and a former wife divorced who has not remarried and to whom alimony is still payable. Also, a wife living separate and apart from soldier under court order or written agreement providing for maintenance or support. These need only prove relationship.

LAWFUL WIFE includes wife living in soldier's household, wife living separate and apart, and common-law wife if marriage was contracted in a state in which common-law marriages were recognized when such marriage was established.

FORMER WIFE DIVORCED includes only the former wife who has not remarried and to whom alimony is still payable.

CHILD includes soldier's legitimate child, adopted child, stepchild of a member of the man's household, illegitimate child if the required proof of paternity is submitted, and any child to whom he has stood in loco parentis (in place of parent) for at least one year prior to the date of application. To be eligible, a child must be unmarried, under 18, or of any age if incapable of self-support by reason of mental or physical defect.

NOTE--The husband and child of an enlisted woman are eligible only if they are dependent upon her for chief support.

Class B Dependents--Parents and minor brothers and sister are defined below, who are dependent upon soldier for their chief support.

PARENT includes father, mother, grandfather, grandmother, stepfather, stepmother, father and mother through adoption, either of the soldier or of his spouse, and persons, who for a period of not less than 1 year prior to the man's enlistment or induction, stood in loco parentis to the soldier. No more than two parents are eligible for an allowance based on the service of one soldier.

BROTHER AND SISTER include brothers and sisters of the half blood as well as of the whole blood, stepbrothers, stepsisters, and brothers and sisters through adoption. To be eligible, a brother or sister must be unmarried and under 18, or of any age if incapable of self-support by reason of mental or physical defect.

Class B-I Dependents--Parents, brothers and sisters who are dependent upon the soldier for a substantial portion of their support. Class B dependents may receive a family allowance only if there is no allowance being paid to the soldier's class B-I dependents.

NOTE--Class B-I and B dependents may receive family allowance only with the soldier's consent. Payments will be discontinued at his request at any time. (TO BE CONTINUED)

In contrast to this action was the fact that the State Department of the Legion, shortly after Pearl Harbor, suspended the Post charters of two all-Japanese Posts, all veterans of World War I. The Los Angeles Fury Post, with a membership of 78, and a San Francisco Post, which has 28 members, were the two suspended Posts, and both suspensions still stand.

The Hollywood Post also unanimously adopted a resolution condemning the Hood River (Ore.) Post for its recent action in taking the names of 16 Japanese-American servicemen from the city roll of honor. Post No. 591 also set forth in its statement of aims and purposes that it will not practise any discrimination, whether it be of color, creed, or race.

There are some that plan to stay put..."The government shoved us in here so why should we move"....unable to forget what it did to them during evacuation....Losing everything they have built, their trust in government offers are gone and they can't believe any promises made by the government because it changes so often.

Pfc. Masaru Abe, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Katsuji Abe of Block 318 was one of the twenty Nisei heroes awarded the Bronze Star Medal by Lt. Jacob L. Devers for valorous conduct in action at France, according to Pacific Citizen. He is the member of the 100th Battalion, 7th Army.

He suffered a slight wound in his right hand palm and was also awarded a Purple Heart according to his sister who received a letter from him recently.

JA FISHERMEN MAY RESUME COAST FISHING

Japanese - American fishermen who are returning to their former homes on the Pacific Coast from relocation centers have the assurance of the WRA and the Coast Guard that they will get their vessels back and be allowed to resume fishing under the same regulations that affect other fishermen, the Phoenix Gazette said on Jan. 13.

Dillon Myer, WRA director, said in a press conference that federal agencies will protect the rights of the evacuees, and that anti-Japanese feeling on the Coast has decreased materially, the story added.

* SOLDIERS' DEPENDENCY BENEFITS *
* NO. II, HOW TO APPLY *

1. How Is Application Made?

(a) Application should be made only on official form (WD AGO) Form No. 625. These forms are available at Army reception centers, Army recruiting stations, American Red Cross chapters, service command headquarters, and the Office of Dependency Benefits, 213 Washington St., Newark 2, New Jersey.

