The 'Biggest Little Rodeo' in the world

Hardly a soul rode into Reno on horseback for the eighth annual National Gay Rodeo, but somehow there were 25,000 weekend cowhands kickin' up the dust at the Nevada State Fairgrounds August 4 to 7. What couldn't be counted were the additional thousands who never strayed from their electric hotels, hanging on to the slot machines tighter than the rodeo riders could hold on to their mounts. Whatever the total numbers, attendance was slightly down from last year, but the country spirit was definitely up. The moral majority types who tried to block the event were nowhere to be seen and Reno 'the biggest little city in the world' had a rodeo to match.

ENDLESS NIGHTS OF STOMPIN' BOOTS

The biggest new hit was the addition of the first Reno Rodeo Country

The crowds in the bleachers yelled wildly at the stomping frenzy of the clogging groups. Clogging is a form of mountain dance performed in formations with taps on the shoes. Notable favorites were the Bugle Boys from San Diego.

The larger number of groups were the square dancers. Two years ago the Foggy City Squares of San Francisco were the first to perform at the Reno Gay Rodeo. This year there were twelve gay square dance clubs hailing from Washington, Oregon, New Mexico, Colorado, Florida, and California.

The Mustangs of Florida were a big crowd favorite. Having formed in 1977 they were also the oldest group on hand. The fastest growing is Puddletown Squares of Seattle which have graduated 160 dancers and several callers since last October. Their director Art Smith said "gay people are dying for alternatives, and square dancing is one of the

Studies showed that the vaccine protected against infection caused by hepatitis B virus in 85% to 96% of those who received the required three shots.

Hepatitis B virus is an important cause of viral hepatitis, a disease mainly of the liver. Even mild forms of this disease may lead to serious complications and aftereffects, including liver cancer. There is no specific treatment for viral hepatitis.

Vaccination is recommended for persons who have a higher risk of becoming infected with hepatitis B virus because of frequent, close contact with infected people or exposure to body fluids from such people. It will not protect against hepatitis caused by viruses other than hepatitis B virus.

Because of the long incubation period for hepatitis B, it is possible for unrecognized infection to be present at the time the vaccine is given. The vaccine may not prevent hepatitis B in such patients.

In three studies involving 3,350 persons, the overall rate of adverse reactions did not differ significantly in those given vaccine and those given placebo (an inactive substance). As with any vaccine, broad use often reveals rare adverse reactions not observed during clinical trials.

Over 200,000 people are estimated to have received the vaccine since its release, and the vaccine continues to be generally well tolerated. Hepatitis B has a long incubation period, and unrecognized infection may already be present at the time the vaccine is given. Thus, reported cases of hepatitis are to be expected and do not appear to be caused by the vaccine. Reactions such as fever, nausea, vomiting, headache, and local pain have occurred. Joint pain has been reported; rash has been reported rarely. Serious illnesses affecting the nervous systemincluding Guillain-Barré syndrome-have been reported rarely, but no cause and effect relationship has been established.

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International Report

International Gay Association holds annual conference

Vienna (IGNA) — Vienna was chosen for the annual IGA conference this year, in IGA's continuing effort to unite gays internationally, to put pressure on homophobic governments, and to work on matters of worldwide concern, such as AIDS.

In some places, the laws are so harsh that gays cannot organize, and here sometimes outsiders can help.

Eastern Europe was represented as were the Third World countries of Indonesia, Venezuela and Brazil.

A variety of topics was discussed, from gay health to the situation in Communist countries, to the admission of South Africa, as well as S&M, religion, and changing the World Health Organization's classification of homosexuality as an illness.

The stormiest debate took place over the admission of South Africa's gays to the organization. Leftist delegates worked to attach anti-apartheid conditions to the admission of GASA (the Gays of South Africa), but the IGA constitution forbids adding conditions. A group must be either accepted or rejected.

South African opponents tried to associate GASA with South Africa's white supremacy policies, for example, by pointing out that the GASA paper is written in English and Africans, not Bantu, etc. To this reporter's knowledge, no other group was told to explain its credentials and policies. GASA likewise was not even asked its policies before being attacked as racist. GASA's admission was postponed for discussion at the 1984 conference in Helsinki.

