RuPaul talks about God, politics & the new TV movie he's been filming in the Valley—as a boy.

i. My name is RuPaul. Cowboy supermodel of the world!"

It's a sunny Sunday morning in February. Swathed in denim, the Stetsontopped actor-cum-diva commandeers a microphone and steps behind a movieprop podium to thank the 400 volunteer extras assembled on the Arizona Capitol plaza.

"Everybody say love," he urges in his trademark style, and everybody does. The man who wove the phrase "you better work," into '90s pop vernacular proves that—in or out of a wig and heels—he damned well knows how to work a crowd.

The wildly cheering non actors, most representing a variety of Phoenix-area gay and lesbian groups, have been invited onto the set to fill in the background of a climactic Pride Rally scene for the gaythemed TV movie, *Jane's Coming Out Party*.

He's just back from the Sundance Film Festival, where two new movies in which he has roles were screened. He did the male-drag thing as Mike in But I'm a Cheerleader, a satirical look at ex-gays starring Natasha Lyonne. He also narrated the indie documentary, The Eyes of Tammy Faye, one of this year's festival highlights. He has

The Lifetime Original movie explores a lesbian teenager's coming-out process. It is being filmed entirely in Phoenix this month to air sometime in August. Stockard Channing stars as the girl's mother, with James Naughton as dad and newcomer Ellen Muth as Jane.

RuPaul costars as Jimmy, a gay friend of the family who helps guide Channing's character through her crisis of conscience.

Playing Jimmy gives the entertainer another opportunity to act in his goatee and blue jeans, revealing more of what he labels his "male drag" side. It's a role created specifically for RuPaul by the movie's writer and director, Lee Rose, with whom he's worked in other TV films.

He is best known as the towering goddess with the hit singles, but there are many other facets to the still-unfolding career of RuPaul Andre Charles. To that end—and heeding his own advice—he has been working. A lot. On the musical front, he recently went into the studio to record a duet with Hip Hop artist L'il Kim. He's also putting together a new club act and will start touring this summer. He says he'd love to play Phoenix again if he can find the right venue to host his act.

s chronicled in his 1995 autobiography, *Lettin' It All Hang Out*, RuPaul was raised in San Diego in the '60s with three sisters. His Dad moved out when RuRu, as he was called, was seven. His mom was subject to manic mood swings and often doped up on shrink-prescribed Librium.

Freckled and effeminate, little Ru coped with poverty and an innate sense of being an outsider by smoking pot and by dreaming of stardom while mooning over the likes of Diana Ross on TV. In his late teens, he relocated to Atlanta with an older sister. There he helped sell used cars, attended a performing arts high school, and later foisted himself upon a own variety show on Public Access.

From Atlanta, RuPaul moved to New York. He fast became a hard-core partyboy and a fixture on the city's club scene. He worked as a radio deejay and a gogobox dancer in the '80s, while honing his performance skills and fashion flair. He experimented with a number of alternative looks before settling upon the fabulous blonde RuPaul Supermodel persona we know today.

It's an alter-ego for which he's recognized worldwide, mainly on the strength of the best-selling dance single *Supermodel: You Better Work (Bitch)*. His diva image has been bolstered further by his follow-up hits, including a duet with Elton John; several drag film roles and TV appearances; and a balls-to-the-wall talk show he hosted for three seasons on VH-1.


A few days prior to filming the rally at the Capitol, a more laid-back Ru settled down to chat with *HeatStroke* on a more subdued *Jane's Coming Out Party* location. This time, a backyard barbecue scene was Encanto district. The house and grounds have been temporarily overtaken by Rose and her L.A.-based crew.

Himself a recent transplant to L.A., RuPaul has had a long and warm association with Rose. He is thrilled to be included in a project that was written by an out lesbian and that carries a gay-positive message.

His days of alcohol and chemical overindulgence a thing of the past, RuPaul chain smoked and stretched out on the dense lawn between takes. Not as tall in person as one might imagine and far better looking as a man than his publicity pictures often project, the superentertainer talked about the movie, gay politics, and his future career plans—or the lack thereof.

HeatStroke: What particularly appealed to you about the script for Jane's Coming Out Party?

RuPaul: Oh, Gee. I mean, it's like every kid out there needs to see this movie. And I was honored just to be asked to do it. It's a *See "RuPaul," page 16*



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

On Presidents' Day, the C-SPAN cable network released a ranking of U.S. Presidents by 58 presidential historians.

The historians rated presidential performance based on a ten-point scale in ten categories. The categories included crisis leadership, economic management, public persuasion, international relations, administrative skills, relations with Congress, moral authority, vision/agenda setting, pursuit of equal justice for all and performance within the context of each president's times.

Abraham Lincoln, Franklin Roosevelt and George Washington topped the list. Franklin Pierce, Andrew Johnson and James Buchanan brought up the rear.

Of the modern presidents, John Kennedy ranked eighth, Lyndon Johnson tenth, Ronald Reagan eleventh, George Bush twentieth, Bill Clinton twenty-first, Jimmy Carter twenty-second, Gerald Ford twenty-third, and Richard Nixon twenty-fifth.

The modern presidents—with the exception of Clinton—all ranked higher than in previous academic surveys. Richard Nixon moved from his place at the bottom of many previous lists to well into the middle range on this one.

Clinton's legacy will also improve with time. History will show that he did far more good for this country than his detractors will give him credit for. Time will also diminish the significance of his extra-marital activities.

How sad that Reagan and Bush far outdistance Clinton's scores in the category of moral authority, where Clinton ranks at the bottom of the list.

The morality of idly watching legions of Americans die from AIDS with no national leadership response remains questionable at best. Under Reagan/Bush, racial tension and hate crimes couldn't find their way into the conservative political agenda. Addressing issues like poverty, health care and education didn't rank high among Reagan/Bush priorities.

It's clear that the historians who were polled equate moral authority with religious teaching even though, by the grace of God, the framers of our constitution chose to grant us freedom of and from religion.

Abraham Lincoln ranks deservedly high because he embraced rights and liberties for all Americans—or for more Americans than any president had previously dared.

Thankfully, Bill Clinton will not be helping the United States to emerge from civil war or an economic depression. Our lives have been relatively safe and prosperous during his administration. However, the era over which Clinton presides will ultimately become the human-rights equivalent of the civil war and the civil rights movement of the 1960s.

I suspect that in addition to the moral authority category, Clinton scored low in the areas of relations with Congress, international relations and crisis leadership.

I, for one, can't tell you how grateful I am that Clinton did not get along with a Congress led and often dominated by right-wing religious zealots who are out to impose their version of morality on

the rest of us. Fortunately, the number of crises during his administration remains low. Perhaps this is because he has presided over the largest and longest domestic economic recovery our nation has known. His personal-life imperfections are really all his enemies have to point to when disparaging his name.