(b) Documentary evidence should accompany all applications, and no payments may be made until the evidence has been submitted and approved. There is one exception: if soldier serving in Alaska or

outside the continental United States files application for class A dependents without attaching such evidence, payment may be authorized. Evidence should, however, be submitted as soon as practicable within six months, or payments will be stopped. (All required evidence for a Class B or B-1 dependent must be submitted with the application.)

(c) All questions on the form must be answered.

2. Who Should File The Application?

(a) The soldier himself should apply for the family allowance, if practicable. He should file application with his commanding officer. Official application form (WD AGO) Form No. 625) will be given him at the reception center. He should follow carefully the simple instructions printed on form and, if possible, attach all required documentary proof of claims of relationship and dependency.

(b) Dependents may apply but it is best for the soldier to apply. His wife or child (also a divorced wife who has not remarried and to whom alimony is still payable) may receive this benefit with or without his consent. But class B-1 and class B dependents may receive it only if the soldier agrees.

3. Where Is Application Sent After It Is Filed Out?

(a) Instructions are printed on the final page of the four-page form. A civilian applying should retain copy marked Applicant's Copy and instruction sheet and mail remaining pages of form to the Office of Dependency Benefits, 213 Washington St., Newark 2, New Jersey. Soldier should retain Applicant's copy and instruction sheet of form and turn in remaining pages to his commanding officer, who will forward them to the ODB.

(b) Civilians should be sure to put sufficient postage on their envelopes in mailing applications and evidence. Three cents' postage is not always sufficient. (To be continued)

DUNCAN MILLS EXPLAINS WRA RELOCATION ASSISTANCE

In the following message to residents, Director Duncan Mills explains the two forms of assistance, advisory and financial, which the WRA is providing in planning the closure of the centers and the re-establishment of people in normal communities. Financial aid will be provided to those whose relocation plans are approved by the relocation division. All families are advised to discuss their plans with the relocation division or welfare section at the earliest possible date.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Financial aid will be given as follows to those whose relocation plans are approved:

1. Transportation to the place of resettlement.

2. In case of need, \$3 per day per family member to cover cost of meals on the journey.

3. In case of need, \$25 per family member to assist in re-establishment.

4. Transportation of household goods, personal effects, and to a limited extent, commercial property.

ADVISORY ASSISTANCE

1. Accurate, expert advice as to the use of resources of the community to which the family relocates.

2. Information concerning travel.

3. Assistance in bringing together family members who have been separated.

4. Information about government agencies which can aid resettlers.

APPOINTMENT FOR INTERVIEWS

Appointments are being made for discussions with the relocation and welfare departments on a day-to-day basis, as they have been in the past. However, families do not have to wait for appointments. They may consult the unit relocation offices at any time.

Families or individuals who cannot support themselves should discuss their problems with the welfare counselors at the earliest possible time. Those facing this situation can rest assured that arrangements can be made for their resettlement with complete security.

LEAVE REGULATIONS

It is no longer necessary to apply for indefinite leave.

Persons desiring WRA assistance should consult the relocation offices. Assistance will be given, departure arrangements made, and a gate pass prepared. The gate pass can be picked up at the departure station as they leave.

Persons who do not want WRA assistance should make their request at the leave office where a gate pass will be issued. However, in deciding to leave without WRA aid, they forfeit their right to transportation and assistance grants and other WRA assistance.

Persons wishing to leave the center for a short period of time for adequate reasons may do so. Arrangements for such passes should be made at the relocation offices.

NITTA HOMECOMING TOLD IN LONG BEACH PAPER

The welcome given by Methodist church members to the Nitta family of Poston on their return to Santa Ana, Calif., was described at length in the Jan. 8 issue of the Long Beach Press Telegram.

"The Nittas were welcomed yesterday," the story said, "with a brief sermon on racial tolerance. After services, the churchgoers crowded to shake their hands."

According to the article, the Nittas had stopped for food only once on the trip from Poston to Santa Ana, and that at the home of a Methodist minister in Indio. "We didn't want to cause trouble," Shosuke Nitta was quoted as saying.

