

Views split on upcoming abortion vote

ASU students react

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Arizona could revert to the days before 1973 — the year abortion was legalized in the United States - if Proposition 110 is passed by voters.

"It is inconceivable to make (abortion) illegal," said Caroline Cohen, president of ASU Students for Choice.

"I am praying that we will defeat the proposition. But if it passes, the consequences will be dire.'

Proposition 110, initiated by Arizonans for Common Sense, is the preborn child protection amendment to the Arizona Constitution whose aim is to ban all abortion with the exception of rape and incest cases or to save the life of the mother.

A petition to place Proposition 110 on the November ballot was submitted to the state with a record 225,000 signatures on Aug. 12. But on Sept. 18, the Arizona Superior Court struck down the referendum because of a provision that would prohibit using public funds to pay for an abortion. The court said it is unconstitutional to combine public funding for abortion and illegalization of abortion on one referendum. However, just days later, the Arizona Supreme Court overruled the lower court's decision, saying it was too late to remove the proposition from the ballot.

The anti-abortion initiative started because of a high number of abortions in TURN TO PROPOSITION, PAGE 7.



With little more than a month until the 1992 presidential election, Texas billionaire Ross Perot ended widespread speculation Thursday at a Dallas news conference with his announcement that he is reentering the presidential race.

'By choosing me as your candidate you have given me the highest honor I could ever receive," he told supporters. "You've written, called and urged me to run.'

After Perot's abrupt withdrawal from the race this summer, persistent supporters managed to place the on-again, off-again candidate on ballots in all 50 states. On Sept. 18, Arizona was the last state to place him on the ballot.

'My decision in July hurt you and I apologize," he said. "I thought I was doing the right thing, but I made a mistake.'

New state law dries up nights for underagers Clubs anticipate loss

Underage nightclub patrons who take advantage of over-under nights at some bars will have to find other places to go because of a new state law that prohibits indoor clubs from admitting underage people while alcohol is being served.

Arizona Revised Statute 4-244, passed by the state Legislature three months ago and enacted Wednesday, prohibits nightclubs from allowing a person under the legal drinking age of 21 to remain on the premises during hours when the primary business is the sale of alcohol. "It got to the point where we were getting so many reports of things like 37-year-old guys passing drinks over to 17-year-old girls because there was just a rope or something separating the underage kids from people who were drinking," said Mark Mazzie, superintendent of the State Department of Liquor Licenses. One of the clubs that will suffer financial hardship under the new law is After The Gold Rush, 1216 E. Apache Blvd. Brad Low, general manager of the club, said crowds of TURN TO OVER, PAGE 6.

Perot said he decided to re-enter the race after supporters, disconcerted with candidates Gov. Bill Clinton and President George Bush, requested that he formally announce his candidacy.

"I promise you I will give it everything I have, but it's in your hands," he said. "I can't do this job without your continued support."

The independent candidate announced that his running mate is James Stockdale, a retired admiral who was a prisoner of war in Vietnam.

During his 15-minute televised press conference, Perot expressed concern over the current American political system, which he believes attracts "ego-driven, power-hungry people."



Honors students mount Lawrence recall effort

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STATE PRESS Two days after the Associated Students of ASU Senate failed to remove Activities Vice President Kate Lawrence from office, students are forging a recall effort to boot the troubled VP from the MU's third floor.

'(Lawrence) should no longer be in office," said Casey Fleck, an Honors College business senior who is helping to organize the recall drive. "One of the important things is that the student body is being given the impression that Kate Lawrence speaks and represents the Honors College. We resent the association between Lawrence and the Honors College."

Fleck said he and Leah Campos, Honors College political science junior, had petitions printed Thursday night and hope to have them filled with the signatures of students dissatisfied with Lawrence's performance.

Campos said she has spoken to at least a dozen students who will circulate the petitions. She said if enough signatures are not collected today and over the weekend, she and Fleck will set up a booth on Cady Mall Monday to finish collecting the signatures.

