all of which were not far from Woolsey's Ranch; with 8 others located on May
21, 1864, 200 feet each on the "Deadwood" lode at "a place 2 miles west of a
point where the trail leaves Lynx Creek for Granite Creek".
Was Secretary of the 3d Territorial Council at Prescott, 1866; and
District Attorney of Yavapai County, 1868-69; listed, U.S. Census, 1870, at
Brescott, age 39, occupation - Lawyer, property valued at \$6,000. The Prescott
Arizona Miner printed the following item on September 24, 1870:
"The Del Pasco Co. sent out a pack train laden with provisions and tools, on Tuesday last, and Messrs. Rountree, Holstein, and half dozen other gents went along to see the new mines on the Bradshaw mountains."
Died at Nashville, Washington County, Illinois, April - 1873, buried
