NGLTF TARGETS GOVERNMENT TESTING PROGRAMS; ISSUES EDUCATIONAL FACT SHEET

Late last year, the U.S. State Department announced a new policy implementing mandatory HIV antibody testing for all foreign service employees and their dependents. Less than a month later, the U.S. Job Corps announced plans to test all employees and applicants in Job Corps programs. The proposals drew fire from a broad spectrum of civil liberties and gay organizations. "The justifications offered by the federal government for introducing mandatory testing programs were implausible at best," observed Jeffrey Levi, Executive Director of the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF). "We viewed these programs as the federal government's attempt to literally test the waters of mass mandatory testing for all federal employees, and perhaps for all Americans."

NGLTF responded immediately by contacting the Congressional committees with oversight over these departments to obtain hearings on the utility and necessity of the new regulations. To date, no Congressional leader has undertaken a challenge to these policies. The Task Force also contacted federal employee unions such as the American Foreign Service Association and the American Federation of Government Employees. Although the AFSA does not plan to protest the new policy, AFGE is participating as plaintiff in a lawsuit being prepared by Lambda Legal Defense & Education Fund.

We believe that the decision to take the antibody test should be an individual one and not one that is coerced by the government," noted Levi, "Given the tremendous psychological, legal, social, and economic impact a positive test result can have on an individual's life, the government has no business interposing itself into this difficult decision.'

To focus the debate further, the Task Force has prepared and distributes several fact sheets on antibody tsting, including the enclosed document "Questions & Answers on HIV Testing and Government Employment and Programs". Other NGLTF fact sheets include "Questions and Answers About the HIV Antibody Test", and a "Summary of Positions" on the relative efficacy of prevention programs, testing, and contact tracing.

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HUMANSPACE BOOK

Surpassing the Love of Men: Romantic Friendship and Love Between Women from the Renaissance to the Present. Lillian Faderman, author. New York: William Morrow & Co. 1981. 415 pages, photos, notes, index. \$10.95 paperbound.

The information and philosophy in Surpassing the Love of Men is an essential and major component of feminism. From the back cover blurb: "She shows... ... feminist values have always played a role in women's passions for each other and in men's reactions to them, from ridicule to admiration to revulsion ... Surpassing the Love of Men is a quietly revolutionary book that brings together forgotten and ignored strands of history in an unexpected new synthesis.'

The key word up there was "quiet". Faderman began researching a paper about Emily Dickinson, and ended up doing her thesis on romantic friendships between women; she's now a full professor of English. Her work is copiously documented, with the notes at the end so they don't interfere with reading pleasure, and they're fascinating reading themselves, as is the introduction. Professional level academic work for public consumption occasionally hits the jackpot - interesting, relevant and accurate, and this one does it, along with American Couples and The Male Couple.

Faderman began wondering what was going on between Emily Dickinson and Sue Gilbert — if the relationship was lesbian, as Faderman understood "lesbian", why was there no indication of secretiveness, anxiety, guilt? Her further research turned up an elegantly simple explanation: romantic friendship and love between women doesn't necessarily include sexual expression, and it's the

sex that gives people conniptions.

Or maybe it's the label "lesbian" that's been creating some of the fuss. Faderman inundates us with evidence that romantic friendship and love between women has always been around, and frequently as open and unremarkable as any other relationship; she reminds us of the term "Boston marriage". Faderman leads us persuasively to her implication that the popular association of "lesbian" with sexual expression isn't doing any of us any good, but instead confuses the universality of love by dividing people into categories. As a non-lesbian reader, I found this intuitively right.

If you're a feminist reader, male or female, gay or not, you know that you'll find this book enjoyable, rewarding and affirming. It's simply fun to read. And this is the book to give to people who are partway along the path to acceptance of alternative ways, and need to know what

Sudden Death. Rita Mae Brown, author. New York: Bantam, 1983. 241 pages. \$3.95 paperbound.

The phrase "roman a clef" (literally: keyed novel) has no English equivalent; the closest is "expose", which is also French. A few centuries back, these novels were even more common in French literature than they are here and now. (My college major was French literature.) These novels describe the unpublicized or scandalous activities of well-known people as barely fictionalized major characters. The writing quality varies wildly. but people usually read these books for the gossip and sex anyway.