Living in a shack on the edge of their property, the Nittas are giving the tenants of their ranch six months to evacuate. Meanwhile they plan "to fix up the place a little."

SUPREME COURT'S APPROVAL OF EVACUATION WAS "LEGALIZATION OF RACISM" DAYS JUSTICE MURPHY

In THE OPEN FORUM, bulletin of the Southern California branch of the American Civil Liberties Union, for Dec. 30, Jan. 6 and 13, is contained a review of the Supreme Court decisions which rendered unconstitutional the detention of an American citizen in a relocation center, solely because of ancestry, and upheld the validity of evacuation as a military necessity.

Especially emphasized by the FORUM, is a paragraph from Justice Frank Murphy, who along with Justices Jackson and Douglas, dissented from the Supreme Court's approval of the exclusion of Japanese from the West Coast as a military necessity.

DOMESTIC POSITIONS OPEN IN CALIFORNIA

Six job offers received here recently from California were all for domestics. Interested persons should contact their respective relocation offices.

Three of the offers were for couples. One was from near Pasadena, one from Beverly Hills, and one from Hollywood.

Wages vary from \$125 to \$200 a month for couples, while the San Francisco job for a single person offers \$100 a month.

The paragraph follows:

"I dissent, therefore, from this legalization of racism. Racial discrimination in any form and in any degree has no justifiable part whatever in our democratic way of life. It is unattractive in any setting, but it is revolting among a free people who have embraced the principles set forth in the Constitution of the United States. All residents of this nation are kin in some way by blood or culture to a foreign land. Yet they are primarily and necessarily a part of the new and distinct civilization of the United States. They must accordingly be treated at all times as the heirs of the American experiment and as entitled to all the rights and freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution."

Branches of the ACLU on the Coast will assist the many other agencies in straightening out problems of the return of the Japanese-American and alien population, the OPEN FORUM also reported.

The writer has been living in the Milwaukee, Wisc. district for a period of a little over a half year, and feels like a veteran middle westerner. For the benefit of those residents of Poston who are not planning to return to the west coast and who might be contemplating the possibilities of relocating in the middle west, I thought I'd scribble some of my impressions of this locality during my short residence in this district.

First of all, I have noticed that the sentiment here is just plain wonderful. The people on the streets, in the shops in the street cars, in the government offices or public places have been really friendly. The reputation of the people of Japanese ancestry here has been worked up gradually, and it may be frankly said that we are accepted in the category of above the average class of people. No matter where one goes, he or she is treated with sincere courtesy.

All this has been due to many things. For one thing, the leading newspaper of Milwaukee, the Journal, has been giving the Japanese-Americans very good publicity. It is rare that a week passes by without some news of benefit to us appearing either in the news column or in the editorials. Killed in action in Italy last August, Pfc. Harry F. Madokoro, 32, from Watsonville, Calif., has been posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for "extraordinary heroism in action" on two occasions. Madokoro was chief of police in Unit II before he volunteered for service. His mother, Mrs. Matsu Madokoro, lives at 213-13-G.

Mills Approves Manpower Commission Recommendation

It has been decided that reduced kitchen quotas set by Washington will be met by April 1 by not replacing workers who terminate. No one now working will be terminated.

The Manpower Commission recommendation to this effect has been approved by Project Director Mills, with one limitation. That is, if normal losses have not brought any block down to quota by April 1, surplus workers will be given terminations at that time.

More than 300 workers in the three units are involved in the quota reduction. It is estimated that this will mean an average of five workers below the present employment level in each block.

Where two mess halls are consolidated, the new consolidated kitchen will be limited to the Washington quota. For example, instead of 30 workers in consolidated kitchen 5-12, there will be 26.

