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"This election so far has focused on a lot of the same old things. I got in to the race because I care about my Navajo people. I want to come back home to work in the reservation someday, but the economic, land, and education policies. Additionally, I am a proud Navajo transwoman, made exactly as the Holy People intended. I have been the brunt of laughter, jokes, and bullying. People who talk about k'é hwindzin have also made fun of my gender and disability. The Navajo Nation has a problem, it is not about Navajo government (though that's part of it), rather it is the old guard and the policies, culture, and stories they protect. These policies teach our children and people how to leave, but does not teach us how to come home. Rather, these policies and culture ask us to stay away. I got into this race because I believe in the power of the Navajo language, culture, and traditions. I believe our grandparents received the strength to survive the genocide at Ft. Sumner because they believed in equality, they believed in progress, they believed in acceptance. They believed that the future of the Navajo people depended on making sure our children's dreams come true. The Navajo politicians have failed in bringing about the vision of freedom our grandparents fought for, even gave up land for. The current politicians do not make room for all Navajo people, only those who will keep them in power and ensure their wealth. Navajo tradition says our wealth is the knowledge of our traditions, we can not reclaim our rightful place in the world when we discriminate against the youth, when we do not accept our LGBTQI brothers and sisters, when we fail to provide safety for the disabled, when we silence out children's voices by lecturing them. This is not the Navajo way, this is not Navajo liberation.

My name is Trudie Jackson and I will fight for the vision and future our grandfathers and grandmothers sacrificed their lives for, we must become the answers to their prayers."