Brown had a huge and devoted following before she wrote Sudden Death; it made the New York Times bestseller list for reasons beyond its titillating implications. I consider Brown a master writer - her writing shows not only her control of her medium, but also her pleasure in using it. Her characters play with words, and I laugh out loud at some of the

tricks she coaxes out of simple English. The phrase "sudden death" is associated with tennis. The tennis players in Sudden Death are some of the women who work the professional circuit. Brown focuses our attention on Carmen, a champion at her peak, and the people who affect her most. Carmen's lover is Harriet, a vulnerable and supportive professor and effectively a kept woman. Susan is Carmen's first lover and current professional rival; Susan's the one who spills the beans about Carmen and Harriet. Miguel is Carmen's brother. coach and financial manager, who attempts to rearrange her commitments

for his own purposes. I learned a little more than I wanted to know about professional tennis. Concessions to advertisers and financial supporters, technicalities of court surfaces and playing strategies, and other unpublicized considerations are necessary to the players and the story itself, and may be more inherently interesting to you than to me. The personal motivations and interactions, the character development of fictions who became real in their own rights, and the pleasure of good writing kept me turning the pages.

If you like tennis, or tennis players. keep in mind that Martina will be available in paperback by the time you read this. If you like Brown, you'll want to pick up a copy of High Hearts. currently available in hardback.

Spring Forward/Fall Back. Sheila Ortiz Taylor, author. Tallahassee, FL: Naiad Press, 1985. 257 pages. \$7.95

Taylor's other novel, Faultline, was fairly well received for its competent writing and offbeat, humorously treated subject matter - in a nutshell, it's about rabbits. It was very heavily promoted by Naiad Press; Naiad's owner intends to get books about lesbians into mainstream consciousness.

Spring Forward/Fall Back is another moderately successful investment in pleasing everyone ... okay, would you believe giving everyone some point of identification? Okay. Would you believe throwing in enough diversity that everyone will recognize something? This one wanders off in several directions at once and keeps us busy trying to remember the landmarks.

Think of something of current interest to you or someone you know, and you'll find it in Spring Forward/Fall Back. Convoluted relationships among past, present and future lovers. Teenage coming-out. Fascination with strong, famous women. Running a mixed gay bar. Death from cancer. Age difference between lovers. Friendship between gay women and nongay men. How to leave your husband and buy a house. Goddesses. Stereotypes perpetuated and overturned. Etc. This is lots of fun. entertaining and absorbing, and you won't remember anything about it when you're finished.

We meet Elizabeth when she's seventeen, finishing high school and falling in love with her English teacher, about to spend her last summer on Catalina Island before going on to make her place in the real world. At the same time, Marci is twenty-nine, and leaving her husband and buying a house on the California mainland. Ten years later, Elizabeth and Marci meet, and may or may not live

happily ever after.

Meanwhile, all kinds of interesting things are happening with them and all the other characters. They move in and out of each other's houses and love and lives, they give birth, they die, they have boring or cataclysmic interludes with their families, they attribute various events to various causes.

Spring Forward/Fall Back is divided into three "books" - major sections and Taylor coordinates this three-ring circus competently. She provides diversions for whenever the main action may get boring for her readers, and even when it's not boring, there's something to distract us, and we come back to find that we've missed something that may have been important. That's what this book feels like - we never know what was supposed to be important. So we stop wondering what to keep track of, and we relax and enjoy the literary overstimulation. And when we're finished, we realize that we've forgotten our own distracting concerns and we're ready to get back to the important stuff.

According to Michael, the collectible line is generally the most sought after by the investor, as these oil paintings come from estate sales and other private sources. This line contains the works of Bogard, Edward Horan, Hargrove, Carson, Garcia and the like.

"In order to sell paintings at wholesale prices, all of our oils are sold either in shows such as the one at the New Camel Club or in private home presentations," explains Michael. "Each painting is sold unstretched and is priced to include your choice of frame."

The New Camel showing will be set up gallery style for better viewing. A cross-section of art styles being presented will include Southwestern, abstracts, pointilism, contemporary and character studies.

