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


NU-TOWNE CELEBRATES FOURTEEN YEARS

Dear Covina:




THE SONS OF APOLLO



DR. GREEN JEANS PLANT CARE

DRACAENA MARGINATA

Description:

There are many dracaenas. This being one of the most beautiful and dramatic, they have heavy trunks topped with clusters of long, dagger-like leaves. The leaves are dark green and may have a red outline.

Care:

Again, this is a very versatile plant where light is concerned. High, medium or low light will work, but high or medium light is required for growth. The plant just exists in low light. (Remember, low light does not mean no light.)

Most books on plant care will tell you to keep Marginatas moist, but it has been my experience to let them dry slightly between waterings.

Feeding:

For plants in medium to high light, use the standard formula. If low light situations exist, use much less fertilizer. Over-feeding will cause brown tips and edges.

Notes:


Marginatas can vary in height from 6" to 15 feet. They are a very popular plant because of their versatility. You will find that lower leaves turn yellow as new growth appears at the top. This is normal unless you are losing more than you are gaining. The only things to avoid are strong drafts and high traffic areas — people brushing by the plant will cause bruising and tip damage.





Phoenix was treated to "star power" this past week, by Ms. Gail Fisher.

"You name it, I've got the recipe and I'll cook it better than the instructions," she

Ms. Fisher has tired of life in the "fast lane," as she calls it, and longs to move from smog-bound Los Angeles to the shore. "I love the ocean; it helps regenerate my soul—after all, I am a soul sister, you know."

At a reception given in her honor by her Phoenix host, Littlejohn McCary, she was Hollywood tried and true. She stopped to speak with each guest and touched each one there. She signed autographs and was interviewed by the press. She absolutely stopped them cold later that evening at J.R.'s with the recitation of a piece of poetry she wrote many years ago. "You could have heard a pin drop," was the popular comment.

"I write lots of poetry — it seems to flow from me at times," she said. Some of her work has been put to music and recorded by such greats as Carmen McCrae.

What's her favorite pasttime? "I love the sun and water and shopping." And while here, she got an equal dose of all three.

And dining ranks among her favorites, also. "I love to dine casually with good friends, talking between courses, taking time before moving on to the next dish," she added.

Having experienced Phoenix dining emporiums, including Lucille's Soulfood Kitchen, Macayo's and our own Taylor's/DW's, which was her favorite, Ms. Fisher expressed her secret desire to own a restaurant. "I want it to be the best. Great food, great service — an ambience not to be found anywhere in the world."

Ms. Fisher said she didn't know where this would be — "probably close to the

Her appearance on Sunday evening at The Phoenix Hilton gala Reader's Choice Awards as a special star presenter gave a certain glow to the entire evening. "It was an absolute blast! I love to see people honored for what they do!"

April 15th is just around the corner. If you don't think you'll have your return filed by the 15th, then prepare for an automatic 4-month extension (form 4868). You must accurately estimate your tax liability due and send it with form 4868. This is only an extension of time to file form 1040 or 1040A, not an extension to pay.

A question being asked frequently is: "If I have my return complete, I owe money but unable to pay — what then?" My answer is to go ahead and file your return on time. Most agencies will work with you on payments.

THE POWER STATION "THE POWER STATION"

(Capitol, Produced by Bernard Edwards)

The '80's have witnessed a number of "Supergroups;" all-star monster bands comprised of name artists with apparently little to do between projects of their own. And often little to offer musically.

The Power Station unites Taylors John and Andy of Duran Duran with British rocker Robert Palmer. Former Chic members Tony Thompson and Bernard Edwards handle drums and production chores, respectively. This merging of Brit Rock and studio funk proves to be an infrequently effective collaboration.

Edwards' production meshes the rowdiness of rock with hip-hop funk with only marginal success. We are teased with the neo-psychedelia of Taylor's guitar, fused with the thud of electric drum and Chic-style homogeny. That Edwards has elicited a true performance from Taylor is accolade enough.

We are offered a Great Big Hit Single in "Some Like It Hot," a thoroughly inaccessible, hookless wonder of a song. All throbbing beat box and Duran-ish vocal, the tune's redemption is its too-infrequent horn riff.

The only real eye-opener here is a one-off on the T-Rex Classic, "Bang a Gong." Again one catches a glimpse of what might have been, in an effective blend of '70's psychedelics and urban funk. While the set as a whole attempts this fusion, it is realized most accurately here, in a sizzling meeting of guitar, horns, and raucous vocal.

The album as a whole, however, is more a near-miss in the Supergroup school of vinyl.



TOM PETTY & THE HEARTBREAKERS "SOUTHERN ACCENTS"

(MCA; Produced by Tom Petty, Jimmy Iovine, Dave Stewart, and Robbie Robertson)

Numerous firsts mark a refreshing return in Petty and Company's sixth outing.