Business meetings included the strengthening of IGA structures and finance committees. The most active countries were the Scandinavian and the Dutch. Only two British groups (CHE and Gay Medical Association) belong, with CHE not participating this year. A separate group of Scots arrived in a minibus.

Since the World Psychiatric Association was meeting in Vienna at the same time, the IGA delegates sent a delegation to express gay concerns.

Nation's lawyers fail to endorse gay rights bill by Ernie Potvin

In a vote that was closer than anyone expected, 134 to 158, the American Bar Association failed to pass a gay rights resolution in Atlanta when it was introduced for the first time at the ABA's annual convention during the first week of August. It was presented by Attorney Dan Bradley, former head of the Legal Services Corporation, a quasi-governmental organization that provides legal help for the poor. Bradley came out openly gay following his resignation from that post in March of last year.

The resolution he presented urged states and cities to enact laws barring discrimination against homosexuals in jobs and housing. The delegates heard an impassioned plea from Bradley who said, "I am proud to be a lawyer, and I am equally proud to be a homosexual... We're not asking you to approve homosexuality. We seek your approval of legislation to end discrimination." simply and plainly demand, as citizens of the United States, our constitutional and civil rights. We are as much a part of America as anyone else. And we mean to be treated as citizens in full partnership. Yes, I am still a political conservative, and yes, I am gay. So what? That's not in my text, but it sort of fit in there. What difference does it make?"

He acknowledged having voted against gay rights bills himself in the past and said, "I was wrong, a person can mature." The ABA took only 20 minutes on the matter before voting the resolution down, but former congressman Bauman and others said they would be back next year to try again.

National candlelight vigil set

Washington, D.C. — Thousands of people will participate in a candlelight vigil on Capitol Hill the evening of October 8, 1983 in Washington, D.C. The announcement was made by the NATIONAL AIDS VIGIL COMMISSION.

The coalition, formed under the aegis of gay and non-gay organizations, focuses national attention and public awareness on the syndrome (Aquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) that has already affected over 1,800 loves.

The AIDS Vigil is a single issue action highlighting discrimination against persons with AIDS; to support the critical task of local and national AIDS organizations and to demand increasing crucial necessary federal funding forresearch of this dread disease.

The Vigil Commission is comprised of an everwidening group of congressional, medical, educational and business groups, unaccustomed to mass demonstrations. Nevertheless, our nation has never faced a health crisis of such magnitude in recent years as that presented by AIDS.

Ex-Congressman Bauman says he will become a gay activist by Ernie Potvin via GPA Wire Service

Ever since the loss of his congressional seat in 1980, ex-congressman Robert E. Bauman, the conservative Republican from Maryland, has had a tough time getting either a government appointment or legal clients. He continues to support President Reagan, and remains opposed to abortion rights, but has made a turn about in his former position on gay rights. Last week he announced he was joining forces with the Gay Rights National Lobby in Washington, and plans to direct pressure on fellow conservatives to vote for the Gay Civil Rights Bill awaiting passage in the House. He said that his involvement with GRNL will be that of an unpaid consultant.

Steve Endean, the Executive Director of GRNL said it was incredibly important that Bauman speak out for the bill because it has always been perceived as a liberal cause exclusively, and that is not the case.

Endean has been subject to considerable fire lately by Advocate publisher David Goodstein, and syndicated Washington gay columnist Larry Bush. They would like to see him removed from his position with GRNL and from the Human Rights Campaign Fund for alledgedly immature leadership and ineffectiveness. This in spite of the fact that, under Endean's direction, 81% of the races GRNL supported were won in 1982, and over \$600,000 was raised by HRCF. Bauman will be most helpful in countering one of Goodstein's other charges ... that being "Endean not only lacks experience, but his youth, poverty, and fear of dealing with powerful authorities, especially conservative Republicans, has caused critical problems." It's a task Bauman seems itchy to take on. Last week Bauman said he would like to discuss the issues either publicly or privately with Jerry Fallwall.

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The most impactful speaker addressing the delegates on behalf of the resolution was former Maryland congressman Robert E. Bauman, a conservative Republican who lost reelection in 1980 after being charged with soliciting sex with a teenage boy.

Prior to that event Bauman was a leading spokesman for the new right in Congress, and, ironically, a vocal opponent of gay rights legislation. Following several years of searching for a 'cure' to his gayness, he followed the advice of three psychiatrists and decided to accept the inevitable. He said the hardest part of his decision was dealing with the effect it may have on his four children who range in age from 11 to 21.