"There are as many styles as there are individual buyers' tastes, and Phoenix Wall Designs has attempted to set up operation in order to serve the greatest number of first-time and seasoned buyers' interests," Stedman explained.

All paintings are registered in the buyer/owner's name at the time of purchase (in part, for insurance reasons; also due to the fact that the purchaser of any piece of art is actually making a long-term investment).

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LOVE MEANS NEVER HAVING TO SAY YOU'RE SORRY

In 1977 the quickly slapped-together rock group, The Sex Pistols, was riding the crest of media hype surrounding the "punk" movement. The adolescent British underclass embraced their anti-establishment philosophies as a means to make blunt statements of social protest.

As with every musical group, there are groupies. Nancy Spungen came to London from Pennsylvania. Her high-strung determination attracted the alienated Sid Vicious and rekindled his sexual appetite, as well as his drug usage; Nancy was a heroin addict.

Often one may not care for the content of a movie. With subject matter so unpleasant and people so disagreeable, it would be easy to dismiss this film — if it weren't so well made.

Sid and Nancy is a stunning experience. I was alternately impressed and revolted. The acting is superb—at one point I forgot I was watching performances. The cinematography and art direction are first rate. Scene after scene, one is drawn inexorably into a world of drugs, violence and misdirected affections.

Sid and Nancy is a love story. The film's original title was to have been Love Kills. It would be easy to blame the couple's demise on Nancy, were it not obvious from the beginning that Sid was ripe for her particular kind of exploitation. Believe it or not, the story has a good mix of irony and humor, although the situations are hardly glamourized.

At the beginning of the movie a charac-

ter entreats passers-by on the street to enter his nightclub by saying, "Come see the slimy underbelly of London. Is it fucking worth it?"

Yes, it is.

ALL ABOARD!

It is always strange — and often difficult - to view a story in different incarnations. Having read The Shining, I was devastated (read: disappointed) by Kubrick's interpretation on the screen (although the casting was curiously correct). And, after being entertained by the movie version of Boys in the Band, it was a troubling experience to witness the local Janus group spread the dramatics out on the stage. (An odd contradiction, since most plays are automatically 'opened-up' for the movie treatment.) When I went to see the Janus Theatre Company presentation of Bus Stop the other evening, I was worried by the thought that I had already seen the motion picture. I need not have been concerned.

A bus pulls up to Gracie's Cafe on a stormy winter day. Grace and her employee, Elma, are ready for their customers. The first to enter is a distraught blonde, Cherie. She is followed by an aging ex-professor, Dr. Lyman. Carl the bus driver and Will, the local sheriff, are next.

Finally, Virgil and Bo make their entrance. Bo, the younger of the two cowboys, has kindapped Cherie with the intention of marrying her and taking her to his ranch in Montana. His victim is not

amused. The sheriff plays referee. Grace feigns a headache and rushes off to her unstairs apartment Carl excuses himself

amused. The sheriff plays referee. Grace feigns a headache and rushes off to her upstairs apartment. Carl excuses himself and joins her. Dr. Lyman makes passes as naive Elma. Bo and Cherie spar. Virgil plays it cool.

Bus Stop is a story about relationships. People doing whatever it takes to involve themselves with others — in this instance hetero coupling — and the personal sacrifices or compromises that are made.

Grace had a husband, doesn't know or care what has become of him, but continues seeking personal satisfaction in her encounters with bus drivers. Elma is young, smart and optimistic. She is easy prey for the lascivious advances of disillusioned Dr. Lyman. He has married three times and now spends his days traveling, drinking too much and hanging around schoolyards. Will doesn't have a relationship. His commitment is his job. Cherie has been around, if you know what I mean, and fancies herself a successful nightclub singer. After so many one night stands, she can't imagine anything more enduring. Bo is loud, aggressive and too

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
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single-mindedly obnoxious to be believed. His behavior is a cover for his insecurities. He was a virgin before he met Cherie. Now he can't imagine life without her. Virgil is the only loner. He has resisted the changes required to develop a relationship. Some folk never Fall In Love.