One other Manpower Commission recommendation has been accepted by Director Mills as a working basis. This (cont. on Unit 1 page)

PFC. HARRY MADOKORO WINS POSTHUMOUS DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS

Italy...during the final assault on an enemy held hill, Pfc. Madokoro advanced ahead of his squad to a strategic position from which he could deliver effective automatic rifle fire. Partly exposed to enemy fire, he scanned his sector of the slope for targets. He leveled his automatic rifle on a position and proceeded

nest of snipers, forcing them to disperse. Throughout the bitter fight he held his position, neutralizing another enemy nest and pinning down the enemy to enable his platoon to take the hill.

"Again...on July 17, 1944...at Luciana, Italy, Pfc. Madokoro occupied an advanced position and proceeded

to fire on the enemy entrenched on the outskirts of the town. With heavy fire directed at him, he stubbornly held his position and provided covering fire when his squad was forced to withdraw because of a concentrated artillery and mortar barrage. The following day, when his squad became separated from the remainder of the company within the town, Pfc. Madokoro provided flank protection against determined enemy attacks. A group of enemy soldiers entered a nearby draw and threw hand grenades at him, but Pfc. Madokoro crawled toward the draw and tossed a grenade into the enemy position. On another occasion he left his position and silenced a machine pistol position with a grenade. Still later in the course of the battle, he approached an enemy machine gun nest and silenced it by firing

"from a kneeling position. By his stubborn determination, conspicuous devotion to duty and courage, Pfc. Madokoro inspired his squad in preventing the enemy's escape while his company closed in to occupy the town."

* SOLDIERS' DEPENDENCY BENEFITS *

* NO. III WHEN PAYABLE *

The difference between "Initial" and "Regular Monthly" family allowances, and how soon they are payable:

1. The Servicemen's Dependents Allowance Act of 1942, as amended, provides for the payment of an INITIAL family allowance to certain dependents of enlisted men who entered the service on or after Nov. 1, 1943. This initial family allowance payment is contributed entirely by the government, and no deduction is made from the soldier's pay.

Application for an initial family allowance must be made by the soldier within 15 days after entering active duty on pay status.

An initial family allowance payment is made only to class A dependents (wife and children) and class B-1 dependents (parents, brothers, and sisters who are dependents upon the soldier for chief support).

The initial family allowance payment covers the month in which the soldier entered the service, and is mailed from the finance office at the station to which the soldier is assigned.

2. Regular MONTHLY payments of family allowance will be made by the Office of Dependency Benefits, Newark 2, New Jersey, if documentary evidence of relationship or dependency supporting the soldier's sworn statements is submitted to and approved by that office. On the basis of the evidence, the Office of Dependency benefits will determine whether payment of monthly family allowance is warranted, and the amount to be paid in accordance with the provisions of the Servicemen's Dependents Allowance Act of 1942, as amended. In some cases the regular monthly amount may be different from the amount of the initial payment.

Dependents who receive an initial allowance will not receive a monthly allowance for the same month. The regular monthly family allowance is "earned" during the calendar month after the soldier entered the Army and is payable after it is earned. For example: If the soldier enters the Army March 3, and his dependents receive the initial family allowance March 10, the regular monthly family allowance, if approved by the Office of Dependency Benefits, will be "earned" during April and will not be payable until May. Thereafter regular monthly checks will be mailed after the end of the month in which they are "earned."

EXCERPTS FROM POST-EXCLUTION BULLETIN NO. 3

Issued by Acting WRA Director John H. Provinsse

Alien Travel Permits: For a short period after Dec. 17, some U.S. attorneys believed they had no authority to issue travel permits to Japanese aliens from travel to the evacuated area. This misunderstanding has been corrected, and all U.S. attorneys have been instructed that they may issue permits in such cases, if the individual is not an excludee.

Eligibility of Reinductees For Relocation Assistance: The provision that all relocated evacuees must secure advance approval of the area relocation office for returning to a center went into effect July 20, 1943. Consequently, all center residents reinducted or admitted without such approval at any time after that date are ineligible for relocation assistance. Those previously inducted are eligible on the same basis as other center residents.

