Naval Air Training Plan Falls Through

The Navy Department notified President Grady Gammage Tuesday that an unnamed southwestern university had been selected for the naval cadet training plan which the Navy had tentatively slated to be held on the Arizona State campus this spring.

Six hundred men would have taken training here under the proposed plan, which was to go in effect January 7 if approved by the Navy Department. The plan provided for a 12-week course in pre-flight instruction for the naval air trainees.

Changes in the national manpower administration were believed to be partly responsible for the rejection of Tempe's bid for the pre-flight school.

Wright and Bullock To Present Recitals

Announcement was made this week by Harry B. Harelson, head of the music department, of two faculty music concerts to be given at the first of the year by Dr. Kenneth Wright, violinist, and Arnold Bullock, pianist.

Dr. Wright will appear on January 13, and Mr. Bullock's concert is scheduled for February 10.

In previous years, there has been a more extensive faculty music program, but this year these two concerts will be the only ones presented.

They will both take place in the college auditorium, and the public and students are invited to attend.

Vivacious "Claudia" Enjoyed Wednesday

A thousand laughs and more than a few blushes ushered in Dr. Marian Galloway's first drama season at Arizona State Wednesday night when "Claudia," Rose Franken's vivacious comedy of young married life, was presented in the college auditorium.

Betsy Williams, Phoenix freshman who played the title role to perfection, firmly established herself in Arizona State dramatics with her portrayal of the lovable, laughable, unpredictable Claudia. She shared the spotlight with George Sampson, however, who showed drama fans that comedy is also one of his accomplishments as he struggled with the task of keeping up with Claudia, his wife.

Another highlight was the performance of Louise Alexander as Madame Barushka, temperamental opera star who nearly stole the show the short time she was on the stage.

The cast, contrary to most non-professional productions, had no weak spots. Each of its members turned in performances which kept the large audience weeping with laughter.

If any criticism of the play could be made, it is that it was perhaps a little too much of a good thing. The cast handled the lines with such skill, however, that the bad taste of even the most risqué scenes was soon removed by the gales of laughter which inevitably followed.

Registration To Begin January 5

Second semester registration for all students now enrolled will be held following the Christmas holidays between January 5 and January 20, according to a report received from the Registrar's Office this week. This is not a pre-registration period but actual registration and any student who has not completed registering at the end of this period will be charged the late fees.

Instructions for second-semester registration are as follows:

1. Obtain trail study list and schedule of classes from the Registrar's Office. Fill in the Trial Study Card and have it signed by your adviser.

2. Take Trial Study Card to Registrar's Office and have it checked. Obtain a set of Registration Cards to be filled out at your leisure.

3. After Registration Cards have been filled out, have the Program Card signed by your adviser and take it to the Business Office and pay fees.

4. After paying your fees, go to room 118 in the Library building and turn in your Registration Card and fill out Class Cards. This will complete your registration.

New Students may register on the first day of the evening, and Saturday classes will be held at the first meeting of the class.

"Hobo Holiday" Is Financial Success

Netting more than \$170 on Friday night's "Hobo Holiday" bond and stamp carnival, Blue Key planned this week to invest the sum in bonds for the Student Union fund as soon as details of collection are completed.

Financial results of the carnival were given as follows: gross receipts, \$237.26; concession income, \$77.30; admission, dance and raffle income, \$120.30; expenses, \$27.30; net for bond purchase, \$170.30.

Leading the concessions in income were the Lambdies, with \$26.50, and the Zetas, with \$23.50. Bill Ward, Blue Key president, commended each organization sponsoring a booth for its cooperation in making the carnival a success.

The income from the carnival, which will buy \$225 worth of bonds, raises the Student Union fund to a total of more than \$600 in bonds.

Student, Faculty Group Draws Up Plan For New Recreation Room In Lyceum Building

"Truthfully speaking, the Student Union Building is still a long way off—almost a dream. But the Student Union 'room' may be a reality in the very near future." Until Al Onofrio, student body president, made the above statement Tuesday morning, after getting tentative consent of Dr. Grady Gammage, recreation for students at Arizona State was a problem intensified by the fact that gas rationing has become an actuality.

The leaders of the various campus organizations put their heads together Monday night and decided to turn the basement of the Lyceum building into a recreation center. Plans for obtaining a juke box, ping-pong set, checkers, dominoes, maps, chess sets, cards, darts, newspapers, books, magazines, pictures, a radio and furniture were put into action.

Every weekday the basement will be open to students from 4 to 6 p. m. and from 7 to 9 p. m. On weekends, Friday and Saturday, admittance will be from 8 to 12 p. m. The care of the Student Union Room will be a full time job for some woman student, yet to be chosen, but cooperative effort to keep the place in order will be the necessary duty of each

Army, Navy Leaders Spike Rumor That Reserves Face Immediate Call

The status of men in the various college reserve plans has not been changed in the slightest, it was announced this week by regional army and navy heads in Phoenix in answer to rumors circulated Wednesday regarding immediate induction of reservists.