Lawrence was found guilty Tuesday on the three charges against her, and by an overwhelming majority on the charge that she fired Homecoming Director Tracey Kieselbach improperly. However, the Senate failed to obtain the number of votes needed to convict Lawrence, allowing her to remain in office.

Lawrence could not be reached for comment.

The ASASU constitution requires that for a recall to go through, petitions must have the signatures of at least 5 percent of the total number of ASU students registered with one or more hours for the semester. The constitution also requires the signatures and identification numbers to be validated by the registrar's office.

According to assistant registrar Mary Neary, the recall effort will need 2,176 signatures to be successful. The number includes graduate as well as undergraduate students.

Neary said verification would take no more than 48 hours, with the registrar staff checking

the enrollment status of each individual student who signs the recall petition.

Neary said the cost of validating the signatures would be absorbed by the registrar's office as a service to ASU students.

If the recall is successful, however, a special election would have to be called by ASASU's executive committee, which ASASU would have to pay for. According to ASASU adviser Gary Kleeman, it is not certain how much the special election would cost, although Kleeman said general elections in the past have cost "several thousand dollars."

Kleeman said the special election would probably cost a fraction of a general election since it can only deal with one specific issue the recall of Lawrence.

A recall election could remove Lawrence with a simple majority of student vote, provided that the total number of votes in the special election represents at least three-fourths of the number of votes that put Lawrence into office.

Before Tuesday's chaotic impeachment trial, Campos and Honors College justice studies major Keith Parrella circulated a petition urging Honors College Sens. Alberto Reyes and Margy Cummings to vote for the ouster of Lawrence.

After the two senators voted against removing Lawrence, Campos said she was "ashamed" of Cummings and Reyes.

However, Cummings and Reyes contended at the time of the trial that the 73 Honors College petition signatures could not be considered a valid statement of opinion because there was not ample time to check the validity of the signatures.

Reves also said that some students who signed the petition complained of "deceitful methods" used by petitioners in obtaining signatures.

However, Parrella said the current recall petition effort "will show the validity of the earlier petition."

If Lawrence is removed by a recall election, ASASU President Scott Maasen would appoint an eligible student to fill the post left vacant by her departure. The Senate would have to approve the appointment.



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

Perot factor could throw election

October entry adds wild card element to race

WASHINGTON — In the heady days of May, Ross Perot was a potential president. Now, he's likely no more than potential spoiler, but nonetheless a wild card who could reshuffle the deck in the campaign's closing weeks.

The Perot Factor was reintroduced to presidential politics Thursday, 11 weeks to the day after the Texas billionaire abandoned plans to run, saying he had concluded he could not win.

Now, with just 33 days to Election Day, Perot is back in the race, with even slimmer odds of winning. Indeed, 72 percent of

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respondents in a new **CNN-USA** Today poll said there was 'no chance'' they would vote for Perot. Many analysts

view his re-entry as a selfish attempt at redemption by a

political novice who failed to realize what he was getting into months ago and now wants to heal a wounded ego.

"The reasons he gave for withdrawing from the race are as valid now as they were then, so I see no other rationale for re-entering," said political science professor Emmett Buell Jr. of Ohio's Denison University. "It's obvious he would like to be crowned rather than go through an election."

Whatever his motivation - or chances -Perot is back, and he has the potential to affect the race even if he never leaves third place.

First, Perot could help President Bush in the short term just by shaking up a race that had been stagnant for more than a month, with Democrat Bill Clinton well ahead - by 17 points in the CNN-USA Today poll. Debates, still being negotiated, offer a second vehicle to stir the campaign dynamics.

Anything that tosses this race up in the air and is an unknown is a good thing for Bush." said Republican pollster Bill McInturff.

It may take a while to assess Perot's broader impact, but there are obvious things to watch and both campaigns have reason to WOITY

Perot has never disguised his disdain for Bush and already is preparing to launch television advertisements. With a personal fortune and no spending limits to worry about, Perot could easily affect the race if he decided to attack one candidate and leave the other alone.

