

Miss Hollies New Career

Last summer, this Phoenix entertainer helped transform six guys into pageant-winning ladies. Now he's the Valley's most sought after makeup artist.

with a palette of powder, a can of lacquer and a back comb. "I thought: well there's a task." Anaya had plenty of experience His makeup, hair and costume design work has not been restricted to

or ten years, Hollie Woods has been well known throughout Phoenix's gay community.

She's a svelte trend setter in the bars, recognized for her stunning performances at hundreds of variety shows, drag pageants and AIDS fundraisers.

Whether recreating Cher, Madonna, Dolly or Marilyn—or giving her audiences something completely original—"Hollie" is actually the effervescent alter ego of an experienced female impersonator named David Anaya.

But it's Anaya's own name, not Hollie's, that's being recognized these days in play programs and in backstage dressing rooms all over the Valley. He's newly known in theatrical circles not as a veteran drag entertainer but for his remarkable skills With no formal training and little dramatic experience, Anaya has turned a knack for making guys look like girls into a new career in the legitimate theater. He's doing something he loves and making a decent living at it—in a field where stability is hard to come by.

And he fell into the entire enterprise nearly by accident.

"I figured the best way to learn this was the same way that I've been able to learn everything else, and that's to dive in and teach myself," he said during a recent interview at his home in east Phoenix.

It all started when the petite impersonator was asked by local producer & choreographer Lyman Goodrich to help transform six guys into girls for *Pageant*, the cross-dressing musical comedy presented by In Mixed Company last summer in downtown Phoenix. applying drag makeup to himself and to others but had never worked within the confines of professional theater. At first, he was slightly intimidated.

He read the script and decided to give *Pageant* a try. "I thought that this would be okay, that this one show would be something that I could handle. Little did I know it was going to blow up into as much as it has."

n only one year, Anaya has been credited with the hair, makeup and in some cases the costumes for a total of 25 Phoenix area productions—from period dramas to modern musicals and everything in between.

"It's been really amazing and rewarding to see David take this and just run with it," said Goodrich. "He is just very, very talented and it all seems to come naturally." cross-dressed characters. "I've worked with something like eleven different companies all together," Anaya said.

"The show that I did immediately after *Pageant* was *Fiddler on the Roof*, which required a lot of facial hair and aging makeup. The women required a lot of falls, and so I was really hired for the hair more than for the makeup."

A lot of his abilities, he said, come from reading, doing research and just paying attention. "I found out that there was a lot of research involved in set design, props, costumes and everything. There's a lot that goes into it—that was kind of news to me."

For his second job, he studied Jewish Orthodoxy and the time period in which *Fiddler* is set. He was

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
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Horowitz: Tired of Ellen

hen Ellen DeGeneres came out, I celebrated with her and for her. She provided undeniable benefits to our community and to me personally.

In this column, I lauded the fact that Ellen Morgan became the first openly gay lead character in a prime time show. The Coming Out episode showcased not only the star's sexuality, but her acting and writing talents as well.

The American public is ready for gay characters—we just can't depend on everyone to understand the nuances of our important issues until we educate them.

The Emmy-winning show gave us a truly humorous and honest portrayal of that initial coming out process. The show received its highest ratings ever. And then came the regular season.

The series continued to showcase Ellen's sexuality and offered a glimpse at situations specific to gay life not seen on television—particularly in a prime time sit-com. At some level, the gay community got our lives legitimized because we were included.

Unfortunately, the comedy's ratings steadily declined throughout the season. Those of us with opinions have argued for several months over the reasons for the decline and the ultimate cancellation of the series by ABC.

The religious right claims a victory for its own efforts to get the show booted off the air. They've engaged in an all-out war against Disney, the parent company of ABC, because Disney had the guts to treat gay people equally.

In a press release, the Southern Baptist organizers of the Disney boycott claimed that the series cancellation was due to the financial pressures their movement had inflicted on ABC and Disney. I might say they had a case if the Disney stock hadn't continued to soar on Wall Street, just last week providing its shareholders with a three-for-one stock split.

eGeneres herself claims that she is the victim of plain old discrimination. In Entertainment Weekly, she says that ABC executives "sabotaged" the show: "I was fired because I'm gay."

I've been the victim of antigay job discrimination, but I don't think Ellen was—at least not in this circumstance. I don't doubt for a moment that ABC would have gladly renewed the series if its ratings remained high. The almighty dollar runs the television world. The product's value to ABC's bottom line decreased. When an employee becomes less valuable to an employer, that employee better start looking for a new job.

I am confident that network executives were positively gleeful when the season opener of *Ellen* achieved such high ratings. They saw advertising dollars and publicity ready to roll in. Unfortunately, the gay content became an inside joke.

