Deconcini deletes anti-gay amendment

Phoenix businesses pledge ARC support

PHOENIX - The evening of September 9, found Bob Hegyi's home filled to overflowing, standing room only capacity with Phoenix Gay bar owners/representatives, board members and other interested persons of the Gay community for the second 1980 Alternative Relations Center (ARC) Fund Raising meeting.

Among those present were Fred McNamara, Manager Aunt Charlie's; Pat Williams of Taylor's/Connection; 307 owner Palmer Ganske; Trax owner Chuck Stanley; Tom Wood, owner of Tommy and Clyde's; Ron Farrah of Farrah's along with Bob deBrecht (Brandy) and Lon Pearson; and Clint Baron representing Arizona Gay News. Others present included Bob Ulsrud of Penquin Productions; Advocate representatives Mal Bernstein and Bill Irwin as well as Skip Green and Jack Caldwell of The New Pride.

An update on ARC fund raising purposes and activities was presented by Paul Consales, ARC Board Chairperson and Jerry Boehm, Fund Raising Drive Coordinator. After general discussion, the following special events were permanently established as personal contributions to the 1980 ARC Building Fund Drive by Phoenix Gay bar owners and other organizations:

AUNT CHARLIE'S - A \$25 per plate benefit dinner (date to be determined) for 65-70 persons. Employees will donate both their time and tips and Aunt Charlie's will donate a percentage of the bar receipts. Topping off this special event will be the auction of a \$1,500 painting by prominent Phoenix artist Ralph (Gus) Kniffin. Also being considered is a special ARC brunch.

TOMMY AND CLYDE'S - A super special Plant Auction will be held at Tommy and Clyde's on September 28. Anyone knowing of the location of a "Jolly Green Giant" auctioneer, please call Tom Woods, owner. And what better way to end their fund raising efforts than by the Tuesday, October 7 -- "Wet Jockey Short Contest?"

TAYLOR'S / CONNECTION - Raffle tickets for a color TV console, donated by Dale Williams, owner, will become available beginning the week of September 15. Dale's special axtivities for the ARC Building Fund drive will culminate with a super-hot disco bash at the Connection on Sunday, November 9.

PENQUIN PRODUCTIONS - A production of their version of "Hello Dolly" will be staged in mid-October. All door proceeds will go to the ARC Building Fund. Specific dates and times will be published later.

WASHINGTON, DC - In what has been described by the Gay Rights National Lobby as a "temporary victory", the Senate appropriations Subcommittee had deleted the anti-Gay "McDonald Amendment" from the Legal Services appropriations legislation, H.R. 7584. A motion by Senator Dennis DeConcini (D-Arizona) to delete the amendment passed by a voice vote, apparently by a 6-2 margin. Senator Paul Laxalt (R-Nevada), author of the anti-Gay "Family Protection Act", and New Right Senator Jake Garn (R-Utah) supported the retention of the McDonald amendment in the Senate bill. Senator Lowell Weicker (R-CT), who is the ranking

minority member of the Subcommittee and is also a co-sponsor of S. 2081 (the Gay fair employment bill), was a vigorous supporter of the pro-justice position.

Although pleased with the Subcommittee result, Steve Endean, GRNL Executive Director, who has been coordinating strategy for the Senate fight, indicated that he is certain that the Senate will see further action on the Legal Services anti-Gay prohibition. "We are firmly convinced that the origin of this anti-Gay amendment is a New Right strategy to force a roll-call vote in this election year. It is likely that the amendment will be re-introduced on the floor of the Senate." Endean went on to urge strong response by the Lesbian and Gay communities. "At this time, it is critical that our movement, our communities, and, for that matter, all people who believe in equal justice, expend every ounce of energy to put constituent pressure on for the Senate vote. Later, only after Senate action has been completed, it will be important to thank our friends in both houses and to demand accountability from those that voted for the anti-justice position."

In just one of the efforts to defeat the expected floor vote in the Senate, the Gay Rights National Lobby has sent a "Congressional Action Alert" to 16,000 targeted in its Constituent Network. The purpose, of course, of the Alert, which includes two postcards to be sent to the Senators, is to mobilize pro-justice constituent pressure. The Gay Rights National Lobby contends that constituent pressure is the key to a successful legislative strategy. "As long as Members of the House and Senate believe that their constituents oppose justice for Gays, and that a projustice position is dangerous politically, we are going to end up on the short end of these votes," Endean said.

TRAX - a special band for wild and wooley dancing has been hired for the evening of October 30, Thursday. Admission charges will be donated to the ARC Building Fund. Chuck Stanley, Trax's owner, indicated there would be a continuous, "unique" Fund Raising attraction. This should be a spectacular "behind-the-scenes" money raiser.

307 (The Numbers) - Palmer, 307 owner, stated he would back 100 percent any activities his manager, Ron Johnson, would conceive as ARC Fund Raising events. He also stated that during the evenings of November 7 and 8, when PLLC's shuttle bus service is transporting members of the Gay community to other Gay bars, that each bar should "kick-in" a percentage of the evening's profits.