In urging the 300,000 member Bar Association to support legislation to ban discrimination against homosexuals in housing, employment, and public accommodations, the delegates saw a Bauman they had not seen before. Only two years ago he resigned from the ABA statingit had become "too liberal."

Bauman said, "We gay people have come too far to turn back now. We don't ask for approval... we Bauman said he has not been alone in his hypocrisy. "I used to believe that homosexuality was a sin," he said, "I've lived in a world of self denial for 40 years."

In coming out publicly, and declaring his intentions to work for the movement, he sounded like other significant Washington figures who left their closets ahead of him. He told the press, "I can't téll you how many gays there are in the House and the Senate. I know they're there." Continuing Bauman offered, "I have run into gay officials in the Reagan Administration, gay labor leaders, gay priests, gay professors, gay congressman. So what? We are everywhere."

Six gunmen assault Hollywood gay bar by Ernie Potvin via GPA Wire Service

Rafael Rivero, the sole survivor of a police shootout, August 8, at a Hollywood liquor store holdup, has been positively identified by witnesses as one of the holdup men in the previous week's assault of the Lodge, a gay bar in North Hollywood. Rivero, like his four dead companions killed in the shootout, is believed to be a Cuban refugee from the 1980 freedom flotilla boatlift. The Lodge witnesses have yet to view coronor's photos of the four dead men pending a police search for photos of them live. In the meantime a few valuables, possibly taken from Lodge customers, have been recovered, and more may be expected to be found. The Lodge was surprised shortly after midnight July 31, when six armed robbers took over the bar robbing patrons of their money and jewelry as well as relieving the receipts from one of the bar's three cash registers. There were no serious injuries but one patron was hit with a bottle, and several bullet holes remain in the ceiling as evidence of the nervous gunmens' effort at controlling the crowd. Witnesses said the robbers left before they could collect the valuables from all 200 patrons they had forced to lie on the floor. Police investigators said 31 victims reported losses totaling \$19,911 including \$1,300 from the bar itself. The unmasked robbers were described as being dressed in street clothes, two blacks, three latins, and one caucasian. Some witnesses thought they sounded either Cuban or Puerto Rican. Reports differ as to what time the robbery started, but witnesses we talked

to said the police arrived about one half hour later. Police spokesmen said response time was 15 minutes. Calls were reportedly made by several neighbors, and from Lodge owner Stu Zinn who was locked into the bar's office at the time.

One witness gave the following report. "I was there with my lover. It was really very crowded. Suddenly we heard some shots and people started yelling get down, get down. From the front to the back, it was like dominoes, then someone shouted, 'Oh my God, they're coming in from the back.' I saw two guys with what looked like 22 semiautomatics. Some guy coming out of the women's john gave one of them some lip and was hit with a bottle around the eye. They were yanking the watches, rings, and necklaces off of people, not allowing them to hand them over. The D.J. shut off the music, but the lights remained low. Somebody started to come in through the back door and Steve, the doorman, waved him off. One tall black guy with a pool stick jammed it into a guy's crotch and yelled, 'You horny, queer?, you horny?' One of them kept urging they get out before the cops arrive. After about fifteen minutes they left. When they did leave, the lights went up and the bartender called the police. They got there about fifteen minutes later. What I want to know is why there wasn't a silent alarm?' Hollywood Station detectives said the investigation will continue, and robbery victims of the Lodge will be notified when and if needed. The search will also continue for the sixth missing suspect.

President of the American Cancer Society, who will sit as a special advisor.

The donation from the Arizona AIDS Fund is believed to be one of the largest community (state) donations yet made to *GRNL* since the starting of its *Special AIDS Lobby* and directed for that usage. The money has been raised by special functions held ranging from a private party which garnered over \$400 to a beer bust bringing in over \$800, and the Phoenix campaign for Reno's Miss, Ms. and Mr. Gay Rodeo contest which netted over \$3,000 to Arizona AIDS Fund.

