Dear Sir:

The Havasupai Indians have asked me to write you that they regret not having had the pleasure of meeting the Committee on Indian Affairs as was planed and of laying before the Committee in person their reasons for wanting this land known as the Indian Pasture for a reservation.

We would be pleased if before this bill comes up again you could visit us and see this land. Should we get this land as an Indian reservation we wish to have included the agriculture land which lies just east of the Indian Pasture or grazing permit. This would include all land between Cataract and the Grand Canyon and west of the east line of sections Nos. 20,17,8, 5, 32, 29, 20, and 17 Range 1 West of the Gila and Salt River meridan to the junction of the Cataract and the Grand Canyons.

For further information relative to the value of this land to the Havasupai Indians I would respectfully refer you Mr. H. F. Robinson, Supt. of Irrigation, Albuquerque, N. M. Mr. Robinson is familiar with the needs of these Indians and is familiar with this land in question.
