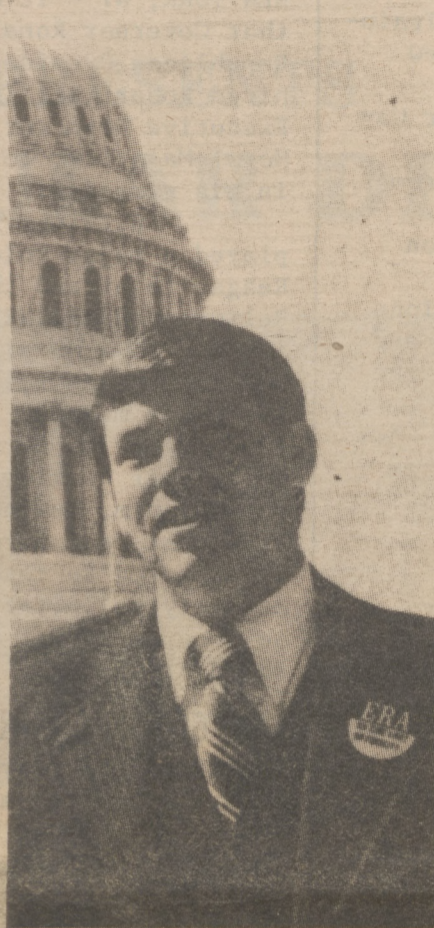

Methodists push for
ERA passage

RALEIGH, NC (UMNS) - Thirty-six United Methodist supporters of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) from five southeastern states gathered here September 19-21 to discuss strategy for passing the proposed 27th Amendment to the United States Constitution. Legislatures in each of the states that were represented have failed to ratify the amendment. In each instance much of the opposition to its passage has come largely from segments of the religious community. Three more state legislatures must pass it by the June 30, 1982 ratification deadline before it can become part of the Constitution.

State reports on the final day of the workshop called for visits with bishops, participation in ecumenical efforts to pass the amendment and continued efforts to enlist the support of legislators and church persons were among planned strategies. "It is important that United Methodists understand that support for the amendment has been voted by three successive General Conferences," said Ellen Kirby, executive secretary in administration for the Women's Division. Among persons attending the workshop were Virginia State legislator Evelyn Hailey and North Carolina legislator William A. Creech.

WASHINGTON, DC - A newly created national political action committee, the Human Rights Campaign Fund, has been established to contribute to and assist those federal candidates committed to equal justice and civil rights for Lesbians and Gay men. The Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF), which will engage in direct partisan political activities such as making financial contributions to candidates, will be an independent, separate organization although it will work very closely with the Gay Rights National Lobby (GRNL), the only full-time lobby at Congress for Gay civil rights.

One of the motivations for the establishment of the Human Rights Campaign Fund is the mobilization of the "Moral Majority", "Christian Voice," and the rest of the "New Christian Right." They are establishing PACs, registering voters in their churches, interjecting their

own brand of morality into this year's Congressional campaigns. These groups are determined to defeat many of those with the courage to sponsor or support Gay civil rights legislation. Steve Endean, who played a key role in founding HRCF, is on the Board, and is also Executive Director of the Gay Rights National Lobby, said, "By standing behind our friends in Congress, working to defeat those that oppose civil rights for Gay people, and identifying 'open seats' that could mark a pick-up for pro-justice forces, the HRCF could signal a new level of development of Gay/Lesbian participation and sophistication in the electoral political process.

The Human Rights Campaign Fund has created a national Advisory Committee of political, religious, labor and community leaders including: Julian Bond, long-time civil rights leader; Mayor Donald Fraser, Minneapolis; Gloria Steinem, leading feminist; Bishop Otis Charles, Episcopal Diocese of Utah; Mayor Diane Feinstein, San Francisco; Rabbi Richard Sternberger, President of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations; Iris Mitgang, National Chair of the National Chair of the National Women's Political Caucus; Dr. John Spiegel, former President of the American Psychiatric Association; Mayor Marion Barry, Washington, DC; Bella Abzug, leading feminist and former Congressperson; Michael Harrington, author of "The Other America" (which was the basis of "Great Society"); Patsy Mink, national President of Americans for Democratic Action; Joseph Rauh, legal Counsel of Leadership Conference on Civil Rights and Bishop Wesley Frensdorff, Episcopal Diocese of Nevada. (This is a partial list).