"For all the uncertainty about Perot, we know one thing: he doesn't care for George Bush," said Andrew Kohut of Princeton Survey Research.

And despite his comfortable lead, even Clinton predicts a natural tightening of the race as the election draws closer

If that happens, Perot could prove the difference in many states.

Clinton now leads in Ohio, for example, but it is a GOP-leaning state and spring surveys showed Perot drawing more support from Clinton.

With Perot as the joker in the deck, it could make a critical difference in Ohio,' said Buell.

The reverse is the case in some other states, particularly in the South, where surveys show Perot draws more from Bush.

"It certainly boosts the chances of Clinton carrying Texas," said University of Texas professor Walter Dean Burnham, who studies voting behavior.

As he rejoined the race, Perot said he was running to win. But it's hard to find an analyst who thinks he can.

"The last week has been a charade,' said independent California pollster Mervin Field, who believes Perot is now reduced to protest candidate, a view shared by many other analysts.

Even if Perot gets a sudden burp in the polls, Burnham predicted, "once his supporters decide they've done their job of sending a message they will choose among one of the candidates likely to win."


Behind such thinking is a belief that a Perot win is no longer a threat, because of a combination of factors including disillusionment among early supporters, critical media coverage of insider dealings that belie Perot's outsider rhetoric, new accounts of his use of private investigators to do background checks on even his campaign volunteers and reports that Perot spent millions to keep his campaign operation intact after insisting he would not run.

'This guy shot himself in the foot, the hands, the arms," said McInturff, whose surveys show Perot with a higher negative rating than either Bush or Clinton. "The way he handled his pullout removed him as a credible challenger for the presidency.

Still, McInturff and others don't discount Perot's potential as a spoiler.

'If he hurts Clinton by taking change votes, it's theoretical that Bush can win the presidency with 45 or 46 percent of the vote," McInturff said. Democrats say that won't happen. Yet they don't dispute Perot's potential influence.

"He is not the candidate now that he was two months ago and he is not even the candidate now that he was two weeks ago,' said Clinton pollster Stanley Greenberg. "But obviously if the race gets very close then Perot is going to be a factor."

Who is H. Ross Perot?

DALLAS — He's worth about \$3.5 billion. He owns a copy of the Magna Carta. He donated horses to the New York City police. He put together a commando team to rescue Americans trapped in a foreign land. Now he wants to be president.

"I keep having to remind people I am mainly a myth," says Ross Perot, who journeyed from middle class to billionaire tycoon.

On Thursday, Perot's equally extraordinary political path took another twist as he formally entered the presidential race.

He cast himself as a reluctant political warrior, forced to oblige the die-hard volunteers who put him on 50 ballots. Yet he bankrolled their efforts for 2'2 months after dropping his undeclared candidacy.


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The wiry, wisecracking Perot grew up in Texarkana, which straddles the Texas-Arkansas border 160 miles east of Dallas. The son of a cotton broker and homemaker, Perot calls his parents 'heroes.'

After graduating from Texarkana Junior College, Perot entered the Naval Academy, serving on a destroyer and aircraft carrier from 1953 to 1957.

In 1955, angered by a senior officer and confused by the terms of his service obligation, Perot sought help from Texans in Congress to get out of the Navy. But he couldn't and was reassigned to another

ship. Still, the Navy instilled in Perot a passion for the military that crops up in his everyday action and language.

U.S. missiles accidentally hit Turkish ship

WASHINGTON — A U.S. aircraft carrier accidentally blasted a Turkish destroyer with missile fire Thursday during a NATO exercise, setting the vessel ablaze and killing at least seven people, Pentagon officials said.

Initial reports indicated at least 15 other members of the Turkish crew were injured, but there were no reports of U.S. Navy casualties, said a Pentagon spokeswoman, Maj. Katherine Ingram. The USS Saratoga aircraft carrier accidentally launched two Sea Sparrow missiles during maneuvers in the eastern Mediterranean and apparently hit the Turkish destroyer Mauvenet with both missiles, officials said.