Administering the Arizona AIDS Fund are Bill Daly, Ken Fisher, Bob Hegyi, Scott Jacobson and Larry Smith, all of Phoenix, and Michael Heimbuch and Bruce Karon of Tucson. Rowe Babcock, Phoenix, is a trustee of the Fund. The board is backed by an advisory committee similarly comprised of local businessmen. Boards around the country have experienced difficulty in identifying and selecting worthy causes to donate community AIDS funds to. Support of any single AIDS patient's medical costs, based on national averages, would wipe out most existing funds and could create problems in insurance coverage and qualification for other benefits. Similarly, suggestions for paid straight media advertisements educating the general public about AIDS was found to be prohibitively expensive by individual boards. Arizona board member Bob Hegyi stated that he was 'glad we could find a worthy cause where the money will contribute to something everyone can benefit by. We have also set up other similar donations, one for medical research and the other for the support of a hotline for AIDS.

GRNL'S AIDS Project has stated as its goals the following: 1. to secure adequate federal funding for basic and epidemiological research; 2. to obtain major funding and a well-informed commitment from the federal government to undertake an effective and sensitive AIDS public education program; 3. to promote greater responsiveness by the federal agencies responsible for helping AIDS patients cope with the financial, social and personal problems associated with AIDS; and 4. to promote greater responsiveness by the federal government in supporting the many excellent local programs of education about and, the study of AIDS.

GRNL charges that "The federal government has been very slow to respond to the AIDS epidemic." It has reported that of an estimated need of \$50 million in AIDS research money for 1984, thus far only \$17.1 million can be identified with \$12 million from the National Institutes of Health, \$4.2 million from the Centers for Disease Control, \$0.4 million from the Food and Drug Administration, and none from any other source. It is the obtaining of the additional needed funding that donations such as that from the Arizona AIDS Fund will be used for. Through financially supporting the newly formed GRNL AIDS Project, they, in turn, can present the case for communities throughout the country demanding more attention from Congress.

In addition to the donation to *GRNL*, the *Arizona AIDS Fund* has voted a \$1,000 donation to the *Centers for Disease Control* in Atlanta, earmarked specifically for the usage of Dr. Donald Francis in his research into AIDS. Dr. Francis, formerly of Phoenix, was placed on the staff of the *CDC* in 1982 due to his highly acclaimed research on the Hepatitis B vaccine.

\$175 per month was voted as support for the Lesbian and Gay Assistance Information Line (switchboard) of Metro Phoenix Gay Community Services (MPGCS). The 'Information Line' has been in existence for several years as an emergency hotline. One of the first actions of the Arizona AIDS Fund, following their formation in March, was to request that the switchboard's scope be enlarged to include handling emergency and informational calls regarding AIDS. The new monthly donation, it is hoped, will allow the MPGCS to expand to meet these needs. Currently there are over thirty volunteers manning the phones in the Phoenix office location.

in awe. "It's like a jigsaw puzzle," a dancer explained, "you're given instruction and if you follow the path correctly the square continues to function, and if you miss the path, you run into a blockade and the whole square breaks down." Obviously it was as much concentrated work as it was dedicated fun.

In winding up the Rodeo Dance Festival coordinator Ron Brewer, an incredible dancer himself, called out all the accomplished and beginning dancers to form a massive circle. "We're going to revive some of our heritage," he said, "a dance our grandaddies and grandmas did in the grange halls and town meeting halls all across America. Grab your neighbor's hand, and whatever you do, don't let go. Don't let go!" And with that the music went wild, the circle moved left and right and broke into an intricate serpentine pattern lasting a good twenty minutes, and no one let go until the jubilant end.

sport due to injuries. "I've got a metal plate in the hip, several steel pins in the arm, and all these teeth are false," he said running his finger across his smile. He didn't do as well in the this Reno Gay Rodeo but he intends to keep coming back.

One of the more colorful cowboys we met was Stoney Burke who has been coming to the rodeo for eight years from an isolated ranch in southeast Arizona. "Real cowboys like myself only spend 20% of the time on horseback working cows," said Stoney, "we spend more time driving trucks and being mechanics." Stoney likes dancing at gay bars, but the nearest one in Tucson is a couple hundred miles away, and he adds, "I wouldn't want to live any closer." As the rodeo's 'barn boss' he is the collector for what will someday be gay rodeo lore. It was a delight to hear him tell about 'Phillis', a "monster bull with 36 inch horns that had killed several people before we got him, and no one in the gay rodeo would dare to ride." He explained, "at this rodeo we give all the bulls female names, and that one was named after the founder Phil Ragsdale." I reasoned it had to be a form of cowboy camp.

they're mostly mulies." Mulies? "They're the ones that have been de-horned. They do more damage by kicking than charging. They like to roll you, butt you and step on you." Lee Williams, the other cowboy said, "well I got one with horns at this rodeo last year and ended up the rodeo's biggest casualty. Ripped me open. I had 57 stitches in the crotch." Each cowboy or cowgirl takes their turn at the chute and is obliged to ride whatever animal comes up, horns or no horns.