Take the example of openly gay stand up comics like Kate Clinton, Suzanne Westenhoffer and Jason Stuart. I've seen all their shows, and they are absolutely hysterical—as long as you get the inside jokes.

I've sat with groups of people at Gay Denny's making fun of straight people accidentally caught outside of their comfort zone late on a Saturday night. They just look around completely oblivious to what's going on. Much of Ellen's straight audience did the same thing.

Bob Iger, ABC's president said, "The character was gay every single week. It was too much for people." He doesn't get it either. Every straight character is straight every single week.

Since I came out, and even before, I'm gay every single day. When people ask, "Why do you always have to talk about being gay?" I tell them it's simply who I am. I just want to participate fully in life; the political statement isn't as important. Yet, I'm not an entertainer. Ellen the character and Ellen the actress remain different from Ellen the human being.

he American public is ready for gay characters—we just can't depend on everyone to understand the nuances of our important issues until we educate them. I will be forever grateful that Ellen took that process to a new level.

Historically, her coming out will rank up there with Martina Navratilova, Rock Hudson and Greg Louganis. I can hardly wait to see what she does next, but I am ready for her to stop complaining and get on with it.

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Coalition responds to anti-gay ad campaign with full page ad in national newspaper

The American Psychological Association calls 'Conversion Therapy' potentially harmful

WASHINGTON — A coalition of organizations answered an anti-gay newspaper ad campaign, launched by several right-wing groups, with a full page ad in the July 15 edition of USA Today.

The coalition ad highlights a Minneapolis family who loves and supports their lesbian daughter and counters the myths propagated by the Religious Right, according to HRC.

"Our ad will show that the Far Right does not have a monopoly on family values and religion. Gay people are no less religious or family-oriented than anyone else. The Right's on-going character assassination of an entire group of people is offensive to millions of gay Americans and their family members," said HRC executive director Elizabeth Birch.

The coalition's ad features Dave and Ruth Waterbury, Republican, church-going, Minneapolis parents and their lesbian daughter, Margie. In the ad, the Waterburys make an appeal to the American people to treat their daughter with dignity and respect so she can live her life free of discrimination.



The right-wing ad campaign is the latest in a series of on-going attacks directed against gay

Americans by religious political activists. In an effort to appease Focus On The Family's James Dobson, Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott kicked off a wave of anti-gay rhetoric when he recently said that homosexuality was a sin and likened gays to alcoholics and kleptomaniacs. His comments were followed by disparaging remarks about gay people by several public officials including Senator Don Nickles (R-Okla.), Rep. Dick Armey (R-TX.) and Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.).

In the first full page right-wing ad, which appeared in the July 13 edition

> appeared in USA Today. The campaign is sponsored by fifteen organizations representing political religious activists including the Family Research Council, the American Family Association and the Christian Coalition. On July 14, the American Psychological Association questioned the efficacy of so-called "conversion therapy."

"For nearly three decades, it has been known that homosexuality is not a mental illness. Medical and mental health professionals also now know that sexual orientation is not a choice and cannot be altered. Groups who try to change the sexual orientation of people through so-called `conversion therapy' are misguided and run the risk of causing a great deal of psychological harm to those they say they are trying to help," said

American Psychological Association Executive Director Dr. Raymond Fowler.

In August 1997, the American Psychological Association overwhelmingly passed a resolution, at the APA convention, that asserts that there is no

sound scientific evidence on the efficacy of "reparative therapy," which seeks to "cure" homosexuals. In 1973, the American Psychiatric Association removed homosexuality from its list of mental disorders.

The Human Rights Campaign is the largest national lesbian and gay political organization, with members throughout the country. It effectively lobbies Congress, provides campaign support, and educates the public to ensure that lesbian and gay Americans can be open, honest, and safe at home, at work, and in the community.

GLAAD calls "ex-gay" ad campaign 'deceptive and misleading'

A coalition comprised mostly of religious political extremist groups, headed by the Family Research Council (FRC), placed a full-page advertisement in the July 13 *New York Times*, promoting the supposed conversion of lesbians and gay men to become heterosexual.

Leading with the heading: "Toward hope and healing for homosexuals," the advertisement features a large photograph of a woman which is captioned, "Anne Paulk—wife, mother, former lesbian."

GLAAD Communications

Director Jennifer Einhorn said, "We are struck by the overriding egregious and misleading tone of this advertisement, which suggests that lesbians and gay men are not and cannot be people of faith. It is a shameful disservice to lesbian and gay clergy, not to mention the thousands of lesbians and gay men who are instrumental to their places of worship."