Responding to the argument that the Gay and Lesbian movement should not become "political" and contribute to candidates, Endean said, "For better or worse, politics and elected officials will play a role in deciding the outcome of our fight. DELAWARE HOT SPOT FOR GAYS

REHOBOTH BEACH, DE (BAR) - Two Gay discos here have burned in little more than three month's time. Fire marshalls deemed the blaze that consumed Studio I disco on August 6 the work of an arsonist. Gasoline, or a similar substance, spread around the building rushed the flames through \$100,000 in damages in a few short minutes before firefighters arrived. On July 3, The Renegade, another disco, burned in a similar manner.

The Boat House, a third Gay disco, may be next in line for some hot action, locals fear. State police report numerous beatings of patrons in front of the establishment, and the building itself now sports a spray-painted message warning, "You're Next!"

MOVE OVER JIMMY AND RONNIE

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (GayLife) - Although not expected to beat Jimmy Carter, David McReynolds, an openly Gay man, is running for president. McReynolds is the Democratic Socialist candidate seeking nomination of the Peace and Freedom Party. If elected, he would be the first Gay president of the United States, unless you count James Buchanan.

WYOMING GROUP FORMS

LARAMIE, WY - A new organization has appeared on the campus of Wyoming. Gays and Lesbians of Wyoming (GLOW) is now an officially recognized organization and has been afforded the full use of campus facilities for distribution of literature and information pertaining to Gays. MARINES RANSACK D.C. BAR

WASHINGTON, DC (Update) - 150 U.S. Marines ransacked a Washington, DC Gay bar, the Equus, breaking windows and assaulting the owner and patrons. The Marine Corps defended the assaults according to the Washington Post, stating they were probably in retaliation for unspecified assaults by Gays against Marines. The Gay bar is located near the District of Columbia Marine Barracks. Attacks on Gays by Marines have been reported frequently by the Washington press.

REAGAN HIRES MORAL MAJORITY LEADER

NEW YORK, NY - It has been revealed that Governor Ronald Reagan, the Republican Presidential Nominee, has hired Robert Billings, the former Executive Director of the anti-Gay Moral Majority, to play a major role in his campaign.

Billings is believed to have played a major role in getting Reagan to attend the well-publicized Religious Roundtable meeting in Dallas, Texas. (AGN, Sept. 19). At that meeting Reagan told the large crowd, which was meeting to plan the mobilization of the conservative "born-again" vote, that he knew they could not endorse him, but he wanted them to know that he endorsed them. Billings is expected to return to the Moral Majority following the election unless he accepts a post in the Reagan administration.

KKK GETTING STRONGER

FALLBROOK, CA (GayLife) - Tom Metzger of Fallbrook ran as an openly avowed member of the Klu Klux Klan pledged to do all he can to end integration in America and to send black people back to Africa and put all homosexuals in prisons and mental hospitals for life. Metzger is a Democrat and he won the Democratic nomination to oppose the incumbent Republican. And there are some folks down in San Diego County who feel he may just win it all in November. Many Democratic bosses are rushing to denounce Metzger but it is obvious that 32,000 people in the 43rd Congressional District agree with the hate programs as outlined by Metzger and the KKK. Incidentally, the KKK has endorsed Ronald Reagan and the Republican platform.

MORE HORROR FROM IRAN

KERMAN, IRAN (GayLife) - Their heads covered with ceremonial hoods, the four condemned prisoners were buried chest deep in the earth just outside the town of Kerman in southern Iran. After the presiding Islamic judge had cast the first stone, five other people began pelting the hooded figures with rocks, some as large as oranges. The prisoners - two men accused of assorted sex crimes and two female prostitutes - took 15 minutes to die under the barbaric barrage. The grim executions took place following renewed calls by Khomeini for a strict adherence to Islam and a purge of all forms of corruption.

