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REVISED CDC AIDS DEFINITIONS BROADENS ADULT CATEGORY, SEPARATES PEDIATRIC AIDS

The CDC's revised AIDS classifications for adults, which broadens the criteria and counts clinical symptoms that previously did not qualify for an AIDS diagnosis, have been completed, approved, and are awaiting publication in the Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR). The new pediatric classification, which now counts pediatric AIDS as a separate category, is not yet completed but is expected to be issued soon.

The new adult classifications include marginal symptoms if the person tests HIV seropositive. These symptoms include nocardiosis; dementia in the absence of brain infection with a microorganism other than HIV (it is now recognized that HIV can cause a primary dementia); and an indicator disease in the presence of another cause of immunosuppression (e.g., Hodgkins disease, immuno-sup-pressive drugs for cancer or graft rejection, or systemic corticosteroids). The CDC expects the new classification to increase the number of AIDS by 15% to 20% in one jump.

Numbers from the old and new systems can't be compared. But the CDC considers accurate tracking important, so it will keep two parallel tallies, tracking cases by both definitions. Harold Jaffe, M.D. chief, AIDS Program Epidemiology Branch, CDC, notes that one reason to continue tracking AIDS is that there will soon be a year in which there are no more AIDS cases than in the previous year. The plateau "will be at a fairly high level." But the CDC wants to identify that year accurately. Theoretically, the annual number of cases will then decline.

The new classification pediatric HIV infection differentiates between perinatal infection (under 15 months) and the presence of AIDS in older children (over 15 months) with perinatal infections (under 15 months), a diagnosis will be accepted if the virus is identified in blood or tissues, or if HIV seropositivity is indicated (through at least two abnormal immune function tests and the presence of at least one factor from category P-2 listed below), or if it meets the CDC case definition for AIDS.

Three classes of HIV illness are included for older children: (1) P-O, "indeterminate infection" (i.e., antibody positive, minor symptoms, or not clear infection), included to ensure that such children are not ignored; (2) P-1, those infected yet asymptomatic or with minor infections; and (3) P-2, those with symptomatic infections, including nonspecific finding (oral thrush, fevers), progressive neurologic diseases, lymphoid interstitial pneumonitis; secondary infectious diseases; or other HIV- related diseases.


PEACEKEEPERS NEEDED FOR THE LESBIAN AND GAY **RIGHTS RALLY**

The Phoenix Lesbian and Gay Pride Committee is announcing a desperate need for peacekeepers for the Sunday, June 14, 1987 Lesbian and Gay Rights Rally at the Wesley Bolin Memorial Plaza, 1700 W. Washington, Phoenix.

The peacekeeper's responsibilities include answering questions, acting as a security system and basically being available to help where needed. The rally will be from 5-9 pm, but most peacekeepers will need to be there from 4-10 pm.

"At other rallies, we have had about 100 peacekeepers and it worked really well. We hope to enlist the help of past peacekeepers who have experience and knowledge of non-violent actions," stated Bj Bud, Chairperson of the Committee. There are positions open for men and women. "If an affinity group wants to work together, that can be arranged. No one works alone. We work," Bud explained, "in groups of five to ten peacekeeper in what's called an affinity group."

Less than 20 peacekeepers have volunteered to date. "If everyone who has peacekeeper experience would volunteer, we would be in great shape" Bud said hopefully. There is a training scheduled for June 13 from 10 am to 2:30 at ASU. Call Bj Bud at 246-8277 from 10 am until 10 pm to volunteer to be a peacekeeper.

You're not just Hot, you're Busted!



Sargeant Taggart (John Ashton) and Detective Rosewood (Judge Reinhold) are back and it ain't a pretty picture. Taggart still complains about Foley's tactics, but he is so emasculated by his personal marital problems that he easily gives in and eventually helps save the day. Rosewood reveals his Rambo-like penchant for acquiring a large personal arsenal of weapons. The Bad Guys are symbolically represented by the statuesque presence of Brigitte Nielsen. Eddie's name is listed in the writing credits, so I suppose one shouldn't be overly surprised by the demented antics of his supporting cast. It is, after all, Eddie's gig. Enough of that. Cop II is funny but

flawed. Chances are that you are astute enough to notice most of the problems; especially if you saw the first installment. That catchy (Oh, Shit. Another jingle in my head!) instrumental piece is back. It's a good thing too, because I don't remember - or hum in my head - any of the rest of the musical embellishment.

