Nell B. Byers, assistant professor of English at Arizona State and wife of Frank Byers, college drama professor, has written an article which was printed in "Elementary English," official organ of the National Council of Teachers of English.

The article, "Porridge for Goldilocks," is a commentary on the possible effect on later morals of the employment of many of the traditional fairy tales in a child's education.

"Jack," of "Beanstalk" fame, contends Mrs. Byers, is first of all a wastrel and then in his relations with the giant and his wife a cheat, a liar, a thief and finally a murderer.

"Conceivably," says Mrs. Byers, "the child consumer of such fairy tales could grow into an older baby sitter who would read her employer's mail and use chocolate bars for book marks."

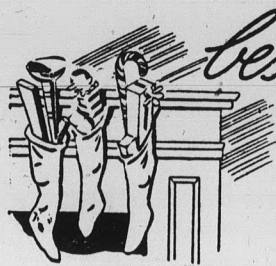

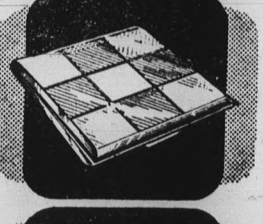

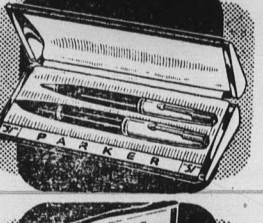

ASC Gains Revenge, Waves Upset, 50-42

TAKING ADVANTAGE of the home court and a partisan crowd, the Arizona State Sun Devils gained revenge over the Waves of Pepperdine, defeating them 50 to 42 last night.

Charlie Beall and Wade Oliver sparked their team mates throughout the game with masterful plays and sure ball handling. Diminutive forward Gil Trejo, firing his accurate shots only when he was open, proved the dead eye of the squad by garnering 13 points to pace the Tempes in the scoring column.

Vic Larson of the Waves and Beall stood out in the guard slots, each setting up plays and taking control of the ball for their respective teams. Larson sank 11 points to top the Waves' scoring honors.

Larson broke the ice after twenty seconds of the game had elapsed by dumping in the first basket for the Waves. Ed Long of the Demons and Trejo combined on free throws and careful field goals to put the Demons in the lead, Long sinking a looping swisher and Trejo following up a few seconds later to put State ahead, 10 to 9. Mack Larson and Lynn Dalton kept Tempe in the lead the rest of the first half to edge the Waves out 27 to 24 at the end of the initial 20 minutes.

Both teams used tight, shifting man-to-man defenses throughout the game, which slowed both attacks during the initial fifteen minutes of play.

State's attack was hurt momentarily when Long fouled out after 40 seconds of play had elapsed in the second half. John Faulkner, 6' 7 1/2" center for the Waves, took advantage of the fact and sank a pivot shot to tie the game at 32 to 32. Pepperdine turned on a blistering attack of fast breaking to take a temporary lead. Trejo and Faulkner each tied up the game at 35 and 38 points respectively, but Lynn Dalton dropped in a setup shot to put the Demons ahead for the rest of the fracas.

Cagers Win Pair, Lose Three On Trip

ARIZONA STATE'S Sun Devil cagers opened their season last week on a trip to California, returning with two wins and three defeats. The victories for the Tempe five were over Camp Pendleton Marines and San Diego State Aztecs, and the defeats came at the hands of Loyola University and two by Pepperdine.

Gil Trejo, speedy Devil forward, led the local five to an 85 to 33 victory against the Marines on November 29. Trejo hit the hoop from all over the court for 19 points and was a stellar defensive man throughout the contest.

In the second tilt, the Solar Demons were forced to come from behind to rack up their second straight win with a 58 to 54 decision over the Aztecs on December 1.

Carl Heath came through for the Devils with four quick baskets to put Arizona's ball club back in the game.

Norman Glick, towering Loyola center, scored 18 points to lead his team to a 48 to 41 victory over Coach Bill Kajikawa's five on December 3. The big boy controlled both baskets, ruining the Demon's chances for a win.

Last Friday night the Tempe team fell before a red hot Pepperdine five, 62 to 48, on the Wave's court. Leading 29 to 23 at halftime, the victors opened the final twenty minutes with seven quick baskets to sew up the game.