Production assistance from Dave Stewart (Eurythmics) and Robbie Robertso (the Band) aids in flushing out and expanding on Petty's well-established sound.

The collaboration with Stewart (who co-wrote three of the LP's songs) brings a relaxed quality to Petty's trademark whine, as on the slow build of "Don't Come Around Here No More." Stewart wisely bridles his synthetic thumbprint, allowing Petty to shine through respectably.

Robertson shows considerably less restraint in his collaboration on "The Best of Everything," leaning heavily on Garth Hudson's keyboards and chorus vocals a la the Band. Still, Petty's inimitable style is apparent.

Recognizable amid all this production fluff is the man himself. Petty's powerful guitar playing rips through the soulful "Make It Better" and strums acoustic on the LP's title cut.

The progression of Petty and his Heartbreakers is apparent, while still delivering the expected musical signature of one of rock's most creative bands.



WHITNEY HOUSTON"

(Arista; Various producers)

Seldom does there emerge a vocalist whose style and timbre challenge the talents of those who precede her. Whitney Houston skips the school of novice and belts her way into the ranks of mother Cissy and cousin Dionne Warwick.

Listening to Whitney Houston sing, one is reminded of the young Aretha Franklin. Without emulating Franklin, Houston projects the confidence of a seasoned professional That she occasionally downplays her formidable voice (as in the duets with Teddy Pendergrass and Jermaine Jackson) allows for her vocalizing to shine brighter where she *really* sings out.

Sleek production (Kashif's work here is arguable his best) West-Coast styles make for a startling debut. A must for fans of great big vocals.

EMMY LOU HARRIS "THE BALLAD OF SALLY ROSE"

Warner Bros; Produced by Emmylou Harris and Paul Kennerly)

Emmylou Harris, sweetheart of the country music rodeo, presents a concept album with a storyline based every-so-loosely on her own life.

And while concept albums rarely work as a whole, Harris has succeeded in recording an album filled with good songs which tell a story.

Country's many facets receive a work-out here — Harris covers all bases, from Bluegrass ("Long Tall Sally Rose") to country-rock ("Bad News"). The classic balladery of "Heart to Heart" is more reminiscent of Emmylou's "Blue Kentucky Girl" days than anything else here; Harris' approach is elsewhere more aggressive and hard-hitting.

For her first full-scale Nashville outing, Emmylou chose to work with producer-songwriter Paul Kennerly. Kennerly's spare production gives Harris ample room to do what she does best play and sing unadulterated country-bluegrass.

This quality and an overall consistency of style carries off Emmy's "Ballad of Salle Rose" very well.

BOBBY GENTRY "ODE TO BILLY JOE"

Everybody recalls this ode to teenage romance and suicide. How many of us wondered exactly why Billy Joe flung himself off the Talahachee Bridge?

Critics and probrammers ignored what was intimated in the song's lyric: that young Billy had been with a man. Unable to live with this unpardonable sin, the young man kills himself. Honestly! Such dramatics.



TEARS FOR FEARS "SONGS FROM THE BIG CHAIR"

(Mercury; Produced by Chris Hughes)

A near-perfect union of the Tears' moody eloquence and the Pop sensibilities of producer Chris Hughes make this a winning, accessible

Much of this band's earlier grousings are imbued with a more fulfilling musical substance. "Everybody Wants to Rule the World" is happier, more upbeat than any of their previous work. "Shout" uncovers dance fllor ideals suggesting eminent cross-over potential.

This pop-dance thrust continues with numerous trim, richly hued originals. Without letting go their established punkish stance, Tears For Fears balance this newly optimistic sound with driving synthetics and their caustic observation of life.

This duo's atmospheric post-punk style is reminiscent of countless downbeat rockers. However, this solid, diverse set out to please programmers and win new fans for the Tears.



LUTHER VANDROSS "THE NIGHT I FELL IN LOVE"

(Epic; Produced by Luther Vandross and Marcus Miller)

Without abandoning his unique ability with a ballad, Luther Vandross has infused this fourth solo venture with a decidedly more up-beat stamp than on previous

'The Night I Fell In Love" proves what Vandross has intimated in past ventures: That he is both a vocalist capable of sensual balladery and a craftsman of wonderfully funky soul. His stylish production fuses these qualities into an admirable set.

The bounciness of "Til My Baby Comes Home" sets the mood for several up-tempo numbers, which balance nicely the more somber offerings here. The title cut is the by-now standard Vandross ballad, all lilting vocal and lush production. The lovely "It's Over Now" looms as a possible second single.