More importantly, however, Clinton's legacy will live on and will improve as our nation embraces equal rights for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered people.

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

Deb Price Finding ways to minimize disruption Pray for gay-friendly progress in our churches

Like a rare alignment of planets, three influential Protestant denominations that haven't met in the same year since 1988 will hold their conventions within weeks of one another this spring and summer.

The United Methodist Church, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the Episcopal Church will be watching each other as they wrestle with persistent, growing demands to fully integrate openly gay individuals and couples into the life and work of the church. Although the clergy and lay people pushing their denominations forward aren't forecasting huge breakthroughs this year, they have faith that profound change is just over the horizon.

"Ultimately, the church is going to have to move to be faithful to itself," predicts Presbyterian

elder Mitzi Henderson, co-moderator of More Light Presbyterians, a network of gay-friendly congregations.

By any measure, the Episcopal Church is far ahead of the Methodists and Presbyterians in exorcising anti-gay prejudice from its policies and practices. The question for Episcopal bishops

and deputies is whether they will show leadership again this year by, for example, standardizing gay holy union ceremonies.

The Methodist general conference, meanwhile, will be a test of whether a full-scale civil war will break out over punishment of gay-friendly ministers. In the middle, Presbyterians must decide whether to keep stalling or squarely face the gay issues confronting them.

Here's a primer on what's ahead: • Methodists: Set to meet May 2-12 in Cleveland, the nation's second-largest Protestant group calls homosexuality incompatible with Christian teaching and bars gay ministers. Four years ago, at its last conference, the 8.4 millionmember denomination forbade ministers to conduct holy unions. Last year, it defrocked one minister and suspended another for violating that ban. Another 92 ministers blessed a California lesbian couple last year.

The gay-friendly Reconciling Congregation Program, which includes 14,500 Methodists, is feverishly attempting to educate conference delegates about the human costs of anti-gay rules. The Cleveland conference center is to be encircled by 2,000 Reconciling Methodists bearing witness to "God's



inclusive love."

Looking beyond 2000, Reconciling director Marilyn Alexander says, "We are so close to being able to get the church changed." She hopes the holy union ban will be relaxed this year.

• Presbyterians: When delegates of the 2.6 million-member group gather June 24 to July 1 in Long Beach, Calif., they will wade into a hot controversy some have tried to ignore. Quite a few churches are in open rebellion against a 1997 rule requiring fidelity in marriage and chastity in singleness—a rule taken to ban sexually active gay people from the ministry and church offices. One proposal would repeal that rule. Another would ban holy unions. And a "take-ahike" initiative encourages progressives

"There's a lot of discussion over whether the denomination will split. And, basically, the gay and lesbian folks and their supporters are saying, 'We're not leaving,'" says Henderson, who has a gay son.


• Episcopalians: At its last convention, in 1997, the 2.4 million-member group, which has openly gay priests and allows holy union services, apologized for its historic mistreatment of gay people. It also authorized partner benefits for gay clergy and other church employees. A hot topic at the July 5-14 convention in Denver may be the call by Vermont Bishop Mary Adelia McLeod for the church to support legalizing same-sex marriage.

Louie Crew, who founded gay-friendly Integrity in 1974, credits Episcopal advances to the fact that for decades bishops have been "learning to live with the gay and lesbian people in their midst. And we've had gay priests coming out all over the place."

The religious conventions' agendas are just beginning to take shape, but it's never too early to pray for progress.

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Gay group lobbies Arizona Legislature

More than 80 lesbians and gay men gathered at the Arizona state capitol on Wednesday, Feb. 16, to lobby for the repeal of three archaic sex laws.

The event, sponsored by the Equality Begins At Home coalition of gay community and political organizations, also presented the legislature with more than 2000 signed petitions demanding the abolition of the criminal statutes. the event was to convince the legislature to pass the pending repeal bill, a second goal was to energize the gay community to engage in direct, hands-on participation in the political process.

The day's events began about 9:00 a.m. in the plaza area between the State Senate and the State House of Representatives.

After an orientation by Kobeta, those gathered split into legislative district groups based on the residency of each avoid a reduction in social security benefits, but nobody believed they ought to be considered criminals.

Not all legislators were eager to meet with their gay constituents. One gay man had made an appointment with Rep. Linda Gray, Republican, Northwest Phoenix. When he attempted to attend that meeting he was advised by Gray's aide that she refused to see him based on the substance of the topic he planned to houses of the legislature, he doubted the bill would become law. Representative Andy Nichols, Democrat, Tucson, indicated that the conservative Republican legislative leadership would likely prevent either the full House or Senate from voting on the bill, thus defeating the repeal effort.

The three statutes criminalize private sexual relationships between consenting adults. The misdemeanors specifically prohibit "lewd and lascivious acts," "open and notorious cohabitation or adultery," and the "infamous crime against nature," sodomy.

Amy Kobeta, co-chair of the lobby day event, stated that although nobody is prosecuted for violating these laws, the statutes are often cited as justification for anti-gay discrimination in areas such as employment, housing, and adoption.

Kobeta and co-chair Travis Hussey said that while the immediate objective of participant. Each group then attempted to meet with its state senator and representatives to urge them to vote for the pending repeal legislation.

The half-dozen residents of District 28, North Scottsdale, had a short but productive meeting with Republican Rep. Carolyn Allen in her office.

Allen indicated her enthusiastic support for the bill and expressed some delight that conservative Republican State Senator Ed Cirillo of Sun City was one of the primary sponsors of the bill. She speculated that some of his senior citizen constituents were cohabitating so as to discuss.

Throughout the morning about a dozen state senators and representatives were directly lobbied by the constituent groups.

At about 10:15 most of the EBAH participants gathered on the visitors balcony overlooking the House of Representatives. At that time they were briefly addressed by the two openly gay members of the legislature, Rep. Steve May, Republican, East Phoenix-Scottsdale, and Rep. Ken Cheuvront, Democrat, Central Phoenix.

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re continues its struggle with domestic partnership bill Vermont leg SPI

MONTPELIER, Vt. (AP)-And now comes the vote counting in earnest.

As the House Judiciary Committee wraps up its work on a domestic partnership bill for gay and lesbian couples, leaders began trying to figure out how lawmakers would decide the issue.

And the members of the committee, who expect to vote out a bill as early as Feb. 23, began making the rounds pitching the bill, answering questions and trying to garner support for a bill that has a fragile coalition behind it at best.

Vote counting is complicated because some people say they'll vote for the bill if it's broadened to include opposite-sex couples while others say that would be enough for them to vote against it. Others say their support would depend on whether the bill also included a definition of traditional marriage as a union between one man and one woman.