More bothersome than sound is sight. This flick looks like it was filmed by a kid with a hand held home movie camera on a polluted day in Los Angeles. Oh well, scenes needn't be perfectly focused for a stand-up comic's routine, which is essentially what Cop I and Cop II are all about. They are mirror images of each other. Chances are you'll have a good time and not remember much detail. Odds are you will remember Eddie Murphy. Again.

If at first you succeed - do it again. You're busted.

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GAYS TARGET DUKAKIS' CAMPAIGN

Gay activists, still angry over a Massachusetts policy that makes it virtually impossible for gay men and women to become foster parents, have said they will step up protests against Gov. Dukakis druing his presidential campaign.

The Washington-based National Gay and Lesbian Task Force last week pledged a "DukeWatch" in Iowa, New Hampshire and other stops along the campaign trail.

"As the Dukakis campaign gets rolling, we want to organize around the country so everywhere he goes the local press will be reminded that he's responsible for a very discriminatory social policy," said Sue Hyde, a national organization spokeswoman.

Dukakis' relationship with the gay community has been cool as both a gubernatorial and presidential candidate. Since he announced that he would run for president, gay protesters, either singly or in small groups, have turned up in Maine, New Hampshire and Iowa. On the day he formally announced his candidacy, a banner raised on the Boston Common proclaimed "The Duke is an antigay bigot." A Dukakis supporter pulled it down.

Dukakis, who made his first West Coast campaign swing last week, did not go to San Francisco, but denied that it had anything to do with concern that he might face gay protest.

In an interview last week, Will Hutchinson, chairman of the Boston Lesbian and Gay Political Alliance, said the demonstrations will continue.

In some ways, Dukakis represents a paradox to gay voters. He has been responsive in providing state funding for AIDS support services and recently lobbied strongly on behalf of a state gay rights bill. But homosexuals charge that the foster care policy reinforces misperceptions about their ability to nurture children.

Some gay activists said that among Democratic presidential candidates Rev. Jesse Jackson comes closest to endorsing gay positions on issues. Some activists expressed reservations about the opposition of Sen. Joseph Biden of Delaware to Medicaid funding for abortions.

It is also unclear just how much political clout gays have in a presidential campaign. However, some gay activists suggested in interviews that an organized boycott of the Dukakis campaign could affect fundraising, particularly on the West Coast.

Dukakis defends the foster care policy, even though a commission he appointed recommended in a draft report that it be changed. The draft report is under review by state Secretary of Human Services Philip Johnston, who is expected to make a recommendation to Dukakis within the next few weeks. The report concluded that sexual preference — like age, income, sex and education — is an important factor in placing children in foster homes, but it should not be the "overriding determinant."

Foster care policy

Under current policy, the state asks potential foster parents their sexual preference and places foster children in a "traditional family setting" whenever possible. In addition, Massachusetts requires written approval of the commissioner of social services before children can be placed in single parent or nontraditional homes.

Rep. Gerry Studds (D-Mass.) said in an interview last week that he disagrees with the foster care policy and urged Dukakis to reverse it. Studds, who is gay, called the issue "of some consequence," but said he did not know whether it will be "the overriding issue" with gay voters.

Studds, who agreed that the foster care policy might discourage some gays from contributing to the Dukakis campaign, said: "To the extent that one does not have support that one would expect, it's a net loss. It is support that the governor ought not lose."

John Sasso, the governor's campaign manager, had only cursory comment when asked for his reaction last week to opposition in the gay community. "If people want to protest, they should protest. It's America," Sasso said.

He said he had "no idea" how a continued organized protest by the gay community would affect Dukakis' campaign. He then dismissed it as a topic he should be asked to address, because, he said "I have a lot to do."

Campaign aides and fund-raisers with Dukakis in California last week said they were unaware of any problems.

Some political observers said the issue could help Dukakis take the edge off his image as an East Coast liberal.