According to an FRC press release, similar advertisements were scheduled to appear the *Washington Post* and in the sports section of *USA Today* on July 15.

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Texas school board dumps Disney stock

AUSTIN, Texas (AP)

The decision by Texas education officials to dump \$46.4 million worth of Walt Disney Co. stock to protest the content of movies released through a Disney subsidiary could be just a first step.

"I'm concerned could this be a domino effect on our investments, and what impact that could have on the return of our investments for the children?" said Geraldine Miller, a Board of Education member who voted to divest.

The 8-4 vote July 10 marks the biggest attempt to punish Disney on moral grounds since Southern Baptists launched a boycott against the company last year. Disney said Texas is the first state fund to divest its stock.

"I don't intend or want to be the moral conscience of adults. Disney, however, is known as a children's entertainment entity. The films Miramax makes are directed for teenagers," board member Grace Shore said. "I think we could more prudently invest our money somewhere else."

The vote came after the American Family Association of Texas, which is involved in the Southern Baptist boycott, sent board members a videotape of excerpts from Disney-owned Miramax movies, including *Chasing Amy*, which has gay overtones, and the violent *Pulp Fiction*.

The board's 1.2 million shares represent only about 0.10 percent of all Disney shares. On Wall Street, Disney closed at \$38.12 1/2 on July 10, up \$1.12 1/2.

All those who voted to liquidate the Disney stock from the \$17.65 billion Permanent School Fund are Republicans. Those who voted against or abstained are Democrats. One Republican on the 15-member board was absent.

Opponents of the divestiture said the board currently holds \$846.7 million in stock in companies that could also raise moral objections, including firms that produce, promote or sell alcohol, gambling, adult-oriented entertainment or armaments.

According to the Texas Education Agency, the board also invests with companies that have been accused of human rights violations, pollution, unfair employment practices, illegal political contributions and animal testing.

"There are a lot of issues that people can get uptight about," said board member Will Davis, who opposed divesting. "I think that's going down a very slippery slope."

Disney said it and its subsidiaries make movies for all ages.

"The Walt Disney Company produces more family entertainment than any other company in the world, and any products marked with the Disney brand name are always suitable for all ages," said Disney spokeswoman Claudia Peters.

Miramax is ``a highly acclaimed film label that has received 110 Academy Award nominations and 30 Academy Awards over the last 10 years," she added.

Like the Baptist boycott, the decision will probably have little financial effect on Disney. The company all but suggested that the school board would be the loser, given the stock's strong performance.

While a longtime proponent of tra-

ditional family values, Disney has lately been under fire from Christian conservatives who have complained about Miramax, ABC's airing of the sitcom *Ellen* and the recent extension of Disney's health benefits to samesex partners of employees.

Rights group links religious fundamentalists to anti-gay attacks

A new People For the American Way (PFAW) report links fundamentalist political extremists to almost 40% of 170 events described in "Hostile Climate," which chronicles 1997 incidents targeting lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people.

Incidents catalogued include antigay hate speech and hate-inspired violence, job discrimination, harassment and beatings of high school students and attempts to pass antigay laws. One example of last year's hate speech cited in the report was from Frank Simon, who said, "There are hundreds of children in America who are dying of AIDS because they were sexually abused by homosexuals." • The report also shows that just four states—California, North Carolina, Massachusetts and Washington-accounted for more than 25% of the incidents.

PFAW President Carole Shields said, "The religious right has poisoned the public dialogue about lesbian and gay rights and, as a result, our public discussion of these issues is often stuck in the dark ages. The religious right is playing a destructive game of blaming the victims of anti-gay and -lesbian discrimination."

The report groups discriminatory incidents among six categories: employment, arts and entertainment, marriage and family, education, religion and general intolerance.

NY Gov. signs HIV partner notification bill into law

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP)

HIV-infected people who seek treatment with doctors will have to reveal previous sex partners and drug needle sharers so public health authorities can inform them they may have been exposed to the virus, a new state law mandates.

The controversial HIV partner notification legislation was signed into law by Gov. George Pataki July 10. Approved by the state Senate and Assembly after heated debates earlier this year, the measure will take effect in January.

While legislators and state health workers hailed the passage as a public health victory, some AIDS support and treatment groups continued to voice opposition to a law they say will deter people from getting tested for the virus that causes AIDS.

Ronald Johnson, of the Gay Men's Health Crisis, said Friday the stigma attached to the disease has not diminished despite increased awareness and education, so many may fear their name being released into the general public if they seek treatment.

Although Queens Democrat Nettie Mayersohn, sponsor of the bill in the Assembly, said public health officials will continue to protect the privacy of HIV-positive patients, Johnson said

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the law does not ensure that.

