Dear Carl:-

After coming down town the other day for the first time in ten days, I took cold again and had to go to bed. Consequently, as I have not been at the office, I have not written to you as I told you in my telegram that I would.

What I desired to call your attention to regarding your proposed creation of a National Park at the Grand Canyon is the fact that the Forest Service officials here are of the opinion that the western boundaries of the Park might be improved by making the same conform to section lines instead of the rim of Cataract Canyon. Supervisor Greene informs me that he has written to you regarding the matter, and that he has explained the same to you in detail.

From an administrative standpoint I think he is right, and I believe there can be no possible objection to amending the bill to conform to his suggestions.