I wish it could be said that all the performances were grand. For the most part they were just fine. What distracted the most — I wanted desperately to overlook it but the companion kept elbowing me — was the costuming of Bo. The actor was visually appropriate for the part. His outfit was not. This dude was decked out in tight faded jeans and a plaid shirt (so far, so good). Top this off with brown belt and boots, a black hat (?) and a pink hanky around the neck (!). If that weren't enough, the poor guy sports a wig and matching moustache. (If they're real, my apologies.)

Back to why I was ultimately (about halfway into the evening, to be precise) unconcerned about having seen the film before seeing the play; I don't remember the movie at all. The only scene that easily comes to mind is the one where M.M. sings "That Old Black Magic" and changes her spotlight by stamping her foot on a floor control. That's it. Wanna know why? Because it's a boring story!

The Janus Theatre Company has undertaken more challenging projects

than this and have done quite nicely. Here's to the future!



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PRESIDENT'S BUDGET CALLS FOR AIDS **FUNDING INCREASES; TASK FORCE TERMS FUNDING LEVELS "STILL INADEQUATE"**

President Reagan's fiscal year 1988 budget, released this week, calls for a \$118 million increase in AIDS funding over Fiscal 1987. AIDS was one of the few nondefense programs slated for increase by the Reagan Administration. Under the proposed budget, AIDS research and prevention would be increased from \$436 million in the current fiscal year to \$534 million next year.

"In the current budget climate, the fact that the Administration requested an increase reflects a recognition belated and inadequate as it may be — of the magnitude of the AIDS crisis," commented Jeff Levi, executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "However," Levi continued, "this request still falls dramatically short of the funds needed, particularly in the area of prevention.'

The Task Force will lobby for funding levels near \$700 million for AIDS research and prevention in the next fiscal year. Such a level, Levi explained, "would allow us to move in even increments to the \$2 billion a year figure that the National Academy of Sciences/Institute of Medicine report recommended recently.'

NGLTF finds the most serious deficiency in the budget request to be in the area of prevention education. The Centers for Disease Control, the agency spearheading the prevention programs, is given only a \$23 million increase in a budget, which covers prevention, surveillance and epidemiology.

"Absent a vaccine, education is our only prevention tool," Levi said. "Few would argue that we now have an adequate prevention program. Even if all \$23 million of the increase for CDC went to education, we would be nowhere near what is needed for an effective campaign. The British are spending \$30 million on a mass media campaign alone in a country


a fraction the size of the United States and with a much smaller AIDS problem. To gear up toward a significant prevention program in this country, the CDC should be given at least another \$100 million."

As in previous years, the AIDS budget is limited to research and prevention. It does not address the important issues of health care costs and impact aid for communities that have been hardest hit by AIDS. "The federal government can hide from these issues for just so long," Levi said. "The more they delay, the more costly the solution will be, and the more lives will be lost."

The Task Force will lobby Congress to provide significantly increased sums for AIDS programs, in cooperation with other gay/lesbian, AIDS, and other interested organizations. Later in January, NGLTF will issue a Counterbudget, detailing all the areas of the federal budget where gay/lesbian concerns ought to be addressed but have not been in the Reagan Administration's budget.





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

This leaves us with a political quandary. Mr. Mecham is Governor. Yet, if one were to ask any fifty people on the street who they voted for, few admit to having voted for Mecham! Someone elected this man.

Perhaps a review of the democratic process is in order. Call it a pet peeve; one of those endlessly irritating subjects that comes up again and again: People want to bitch and complain about the current political climate, yet when asked, respond with, "I didn't vote." Chances are that this same person will raise hell should the powers that be do anything that affects him

personally. In being forced to deal with such people, one quickly gets the feeling that, intellectually, we are waltzing with porcupines.

Being optimistic by nature, and having a great deal of faith in people in general (specifically people in the gay community), we'd like to quote the late Dr. Martin Luther King, who said, "I have a dream today." The circumstances and the time may be different, but the principles are the same. An oppressed people are encouraged to overcome their oppression. We, too, have a dream. Our dream is that each and every one of us will have enough pride in our community and in ourselves to give a damn about what takes place in our state and our country, politically. Likewise, we dream of the space to be unafraid to speak up and be heard when these individuals (read: candidates) who feel justified in restricting our civil liberties, in any way, are called to task.