MILK MAIDS AND RIBBONS

Not all the Rodeo events are as dangerous as riding broncs and bulls, but they sure can be rough and tumble. Among them is the wild cow decorating and milking contests. In both events the wild cows come bolting out of the chutes held only by a leader rope and often dragging the cowboy/girl half way around the rodeo ring. The partners, sometimes in drag, have to wrestle it down and retrieve a few drops of milk in one case, or decorate the animal with a pink ribbon around its tail in the other. Neither is an easy feat, and always provides uproarious fun for both participants and spectators. With all the confusion in the ring of half a dozen wild cows, 18 "cowpersons" some in drag, a couple of rodeo clowns. several pick-up riders on horseback, three judges, and the official rodeo photographer, it's no wonder this rodeo circus would need a 'ringmaster.' That man was Dave Wilson, the arena director who kept all the action moving. He also had the job of keeping the announcer in the tower abreast of what was happening. And that was no easy task being as the funny looking cowboy in the tower was Frank Cala, an Italian businessman and comedian from L.A. who had never announced a rodeo before in his life. At one point Cowboy Frank asked the crowd, "You know the difference between gay and straight rodeos? . . . At the straight rodeo they shout, Ride that sucker!" He survived the appreciative groans. Between Dave and Frank they kept the action moving a lot faster than in previous years. Part of the reason for the relatively quick paced show was the

fact that slack-time preliminaries were held this year for the first time which eliminated many in the very large field of entrants.

THE COLORADO KIDS

One of the more impressive highlights of the rodeo was the equestrian drill team from Denver. Their exhibition of precision riding with banners flying thrilled the grandstand every day. The team is an outgrowth of the Colorado Gay Rodeo Association whose first rodeo last month drew a crowd of 1,200. Next year they expect it will grow to 10,000. Like the western dance craze which has seen tremendous growth in the gay community in the last three years, the move is now on for establishing several regional gay rodeos. A Houston group is planning one for next March, and a few Southern California horse people are beginning to discuss the possibility of holding one also.

MUNCHING ON THE MIDWAY

BRUSHING DOWN AND SADDLING UP

Meanwhile back at the barns cowboys and cowgirls from most of the western states were giving tender loving care to their horses. One rider, Jimbo from Garden Grove, California, was rumored to sleep with his horse, they were so close. Several cowboys watched closely as Jimbo lead the animal around the figure eight pattern of the classic barrel race in which the horse had to come to a complete motionless stop without wasting precious seconds. Whereas some others continued to fidgit and prance, as expected Jimbo's horse stopped on a dime.

Virtually all the participating cowboys were raised on ranches and farms and have long histories of rodeo riding. If there were any non-gays among them they must have been hiding. One of the scrapiest was 26 year old Richard Bray who won "All Around Cowboy" at the first Colorado Gay Rodeo held last July. While many of the riders participated in only a few events, Richard entered all eleven. He entered the two gay rodeos after several years absence from the

BUCKING BRONCS AND BREAKING BONES

Mike Lytle, a Texas cowboy now residing in Los Angeles, had a rough time riding the broncs in Reno. On Friday he managed to get a black eye and bruised arm, on Saturday he got what he thought was a minor break at the thumb joint, and on Sunday, with his arm all bandaged, the wild horse he was riding threw him to the ground and went flying into a fence. Through it all he won the title of Champion Bronc Rider of the '83 Reno Gay Rodeo. Back in L.A. he learned he had a broken wrist and is now sporting a cast to the elbow.