"The law was not as vigilant on this issue as we might have liked," Johnson said. "So we certainly will be looking to see how the state Department of Health handles this. At the very, very minimum, we would hope the registry of names of people who are HIV-positive will be handled with the

same privacy and confidentiality protections with which the current AIDS registry is being handled." In a last-minute

change to the notification bill in June, the Democratic-led Assembly decided to keep HIV test-

ing anonymous, but start the notification process if treatment begins.

Mayersohn said she expects the controversy surrounding the legislation to ebb as people realize that confidentiality is still being protected. She said the law gives public health officials an important new strategy they can employ to stem the growth of the AIDS epidemic.

"We've taken the disease and put it into the hands of public health workers, where it belongs ... It's a disease and we've got to start treating it like a disease," she said. "We can continue to talk about clean needles and education, but there are other public health strategies we need to

pursue and this is one of them." Pataki said the law will give


spouses and others crucial information they need to protect their health.

We've seen innovations in the care of people suffering from this disease, especially when they receive prompt and early diagnosis and treatment," he said Friday.

> The impetus for the legislation came in the wake of the HIV outbreak connected to Nushawn Williams in western New York last year. In what is believed to be the state's most widespread case of HIV infection, authorities say Williams knowingly infected, directly or indirectly, at least 17 people in Chautauqua County and New York City.

The 21-year-old drifter was the first HIV-positive person to be publicly identified by a health official in the state in order to protect the health of the community. Williams is charged with the statutory rape of a 13-year-old Chautauqua County girl, who is now HIV-positive.

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New Mexico needle exchange program gets underway

LAS CRUCES, N.M. (AP)

With the hopes of reducing the spread of infectious diseases among drug users, a needle exchange program has quietly gotten underway here.

"It's not to reduce drug use," said Maria Chaparro, an AIDS education specialist with Families & Youth Inc. "It's to reduce hepatitis and HIV."

Families & Youth Inc., a human services company, and the

state Department of Health are spearheading the program that is the first of its kind in Las Cruces. Other exchange programs started in Roswell and Albuquerque this year.

Through the Las Cruces program, drug users can trade used syringes for new syringes at the sites—a one-forone policy.

While making the exchange, users answer a short questionnaire about their drug habits. They also receive a card registering them into the program.

Lorenzo Olivas, a health program manager with the state Department of Health, said it is expected that the program will start out slow. "When word gets out, and they say the folks are pretty OK, we're going to see the people come," Olivas said.

> specialist, said the biggest step will be getting the drug users to believe that it is a true exchange program, not a trap.

``The biggest fear for them is that we're with the police," he said.

Authorities will not be harassing the people exchanging needles, said Police Chief James Bonnell, who met with the program's organizers before it began.

``I fully understand the need to support any program fighting the spread of infectious diseases. It would be foolish not to support it," Bonnell said. ``But there has been no solid evidence it has been effective." In cooperation between AIDS Project Arizona & Phoenix Body Positive

Canadian AIDS activist turned back at Idaho border

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho (AP)

Well-known Canadian AIDS activist Richard Hollingsworth has crossed into the United States many times since he became infected, but he was rebuffed at Eastport this time around.

He entered the customs office from the Canadian side July 10, carrying a billboard with ``AIDS does not discriminate but governments do." He was not refused because of his medical condition, but because he admitted to authorities to having a criminal record.

"AIDS was a nonissue with them," said Hollingsworth, after he was pointed back home by U.S. officials. He had several drug convictions in the 1970s and 1990s, he said. "They consider AIDS a communicable disease spread by airborne pathogens like tuberculosis, smallpox and the plague," he said. "AIDS is no airborne pathogen, there are specific ways of getting AIDS and you don't get it from someone sneezing."

If an infected person does not admit to having the virus or if AIDS medicine is found in a person's luggage, he can be refused entry, said Robert Walker of the U.S.

He wanted to cross the border to see a sister he has never met in Council Bluffs, Iowa. He was accompanied by his wife and two daughters and several Canadian reporters.

Hollingsworth recently made news when he used his infected blood on several pieces of artwork. He has also led many AIDS-awareness marches and is head of an AIDS foundation based in Cranbrook.

The U.S. Health Act prohibits people from entering the United States if they have a communicable disease such as AIDS. There are several exceptions such as for medical treatment, to visit close family members or to attend AIDS conferences. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The Boundary County sheriff's office had several deputies at the border and customs also beefed up security prior to Hollingsworth's arrival, Walker said.