Whatever the political consequences, the foster care policy raises strong emotions for some gays. "Party at its worst"

For example, Eric Rofes, executive director of the Los Angeles Gay and Lesbian Community Center, wrote an opinion piece that described Dukakis as the "paradigm of the Democratic Party at its worst on gay and lesbian issues." The article ran in a half dozen gay and lesbian newspapers. He said he also contacted gay colleagues who had been approached by Dukakis' chief fundraiser, Robert Farmer, to tell them about the Dukakis policy.

Rofes said the goal of his group "is to make sure that Mike Dukakis is not the presidential candidate of the Democratic Party."

But some gay, activists said the Dukakis record is not entirely negative.

For example, Hutchinson of the Boston Lesbian and Gay Political Alliance said Dukakis played a major role in winning support for gay rights legislation that passed the House this month.

Dukakis also took care in his presidential announcement speech to pledge to fight AIDS. As governor, he increased the appropriation for AIDS education and support services to \$5.6 million after his initial amount was criticized as inadequate.

Boston City Councilor David Scondras, who is gay, said that Dukakis' recent efforts on behalf of the gay rights bill may soothe some, "but it will not be in and of itself sufficient."

"There's been a breakdown in trust over time, the evolution of a feeling that he doesn't really care about the problems and concerns of gay people," said Scondras.

Will Snyder, associate editor of San Francisco's Bay Area Reporter, the largest gay weekly newspaper in the country with a circulation of 33,000, said he just finished researching and writing a lengthy piece on Dukakis and found the governor's record "a little confusing for gay people." Snyder said Dukakis' accomplishments as a fiscal manager will be attractive to gay voters, just as they will be to voters in general. But he said gay voters will be trying to discern "what kicks inside his head" in terms of his attitude toward them.

In California this week, Joyce Jacobs, state Democratic Party finance chairman, said there is no evidence Dukakis has problems with the gay community, but that she had heard it might be a problem. "I have heard that this is his weak spot," she said. "If he has one weakness, that's probably it."

PENTAGON ISSUES SEXUAL CONDUCT LIST

The Defense Department has adopted new, specific guidelines on sexual conduct which Pentagon officals say could be used to revoke security clearances or fire civilian workers who violate them.

On the list of prohibited activities are homosexuality, transsexualism, crossdressing, sex with animals, adultery and sex orgies.

Gay rights groups and some members of Congress have criticized the guidelines as possibly leading to discrimination against people who do not pose a threat to national security. "To the extent that sodomy includes sexual relations between consenting adults, it is none of the government's business," said Democratic Reps. Don Edward of California and Patricia Schroeder of Colorado in a letter to Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger.

But according to a spokesperson, homosexuality would not automatically lead to a review of a civilian worker's security clearance.

In addition to listing prohibited practices, the directive also obliges individuals to come forward with information on their co-workers.


Several members of Oasis MCC have been donating community service, time and money to provide food for people with AIDS. This benefit will help expand Oasis' service to PWA's.



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Paz. Camarin Grae, author. Chicago: Blazon Books, 1984. 326 pages. \$8.95 paperbound.

Grae has given us three books (so far) on issues of current interest. Paz, Winged Dancer and Soul Snatcher are all stories about relationships, the spiritual or supernatural, personal integrity and community involvement. Grae appeared on the alternative literature scene without fanfare, through a little-known publisher, without a monotonously impressive list of qualifications, and at a time...now... when we need her badly. Grae is a master of grammar and style, so her writing is inherently interesting, and she knows what's important to her readers, so her subject matter is interesting. She knows how to build suspense – I was rarely able to "stop reading after this chapter." It's even more rewarding, and especially in the alternative-press field, to read a pageturner in a solidly constructed and physically attractive book. Stay alert for future releases from Blazon Books: they've established high standards for literary and physical quality.

We meet Paz as Drew McAllister; Drew seems fully recovered from her recent traffic accident, except for her feeling that something strange is happening to her mind. An apparently unrelated side effect, pleasant and vaguely puzzling, is that now people are treating her casual suggestions as imperatives. Drew's best friend Wiley is a pschologist, and with the encouragement of Wiley's professional and personal interest, Drew experiments until she's defined the extent of the change: with direct eye contact and slow speech, Drew can make anyone do anything. She can control people's minds.