Ingram said one missile hit the bridge of the Mauvenet, an area of the ship that controls navigation. A fire broke out but was extinguished in 15 minutes, the spokeswoman said.

"It was an accidental launching," Ingram said. Crewmen from the Saratoga were dropped onto the stricken ship by helicopter to help with the rescue. A multinational contingent of ships in the region also rushed to the vessel's aid.

It was not known how many crew members the Mauvenet was carrying.

Ingram said the accident occurred about midnight local

time (3 p.m. Arizona time) in the Aegean Sea, an arm of the Mediterranean between Turkey and Greece. The two U.S. and Turkish ships were about three miles apart at the time.

Both ships were taking part in "Display Determination," an annual NATO exercise consisting of vessels from the southern NATO region, the Pentagon said. The exercise usually involves the United States, Turkey, Greece and Italy.

U.S. Navy officials were dispatched to the Mauvenet, a 376-foot destroyer, to assess damages and injuries to Turkish allied crew. The USS Belknap, flagship for Adm. William Lopez, commander of the U.S. Navy's 6th Fleet, was headed for the scene Thursday night.

The Mauvenet was formerly the American Robert H. Smith-class destroyer commissioned in 1944. It was transferred to Turkey in 1971 after having been converted for minelaying

The 1,063-foot Saratoga is a conventionally powered aircraft carrier commissioned in 1956. It was among the first class of carriers designed specifically to launch jet aircraft.

The Sea Sparrow missile is a scaled-down version of the Sparrow, which is used on fighter aircraft such as the F-14 and F-15. It is modified for use on board surface ships so that it could be launched against attacking aircraft and Cruise missiles.

Better never than late

Standing in front of hundreds of news media in Dallas on Thursday, and broadcasting to millions of viewers around the nation, Ross Perot dramatically and boldly announced that he was throwing his hat in the ring as a contender for the presidency.

If you didn't know any better, you'd think Perot was making the speech on day one of the presidential campaign. He was the quintessential candidate, oozing confidence as he trumpeted his candidacy as the best thing for a nation led astray by the nasty men and women inside the beltway.

But the real truth of the day was that Perot wasn't announcing his candidacy on day one, but rather was entering the race a mere 33 days before the nation goes to cast its votes for the presidency.

Or to put it in horse racing terms, Perot entered the race not at the starting gate, but before the final turn, heading into a homestretch that promises an all-out, ugly struggle between Bill Clinton, the Democratic nominee, President George Bush and Hero Perot.

Fairness aside, the very nature of Perot's motives deserve careful examination.

Perot withdrew his name in July because he said he did not wish to go down in history as a "spoiler" in a race that was forming around the two major candidates, and was looking like it would exclude Perot as a major player.

So, looking very much like the petulant partypooper that he has been known to be, Perot swiped his hat out of the ring and left his thousands of volunteers hanging in the wind like so many wasted dreams.

Now, purportedly at the behest of those same star-struck volunteers, Hero Perot has donned his cape again and on Thursday stood before us all to reclaim his place as our savior.

But, apparently unknown to him, Perot is still nothing more than the spoiler he was two months ago.

In a poll completed this week by CNN and USA Today, Perot is raking in a meager 7 percent of the nation's support, a number that would put him in the middle ranks among third-party candidates were he to finish at that level on election day.

Perot attempted to justify reentrance into the fray by saying neither Clinton nor Bush had adequately addressed the issues Americans want addressed, primarily the federal deficit.

But what Perot is really doing is manipulating the very same Americans he says he wants to support.

Perot, who decries the lack of backbone our governmental participants have today, has shown the least backbone of all the presidential candidates to date.

It doesn't take a lot of courage to wait until the last minute to enter a presidential race.

It does take a lot of gumption to presume the



Suspension highlights KKK message

A young Caucasian male was suspended Tuesday from Saguaro High School in Scottsdale.