"I am not an AIDS terrorist," Hollingsworth said. "This is a human rights issue and a social injustice and we need to get this matter resolved."

He said he will be back.

"We have started a dialog with this attempt today," he said. "This matter isn't over, and I want to be at Eastport again, God willing."

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
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Catalonia passes partners law

The parliament of Spain's Catalonia region, which includes Barcelona is, passed a bill June 30 that gives cohabiting gay and straight couples many of the rights of matrimony but withholds adoption rights for gays.

The vote was 100-12.

Spousal rights in areas such as inheritance, alimony, next of kin, apartment leases, and work leave are included. Other rights — in areas such as Social Security, taxation and immigration - are not included because they're matters of national rather than regional law.

Couples must file a notarized document attesting to the nature of their relationship to access the new rights.

"The law ... shows that Spain is evolving, modernizing, shunning machismo," said Jordi Petit, Barcelona-based secretary general of the International Lesbian and Gay Association. "But the bill is ... discriminatory in that it has excluded adoption rights to couples of the same sex.

Spain's Catholic Episcopal Conference denounced the law. Petit responded that the bishops were engaging in "unacceptable meddling.'

The other countries with laws that grant same-sex couples nearly every right of matrimony are Denmark (and Greenland), Hungary, Iceland, the Netherlands, Norway and Sweden.

Partners measure introduced in Germany

Three German states have introduced a bill in the upper house of parliament, the Bundesrat, to ban discrimination against same- sex couples.

The measure extends to gay partners nearly every privilege of matrimony—including access to adoption and the right not to testify against each other in court.

homosexuality June 30, setting the nation up for a conflict with the Council of Europe and imperiling its hopes of joining the European Union and NATO.

"It would be immoral to legalize homosexual sex," said Christian Democrat MP Emil Popescu. "Homosexual couples are sterile. They cannot breed. We want a healthy nation."

Current law states: "Same-sex relations taking place in public or resulting in a public scandal shall be punished by one to five years imprisonment. Enticing or seducing a person to practice same-sex relations as well as propaganda, association or other forms of proselytizing with the same aim shall be punished by one to five years imprisonment."

Gay activists say the wording of the law not only outlaws gay organizations but also criminalizes private relations between consenting adults if some member of the "public" manages to become "scandalized" by the relationship.

"Romania has missed again the chance to part from a repressive and archaic legislation which serves a totalitarian mentality and a policeoriented practice which have brutally and repeatedly violated human rights in Romania," commented the Bucharest gay group ACCEPT.

Lesbian will sit on Tel Aviv City Council

Baring a major change in circumstances, an open lesbian will be elected to Tel Aviv City Council in October.

Activist Michal Eden won second place on the Meretz Party list in the June 23 primary election. Since the party is expected to continue to hold four seats on the Council, her election is all but a given.

In other news, more than 1,500 people marched in Tel Aviv's first gay-pride parade June 26.

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If Helmut Kohl's center-right government loses office in September's federal elections, the measure has a good chance of becoming law, activists said.

Meanwhile, more than 200,000 people turned out for Berlin's gay and lesbian pride parade June 28, walking from the glitzy

Kurfuerstendamm shopping street to Bebelplatz Square on the east side of the city.

At the post-parade rally, gay Member of Parliament Volker Beck demanded that gays be allowed to marry.

Romania rejects legalization of homosexuality

Romania's Chamber of Deputies voted down full legalization of

Led by dykes on bikes and a rainbow flag the width of the street, they walked from Rabin Square to Independence Park.

Politicians making the trek included Labor Members of the Knesset Elie Goldschmidt, Yael Dayan and Eitan Cabel, Meretz MKs Dedi Zucker, Naomi Hazan and Anat Maor, Hadash-Balad MK Tamar Gozansky, and Tsomet MK Modi Zanberg, who is believed be the first right-wing MK to attend a gay event.

"Something good has happened to society in Israel," Zucker told local reporters.

Activist Dan Yakir of the Association of Civil Rights in Israel said, "Changes in the law regarding homosexuals are worthless if they are not accompanied by social change. But this parade clearly proves that such social change exists."

Brit consent change doesn't apply to islands

The British gay group OutRage! says Britain's recent reduction in the age of consent for gay sex to 16 will not apply to the self-governing British Crown dependencies of Jersey, Guernsey and Isle of Man and that Prime Minister Tony Blair is unwilling to pressure local parliaments on the issue.

OutRage! is also protesting "that despite the equalization of the age of consent, men of 20 or over convicted of consensual 'buggery' and 'gross indecency' with 16-and 17-year-olds in situations where more than two persons are present or where the sex takes place in parks, backrooms, toilets and other 'public' places will still be branded as pedophiles and forced to sign the Sex Offenders' Register."