Modifications of Visiting Policy: Two changes in the policy governing visitors have been approved. The first will make it possible for members of the armed forces on furlough or awaiting call to active duty to visit the centers. They were previously omitted through inadvertence. The second will broaden the policy covering visits for relocation planning purposes, so as to include evacuees who need to visit the centers to develop plans with potential associates in business or agricultural enterprises. However, it is still required that the visit must be requested by the center residents with whom the planning is to be done.

Denial of Admission To Visitors At The Gate: In most cases where evacuees appear outside center gates asking permission to visit without advance approval, they will be admitted temporarily and processed. However, if they do not fall into any of the approved visitor categories, the Project Director is authorized at his own discretion to deny admission.

Group Relocation: The ruling that "approval will not usually be given (for travel assistance covering investigatory trips) where more than three families are to reside on contiguous farms or in an immediate neighborhood" has been dropped. However, WRA will continue to discourage the relocation of groups consisting of more than six families except in cases where the relocation officer feels it might be advisable.

Social Visits: Evacuees living in nearby communities may not visit the centers over weekends for social purposes. However, in cases where an evacuee in a nearby community has valid reasons to visit the center for relocation planning, and where his presence is requested by center residents, he may be admitted.

Among those present were resettlers, long-resident local Japanese, about 50 Nisei soldiers from Hawaii and the mainland, and 100 Caucasian friends. One of the guests was Sono Osato, famous dancer who is currently being featured on Broadway in "On The Town."

Receipts, to go to the New York War Fund, totalled \$250 from the sale of tickets and of a Directory of Japanese Americans in New York, which was prepared by the War Fund Committee. The directory includes the names, addresses and telephone numbers of 125 individuals, and various church and business organizations.

Dr. Kanzo Oguri, prominent Brooklyn physician, is chairman of the Japanese American War Fund Committee.

Patients hospitalized in Phoenix hospitals for over one month and soldiers receiving honorable discharges at Ft. Douglas, Utah, will no longer be charged for subsistence and room on their return here, as they have been since Jan. 2.

Because of complaints which arose out of the Washington ruling which stated that such persons could not be reinstated, the Community Council recently sent a protest to WRA Washington through Project Director Mills, and approval has been received here to have the order retracted.

This is a city of about 1,000,000, but the main business and shopping district is very concisely located within an area of just about 10 blocks square. Within this area are located the two R.R. stations, the court house, post offices, police dept., motor vehicle dept., majority of the theaters and hotels, most of the large department stores, number of factories, and countless number of business concerns of all kinds. One is able to cover the whole main section of the city as a pedestrian within a few hours. I have never seen any city of this size with such a concise and compact main business section. This fact brings to one's mind the question of highly congested traffic. Well, it is peculiar, but there is just one street, the Wisconsin Avenue, on which both traffic and pedestrians decrease to a point that one would think it was a suburb.

Travel facilities are better than the average under the circumstances. There are street cars and trackless trolleys on practically every street for local service, and motor busses running day and night to the outskirts of the city. A \$1.00 weekly pass allows one to travel anywhere within the city limits, and a \$1.50 pass takes one to the suburbs within a radius of 20 miles. Two railroad systems run to Chicago, the trains coming and going at practically hourly intervals and for about \$2.00 fare. (continued)

PROCEDURE FOR GRADUAL LIQUIDATION OF CENTER OUTLINED

Dr. A. L. Harris Explains Poston School Situation

In a message to Poston parents entitled, "Where Will My Children Attend School In September, 1945?", Dr. Arthur L. Harris, superintendent of schools, has set forth facts of the school situation.

Regular classes will end June 4, and under no circumstances will nursery schools or a possible summer session stay open after Aug. 31.

After that date, (1) there will be no money for teachers' salaries or school supplies, and appointed teachers are expected to leave in June or July; (2) all school records will be sent to Washington and it will be necessary to write there for copies (cont. on Unit I page)

ANOTHER POSTON GIRL ENLISTS IN THE WAC

MILWAUKEE, WIS.—Toshiko Nancy Etow, formerly of Watsonville, Calif., left Jan. 24 for Des Moines, Ia., to train as a medical technician.