If there is a lesson to learn here, it may be that more gay people are taking up western dancing than rodeo riding. On Thursday morning a couple of cowboys were standing over the pens looking at the bulls that the stock contractor had brought in for them to ride. Tim Chavez of Ogden, Utah said "they look real good, stout and strong, good thing

Once again there were plenty of booths with western artwork and crafts for those who hadn't blown it all at the casinos. Leather goods and Indian jewelry predominated and in between were a dozen places to munch hotdogs, pizza, ribs, or Thai food. Where the rodeo organizers fell down once again was with their highly touted barbeque catered by the Peppermill Hotel. It was a bust. Long lines moved slowly toward a spread that was hardly worth it. The promised 10 ounce New York steak became a 6 ounce New York strip. It was only one of the problems that cropped up for Phil Ragsdale and his lover Joe Sedlack who have almost single handedly put on the Reno Gay Rodeo since its beginning in 1976. That year they drew 250 people, were refused live stock by cattle owners, and ended up purchasing a few calves and a pony for the limited event.

Phil agrees with his detractors that the rodeo needs improved administrative handling, and the possibility of additional help may be forthcoming from the many hotel casinos that benefit so much from the thousands of tourists he brings

AIDS -

Some precautions you can take

AIDS is the name given to a recently recognized medical syndrome. It is not inherited, but appears to be obtained from a combination of infectious and environmental factors; thus, it is ACQUIRED. The IMMUNE DEFICIENCY is the common link to all affected by this disease. SYNDROME refers to the variable and complex ways that this disease can present itself.

Two thousand people have been diagnosed with AIDS since 1979. Over half are dead. The yearly mortality rate is 40% with a five year mortality of nearly 100%. Victims fall into four broad categories; Homosexuals 75%, Heroin ad-dicts 15%, Haitians 5% and Hemophiliacs 1%; with 4% falling into no specific risk category. Gay males affected tend to be between the ages of 25 and 65 with an average age of 37. Although strongly associated with a history of sexual promiscuity, many cases have been reported in non-promiscuous homosexual and bisexual males. From all scientific data, the evidence is clear that AIDS is passed by an infectious process, most likely a single agent, and most likely viral. The incubation period may be anywhere from 6 months to 4 years, depending on the individual. The geographic

spread and geometric rise in numbers cannot be explained by any other process. To date, no organism has been identified. There is no test for AIDS. There is no way of identifying a symptomatic victim. Diagnosis is based on rigid criteria set up by the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, GA. Diagnosis is based on the findings of unexplained swollen lymph nodes, persisting over several months and the biopsy or culture of Kaposi's sarcoma or one of several opportunistic infections.

The specific diseases in the syndrome are becoming well documented. Of the cancers, the most common is the previously rare Kaposi's sarcoma. It presents itself as red to purple spots that persist and may be flat or raised. Also seen in AIDS is lymphoma involving the tissues which cover the brain. Opportunistic infections are those that invade only when there is a breakdown of the natural barriers to disease. Pneumocystis carinii pneumonia is a parasitic infection of the lungs and is the most common infection seen in diagnosing AIDS. Other infectious agents include mycobacterium species related to the tuberculosis bacteria, various fungal and parisitic agents. A concern that the diagnostic criteria may be too rigid is becoming an important topic among researchers because there are many who don't fit into the above categories, but have many unexplained signs and symptoms associated with the syndrome.

The signs and symptoms that should alert anyone at risk for AIDS are as follows:

- 1. Swollen lymph nodes (glands) in the neck, armpit or groin that may or may not be painful and have been present for several months. Self-examination should be done monthly;
- 2. Red or purplish flat or raised blotches, bumps or spots, usually painless, occurring on or under the skin. They may be found in the mouth, nose, eyelids or rectum. They may look like bruises that don't go away. Again, selfexamination should be done monthly;
- 3. Persistant white spots inside the mouth;

4. Fever of greater than 99 degrees



or drenching night sweats lasting for several days or weeks;

- 5. Generalized fatigue unrelated to physical exertion or stress, drug use or tension;
- 6. Persistant dry cough or shortness of breath unrelated to smoking or other infection;
- 7. Persistant diarrhea unexplained by other causes;
- 8. Weight loss of greater than 10 pounds over two months without explanation;
- 9. Development of major, unexplained confusion, memory loss or a major shift in personality.

An evaluation by a physician is recommended for anyone at risk with one or more of these symptoms.