More than 15,000 lesbians strutted down Toronto's Yonge Street June 27 in the city's annual Dyke March. A day later, a whopping 750,000 people watched the threehour-main parade, now in its 18th year.

Riding on an antique fire truck, Mayor Mel Lastman told reporters: "As mayor of Toronto, I should be here. As mayor of Toronto, it's my job to be here. As mayor of Toronto, it's my job to represent all the citizens of the city of Toronto.

"If they [my critics] don't like what I'm doing, that's too damn bad. I have no use for them. It's their way or no way and I don't buy that.

I'm doing this because it's the right thing to do."

In Sao Paulo, Brazil, 6,000 gays and lesbians marched down the main street of South America's largest city June 28 — three times last year's turnout. There was also a march on Atlantica Avenue in Rio de Janeiro.

In Rome, 3,000 people marched through the central city ending up at an open-air concert.

In Mexico City, thousands marched up central Reforma Avenue in the rain, creating a "carnival portrait that revindicated the richness of diversity," according to a local feminist news collective.

Finland's only gay bookstore closes

Finland's first and only gay book store, Baffin Books, closed this month due to competition from booksellers on the World Wide Web.

But, if you can't beat 'em, join 'em: Baffin will continue to sell books via its web site.

Scotland Yard launches gay group

Britain's Scotland Yard launched a gay contact group last week in hopes of increasing the reporting of anti-gay crimes.

Seven officers staff a gay-crime phone line 24 hours a day.

"We formed the group to develop a better working relationship between the police and the gay community," said spokesman Mark Williams. "Part of the gay community is not reporting homophobic offenses."

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

Madison, Wisconsin censures anti-gay ads

MADISON, Wis. (AP)

Billboards calling homosexuality a sin have attracted the state capital's formal protest in a resolution that declares "Madison to be a city of tolerance."

About 250 people gave aldermen a standing ovation July 7 after the city council unanimously approved the resolution at the urging of speakers who complained about gay-bashing.

In opposition to the five billboards scattered about town, demonstrators carried candles and picket signs outside city hall, chanting: "Two, four, six, eight, how do you know your kids are straight?"

Council member Barbara Vedder urged the billboard sponsor, Wisconsin Christian United, to

remove the advertising.

`Since these signs have gone up, there have been two gay-bashing incidents," she said. "People are scared. People are angry."

Matt Crowson of Madison, one of two speakers against the resolution, said it shows preference for gays. He complained about vandalism to the billboards.

'As a Christian, in many parts of Madison, my strongly held Christian beliefs have been unwelcome," Crowson said.

Collegians Activated to Liberate Life issued a statement after the meeting, accusing the resolution's supporters of promoting ``censorship of Christian free-speech" and inciting "homosexual listeners to hate

Christians who disagree with them." Speakers compared the billboards

to racism and political oppression. "People are being beaten up for who they are. That's exactly what

happened in Nazi Germany," Dee Michel said.

School board member Joann Elder, saying her son's Quaker marriage to

another man represented family values, accused the billboard sponsors of misquoting the Bible.

"We do not want our gay children branded sinners," she said. "They do not deserve this label."

The resolution says "gays and lesbians have been singled out by a recent billboard campaign questioning the value of contributions made by gays and lesbians to their family and to the community as a whole."

An ``attack on any of our citizens is an attack on the community as a whole," it says.

Canadian mayor says he can't be forced to proclaim gay pride week

FREDERICTON, New Brunswick (AP)

The mayor of New Brunswick's capital city has a fundamental right to refuse to proclaim Gay Pride Week, his lawyer argued July 9 at the close of an unusual human-rights hearing.

The hearing, before a tribunal of New Brunswick's Human Rights Commission, concerned allegations by gay-rights activists that Fredericton Mayor Brad Woodside discriminated against them by refusing for the past decade to issue a Gay Pride proclamation.

Woodside's lawyer, Bruce Noble, told the tribunal that the mayor has a constitutional right to say and do nothing, especially if his personal beliefs are at stake.

`It's a travesty to order somebody to make a statement they do not believe," Noble said. "Any instruction ordering the mayor to make a specific statement is an attempt to restrict his freedom of expression."

Noble said freedom of expression is guaranteed under Canada's Charter of Rights and takes precedence over the New Brunswick Human Rights Act, which forbids discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation.

Woodside has refused for almost

10 years to proclaim a Gay Pride Week, despite repeated requests from the city's gay community. He said he doesn't want to be perceived as endorsing an alternative lifestyle which he believes is disapproved of by most Fredericton citizens.