"I thought I could best utilize the nurses' aide training I had at the Colorado River Project in service for my country by becoming a medical aide in the WAC," Miss Etow said. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenzo Etow, 216-5-B, and has a brother, James, in Denver, Colo., who is waiting to be called for active military service.

She is the seventh Poston girl to enlist in the WAC.

Mills Says No More Reinductions Will Be Permitted Into Center

Except in a few special cases, no more reinductions or visits into the center will be permitted, Project Director Duncan Mills has announced.

In all the special cases, except soldiers on furlough, advance approval must be obtained from the appropriate field or center relocation officer.

The exceptions are listed below:

1. Visits necessary to further relocation plans of family members living in Poston.

2. Students at the end of a school term, if they did not relocate on a permanent basis.

3. Emergency visits because of serious illness or death of family members in the center.

4. Persons who have been accepted for army service and are awaiting induction, or those (cont. on Unit I page)

WASHINGTON MUST OKAY MESS QUOTA DECISION

A serious omission was made in the story last week concerning lowered mess quotas to be met April 1.

The recommendation by the Manpower Commission that the quotas be met by not replacing terminating workers has been approved by Director Mills, but his approval is subject to approval by WRA Washington. The approval has been requested, but has not yet been received.

According to directives from Washington, a plan for the step-by-step liquidation of relocation centers will be followed here.

All agricultural activities will be reduced and nothing will be planted which cannot be harvested before July 1. There will be no more purchases of swine, but it is believed that there is enough to last until July. No new chicks will be purchased; flocks will be consumed as they go out of laying.

All construction will be completed this quarter. This includes two school buildings and the garage annex. Two laterals now being worked on will be completed.

Maintenance will be curtailed with no new equipment to be purchased over an absolute minimum.

BOSTON WILL SEND FOUR DELEGATES TO CONFERENCE

Poston will send four delegates to the all-center conference which will probably be held at Salt Lake City, Utah, the Community Council has announced.

Two of the delegates will be selected from Unit I and one each from Units II and III.

A wire from Masaru Narahara, chairman of the Topaz Community Council, recommended that the conference begin tentatively on the week starting Feb. 5, but the Poston Council is requesting that the date be postponed in order to have time to prepare an agenda for the conference.

POSTON I MID-TERM GRADUATES NUMBER 34

SOLDIER'S DEPENDENCY BENEFITS *

NO. IV AMOUNTS PAID *

DEDUCTION FROM SOLDIER'S PAY: \$22 a month is deducted from the soldier's pay, if the family allowance is for class A, B-1 or B dependents only; \$27, if it is for more than one class of dependents. This is deducted for all regular monthly payments of a family allowance. (No sum is deducted for the initial allowance.) The initial allowance is paid only if the soldier applies within 15 days after he enters active duty on pay status. (The entire sum is paid by the government and made by the disbursing officers in the field, not by CDB.)

In case alimony payable to a former wife divorced is less than \$22 a month, a monthly deduction of less than \$22 (the exact amount of the alimony) will be made from the soldier's pay, provided the soldier has no other dependents who receive family allowance.

SOLDIER'S DEPENDENTS BENEFITS: Class A Dependents--The amounts are fixed by law for each eligible dependent, as follows: Wife (no child)--\$50*; wife and one child--\$80; wife and two children--\$100; for each additional child--an additional \$20; former wife divorced**--up to \$40; former wife divorced and one child**--up to \$72; former wife divorced and two children**--up to \$92; for each additional child--an additional \$20; child but no wife--\$42; for each additional child--an additional \$20.

Class B-1 Dependents--one parent--\$50; two parents--\$68; one parent and one brother or sister--\$68; two parents and one brother or sister--\$79; one brother or sister but no parent--\$42; for each additional brother or sister--an additional \$11.

Class B Dependents--One class B dependent or more than one--\$37. This amount is a flat rate, no matter how many dependents there are, and is payable only if there is no family allowance payable to any class B-1 dependents.