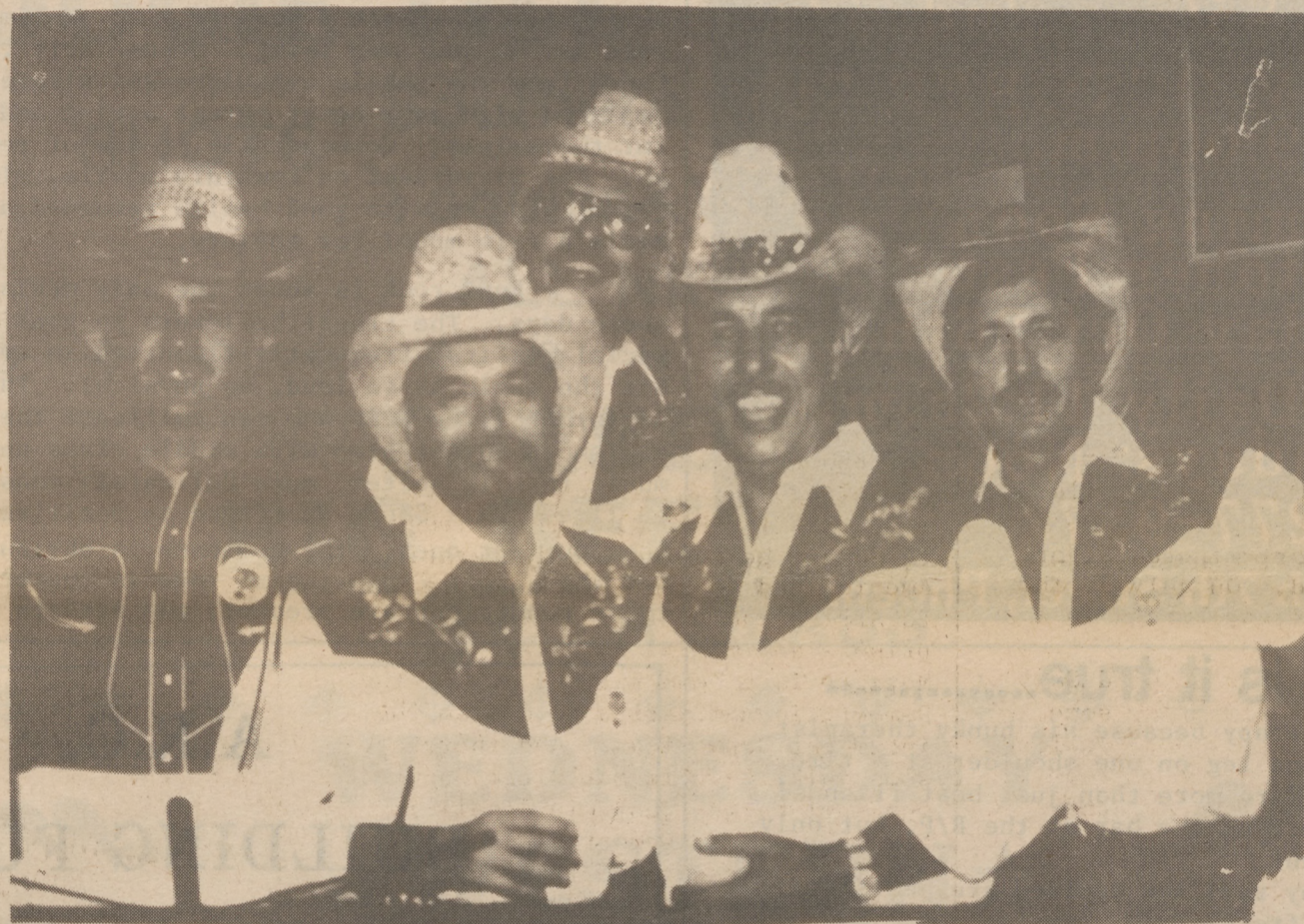

Review... Review... Review

A new form of entertainment emerged in Tucson on Sunday, September 21 - music for people who need positive reinforcement in their search for alternatives to traditional heterosexuality. It was very comforting.