After all, Caucasians have it so bad here in America.


Let me also say that the Ku Klux Klan is totally justified in advocating a separate white nation, demanding equal rights for whites and discouraging race mixing.

Why is he ducking the debates? It depends on who you want to believe.

In private, some of Bush's people say that Bush has little or nothing to gain by debating a glib talker like Clinton. about 350 underage patrons were visiting the club on weekend nights at a \$6 admission charge.

"It obviously doesn't help us financially," Low said. "I really don't know why (the Legislature) did that, because we've never had any problems with alcohol during over-under nights. I think (the law) is a little ridiculous, if you ask me."

At After The Gold Rush, the sections for overage and underage patrons were separated by an 8-foot-high partition made from plexiglass. Both age groups were allowed on the dance floor, but a hand stamp detectable by ultraviolet light was needed for re-entry into the section where alcohol is served.

Low said that he felt this setup minimized potential problems. But he said his nightclub did not have a chance to present its viewpoint to the Legislature because the law had been passed by the time club executives found out about it.

"We usually have a turnout of about 350 kids on the

weekends, so I guess they'll all have to go to Mill Avenue, and the cops can deal with them there," Low said.

Mazzie said the law came under serious discussion when several local police agencies contacted the SDLL, saying they were having problems policing the acquisition of alcohol by minors at such clubs, whether it be inside the facility or in the parking lot.

When asked about the new law, Sgt. Al Taylor, a spokesman for the Tempe Police Department, said he was unaware of it. But he added that it would be a "positive" piece of legislation.

Taylor said his department has had constant problems with nightclub incidents involving underage people, and added that he did not know if Tempe police had talked to SDLL officials about the problem.

"The mix of the people in the same building — some who are drinking alcohol, some who aren't - we're not for that mix," Taylor said. "Problems from that stretch out not only around the facility, but to adjoining ones as well. Obviously, (the new law) is a good move, in our opinion."

The law only applies to premises whose primary use is the sale of alcohol. Facilities whose main use is for participatory recreation - such as concert halls or clubs - are not affected by the law.

Bob Stockmar, general manager of Club Rio, 430 N. Scottsdale Road, said that his nightclub stopped having overunder nights about three years ago because it had been rumored that the new law was coming.

"We pretty much decided that we might as well let only age 21 and above in and not have to deal with it," Stockmar said. "It was the best thing, I think. Anyway, we soon found that having 18-year-olds in there kills a bar-like atmosphere."

Arizona used as a form of birth control, said Michelle Tucker, communications director for Arizonans for Common Sense

"Arizonans don't believe murder is the answer," said Tucker, who believes the initiative will pass because Arizonans want to ban abortion.

She said there are 15,000 abortions in Arizona each year costing anywhere between \$250 and \$8,000 each.

Tucker added that polls have indicated that Arizonans want restrictions put on abortion. However, according to a July KAET poll, only 23 percent of Arizonans favor greater restrictions on abortion. About 32 percent want to make it easier to get an abortion and 38 percent desired the law to remain in its current form.

Cohen said if abortion were to be made illegal, there is a possibility that people would go back to back-alley or self-induced

abortions, neither of them legal or safe.

Cohen said the wording of the proposition is very misleading. She said the word "preborn" makes the proposition sound positive, but the consequences are not positive.

Georganne Scheiner, adviser of Students for Choice and an ASU women's studies professor, said she believes the proposition is going to pass, contrary to what she supports.

The proposition was coupled with the idea that there will be no public funds used toward abortion except in the case of the mother's life being in danger. Scheiner said linking the two was a good way to gain support.

Jay Nenniger, executive director of Arizona Right to Life, said the proposition is aimed at ending abortion as a form of birth control. Nenniger said 95 percent of abortions in Arizona are strictly for birth control reasons.

people in the country to come to serve and to go back home and go to work," he said. "We can make the political process responsible and relevant.

Perot said that, unlike his opponents, he will not skirt the issues that directly affect the American people.