The two-day hearing ended July 9 and a ruling is expected by the end of summer on whether Woodside will be forced to make the proclamation and possibly pay a fine. Woodside, who attended the hearing but didn't testify, has said he would go to jail before he would pay a fine.

Representatives of the gay cominity said Woodside has denied

them a service he offers other groups. The mayor has proclaimed special observances ranging from Tartan Day to Anti-Pornography Week.

`He has a responsibility to represent all the citizens and not create more divisions by polarizing the community," said James Whitehead, spokesman for the Fredericton Lesbians and Gays Association.

Mayors in the Ontario cities of Hamilton and London took similar stands and ultimately lost before human rights inquiries. In both cases, the city officials had to make Gay Pride proclamations and pay fines.

New York Times Quizzes the Monkey

The July 9 issue of the *New York Times* featured a review of a new "kid-friendly" Web browser called Surf Monkey, which offers continual updates of its list of filtered sites.

Reviewer Michelle Slatalla spoke with David Smith, chief executive of Media Live, which manufactures Surf Monkey. She writes, "'The filter works with e-mail, too,' Smith said. 'Type an e-mail message with an obvious profanity and then ask the monkey to read it aloud.' Sure enough, the monkey refused to speak the four-letter word I had typed. In fact, the program changed the letters of the word on-screen as well, substituting '####,' which the monkey pronounced soberly as 'number-numbernumber-number.'"

She then tested for the software's blocked words. Slatalla writes, "As a test, I typed, 'My name is Michelle, and I am gay.' The monkey said, 'My name is Michelle and I am numbernumber-number.'" When she questioned Smith about this, Smith replied, "'Ouch. 'Gay' is not supposed to be blocked. 'Gay' is not a bad word.'"

Slatalla continues, "In fact, just the previous week I had addressed this same topic with [daughters] Zoe and Ella, who had been troubled by a third grader on the school bus who shrieked 'gay' as an insult. The last thing we needed was a painful follow-up discussion about how some adults can be as bigoted as thirdgrade bullies. Or monkeys."

Slatalla also performed a similar test using the word "breast" in the phrase "chicken breast." It was blocked.

Through her review, Slatalla exposes the dangers of Internet filtering and how it can adversely affect children. She also illustrates how all parents have the right and the responsibility to test software before using it. In addition, the article documents the sometimes arbitrary bias inherent in Internet filtering software.

Please thank Slatalla and the *Times* for such a clear example of how filtering software deny access to a significant amount of age-appropriate Web content. Also, ask Surf Monkey to make sure their "glitch" is fixed. Contact:






But he believes that his lack of previous experience or formal education in theater is actually an advantage.

No stranger to cross-dressed beauty competitions, Anaya (as Hollie Woods) has been named Miss Arizona Gay Rodeo Association, Miss International Gay Rodeo Association, First Runner-Up to Miss Las Vegas and most recently, Project LifeGuard's 1997 Queen of Safer

Sex. He started doing drag at the age of 14 in his hometown of Las Cruces in remote southern New Mexico, and on excursions to nearby El Paso, Texas. "Drag was the only way we could get into the bars when we were underage," he recalled. "But I couldn't do what I really wanted until I grew up and got out of the house." Getting out of the house, in Anaya's case, meant joining the Air Force after high school. And certainly there was no better place for a dresses-and-heels-loving private to be stationed than Nellis Air Force Base, on the edge of Las Vegas, where he lived from 1984-89. "In Vegas I met Gregory Andrews, who was doing the makeup for (legendary female impersonator) Kenny Kerr," he recalled. He worked full time at the western bar dressed in full-on cowboy gear while continuing to perform at area bars and out of state rodeos as Hollie Woods. "Charlie's gave me the opportunity to do a lot of shows, to get on the microphone and get comfortable while working on my humor and stage presence."

He next competed for and won the title of Miss International Gay Rodeo Association, 1991.

"There has never been a classier Miss IGRA than Hollie Woods, not before or since," said John King, owner of Charlie's and one of the



Gay singer-songwriter continues family tradition

"Someone called it 'modern classics'. Someone else called it 'popera'. I classify my music as entertainment. You're there; I'm the show. I'm here to serve you."

So says Rufus Wainwright, the product of two singer-songwriters. His dad is Louden Wainwright III and his mom is Kate McGarrigle of Canada's McGarrigle sisters—so it follows that he'd take up the family business. His debut album, *Rufus Wainwright* was released in May. It showcases a melding of piano-driven pop with his rich, world-weary baritone and seductive, contemporary melodies.