The following night Kajikawa's boys were handed their third straight defeat, the second in a row by Pepperdine, 49 to 37, on the California team's floor.

Controlling the boards throughout the game with two towering forwards, the Waves gave the Tempe quintet little chance to score.

Roy Hatch, Devil forward, led the losers in the scoring department with eight points.

Waves, Lions Initiate Devil Home Schedule

WITH THE GRID season a thing of the past, the athletic spotlight of Arizona State has turned to basketball as the Sun Devils tangle with the George Pepperdine Waves in the second meeting of the two clubs on the home court tomorrow night.

The Peps took the measure of the Demons during a recent barnstorming tour of the Pacific coast by the Staters. The scores of the two games were 62-48 and 49-37, respectively.

In tomorrow's game with Loyola the Devils will be out for revenge due to the 48-41 defeat they suffered on the Lions' home floor.

In tonight's contest the Waves will be led by their three timber toppers, Hugh Faulkner, 6' 7 1/2"; Bob Drummond, 6' 6"; and John Furlong, 6' 6". These three men were the big guns in the two coast games. They are very valuable in controlling the backboards both on offense and defense.

On the coast the Staters were led by Wade Oliver and Boyd Hatch, high point men in the two encounters.

Loyola will send the same team against Bill Kajikawa's men as it did in Los Angeles, and will depend on Norman Glick, 6' 8 1/2" center, who, like Pepperdine's tall men, is excellent in controlling the backboards.

Kajikawa will probably field a team consisting of Captain Ed Long, center; Trejo and Mack Larson, forwards; and Charlie Beall and Oliver, guards.

Tonight's game with George Pepperdine college has been approved by the Athletic

Council of Arizona State as a benefit game to obtain contributions to be used to buy basketballs and basketball shoes for the University of Helsinki, Finland. It is said that there are only five basketballs in all of Finland. The Finns have just returned from a tour of France where they won seven out of ten games.

Devils Stop Lobos In Homecoming Tilt

TWELVE THOUSAND spectators, including a large Homecoming crowd of students and alumni, watched the Sun Devils of Arizona State come from behind in the fourth quarter to defeat the New Mexico Lobos, 28 to 17, last Saturday night at Goodwin stadium, in a fitting climax to the week of Homecoming.

New Mexico, a two-touchdown, pre-game favorite, scored the second time they got their hands on the ball. The score board read third down and eight yards to go, when Joe Stell took off around the Lobos' right end, and after carrying the ball to the State 30, he lateralled to Jerry McKown, who raced the remaining distance for six points. McKown added the extra point, and the score was 7 to 0.

It took the Solar Demons only seven plays to tie up the game. Sammy Lewis, Wisford (Whizzer) White, and Mark Markichevich alternated carrying the ball to the visitors' two-yard line, where Markichevich carried the pig skin into the end zone. White split the uprights on the extra point and the game was all tied up.

On the first play after the kickoff, Lewis intercepted a New Mexico aerial and returned it to the Lobos' 41. Quarterback Cecil Coleman fired a pass to White on the next play, and the Mesa meteor went all the way for another Devil touchdown. White missed the placement.

The Demons recovered a fumble on the visitors' 38, and from there they went on to score three more points. After driving to the eight-yard line, the Sun Devil attack faded, but White dropped back and kicked a field goal for Tempe. The first quarter ended with the score standing 16 to 7 for the local eleven.

It looked for a while as if the second period would go without a score, but after two penalties against the Demons and some fine running by the Lobo backs, big Rudy Krall punched over on the last play of the half for a TD. Stell booted the placement, and the two teams walked from the field with the Devils leading 16 to 14.

On the first play of the fourth period, Coleman tossed to Jim Coppinger as the big Devil end was going into the end one, and Coach Ed Doherty's men had a 22-to-17 lead.

Two Coleman passes and a fine run by Markichevich put the ball in scoring position a few minutes later. Coleman went across on a quarterback sneak. On the last two touchdowns, White kicked the extra points on the first try, but on each attempt, the Devils were off side, and on the second kick failed, leaving the final score 28 to 17.

 10. Dormitories (other half

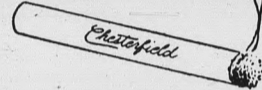