Meanwhile at ASU, faculty and students agree that Perot does not have a chance of winning the presidential election. However, there is a difference in opinion concerning whether or not his re-entering the race will have an impact.

"I don't think it was a bad decision. He gives the voters another opportunity," said Mark Kilduff, a junior marketing major, who, along with 60 other students in the MU TV lounge, watched Perot's address.

Kilduff said there are a lot of voters who are dissatisfied with Bush and Clinton. Richard Herrera, a political science associate professor, said he does not think it was a good decision for Perot to re-enter the race because he is not going to win.

"I think he got in because he wanted to try to re-establish his reputation and satisfy his ego," Herrera said.

Ashash Parakh, a computer information systems graduate student, said one of the positive points about Perot entering the race is it will force the other two candidates to take a stronger stand on certain issues.

A non-partisan Rocky Mountain Poll released Sept. 23 showed Perot trailing both Clinton (36 percent) and Bush (31 percent) with 17 percent of likely Arizona voters. Before dropping out in July, Perot had 26 percent of votes and was in second place, three points ahead of Bush and only two behind Clinton. The poll is based on 500 interviews with Arizona citizens from Sept. 20-21, and has a 4.5 percent margin of error.

Petition halts 'takings' law passage; bill put on hold

A coalition of Arizona environmentalists, community groups, religious organizations and Democratic Party leaders has succeeded, at least temporarily, in preventing a controversial private property protection bill from becoming law.

The bill would have become state law Thursday but for the last-minute submission of 70,000 signatures on petitions to Secretary of State Richard Mahoney in favor of a referendum that would repeal the bill.

Signatures were submitted after 1992 ballots were printed so the proposition will appear on the 1994 ballot if signatures are validated.

"I'm relieved," Dana Larsen, state director of Common Cause, said.

"It's on hold," he added, referring to the delay in the bill becoming law.

He said the bill, which was passed by the Legislature and signed by Gov. J. Fife Symington last spring, would be "on hold" at least until after the secretary of state's office had validated the petition signatures.

Linda Lairson, a project director in the secretary of state's office who is in charge of counting and verifying signatures, said she didn't know when the validation process would be completed.

The petitions must contain 52,771 signatures of registered Arizona voters.

The bill's supporters say it is a precaution against excessive governmental interference in commerce, while its opponents say it will either bankrupt the state or undermine the enforcement of environmental protection and public health and safety laws.

The bill evokes eminent domain laws, which ensure that when a government agency "takes" property the owner is justly compensated.

Senate Bill 1053, if it becomes law, would require the state to compensate private property owners, including giant corporations, for any decrease in the

profitability of their holdings as a result of any law or regulation, Larsen said.

Rep. Mark Killian, R-Mesa, House majority leader, was the author and chief sponsor of the bill, which was co-sponsored Sen. Gus Arzberger, D-Wilcox.

Killian said his motivation for the bill was that the federal government had lost \$160 million in the last three years because of "takings"-related law suits, and he wanted to offer legislation to give state agencies guidelines to help them avoid similar pitfalls.

The Take Back Your Rights Committee, the group that organized the statewide petition drive, has dubbed the bill the "Polluters' Protection Act" to draw attention to their fear that the bill will compel the state government to choose between enforcing anti-pollution and public health laws or paying billions to large businesses because the laws have dug into their profits.

"It would bankrupt state government," Larsen said.

Rather than let that happen, Larsen said, it is his prediction that the state would simply stop enforcing any laws that might cause the loss of profits in the private sector.

Killian said the fears of the bill's opponents are unfounded because the bill has provisions against compensating for illegal acts and the law requires the Arizona attorney general to draw up specific guidelines, taking into account U.S. Supreme Court decisions defining "takings."

He said that if the secretary of state approves the Take Back Your Rights Committee petitions, a group of more than 50 business, labor, farm and ranch organizations stand ready to challenge the petitions in court.