Besides those questions, one of the chief complaints advocates of the bill must confront is why they're seeking to move the bill this week so it can go before the full House next week. They say it's because the Senate will need as much as six weeks to work on the legislation, as the House has had.

But committee Vice Chairman William Lippert, D-Hinesburg, said there were other reasons to continue moving ahead.

`There are individuals and groups motivated by the fact they object to who gay and lesbian people are, that they carry and hold prejudice," Lippert, the Legislature's only openly gay member, told the Democratic caucus. "Some people and some individuals will not be swayed by any careful, deliberate work on our part or any work, whether it takes two weeks or four weeks, two years or five years."

Committee Chairman Thomas Little, R-Shelburne, in a tense exchange in the House Republican caucus, took a some-

what different tack. He conceded in response to a question that the issue was before the Legislature because of the Supreme Court's ruling that gays and lesbians were being unconstitutionally denied the rights and benefits of marriage.

I also happen to think it's a good move for the state of Vermont in general," Little said.

Although the issue has not broken down along partisan lines, Little faced the toughest questions during his presentation before the GOP caucus. Several people wanted to know why the House leadership was pushing for a vote before Town Meeting Day, when many communities have questions on their agendas.

Shouldn't there be a referendum of

some sort to find out what the people of Vermont want?" asked Rep. Henry Gray, R-Barre. "Most people believe (gays and lesbians) have the same rights. They have the right to marry the same as we do. They can marry someone of the opposite sex.'

Little said he did not believe a public referendum by the majority on an issue of minority rights would be appropriate.

"The same was said for 10 or 15 generations of black Americans," he said, referring to the prohibition against interracial marriage that lasted up to about 50 years ago.

There also were questions about why the committee wasn't simply calling the bill marriage. The domestic partnership scheme has been devised as a parallel to existing civil marriage.

'To me it sounds like homosexual marriage and that's what I'm concerned about," said Rep. Nancy Sheltra, R-Derby.

Although the committee strongly believes that it is not pursuing gay marriage, it has been struggling with what to call its system. It's typically been called domestic partnership, but panel members believe that does not adequately describe what the bill would do. It tried out ``civil domestic union" on Feb. 21 and shortened it to "civil union" on Feb. 22.

The nomenclature and terminology is very important to people," Little said. "We're trying to come up with something reasonably descriptive that doesn't ring any bells that people don't want to ring. And people are hearing a lot of bells."

arriage to Senate Colorado House sends ban on

DENVER (AP)—A marriage between one man and one woman would be the only union recognized as legally valid by the state under a bill approved by House lawmakers.

The House, which approved the measure on a 36-29 vote, sent it to the Senate, where it probably would pass, according to Sen. Mark Hillman, R-Burlington. Senators approved a similar proposal earlier this month.

Gov. Bill Owens has said he would sign the bill if approved by the Legislature.

In its original version, House Bill 1249 would have authorized courts to enforce noneconomic provisions of prenuptial contracts.

Sponsoring Rep. Mark Paschall, R-Arvada, succeeded Feb. 21 in stripping all language from the bill and substituting it with provisions to ban same-sex marriages and to ensure the state would not recognize same-sex marriages performed

outside its borders.

As it did the previous day, the House on Feb. 22 rejected a motion to send the bill to the House Judiciary Committee for a public hearing. Moderate Republicans on that committee last year joined Democrats in killing a similar bill.

Committee members argued that they should be allowed to give the bill a public hearing, but Paschall and other supporters said the concept has had extensive public input.

This is an obvious, transparent attempt to kill the bill," said House Majority Leader Doug Dean, R-Colorado Springs.

He and other supporters said the measure is necessary to avoid forcing Colorado to officially recognize same-sex marriages performed elsewhere.

Supporters said a recent ruling by the Vermont Supreme Court called for legislative action on same-sex marriages, and that action could mean official recognition of such unions.

But Rep. Dan Grossman, D-Denver, and other opponents said the Vermont Legislature appears to be moving toward recognition of "domestic partnerships" rather than same-sex marriages.

The final vote came after opponents argued it was a simple attack on homosexuals.

`The bill is nothing more than something based on fear and I think it is an irrational fear," Grossman said. "What horrible thing would happen to us? It's gratuitous and mean-spirited."

Supporters denied that.

``It's based on the accumulated wisdom and experience of cultures for 7,000 years," said Rep. Shawn Mitchell, R-Broomfield. "We always have recognized as self-evident that marriage is a joining of opposite members of the human species.'

Paschall said he offered the measure as a reinforcement of "good public policy."





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Tucson PFLAG rescues gay Siberian youth detained in U.S. seeking asylum in Canada

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—A gay Siberian youth who entered the United States illegally in an attempt to seek asylum in Canada is getting his chance, thanks to help from new friends.

Denis Dementiev, whose parents sold a car to finance his flight, hoped to join his sister, an applicant for refugee status in Canada who had resettled there last year.

When Dementiev, who turned 20 on Feb. 16, failed to qualify for a Canadian visa, he entered the United States from Mexico in December in hope of making it across the country to Canada.

Instead, he was

caught and was held in a Florence detention center pending a deportation hearing set for next month at which he could have been sent back to Siberia.

During the past week, gay and Jewish groups in Tucson rallied to his defense and raised enough money to pay Dementiev's \$1,500 bond and get him to the Canadian border, where he may legally apply for asylum. The bond will be returned when Dementiev arrives in Canada

Chris Nugent, director of the Florence Immigrant and Refugee Rights Project, a non-profit legal group that represented Dementiev, said immigrants increasingly are trying to cross the United States to reach Canada's more liberal refugee laws

The issue of bond for asylum seekers is very, very hard, because those are refugees usually fleeing with the clothes on their back," Nugent said.

Nugent publicized Dementiev's plight. The Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays in Tucson responded, holding a fund-raiser for the Russian immigrant. More money was raised Sunday at a march protesting an assault on a gay University of Arizona student. Jewish groups also were approached for

Dementiev was released Feb. 18. He was to fly from Tucson to Buffalo, N.Y., where he would be escorted to the Canadian border to apply for asylum.

In his U.S. asylum application, Dementiev said that ``about 20 different students at the school would beat me, usually in gangs of four or five, almost every day for a period of about three months."

In November, Dementiev flew from Amsterdam, the Netherlands, to Mexico City, then on to Tijuana, Baja California, Mexico. In Tijuana, he walked to the border and two men mugged him, stealing all his possessions. He subsequently was caught as he tried to jump a border fence at Tijuana.

LOS ANGELES (AP)-State Assembly candidate Cesar Portillo revealed that he pleaded no contest to a charge of misdemeanor lewd conduct in 1991 but said he was innocent and alleged the arrest was the result of a proposition by an undercover officer.