PHOENIX LEVI/LEATHER CLUB - Along with their \$1,000 challenge, PLLC will provide shuttle bus service to all Phoenix Gay bars during the evenings of November 7 and 8. Schedules to be announced in AGN. On December 6 and 7, PLLC will will present its Third Annual Fine Arts Sale And Auction. After expenses, proceeds will be donated to the ARC Building Fund.

Immigration victory for Gays

WASHINGTON, DC - Suspected Gay aliens will no longer be subject to probing interrogation on their private sexual life by immigration authorities under a new policy announced by the Department of Justice, September 10. The National Gay Task Force (NGTF) and Gay Rights Advocates (GRA) were given advance notice of this decision by Associate Attorney General John H. Shenefield at a special Justice Department briefing on Tuesday, Sept. 9. The new policy replaces the parole procedure in effect since August, 1979. The State Department is expected to bring its procedures for visa applications into conformance with the Justice Department guidelines.

Henceforth, only those individuals who self-identify themselves as homosexual to immigration personnel will be subject to exclusion. Wearing political buttons, T-shirts CONTINUED ON PAGE FOUR

OJ OR NOT OJ FOR ANITA?

MIAMI, FL - Anita Bryant's contract with the Florida Citrus Commission has run out, and for the first time since 1969 it hasn't been renewed yet. Officials of the commission told the New York Times that Bryant's contract for commercials, which paid her \$100,000 in the year before it expired August 31, was held by the production company headed by Bob Green, her former husband and manager. At least in part because of complications ensuing from the couple's divorce, the contract has not been renewed.

But, says the commission's Bernie Lester, such a renewal has not yet been ruled out. "The contract had to expire, because of the divorce and so forth," Lester told the Times. "We haven't determined what we're going to do. We didn't set any particular date on continuing the relationship." Not mentioned by either Lester or the Times as a contributing factor in the contract negotiations is a Lesbian and Gay organized boycott against Florida citrus products dating back to 1977, when Bryant and Green together led a successful campaign to repeal a Lesbian and Gay rights ordinance in Dade County, Florida. Since that time Bryant has been a symbol of the movement to halt Lesbian and Gay rights.


KNIGHTHOOD FOR HOMOSEXUAL

RIGHT-WING ROUNDTABLE

DALLAS, TX - Some 20,000 fundamentalist ministers and lay right-wing leaders gathered here recently to participate in a National Affairs Briefing organized by Religious Roundtable, an organization of New Right politicians, clergy and financiers in Washington, DC, that helps coordinate the political lobbying of Christian groups. The Guardian reports that the purpose of the conference was to teach fundamentalist leaders how to promote the political goals of the religious wing of the New Right.

Such prominent leaders of the Right Wing as presidential candidate Ronald Reagan, ERA opponent Phyllis Schlafly and anti-Gay legislators Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC) and Rep. Philip Crane (R-IL) addressed the group, attacked "traditional right-wing targets" such as ERA, abortion, Lesbian and Gay rights, and desegregation and deplored the separation of church and state, according to the Guardian.

One of the major focuses of the briefing was on methods to activate the estimated 12,000 to 20,000 fundamentalists who reside within each Congressional district, but are not regustered voters. Lance Tarrance of Lance Tarrance, Inc., a political polling firm formed especially to sound out fundamentalist views for conservative organizations, told the group that these voters could provide the margin of difference in congressional races if they are mobilized. James Robinson, a Texas evangelist whose television program was removed from the air by a Dallas station after repeated anti-Gay remarks, told his listeners, "Not voting is a sin against the almighty God."





or other symbols expressing support for the Gay rights movement will not be sufficient to trigger inquiry into an alien's sexual orientation. However, a button or other sign which states that the wearer is a homosexual or the identification of an individual as homosexual by a traveling companion would lead to specific inquiry. If the suspected alien answers 'No' to the question, "Are you a homosexual?" he or she will be permitted to enter the United States without further inquiry.

TUCSON - We're finally ready to try our first Great Outdoors experience in Southern Arizona. We've planned a two-day overnight at 8,000 feet in the Santa Catalina mountains. Perspective DOOR DRUDGERY

In recent months you may have noticed that more and more Phoenix drinking establishments have hired people to sit at the door and check various forms of I.D. Anyone who has ever worked in the bar realizes the need for this action. This being an election year, makes it harder on bar owners, bartenders and yes, even patrons.

All of us, at one time of another, have witnessed Phoenix's finest entering one of our bars to count heads and seek out the under-aged. Unfortunately, there is nothing we can do about it, but equally as unfortunate is the seemingly endless hassles and fights given to the person whose job it is to protect us.

State law makes it illegal to enter a bar or buy any alcoholic beverage without having your I.D. with you no matter how old you are. The law stipulates that the only acceptable forms of I.D. for this state are:

- 1. Valid Arizona driver's license.
- 2. Arizona 19-year-old card.
- 3. Valid military I.D. (Green Card).

If you are not carrying one of these forms of I.D., you may not legally enter any bar or buy any alcoholic beverage.