"I believe the majority of Arizona voters are going to support the bill (S.B. 1053) once they know about it," Killian said.

Joni Bosh, Take Back Your Rights Committee state coordinator, said the secretary of state's office told her that it could be the end of October or the beginning of November before the signatures are validated.

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



That someone has some big shoes to fill. That someone is Jerone Davison.


"It's going to be Jerone Davison's show," ASU coach Bruce Snyder said. "He'll get a chance now to show what he can do.

Special teams crucial key for ASU

When the ASU football team attends a screening of The Last of the Mohicans in Eugene tonight, as a relaxation mechanism for tomorrow's game with Oregon, the players will see a variety of special effects.

It is special teams, not effects, which the Sun Devils must improve upon in order to achieve victory, according to Sun Devil coach Bruce Snyder.

"Just every area (of special teams) showed up a weakness," Snyder said, regarding last week's 45-21 loss at Nebraska.

The first-year coach cited several instances in which special team blunders led to misfortune:

Last week, the Sun Devils were forced to start their first two drives from inside their own 10-yard line because of penalties assessed on the kickoff.

"That's brutal to start a game like that," Snyder said. A fumble by punt returner Adam Brass deep in ASU territory

set up a Nebraska touchdown. Nebraska had a 50-vard kickoff return which led to another score

ASU punter Steve Rausch had subpar kicks of 34 and 39 yards.

"If we don't get (these problems) solved, it is going to be a long year," Snyder said. "We've just got to get better. And we've done some things this week that, I think, will do it."

One maneuver Snyder and his staff have made is moving more starters, such as linebackers Brett Wallerstedt and Justin Dragoo, to

This is a common quotation used by historians - but it's also a personal philosophy practiced by ASU sophomore Trip Kuehne.

Kuehne, a top contender on the ASU's men's golf squad, is an avid golf historian. In his spare time, the sophomore standout said he enjoys reading about former golf legends.

Kuehne, a native Texan, said he has extensively researched the career of former PGA player Ben Hogan. Hogan, a green star on the professional circuit in the 1940s and 50s, was making birdies long before Kuehne was born.

"I have tried to improve myself and my swing by doing research on Ben Hogan," said Kuehne, who professed to learn Hogan's swing from his golf teacher, Hank Haney

While Kuehne may study other golfers, it doesn't stop him from looking back on his own past experiences on the links and learning from them.

He reflected on a tourney last season, where he said he

played below expectations.

It was at the Rebel Classic in Las Vegas and Kuehne struggled. He ended up with a 13-over 85 in his final round. It marked the first time in three years that Kuehne said he had shot over 80.

"It was one of those deals where I tried every single shot. I just couldn't hit a decent ball or do anything right," he said.

Kuehne described the experience as "humiliating" and he said he thinks about it often.

"Whenever I sit on the couch and eat potato chips and watch TV, I'll think about it and how it happened," Kuehne said. "But I use it as a motivating force to practice and get better every day."

The extra practice has proved to be fruitful.

Kuehne got off to a strong start in the 1992-93 season, as he posted a third-place finish at last month's Fox Acres Invitational in Colorado. His even-par performance helped the Sun Devils push over the hump for a second place finish.

Golfweek magazine has projected him as a third team All-American for this season, a rating that Todd Rolfus, the Sun Devil's interim coach, said should improve

"I think realistically he could be much higher than that after the season is over," Rolfus said.

Kuehne's work ethic on the golf course has apparently carried over into the classroom. The psychology major has an

points than it did all of last season. In addition, Oregon has an impressive rushing attack — very similar to the one at ASU.

"Their rushing attack has really improved," Snyder said. "I think they're going to come out and pound the ball at us.'

Oregon coach Rich Brooks has seen the Sun Devil defense on tape, and he isn't too happy about what he has seen.

"They have an outstanding defense and we will be concerned whether we will be able to move the ball with any consistency against their pressure eight-man defense," Brooks said.

