"CYRANO DE BERGERAC" IS ACCLAIMED BY DRAMATISTS

The insouciance of Edmond Rostand was well portrayed Wednesday and Thursday evening in his play, "Cyrano de Bergerac," presented by the dramatic arts groups under the direction of Miss Beryl Simpson, head of the department.

The life of France in the old days as described in the five-act classic, was well portrayed with the story of Cyrano, taken from life by the author, and well presented by the actors as a group. Paul Fuval, historian, has stated that Cyrano de Bergerac was the third character in the three musketeers of Dumas' novel, "The Man of the Iron Mask" taken from life.

An interesting feature of the production was the interchanging of the two leads, Cyrano and Christian, by Jimmie Jones and Herman Bradshaw.

Jones played Cyrano Wednesday evening, and gave a very credible performance, much better than that of the average college actor. Despite a tendency to orate rather than read meaning into his lines, Cyrano was presented to the audience as a very live character, proud, haughty and clever; toward the end Cyrano was rather pitiful, because Jones showed clearly how much Cyrano realized that he was a bystander watching life.

Thursday night, as Christian, Jones did more good work, making Christian rather despicable, in the way he took so much from Cyrano, and only at the very last showed any gratitude.

Of course the interpretation of the two actors, Bradshaw and Jones, was so entirely different that no comparison could be made. Bradshaw, as Christian on Wednesday night, made a rather weak character of him, and more lovable

than was Jones' portrayal. However, as Cyrano on Thursday evening, Bradshaw really showed his ability as an actor. He has a natural talent, and his work had the finished touch of the professional and experienced actor. He took advantage of all of his big scenes and made every word and every line carry a meaning.

Claudia Kinsey as Roxane was much prettier than the leading lady in Walter Hampden's production of the famous play, and in one way at least she, even though an amateur, did much better work, because the Roxane of the professional troupe played entirely for the director, while Miss Kinsey played her part for its own worth. She lacked emotional depth, which showed in some of her best scenes; however, this was probably due to youth and in-

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Heads Of Colleges And University To Discuss Problems

Problems common to all institutions of higher learning will be discussed at a joint meeting of the governing boards of the three institutions in Arizona and the state board of education to be held this afternoon in the state capitol.

This meeting has been called in accordance with a resolution adopted by University of Arizona regents, providing that the boards of the three schools, the University of Arizona, ASTC at Tempe, and ASTC at Flagstaff, together with their presidents, and the board of education shall meet in point session quarterly to discuss problems common to all.

It has been planned to discuss the needs of accomplishing a more efficient and economic program of higher education in the state.

Tests Will Be Given College On Three Days

Sophs, Juniors and Seniors To Take Achievement Tests

All ASTC sophomores, juniors, and seniors will be required to take the Carnegie foundation achievement tests to be given next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday mornings in the auditorium, it has been announced.

These tests are a part of a nationwide program of testing of college students. They have been constructed as a result of a \$500,000 grant from the Carnegie foundation and are being given in over 200 colleges and universities scattered throughout the United States.

Questions in the test for sophomores cover general information on English, literature, social science, and science. The junior and senior tests cover the professional field in education and psychology.

The sophomores will take two tests and the upperclassmen one. The schedule for the tests is as follows: Tuesday, May 3, 8 to 12 a. m., sophomores in the auditorium; Wednesday, May 4, 8 to 12 a. m., sophomores in the auditorium; Thursday, May 5, 8 to 12 a. m., juniors and seniors in the auditorium. Student teachers will be excused from all classes Thursday morning.

The university of the future will consist of a stadium for entertainment and a library where the students may go to satisfy their curiosity, says the Ottawa Campus.

Several poems by Dr. A. Lionel Stevenson have recently been published in "The Decachord," a London poetry magazine.

One minute speeches will be made to nominate students for student body offices in general assembly to be held here a week from today, according to completed plans. Prepared speeches will be delivered from the platform of the auditorium.

Gerald Caplinger, retiring president of the associated students, will have charge of the nominations for the offices of president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer.

Primary elections will take place one week later, in accordance with regulations provided for in the constitution. Nominees receiving a majority of votes in the primary will be declared elected, and others will be voted on a final time the following week.

Students will also vote approval or disapproval of by-laws to the constitution, drawn up and approved by the student council at recent meetings, and approved Monday. The complete by-laws will be found published elsewhere.

Additions concern the election of editors and business managers of publications of the college, and their duties and powers; the duties and powers of the president, vice president and treasurer; and the qualifications, duties and awards of athletic managers who will have charge of the management of athletics in the future.

Class officers and representatives to the student council for next year will be elected in the near future, it has been planned.

Twelve Geologists To Take Trip Over Northern Arizona

Members of the geology class left yesterday afternoon on an extensive field trip, making a circle tour of Northern Arizona. The group will return from the three-day trip Sunday evening.