Holly Near, a gifted singer, attracted about 800 people to the Temple of Music and Art. She is a political activist and defender of free choice in sexual roles. That sounds ordinary enough. The surprising part were the vibes from the predominately female audience. A feeling of pride mixed with desperation. Of wanting to be different from the norm, yet hating to struggle alone.

The prevailing fashion there was short hair and heavy cotton pants, similar to G.I. fatigues, worn with heavy work shirts. These ladies weren't on a stylish outing, they were dressed for combat. But they wanted to give up their guerrilla status and join a serious army. Holly Near gave them the chance. In this battleground of the mind, Near was the inflammatory flag waver. When she sang powerfully about the joys of Lesbian love, the audience shouted its approval.

The number of people who turned out, the enthusiasm with which they responded, is proof enough of the strong social need for such a message. As sentiments of the 1960's, such as "do your own thing," became trite, old fashioned and faded from the public consciousness altogether, they weren't replaced with some newer phrase urging individuals to think for themselves. Consequently, a lot of people stopped doing so. The picture of an upwardly mobile, middle class heterosexual glowing with good health returned as the advertising media's role model for society.

Punk rock is about the only deviation set to music these days. The truest believers in punk have always been social misfits, frequently flaunting an ambiguous sexuality. But the music is so loud, so physical. There is a need for performers like Near who can cultivate the same kind of audiences out of step with middle class norms, but who play music that is softer, more delicately constructed, easier to live with. Songs expressed in positive terms, rather than defiant ones. The audience is obviously here, wishing for the sounds. Wanting to take in concerts. Whenever those those conditions are present, the artists are forthcoming.

Because HRCF is a political action committee, individuals may take an income tax credit for contributions. They may claim a tax credit of 50% of the amount given up to \$100 (200 for a joint return). So a \$50 contribution costs only \$25.

Your "Viewpoint" column in ACN (Week of Sept. 26) which included "A View From The Left" and "A View From The Right" was, in our opinion highly politically misleading. We feel an injustice was done to the politically oriented Gay community of Phoenix.

To place negative comments about the Alternative Relations Center under the heading of "A View From The Left" and positive statements under "A View From The Right" was absolutely politically backwards.

If it were not for liberal (which immediately places one to the Left), people such as ourselves, the very concept of an organization such as ARC would not exist; Those on the Right (the conservatives, Republicans, the "Moral Majority" (or the Nazis) would never create such an organization in the first place, and would (and do, in fact) work to eliminate and destroy such things. IN RESPONSE TO CURTIS NEWTON

Who you are, I have no idea. Whether you're Gay is not apparently indicated within the confines of your article. What is most apparent is that you have a primary knowledge

regarding the Alternative Relations Center. Knowledge that seems to be filled with personal feelings, conjecture and obvious disappointment.

Please permit me to introduce myself. I'm Jerry W. Boehm, A.R.C. Fund Raising Drive Coordinator. I was asked by the Board of Directors to both organize and coordinate this most necessary fund raising event. As a non-ARC member, I took a hard, objective look at the Center's varied programs and needs. I was astonished at the variety of social service programs offered and critical in other areas. However, in the long run, I felt that I could honestly accept the responsibility of coordinating the fund raising drive since precise analysis of the Center and its programs indicated that ARC actively sought to assist the Gay community members wherever needed.

The tone of your letter, as well as the content leads me to assume that you, Mr. Newton, are educated, thus have no need of specially tutored classes to complete your high school education. Others do! I also must assume that you are gainfully employed and require no need of the Center's Job Placement Assistance Service, emergency temporary housing nor emergency food boxes. Others do! Whether you have an alcoholic problem I have no way of ascertaining. However, others do and attend twice weekly the Alcohol Abuse Program offered by ARC. Whether the Center could be of assistance to you in any way is undertain at this juncture. However, the Center is there should you need it!