Out of Town

A New York Getaway: the Hamptons By Andrew Collins, HeatStroke Contributor

you're looking for a fabulous seaside break near New York City, consider the Hamptons, a posh strip of Colonial-style villages extending along the South Fork of eastern Long Island and lapped by crashing Atlantic Ocean waves.

No, the Hamptons have not, and probably will never, steal the gay tourism thunder from Fire Island. But this collection of secluded and sophisticated communities offers a refreshing change of scenery from the Pines and Cherry Grove-and it's accessible year-round.

A surprising number of gay men and lesbians encamp in these parts, feeling right at home among the several fine inns, countless businesses either owned or partially staffed by family, and one very lively gay nightclub.

Three to four hours away from Manhattan by car (buses and trains run regularly between the two), the Hamptons consist of several towns. In general, the ritziness of each community increases the farther eastand away from civilization-you travel along the main road, the Montauk Highway (Rte. 27).

he first of the bonafide seeand-be-seen villages is Southampton, beyond which you'll pass through Bridgehampton, East Hampton, Amagansett, and

Just north of these ocean communities, fronting Gardiner's Bay, is the quaint seaside hamlet of Sag Harbor, a short ferry ride away from which is blue-blooded and rather sleepy Shelter Island. These latter two communities are within striking distance of the dining

Montauk.

and nightlife of the Hamptons but offer insulation from the traffic and crowds, which thicken intensely on summer weekends.

Accommodations vary greatly here, ranging from simple motels that remain relatively affordable yearround to exclusive 250-year-old country inns where weekend rooms can run as high as \$400 nightly. Expect to save from 25 to 40 percent on your rates during the week.

On the budget side, the Cozy Cabins are a charming but rustic patch of yellow cottages in the hamlet of Wainscott, on the eastern edge of East Hampton. In summer, this place caters heavily to gays and lesbians; the region's gay entertainment complex, the Swamp, is a quick but agility-demanding skip across the busy highway.

At the other end of the spectrum, two centrally located upscale East Hampton inns have

long welcomed a mix of gays and straights. The Victorian-era Centennial House is filled with museumquality antiques and gilt-frame mirrors and paintings; a candlelight breakfast is presented daily.

Less formal and extremely popular with same-sex couples is 132 North Main, comprising a central house with seven rooms and a few poolside cottages. It's set

on 2 wooded acres and anchored by an

olympic-size swimming pool, which is clothing optional.

An especially stylish option is the



> Bridgehampton Motel, which from the outside appears to be a neat but simple '50s-style motor lodge.

However, Alexis Stewart (daughter of homemaking doyenne Martha) opened this place a few years back, refitting the rooms with a minimalist, chic sensibility that's right out of a SoHo designer shop-this accounts for the motel's appeal among bivouacking urban hipsters.

You'll see a significant gay presence at two area beaches: In East Hampton, go to the left side of beach at the end of Two Mile Hollow Road; in Southampton try the western reaches of Fowle Beach.

must-see cultural attraction, if you have an appreciation of the region's considerable art lure, is the Pollack- Krasner House and Studio, which contains prints and

Shoppers should plan to spend plenty of time in Southampton, which has the fanciest and most developed of the region's downtown commercial districts.

East Hampton is slightly quieter but still has plenty to

offer, especially along Main and Newtown streets. If you're in need of a good book, be sure to check out

Book Hampton, which has an excellent gay and lesbian section. And don't leave East Hampton without tempting your tastebuds at Barefoot Contessa, a remarkable gourmet market that will impress even the most seasoned foodies.

Dining is at its best in East Hampton, as well as in Bridgehampton. In the latter, you can hang at one of Truman Capote's favorite haunts, Bobby Van's, which serves Caribbean-influenced New American dishes. Or sample such ethereal French cooking as soft-shell crabs with leeks, tomatoes, and capers at nearby 95 School Street.

East Hampton is notable for Nick & Toni's, a virtual commissary of the stars renowned for stellar New American cuisine and hard-to- come-

by reservations.

For substantial but more moderately priced Cajun, Southwestern, and Southern fare, consider Turtle Crossing.

Just east, Amagansett has a fine mid-priced option called Estia, a diner-cum-bistro serving light inventive fare by day and fresh pastas and grills by night.


Finish off any evening at the aforementioned Swamp Nightclub,

which, despite a name that suggests a rather miserable experience, is actually one of the most inviting gay and lesbian beach clubs on the eastern seaboard.

It consists of a restored barnlike structure that houses a comfy cocktail bar and an upscale Continental-American restaurant, the Annex. Next door, a second building contains a large mirrored disco. And in between is a tree-shaded patio where sexy souls pose all night long in their best summer threads-it's the place to cool off when dance floor steams up.