The route taken by the geologists goes by way of Black Canyon and Cherry Creek to Clarkdale and Jerome, with stops being made at various points of geologic importance, including Montezuma's Well and Oak Creek canyon. Proceeding to Flagstaff, side trips will be made to Sunset Mountains, Lava Beds, Belmont lava cavern, Walnut canyon and the Bottomless Pit. The return trip will be made by way of Mormon and Stoneman lakes, down over the Mogollon Rim to Pine and

the Payson Natural Bridge. The final section to be taken Sunday includes Tonto Basin and the Apache Trail.

By-Laws To Constitution Of Associated Students Of ASTC

ARTICLE III

Section 3-A. The Editor of the Collegian shall be chosen in the following manner and he shall have the following duties and responsibilities as specified.

1. He shall be chosen upon the recommendation of the incumbent editor, of the head of the Journalism Department, and of the members of the Associated Student Council. He shall be employed by contract for the period of one year at a salary which shall be set by the Associated Student Council.

2. He shall have the following definite duties and responsibilities. He shall make, sign, and carry out all written contracts necessary for the publication of the Collegian. He shall have an edition of the college paper, The Collegian, issued every Friday of the college year excepting holidays, vacations, and final examination weeks. He shall choose all sub-editors. He shall be responsible for the policies of the paper to the head of the Journalism Department and to the President of the Associated Student Body.

Section 3-B. The Business Manager of the Collegian shall be chosen in the following manner and have the following duties and responsibilities as specified.

1. He shall be chosen upon recommendation of the head of the Journalism Department, the incoming editor, and incumbent business manager. He shall be employed by contract for the period of one year at a salary which shall be set by the Associated Student Council. He shall make, sign, and carry out all contracts necessary for the publication of the Collegian. He shall have charge of the soliciting of advertising in the Collegian. He shall have supervision of circulation and mailing of the Collegian. He shall manage all other business details, authorized by a purchase order of the Associated Students. The Business Manager shall be responsible to the treasurer of the Associated Students in all financial matters.

ARTICLE III

Section 3-C. The Editor of the Sahuaro shall be chosen in the following manner and he shall have the following duties and responsibilities as specified.

1. He shall be chosen upon the recommendations of the incumbent editor, of the head of the Journalism Department, and of the members of the Associated Student Council. He shall be employed by contract for the period of one year at a salary which shall be set by the Associated Student Council.

2. He shall have the following definite duties and responsibilities. He shall make, sign, and carry out all written contracts necessary for the publication of the Sahuaro. He shall publish the college annual by May 15 of the college year. He shall choose all sub-editors.

ARTICLE III

Section 3-D. The Business Manager of the Sahuaro shall be chosen in the following manner and shall have the following duties and responsibilities as specified.

1. He shall be chosen upon recommendation of the head of the Journalism Department, the incoming editor, and incumbent business manager. He shall be employed by contract for the period of one year at a salary which shall be set by the Associated Student Council. He shall make, sign, and carry out all contracts necessary for the publication of the Sahuaro. He shall have charge of the soliciting of advertising for the Sahuaro. He shall collect all money for advertising space, organ and class space, and individual fees. He shall make a monthly report to the Treasurer of the Associated Students. He shall conduct all purchases on purchase orders of the Associated Students.

ARTICLE III

Section 4-A. A system of athletic managements shall be organized according to the following statements.

1. A General Manager of athletics shall be elected by the Student Body Council. His duties shall be: (a) He shall make all necessary arrangements for ticket-sales, and advertising. (b) He shall appoint all necessary ticket sellers, ticket takers, and student patrolmen for any game. (c) He shall conduct all expenditures on duly authorized purchase orders of Associated Students.

2. A Team Manager shall be elected, upon recommendation of the Coach, by the Associated Student Council. His duties shall be: (a) He shall be in charge of all other team managers. (b) He shall carry out those duties connected with an athletic team management which the coach directs.

3. An Assistant Team Manager shall be elected, upon recommendation of the Coach, by the Student Body Council. His duties shall be: (a) He shall carry out those duties connected with athletic team management which the Team Manager or the Coach may direct.

4. Freshman Managers shall be chosen by the Coach out of all candidates for the position as soon as one proves his worth. His duties shall be: (a) He shall carry out those duties for any Freshman team assigned to him by the Team Manager or Coach.

5. All managers excepting Freshman managers must maintain the same standard of eligibility as members of an athletic team.