"The Night I Fell In Love" appears to be the milestone album that Vandross fans have been waiting

LEATHERNOTES

— LEATHER — HOW TO BUY IT HOW TO WEAR IT

We are all a composite of our experiences. We touch and are touched by those around us. And in those we take and give in reasonably equal measure and make part of that person a part of us. For most of us, our interest in leather is sparked by close contact with a person already in leather. Whether it be just seeing that hot body across a rather dark and smokey room or having that hot body in a much more intimate environment, contact with someone who looks and feels good in leather helps the beginner decide whether or not to try it for themself.

Leather is an expensive product. When deciding, as a beginner, what to purchase always start as simply and inexpensively as possible. Leather is not for everyone. Some will decide that either they don't like the leather itself or they don't like the effect it produces on them. There is nothing wrong with not liking leather. In these days, when we all are judged on how we look and who we know rather than who we are, it is easy to be forced into situations not of our own choosing. If you don't like leather, don't enjoy the feel or smell or response of others in leather then by all means don't invest money in it. But, if you do enjoy it. If, as Leroy always says, it makes your "putter flutter" then the decision is how much and how soon. Like we said before, start slow and simple. In clothing simple would be a vest or harness. Begin with a color. Though black is the most accepted we have made several brown and grey vests. Most have been for men who already have black leather vests. Again, black is the most universal but leather comes in over 40 different colors. Next comes weight of leather. So many times we have been asked to make clothing from glove leather or calfskin and usually the person is simply looking for high grade leather. There is no such skin as glove leather. There isn't a tannery in the country that sells glove leather. But soft leathers are available in a variety of weights. Calf skin on the other hand does exist. But as a good leather for clothing it is close to the bottom of the list. There are many full grain cow hides more durable and attractive. Don't confuse light weight as something of high quality. Weight is not the deciding factor. Look at the grain, evenness of color, smooth gloss or lack of it as long as it is even across the hide. Remember also that leather is not a manufactured material, it is not woven but grown. Small blemishes or flaws in the skin are to be expected and in some cases even desireable. It is the small imperfections of the skin that make it worth buying over manufactured products like vinyl or naugahide. Obviously, larbe scars and sharp changes in grain should be avoided. Now back to weight. A vest will usually be made from a 3 to 4 ounce leather. That is 3 to 4 ounce per square foot. Lighter weights of 1/2 to 2 ounce can be used for dress vests, tank tops and t-shirts. Heavier weights of 5 to 7 ounce are fine for biking vests. Harnesses can be made of lightweight leathers also but only for show or bar wear. Any harness that you are also going to be "playing" in should be made of something heavier. At least 4 ounce and usually 6 ounce will be the best on harnesses that will be worn out as well as in.

Now comes fit. This is where the quality comes in. Even a second rate skin can make a first rate piece of clothing. If the fit is correct. Some people are fortunate and are able to find items off the rack that fit as if made for them. Others must have clothing cut specifically for them. A vest should lay flat on the shoulders and next to the body down the sides. Whether the back of the vest conforms to you is based on several factors; do you have a pronounced curve in your lower back, do your shoulders roll slightly forward? Small body differences can be compensated for in the cut of the leather but the only way to pull the back of the vest in tight against the small of your back is to have a closure in the front of the vest. On harnesses, the straps should hug the body without binding it. The width of the straps are determined by the size of the body they are to be wrapped around. A large body can handle straps of up to 2 inch widths, a person on the slender side should stay down around ¾ to 1¼ inch widths. Whether the harness is buckle or snapped is a matter of personal preference, but a buckled harness generally works better on a larger torso. The final cut of both the vest and harness are a matter of taste and custom made items can be designed to fit the person's wallet as well as attitude.

The next step in your leather would be pants or chaps. Jackets would also be a logical step. First though a quick look at pants and chaps. We won't go into style as there are a variety of combinations. On weight. Anything under 3 ounce will quickly stretch and lose its shape. Again, lighter weights are available. The decision is based on how long you want the clothing to last. On fit. Both pants and chaps should fit firm in the crotch and thigh, loosen slightly at the knee, then firm again at the calf and around the boot. Individual cuts are based on individual tastes.

And jackets. Well, jackets are practically a story all to themselves. For quality and fit though the best advice is to stick to major names. Brooks, Perfecto, Shott Bros. and probably the finest jacket made, Hein-Gerick.

Finally, some common things to watch for when buying leather. The grain should be reasonably consistent through the body of the garment. The gloss of the hide should be consistent. You should not be able to feel weak or thin sections in the leather. And something of importance, look for nylon thread. Many "off the rack" leather items are sewn with cotton thread. It is fine for fabric clothing but weakens quickly on leather. Nylon thread is usually glossy against the leather, cotton thread is usually dull. So, if you have the money and it fits, buy it. If it turns you on and makes you feel good it will probably do the same for someone else. Leather is just another way to express our masculinity. There are many and one is just as good as another. We have found one way. If you have found another share it with us and watch for a short series of articles in the near future on leather attitude and masculine behavior. For next time though — Toys and Restraints — When and How.