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

The Sun Devils, shooting to defend last year's tournament win at Ping, are scheduled to compete against Kentucky, Arizona, UNLV and Arkansas.


Teams will first play 36 holes on the par 72, 7,081yard course. A final round of 18 holes will be played on Saturday.


Kuehne will try to equal or surpass the success he had at Fox Acres. The sophomore led all Sun Devils as he broke even par and placed third in the individual standings.

Sophomore Derrick Land has been tabbed to return kickoffs, filling the spot left by injured running back Mario Bates.

"He's got great speed," Arbuckle said of Land. "We have a great person stepping into that role."

Snyder said that no changes will be made in the current punting situation but expressed desire for its improvement.

We've just really emphasized to Steve Rausch that he's got to settle down and punt that ball properly — with rhythm, with confidence," Snyder said.

Many players, such as freshman inside linebacker Sam Santana, are eager to test out the new personnel changes.

"I think, basically, coach Arbuckle is doing a good job with us, he's switching a lot of people around," said Santana, who plays a variety of special team positions.

"You've just got to concentrate on your responsibilities. Everybody has their responsibility on a special team. If you do your job, and if everybody else does their job, it's going to work.'

Arbuckle said he is pleased with the performance of kicker Mike Richey. Richey has hit 5 of 6 point-after tries and has converted all three field goal attempts.

"I think Mike Richey has been doing a really fine job for us," Arbuckle said.

Richey's spot is one of the few stable positions within the revamped special teams. But with the newly-implemented changes, the coaching staff is optimistic that the performances among the special teams will improve. "There are mistakes that we have to clean

up, and I really believe we're going to do that," Arbuckle said. "We know we made errors which were costly to us."

Canseco, La Russa still giving each other shots

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Jose Canseco and the Oakland Athletics sound more like the Trumps than baseball people these days.

"If he had never said anything, I never would have," Oakland manager Tony La Russa said. "But I don't want our fans getting only one side of the story.

Before the A's 7-3 loss to the Texas Rangers - and Canseco - on Wednesday night, La Russa uncharacteristically took half an hour to address charges Canseco made the previous night.

"We not only supported him, we protected him, and we humiliated ourselves to do it," La Russa said. "I would tell halftruths in order to keep things private."

La Russa added that one word summed up his feelings about Canseco's outburst: "Betraval."

"You're talking about betrayal?" Canseco shot back later. "I'm a guy who has been in the organization for 10 years."

Of the charges the team lied for him, Canseco replied: "That's obscene. That's ridiculous.

On Tuesday night, Canseco accused his former Oakland teammates of never accepting him. He said he was labeled as lazy even when he was in too much pain to play. And he spoke with bitterness about his unceremonious trade to Texas Aug. 31.

"First of all, I was never accepted over there," Canseco said. "They alienated me big-time. They had all of these cliques.'

The problem seemed solved when Canseco was pulled from a game in late August and told he had been traded to

Texas for outfielder Ruben Sierra and pitchers Bobby Witt and Jeff Russell.

In days following the trade, Canseco criticized La Russa, and he stepped up the verbal attack on Tuesday night, when he

returned to the Oakland Coliseum for the first time since the trade. "No matter how hard I worked, that (laziness) will always be my label, Canseco said before the game. "I can look anybody in the eye, including Tony, and tell them I was playing even when I was

dying in pain." La Russa wouldn't cite specific instances where Canseco had problems with the team, but said Canseco was an example of what's wrong in the major leagues.

"It is something that goes on a lot in baseball. A lot of organizations protect a player so the public doesn't hold the player accountable," he said.

Canseco said he was especially stung by the implication that he didn't play to his full ability.

"Do you think anybody can do what I did in baseball without working at it?" he said.

Canseco cited the 1990 Oakland loss in the World Series to Cincinnati as an example of the team's lack of support for him. At the time, Canseco was criticized for his fielding.

"Jose was blamed for that whole World Series," Canseco said. "That's obscene. Is that an organization that backs up its players? That's a joke.'



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