Portillo, a gay activist who is director of governmental affairs at the AIDS Healthcare Foundation, said Sunday he chose to disclose the arrest because he `wanted to make sure people heard from me first rather than misinformation and smear."

"Nine years ago, I was approached by an undercover police officer who propositioned me and then arrested me. I was not guilty. I was in my 20s and I did not have the money to fight this in

uis**ia**na students suspended ter anti-qay club protest

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)-Thirtysix McKinley High School students were suspended for three days Feb. 22 because they disrupted the school day with a protest against a proposed club encouraging tolerance of homosexuals.

The protests occurred Feb. 18. The students gathered before school and at lunch time carrying signs in opposition to the efforts to start the club at McKinley. But according to school board officials, many of the protestors failed to return to class on time or didn't go at all. They were suspended for disrupting school.

The suspended students were assigned to spend the three-day suspension at the parish's discipline center

where they can make up missed classwork and avoid the suspension from showing up on their record.

The suspended students can return to McKinley on Feb. 28.

The suspensions came a day after a group of local ministers met with McKinley principal Almenia Freeman Warren and urged her not to approve formation of the proposed "Gay-Straight Alliance" club.

The club's application for a charter at McKinley is pending, but Warren has said that a chapter of the Gay Straight Alliance can open at the school if it follows the law and new school system rules for extracurricular clubs.



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CITY CHOOSES GAY CARNIVAL ROYALTY

The East German city of Wittenberg, pop. 55,000, chose a gay-male couple as its Carnival royalty this year.

The city is famous as the place where Martin Luther launched the Protestant Reformation by nailing his 95 Theses to the Catholic cathedral door.

The couple, Michael I and Thomas I (Michael Fonfara and Thomas Walter) have lived together in the city for several years operating a company called Image Design.

According to national television reports, which have shown the couple kissing and strolling through Wittenberg's cobble-stone streets in their elaborate Karneval costumes, no one has objected to this year's king and queen being two kings.

In fact, Mayor Eckhard Naumann bragged to reporters that even sophisticated Cologne—Germany's Karneval capital—has yet to crown a gay couple.

ISRAEL ACCEPTS FOREIGN PARTNERS

Israel this month granted permanent residency to the foreign lovers of two gay citizens.

"We agreed to their requests and they will now be considered as permanent residents," said Interior Ministry spokeswoman Tova Ellinson.

The foreign partners will have all privileges of Israeli citizenship except the right to vote and have an Israeli passport. The process of obtaining full citizenship for a foreign spouse takes about five years.

The cases were championed by Member of the Knesset Yossi Paritzky who told the local Ha'aretz newspaper: "I advised the first couple who turned to me to get married because marriage is status. If the marriage was recognized in one country, another country cannot refuse to recognize it,

and the Ministry of the Interior is then obligated to register their marriage. In the case of [Israeli citizen] Shuki [Yatir] and [Belgian] Paul [Vanwinsberga], I suggested they go a step beyond. The country recognizes the status of common law spouse, even of the same sex, and thus there's no reason not to demand in the name of this status citizenship as well. I think that an important step for human rights has been taken."

MALAYSIAN PRIME MINISTER DISPAR-AGES GAYS

In his monthly newspaper column published in Tokyo's *Mainichi Daily News*, Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad said he tolerates foreign cultures up to a point but not if they accept homosexuality.

In the Feb. 15 edition of "Dr. Mahathir's World Analysis" column, the premier wrote: "I had lunch with [French President Jacques Chirac] for about two hours. For Malaysians, we respect French culture and have no objection to them drinking wine or liquor during meals with us. ... They respect us by not serving pork but we respect that in their culture they have wine with their meals. We don't go around saying, 'Your way is wrong. Our way is right!'

"But there is a limit," Mahathir said. "For example, in Western culture they accept homosexuality, including promoting homosexual practices among school children. We cannot accept this. We admit that some people are born with their sexuality mixed up. That is not their fault. But to promote homosexual practices actively as is being done in some European countries is to purposely promote abnormality."

GAY INDIANS UPSET PARENTS

Gays are coming out of the shadows in India, the Kyodo News Service reported Feb. 5.

Authorities are registering one new gay activist group about every six months and the eight-year-old New Delhi gay film festival was opened to the public for the first time this year.

"An increasing number of middleclass Indian gays are 'coming out of the closet,' much to the disapproval and consternation of their families," Kyodo said.

The agency credited the growth of gay life, in part, to satellite television and the Internet.

CANADIAN DOCTORS FACE HOMOPHOBIA

The Canadian Medical Association (CMA) is urging medical schools to develop anti-homophobia programs in the wake of a McMaster University/CMA study which found gay physicians-intraining are afraid to come out of the closet.

The researchers also urged schools to hire faculty to be role models for gay students and to set up gay support groups.

The study appears in the current Canadian Medical Association Journal.

GROUP CAMPAIGNS FOR CRUISING SEX

In a submission to Britain's Home Office, the highly visible gay activist group OutRage! has called for legalization of gay sex in cruising locations and for reform of other anti-sex laws, British newspapers reported last week.

"We do not believe that consensual actions between adults, no matter how bizarre they might appear to the majority, are any concern of the law, or its agents," the group wrote. "Thus we seek to legitimise consenting actions in bath-houses and saunas, 'backrooms' in pubs, and all group sex in private, including sadomasochistic games."

OutRage! continued: "We would also like to extend the concept of private to include public lavatory cubicles and afterdark 'cruising' areas. ... Since recreational sex is a natural activity and popular pursuit, all laws which seek to control it should be abolished. ... The whole basis of the current homosexual control laws is moralistic and based on a largely medieval concept of Christianity which we believe has no place in a pluralistic democratic society. Terms such as immoral, indecent, unnatural, sodomy and buggery have no place in a modern legal code."

The Home Office is in the midst of a review of sex-related laws.

FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION TARGETS HOMOPHOBIA

Britain's Football Association and the gay lobbying group Stonewall are working together to reduce homophobia in the sport, the *London Times* reported Feb. 14.

Among the first steps will be placing anti-homophobia ads in game-day programs and putting questions about homosexuality in the association's annual survey of supporters.

"The issue of homophobia is not being properly addressed," said Football Association Executive Director David Davies.

PRISONERS TO GET SEX-CHANGE OPERATIONS

Corrections Canada will let some transgender prisoners undergo sexchange operations, Canadian Press reported Feb. 17.

The new policy will settle a humanrights complaint filed by a transsexual murderer.

CP said there are 14 transsexual inmates in Canadian institutions at present.

The operation costs about \$30,000 (US\$20,000).