The effects make sense to us once we've seen them, but Grae never lets us second-guess any of her characters. We have to get to know them and all their quirks and consistencies, as Grae develops them for us. I'm not going to tell you the plot or the resolution, but I will tell you another reason for you to read a well-written suspense story.

Some good writing reaches us through alternative presses because mainstream publishers know what most book-buyers expect, and it isn't this. The feminism in Paz is so integral to the story that readers don't notice until they're hooked on the story that it challenges and eliminates traditional notions of male and female roles. Mainstream readers may not react kindly to new principles disrupting predictable action, and they may not react kindly to female characters falling in love with each other. And they'll probably be indignant about a resolution that allows Drew/Paz to create a community of peace.

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LESBIAN AND GAY RIGHTS RALLY (JUNE 14, 1987)

As June 14 draws nearer, the plans for the Phoenix Lesbian and Gay Rights Rally are coming together. The Capital has been informed. The police and media have been notified. Many of the speakers have been finalized. The sound system is contracted for. Tshirts have been ordered. The Rally will be Sunday June 14 from 5pm to 9pm at the Wesley Bolin Memorial Plaza, 1700 W. Washington, Phoenix, Arizona.

The speakers for this year's rally are from a diverse community. A representative of the Phoenix Lesbian and Gay Interfaith Alliance will open with an inspirational message. Naomi Harward, Chairperson of the Mecham Recall Committee, will have an opportunity to relate the most recent information about the recall. Dianne Post, Senior Attorney, will speak on Lesbian/Gay Rights. Nicholas Snow, Executive Director of the Lesbian and Gay Switchboard, will introduce that important resource to the community. There will be a spokesperson from the Arizona Stop AIDS Project (ASAP). Still Waters, a singing group, will be a part of the entertainment. The emcee, at the present time, is Bj Bud, former editor/publisher of Sunday's Childe, a lesbian/gay newsmagazine. There will also be a comedian, dancing, music, and a "HANDS AROUND THE CAPITAL" event.


There will be either a live band or recorded music for dancing from 5 until 6 pm, followed by some of the speakers. Before dark, the Rally will move from the Plaza, across the street to the Capital. In a symbolic gesture, the supporters of Gay and Lesbian Rights will join hands as they encircle the Capital. We will sing and have chants. Afterwards, the rally will return to the Plaza to hear the remaining speakers. There will be dancing following the speakers.

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COMMUNITY SWITCHBOARD — 'BUILDING BRIDGES'

Nicholas Snow, formerly of the Lesbian and Gay Speakers Bureau, has recently taken over Executive Directorship of the Lesbian and Gay Community Switchboard, replacing the departing Bob Hegyi. Hegyi, who has taken a position with the County Health Department, held the reigns of the Switchboard over the last several years. Snow has instigated a reorganization and restructuring of the Switchboard, implementing a new staff of volunteers and several off-shoot projects. Among these projects is a proposed organization now known as the Community Committee.

Nicholas Snow: The concept of the Community Committee is that of representatives from all interested lesbian and gay organizations coming together once a month to share what's going on and to combine efforts where it's appropriate. I especially want to see women and feminists represented in the Committee. We're in the early stages of the organization now; we meet the first Monday of every month at Metropolitan Community Church at 7:30.

PR: The segregation of gay men and women within the Phoenix gay community has always been an issue. To what do you attribute this disjunction? **Snow:** I feel that women have had a

Snow: I feel that women have had a tougher row to hoe, given the way that our society is structured. I brought up the fact that I want to see more women's groups involved in the Community Committee because it was mentioned to me that I had inadvertently stepped on some toes by not sending invititations to some of the women's groups. In fact, I do want involvement in the Committee by women's organizations.

PR: Since having taken over as Director of the Switchboard, do you find that you've lost some possible funding that Bob Hegyi might have easily acquired, given his stand in the community?

Snow: No. Bob Hegyi is still on our Board of Directors. All of the support

that the Switchboard had when Bob was Executive Director is still here. I have some connections that Bob didn't, given that I travel in different community circles than he. If anything, there is more support than before as a result of these different contacts, energies and ideas coming into the organization.