Door people are just like anyone else, they have a job to do, and part of that job is making sure that if a policeman enters the bar you're in, and ask for you I.D., you won't go to jail. So why not make it a little easier on them and yourself. Carry your I.D. with you, and have it ready to show the door person as you enter the bar. It could cost the Gay community the option of visiting the bar that lost its license because of those few that refuse to do what the law requires.

Tucson ERA walkathon Sept. 27

TUCSON, AZ - On September 27, the Tucson Chapter of the National Organization for Women (NOW) will hold a Walk-A-Thon in support of the Equal Rights Amendment. In a twilight march, walkers will cover a 12 kilometer course in Northwest Tucson which will start and end at Jacobs Park, on Fairview between Miracle Mile and Prince.

A kick-off rally will be held at the starting point at 4:00 p.m. Speakers will include representatives of many organizations supporting the ERA, including NOW, Mormons for ERA, the Black Women's Awareness Task Force, several union and professional organizations, Arizonans of Faith for the ERA, and others. Also, pro-ERA legislative candidates will speak and there will be entertainment songs and skits. Tucson NOW President Kate McGee will lead off the march at 5:30 p.m. and the walk should take $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 hours to complete.

Approximately 200 walkers are expected to participate. Each person will be sponsored in the walk by individuals or companies who have pledged a contribution for each kilometer completed by the walker. NOW expects to raise \$10,000 for the NOW ERA ratification Fund from this event, half of which will be used in Arizona and the rest in the national campaign.

Tucson's 1980 Walk-A-Thon for Equal Rights is part of a nationwide commemoration of the 60th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th Amendment, which granted women's suffrage. Rhe same suffragettes who led the movement to gain women the right to vote also wrote and first campaigned for the Equal Rights Amendment, and NOW plans to use the funds collected in the Walk-A-Thons to continue their work. This is the 4th year the NOW has held nationwide Walk-A-Thons, and this year, Walk-A-Thons are scheduled in 47 states.

I invite you to re-read your own third paragraph. You state, "Gay people spend more time and effort putting each other down." But, isn't that exactly what your entire article was doing? I completely reject your theory that special codes are a "reflection of guilt, shame, and fear" and that "it shows lack of respect...for (my) own sexual orientation." Take note though, in the previous sentence the key words are "I" and "my" because I am an individual and if I choose to use codes (and I often do wear handkerchiefs and/or keys), that's my decision and I have no guilt, shame, fear or lack of respect. I ask you, when was the last time you got to know someone wearing a handkerchief? I find the people who do, as diverse a group of people as any I've known. They come in all races, creeds, ethnic backgrounds, professions, sexes (yes, women sometimes wear them too), you name it.

I also disagree that "costume Gayness'" rob us of our individuality. I was accused once of being a "Castro Clone" because I had short hair, neatly trimmed beard, jeans and a lumberjack shirt. Well, I've had short hair for over 30 years, a neatly trimmed beard for 13 years and worn jeans and flannel shirts for most of my life gr owing up in cold South Dakota. However, I sometimes wear a suit and tie to work too. So, am I any less of an individual?

Concerning the effects of some of these "superficial aspects of the Gay lifestyle" on straights, I must once again take the exception. I discussed many important subjects (employment, housing, legislation, etc.) with straights while traveling on the Gay Freedom Train to the March on Washington last fall. Did I lose credibility with those people because I happened to have a handkerchief hanging in my pocket? I doubt if many of them even knew that it was some sort of a Gay signal.

Now Ten Speed, I'm not putting you down for your beliefs or views. BRINK'S JOB SUSPECT SOUGHT

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - FBI agents are looking for a man "known to associate with homosexuals" whom they believe to be the one who stole \$1.85 million from a Brink's armored truck here. The Associated Press reports that agents are combing the city's Castro area, carrying pictures of George Manuel Bosque, 25, who is wanted in connection with the heist. The agents are asking Gay bar patrons and others if they know where Bosque might be.


Bosque, who worked part-time at Brink's, has been charged with making off with the loot after a routine pickup at San Francisco Airport several weeks ago. He allegedly took two large sacks of money out of his Brink's armored van before abandoning it at a nearby hotel and commandeering a motel maid's car, according to authorities. The car was found later.

Agents are also looking for a man they believe to be Bosque's Daly City roommate, Carl H. Denton, 22, according to William D. Newman, special agent in charge of the San Francisco FBI office. Miami agents have questioned members of Bosque's family there to see if they know of his whereabouts.

WELL, ONLY RULA LENSKA IS FLAWLESS

NEW YORK, NY (GayLife) - Researchers have found it impossible to duplicate findings by sex therapists William Masters and Virginia Johnson because their work is flawed by methodological errors and slipshod reporting, two california psychologists said. Bernie Zilbergeld and Michael Evans wrote in Psychology Today that Masters and Johnson "have gone far beyond the allowable limits of nonperfection." For instance, on homosexuality, Evans and Zilbergeld noted that Masters and Johnson "claim they were surprisingly successful at, in effect, changing homosexuals into heterosexuals. The heart of our criticism is that many of their homosexuals weren't really homosexuals. We know they misdiagnosed many of their patients.