ARTICLE IV

Section 2-A. The President of the Associated Student Body shall have the following duties:

1. He shall preside at all meetings of the Associated Student Council.

2. He shall preside over all deliberative assemblies of the Associated Student Body.

3. He shall determine the validity of, and sign all purchase orders on the Associated Student Body.

4. He shall endorse all invoices demanding expenditure of Associated Student money.

5. He shall sign all checks drawn upon the Associated Student fund.

6. He shall execute all other Associated Student affairs as shall be necessary from time to time.

7. He shall preside over the first meeting of the Freshman Class each year, or until such time as a class president may be chosen.

A record class of 246 students will receive diplomas from ASTC this year, it has been announced. Approximately one-fourth of these graduates are men.

Besides the list of students graduating at the end of the school term, diplomas will be issued to those students who completed the three-year and fourth year curriculum in January, and to those who will complete requirements in August.

experience. Her hands were used well, and her voice could easily be forgiven when watching the work of her hands.

Compte De Guiche as played by Henry Frick was a proud count of Cardinal Richelieu's court. More proud than clever, and as the villain of the play was cordially hated by all. Frick was rather slow and missed a lot of his action and his voice did not carry as well as he has done in other plays. He did good work in that he made De Guiche a thorough villain.

Spencer Thompson as Valert, the aid of De Guiche, was a dashing cavalier as he swaggered across the stage. His duelling with Bradshaw was splendid. When Bradshaw Valert he flung the rapier in the air catching it and tossing it lightly back to him—a very good piece of technique and a grand gesture.

Ragueneau, Perle White, the pastry cook, added humor to the play and his splendid voice made him a real "poet-cook."

Byron Holdren as Le Bret, the friend of Cyrano, was too slow in catching his cues, and was inclined to underact his part; however, his appearance and voice carried the part well.

Carbon de Castel-Jaioux, Gilbert Cady, was a very militaristic and smart captain of the guard, although his voice was not as good as it might have been.

Although a small part, the duenna, Thelma Beck, was poised personified. Miss Beck has the enunciation and carriage of a good actress.

Much humor was given the play by the two pages, Wilma Driskill and Frances Windes. The atmosphere of the seventeenth century France was added by Helen Roach and Lorene Robinson, as refreshment and flower girls. Ligniere, Carl Jones, did good work in his portrayal of a drunken man; Clarence Stull, Vomen Frye, James Samuels, and Bernard Muffley were honorees, which added atmosphere.

The cadets of Gaston were regal and audacious in their portrayal of the gallant soldiers. The fourth act was rather weak, because they did not respond to the orders of their captain with proper military precision.

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In compliance with the spirit of the North Central Association rulings regarding subsidizing and recruiting of athletes, representatives of the University of Arizona, Flagstaff Teachers College and ASTC met last week and drew up the following resolutions.

BE IT RESOLVED: That we, the institutions of higher learning in the State of Arizona, pledge ourselves to carry out the spirit and purpose of the North Central Association ruling regarding recruiting and subsidizing of athletes, and that we agree to refrain from offering special inducements to athletes, as such, to attend any one of our institutions and that we will discourage any effort at recruiting of athletes on the part of students, alumni, or any organization or group.

To this end we agree to the following:

- (1) That no member of any athletic department shall initiate any correspondence with any prospective athlete;
- (2) That no athletic department shall offer jobs to any prospective athletes;
- (3) That the visiting representative of any college or university shall be a regular member of the faculty of the college or university and not connected with the coaching of intercollegiate athletics;
- (4) That no employment shall be given by the college or university to any student for more than sufficient money for the payment of board and room;
- (5) That student employment in the University of Arizona, the State Teachers College at Flagstaff, the State Teachers College at Tempe, and the Phoenix Junior College shall be limited to high school graduates whose scholarship rank is in the upper two-thirds of their graduating class;
- (6) That we deplore the tendency of over-emphasis on winning athletic competition, and we express the hope that alumni and public refrain from criticizing and condemning coaches and institutions for not producing winning teams.

Finley Is Star For Occidental College In Track and Field

Dick Finley, former ASTC football and track star, carried away individual honors in a recent meet between members of the Southern California conference according to word received here.

Finley is the outstanding athlete at the present time for Occidental college near Los Angeles, the team which won the meet.

He took first place in the discus throw breaking the old conference record by a distance of 11 inches. Although he placed second in the shot event he was only surpassed by 1.4 of an inch and his toss of 46 ft. 7 3-4 inches was greater than the former record. He tied for first place in the high jump with a leap of six feet.

In the backfield, Jones will hold down the right half position, McCullar, quarterback, and Hezmalchal will be fullback. Tuckey may replace Chill at fullback and although he was a former end, has shown great drive and adeptness to the fullback position.

Tonight's lineup will be: Sexton and Hardesty, ends; Cooper and Jory, tackles; Curry and Griffin, guards; and Calicoat, center. Jones and Morris or McNeely, halfbacks; McCullar, quarterback; and Hezmalchal, fullback.

The captain to lead the Bulldog gridsters next fall will be elected just before the game.