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
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


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Gore looking to bury Bradley, collects endorsement from gay lobbying group

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—For Al Gore, it's not enough to be far ahead of Bill Bradley in the polls. The vice president, piling up endorsements from abortionrights, gay-rights and labor groups, is bent on not just beating his rival but burying him.

`All I'm concentrating on is pouring the gas on ... and making sure that I drive the message home," Gore said Thursday.

Talking tough, he has called Bradley a ``special agent" for the Republicans and charged him with one of the worst sins a Democrat could commit: trying to ``starve Medicare."

Bradley was sounding philosophical Feb. 17, addressing high school and college athletes in Providence, R.I.: "When you encounter those moments in life that are tough, those moments are not like a hammer hitting a clay pot, shattering it, but like a hammer hitting metal, tempering it and making it stronger."

But he knows he needs real victories, and soon.

"I clearly have to win a number of states on March 7 and 14, no question about that," Bradley said.

He told reporters in Boston that Gore could expect a two-week ``bump" in support from the vice president's Feb. 1 victory in New Hampshire, and ``now we're in the third week."

Bradley is concentrating on the Northeast, where he is strongest, and on California, where he is 40 percent behind in public opinion polls. His forays to Washington state, which holds a primary on Feb. 29 but does not elect delegates until March 7, suggest he's bidding for an invigorating, symbolic victory there.

Acknowledging Gore's lead, Bradley said, ``I don't think it's impossible to overcome when the public focuses again." To try and command that focus, campaign strategist Anita Dunn promised sharper ads raising questions about Gore's record—on abortion and gun control, for example.

But, in the abortion ad he began airing Feb. 17 in Michigan, Ohio, Maryland and Washington, Bradley mentions only his own consistently pro-abortion-rights record.

Meanwhile, Gore, top-heavy with Democratic Party support but anxious for insulation, has wrangled endorsements from the National Abortion and Reproductive Rights Action League and the gay-rights Human Rights Campaign—two groups that had planned to remain neutral in the Democratic primary.

"I'm campaigning as if I'm one vote

behind," Gore said. Asked this week how often he would be back campaigning in New York, Gore cracked that the better question was: "How often am I going to leave?"

New York, where Bradley was a pro basketball star with the Knicks, was a neck-and-neck race one month ago. The latest poll, on Feb. 10, put Gore ahead 56-32.

"It's hard to make a souffle rise twice," Democratic consultant Bill Carrick observed. And getting Democrats to take a second look will be tough for Bradley.

Nick Record, a 21-year-old University of Rochester student leaning toward Gore, told a reporter this week all he knows about Bradley: ``He used to play for the Knicks and he's not so much for education."

"Don't know anything about him. Never have," said New Orleans electrical worker Eddie Cordes.

Aside from personal feelings—confidants on both sides make clear that Gore thinks Bradley arrogant; to Bradley, Gore is a liar who "made my blood boil' practical considerations drive Gore.

Having used up millions of dollars early last year on a campaign that even he now regards as a waste, Gore cannot afford a war of attrition.

Bradley can: He has \$2 million more in the bank than Gore and has already made some \$3 million in commitments to California TV ad time that Gore won't match.

Recognizing that most Americans still see Gore as President Clinton's No. 2, the vice president's advisers say blowout victories on March 7 and again on March 14 would show him as a winner in his own right.

"A national fight is good for Al Gore. It increases his credentials with the American people and shows him as a fighter. That's the image that's important," said campaign chairman Tony Coelho, hastening to add, "It's the reality, too, of course."


Democratic consultant David Doak warned there is such a thing as overkill.

Doak was in the San Jose convention center, when Gore railed against Bradley as a Republican agent, not a ``real Democrat."


"The only effect that speech would have is to cause Bradley to pick up the phone to his media person and say, 'Take off the Michael Jordan endorsement spot and put up the Buddhist temple ad,'" Doak said.

"The last thing he needs is to give Bradley, with his \$20 million, an excuse to go negative in TV ads."



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Profile: the Metropolitan Community Church flourishes in the South

ASHEVILLE (AP)—They come from all kinds of Christian backgrounds, evangelical to Pentecostal to liturgical.

Many of them struggled with the doctrines of the churches of their childhood, but they couldn't walk away from their faith.

"It was the hardest journey of my life," admitted Sandi Rice, a Buncombe native and Southern Baptist who found a home in the Metropolitan Community Church of Asheville. "This church meets my spiritual needs. This is a very Christ-centered fellowship where I can be fully and totally myself."

In other Christian denominations that follow a literal interpretation of the Bible, their homosexuality is considered sinful. But on Sunday evenings, Rich and others come together to worship as a community that celebrates gays, lesbians and others who've often felt shunned by other churches.

Same-sex couples sit together, sharing hymnals and prayers for each other and those absent, who may be suffering from AIDS.

While many churches bill themselves as "welcoming" congregations for gays, the Metropolitan Community Church caters mainly to the gay, lesbian and bisexual community. Founded in 1968 in Los Angeles by a defrocked Pentecostal minister, the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches has grown into a denomination of some 300 churches in 17 countries with an estimated membership of 32,000.

Brent Pack, a native of Mars Hill, helped start the local church in Asheville in 1992. Now, Pack currently serves as worship director for the 30-member church, selecting hymns and liturgy each Sunday, and leading the weekly communion.

Coming out about his sexuality as a teen, Pack remained in the

Southern Baptist church of his childhood. But he later moved into the Metropolitan Community Church. "Here I can be Christian and gay. They're not mutually exclusive."

After Pack's announcements and the community prayers led by Rice, the Rev. Carlene Wood stands before the congregation. She preaches a sermon on John the Baptist-emphasizing the need for repentance.

Wood grew up Baptist in California. Moving to Asheville 13 years ago, Wood soon found herself divorced, and slowly realized her sexuality as a lesbian. She also began attending various churches, exploring her spirituality.

"It came down to three churches, the MCC, the Episcopalians and the Quakers. an abomination." In the New Testament, Paul also deplores homosexual behavior in Romans 1:24-27

Wood believes those scriptures have been taken out of context and grossly exaggerated. The prohibitions in Leviticus may have referred to homosexual rape, while the New Testament verses may be talking about temple prostitution practiced by some religious cults in Paul's day.

The Rev. Ralph Sexton, senior pastor of Trinity Baptist Church, holds to a literal interpretation of those verses and the orthodox Christian view that homosexuality is a sin. "That's obviously based on the scriptures. The Bible is quite explicit that this particular sin is considered by the Lord God an abomination. Of course, God doesn't have big or little sins, and God doesn't hate the sinner. Scripture tells me I'm a sinner, that all of us are sinners. That's a common ground that we share."

Wood holds to the Baptist doctrine of the Priesthood of the Believer, allowing each person to read and interpret scriptures. "I may not agree with your interpretation, but we can disagree as brothers and sisters in Christ," said Wood.