BIDDLE SAYS 5,000 AT TULE LAKE CENTER ASK FOR REPATRIATION

Five thousand residents of Rule Lake center have applied for repatriation to Japan, Attorney General Francis Biddle has disclosed.

Among this number, he said, were "70 to 80 vicious internees, whose disloyalties had definitely been established."

BUDDHISTS ASK POSSESSION OF HONGWANJI TEMPLE

A battle looms in Los Angeles Municipal Court over the possession of the Hompa Hongwanji Temple.

The Temple has filed suit against the Providence Baptist Association for

"unlawful detention" of their properties. The action states that the property was leased to the Baptist Association for one year on Jan. 5, 1944, and that upon expiration of the lease, the Baptists refused to move out. It also asserts that, in violation of the terms of the lease, the tenants subleased and rented space to individuals for living quarters.

The court is asked to evict the present tenants and to assess damages at \$50 a day for each day's occupancy of the premises since the lease expired.

The Baptists are a Negro group.

*-Wife living separate and apart under permanent or temporary court order or written agreement is limited to amount provided therein, up to \$50.

**-In no case will the monthly payment to a former wife divorced exceed \$42. If alimony is more than \$42, payment may be in the amount of \$42; if alimony is less than \$42 a month, payment is in the exact amount of alimony. Under the law as amended, payments to a soldier's wife and his former wife divorced are no longer divided proportionately. The wife receives \$50; the former wife, up to \$42.

to enable children to enter outside schools.

The Arizona State High School Visitor inspected secondary schools in I and II this month and results indicate that satisfactorily completed credits will be accredited by the state for transfer to any high school. Dr. Harris further notes that the school program here is adequate to make transfer during the school year possible without loss of time or credit. Relocated students usually report that they are ahead of students in other schools.

"...Parents must sacrifice the false sense of security they have developed...both for their own welfare and for the welfare of their children," the message concludes.

(A former Postonite continues with his impressions of the Milwaukee, Wis., area:)

"The countryside is really beautiful in the summertime. It is not at all dry and dusty like in Arizona or California, but is nice and green and refreshing. There seems to be very little fruit farming except for cherries and apples. Of course, the main country occupation is grain farming and cattle and dairy, but one sees quite a lot of vegetable growing. The soil seems to be rich and generally on the heavy side.

"The weather does not seem to be as good as one would like to see it. The summer months of June, July and August are really hot in a sultry sort of way, and to one who is unaccustomed to this weather, it is very uncomfortable and is difficult to stay in houses. Even after taking a shower one does not feel refreshed and clean because the perspiration insists upon clinging to the body. So what we do is to go out to the lake shores or to the parks to lounge around until late in the evening. While winter this year has been reported to be one of the severest in the past half century, if this is a fair example of a Milwaukee winter, it frankly is miserable. It isn't so bad until about the first of December. Then it really gets bad. The temperature itself doesn't get alarmingly low --about -15 at the most, but the combination of sub zero temperature plus high humidity and a brisk breeze off of the lakes really cuts through you like ice

ers of clothes you have on. Of course, the severity lets up a bit in the middle of February (so I understand).

Housing problem is, of course, still a big headache. But with a little perseverance and looking around, they are not impossible to find. One good thing is that there is very little if any discrimination shown in any district. If one is interested in investing in a house and lot, there are many homes to be purchased anywhere from \$2500 and up, and at 20% down with monthly payments for the balance. At any rate, the housing situation as a whole doesn't appear to be getting any worse.

Work opportunities here, as most anywhere else, are plentiful. Again, there appears to be very little prejudice shown toward any race in regards to employment, and there are Niseis as well as Isseis employed in many different kinds of shops, and doing all kinds of work. For instance, in the shop where the writer is employed, there are about 15 Niseis, two Isseis, three Negros, 2 Italian, two Polish people working side by side, along with others. Unskilled laborers generally start at about 70¢ per hour and usually get raised to 80¢ per hour within a few months. Skilled laborers are paid anywhere from \$1.00 per hour and up.