Being homosexual does not increase the risk of getting AIDS, but certain sexual practices in the gay lifestyle do seem to set up conditions that promote transmission. It appears that infection requires the mixing of infected body fluids from one partner with the blood of the unaffected partner. In hemophiliacs this is accomplished by the injection of blood products derived from multiple donors. In drug abusers needles used in common is the means of transmission. With the Haitian population a combination of folk medicine using the same needles on several patients and the practice of prostitution by young males in the community appears most likely to spread the infection. In the homosexual population the mode of transmission appears to be associated with passive rectal sexual activity. The rectum, unlike the female vagina, does not have the capacity to stretch without damage. It also functions as an organ of great absorptive capacity. Small hemorrhages from the acts of anal intercourse, rimming or fisting set up conditions for an infective agent to be absorbed readily. This is not a command or even a suggestion to give up these practices. These activities performed within a monogomous relationship carry far less risk than arbitrary activity with anonymous partners of uncertain health.

If certain activities are more highly associated with the transmission of the infectious agent, then any measure to curtail or control these activities should lower the risk

High risk is associated with large numbers of different and anonymous partners. Limiting the numbers of different sexual partners and having some knowledge of your partner's health status will greatly reduce the risk of contracting AIDS or other sexually transmitted diseases (STD's).


Various drug users are associates with the transmission of AIDS when they are injected with unclean needles. Also, under the influence of drugs, more aggressive activities are known to occur, causing a greater potential for damage to the rectal mucosae.

It appears as though AIDS will be a significant public health problem for several years to come. Whereas the task of finding the infectious agent and obtaining a vaccine or cure seems to be a monumental task, we must remember that we are at the same stage of research today with AIDS that we were fifteen years ago with Hepatitis B. AIDS is now the number one priority with the Centers for Disease Control. Lobbying efforts by those concerned have opened the federal government's purse strings and research has begun without reservation.

Physicians who care for large numbers of gay men have been overwhelmed by patients who want some reassurance that they have no signs of AIDS and some evidence that they are not carrying the infective agent. No specific test exists as yet. The best that can be done at this time is first to determine the risk level of the individual, based on his history of sexual activities. Next a general physical exam paying close attention to any of the signs previously listed. If warranted, basic blood tests, cultures, biopsies should be performed. Specific T-lymphocyte studies are reserved for patients in whom a strong suspicion of AIDS is present. T-lymphocyte ratios are abnormal in a number of infections and cancerous illnesses. Their use is not to diagnose, but to confirm a previously made diagnosis and to follow the progress of the disease.

What can be done on an individual and community level to prevent and cure AIDS? First everyone at risk needs to become informed. Understand that the disease is infectious and that the transmission most likely occurs through the rectal membranes during passive anal sex. Understand that high risk is associated with large numbers of different partners, especially if they are of unknown health status. Lowering your risk profile will not only protect you, but may protect others. The use of condoms has been suggested for those engaging in anonymous anal intercourse. Showering as part of foreplay not only assures a cleaner partner but allows a cursory examination for lymph nodes, lesions, warts, etc.

After years of nearly unrestrained sexual freedom, the gay community now finds itself responsible for that freedom. It will be difficult for many to find the balance between healthy, fulfilling, guilt-free sexual activity and responsible reduction of risk for AIDS transmission.





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

of California magazine for its July cover story called "Whitewash."

At its July 20 meeting, the Coalition unanimously condemned the article for attempting to blame the gay community for the spread of the AIDS epidemic while exonerating the federal government, which continues to delay adequate research funding.

The Coalition says that attacking the gay community, already under attack by the disease, is another example of blaming the victims.





into town. The first rodeo was staged as a benefit for the Imperial Court of Reno and subsequently as a benefit for the fight against muscular dystrophy, and this year, AIDS.

Again this year Phil arranged for contests in a dozen western cities to run for the titles of Mr., (male) Ms., (female) and Miss (drag) Reno Gay Rodeo by holding fundraisers to combat muscular dystrophy in their home towns. The candidates from Fresno came in first raising \$8,014. and Phoenix was second with \$7,143. Representing Phoenix were Mr. Michael Cooney, Ms. Mary Carter, and Miss Ebony, who must have brought along a trunk of dresses for the occasion. Even as we were leaving for the airport, Miss Ebony, oblivious to the world, hobbled into the street in front of our tour bus in a long white gown. We had seen her in tan, in gold, in red, in black, in yellow, and now her second outfit in white.