While battling society's stereotypes of lesbians, Wood also endures suspicions in the gay community. "I've come out of the Christian closet," said Wood. "Being a gay Christian helps me to offer Christ to a group of people who have flat-out been denied access. They've been told that 'God abhors you, that God would rather you be dead than queer.'

"It's incredibly important to help people reconcile their faith and their sexuality, but my relationship with God is more significant than who I sleep with. I don't have gay values. I have Christian values."

While mindful of the issues facing the gay community, Wood and her church also seek to reach out to others facing exclusion from mainstream society, including the

poor and minorities.

Sunday morning remains the most segregated time in our society both racially and economically, and that's just pitiful."

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But it was the Metropolitan church that quickened her spirit. "I felt at home the first time I walked in. I really wanted to be accepted at first, then I wanted to be affirmed for who I am. Now I want to be celebrated."

The Metropolitan Community Church is theologically conservative in its doctrine, following the Nicene and Apostles' creeds, proclaiming the Bible as divinely inspired, and the justification by grace through faith in Jesus Christ. The church recognizes two sacraments in baptism and holy communion.

What the Metropolitan Church does not preach is homosexuality as any kind of sin or sickness, running counter to a literal interpretation of scripture.

Wood calls these ``the texts of terror," six verses in the Bible that have been used over the centuries to condemn homosexual acts.

Leviticus 18:22 reads, "You shall not lie with a male as one lies with a female, it is

Metropolitan church blends worship styles from traditional hymns and high liturgy.

Communion is served each Sunday either by intinction, where the wafer is dipped in the goblet, then placed on the communicant's tongue, or by drinking or dipping the wafer in the common cup. Each communicant is prayed over by Wood or another communion server. In a service, the congregation will hear more about the Gospel than about being gay.

'This is church," said the Rev. Dorri Sherrill, a Baptist visitor to the service. "You can see and feel the love they have for each other."

Only a few months ago, Wood lay close to death in an Asheville hospital, suffering from pancreatitis.

In her three months of recovery, Wood was visited by many of her church, and pastors from other denominations, whose prayers she is grateful for.

Tipper Gore speaks at Human Rights Campaign gala

UNIVERSAL CITY, Calif. (AP)-Tipper Gore, campaigning for her husband and presidential candidate Vice President Al Gore, spoke Feb. 19 about issues faced by homosexuals at a Human Rights Campaign Foundation awards dinner.

The foundation, the country's largest gay political organization, held ``Human Rights Campaign Gala 2000," awarding actress Sharon Stone a humanitarian honor for her "diligence, compassion and dedication to critical issues in our society." Stone was lauded for her support of AIDS and breast cancer research.

The event, sponsored by the Washington-based foundation, raised money for the organization. Mrs. Gore delivered the keynote address. Gore is vying for the Democratic presidential nomination against former U.S. senator Bill Bradley.

Mrs. Gore spoke about workplace discrimination of homosexuals, support for AIDS research and revamping the nation's health care system.

Gore's California press secretary, David Chai, said Mrs. Gore's remarks echoed sentiments that are central to the vice president's campaign

`Al Gore is going to be fighting the good fight for the critical issues" that are particulary important to the gay and lesbian community, such as

ensuring funding is maintained for Medicaid, including for those who have AIDS or the HIV virus. Actress-comedian Ellen

DeGeneres and her partner, actress Anne Heche, presented Stone with the humanitarian award.

Mrs. Gore was in Oakland earlier Saturday visiting a health clinic where she spoke about her husband's support of universal health care coverage.

Both she and Bradley's wife, Ernestine, were scheduled to attend a forum Feb. 20 sponsored by the New Frontier Democratic Club. The forum at the University of Southern California will focus on minorities and politics.

great script. I cried when I read it. It's just beautiful.

HS: When people our age were growing up, there were no TV movies about gay teens for us to watch. Is this movie's progay message important for America's kids to hear today?

RP: Not only kids, but parents. There's only one of each of us here on this planet, and we all need to be educated about how beautiful we are. When we try to focus on what makes us different from one another, it defeats the purpose.

Ninety-nine-point-nine percent of us is exactly the same. Then there's that small, other percentage that makes us different. So, we all tend to focus on that, and it's not a good thing. We should focus on the fact that there's only one of us here, and that we're all going through the same thing.

HS: Stockard Channing plays the conflicted mother in this movie. You have acted with her in other TV movies, as well as in the feature Too Wong Foo: Thanks for Everything, Julie Newmar, right?

RP: This my fourth project with Stockard Channing-although I didn't have any scenes with her in Too Wong Foo. I've never had that experience with any other actor, where we've done so many things together. She is great.

HS: When you and I were teenagers, she was in a bizarre TV movie called The Girl Most Likely To. She played a fat girl who got teased a lot in high school for her weight. Then she grew up, turned into a ravishing beauty and went back to kill all the people who made fun of her. It's a strange, black comedy. It really affected me as someone who was also picked on-though for another reason.

RP: Everybody remembers that! And for everybody I know, that movie means a lot to them. Did you know that movie was written by Joan Rivers? That was the movie that made Stockard Channing a star.

HS: In Jane's Coming Out Party, her character freaks when her 15-yr-old daughter tells her she's gay. You wrote in Lettin' It All Hang Out that your own parents were rather indifferent to that bit of information when it came from you-although you, too, were only a teenager at the time.

RP: Well, my parents were too self

absorbed in their own things to really go there. Although I did have a minor conputting it all out there ?

RP: I'm trying to be about that. I'm a human being just like everybody else.

HS: Is there anything that you aren't completely candid about?

RP: Oh, yeah-tons!

HS: It seems you rarely hold backexcept maybe when it comes to your personal, intimate relationships with men.

HS: Okay, right. But what's your job? RP: That is my job. Being the best Ru that I can be. By the way-you left out product spokesperson.

HS: Oh, that's right-for MAC cosmetics.

RP: Not just makeup. I pitch lots of stuff.

HS: In your 1995 book, you said that one of your goals was to work both your male and female sides. Since then, you've done several movie appearances out of drag. How far will you go with what you

call your male-drag side? RP: You know what? I've gotten out of the habit of planning where my career is going to

HS: The popular image of you is that you have a lot of self confidence: Is that the real Ru? Or is extreme self confidence part of the fierce persona you've created in order to become successful?

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
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

Partying for art's sake Masquerade Ball & erotic photo auction could help alternative gallery stay afloat

From Europe to Florida, California and New York, Lee Andrew's erotic photographs have been exhibited many times during his artistic career—but never before in Arizona.

That will change on Feb. 26, when the Phoenix resident lends a number of his newer prints—nearly all of them male nude studies—to a benefit showing and masquerade ball that he hopes will aid a flailing underground arts venue.