PR: What about the volunteer staff? It seems that the Switchboard has been keeping odd hours lately. **Snow:** Our goal is to be staffed from

Snow: Our goal is to be staffed from ten a.m. until ten p.m. seven days a week. We're almost there. Volunteer support is actually up; our volunteer coordinator is a non-gay woman who has made certain that we are covered on the phones at all times. When we can't, our answering machine explains as much. Still, this is a temporary situation, as we expect to have a full staff of volunteers soon.

PR: The Switchbord has been expanding its involvement lately. I understand that you're even planning a "Lesbian and Gay TV Show?"

Snow: It's in the developing stages

right now. The plan is for the show to have a news and talk format, and to be aired monthly on Public Access television. We're involved in enlisting volunteers to take part in the actual production of the show, and plan for the show to be seen weekly by January of 1988.

We hope for the show to act as a unifying force within the community – we want to focus on different issues throughout. The show will be co-hosted by myself and Judith Curtis-Mardon, a lesbian who has been very involved with our community. We're both natives of Arizona.


PR: What about the Switchboard's involvement in the Gay Pride Event on the 14th?

Snow: The rally this year has political overtones, so we can only be involved in an educational capacity. We cannot be overtly involved in anything political, because of our non-profit tax exempt status. I hope to assist in building momentum for support of the Switchboard at the Event.

PR: The Switchboard appears to have some new, very high-profile goals for the immediate future.

Snow: We've definitely broadened our horizons. Our new statement of purpose suggests that we are now evolving into a Network Rescurce Center. I envision the Switchboard as being the heart of the community, and in many ways that is already the case.

We have a new focus on education; through use of a speaker's bureau, the television show, and ongoing media relations. In addition to orchestrating a committee within the community, we're also looking to present positive and accurate information to the public at

large.

PR: You're referring to your having been recently chosen as chairperson for the Media Committee for the Maricopa County AIDS Coalition?

Snow: Yes. I stressed the point that I was going to be working with the media as an openly gay man for the Lesbian and Gay community. There was no problem with that. We're basically a

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EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF MARCH ON WASHINGTON ADDS AIDS ACTIVIST DAVID W. ALMAND

The National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights announced the expansion of its National Executive committee to include long-time disability rights and AIDS activist David W Almand. The National March on Washington will take place on October 11, 1987. A national Steering Committee of 64 persons has begun the work of organizing the March.

"I am very pleased to be able to serve on the Executive Committee of the March on Washington," observed Almand. "As a gay man and as a person with AIDS, I feel that the March is extremely timely and urgent. So much discrimination exists, there are many battles to be fought, and I am deeply committed to the fight." Mr. Almand, an activist based in Atlanta Georgia, brings to the seven-member Executive Committee extensive organizing experience in the areas of the rights of handicapped persons and the rights of persons with AIDS.

Almand is a graduate of Mercer University and holds graduate degrees from the University of Wisconsin and the University of Minnesota in rehabilitation counseling and interpreting for the hearing impaired.

Almand worked as a rehabilitation counselor for the Department of Economic Security in Wisconsin until 1980 when he moved to the Los Angeles and San Diego areas. For over five years, Almand worked for the San Diego Schools, serving as Assistant Director for Placement for Handicapped persons. He also worked with the deaf community as a consultant on a variety of projects and worked to set

up Adult Education programs for the handicapped in the Los Angeles area.

Almand was diagnosed with AIDS in July of 1986 and has been actively involved in AIDS issues on a national and local level. He is active in AIDS Atlanta, the local AIDS service and the Georgia AIDS Action Committee. He is an ex officio board member of the National Association of People with AIDS and is presently working with several grass roots educational and outreach efforts targeting families of people with AIDS as well as people of color with AIDS.

Almand joins the following persons on the executive committee of the March: Kay Ostberg, Washington, DC, March Co-Chairperson: Steve Ault, New York, March Co-Chairperson; Pat Norman, San Francisco, March Co-Chairperson; and Nicole Murray.


group of people willing to address gay issues and AIDS issues with the press. This way, the questions asked are being answered by those most qualified to do so.