Christmas Assembly To Be Held Tuesday

Arizona State's annual Christmas assembly, an all-musical program presented by the music department of the college, will be held Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 22, at 3 p. m. in the auditorium. Harry B. Harelson, head of the department, is in charge of the assembly.

Selections by the women's glee club, with violin obligatos by Dr. Kenneth Wright, violinist, feature the program, which includes also a contralto solo by Dovie Lou Green, selections by the men's glee club, and a number by the women's trio composed of Virginia Padfield, Jeanette Ummel and Dovie Lou Green.

Group singing of Christmas carols will close the program. Classes will be dismissed for the program.

Wexler May Teach Astronomy Course

A course in elementary astronomy, which may include the elements of celestial navigation, will be offered second semester provided 15 or 20 students signify their intentions to take the course, it was announced this week by Dr. Charles Wexler, who will teach the subject.

Students interested should notify Dr. Wexler as soon as possible in order that arrangements may be made.

"No directive has been received by my office in regard to induction of navy reserve men," Lt. Commander J. S. Frazer of the naval recruiting office said. "Such a report was announced over the radio but it apparently applied only to non-college members of the various reserve corps."

Capt. Weir of the army recruiting office in Phoenix made a similar statement, adding that "we have no intention of taking reservists out of school unless a national military emergency arises. It is very possible that these men will finish the entire year."

Under new provisions of the induction procedure, men can now ask for induction, through their local draft boards, into either the army, navy, or related branches. If the service of their choice rejects them, however, they will enter the regular army unless judged mentally or physically unfit.

Course In Insect Study Is Offered

A course in General Entomology, with three hours credit, will be offered to Arizona State students next semester, it was announced by Dr. H. L. Stahnke, associate professor of science, this week.

Involving a study of insects, including general structure, physiology, habits, life histories, and classification, the course will be excellent for students interested in teaching the elementary grades, especially in the kindergarten-primary level. Also, students interested in medicine will find that insects are one of the major problems in health and disease.

There will be one four hour lab each week. Many of the laboratory hours will be spent in the field collecting and observing insects.

Training School To Dramatize Nativity

"The Nativity," a dramatization of the original Christmas, will be presented to the public by the children of the Eighth Street Training School on December 22, at 2 p. m. in the B. B. Mauer Activity Building in Tempe. There will be no charge.

The Christmas carols will be sung by a children's chorus and accompanied by the orchestra. A silhouette of Bethlehem and other scenes were prepared by the art class. Colorful costumes, which have been collected from many sources will add to the atmosphere of the play.

The chorus will consist of about seventy-five children from the upper grades. The orchestra, which has about fifteen members, will play several selections.

Classes Moved Up

All classes will begin a half hour later and dining hall hours will be changed accordingly beginning Monday, Jan. 4, it was announced Wednesday by Dean J. O. Grimes.

Conservation of fuel and electricity, together with added convenience to off-campus students with early-morning jobs, were given as reasons for the change.

"Varsity Bill" Is Campus Fixture

"Let's go down to the Varsity and have a coke." "O.K." "Couple of Cokes Bill." "Two cokes coming right up," was the answer by the man behind the counter. The students had their cokes, but who is Bill? Where had he come from? What had he done? They couldn't even tell you his last name.

Kenneth Bailey, alias Varsity Bill, was born in Winchester, Indiana, in the year 1902. He attended the Winchester grammar school and then the city high school. His education had just begun, for after graduation from high school he enrolled in Wabash College where he completed one year. After leaving Wabash he attended the University of Indiana for five years, and graduated in the class of '26. He has a B.S. degree, and a degree in commerce and finance.

Works In 5 and 10

His first venture into the world of employment was for the S. S. Kresge company, a five and ten cent store in Toledo, Ohio. He worked there for three years, and was then transferred to a branch store in Findley, Ohio, as assistant manager. He stayed there for six months and then came to Phoenix to run a wholesale candy business with his brother-in-law.

In January of 1930 Mr. Bailey bought the Varsity Inn. This was to be the start of what is now a profitable business venture and the hangout for many hundreds of college students. The Varsity Inn, referred to by many as the "V.I.," was to be rebuilt twice. The first time was in 1933 when the old building was completely torn down and a new one put up and the second was in 1938 when he doubled the floor space and remodeled the entire Inn.

In 1936 "Varsity Bill" started a log book, in which students may sign their names, nicknames, class year, fraternity or sorority, home town, and school address. The book now contains hundreds of names.

Last January "Varsity Bill" put up a service flag for the boys in the service who have attended Arizona State. There are now approximately 415 blue stars on the chart, but there are eight gold stars for those who have gone down fighting and four red stars for the missing. 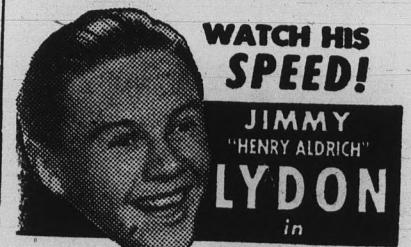
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