"I'm doing this to help Barbara," he says, referring to Barbara Brown, proprietor of SOHO 121. Of the year-old artspace at 121 East Camelback, Andrew says, "It's a great concept and we should try to keep it alive, because it's unique."

Brown's concept was to create an inexpensive, community-based gallery and studio space as an "art club" that accepts anyone with an interest in the arts and brings like-minded people together to share their ideas.

"Art is something that can unify all segments of society," Brown says. She founded SOHO 121 last March as a "Community Center for art. It's for artists, and for anybody who wants a place to belong, to introduce themselves to the arts community."

Her vision, however, is in financial trouble. Brown rented the commercial building hoping to sublet its gallery and

studio spaces to artists. She has also set up differing levels of membership for those who want to use the facility to read, gather ideas, preview films or chat over coffee.

"There is always coffee on and muffins,

bagels, whatever, for a small donation." She has taken on some short-term renters and has managed to keep enough art displayed in the galleries to draw the interest of passers by, but says she is disappointed in the overall response to her project.

Part of the problem she's had, she admits, has been with marketing. "I'm not

good at that, and I guess I didn't do enough to let people know what this was and that I was here," she says.

Brown initially hoped that the gallery's close proximity to three busy gay bars and the city's gay community center and bookstore would generate more interest within the Phoenix gay community.

"The space is very conveniently located and accepting," says Andrew. "Some of the artists she has as members are established, but most are struggling." When Andrew learned that Brown may be forced to close, he says, he "wanted to help out."

The Feb. 26 all-day showing and silent auction of Andrew's' photos is part of a fundraiser that includes a Masquerade ball that night and an after hours party until 4:00 a.m.

The suggested donation for the ball is \$10, \$5 in advance. DJ's Pretty Boy and Ishmael will start spinning at 10:00 p.m. The photo show opens for a preview at noon, \$3 suggested donation.

Brown is hoping that at least 200 people will show up to party and place bids on Andrew's work. For information or to buy an advance ticket, call 602/274-9225.



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

Known in Europe as an adult film director and erotic photographer, Lee Andrew has lived in Phoenix, La Jolla, Virginia, Texas and France on and off over the years. He first came to the Valley to attend Grand Canyon State College ten years ago.

In the early '90s, he owned and later sold Parr of Arizona, a local swimsuit company. He has trained with renowned fashion and portrait photographer Herb Ritts. He moved back here two years ago, and currently works in the video production field. His X-rated action projects are limited to his frequent travels overseas.

Many of the models for Andrew's still photos, however, are local finds. He met several Valley policemen when he shot a beefcake calendar for the Phoenix Metro PD a few years ago, and one of the cops became a regular model.

An oral argument

Oral sex is risky? Can it be true? But didn't the Center for Disease Control (CDC) say it was safe?

These questions have been pretty common lately at the LifeGuard office. The recent news about a study of San Francisco gay men that showed 8% of HIV infections were from unprotected oral sex has people wondering about their own risk for HIV.

Many of us walk around with a shopping list of sexual activities that we feel comfortable doing and that we know are within the confines of how risky we want to be. This list can be one item long, it can keep you only in the produce section, or have you running amuck through the entire sexual grocery store.

We all have certain ideas in our head. When we get information that goes against what we have been thinking all along, it can lead to panic.

We need something better than a shopping list. Besides, who ever has a pen handy to cross off the darned items when they get to them? Okay, I think maybe I have carried the shopping-list analogy too far

When I really want to understand something, I try to break it down into its most basic form. Instead of going through each and every circumstance during which HIV can be transmitted sexually, I think of what all of those behaviors have in common.

Any sexual activity in which an infected person's blood, semen, vaginal fluids, or breast milk can enter an uninfected person's bloodstream is a risky behavior. Simple enough, right?

The complications come in when we start to talk about *how* risky a particular activity is. So many factors are involved with determining this that it is never exact. Generally, however, certain things hold true.

For one thing, any kind of sex with a condom is safer than the same activity without a condom. That, of course, is because those pesky above-mentioned fluids are kept at bay. That is pretty logical. Also, anal sex without a condom is riskier than oral sex without a condom. There are simply more possible routes to

the bloodstream. Not rocket science here, either.

Can you see a pattern here? Well, actually, there are two patterns.

First, as you get more specific with regard to behaviors, things get proportionally more technical with respect to risk. So if you are wondering whether oral sex without a condom for 34 seconds after having brushed your teeth one hour

> before is safe, then the answer is... how the heck do I know! The other pattern is that everything goes back to that very basic concept described earlier. The one about the different fluids, and whether they are entering the bloodstream. If you're worried or confused, always refer back to this.

So now we're back to the first question: Is oral sex risky?

I think I answered that already.

Head of New Mexico Catholic church disputes newspaper AIDS survey

SANTA FE (AP)—The head of the Roman Catholic church in New Mexico is disputing a newspaper survey that found priests in the United States are dying from AIDS-related illnesses at a rate four times higher than the general population.

Archbishop Michael Sheehan has denounced the January series by the *Kansas City Star*, which also suggests that priests who died of the illness often had it concealed on their death certificates, as ``a hatchet job" and ``outrageously unfair."

"It seems like the media picks on priests," Sheehan said. "I believe priests are overstudied, and more studies are done on priests than other professional groups. It's almost like they're trying to put (priests) in an unfavorable light." Sheehan, the leader of the Archdiocese

of Santa Fe's 300,000 Roman Catholics, said he knows of no priest in his jurisdiction with AIDS or HIV, the virus that causes the disease. He also said none of the 100 or so priests in his archdiocese has died of the disease.

Sheehan said one priest he knew, who lived elsewhere, possibly died of AIDS. But he still urged readers to be ``extremely cautious" about the survey's conclusions.

The *Star* received 801 responses to questionnaires that were sent last fall to 3,000 of the 46,000 priests in the United States. The margin of error of the survey

was 3.5 percentage points.

Six of 10 priests responding said they knew of at least one priest who had died of an AIDS-related illness, and one-third knew a priest living with AIDS. Threefourths said the church needed to provide more education to seminarians on sexual issues.

Star reporter Judy Thomas, who wrote the AIDS series, said she worked with several polling experts in setting up the survey. She also said researchers from within the Catholic community assisted with the survey to word questions appropriately.

"I just think the fact that 801 priests responded to the survey shows that

priests across the country see this as an issue that needs to be addressed," Thomas said.

The *Star* said precise numbers of priests who have died of AIDS or become infected with HIV is unknown, partly because many suffer in solitude. When priests tell their superiors, the cases generally are handled quietly.

But Sheehan said the Star's conclusion that there is a much higher percentage of AIDS among priests than the national average is ``simply not true."