Your utilization of the word "select" is both erroneous and detrimentally misleading to those who read AGN and your article. There are no "select" members nor "select" groups at ARC. The center is open to one and all. What ARC contains is an abundance of Gay people who have specific needs. This is not a matter of semantics, but a truism.

I too agree with you, as do other member of ARC, that the present, temporarily leased headquarters is not sufficient to realistically meet the needs of the community nor provide for future expansion. Therein is one of the primary reasons for the 1980 ARC Fund Raising Drive. Remember, it is temporary! The funds generated through this campaign will enable the Center to locate larger quarters that will provide the optimum of space in which the Center can adequately function and expand.

ARC is your Center. It attempts to cater to the needs of members of the Gay community. If the Center lacks com-

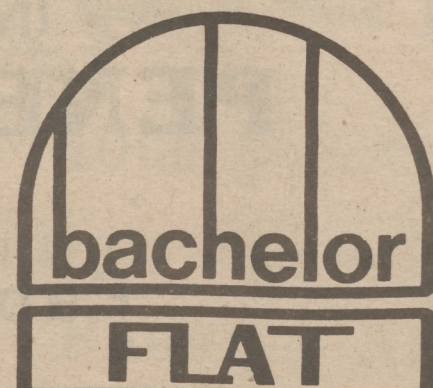

EDITOR'S COMMENTS

A VIEW FROM THE MIDDLE

My good friend Ron Atkins letter to the editor in this issue of AGN makes a point that "Right" and "Left" have their own connotations in the political movement. Our usage of the two terms in the article "Viewpoint" was merely to point out two divergent points of view, strike a responsive chord (which it obviously did) and motivate our readers to the true facts of the Alternative Relations Center. The amount of space that AGN has devoted in the past, and in the future, clearly indicates that AGN is solidly behind the ARC, their programs, their volunteers and their Fund Raising Drive. An important point to be made here is since when does such an organization as a Gay Community Center become politically oriented? There are organizations for such political activity and they do not belong in the everyday activities of running a Gay social agency, no more than they should be involved in churches, schools, etc.

The controversial "Newton" letter did not represent any persons point of view except the individual. He has done, we believe, no more than get people thinking about the good points of ARC and to help rally people around ARC. The publishing of the Draffan McBride "rebuttal" letter did not seem to worry anyone - not even one good word about that. But again, that is the plight of the communicator who attempts to be fair, try to get the word out on all sides of a controversy and still endeavor to keep a level-headed judgement on where the community is going. It is not an easy task. If a particular cause is right - excuse me, correct - then it is most obvious to the reader. If it is not, then it will be just as obvious.

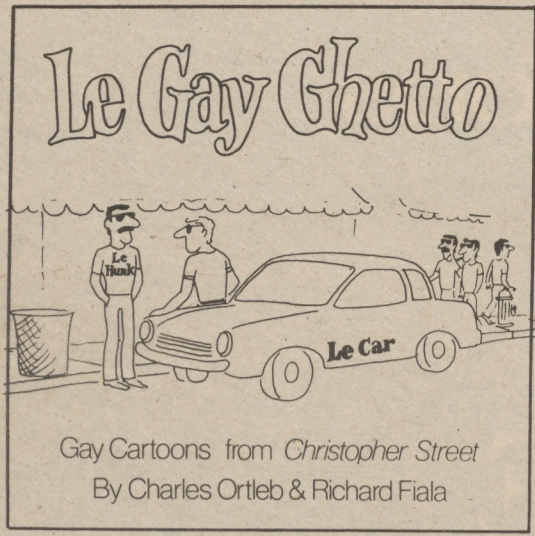
Semantics have been a problem for years, and those that involve themselves with semantics are most difficult to deal with. Right, left, up, down, in, out, whatever you might want to say, it all amounts to two points of view (in this case 180 degrees out of phase). If we had used the words "North" and "South" we undoubtedly would have heard from a lot of unhappy Yankees and Rebels. In this particular instance, it was felt that this important issue deserved more space than just another Letter to the Editor.

Plant auction benefit success