This country has come a long way in establishing rights for its citizens regardless of age, sex, race or creed. It is time to push for the next step — so that our individual freedoms are not violated based on our sexual preference.







THE MOST SEX YOU'VE HAD WHILE LAUGHING

"Who is Bizarro in Love, and why is she going to change lesbian sex history forever?" asks Susie Bright, editor of *On Our Backs*, a lesbian erotica magazine. It's a rhetorical question, and Bright answers it herself. "Bizarro is the leading lady of the most outrageous, explicit, sexy, lesbian novel ever unleashed on a pair of sweaty palms."

Bright is talking about *Bizarro in Love*, a new novella by San Francisco author Jan Stafford. The book is a first in its content and its attitude. It contains explicit sex scenes in fantasy settings. Its characters are almost exclusively lesbians; indeed they seem to live in a world populated only by out-of-the-closet lesbians. And it does this with a tongue-incheek sense of humor.

"I just got tired of sickenly sweet, flowery erotica," explains the author. My friends were buying heterosexual erotic novels or magazines and renting gay male erotic videos just because there were no lesbian alternatives." Stafford decided to write a lesbian erotic novel for her friends. She would write a chapter a week and circulate copies. This established the format for *Bizarro in Love*, which consists of 18 chapters, each with a different byline. Bylines include humorous pen names such as Penny Trashun and Mary Wanna.

The book chronicles the exploits of Bebe Ziarro, a former world class hurdler who is the *Bay Sun's* ace sportswriter. Bebe falls in love with a married woman. She knows it's wrong for her; but she can't help it. She launches herself into a series of ribald distractions under the alias of Bizarro in Love.

Bizarro turned into erotica with a twist. "It just came out as a comedy," says Stafford. "I was turned off by lesbian novels that take themselves to seriously. I wondered why there were no tongue-incheek lesbian fantasy characters, sex symbols like James Bond (without the sexism and violence). As I got into the fantasy of this lesbian superhero, the episodes just got more and more outrageous." Fantasy scenes in the novella include sexual encounters in elevators equipped with trapezes. Characters include the Memphis Queen, a motorcycle mama; mysterious Monica, a megamillionaire; a jujitsu expert; a southern university's head cheerleader; a famous athlete; a park ranger; and many others.

"What I found refreshing about this

book is that all the characters are lesbians," said Bay Area actress Anne Block in an interview with the author which was aired on the Gay Cable Network. There's no question that they prefer women." This was intentional, according to the author. "Since I began writing the book for my lesbian friends, coming out or sexual persuasion confusion was not an issue," says Stafford. "Most lesbian books and the few movies with lesbian themes have two women engaging in fabulous sex only to beat their head against the wall about their sexual persuasion the next morning. Why are there no books about lesbians who are not confused, ashamed, or unhappy about being a lesbian? For many lesbians, coming out is a dead issue." And for those for whom it isn't, says Stafford, "it may be a dead issue after they read Bizarro.

Stafford published and is distributing Bizarro with the support of several friends who are partners in Cheap Shots. When she offered the book to several lesbian publishing houses in 1984, one company offered to publish it. That company, which Stafford declines to name, held the manuscript for a year and then returned it. "They decided to go into video production instead." Stafford says. "So I decided to self-publish rather than going through the time-consuming process of seeking another publisher." She would consider selling the rights to the book at a later date, she says.

consider selling the rights to the book at a later date, she says.

Response to the book has been good, reports associate publisher Maxine Kincora. Many bookstores have ordered

copies and mail order sales are brisk. "We're getting a lot of repeat customers who read the book and want to buy it for their friends," Kincora notes. The book is sold in bookstores across the country, including A Different Light in New York and Hollywood, Oscar Wilde Bookshop in New York, A Woman's Place in Oakland and Portland, Ore., and Good Vibrations

in San Francisco.

Although self-publishing and distributing is a tremendous amount of work, Stafford, who in everyday life is a full-time editor for a national magazine, has other projects in the fire. She has completed a teleplay and is at work on the second Bizarro novel, entitled *Psychic Sex*.

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
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