"Our sexually permissive society has taken its toll on priests," he said. "Now there's an effort to correct the situation and recommit."

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"I can't imagine going back to South Beach. I can tell from my visit last weekend that the place is too shallow even for someone who can enjoy the escape the party scene offers. If I want to spend the weekend surrounded by emotionally neutered body boys, I can seek them out a lot closer to home. At least the body boys I know here [in Boston] can probably tell me the names of the congressperson, mayor, governor or city councilor who represents them, rather than just the names of the DJs appearing that week." —Jeff Epperly, editor of Boston's Bay

Windows, in a Jan. 6 editorial.

"Gaydar can lead to a social form of racial profiling. The police aren't stopping gays on the highway, but a gay who comes anywhere near the Richard Simmons profile still carries an added burden in the workplace. At its worst, gaydar is deadly. 

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
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Planning the Perfect Road Trip

When people find out I'm on the road six to eight months of the year, they nearly always want to know how many frequent-flyer miles I've racked up. "You must spend half your life in airports," they muse, suddenly imagining the flip side of my job as a travel writer.

I'm always happy to report that, in fact, I fly no more than three or four times annually, usually when air travel is my only practical option (for example, to Europe or Australia). For North American destinations, I travel by car—there is no activity more exhilarating to me than taking to the open road.

Car travel is not for everybody. If time is tight, you're better off flying: with the most ambitious itinerary, you need to factor in at least a full day of travel for every 500 miles you plan to cover by car. It takes at least six days to drive across the country, above and beyond the time spent exploring each destination. And the best way to experience the terrain is to avoid the superhighways and stick to slower but more scenic roads.

I crisscross the continent at least once a year, typically taking in 30 to 40 cities and passing through 15 to 25 U.S. states and Canadian provinces. I take three to five months on such a trip and still usually wind up feeling rushed.

The most important decision to make before setting out is whether to use your own car, rent a car, or fly to a given destination and rent one on arrival. I use my own car, partly because as a travel writer on assignment I'm able to deduct most automobile expenses.

If your trip isn't work-related, using your own car may not be cost-effective. The money you spend on gas, tolls, and parking, combined with the wear and tear on your car (or the extra miles if you lease your car), can amount to a tremendous expense.

The best car for a long road trip is a late-model (still with its full factory warranty), mid-size sedan with a large trunk and a dependable car alarm—I drive a Saab, which I chose largely because of its excellent security features and its enormous cargo space.

A car with an expired warranty is a risk, given the myriad hazards you might encounter on the road. Sedans are roomier than coupes, and rear passenger doors

the back seat.

A trunk is better than an open-bed storage space like the back of a sport-utility vehicle or a station wagon, because it's protected from the sun (which can damage film, food, beer and wine, and many toiletries) and is hidden from the covetous eyes of potential burglars.

A mid-size sedan, while not as handy

and cost-effective as a compact car, gets much better mileage than a sport-utility vehicle, is fairly easy to park and maneuver, and ensures the smoothest and most comfortable ride.

If the car you own fails to meet most of the above requirements, consider either renting one locally for the entire trip or flying part of the way and renting a car once you arrive. The immediate expense may seem high (typically from \$150 to \$250 weekly for a mid-size), but the advantages can be tremendous, especially if the car-rental agency offers free unlimited mileage and roadside assistance. Remember, however, that most rental-car agencies charge a hefty pre-

mium if you return the car in U.S. 82 from a different city than where you started, so a loop itinerary may be your best strategy.

Before planning any road trip, pick up detailed maps covering the region that interests you. Bound, indexed atlases are more convenient than foldout maps. Better yet, buy a CD-ROM street atlas and/or trip planner and use it with a laptop computer if you have one.

My favorite program is Microsoft's Expedia Streets and Trip Planner, but both Rand McNally and Delorme also make excellent products. This software will allow you, with unbelievable ease, to pinpoint addresses, determine the exact length (in miles and hours) of your itinerary, and plot the most time-efficient route.

Packing for a long road trip, one that involves spending one or two nights in multiple cities, differs markedly from conventional packing. The best approach is to imagine the back of your car as a combination closet, kitchen cupboard, and office.

I strongly recommend you confine your luggage to one carry-on suitcase and, if necessary, a backpack or duffel bag —there's no reason to haul a massive suitcase between your car and your hotel every night or two. I use a standard-size carry-on manufactured by Andiamo, which I've found to be the best luggagemaker around.

No matter the length of the trip, pack your two small bags with no more than the clothing and belongings you'll need for three or four days. Store your luggage on the backseat of your car, along with any other items you'll be taking into the hotel with you each night.


Use your trunk to store the many

your trip but won't be using every day, such as extra clothing, travel guides and maps, and non-perishable food. Configure your trunk as follows: Depending on how much stuff you're bringing, buy some cheap plastic stackable storage drawers and line your trunk with them (use a bungee cord to keep them from flying open while in motion).

ing restaurant leftovers in your cooler and making lunch out of them the following day (most highway truck stops have microwaves, if the thought of cold, dayold shrimp pad Thai gives you the willies).

Such detailed road-tripping strategies may sound excessively anal-retentive, but good planning will actually enhance your



Anybody who's ever driven from coast to coast knows that crossing the mighty Mississippi River, in this case along U.S. 82 from Mississippi to Arkansas, inspires a great sense of accomplishment.

Open plastic milk crates work well for books, atlases, and music carrying cases, but at least one of these drawers is a must for smaller, easily misplaced items, such as batteries, a flashlight, a few basic tools, first-aid supplies, a portable umbrella, various office supplies, extra film and a disposable camera, spare toiletries, a sewing kit, and whatever else you might need.

Extra clothing should be folded and placed either in storage drawers or in an open laundry basket. Keep a large garbage bag beside your clean clothes, and a bottle of laundry detergent beside that. Each time you check out of a hotel, toss your dirty clothes into the garbage

bag and restock your luggage with a fresh change of outfits, books, and other supplies. And don't worry when the clean clothes run out—laundromats are not only cheap and abundant, they're great places to meet people!

Lastly, invest in a dependable food cooler (and maybe a thermos), which you should always keep in your trunk. Hot cereals and soups that can be heated in their own containers work nicely in any hotel room with a coffeemaker, and high-carbohydrate snacks like Power Bars, peanut-butter crackers, and dried fruit travel well at any temperature.

But a cooler is ideal for perishables, wine, and beer. And it's amazing how much ability to cut loose on the road. If you've got your belongings, atlases, and travel gear in order, you're in a much better position to throw caution to the wind in ways that really matter, like deciding at the last minute to add a Vegas side trip to that trek you've planned down the coast from Vancouver to San Diego. And remember, in the words of Robert Louis Stevenson, "it is better to travel hopefully than to arrive."
