I called the bill up in the final meeting of the Committee on the Public Lands, but the Committee vecided not to report it at this session of Congress because it is impossible to pass any new legislation between now and the 4th of March. Smator Ashurst, however, has succeeded in obtaining a favorable report from the Sonate Committee on Public Lands, of which I enclose a copy. I doubt very much whether anything further will be cone with the bill in the Senate. I shall be glad to give careful consideration to the suggestions which you have made before reintroducing the bill in the next Congress. About a half a dozen members of the Committee on In-Wien Affairs of the House are planning an inspection trip Frough the West, and I have suggested that it would be well for them to visit the Havasupai Agency.
